To the Honorable the Legislature:

The Department of Natural Resources is pleased to transmit to you the results of two studies entitled "Discarded Household Appliances-Management and Recycling in Wisconsin" and "Final Report Household Batteries Waste Management Study" required under 1989 Wisconsin Act 335. These studies address the barriers to the recycling of major appliances and the feasibility benefits and method of household battery collection and recycling.

As you know, the major appliances were banned from landfilling by State Law as of January 1, 1991. Also, 1989 Wisconsin Act 284 required that refrigerants must be removed from major appliances before they can be recycled. These requirements will impact the way in which appliances are handled and eventually recycled in Wisconsin and nationally. The impact of these new requirements plus other issues are reported on in this study; also included are suggested actions that our department and the legislature may want to consider to improve the environmental management of this waste prior to the salvaging of metal. Some of these suggestions would require a change in State law.

I want to share with you the fact that Wisconsin is viewed by many states in the country as the national leader on the recycling of major appliances particularly as it applies to the refrigerant issue. This position of national leadership could not have occurred without direct action of the legislature.

The proper disposal of household batteries and their potential recyclability has received national attention recently. In Wisconsin, batteries for personal use in the home can legally be landfilled. The study does recommend that a state program for household battery recycling be considered with suggestions as to the best

method of doing this. These suggestions have been modeled after similar laws being considered in other states.

As required by 1989 Wisconsin Act 335, we will distribute copies of the appliance report to appropriate solid waste managers, scrap dealers, processors and other interested persons. As required by s. 13.172 of Wis. Stats., we will provide copies of these reports to all interested legislators. Thank you again for allowing us the opportunity to study these issues with regard to the management and recycling of solid waste in Wisconsin.
