Appendix to Senate Bill 242

Public Policy Involved

This bill is not desirable as a matter of public policy. The

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sales tax is a tax on the gross receipts of sales made by retailers; sales by vending machines are retail sales. Vending machines compete with restaurants, drive-ins, soda fountains and other retail establishments preparing and selling food for direct consumption. It is unfair to give a competitive advantage to vending machine operators by exempting their sales of food products and beverages while continuing to tax other retailers selling such items.
