JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1.

Relating to the death and public services of Honorable Herman Bjorn Dahle.

Honorable Herman Bjorn Dahle, formerly a member of congress from this state, died at his home in Mount Horeb on April 29, 1920.

Mr. Dahle was born March 30, 1855, in the town of Perry, Dane county, which county remained his home until his death. He received his education in the common schools of his native town and in the state university. At the age of twenty-two he entered the mercantile business at Mount Vernon, but later moved to Mount Horeb, where he continued in the same business and in addition that of banking.

He was elected to congress in 1898 and again in 1900, where he served with distinction for four years the counties of Columbia, Dane, Dodge and Jefferson.

In public life Mr. Dahle was firm in his adherence to his convictions, loyal and unselfish in his friendship and in the support of men and measures, sturdy in his independence, and in every way a useful and highly respected servant of his fellowmen. In his business career as merchant and banker he won success by methods of integrity, intelligence and industry, and this long and honorable business career in which no man can point to a dishonorable act gave him the profound respect of the people in whose midst he lived. His death has left a personal loss among the ranks of his many friends. It has removed one who had long been an effective force for good in his community and in his state until death called him from his active labors. Now, therefore, in recognition of Mr. Dahle's useful and devoted service to his fellowmen, both in his private and public capacity, be it
