Appendix to Senate Bill 250

Public Policy Involved

According to the U. W. System Personnel office, the purpose of the faculty sabbatical program is to recognize and enhance teaching efforts and excellence. The sabbatical program is authorized by statute, and U. W. Regent policy requires that faculty on sabbatical must engage in intensive study to become more effective teachers and scholars.

Under present law faculty members who are granted sabbatical leave for one semester continue to receive full pay during that semester period. However, faculty who are awarded one-year sabbatical cannot receive pay more than 65% of their previous compensation under policy rules adopted by the Board of Regents. This bill would allow faculty members who are granted one year sabbaticals to continue to accrue service credit, and at the compensation rate in effect before the sabbatical leave. The bill also gives the Board of Regents of the U. W. System the flexibility to structure its sabbatical program in a manner that is competitive with other major universities.

Recommendation

The Senate substitute amendment 1 to Senate Bill 250 clarifies the provisions and procedures for crediting sabbatical leave granted to U. W. System faculty. The Joint Survey Committee on Retirement Systems recommends the adoption of Senate substitute amendment 1, and the Committee finds that this legislation as so amended is good public policy and recommends its passage.
