Eightieth Session

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MONDAY, January 4, 1971.

2:00 o'clock P.M.

The eightieth session of the legislature of the state of Wisconsin convened at Madison, the capital city, on Monday, the 4th day of January, A.D., 1971, at 2:00 o'clock P.M., pursuant to law.

The senate was called to order by the Honorable Martin J. Schreiber, president of the senate.

Prayer, as follows, was offered by Pastor George Brueggemann, Pastorial Counselor of Milwaukee Lutheran High Schools, and Pulpit Assistant of Mount Calvary Lutheran Church of Milwaukee:

O Lord, our God, infinite in wisdom, power and love—in whose hands are the destinies of men and nations—You have invited and encouraged us to pray for those “in authority”.

Therefore, trusting in Your word, we now lay claim to Your promises, and we ask You to bless these men to whom we have given the responsibility of leadership in the affairs of our state.

Keep them sensitive to the fact that they are responsible to those who have placed the burden of high office upon them, and especially to You, the Lord of us all.

Keep them mindful of the fact that they are stewards of the wealth of blessings You have showered upon us and our state, and help them not only to conserve these resources

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but also to develop them for the service and enjoyment of all our people—and generations yet unborn.

Keep them strong in body and spirit that they may meet the challenge of their tasks with zealous devotion to duty and a selfless concern for all whom they serve.

May the influence of Your Spirit be felt by them in this room and in the offices and corridors of this building, so that in all they do here Your will may be done.

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**EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS**

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

I have the honor to report to you the pardons and commutations of sentence granted by me as Governor during the term beginning the first Monday in January, 1969, and ending the first Monday in January, 1971, with reasons therefore, as required by Section 6, Article V, of the Wisconsin Constitution.

Upon due application executive clemency was granted to the following persons:

(1) **JACK F. ANDERSON**, 29, who was convicted on September 3, 1959, in the County Court for Dane County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to pay a fine of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) or six months in the County Jail (fine paid). Anderson was

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granted a full pardon based on his educational achievements and public service.

(2) SYLVAN JOSEPH BAUDHUIN, JR., 46, who was convicted on October 24, 1955, in the Municipal Court for the Eastern District of Waukesha County of the crime of embezzlement and sentenced to three years' probation. Baudhuin was granted a full pardon based on the circumstances of the offense and his record of citizenship during the past fourteen years.

(3) DELBERT JOHN BOEHM, 45, who was convicted on September 29, 1954, in the County Court for Brown County of the crime of obtaining money under false pretenses and sentenced to a term of one year. Boehm was also convicted on May 8, 1964, in the County Court for Brown County of the crime of obtaining narcotics with a forged prescription and placed on two years' probation. Boehm was granted a full pardon based on his recent educational achievements, record of military service and to aid the rehabilitative process.

(4) ROBERT HENRY BONN, 28, who was convicted on July 3, 1961, in the County Court, Branch II, for Kenosha County of the crime of burglary and sentenced to a term of thirty months. Bonn was granted a full pardon based on his lack of other convictions and record of rehabilitation in the last nine years.

(5) HENRY JOSEPH BRITZ, 52, who was convicted on December 17, 1963, in the County Court for Walworth County of the crime of intentionally receiving and forwarding bets and offers to bet and unlawfully conducting a lottery and sentenced to pay fines totaling Three Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars and costs. Britz was granted a full pardon based on the circumstances surrounding the offenses and to increase employment opportunities.

(6) CRAIG BRUNETTE, 20, who was convicted on April 5, 1968, in the County Court for Barron County of the crime of burglary (eleven counts) and sentenced to nine terms of

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two years, concurrent; two years, consecutive; and two years, consecutive (total six years). His sentence was commuted to ten terms of four years, concurrent, and two years, consecutive, on the basis that earlier appearances before the Parole Board would enhance his exemplary rehabilitation process.

(7) CLIFFORD EDWARD CAMPBELL, 28, who was convicted on April 18, 1961, in the Circuit Court for Wood County of the crime of burglary (two counts), and sentenced to a term of two years on each count, concurrent; sentence stayed, and placed on two years' probation. The granting of a full pardon was based on his record of rehabilitation since 1963 and a desire to obtain employment in the State of Florida.

(8) THOMAS CARIGNAN, 28, who was convicted on March 5, 1958, in the County Court for Sauk County of the crime of burglary (seven counts) and theft (eight counts) and sentenced to a term of two years on each of eight counts of burglary, concurrent, and six months in the Sauk County Jail on each of seven counts of theft, concurrent; all sentences to run concurrently at Wisconsin State Reformatory. A full pardon was granted based on his excellent record of rehabilitation and his remarkable effort toward self-improvement over the last nine years. He will graduate from college in the spring. The sentencing judge and prosecuting district attorney also favor the granting of an absolute pardon to Mr. Carignan.

