REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER

"Thank you. It is a privilege for me to assume the post of Speaker today.

I thank you for your confidence and pledge to serve you and the people of Wisconsin to the best of my ability.

In electing a Speaker, the House bestows on one of its members great power over them, and it has been such since our legislative system first started its evolution in England. But the power is restrained. As elsewhere in our enlightened system, it is power checked.

Above all else, it is a position and person that must live by the rules.

Assembly Rule 3 (k) captures the position well when it states that the Speaker shall "In general, represent and stand for the Assembly, declaring its will and obeying its commands ..."

I look forward to obeying your commands. The lessons I have learned from two friends -- Norman Anderson and Ed Jackamonis -- will help us all.

Those of you who were just sworn in are here today because democracy works. You are here to make democracy continue to work.

You have won an election. Like the recipient of the Chinese curse, you have realized your desire.

This chamber is the arena in which you will now fight for the people of Wisconsin.

Robert La Follette said "...democracy is a life; and involves continual struggle. It is only as those of every generation who love democracy resist with all their might the encroachments of its enemies that the ideals of representative government can even be nearly approximated."

And when La Follette described his democracy, he also was talking about economic democracy.

People are without jobs in Wisconsin today. Some people are hungry. Some people are homeless. Children need security.

The awesome thing about this job we are fortunate to hold is that we have the power to provide jobs, to provide help, to provide hope.

We only fail, I believe, when we decide not to use the power the people have given us. I plan to use that power.

It may be that government that governs least governs best, but we in Wisconsin are going to have all the government that is necessary to do the job.

The people already know that those with jobs will have to help those without jobs. That those with profits will have to help those without profits.

The people already know our citizen government cannot work without an educated citizenry. Commerce cannot be facilitated nor can farmers move their goods without an adequate transportation system. Our commitment to the elderly and helpless must be maintained in bad times as well as good.

The Governor of New York in his inaugural address said, "A society as blessed as ours should be able to find room at the table for the hungry, shelter for the homeless, work for the idle, care for the elderly and infirmed and hope for the destitute."

Wisconsin is part of a great nation. We cannot expect to be an island of prosperity and enlightenment. Other states are not our enemies. We must seek common goals with our neighbors and not pursue policies that steal their jobs.

Slicing the economic pie in a different manner does not make the pie grow larger.

We must pursue the national idea. And we can make this nation stronger by disagreeing vigorously with national policies that we feel may hurt us.

Be proud Wisconsin led the way with the nuclear freeze referenda passed by this House. And we will send a message of equality to the women of this nation when we adopt an equal rights amendment to our state constitution.

So let us begin our journey. And remember, the goal is not to soar with eagles, but to help others to the heights -- and then go back for another load.

ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION

To create section 25 of article I of the constitution, relating to prohibiting denial of equal rights on the basis of sex (first consideration).

Whereas, equality of legal rights, regardless of sex, is necessary to achieving the ideal of equal justice under law; and

Whereas, the adoption of an equal rights amendment is in the judgment of the legislature and the people of the state of Wisconsin a necessary and proper means of assuring such equality; and

Whereas, it is the intent of the legislature to ensure that benefits and protections provided to persons of one sex are extended to all persons, and it is further the intent of the legislature that this principle of extension of benefits shall apply to any protection or benefit provided by law unless such law is specifically repealed by the legislature; and

Whereas, the legislature here acknowledges that such an amendment shall have no effect on the ability of congress to conscript persons for military service of any kind; and

Whereas, it is the intent of the legislature that the right of privacy guaranteed in the federal constitution permits sex-segregated sanitary facilities; and

Whereas, the legislature intends this amendment to apply to discrimination based on sex and not discrimination based on sexual orientation; and

Whereas, the legislature has determined, understands and intends that such an amendment shall not limit in any way the legislature's power to enact legislation prohibiting, regulating or allowing abortion; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That:

SECTION 1. Section 25 of article I of the constitution is created to read:

[Article I] Section 25. Equality of rights or equal protection under the law may not be denied on the basis of sex.

Be it further resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election.

April 1982 Special Session Assembly Joint Resolution 1

Enrolled No. 43

ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend section 1 of article VIII of the constitution, relating to earmarking not less than 40% of any state sales or use taxes for education property tax relief (first consideration).

Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of article VIII of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article VIII] Section 1. The Except as further provided in this section, the rule of taxation shall be uniform but the.

- (1) The legislature may empower by law authorize cities, villages or towns to collect and return taxes on real estate located therein by optional methods.
- (2) Taxes shall be levied upon such property with such classifications as to forests and minerals including or separate or severed from the land, as the legislature shall prescribe prescribes by law. Taxation of agricultural land and undeveloped land, both as defined by law, need not be uniform with the taxation of each other nor with the taxation of other real property.
- (3) Taxation of merchants' stock-in-trade, manufacturers' materials and finished products, and livestock need not be uniform with the taxation of real property and other personal property, but the taxation of all such merchants' stock-in-trade, manufacturers' materials and finished products and livestock shall be uniform, except that the legislature may provide by law that the value thereof shall be determined on an average basis. Taxes may also be imposed

- (4) The legislature may by law impose taxes on incomes, privileges and occupations, which taxes may be graduated and progressive, and reasonable exemptions may be provided.
- (5) The legislature may by law impose excise, sales and use taxes. Of any tax imposed on sales or use, the legislature shall by law set aside an amount equal to 40% of the proceeds for a school property tax credit. Fifty percent of the amount shall be made available to the towns, villages and cities in proportion to their share of the total property tax levied for education purposes and 50% of the amount shall be made available to the towns, villages and cities on the basis of a general equalization school aid formula, as set by law. Such towns, villages and cities shall allocate the entire amount of such moneys to property owners in proportion to their share of total assessed valuation in the taxing jurisdiction. The resultant amounts shall be shown separately on property tax bills as a credit against all property taxes due.
