Attached is a copy of "A Report to the State of Wisconsin Legislature concerning the Management of State Trust Lands". This report was prepared at the request of the legislature as a provision of 1987 Wisconsin Act 76 which was enacted on November 18, 1987.

The report was prepared by the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands with the assistance of the Department of Natural Resources. The Department has contributed information concerning lands of interest to their programs, suggestions on the Board's land management program and overall advice on the report.

As you will see, due to the Board's long history, the nature of the trust land holdings and scattered location of the lands, the management of the trust lands is a complex matter. Any discussion of divestiture of the trust lands should be done with this in mind.

Because of the limited period allowed for the development of this report, it is, in some areas, quite general and cannot address all issues in-depth. Should you require further information about the trust lands and their management, please contact us.

In compliance with Section 1, 46.03(5)(c) of Act 474, the following information is provided for your consideration and review and for referral to the appropriate standing committees. The figures below

cover the period from January 1, 1987, through December 31, 1987.

1. One inmate was transferred involuntarily from a prison to a mental health institute under 51.20(13)(a)4.

There were 5 inmates committed under 51.20(13)(a)4 for whom treatment was authorized on an outpatient basis in the Wisconsin Resource Center.

2. The number of inmates transferred to a mental health institute on a voluntary basis was 6, and the average length of stay was 35 days. One inmate was transferred involuntarily from a prison to a mental health institute under s. 51.37(5).

In the Mental Health Institutes, the number of inmates being treated with psychotropic drugs on both a voluntary and involuntary basis was 4.

Types of drugs administered consisted of the following: Thorazine, Prolixin, Stelazine, and Mellaril.

During 1987, 566 inmates underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs while residing in correctional facilities.

There were 183 different inmates who underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs while residing in the Wisconsin Resource Center. This constitutes a total of 749 inmates who underwent voluntary treatment.

3. Mental health services available at Mendota Mental Health Institute, Winnebago Mental Health Institute and the Wisconsin Resource Center to inmates transferred on both a voluntary and involuntary basis, where appropriate, are as follows: chemotherapy, sheltered workshops, educational assistance, token economy, individual therapy, behaviorally oriented therapy, and group therapies consisting of occupational, recreational, industrial and family oriented approaches.

Mental health services, both psychiatric and psychological, are available at each of the adult male and female institutions. Services available are: chemotherapy, individual and group psychotherapy, social skills training, neuropsychological evaluations and crisis intervention. Inmates who need more intensive mental health services are transferred to either the Wisconsin Resource Center or one of the Institutes.
