To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the Personnel Commission. The Commission: 1) investigates complaints that state employers have discriminated or retaliated against state employees, and 2) conducts hearings on these complaints and on civil service appeals.

We found the Commission takes, on average, two years to investigate a complaint, from the time it is filed until the Commission determines whether probable cause exists that discrimination or retaliation occurred. A substantial complaint backlog contributes to delays in the investigative process. In addition, we found commission hearing examiners are not consistently timely in completing the hearing process.

The Legislature adopted several initiatives in the 1991-93 Biennial Budget Act to assist the Commission in improving the timeliness of investigations. These initiatives, however, are not likely to reduce time delays to acceptable levels unless the Commission also improves the efficiency of its operations. We recommend several steps the Commission could consider, such as limiting the scope of its investigations and setting workload standards for processing hearing-related documentation, to further reduce the delays in investigating complaints and conducting hearings.

In the course of our evaluation, we examined two additional issues. First, we heard complaints that the Commission is biased against the interests of state employees. However, our review of the disposition of complaints filed with the Commission did not find evidence to support this position. Second, we reviewed complaints of retaliation filed by state employe whistleblowers. The major problem in implementation of the whistleblower protection law is the previously noted lack of timeliness in completing investigations.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the commissioners and commission staff. The Commission's response is attached as Appendix III.

To the Honorable, the Senate:

I am vetoing Senate Bill 148 in its entirety. The bill authorizes a special distinguishing registration plate for use on vehicles owned or leased by veterans and civilian survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor. It also directs DOT to work with a group related to the attack in designing the special plate. A \$10 fee for the plate is established.

I have no objection to the provision of a special registration plate for military survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor. AB 547 makes that provision, and I have signed that. SB 148 is identical to AB 547 with the exception that it makes civilian survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor eligible for a special registration plate in addition to military survivors. State veterans organizations contacted my office to express their support for AB 547.

By extending authority for the special registration plate to civilian survivors the bill creates an administrative problem for the Department of Transportation which would find civilian claims much harder to verify than military claims. To issue plates without verification of the civilian claims would dilute the value of the plate. I am therefore vetoing SB 148.