(9) CARY C. CASTIGLIONE, 27, who was convicted on January 26, 1968, before the County Court for Dane County of the crime of reckless use of a firearm and sentenced to pay a fine of One Hundred Fifty Dollars and costs or three months in the County Jail, fine and costs paid). Castiglione was granted a full pardon based on the circumstances of the offense and lack of a previous record.

(10) DANIEL THOMAS CHICONAS, 34, who was convicted on February 11, 1953, in the Municipal Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of burglary, three counts,

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and sentenced to a term of three years, three years and three years, all concurrent. Chiconas was granted a full pardon based on his age at the time of the commission of the offenses and his record of rehabilitation during the last sixteen years.

(11) FRANK ROBERT CIEZKI, 23, who was convicted on May 20, 1964, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of robbery (armed and concealed identity) and given a suspended sentence and placed on two years' probation. The granting of a full pardon was based on his excellent record of rehabilitation and responsible citizenship during his probation and since his discharge.

(12) FREDERICK J. CLAUSEN, 41, who was convicted on March 16, 1964, in the County Court for Brown County of the crime of receiving stolen property and sentenced to a term of two years' probation. Clausen was granted a full pardon based on his lack of other convictions and demonstrated rehabilitation.

(13) JOSEPH J. CLEMENTI, 52, who was convicted on December 10, 1954, in the County Court for Jefferson County of the crime of larceny and sentenced to a term of one year, sentence stayed and placed on one year's probation. Clementi was granted a full pardon based on lack of additional offenses and record of citizenship during the last fifteen years.

(14) MCKENZIE DAVIS (alias Robert Ford), 61, who was convicted on June 11, 1965, in the Circuit Court, Branch 11, for Milwaukee County of the crime of first degree murder and sentenced to a term of life. Davis was granted a commutation of sentence to twenty-five years based on his age, the time span between the offense and his conviction, and an exemplary record while incarcerated.

(15) RANDOLPH KIRK DeMOE, 21, who was convicted on February 27, 1968, in the County Court, Branch 2, for Kenosha County of the crime of burglary (thirteen counts) and sentenced to three terms of one year, consecutive, and

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ten terms of one year, concurrent, concurrent to previous sentence. His sentence was commuted to thirteen terms of three years, concurrent, on the basis of his satisfactory prison adjustment and in order to allow him to appear before the Parole Board at an earlier date. This was done with the favorable recommendation of the presiding judge and with the assurance that this would aid rehabilitation of the applicant.

(16) MICHAEL JAMES DIXON, 22, convicted in the Circuit Court for Waukesha County on March 21, 1966, of the crime of burglary, two counts, and sentenced to a term of two years and three years, concurrent; sentence stayed; placed on three years' probation. Dixon was granted a full pardon based on his excellent rehabilitation and exemplary behavior since probation was terminated.

(17) DAVID W. DOUGHERTY, 60, who was convicted on April 1, 1955, in the Municipal Court for the Eastern District of Waukesha County of the crime of carnal knowledge and abuse and sentenced to a term of one to five years. Dougherty was granted a full pardon based on lack of other convictions and evidence of complete rehabilitation over the last fifteen years.

(18) ROBERT DOUGLAS FITZGIBBON, 28, who was convicted on June 16, 1959, in the Superior Court for Dane County of the crime of operating a motor vehicle without consent of owner and sentenced to a term of one year, sentence stayed, and placed on one year's probation. The granting of a full pardon was based on his record of rehabilitation and citizenship since his discharge.

(19) ROBERT JAMES GOFF, 41, who was convicted on February 28, 1955, in the County Court for Walworth County of the crime of breaking and entering, four counts, and larceny and sentenced to a term of three to four years and one year, sentence suspended and placed on four years' probation. Goff was also convicted on April 20, 1955, in the Municipal Court for Kenosha County of the crime of breaking and entering, nine counts, and larceny, two counts, and sentenced to a term of three to five years on nine counts,

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concurrent, and six months to one year on two counts, concurrent, and concurrent to previous sentence. Goff was granted a full pardon based on his demonstrated rehabilitation during the past fifteen years.

(20) EARL EDWIN GREEN, 42, who was convicted on October 23, 1950, in the Circuit Court for Ashland County of the crime of larceny, two counts (breaking and entering in the nighttime and breaking and entering in the daytime) and sentenced to two terms of one to three years, concurrent. Green was granted a full pardon based on the period of time since the conviction and his desire to become involved in law enforcement.

