Representative R. Travis asked unanimous consent that the following statement read by him be printed in the journal. Granted.

"Blanche Kelso Bruce, born March 1, 1841 in Prince Edward County, Virginia was raised as a slave. He attended Oberlin College in Ohio after the Civil War and later became a farmer in Mississippi. Between 1872 and 1875, Mr. Bruce served on the Mississippi Levee Board, as Sheriff and Tax Collector of Bolivar County, Mississippi. He was elected to serve in the United States Senate in 1875; serving from March 4, 1875 to March 3, 1881, as a Republican.

Mr. Bruce was appointed to serve as Register of the Treasury by President Garfield on March 19, 1881. He served as Recorder of Deeds for the District of Columbia from 1891 to 1893 and was again appointed Register of the Treasury in 1897, where he served until his death on March 17, 1898.

Blanche Kelso Bruce was the first Black man elected to serve a full term in the United States Senate. Despite his humble beginnings, in an environment that was not

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conducive to his political growth and development, he managed to serve his country and his party well. His record in government indicated that he was an extremely competent and capable representative of the people he served.

I ask that this body join me in saluting Mr. Blanche Kelso Bruce."

Representative Shoemaker asked unanimous consent that the assembly adjourn in honor of the birthday of Representative Hephner. Granted. Representative Johnson moved that the assembly stand adjourned until 10:00 A.M. tomorrow.
