To the Honorable, the Senate:

As required by Article V. Section 6 of the Wisconsin Constitution, I am submitting the annual Executive Clemency Report to the Legislature, covering those clemency cases considered by the Pardon Advisory Board upon which final dispositions were rendered during calendar year 1990. During 1990, the board heard a total of ninety applications. The following twelve applicants received full pardons in 1990:

Donald C. Dahlstrom, convicted of unlawful contracts and conspiracy in Price County on 6/25/80 and sentenced to two years probation and fined \$5,509, was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of his demonstrated need and his societal contributions since the conviction.

Ida G. Hansen, convicted of Theft in Dane County on 11/12/84 and sentenced to three years probation and \$5,000 restitution was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of her demonstrated need and personal development since the offense.

David T. Haug, was convicted of sale of marijuana and possession and furnishing of pentobarbital in Oneida County on 1/5/71 and sentenced to one year in prison and two years in prison to be served consecutively, six months in the county jail with Huber priviliges and three years probation. Mr. Haug was granted a pardon on February 5, 1990 because of the length of time since the offence and his demonstrated need.

Larry Arthur Hoyer, convicted of Theft in Barron County on 6/20/79 and sentenced to two years probation, was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of his demonstrated need and his personal development since the offense.

Gerald R. Johnson, convicted of ten counts of burglary in Fond du Lac County on 12/23/69 and sentenced to five

years on each count, to be served concurrently, was granted a pardon on June 5, 1990 because of the length of time since the offense and his demonstrated need.

Duane Kraemer, convicted of two counts of robbery in Milwaukee County on 8/14/58 and sentenced to one year on each count to be served concurrently was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of the length of time since the offense and his good employment record.

Beecher A. Larson, convicted of possession of marijuana in Racine County on 3/14/78 and sentenced to one year probation was granted a pardon on June 5, 1990 because of his demonstrated need and the length of time since the conviction.

Michael R. Magedanz, convicted of delivery of a controlled substance in Waukesha County on 12/19/73 and sentenced to seven months in jail with Huber priviliges was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of the length of time since the conviction and his good employment and educational record.

Calvin R. Moore, was convicted of being party to the crime of burglary in Dane County on 5/2/78 and sentenced to two years probation and ordered to pay \$150 restitution. Mr. Moore was granted a pardon on November 8, 1990 because of his demonstrated need and contribution to the community.

Alice A. Tarwid, convicted of being party to the crime of burglary in Walworth County on 3/3/77 and sentenced to eighteen months in prison (stayed) and three years probation was granted a pardon on February 5, 1990 because of her exceptional personal development since the offense.

Terry A. Taylor, convicted of burglary in Racine County on 8/29/75 and sentenced to two years probation, restitution and twenty days in the county jail with Huber priviliges was granted a pardon on July 10, 1990 because of his demonstrated need and the length of time since the offense.

Martin Thode, was convicted of having a private interest in a public contract in Eau Claire County on 2/7/78 and fined \$500, and was subsequently convicted of felon in possession of a firearm in Eau Claire County on 12/19/86/and fined \$500. Mr. Thode was granted a pardon on November 2, 1990 because of the length of time since the convictions and a strong showing of community support.

I thank the members of the Pardon Advisory Board and my legal staff for their assistance in the processing of clemency cases.
