EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS

To the Honorable, the Senate:

I am returning Senate Bill 363 without my approval.

Senate Bill 363 amends Wisconsin Statutes Section 21.13, to delete the discretion now vested in the Governor for the appointment of counsel for National Guardsmen who are prosecuted civilly or criminally for acts performed by such member while in his performance of military duty or in pursuance thereof.

Wisconsin Statutes, Section 21.13, deals with the appointment of special counsel. An opinion rendered to my office by Attorney General Robert Warren dated December 31, 1971, concluded that Senate Bill 363 would require that the Governor appoint special counsel in every case where a National Guardsman is prosecuted through civil or criminal action for any act performed by such member while in the performance of his military duty or in pursuance thereof. Because this bill removes the prerogative of the Executive Office to appoint the Attorney General's office to represent a State employee when that State employee is subjected to suit because of his conduct during his performance of his social duties, and because this bill might increase the cost to taxpayers of defending State employees, I do not think it is appropriate to sign Senate Bill 363 into law at this time.
