## CHAPTER 140.

AN ACT to amend and revise chapter 20 and to make divers other changes in the statutes and session laws relating to state finances and appropriations, constituting the executive budget bill of the 1933 legislature, and making appropriations.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. (15.001) (1) There is created an executive council to consist of \* \* \* *three* senators and \* \* \* *three* assemblymen, appointed as are standing committees in the respective houses, and of \* \* \* *six* other citizens appointed by the governor without confirmation. All appointments shall expire with the term of the governor during which they were made, and vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments are made.

15.11 BUDGET BILL. With the state budget report the governor shall transmit a budget bill, incorporating all recommendations for appropriations for the succeeding biennium made by him. Such bill shall be drawn in legislative form as a single appropriation bill. Immediately after the delivery of the budget message, this bill shall be introduced without change by the joint committee on finance in \* \* \* *either the assembly or the senate as it may direct* and when so introduced shall be referred to the joint committee on finance. Such bill shall bear the caption, "Executive Budget Bill."

(20.07) (1) *INTEREST ON CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS*. Annually, on June first, \* \* \* such \* \* \* sums as may be necessary for the payment of interest charges on unretired certificates of indebtedness to the trust funds, to be computed and disbursed as follows: On or before the tenth day of May the secretary of state shall compute the interest accruing on all the certificates of indebtedness belonging to each fund sep-

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arately, up to and including the following thirty-first day of May, and place the amount of such interest to the credit of the income of such fund and enter a credit upon the several certificates for the amount found due on each, and thereupon certify the amount so found due to the officer authorized by law to apportion the income of each such fund, and also certify to the treasurer such amount, who shall thereupon enter a like credit upon the several duplicates deposited in his office. Thereafter upon receiving the apportionments of the incomes of the several funds the amounts so apportioned shall be audited and paid out of the state treasury to the person authorized by law to receive the same.

(20.18) (2) (a) From time to time such sums as may be necessary, to be credited and charged on taxes, as provided in sections 46.10, \* \* \* 51.08, 51.12, 51.26, 51.27, 51.28, and 58.06 of the statutes.

(20.25) PUBLIC SCHOOL AIDS. (Introductory paragraph) There is appropriated annually from the general fund to the several counties, towns, cities and villages of the state for the support of elementary public schools, *upon the certification of the state superintendent:*

(1) *Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, two hundred thousand dollars \* \* \** for salaries and expense of supervising teachers as provided in subsections (6) and (7) of section 39.14.

(2) \* \* \* *Two hundred thousand dollars* for transportation and tuition of pupils as provided in section 40.34.

(3) \* \* \* *Four million three hundred seventy-five thousand dollars* for the payment of the aids for the support of the elementary public schools provided for in section 40.87.

(20.26) (2) ANNUAL STATE AID. Annually, *beginning \* \* \* July \* \* \* 1, 1933, \* \* \* one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars* for state aid to state graded and junior high schools, to be distributed as provided in subsection (1) of section 40.39.

(20.27) (4) TEACHERS' TRAINING COURSES. Annually, *beginning \* \* \* July 1, 1933,* for state aid to free high schools or public schools whose course of study is equivalent to that of a free high school, for a teachers' training course maintained, pursuant to section 40.45, for a period of not less than nine months during the school year in a manner satisfactory to the state superintendent, an amount equal to the sum expended for the wages of the fully approved and qualified teachers em-

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ployed in such teachers' training course, not to exceed an aggregate total to all high schools of \* \* \* *seventeen* thousand dollars.

(20.31) (2) COUNTY NORMAL SCHOOLS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* *1933*, \* \* \* *two hundred* thousand dollars, for county normals and joint county normal schools, organized, equipped and maintained pursuant to sections 41.36 to 41.46, to be distributed as provided in section 41.44.

(20.31) (3) COUNTY SCHOOLS OF AGRICULTURE AND DOMESTIC SCIENCE. Annually, *beginning* \* \* \* July \* \* \* *1, 1933*, *sixteen thousand dollars* \* \* \* for state aid to county schools and joint county schools of agriculture and domestic economy organized, equipped and maintained pursuant to sections 41.47 to 41.60, to be distributed as provided in section 41.57.

20.32 DAY SCHOOLS FOR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN. There is appropriated from the general fund, annually, on July \* \* \* *1, 1933*, as state aid for schools and classes established and maintained pursuant to section 41.01, one hundred forty-five thousand dollars for day schools or classes for the instruction of deaf children or children with defective speech, or for the instruction of blind children *and* one hundred thousand dollars for schools or classes for otherwise physically disabled children \* \* \* , to be distributed as provided in section 41.03.

(41.03) (1) (a) For each pupil residing in the district and attending such day school or class \* \* \* for the deaf or blind two hundred fifty dollars, for children physically disabled three hundred dollars.

(41.57) (1) The state superintendent shall keep a list of not more than \* \* \* *four* of such schools, whose course of study and the qualifications of whose teachers have, on application, been approved by him and the dean of the college of agriculture; and any such school once entered on such list may remain listed and be entitled to state aid so long as the scope and character of its work are maintained in such manner as to meet the approval of the state superintendent. On and after July 1, 1925, no new county schools of agriculture and domestic science shall be placed on the approved list and granted state aid under the provisions of this subsection.

(41.57) (2) If it shall appear that such school has been maintained, pursuant to law, for a period of not less than eight months

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during the preceding school year, in a manner satisfactory to the state superintendent, he shall certify to the secretary of state, in favor of the several counties maintaining such schools, an amount equal to the sums expended by each, respectively, for wages of duly qualified and approved teachers therein during the school year; but not to exceed in any one year \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars for any such school.

(51.08) (1) The expense of the maintenance, care and treatment of each inmate in any state or county hospital or asylum for the insane shall be computed at the rate of four dollars and \* \* \* *twenty* cents per week. For each such inmate maintained at public charge elsewhere than in the county of his legal settlement the whole rate shall be chargeable to the state and one-half thereof chargeable over by the state against the county, if any, in which such inmate has a legal settlement. For all other such inmates maintained at public charge one-half of said rate shall be chargeable to the state and one-half to the county in which such inmate has a legal settlement. All such charges shall be adjusted as provided in section 46.10.

(51.24) (2) The state shall compensate every such county for all insane persons maintained at public cost at its hospital for mental diseases, commencing July 1, \* \* \* *1933*, at the rate of four dollars and eighty cents per week for each acute insane person and two dollars and \* \* \* *ten* cents per week for each chronic insane person. The first period of computation of such compensation shall be for the six months period ending December 31, 1923, and each succeeding period of computation for such compensation shall be each succeeding six months next after the expiration of said first six months period.

(52.02) (1) Except that *the rate for the maintenance, care and treatment shall be computed at the rate of four dollars and eighty cents per week*, \* \* \* sections 51.01 to 51.11, inclusive, 51.14, 51.16, 51.17 and 51.19 of the statutes shall govern the examination, commitment and custody of mentally deficient and epileptic persons; but commitments of such persons shall be to one of the institutions named in section 52.01. In cases of alleged mental deficiency, the examination may be made by a clinical psychologist and a licensed physician skilled in mental diagnosis; but no person shall be recognized as a clinical psychologist unless he has received the doctorate degree in psychology, with work in

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neurology and psychiatry, and has had not less than two years of successful experience in clinical psychological work.

(39.14) (7) STATE REIMBURSE COUNTY. On receipt of such report, and it appearing from an actual inspection by direction of the state superintendent that the work of such supervising teacher has been efficient, and that she has devoted her time exclusively to the duties of the position, the state superintendent shall certify in favor of the county which employed her, the amount of the salary *paid but not to exceed an amount to which such teacher shall be entitled under a salary schedule for supervising teachers to be adopted and promulgated by the state superintendent of public instruction which shall provide for a salary range of from eleven hundred to fifteen hundred dollars per year, varying with length of service and professional training. The county shall also be entitled to reimbursement for the* \* \* \* actual and necessary expenses paid to her in the year preceding, and file it with the secretary of state, whereupon he shall draw his warrant for the amount of the certificate and in favor of the proper county treasurer.

