Whereas, Wisconsin's climate, because of rapidly changing seasons, provides only a limited number of months suitable for highway construction, making it necessary that highway work commence as soon as the weather allows; and

Whereas, despite these pressing present needs the United States department of transportation is holding back highway trust funds; and

Whereas, this state's share of these funds will reach an estimated \$55,000,000 by July 1 of this year; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the senate, That congress be immediately informed of this state's needs and urged to take action necessary to release this state's share of held-back highway trust funds at the earliest possible date; and, be it further

Resolved, That duly attested copies of this resolution be transmitted to the secretary of the federal department of transportation, the secretary of the senate of the United States, the chief clerk of the house of representatives and the members of Wisconsin's congressional delegation.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill directs the senate committee on Health and Social Services to investigate drug abuse and dependence, reviewing the responsibilities of state agencies and their role in drug education and law enforcement. The committee is also directed to review existing legislation and education programs and to propose necessary legislation and education programs consistent with its findings, reporting back to the legislature by January 18, 1972. Necessary professional staff members are to be furnished by the legislative council. Persons requested to testify are granted immunity from criminal prosecution for acts relating to their testimony.

Whereas, the problem of drug abuse and dependence is a matter of the most serious concern to the Wisconsin senate; and

Whereas, the statutes of the state of Wisconsin declare that the use of certain mind-altering drugs is unlawful; and that the use of such drugs and substances may constitute a serious health danger both to the user and society; and

Whereas, the 1969 legislature made substantial changes in the state drug laws and authorized educational programs to combat this growing problem; and

Whereas, the senate committee on Health and Social Services has a responsibility to review state programs in the drug area and the committee has held one conference

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on drug problems and intends to hold others in the future including meeting with drug users; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the senate, That the senate committee on Health and Social Services be directed and authorized to conduct an inquiry and investigation into the phenomenon of drug abuse and dependence and to examine all questions related thereto, and particularly, without limitation because of enumeration:

(1) Review the functions and responsibilities of the several state departments and agencies in regard to the general question and regarding drug education and law enforcement;

(2) Review existing legislation and educational programs, and particularly the laws and programs enacted into law by the 1969 legislature, to determine their effectiveness and adequacy;

(3) Propose such legislation and educational programs as may be appropriate in the context of the findings of the committee; and, be it further

Resolved, That persons who appear and are directed to testify before the committee concerning activities which are the subject matter of this resolution shall have immunity from prosecution in accordance with section 13.35 of the statutes; and, be it further

Resolved, That the senate committee on Health and Social Services shall conduct such public hearings in such parts of the state as is determined by the chairman; and that the committee shall complete its investigation and submit its final report to the legislature no later than January 18, 1972, and that the necessary professional staff for the committee be provided by the legislative council staff under section 13.91 of the statutes.
