



## 2013 ASSEMBLY BILL 477

November 1, 2013 - Introduced by Representatives BARCA, RINGHAND, BEWLEY, KAHL, JORGENSEN, GOYKE, KOLSTE, WRIGHT, BERCEAU and KESSLER, cosponsored by Senators LASSA, SCHULTZ, LEHMAN and ERPENBACH. Referred to Committee on Jobs, Economy and Mining.

1     **AN ACT** *to create* 238.137 of the statutes; **relating to:** entrepreneurial  
2           assistance grants and making an appropriation.

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### *Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau*

This bill authorizes the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) to award a grant of up to \$3,000 to a new business for the business's expenses related to hiring, as a paid intern, a student enrolled at an institution of higher education who studies business, engineering, information technology, or a similar field (entrepreneurial assistance grant). Under the bill, a new business is a business organized in this state no earlier than five years before the business applies for an entrepreneurial assistance grant. Additionally, if WEDC awards an entrepreneurial assistance grant to three or more businesses to fund internships for students enrolled at a single institution of higher education, and the institution develops a program to support internships funded by these grants, WEDC may award an additional grant of up to \$25,000 to the institution. Finally, this bill requires WEDC to allocate at least \$125,000 in each fiscal year to fund grants authorized under the bill and to submit a report on the effectiveness of those grants to the legislature no later than February 1, 2017.

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*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

3           **SECTION 1.** 238.137 of the statutes is created to read:

1           **238.137 Entrepreneurial assistance grants. (1)** In this section:

2           (a) “Institution of higher education” means an institution within the University  
3 of Wisconsin System, a technical college, or a private, nonprofit institution of higher  
4 education located in this state.

5           (b) “New business” means a business organized in this state on a date not more  
6 than 60 months before the date on which the business applies for a grant under sub.  
7 (2).

8           **(2)** The corporation may award a grant of up to \$3,000 to a new business for  
9 the business’s expenses in hiring as a paid intern a student who is enrolled in an  
10 institution of higher education for the business to assist in conducting research,  
11 marketing, business plan development, or other functions relating to the creation of  
12 a new business. A recipient may use the grant under this subsection only for the  
13 recipient’s expenses in hiring students in the field of business, engineering, or  
14 information technology or in a similar field, as determined by the corporation.

15           **(3)** If the corporation awards grants under sub. (2) to 3 or more businesses to  
16 fund internships for students enrolled in a single institution of higher education, and  
17 the institution of higher education develops a program to facilitate internships  
18 funded with grants under sub. (2), the corporation may award a grant of up to  
19 \$25,000 to the institution of higher education for costs associated with hiring interns  
20 under sub. (2), including faculty or staff time and curriculum development. If the  
21 corporation lacks sufficient funds to award grants to all qualified applicants, the  
22 department shall allocate available funds to applicants that have the greatest  
23 potential to create jobs in this state.