(59.87) (4) To supplement the funds provided by the county for the agricultural development, state aid, in the sum of \* \* \* *seven hundred* dollars annually, shall be given to each county in which the county board has made the required appropriation, and in which a county agricultural representative has been established. Such state aid shall be expended under the direction of the board of regents of the University of Wisconsin.

(71.19) (4) This section and the provisions of this chapter relating to the apportionment of taxable income to the several towns, cities and villages and those relating to the collection of the income tax by the county treasurer, shall not apply to telegraph companies, or transportation companies as defined in subsection (4) of section 76.02 and in section 76.39, respectively. All such telegraph companies and transportation companies shall pay their taxes under this chapter directly into the state treasury, and such taxes shall not be apportioned or distributed to the taxing districts within which the properties lie, but shall be retained entirely by the state \* \* \*.

343.411 FALSE PREMIUM LIST OR STATEMENT. Any officer of any organized agricultural society, association or board in this

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state, who, in pretended compliance with the provisions of \* \* \* section \* \* \* 96.68, shall wilfully make and file any false or fraudulent list or statement, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than fifty dollars, \* \* \* *nor* more than one hundred dollars, for each offense.

Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *twenty* thousand \* \* \* dollars, for operation. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To the governor an annual salary of \* \* \* *six* thousand \* \* \* dollars.

(8) EXECUTIVE COUNCIL. \* \* \*

(a) ADMINISTRATION. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seven* thousand *five hundred* dollars for the exercise of its functions. Expenditures from this appropriation shall be made upon vouchers approved by the governor.

(20.03) (1) GENERAL APPROPRIATION. (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *one* hundred \* \* \* *ninety-five* thousand dollars for payment of the expenses of the Wisconsin national guard and the performance of the several duties of the adjutant general. Of this there is allotted:

(3) REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE OF ARMORIES. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *three* thousand dollars for repair and maintenance of state-owned armories.

(6) REVOLVING APPROPRIATIONS. There are appropriated from the general fund to the adjutant general for the purchase of new military property, and for land and improvements at Camp Williams:

(a) All moneys received on account of lost military property as provided in section 21.56 and all moneys received from the United States on account of military property and supplies purchased with funds raised by private subscriptions \* \* \* for the use of the Wisconsin national guard in the service of the United States during the war against Germany.

(b) All moneys received from the sale of armories.

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(7) GRAND ARMY HOME FOR VETERANS. For the Grand Army Home for Veterans:

(a) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* *forty* thousand dollars for operation, and in addition thereto \* \* \* all moneys received for or on account of the Grand Army Home for Veterans except moneys received from the federal government *or in the operation of a canteen*. Of this amount not to exceed forty dollars may be expended for the burial of each deceased member who shall be buried in the cemetery of said home.

(ab) *Annually, a sum sufficient to cover the cost of insurance and of coal and other solid fuel purchased pursuant to subsection (4) of section 15.28 including freight and hauling charges thereon.*

(b) Annually, beginning July 1, 1931, twenty thousand dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

(c) \* \* \* Annually, beginning July 1, 1932, ten thousand dollars for permanent property and improvements, except the purchase of land.

(d) *All moneys received from sales made at the canteen conducted at this home, to be used for the operation of said canteen.*

(9) RECORD OF VETERANS' GRAVES. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *three thousand five hundred* dollars, and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *three thousand five hundred* dollars to carry out the provisions of section 45.215.

(20.04) (1) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifty-five* thousand dollars for the execution of his functions other than the administration of chapter 85. Of this there is allotted:

(4) ELECTION MANUAL. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one thousand five hundred dollars, for carrying out the provisions of section 6.81.

(5) ELECTION NOTICES, BLANKS AND SUPPLIES. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *three thousand five hundred* dollars, and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *four thousand five hundred* dollars for the printing and distribution of election notices, blanks and supplies.

(20.05) (1) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *forty* thousand dollars for the execution of his functions. Of this there is allotted:

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(4) COLLECTION OF GASOLINE TAX. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifty thousand \* \* \* three hundred \* \* \* fifty-five* dollars to pay the expense of administering the tax on motor vehicle fuels imposed by chapter 78 of the statutes. All moneys received by the state treasurer under chapter 78 shall be paid within one week after receipt into the general fund.

(20.08) (1) GENERAL APPROPRIATION. (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifty-three thousand five hundred* dollars, for the execution of his functions. Of this there is allotted:

(3) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *forty-eight* thousand dollars for property repairs and maintenance of the several buildings and properties for whose repair and maintenance the bureau of engineering is responsible under the statutes.

20.13 PORTAGE LEVEE. There is appropriated from the drainage fund, \* \* \* annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, to the *Portage levee* commissioners \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars, for maintaining, repairing, strengthening, adding to and supervising the system of levees on the Wisconsin river in the counties of Columbia and Sauk, in the vicinity of Portage. There having been heretofore paid into the general fund from the proceeds of the swamp and overflowed lands a sum of money in excess of the amount herein appropriated, the state treasurer is directed to transfer to the drainage fund from the general fund

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\* \* \* on July 1 of each year \* \* \* , \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars. \* \* \*

(20.14) (1) GENERAL APPROPRIATION. Annually, beginning July 1, 1931, thirty thousand dollars for the execution of its functions, other than those for which special appropriations are made in subsections (2) and (3). The members of the commission shall receive no compensation, but shall be paid their actual and necessary traveling expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties. *Of this there is allotted:*

(a) *To the secretary an annual salary of not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the commission.*

(2) PURCHASE OF BOOKS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *six* thousand dollars for the purchase of books and traveling cases and for other necessary apparatus and furnishings not supplied at the expense of the \* \* \* *bureau of purchases.*

(3) LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE LIBRARY. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, and on July 1, of each odd-numbered year thereafter, \* \* \* *twenty-five* thousand \* \* \* dollars, and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, and on July 1 of each even-numbered year thereafter, \* \* \* *thirty-eight* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the execution of the functions of the legislative reference library. *Of this there is allotted:*

(a) *To the chief of the legislative reference library an annual salary of not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the commission.*

(5) LIBRARY SCHOOL. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *twelve* thousand dollars, and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *twelve* thousand dollars, for the operation of the library school as provided in subsection (4) of section 43.09.

20.15 MEMORIAL INSTITUTIONS. There is appropriated from the general fund:

(1) MEMORIAL HALL. To the custodian of Memorial hall, annually, beginning July 1, 1927, two thousand two hundred sixty dollars, for the execution of the functions prescribed by sections 45.01 to 45.04. Of this there is allotted to the custodian an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars. \* \* \*

\* \* \* (2) ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT, G. A. R. To the Wisconsin Department of the Grand Army of the Republic, \* \* \* annually, beginning July 1, 1919, \* \* \* one thousand dollars, for necessary expenses of \* \* \* *its* annual en-

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campment \* \* \* , to be expended \* \* \* upon the certification by the commander \* \* \* .

\* \* \* (3) SPANISH WAR VETERANS. To the Wisconsin department of the Spanish War Veterans' Association, annually, beginning July 1, 1931, one thousand dollars, for necessary expenses of \* \* \* *its* annual encampment \* \* \* , to be expended \* \* \* upon the certification by the commander \* \* \* .

\* \* \* (4) VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS. To the Wisconsin department of the association known as the Veterans of Foreign Wars, annually, beginning \* \* \* *July 1*, \* \* \* 1933, one thousand dollars for necessary expenses of \* \* \* *its* annual encampment \* \* \* , to be expended \* \* \* upon the certification by the commander \* \* \* .

\* \* \* (5) AMERICAN LEGION. To the Wisconsin department of the American Legion, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one thousand dollars, for necessary expenses of \* \* \* *its* annual encampment \* \* \* , to be expended \* \* \* upon the certification by the commander of the legion post which conducts such encampment \* \* \* .

\* \* \* (6) VETERANS OF THE WORLD WAR. To the Wisconsin department of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, \* \* \* annually, beginning May 1, 1930, \* \* \* one thousand dollars for necessary expenses of \* \* \* *its* annual encampment \* \* \* , to be expended \* \* \* upon the certification by the commander \* \* \* .