(21) TILMON GREER, 55, who was convicted on July 27, 1964, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of first degree murder and sentenced to a term of life. Greer was granted a commutation of sentence to thirty-five years based on factors surrounding the offense and his conviction, and his excellent record while incarcerated.

(22) ALLEN PATRICK HAASE, 23, who was convicted on October 26, 1965, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to a term of two years' probation. Haase was granted a full pardon based on exceptional rehabilitation and circumstances surrounding the offense.

(23) WAYNE THOMAS HAASL, 21, who was convicted on May 12, 1966, in the County Court for Rusk County of the crime of sexual perversion, three counts, and sentenced to a term of four years' probation. Haasl was granted a full pardon based on his rehabilitation and lack of previous record.

(24) JEROME JOSEPH HALBRUCKER, 27, who was convicted on July 25, 1963, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of endangering safety by conduct regardless of life and sentenced to a term of three years. Halbrucker was granted a full pardon based on his outstanding rehabilitation and employment record since release from incarceration.

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(25) ROBERT G. HOOD, who was convicted on August 9, 1965, in the County Court for Waukesha County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to a term of one year (Huber Law). Hood was granted a full pardon based on his excellent record of citizenship before and since the offense.

(26) MARGARET ANN IGOE, also known as Margaret Ann Corna, 21, who was convicted on August 8, 1968, in the County Court for Door County of the crime of use of marijuana for smoking purposes and sentenced to one year's probation. Miss Igoe was granted a full pardon based on the nature of the offense, lack of other convictions, age and evidence of complete rehabilitation.

(27) ALTON B. ISON, 65, who was convicted on February 19, 1949, in the Circuit Court for Forest County of the crime of embezzlement, three counts, and sentenced to two years' probation. Ison was granted a full pardon based on his excellent record during probation and his exemplary conduct since release from probation supervision.

(28) ROBERT C. KELLY, 44, who was convicted on August 4, 1965, in the Circuit Court for Dane County of the crime of causing to be filed with the State of Wisconsin Department of Securities a statement and representation of a material fact which he knew or in the exercise of reasonable care should have known to be false or misleading, and sentenced to a term of three years; sentenced stayed; and placed on probation for three years. Kelly was granted a full pardon based on his rehabilitation and exemplary record during probation.

(29) JESSE J. KOLMOS, 54, who was convicted on October 4, 1960, in the Municipal Court for Kenosha County of the crime of participating in earnings of or operating a gambling place and sentenced to pay a fine of Five Hundred Dollars and costs or one hundred fifty days in county jail. Kolmos was granted a full pardon based on his excellent record of citizenship since the offense.

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(30) JEFFREY W. KROGMANN, 29, who was convicted on October 4, 1963, in the County Court, Branch 2, for Waukesha County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to a term of thirty days in the Waukesha County Jail. Krogmann was granted a full pardon based on the circumstances of the offense, lack of other offenses, and his record of citizenship.

(31) ARTHUR T. LAABS, 57, who was convicted on March 27, 1967, in the Circuit Court for Clark County of the crime of being a director, officer, agent or employee of a corporation, did falsify records which he knew to be false, and was sentenced to a term of eighteen months. Laabs was granted a full pardon based on the lack of other convictions, the nature of the offense, and record of complete rehabilitation.

(32) DAVID LEE LaMERE, 33, who was convicted on May 19, 1961, in the Circuit Court for Marathon County of the crime of receiving stolen property and sentenced to a term of two years. LaMere was granted a full pardon based on his performance as a law-abiding citizen over the last nine years.

(33) MICHAEL D. LAVERY, 20, who was convicted on May 6, 1970, in the County Court, Branch 2, for Dane County of the crime of unlawful possession of a firebomb and sentenced to a term of eighteen months' probation with the first six months to be served in the Dane County Jail. Lavery was granted a full pardon based on lack of other convictions, academic record and the desire to enter graduate school.

(34) JIMMIE LEE LIGHTLE, JR., 26, who was convicted on November 2, 1964, in the County Court for Dunn County of the crime of breaking and entering, three counts, and attempted burglary, and sentenced to three terms of two years, concurrent, and six months, concurrent. Lightle was granted a full pardon based on his rehabilitation.

(35) PAUL EDWARD MAY, 30, who was convicted on August 16, 1961, in the Municipal Court for Milwaukee

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County of the crime of theft and sentenced to a term of one and one-half years. May was granted a full pardon based on the circumstances of the offense and record of adjustment since 1961.

(36) HAL D. McMICKLE, 32, who was convicted on December 7, 1964, in the Circuit Court for Jefferson County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to five years' probation. McMickle was granted a full pardon based on his complete rehabilitation and record of citizenship.

