JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

WHEREAS, The University of Wisconsin plans for a Win the War for Permanent Peace Convention under the auspices of the League to Enforce Peace, William Howard Taft, president, on November 8 and 9, 1918; and

WHEREAS, The objects are

To sustain the determination of our people to fight until Prussian Militarism shall have been forever crushed,

To confirm opposition to a premature peace,

- To focus attention on the only advantage to the United States from this war—a Permanent Peace guaranteed by the League of Nations, and
- To support the president to the uttermost in his efforts to make good for the World the American Declaration of Independence, and
