GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGES

November 22, 1977

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved Assembly Bill 475 as Chapter 181, Laws of 1977, and deposited it in the office of the Secretary of State.

The bill grants broad authority to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to weigh and certify the weights of grain on a user fee basis. The effect of AB 475 is to authorize these activities at the Milwaukee terminals. In accomplishing these purposes by amending Section 93.06 (1m) of the statutes, a change was made to wording unrelated to the bill's purpose which could have unintended policy implications.

Existing statutory language authorizes the Department to "inspect or examine upon request animals or plants and their products, including food, and facilities used in the production, processing or distribution thereof ..." The bill deletes the word "thereof" and substitutes the words "of animals or plants and their products," which seeks to be more specific. However, the result may be to create ambiguity compared to the department's present authority. It is unclear whether the new language specifically authorizes the Department to inspect or examine facilities used in the production, processing or distribution of food as it does for animals or plants and their products. Without a specific reference to "food" the agency's authority in this area could conceivably be challenged. This possible ambiguity can be eliminated by an item veto.

I urge the legislature to sustain this item veto to retain the Department's clear authority on the subject.
