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transportation and health treatment aidable costs, decreasing the primary guaranteed valuation for 1982-83 school aids and delaying part of the June 1982 aid payment until July 1982, the renewable energy resource system incentive program, granting rule-making authority, providing penalties and decreasing and making appropriations.
