Appendix to Senate Bill 902

Recommendation

This bill corrects an inequality that has occurred because certain individuals were inadvertently removed from membership under the Wisconsin retirement fund as a result of

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accepting a position with a state non-profit building corporation. They were returned to membership as a result of Chapter 115, Laws of 1967. Their duties for the state remained identical after the enactment of Chapter 115 as before. As de facto state employees, they should receive retirement credit for the service requested. Therefore, it is the opinion of this committee that *passage of this bill, as amended by senate amendment 1, is in the best public interest.*
