EXECUTIVE ORDER #108

Relating to a Special Session of the Legislature

I, Tommy G. Thompson, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, section 4 of the Constitution of Wisconsin, do require the convening of a special session of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison, beginning on Tuesday, January 29, 1991 at 10:00 A.M. solely to consider legislation regarding crime control in the following subject areas:

1. Legislation relating to minimum sentences for crime involving dangerous weapons.

2. Legislation relating to gun-free school zones and providing penalties.

3. Legislation relating to increasing the penalty for carrying a concealed weapon.

4. Legislation relating to going armed in a 1st class city and providing penalties.

5. Legislation relating to the possession of a dangerous weapon by a child and providing penalties.

6. Legislation relating to creating one (1) additional circuit court in Milwaukee County, designating some circuit courts to handle primarily crimes involving violence and making appropriations.

7. Legislation relating to drug paraphernalia.

8. Legislation relating to minimum sentences for controlled substances offenses.