(20.16) (1) (a) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifty* thousand dollars to carry into effect the powers, duties and functions of said society.

(b) \* \* \* *On July 1*, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *nine* thousand \* \* \* *six* hundred \* \* \* *seventy-five* dollars, and annually, beginning July 1, 1934, *three thousand six hundred seventy-five* dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

(c) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *five* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the purchase of library books, furniture and furnishings and for other permanent property and improvements.

20.19 COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC LANDS. There is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioners of public lands:

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(1) *GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.* \* \* \* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seven thousand five hundred dollars* for the execution of their functions.

(2) *SURVEY AND INVENTORY OF LANDS.* On July 1, 1933, *three thousand dollars* and on July 1, 1934, *three thousand dollars* for an inventory and survey of all lands under their jurisdiction.

(20.20) (14) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, all of the proceeds of the tax which is levied in subsection (2) of section 70.58, and all moneys paid into the state treasury as the counties' share of compensation of emergency fire wardens pursuant to section 26.14 of the statutes to be used for acquiring, preserving and developing the forests of the state, including the acquisition of lands owned by counties by virtue of any tax deed and of other lands suitable for state forests, and for the development of lands so acquired and the conduct of forestry thereon, including the *growing and planting of trees; for forest and marsh fire prevention and control; for compensation of emergency fire wardens; for maintenance, permanent property and forestry improvements; for other forestry purposes authorized by law and for the payment of aid for county forest reserves as authorized in subsection (5) of section 59.98 of the statutes.*

(20.205) (1) Annually, beginning July 1, 1931, a sum sufficient for the payment of bounties chargeable against the state \* \* \* .

(20.21) (1) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* *twelve thousand dollars* for the executions of his functions and to carry out the provisions of subsection (4) of section 41.01 for the education of handicapped children. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To the state superintendent an annual salary of \* \* \* *five thousand dollars.*

20.28 *ADVANCED COURSES IN RURAL SCHOOLS.* On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seven hundred fifty dollars*, and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *seven hundred fifty dollars*, for the payment of state aid, pursuant to section 40.225, for advanced courses beyond the eighth grade in school districts which do not maintain a high school, a junior high school or a state graded school offering high school courses. If the total of the amounts certified by the state superintendent as payable to school districts under section 40.225, shall exceed the amount available

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hereunder, the secretary of state shall equitably prorate the amount available.

(20.33) (1) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, twenty \* \* \* thousand \* \* \* dollars, for the administrative expenses of the board. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To each appointed member of the board, an honorarium of one hundred dollars per year and actual and necessary traveling expenses.

(b) Such sums as may be necessary for office supplies.

(c) *To the director of vocational education an annual salary not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the board.*

(5) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* fourteen thousand four hundred dollars for the preparation of teachers, supervisors and directors of agricultural subjects, and teachers of trade, industrial, home economics and vocational school subjects, provided that in case any allotment be made to the state university or to any normal school or any other wholly state controlled educational institutions, the appropriation for the operation of such school or institutions for the year in which such allotment was made shall be reduced to an amount equal to the amount of such allotment.

(20.34) (1) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* one hundred sixty-five thousand dollars, for operation. *Of this there is allotted:*

(2) On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* nine thousand \* \* \* four hundred seventy \* \* \* dollars, and annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* nine thousand \* \* \* six hundred \* \* \* ninety dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

(3) \* \* \* On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* ten thousand dollars, and annually, beginning July 1, 1934, nine thousand dollars for permanent property and improvements, except the purchase of land.

(20.35) (1) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* twenty-four thousand dollars for operation. \* \* \*

(2) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* one thousand five hundred dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

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(3) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *nine hundred* dollars for furniture and furnishings; educational apparatus, library and reference books, and other permanent property and improvements, except for the purchase of land.

(20.38) (1) (Introductory paragraph) BOARD OF NORMAL REGENTS. For the board of normal regents, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *nineteen* thousand dollars for the execution of the functions of said board. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To each member of said board such compensation as may be fixed by the board for rendering any specific service under the direction of the board; but they shall receive no compensation for time spent in going to, attending, or returning from the meeting of the board.

(c) Annually, beginning July 1, 1917, an amount sufficient to cover the cost of the annual audit as provided in subsection (7) of section 15.04.

(d) *To the secretary an annual salary of not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the board of regents.*

(2) OPERATION. (a) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, for teachers' salaries at the several state teachers' colleges, one million \* \* \* *one hundred* \* \* \* *twenty-six* thousand nine hundred \* \* \* *nine* dollars.

(b) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, three hundred \* \* \* *thirty-five* thousand \* \* \* dollars for operation other than teachers' salaries, of the several state teachers' colleges.

(4) MAINTENANCE. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seventy* thousand dollars for property repairs and maintenance at the several state teachers' colleges.

(5) MISCELLANEOUS CAPITAL. \* \* \* *Annually, beginning* July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seventy-five* thousand dollars \* \* \* for permanent property and improvements, other than the purchase of land at the several state teachers' colleges.

(12) (a) As revolving appropriations all money received for or on account of any dormitory, dining hall, cafeteria, stationery stand, *or* model farm \* \* \* to be used for the operation, maintenance and purchase of necessary equipment for each such activity.

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(20.41) (1) (a) *GENERAL OPERATION*. On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, and annually thereafter, two million \* \* \* one hundred \* \* \* fifty thousand dollars, \* \* \* and in addition thereto all tuition and other fees and all other moneys received by any person for or in behalf of the university or of any department, school, college or activity thereof, unless otherwise specifically appropriated, to be used for operation. Of this there is allotted:

1. A sum sufficient to pay the actual and necessary expenses incurred by members of the board of regents in going to, attending, or returning from meetings of the board, or in the performance of any duty in pursuance of any direction of the board, but such members shall receive no compensation for services.

2. \* \* \* *To the secretary of the board of regents an annual salary of not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the board of regents.*

(c) *MAINTENANCE*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* forty thousand dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

(d) *MISCELLANEOUS CAPITAL*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* one hundred \* \* \* forty thousand dollars for the purchase of educational and laboratory apparatus, furniture and furnishings, machinery and equipment, tools, live stock, for improvements to buildings and grounds, and other similar permanent property and improvements.

(2) (a) *OPERATION*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, two hundred \* \* \* fifteen thousand dollars, and in addition thereto all moneys received as university extension fees, including fees for correspondence study instruction, class instruction, lecture instruction, medical extension, visual instruction materials, musical and dramatic materials, extension texts and bulletins, traveling instructors, and extension teachers serving local continuation schools and other organizations, and for duplicating service rendered by the extension division.

(b) *EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* five thousand \* \* \* dollars for the purchase of books, educational apparatus, furniture and furnishings, and other necessary equipment, and for improvement to buildings and grounds at Milwaukee.

(f) *REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE IN MILWAUKEE*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, two thousand

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\* \* \* *five* hundred dollars for repairs and maintenance of buildings and grounds at Milwaukee.

(3) (a) \* \* \* *Agricultural extension; county agents; and soils laboratory.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *eighty-eight* thousand one hundred dollars for \* \* \* county agricultural representatives as provided in section 59.87, and agricultural extension as provided in section 36.215; and for the conduct of the soils laboratory, pursuant to section 36.20. The receipts of the soils laboratory shall be added to and become a part of this appropriation.

(d) *AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATIONS.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, forty \* \* \* thousand dollars, for operation, property repairs and maintenance, live stock, equipment, construction of necessary buildings and permanent improvements, except the purchase of land, for and at the several branch agricultural experiment stations.

(i) *HOG CHOLERA SERUMS.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, two thousand \* \* \* dollars for the preparation, purchase, sale and distribution of hog cholera serums, as provided in section 36.21 and for the investigation of swine diseases; and all moneys received under section 36.21 shall be paid within one week after receipt into the general fund, and are appropriated therefrom and added to the appropriations for carrying out the provisions of said section.

