EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATION

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

I have approved **Assembly Bill 263**, liberalizing the special disability benefits for certain protective occupations under the Wisconsin Retirement Act and Conservation Warden Fund. This bill is consistent with the recent liberalizing of benefits under these funds.

However, I believe there are certain aspects to this legislation which deserve additional consideration by the Legislature. Presently, disability benefits received by an employee under Chapter 102 are in no way related to the payments under Section 66.191, Wisconsin Statutes. Since these payments are aimed at compensating an employee for the same disability, it would appear desirable that they be related to each other.

There should also be further consideration of the definition of "disability" as set forth in this bill. This bill provides that an employee may obtain a disability based on other than purely medical factors where "promotional opportunities" have been adversely affected. Further clarification of what constitutes such a disability appears desirable.

The number of cases which have arisen under the situations affected by this bill have been extremely few in recent years.

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The liberalization which this bill provides for should not have a significant fiscal impact. However, should disability claims under this provision increase substantially, the Legislature might well want to review the provisions of this legislation.
