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### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

#### **Senate Resolution 26**

Relating to imprudent disclosure of information compiled by the Department of Justice.

Whereas, the Assembly has voted to investigate the law enforcement activities of the Department of Justice; and

Whereas, imprudent disclosure of the information compiled by the Department of Justice could undermine and destroy the law enforcement efforts of the department; and

Whereas, at a time when the department has accelerated its law enforcement efforts in the areas of narcotics and dangerous drugs, organized crime, environmental protection and consumer protection, an investigation of the department's activities by a branch of this Legislature can only serve to discredit law enforcement and to break employe morale; and

Whereas, the members of the Senate are fully confident that the Department of Justice does not surveil or investigate law-abiding citizens but aims, instead, all its efforts at those who violate those criminal laws for the enforcement

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of which the department is responsible or shares responsibility with the law enforcement agencies of local government; now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Senate,* That it deploras the imprudent action of the Assembly, which can only serve to jeopardize the security of law-abiding citizens who have come forward with valid complaints and information relating to serious criminal activity; and, be it further

*Resolved,* That a duly attested copy of this resolution be at once forwarded to the Speaker of the Wisconsin Assembly.