(p) *TOBACCO INDUSTRY.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, six thousand \* \* \* dollars for experimental work, necessary equipment, and general expenses incurred in investigating the cultural methods employed in the tobacco industry and diseases affecting the tobacco plant, and for the general improvement and advancement of the tobacco industry of the state.

(r) *PROTECTION OF TRUCK CROPS.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars for experimental work, necessary equipment, and general expenses incurred in investigating methods of control and extermination of insects and plant diseases affecting onions, cabbage, sugar beets and other truck crops.

(9) *SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATION.* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *thirty-six* thousand dollars to encourage scientific investigation and productive scholarship as provided in section 36.062.

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(12) PSYCHIATRIC INSTITUTE. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, thirty- \* \* \* *two* thousand dollars for the operation, maintenance and permanent property and improvements of the psychiatric institute.

(14) HYGIENIC LABORATORY. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, thirty- \* \* \* *two* thousand \* \* \* dollars for operation, maintenance, and permanent property for the hygienic laboratory.

(17) STATE GEOLOGIST. (a) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *seven* thousand *five* hundred dollars, for the execution of the functions of the state geologist.

(20.43) (1) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* *thirty-five* thousand \* \* \* dollars, for administration and the execution of its functions for which no specific appropriation is made. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To each member of the board other than the secretary, compensation, to be certified by the president and secretary of the board, at the rate of ten dollars per day when actually and necessarily engaged in the performance of his official duties; but not to exceed two hundred dollars in any year to any such member.

(b) To the secretary \* \* \* *an annual* salary \* \* \* *of not to exceed five thousand dollars* as \* \* \* fixed by the board.

(6) LICENSING OF EMBALMERS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *five* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the examination and licensing of embalmers.

(7) HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *twenty-seven* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the regulation of hotels and restaurants.

(8) REGULATION OF BARBERS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifteen* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the examination, licensing and regulation of barbers. Of this there is allotted to each member of the committee of examiners of barbers a per diem not exceeding ten dollars per calendar day for the actual number of days in which engaged in the performance of his duties, and in addition thereto his actual and necessary expenses.

(9) REGULATION OF PLUMBERS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *sixteen* thousand \* \* \*

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dollars for the examination and licensing of plumbers and supervision of plumbing installations.

(12) BEAUTY PARLORS. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *fifteen* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the examination, licensing and regulation of beauty parlors.

(13) BUREAU OF CHILD WELFARE. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *forty-three* thousand *three hundred fifty* dollars for the operation of a bureau of child welfare and public health nursing and the promotion of the welfare and hygiene of maternity and infancy. To this appropriation shall be added any amounts received from the United States for these purposes, but the appropriation herein shall be diminished by the amounts so received from the United States.

(17) REGISTRATION OF NURSES. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *sixteen* thousand \* \* \* dollars for the execution of the duties prescribed in chapter 149.

20.44 BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS. There is appropriated from the general fund to the state board of medical examiners \* \* \* for the execution of \* \* \* *its* functions \* \* \* *all moneys received by it and paid into the general fund.* Of this there is allotted:

\* \* \* (1) To each member of the board such compensation as *it* shall \* \* \* determine \* \* \* , not exceeding five dollars for each day actually spent in attending to the business of the board.

\* \* \* (2) To the secretary of the board a salary, to be fixed by \* \* \* *it*, \* \* \* not \* \* \* exceeding one thousand dollars per annum.

(20.48) STATE ATHLETIC COMMISSION. (Introductory paragraph) There is appropriated from the general fund to the state athletic commission annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *six* thousand five hundred dollars *but in no year shall the appropriation exceed the nonappropriated receipts.* Of this there is allotted:

(20.49) (Introductory paragraph) There is appropriated from the general fund to the state highway commission \* \* \* *on the allotment dates specified in this section the aggregate amount not previously allotted of* \* \* \* the surplus *above costs of collection* of the motor vehicle registration fees, operator's license fees, and motor vehicle fuel taxes \* \* \* *plus* allotments of federal aid made to this state \* \* \* for the improvement of

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highways \* \* \* *provided that the taxes on motor vehicle fuel used or sold in June may with the consent of the emergency board be included in the allotments on July first, and provided further that in the fiscal years beginning July 1, 1933, and July 1, 1934, this appropriation shall be reduced one million dollars per year, which amount shall be withheld from the surplus of the motor vehicle fuel taxes for general state use, to become available in installments of five hundred thousand dollars each on September 1, 1933, April 1, 1934, September 1, 1934, and April 1, 1935.* \* \* \* *The amount appropriated herein to the highway commission shall be apportioned and distributed by the \* \* \* commission as follows:*

(1) Annually, beginning July 1, 1926, one hundred thousand dollars, for the execution of its functions. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To each appointive member of the commission an annual salary of \* \* \* *five thousand dollars.*

(b) *To the state highway engineer an annual salary of not to exceed six thousand dollars as fixed by the commission.*

(3) On October 1, \* \* \* 1935, and annually thereafter, for marking and signing the state trunk highway system, one hundred thousand dollars.

\* \* \*

(5) On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, *two hundred fifty thousand dollars, on July 1, 1934, two hundred fifty thousand dollars, and on July 1, 1935 and annually thereafter, not to exceed nine hundred thousand dollars to pay the state's portion of the cost of bridges under sections 87.02 and 87.03.*

(5a) On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, *five thousand dollars, on July 1, 1934, five thousand dollars, and on July 1, 1935 and annually thereafter, twenty-five thousand dollars for improving highways forming the most convenient connection between state charitable or penal institutions, and the state trunk highway system, or to construct roadways under or over state trunk highways that pass through the grounds of any state charitable or penal institution. All work under this subsection shall be determined jointly with the state board of control.*

(6) On October 1, \* \* \* 1933, *seventy-five thousand dollars, on July 1, 1934, seventy-five thousand dollars, and on July 1, 1935 and annually thereafter, two hundred thousand dollars for the construction and maintenance of roads, including fire roads, in the state parks and state forests and other public lands*

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as defined in chapter 24, and for highways or fire roads leading from the most convenient state or federal trunk highways to such lands. All work done under this subsection shall be determined by the state conservation commission for state park and forest lands, and by the land commission for other classes of public lands and the county board of the county wherein the lands affected are situated. All work shall be done by or under the authority or with the approval of the state highway commission. Outside the limits of the said park, state forest and public land areas, not more than two direct connections to the most convenient state trunk highway may be built or maintained under the provisions of this section.

(7) On October 1, \* \* \* 1933, *ten thousand dollars*, on July 1, 1934, *ten thousand dollars*, and on July 1, 1935, and annually thereafter, fifteen thousand dollars for the purpose of making surveys of local road materials available for the construction and maintenance of the highways. All work done under this subsection shall be *done* by the state geologist, \* \* \*, on plans approved by, and in such places as shall be directed by the highway commission.

(7a) On July 1, 1929, five thousand dollars, and on July 1, 1930, five thousand dollars to be expended by the conservation commission \* \* \* *acquiring tracts of timber lands abutting on trunk highways and other roads and trails, which upon purchase shall become a part of the state forest reserves.*

(7b) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1935, one hundred thousand dollars to pay the state's share of the apportionable cost of railroad grade crossing improvements on the state trunk highway system, which shall be expended on projects where the state's share of the apportionable cost exceeds fifteen thousand dollars in such order and in such places as the commission shall from time to time determine will best meet the highway requirements of the people of the state, and may be used for improvements either independent of or in conjunction with any other funds that may have been or may be available for the improvement of the state trunk highway system in any county. The apportionable cost is defined as that amount which may be decided upon by the highway commission, the railroad commission and the railway company as representing the financial interest of the railway company and of the public in the elimination of the crossing hazard.