(37) FRED H. MENSE, 39, who was convicted on December 3, 1949, in the Circuit Court for Dunn County of the crime of breaking and entering with intent to commit larceny and sentenced to a term of three to four years; sentence stayed; placed on three years' probation. Mense was also convicted on May 27, 1954, in the Circuit Court for Eau Claire County of the crime of assault with intent to commit rape and sentenced to a term of one year, concurrent with previous sentence. Mense was granted a full pardon based on his demonstration of rehabilitation since 1954.

(38) PATRICK ANTHONY MOORE, 30, who was convicted on December 3, 1964, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of burglary and sentenced to a term of three years' probation. Moore was granted a full pardon based on his adjustment as a law-abiding citizen and evidence of complete rehabilitation.

(39) MYRON HARVEY MULARKEY, 43, who was convicted on October 8, 1948, in the Circuit Court for Marquette County of the crime of assault with intent to do great bodily harm and sentenced to a term of two years' probation; Mularkey was also convicted on October 19, 1953, in the Circuit Court for Marquette County of the crime of assault with intent to commit rape and sentenced to a term of one to five years. Mularkey was granted a full pardon based on the time span since the offenses and strong efforts at adjustment as a good citizen.

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(40) ROBERT E. NOHELTY, 49, who was convicted on September 10, 1958, in the Municipal Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of indecent behavior with a child and sentenced to a term of two years' probation. Nohelty was granted a full pardon based on his rehabilitation and employment record.

(41) RALPH DOMINGO ORLANDI, 46, who was convicted on October 6, 1961, in the Municipal Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of violation of Uniform Narcotic Drug Act and possession of marijuana and sentenced to a term of three years, sentence stayed, and placed on five years' probation. Orlandi was granted a full pardon based on his adjustment during probation, lack of additional criminal activity, and exceptional effort at rehabilitation during the last eight years.

(42) BYRON LEON PHILLIPS, 52, who was convicted on February 25, 1959, in the Municipal Court for Outagamie County of the crime of three counts of forgery, three counts of worthless checks and three counts of forgery (Chippewa County) and sentenced to two consecutive one to ten year terms. Phillips was granted a full pardon based on his outstanding rehabilitation and employment record since release from incarceration.

(43) MARVIN J. PLINER, 54, who was convicted on April 20, 1942, in the Circuit Court for Vernon County of the crime of statutory rape, two counts, and sentenced to two terms of one to five years, concurrent. Pliner was granted a full pardon based on the period of time since the conviction and his good citizenship.

(44) ALEX RAINES, 74, who was convicted on January 20, 1947, in the Circuit Court for Dane County of the crime of first degree murder and sentenced to a term of life. His sentence was commuted to time served based on his satisfactory adjustment for the five and one-half years that he has been on parole. This recommendation was concurred in by the prosecuting district attorney and his parole agent.

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(45) **GEORGE PAUL REIMERS, 52**, who was convicted on April 23, 1964, in the County Court for Waupaca County of the crime of first degree murder and sentenced to a term of life. Reimers was granted a commutation of sentence to a term of thirty years based on the circumstances surrounding the offense and his exceptional effort at rehabilitation while incarcerated.

(46) **WILFREDO ROSARIO, 22**, who was convicted on March 20, 1968, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of burglary (two counts), and sentenced to a term of ten years and five years, consecutive. The granting of a commutation of sentence making both sentences concurrent instead of consecutive was based on the recommendation that he begin appearances before the Parole Board at an earlier date.

(47) **ALLAN ROTBERG, 21**, who was convicted on March 10, 1969, in the County Court for Dane County of the crime of petty theft and sentenced to pay a fine of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and costs or fifteen days in the County Jail. Rotberg was granted a full pardon based on his lack of previous convictions, the minor nature of the offense and the desire to enter graduate school.

(48) **GEORGE ROTTMAN, JR.**, who was convicted on September 13, 1966, in the County Court, Branch II, for Fond du Lac County of the crime of having a private pecuniary interest in a public contract while serving as a member of the council of the City of Fond du Lac and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs of \$35.50 or thirty days in jail. Mr. Rottman paid his fine and costs on December 23, 1966, and was discharged. The granting of a full pardon was based on the technical nature of the violation of the statute and with the favorable recommendation of the prosecuting district attorney.

(49) **JOHN J. SADOWSKI, 20**, who was convicted on April 5, 1968, in the County Court for Barron County of the crime of burglary, five counts, and sentenced to a term of two years on each of three counts, concurrent, two years, consecutive, and two years, consecutive (total six years).

