Pursuant to the requirements of sections 153.10 (1), Wis. Stats., I am pleased to submit to the Governor and to the Legislature the quarterly Health Care Data Report. This report is based on hospital inpatient discharge data reported to the Office of Health Care Information by all operating general medical surgical and specialty hospitals in Wisconsin for the third quarter of 1990 (July-September). For the first time, it also contains selected outpatient surgery utilization and charge data from general medical-surgical hospitals in Wisconsin during the same quarter.

This report fulfills the statutory requirement to report "in a manner that permits comparisons among hospitals... the charges for up to 100 health care services or diagnostic-related groups selected bt the office."

I wish to express my appreciation to all Wisconsin hospitals for their cooperation in the collection of the data which enabled us to prepare this report. Printed copies of this report are available from the Office. Please contact our office should you or your staff have any questions.