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(8) On January 1, 1932, and annually thereafter, to the towns, villages and cities of the state, for the improvement of public roads and streets within their respective limits which are open and used for travel, and which are not portions of the state or county trunk highway systems, and which are not direct connections through cities between state trunk highways, the following sums: Each town and village shall receive for each mile of such road or street, the sum of fifty dollars; each city with a population not more than ten thousand by the last federal census shall receive for each mile of such road or street, the sum of one hundred dollars; each city with a population more than ten thousand and not more than thirty-six thousand shall receive for each mile of such road or street, the sum of two hundred dollars; each city with a population more than thirty-six thousand and not more than one hundred and fifty thousand shall receive for each mile of such road or street, the sum of three hundred dollars; and each city with a population more than one hundred and fifty thousand shall receive for each mile of such road or street, the sum of four hundred dollars. The amounts allotted to cities, towns and villages under this subsection shall be paid into their respective treasuries. The amounts allotted to the towns and villages shall be expended by the town and village officers, subject to the supervision and approval of the county highway committee, but the town and village boards may authorize the work to be done by the county. If the work is done by the county, the amount allotted for towns and villages shall be paid into the county treasury. A report of the work done shall be made each year by the town or village board, if the town or village does the work, and by the county highway commissioner if the work is done by the county. Copies shall be filed with the clerk of the town or village, the county clerk and the highway commission. The board of every town and village, and the council of every city, shall, \* \* \* file with the commission and with the county clerk, a correct plat of their respective towns, villages and cities showing the mileage of roads and streets open and used for travel. In computing the mileage, the lengths included in road and street intersections shall not be included more than once. One-half of the mileage of roads or streets on boundary lines shall be considered as lying in each town, village or city. *In the fiscal years beginning July 1, 1933 and July 1, 1934, any part of the amounts paid hereunder to towns, villages, and cities may be used by them for poor relief.*

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(9) On July 1, 1931, and annually thereafter, for the improvement of the state trunk highway system, and to carry out the purposes of section 84.10, the amount remaining *unallotted at the close of the fiscal year* after the amounts appropriated under subsections (1) to (8) have been set aside. This amount shall be allotted in the manner provided by subsection (9) of section 84.03 and section 84.10.

(13) \* \* \* *After payment into the general fund, all receipts from the performance of engineering work, on request of town, village, or county boards or county highway committees, or in connection with any work to be done under any appropriation under this section, to be used for the same purpose.* \* \* \* Any excess of receipts above the amount required \* \* \* *for the performance of such engineering work* shall be credited to the appropriation for highway maintenance and construction.

20.50 DEEP WATERWAYS COMMISSION. There is appropriated from the general fund to the Wisconsin deep waterways commission on July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *four thousand five hundred dollars* and on July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *four thousand five hundred dollars* for the execution of its functions, conditional upon approval of the emergency board. The members of said commission shall receive no compensation, but shall be reimbursed their actual and necessary expenses.

(20.51) \* \* \* PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION. There is appropriated from the general fund to the \* \* \* *public service* commission:

(1) \* \* \* *Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* twenty thousand dollars \* \* \* to cover all expenditures and obligations incurred for the administration of any of its functions in addition to sums collected under section 196.85 and subsection (2) of section 184.10.* Of this there is allotted to each member of said commission an annual salary of five thousand dollars.

(2) \* \* \* *Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred \* \* \* thousand dollars* for administration and the execution of its general functions, in addition to the appropriation made in subsection (1), conditional upon approval by the emergency board.

20.513 STATE UTILITY CORPORATION. There is appropriated from the general fund to the state utility corporation of Wisconsin, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *one*

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thousand dollars for the discharge of its functions under sections 198.50 to 198.60, and in addition thereto all amounts which shall be paid to the corporation for services rendered pursuant to sections 198.50 to 198.60.

(20.53) COMMISSIONER OF BANKING. (Introductory paragraph, as amended in chapter 15, laws special session 1931) There is appropriated from the general fund to the state banking department for the execution of its functions, \* \* \* annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, one hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars *and in addition thereto all receipts under subsection (5) of section 115.09 and sections 220.08 and 214.02.* Of this there is allotted:

(20.55) (1) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *sixty-eight thousand eight hundred fifty* dollars, for the execution of his functions as commissioner of insurance *and as ex officio state fire marshal.* Of this there is allotted:

(a) To the commissioner of insurance an annual salary of five thousand dollars.

(b) To the commissioner of insurance, such sum as may be required for his actual and necessary expenses incurred in representing this state at the annual meeting of the national convention of insurance commissioners.

(c) *Such sums as may be necessary for witness fees, and fees and mileage to officers, as provided in section 200.21, and subsection (1) of section 200.24.*

(20.57) (1) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *two hundred ninety-five* \* \* \* thousand dollars, for the execution of its functions. Of this there is allotted:

(2) INVESTIGATION OF FIRES. Annually, such sums as may accrue \* \* \* on account of dues to fire departments, under subsection (4) of section 201.59, to be expended \* \* \* for making investigations as provided in said subsection and section 200.19.

(20.575) (2) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *twenty* thousand dollars, for the execution of its functions, *but not to exceed its nonappropriated receipts.* Of this there is allotted to each member of the board a per diem of ten dollars for each day actually devoted to the performance of the duties of said board.

\* \* \*

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(20.60) (2) BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION. (Introductory paragraph) On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *one* hundred *twenty* thousand dollars and annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1934, \* \* \* *one* hundred \* \* \* *eighty* thousand dollars for the purpose of carrying on the work of bovine tuberculosis eradication and the payment of indemnity on animals condemned and slaughtered under the provisions of chapter 94 of the statutes. Of this there is allotted:

(6) (e) *Repairs and maintenance*. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *ten* thousand dollars for property repairs and maintenance.

(16) *OLEOMARGARINE ENFORCEMENT*. Annually, beginning \* \* \* July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *three* thousand dollars from the receipts derived from the taxes levied by section 98.39, for the collection of such taxes and the enforcement of said section.

(20.61) (1) AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT ASSOCIATION. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars to the Wisconsin agricultural experiment association, for securing and testing new and improved varieties of seeds, plants, and fertilizers, studying the best methods of cultivation and feeding crops, and in general advancing the agricultural interests of the state. On June thirtieth of each year the secretary of said association shall make and transmit to the secretary of state a sworn statement of all receipts and disbursements thereof during the preceding year.

(2) STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars to the Wisconsin state horticultural society, for the execution of its functions as provided in sections 93.08 and 93.09.

\* \* \*

(5) STATE DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION. \* \* \* On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *two* thousand *seven hundred* dollars to the Wisconsin state dairymen's association, for printing and otherwise carrying on its work.

\* \* \*

(9) LIVE STOCK BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION. \* \* \* On July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars to the Wisconsin live stock breeders' association, for the execution of its functions as provided in section 93.10.

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(10) POULTRY ASSOCIATIONS. \* \* \* On July \* \* \* 1, 1933, \* \* \* *two thousand two hundred fifty* dollars for state aid to the poultry associations, to be distributed as provided in section 96.67.

(11) AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES. Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *one hundred thirty-four* thousand dollars for state aid to counties and agricultural societies, associations, or boards, and to incorporated dairy or live stock associations, as provided in section 96.68. If the total amounts certified in any year by the department of agriculture and markets as due to the several counties and agricultural societies under section 96.68 shall exceed the amount herein appropriated, the secretary of state shall equitably prorate this appropriation.

\* \* \*

(20.62) (2) REPORTER. (a) Annually, \* \* \* *ten* thousand dollars for the salary of the reporter of the supreme court, the assistant reporter, and such additional help employed by the reporter as the court shall deem advisable.

(5) SECRETARY. To the secretary of each justice such compensation as the justice appointing him shall fix but not to exceed one hundred and \* \* \* *fifty* dollars per month.

(8) COUNSEL FOR BAR COMMISSIONERS. To the counsel for the board of state bar commissioners such compensation, not exceeding \* \* \* *four* thousand dollars in any one year, as may be fixed by the chief justice.