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His sentence was commuted to a term of two years on each of four counts, concurrent, and two years on one count, consecutive, on the basis that his youth, lack of previous criminal activity and exemplary prison record all indicate that earlier appearances before the Parole Board would aid the rehabilitation process. Local officials indicated no objection to the commutation as granted.

(50) ARMANDO SAVAGLIO, 35, who was convicted on April 30, 1959, in the Municipal Court for Kenosha County of the crime of sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to a term of fourteen months' probation. Savaglio was granted a full pardon based on evidence of complete rehabilitation and worthy citizenship during the last decade.

(51) HARRY SHON, 68, who was convicted on July 19, 1935, in the Circuit Court for Washington County of the crime of bank robbery (armed) and sentenced to a term of fifteen to forty years. Shon was granted a full pardon based on his age and period of time since the offense.

(52) CLARENCE WILLIAM SMITH, 46, who was convicted on October 6, 1965, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of commercial gambling and sentenced to pay a fine of Five Hundred Dollars and costs. Smith was granted a full pardon based on his record of citizenship and to remove disabilities to securing a license for his business.

(53) MICHAEL L. SMITH, 25, who was convicted on July 14, 1969, in the County Court for Columbia County of the crime of forgery, three counts, bad check, six counts, and sentenced to a term of four years; Smith was also convicted on July 15, 1969, in the County Court, Branch 2, for Dodge County of the crime of forgery, fourteen counts, and issuing worthless checks and sentenced to a term of fifteen years, consecutive to Columbia County sentence. Smith was granted a commutation of sentence based on the excessive nature of the original sentences.

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(54) ANTHONY TARANTINO, 38, who was convicted on June 20, 1950, before the County Court for Waukesha County of the crime of carnal knowledge and abuse of a minor and sentenced to a term of one to two years. Tarantino was granted a full pardon based on his age at the time of the offense and the time span since his conviction.

(55) RICHARD JOSEPH THEODORE, 29, who was convicted on April 21, 1961, in the Municipal Court for Waukesha County of the crime of burglary and sentenced to a term of three years. Theodore was granted a full pardon based on his citizenship and employment record.

(56) RICHARD JAMES TRAUTLINE, 35, who was convicted as follows: On February 28, 1958, in the County Court for Eau Claire County of the crime of robbery, two counts, and sentenced to two terms of fifteen years, concurrent; on December 8, 1959, in the Superior Court for Douglas County of the crime of robbery and sentenced to a term of twenty-five years, concurrent to previous sentence; and on March 7, 1960, in the Circuit Court for Dodge County of the crime of prison escape and sentenced to a term of three years, consecutive to previous sentences. Trautline was granted a commutation of sentence to a term of twenty years on the conviction of robbery before the Superior Court for Douglas County, and the three-year sentence on the conviction of prison escape before the Superior Court of Dodge County was commuted to run concurrent to the previous sentences, in order to aid his rehabilitation and based on the recommendation of the Wisconsin Division of Corrections.

(57) JOHNNIE B. TRIPLETT, 38, who was convicted on December 26, 1961, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of possession of marijuana and sexual intercourse with a child and sentenced to a term of five years on each charge, concurrent. The granting of a full pardon was based on his fine record of rehabilitation since release from incarceration and his desire to further his business responsibilities.

(58) KERRI WEISEL, 23, who was convicted on April 25, 1969, in the Circuit Court for Dane County of the crime

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of sale of hashish and sentenced to a term of two years' probation. Miss Weisel was granted a full pardon based on lack of previous convictions, academic record and the desire to gain a teaching certificate.

(59) SHERMAN CALVIN WHEELER, 39, who was convicted on January 21, 1959, in the Municipal Court for Brown County of the crime of burglary, robbery, two counts, and operating automobile without owner's consent, and sentenced to a term of ten years, two terms of thirty years, and a term of five years, all concurrent. Wheeler was granted a full pardon based on his record during parole.

(60) CHARLES OSBOURNE WILLIAMSON, 58, who was convicted on January 2, 1932, in the Circuit Court for Sheboygan County of the crime of assault with intent to rob and sentenced to a term of one to ten years. Williamson was granted a full pardon based on the time span since the offense and the evidence of rehabilitation.

(61) ALAN RAY WISCH, 25, who was convicted on April 10, 1963, in the Circuit Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of burglary and sentenced to three years' probation. Wisch was also convicted on December 27, 1963, in the County Court for Milwaukee County of the crime of contributing to delinquency of children and sentenced to a term of ninety days in the House of Correction. Wisch was granted a full pardon based on his age at the time of the offenses and commendable achievements since that time.
