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### COMMITTEE REPORTS

The assembly and senate Highway Committees submit the following report on proposed rules and standards to be established by the administrator of the Division of Motor Vehicles relative to inspection standards and to a random and voluntary inspection program:

1. At the request of Senator Kendziorski, a roll call was taken to amend the Pilot Project Program to the effect that the City of Milwaukee replace the City of Madison for the urban area to be tested.

Ayes, 1; Noes, 10.

Motion failed.

2. Moved by Assemblyman Bock, seconded by Assemblyman Lewison, that the joint committee accept the Pilot Project of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program as outlined.

Ayes, 12; Noes, 0.

Motion carried.

3. Moved by Assemblyman Lewison, seconded by Assemblyman Bock, that the joint committee accept the Self-Inspection program.

Ayes, 12; Noes, 0.

Motion carried.

4. Moved by Assemblyman Conradt, seconded by Assemblyman Mertz, that the Voluntary Inspection Program be accepted.

Ayes, 12; Noes, 0.

Motion carried.

5. Moved by Senator LaFave, seconded by Assemblyman Conradt, that there be a minimum, maximum fee of \$3.00 for vehicle inspection under the Pilot and research project.

Ayes, 10; Noes, 0.

Motion carried.

6. Moved by Assemblyman Van Hollen, seconded by Assemblyman Gehrman, that in Subchapter I, Steering—Suspension, MVD 5.12 (2), this be amended to read “in excess of  $\frac{1}{8}$  turn” instead of 2 inches.

Ayes, 9; Noes, 1.

Motion carried.

Senator Kendzioriski suggested that at least one wheel be pulled for the purpose of checking brakes. No committee action taken.

7. Moved by Assemblyman Gehrman, seconded by Assemblyman Bock, that those vehicles that are required by federal or other regulations to be equipped with a positive crankcase ventilation system, shall be inspected to assure that the system is working to meet the requirements of such regulations.

Motion carried by voice vote.

8. Moved by Assemblyman Hutnik, seconded by Assemblyman Mertz, that the committee accept the Random Motor Vehicle Inspection Program as outlined.

Ayes, 9; Noes, 0.

Motion carried.

9. Moved by Assemblyman Mertz, seconded by Assemblyman Conradt, that the Standards of Inspection as presented in the Wisconsin Motor Vehicle Inspection Program 1968 with suggested minimum changes, be accepted by the joint committee.

Ayes, 9; Noes, 2.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Relating to a study by the Assembly Standing Committee on Agriculture of the University of Wisconsin's agriculture and food research programs.

Whereas, agriculture and the many business activities related to agriculture constitute one of the leading industries of the State of Wisconsin; and

Whereas, the Wisconsin legislature has a duty to the farmers, food processors and consumers of this state to assure adequate production and marketing of Wisconsin food supplies; and

Whereas, scientific research has contributed to the development of Wisconsin agriculture and agricultural methods, the development of the Wisconsin food processing industry and the marketing of Wisconsin-grown food stuffs, and serves to protect the consumer when the food reaches the market place; and

Whereas, because agriculture and related vocations are so fundamental to the economy of this state, the people of Wisconsin would in the future face dire economic consequences if agriculture and food research programs at the public academic institutions of this state were today found lacking; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly Committee on Agriculture, That:

(1) The Assembly Committee on Agriculture shall conduct an investigation of the agriculture and food research programs of the University of Wisconsin pursuant to the authority of Senate Joint Resolution 97, 1967.

(2) The Assembly Committee on Agriculture shall make a full and complete investigation of the agriculture and food research programs conducted at or in conjunction with the University of Wisconsin including, without limitation because of enumeration, an accounting by the University of moneys allotted to agriculture and food research during the most recent 5-year period, and the benefits derived by the citizens of this state from such research during the same period.

(3) The Assembly Committee on Agriculture shall complete its investigation and submit its final report to the Legislature no later than January 6, 1969. The report

shall include the conclusions and recommendations of the committee, and suggested legislation (if any).

(4) The necessary professional and clerical staff for the committee and any administrative services it requires, shall be provided by the legislative council staff under section 13.91 of the statutes.

Moved by Assemblyman Tregoning, seconded by Assemblyman Schroeder, that Resolution No. 1 be adopted.