(20.63) (1) (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *ten* thousand \* \* \* dollars, to carry into effect its functions relative to the state library. Of this there is allotted:

(20.64) (1) (Introductory paragraph) Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *twelve* thousand dollars to carry into effect his functions. Of this there is allotted:

(20.65) \* \* \* STATE BAR COMMISSIONERS. There is appropriated from the general fund to the \* \* \* *state bar commissioners*: \* \* \* Annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *two* thousand dollars to carry into effect its functions, including the conduct of investigations, and in addition thereto all moneys received under the provisions of subsection (6) of section 256.28. *Of this there is allotted to each member of the board compensation, to be fixed by the supreme court, not exceeding ten dollars per day, for time necessarily devoted to the*

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*discharge of his duties, and in addition thereto his actual and necessary expenses.*

\* \* \*

(20.66) (2) REPORTERS. To each reporter appointed pursuant to section 252.18, compensation at the rate of \* \* \* *two* hundred *fifty* dollars per month, and to one of the official reporters of the court in which the statutes require actions against state officers and state commissions to be tried, additional compensation at the rate of seventy-five dollars per month. In addition thereto each reporter attending a term of court or attending by the direction of the court the trial of a compulsory reference, outside the county in which he resides, or attending the sessions of court presided over in other circuits by the judge appointing him, at the request of such judge, shall be reimbursed his necessary traveling expenses and hotel bills.

20.71 BUREAU OF PERSONNEL. There is appropriated from the general fund to the bureau of personnel, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *thirty-five* thousand dollars for the execution of its functions. \* \* \* *Of this there is allotted:*

(a) *To the director an annual salary not to exceed five thousand dollars as fixed by the governor.*

(20.72) DIRECTOR OF BUDGET. (1) There is appropriated from the general fund to the director of the budget, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, twenty- \* \* \* *two* thousand five hundred dollars, for the execution of the functions of the state budget bureau. Of this there is allotted to the director of the budget an annual salary of \* \* \* *not to exceed five* thousand dollars *as fixed by the governor.*

(2) The cost of all examinations and audits made by the state budget bureau pursuant to subsections (7) and (8) of section 15.04 shall be charged to the proper appropriation of the department whose accounts are audited. *The proceeds of such audits shall be deposited within one week of receipt in the general fund and be reappropriated to the use of the department.*

20.74 EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated from the general fund to the emergency board, annually, beginning July 1, \* \* \* 1933, \* \* \* *two* hundred thousand dollars, to be used to supplement appropriations which shall prove insufficient because of unforeseen emergencies, or to supplement appropriations which shall prove insufficient to accomplish the purposes for which made, and for the payment of actual and

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necessary expenses of members other than the governor in attending meetings of the board. Allotments from this appropriation shall be made as the emergency board may deem advisable; provided, that the governor may allot sums not in excess of one thousand dollars to any department when necessary, without a meeting of the board. All allotments made by the emergency board or by the governor in an emergency shall be certified to the secretary of state, and expenditures therefrom shall be shown in the state budget report as an additional cost of the departments, boards, commissions, institutions or activities to whom such allotments were made.

20.785 RECEIPTS REAPPROPRIATED. All moneys paid into the state treasury by any institution, society or association, receiving state aid, which are paid into the state treasury pursuant to section 20.78, \* \* \* are reappropriated therefrom for the use of the institution, society or association, so paying its receipts into the state treasury.

(23.09) (6) DIRECTOR; EMPLOYMENT, SALARY, QUALIFICATIONS, POWERS, DUTIES. The commission shall employ a conservation director who shall continue in office at the pleasure of the commission, and whose salary shall be fixed by the commission, but not to exceed \* \* \* *five* thousand \* \* \* dollars per year. Said director shall be a person having executive ability and experience, special training and skill in conservation work, and shall not be subject to the provisions of chapter 16 of the statutes. He shall be administrative head of the state conservation department, shall be responsible to the commission for the execution of its policies; shall employ, by and with the advice and consent of the commission, such technical and administrative assistance as may be necessary for the execution of such policies, and shall exercise the powers of the commission in the interim of its meetings but subordinate thereto, but shall not have authority to make rules and regulations.

(25.16) (1) The executive head of the state annuity and investment board shall be the director of investments. Such director shall be appointed by the annuity and investment board and shall be a person of proven executive ability, qualified by prior experience and training to invest the state's investment funds. He shall not hold any other office or be engaged in any other employment. Such director shall be paid such \* \* \* salary as may be fixed by the board and approved by the governor, *but not to exceed*

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*five thousand dollars annually*, and shall furnish a bond for the faithful performance of his duties in such sum and with such sureties as the board may recommend and the governor require and approve.

25.21 COMMON SCHOOL FUND. All moneys accruing to the state by virtue of section 2 of article X of the constitution, and all other moneys paid into the state treasury on account of the capital of the school fund, constitute the school fund. All of said fund, except that portion set apart for normal schools by section \* \* \* 25.25, having been found necessary for the support and maintenance of common schools in each school district, and the purchase of suitable libraries and apparatus therefor, is set apart for those objects and denominated the "Common School Fund" which is a separate and perpetual fund.

(39.19) (1) The county superintendent of schools \* \* \* may each year conduct one or more institutes for the teachers of his district. To assist him, he may employ institute instructors and lecturers, but no compensation for special lectures shall be paid to any person conducting the institute.

142.04 If the court shall be satisfied that the required facts exist and that the person should be treated at the Wisconsin general hospital, or at the Wisconsin orthopedic hospital for children, or if the person to be treated, or his guardian if he be under guardianship, selects either of said hospitals as the place of treatment, he shall so find and enter an order so directing; *provided, that patients shall not be certified, at joint county and state expense, as provided in section 142.08, in any one fiscal year from any county in which there is a hospital to the Wisconsin general hospital, in excess of two persons per one thousand of the population or major fraction thereof in such county according to the last federal census. Patients certified to the Wisconsin general hospital in excess of the above quota in any year shall be maintained wholly at county expense. This limitation shall not apply to patients certified to the Wisconsin orthopedic hospital for children nor to counties in which there is no hospital.* If he find the required facts and that the person can receive adequate treatment at home or in a hospital, at the same or less expense to the county, and the person to be treated shall not make the selection aforesaid, he shall enter an order directing such treatment, the place thereof, and the physician or physicians. If the court is not so satisfied, he may make further investigation. If the court does not find the required facts,

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he shall enter an order denying the application. Upon granting the application, he shall ascertain from the superintendent of the hospital whether the person can be received as a patient, and if he can the court shall certify his order to the hospital and to the county clerk.

(142.07) (1) The Wisconsin general hospital shall treat patients so admitted at rates based on actual cost as determined by the board of regents of the university, *but not in excess of four dollars and twenty cents per day for each certified patient*. Payments made by such patients shall be credited to their account. Patients may be admitted without certificate, but the cost of their care shall not be a joint charge against the state and county wherein he has a legal settlement, except such patients are admitted in an emergency pending action of the county court. If the court grants the application the charges against state and such county shall date from his admission. An emergency shall include cases where, by reason of unforeseen physical conditions, a patient is detained in the hospital longer than anticipated and is thereby financially unable to bear the expense of treatment.

(142.08) (1) The net cost of caring for a *patient certified, within the quota fixed for any county by section 142.04, \* \* \** to the Wisconsin general hospital or Wisconsin orthopedic hospital for children shall be paid one-half by the state and one-half by the county of his legal settlement. *The cost of caring for a patient certified to the Wisconsin general hospital from any county in excess of the quota fixed for said county by section 142.04 shall be paid entirely by the county of legal settlement.* The county board may in its own name collect from such patient the total net cost of such care, and after deducting its share of the cost of such care pay the balance so collected to the state.

(142.08) (4) The secretary of state shall thereupon certify to each county one-half the amount paid by the state for each such patient from that county *certified to the Wisconsin orthopedic hospital for children and one-half the amount paid by the state for each patient certified within the quota for the county, and the full amount paid by the state for each such patient certified in excess of the quota for that county to the Wisconsin general hospital, \* \* \* these amounts \* \* \** to be certified, levied and collected with the general state taxes; *provided, that the amount to be certified and levied in 1933 shall be certified and*

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*levied according to the provisions of this subsection as it appears in the statutes of 1931.*

(169.01) (4) The secretary shall hold office during the pleasure of the commission and shall give a bond to the state of Wisconsin in the sum of two thousand dollars, with good and sufficient sureties to be approved by the commission, for the faithful performance of his duties as such secretary. Such secretary shall receive such salary as the commission shall fix, not exceeding \* \* \* *two thousand* dollars per annum.

