PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS State of Wisconsin Department of Administration

April 30, 1992

To the Honorable the Legislature:

This report is transmitted as required by ss. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under section 13.172(3) stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of March, 1992.

On March 1, 1992, the Recycling Fund (Fund 79) balance was \$-4.0 million. This shortfall continued through March 31, 1992 when the balance was \$-2.5 million. The shortfall is due to the timing of revenues to the fund.

The Recycling Fund shortfall was not in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by State Finance will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

State of Wisconsin University of Wisconsin System

To the Honorable the Legislature:

1989 Act 336 (Senate Bill 542) authorized and provided funding for a study of the use of telecommunications to transmit educational and business data throughout northwestern Wisconsin and to

develop funding proposals to establish such a telecommunications system. The \$50,000 appropriation provided in ACT 336 permitted UW-Superior to provide applied research and technical assistance to the Northern Wisconsin Educational Communication System (NWECS) consortium. This consortium consists of UW-Superior, Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College, CESA 12, and the School District of Superior. UW-Superior contracted with Network Resources, Inc. of Madison to conduct the study specified in the legislation.

I am transmitting the report prepared in fulfillment of this legislation, which did not specify a reporting date or reporting authority. This Telecommunications Study for Northern Wisconsin has two parts:

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Unemployment Reserve Fund for the years ending June 30, 1991, and June 30, 1990. We performed the audit at the request of the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations and to meet our audit responsibilities under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

The adjusted cash balance ni the Reserve Fund on the Supplementary Information Schedule increased \$44 million during the past fiscal year. Because this cash balance was again in excess of \$1 billion, the lowest tax rate schedule will continue to be in effect at least through calendar year 1992.

Our audit report contains the auditor's unqualified opinion on the financial statements and related footnotes, and the supplementary information on the Fund's cash balance and related footnote. We have included management recommendations in a separate letter issued to the Department.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by department staff during the audit.
