COMMITTEE REPORTS State of Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services March 25, 1988

To the Honorable the Senate:

I am pleased to provide you with this copy of the 1987 Wisconsin Annual Report on Child Abuse and Neglect. This report analyzes the 28,838 reports of suspected child abuse and neglect received by Wisconsin's social service system in 1986. This volume represents a 10.9 percent increase over 1985. One-third of the reports continue to be substantiated. Nine deaths of children were substantiated as having been caused by child abuse or neglect. Reports of child neglect constitutes the largest category of abuse or neglect reports received in 1986, totaling 40 percent of all cases. Although the increase of reported sexual abuse cases was a modest 6 percent, they represent the largest group of substantiated cases. This has major implications for the service delivery system, as the demand for limited treatment resources continues to increase.

This report, as well as describing the extent of abuse and neglect in Wisconsin, also underscores steps Wisconsin has taken to address the needs of these children. Additional copies of this report are available from the DHSS Forms Center.

We have completed an evaluation of the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District's program for contracting with businesses owned by minorities and women as required by 1987 Wisconsin Act 27. The program establishes goals for levels of participation of businesses owned by minorities and women in each district project.

The District has, on an aggregate level, met its percentage participation goals. However, we found that all participation goals were not met on 7 of 28 (or 25 percent) of district projects in 1987, and that many question whether district goals promote development of businesses which provide long-term benefits to the community. Evidence suggests, though, that the District is committed to continually improving the program, as several identified problems with the program have been, or will soon be, addressed.

While future program improvements are planned, our review indicates the District has not consistently enforced past policies. Greater consistency in following through on established policies and procedures is necessary if planned program improvements are to be effective.

Finally, the District's program has contributed to more work being performed by businesses owned by minorities and women, but the available evidence indicates there has been no increase in the number of viable, local businesses owned by minorities and women able to do work on district projects. Many believe this should be a goal of the District's contracting program. We include several policy and program options for consideration by the District and the Legislature which may contribute to encouraging the formation and growth of minority and women-owned business enterprises.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended by district staff. The District's response is the Appendix.