SECTION 5. Three new sections are added to the statutes; new subsections are added respectively to sections 20.18; 20.60; 40.34; 40.87; 94.07 and new paragraphs respectively to subsection (2) of section 20.38; subsection (3) of section 20.41; and subsection (6) of section 20.60 of the statutes to read:

20.09 TAX COMMISSION. There is appropriated from the general fund to the tax commission:

(1) On July 1, 1933, one hundred forty-one thousand nine hundred seventy-two dollars and annually, beginning July 1, 1934, one hundred forty-three thousand one hundred seventy-two dollars for general administration and for salaries and necessary expenses, and for the general functions of said commission in the general property tax field other than specifically provided for hereafter in this section. Of this there is allotted:

(a) To each tax commissioner an annual salary of five thousand dollars.

(b) To each member of each county board of review appointed as provided in subsection (1) of section 71.13 a per diem of not exceeding ten dollars per day.

(2) Annually, such sums as may be necessary to defray the expenses of executing the functions of reassessments and review of assessment proceedings as provided in section 70.64 and 70.75 to 70.85, inclusive, of the statutes.

(3) On July 1, 1929, twenty-five thousand dollars as a revolving fund and from time to time, sums equal to the charges accruing to the state under the provisions of subsections (6) and (14) of section 73.03 to execute its functions, relating to municipal accounting, as prescribed by said subsections.

(4) Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, three hundred twelve thousand seven hundred eighty-one dollars to be used exclusively for the salaries and necessary expenses of administering the state income tax law.

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20.17 BOARD OF CONTROL. There is appropriated from the general fund to the state board of control:

(1) (a) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION. Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, two hundred twenty-nine thousand dollars for general expenditures incurred in the execution of the functions of said board. Of this there is allotted to each member of the board an annual salary of five thousand dollars.

(b) On July 1, 1933, five thousand dollars and on July 1, 1934, five thousand dollars for the investigation of the financial condition of persons committed as public charges to state and county institutions and for the collection of the cost of maintenance from such persons or from persons legally responsible for the cost of such maintenance.

(2) OPERATION OF INSTITUTIONS. Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, two million one hundred eighty-five thousand dollars, for operation of the Wisconsin state hospital for the insane, the northern hospital for the insane, the central state hospital for insane, the northern Wisconsin colony and training school, the southern Wisconsin colony and training school, the Wisconsin state sanatorium, the Lake Tomahawk state camp, the state prison, the state reformatory, the Wisconsin industrial home for women, the industrial school for boys, the Wisconsin industrial school for girls, the state public school, the school for the deaf, the school for the blind, and the institute for blind artisans.

(3) MAINTENANCE OF INSTITUTIONS. Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, for property repairs and maintenance of the institutions enumerated in subsection (2), two hundred seventeen thousand dollars.

(4) MISCELLANEOUS CAPITAL AT INSTITUTIONS. Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, for miscellaneous permanent property and improvements at the institutions enumerated in subsection (2), eighty-eight thousand dollars.

(5) The state board of control is authorized to spend out of the binder twine or the prison industries receipts not to exceed twenty-five hundred dollars to cooperate with other states in the protection and coordination of prison industries and the market for the products of prison industries.

(6) PREVENTION OF PROCREATION. Annually, on July first, for mental and physical examination of inmates, and prevention of procreation, as provided in section 46.12 of the statutes, two thousand five hundred dollars.

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(7) **INSURANCE AND COAL.** Annually, an amount sufficient to cover the cost of insurance and of coal and other solid fuel purchased pursuant to subsection (4) of section 15.28 for the several institutions under the management of the board of control, and freight charges thereon. Expenditures for coal and other solid fuel hereunder shall be made as provided in section 15.84, but shall appear as an operating cost of the respective institutions at which such fuel is used.

(8) **FEDERAL AID; MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.** (a) All moneys received by the state from the United States as federal aid for the treatment of the mental diseases of persons who served in the armed forces of the United States during the war against Germany and her allies, to be allotted to such institutions in the state as said board shall deem proper, in conformity with the agreement under which such money is received.

(b) All moneys received for the board and treatment of persons who served in the armed forces of the United States during the war against Germany and her allies, and who are suffering with mental diseases, and who have been admitted as patients at the Wisconsin memorial hospital, or from the sale of supplies and merchandise on account of such persons, for the operation of the Wisconsin memorial hospital.

(9) **ABSCONDING PROBATIONERS' FUNDS.** On July 1, 1933, two thousand dollars, and all moneys in the hands of the board of control, or coming into its possession, belonging to absconding probationers as provided in section 57.075, as a revolving fund to be used for the purposes of such section.

(10) **COLONIZATION.** On July 1, 1929, ten thousand dollars and in addition thereto all moneys received on behalf of colonization projects, for colonization purposes.

(11) **BINDER TWINE PLANT.** For the binder twine plant at the state prison, from time to time, sums equal in amount to the moneys derived from the sale of the manufactured products of said plant and paid into the general fund, to be used as a revolving appropriation for operation, purchase of raw materials, carrying, handling and marketing the products of said plant; but whenever said revolving appropriation exceeds six hundred thousand dollars such excess shall revert to the general fund.

(12) **PRISON INDUSTRIES.** For prison industries as provided in section 56.01:

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(a) On July 1, 1919, fifteen thousand dollars, and from time to time, sums equal in amount to the moneys derived from the sale of products of the industries of the state prison other than the binder twine plant, and paid into the general fund, to be used as a revolving appropriation to carry on such industries at the state prison, and for the construction and equipment of buildings, for permanent property and improvements. No expenditures shall be made from this appropriation for the construction and equipment of buildings or for permanent property and improvements, except upon written application of the state board of control, setting forth the need, and upon the certification of the emergency board that such moneys are needed, and that no other appropriation is available for that purpose.

(b) On July 1, 1917, two-fifths of the unexpended balance of the appropriation heretofore made by subsection (11) of section 20.17, and, from time to time, sums equal in amount to the moneys derived from the sale of the products of the industries at the state reformatory, and paid into the general fund, to be used as a revolving appropriation to carry on such industries at the state reformatory.

(13) FARM OPERATIONS. All moneys received by the board of control from the sale of live stock and farm products and from premiums on exhibits at fairs, to be used as a revolving appropriation for operation, maintenance, and permanent property and improvements of the institutional farm and for incidental expenses connected with exhibits at fairs.

(14) OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY. On July 1, 1919, two thousand five hundred dollars to be used as a revolving appropriation for the purchase of the necessary materials and supplies to carry out the provisions of subsection (10) of section 46.03.

(15) WITNESS FEES OF PRISONERS. All moneys received in reimbursement of expenses incurred in taking inmates of state institutions into court pursuant to section 292.45 to be added to the appropriation for operation of the institution incurring such expense.

(16) COMPENSATION FOR IMPRISONMENT OF INNOCENT PERSONS. For compensation to prisoners who have served terms of imprisonment upon conviction for an offense or crime against the state of which they are innocent, as provided in section 285.05, such sums as may be necessary to pay the

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awards of the board created by said section, when certified to the secretary of state by said board.

(17) **BENEVOLENT FUND INCOME.** Annually, beginning July 1, 1931, the income of the benevolent fund created by section 25.31 to be expended as provided in said section on certification of the state board of control upon the recommendation of the superintendent of the Wisconsin industrial school for girls.

(18) **REVOLVING APPROPRIATION.** For the institute for blind artisans, on July 1, 1925, ten thousand dollars, together with any materials then in stock, pursuant to the provisions of this subsection, to be invested in materials, payment of artisans, and for expenses incident to manufacture of different articles; and whenever any such materials, or the articles manufactured therefrom, are sold, the proceeds thereof shall be paid into the general fund within one week of receipt, and credited back to this appropriation.

(19) **CONTINGENT FUND.** Out of the appropriations for the operation of the several institutions under the jurisdiction of the state board of control there is allotted to the superintendent of each institution, subject to the approval of the emergency board, such sums as may be necessary to be used as a revolving appropriation for the payment of current bills of less than fifty dollars incurred for materials, supplies, services, and expense of a consumable nature, including telegraph and telephone service, postage, and express, freight, and drayage service furnished his institution, but not including any salary or other compensation paid to employees. The amount allotted to each superintendent shall be deposited in a separate account to be known as the "superintendent's revolving fund" in a public depository to be designated by the state board of control. Payment of current bills of less than fifty dollars for the purposes specified shall be made by check drawn by the superintendent against such account, without necessity of being first submitted to the state board of control and to the secretary of state for approval and audit. From time to time the superintendent shall file claim for reimbursement on a sworn voucher which shall be accompanied by the receipted bills for payment of which reimbursement is claimed. After approval of such claim by the state board of control and audit by the secretary of state, the superintendent's revolving fund shall be reimbursed the total amount lawfully paid therefrom. If any superintendent shall pay any bill which is subsequently disapproved either by the state

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**board of control or the secretary of state as unlawful and unauthorized, such superintendent shall, within ten days after notification by the state board of control, personally make good such unlawful or unauthorized payment. All moneys received in reimbursement for payments made from the superintendent's revolving fund shall be deposited to the credit of said account and are added to this appropriation. The state board of control, with the approval of the secretary of state, shall make rules and regulations for carrying out the purposes of this subsection. The board of control shall require the superintendent of each institution to execute and file a surety bond in such sum as the emergency board may require, conditional upon the faithful discharge of his duties and obligations under this section, the premium to be paid out of the appropriation in subsection (2) of section 20.17.**

\* \* \*

20.745 (1) As an emergency measure necessitated by decreasing state revenues and to prevent the necessity for a state tax on general property, the emergency board is authorized to reduce any appropriation made to any department, board, commission, institution, society or association, or for any aid, activity or purpose, for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1934, and June 30, 1935, by such amount as it deems feasible, not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the appropriations for these years made or continued by this legislature in its regular session of 1933. Appropriations of receipts and of a sum sufficient shall for the purposes of this act be regarded as equivalent to the amounts expended thereunder in the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1933. It is the intent of this act that all activities, aids and services of the state government required by law shall be continued in an efficient manner, but because of the uncertainties of the existing economic situation it is necessary that no public funds be expended or obligations incurred unless there shall be adequate revenues to meet the expenditures of the government; therefore, the emergency board shall, if it deems it necessary, make such reductions of such appropriations as in its judgment will secure sound financial operations of the government and at the same time interfere least with the services and activities of the state.

(2) No reduction in any appropriation shall be made under authority of this section until after an opportunity to be heard is given, in writing or through publication in the official state paper, to the department, board, commission, institution, society or as-

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sociation to whom such appropriation is made. Any reduction in appropriations determined upon shall be communicated to the department, board, commission, institution, society or association affected, the secretary of state, and the director of the budget. Thereafter, the director of the budget shall not release and the secretary of state shall not draw his warrant in payment of any amount exceeding the reduced appropriation.

(20.18) (3) On July 1, 1933, and annually thereafter, five hundred fifty thousand dollars for state aid of tuberculosis sanatoria to be expended as provided in section 50.07 and subsection (2) of section 58.06 of the statutes.

(40.34) (7) If in any year the total of the claims for state aid under this section shall exceed the amount appropriated in subsection (2) of section 20.25, the state superintendent shall equitably prorate the amount available among the several school districts entitled to share in this state aid.

(40.87) (8) If in any year the total of the claims for state aid under this section shall exceed the amount appropriated in subsection (3) of section 20.25, the state superintendent shall equitably prorate the amount available among the several towns, cities, and villages entitled to share in this state aid.

(94.07) (7) Area retests and retests of infected herds shall be made by the department of agriculture and markets in all counties at such intervals as the department of agriculture and markets may deem necessary to protect the work already done and to preserve such counties their standing as modified accredited or area tested counties under the specifications and regulations of the United States bureau of animal industry and the agreements among the various states. Such area retests and retests of infected herds shall be made at such times and in such manner as the department of agriculture and markets may determine, in the light of the latest and best scientific and practical knowledge and experience, but a complete area retest shall be made in every county in the state at least once in every six years. The department of agriculture and markets is authorized and directed to make such retests in any county in the state without petitions.

(20.38) (2) (c) Out of the appropriation made in paragraph (b) there is allotted to the president of each state teachers' college, subject to the approval of the emergency board, such sum as may be necessary to be used as a revolving appropriation for

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the payment of current bills of less than fifty dollars incurred for materials, supplies, services, and expense of a consumable nature, including telegraph and telephone service, postage, and express, freight, and drayage service furnished his institution, but not including any salary or other compensation paid to employes. The amount allotted to each superintendent shall be deposited in a separate account to be known as the "president's revolving fund" in a public depository to be designated by the board of normal school regents. Payment of current bills of less than fifty dollars for the purposes specified shall be made by check drawn by the president against such account, without necessity of being first submitted to the board of normal school regents and to the secretary of state for approval and audit. From time to time the president shall file claim for reimbursement on a sworn voucher which shall be accompanied by the receipted bills for payment of which reimbursement is claimed. After approval of such claim by the secretary of the board of normal school regents and audit by the secretary of state, the president's revolving fund shall be reimbursed the total amount lawfully paid therefrom. If any president shall pay any bill which subsequently is disapproved either by the board of normal school regents or the secretary of state as unlawful and unauthorized, such president shall, within ten days after notification by the secretary of the board of normal school regents, make good such unlawful or unauthorized payment. All moneys received in reimbursement for payments made from the president's revolving fund shall be deposited to the credit of said account and are added to this appropriation. The board of normal school regents, with the approval of the secretary of state, shall make rules and regulations for carrying out the purposes of this paragraph and shall require the president of each state teachers' college to execute and file a surety company bond in such sum as the board of normal regents may require conditioned upon the faithful discharge of his duties and obligations under this paragraph, the premium upon which shall be paid out of the appropriation in paragraph (b).

(20.41) (3) (s) Annually, beginning July 1, 1933, two thousand dollars for experimental work, necessary equipment and general expenses incurred in investigating methods of control and extermination of insects affecting apples.

(20.60) (6) For the operation and conduct of the state fair, the state fair park and exhibits and fairs thereon:

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(a) On July 1, 1933, twenty-five thousand dollars, and on July 1, 1934, twenty-five thousand dollars for the conduct and operation of the state fair, the state fair park and of exhibits and fairs thereon. Contracts and obligations on account of the state fair may be incurred and paid from the appropriation available for the year in which the fair is held prior to the year in which said appropriation becomes available.

(6) (b) All receipts received for or on account of the operation of the state fair, the concessions or the rent or lease of the state fair park or buildings thereon, except as provided by paragraphs (g) and (j) of this subsection, shall be deposited immediately in the general fund and reappropriated therefrom to the department of agriculture and markets for the payment of necessary expenses incurred in the operation of the state fair.

SECTION 6. The repeal or omission in this act of any appropriation for the purchase of land and for permanent property and improvements or miscellaneous capital made in chapter 20, statutes of 1931, or as reduced by the emergency board pursuant to chapter 30, laws of the special session of the 1931 legislature, shall not affect such appropriation. As provided in subsection (8) of section 20.77 it shall continue to be available until the attainment of the object or the completion of the work for which such appropriations were made.

SECTION 7. All balances in revolving appropriations made in chapter 20, statutes of 1931, which are repealed or omitted in this act shall on the taking effect of this act continue and be available for the purpose for which originally made.

SECTION 8. All balances in appropriations which are reenacted in this act and which under the provisions of subsection (8) of section 20.77 are continuing shall continue to be available for the purposes for which made. The balance remaining in the appropriation created by paragraph (b) of subsection (17) of section 20.41 of the statutes, which is repealed by section 2 of this bill, as amended, shall continue until used or until the attainment of the purposes for which it was created.

SECTION 9. SECTIONS 1 and 3 shall take effect on passage and publication; SECTION 2 shall take effect at the close of business June 30, 1933; and SECTIONS 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 shall take effect July 1, 1933.
