**STATEMENT TO CORRECTIONS FACILITIES COMMITTEE
MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN
APRIL 9, 1997**

The executive budget submitted in February to the state legislature contains disappointing proposals for correctional policy in the state of Wisconsin. Ignoring the final recommendations of his appointed Task Force on Sentencing and Corrections; ignoring the daunting cost projections of continuing current correctional policy, the Governor proposes more of the same---longer sentences and an end to parole and mandatory release.

Just two years ago the Governor's charge to that Task Force was : "Our resources, both human and financial are limited, ...make recommendations on how current corrections resources can be maximized to reduce and manage risk in the community ..."

The Task Force took the view that threats to personal safety and property are local, and by continuing prison building programs we would consume the resources that might otherwise be used in the communities to which almost all prisoners eventually return. They recommended the more cost effective approach of strengthening the resources controlling behavior in the community. The establishment of Community Confinement and Control facilities would provide a type of imprisonment that could serve as a confinement, a short term sanction, a mandatory placement prior to prison release, or secure treatment. Correctional supervisors would have the authority and flexibility to intervene in risk control as needed

This proposal to provide facilities and increase the authority to more closely supervise the reintegration of offenders into the community of work and social interaction is a positive step in community safety. We view this as a type of protection or crime prevention as well as rehabilitative assistance. Such a change in corrections policy would have a significant financial impact here in Milwaukee County where the taxpayers are shouldering the increasing expense of an overcrowded jail and criminal justice system.

The League supports the Governor's inclusion of statutory language allowing the Department of Corrections to implement a pilot program based on these recommendations but it is very disappointing that this Task Force's important work has been virtually ignored as a basis for correctional policy discussion.


We also urge legislators to be aware that the financial focus on community corrections has been quite effective in Minnesota, thus allowing prison space for offenders who need long term incarceration. By providing funding for adequate community corrections efforts, this state spends less on corrections than Wisconsin and also has a crime rate below the national average.

The Governor's budget initiative of longer sentences and ending parole and mandatory release offers no explanation of its effects or costs. The Task Force itself rejected a similar proposal because of the enormous costs attached and indeed that is supported by past projections of over \$300 million by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau.

The League of Women Voters also rejects the Governor's proposal to eliminate parole and in effect require the building of more prisons. We believe that the increase in building costs will reduce the resources available for effective implementation of community safety programs. Longer sentences don't eliminate offenders returning to communities, and it will likely mean there will be insufficient funding for supervision and support. This is a troublesome element of correctional policy in the state of Wisconsin that needs to be addressed.

The recent study done by Wisconsin Correctional Service tabulating all the criminal and traffic cases in Milwaukee County closed in 1995 (March 8, Milwaukee Journal Sentinel) confirms that there are other methods of crime control and correction that could serve our state more effectively. The reasonable and proper public safety belief "Every dangerous offender should be locked up" must not become translated into "Every offender is so dangerous they must be locked up."

We urge the legislature to reject the budget proposals and to make correctional policy decisions based on a carefully planned strategy that addresses future needs and available fiscal resources.

Recently the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors' Intergovernmental Relations Committee deliberated the State Budget. Below please find a list of concerns as they relate to the Department of Corrections' budget:

Youth Aids Program-Increased State Charges to Counties

Milwaukee County strongly opposes the Governor's proposed budget as it relates to Youth Aids. Essentially, the State covers its own costs at the expense of counties, which only erodes counties ability to provide programming for juveniles.

Under the State's Youth Aids Program, counties are charged for the cost of juvenile offenders who are sentenced to institutional placements. The last State biennial budget for 1995-97 (1995 Act 27) removed the former statutory requirement that the State increase the Youth Aids appropriation to counties to compensate for institutional placement rate increases.

The Governor recommends increasing the daily charge for State institutions by 2.8% this July 1st and another 7.2% increase on January 1, 1998. As a result, county costs in 1998 would increase 10.2% compared to the charges paid by counties today. For Milwaukee County, which on average has about 400 juveniles in State custody in an institution, the rate increase would cost \$1.8 million.

Not only is the State increasing rates, it is also increasing the institutional bed capacity for female juveniles by 75 beds. Assuming Milwaukee County girls are sentenced to half these beds, this would cost almost \$1.9 million at the Governor's increased rates. Also the budget proposes to remove funds provided to counties in their county contracts for the corrections rate increases. This would cost Milwaukee County approximately \$750,000 --about half of the state-wide \$1.5 million reduction.

In summary, the Governor's recommended budget would increase county costs by \$4.45 million annually based on these three factors:

* Juvenile Corrections Rate Increase - \$1.8 million

- * Juvenile Institution Bed Expansion - \$1.9 million
- * Reduced Youth Aids Removing Funds Provided for 1996 Rate Increase - \$0.75 million.

Serious Juvenile Offender Program - State Savings at County Cost

In the 1995-97 biennial budget, the Serious Juvenile Offender (SJO) program was created whereby the Department of Corrections (DOC) assumed fiscal responsibility for certain juveniles adjudicated for a "serious offense" (Class A or B felony). The SJO program was initially funded by reducing Youth Aids from counties; in particular, the former \$6 million Arrest Supplement component of Youth Aids was eliminated, of which Milwaukee County received \$2.7 million.

The SJO program has not been utilized to the extent once thought and the budget proposes to reduce funding for the program and transfer dollars to the State's general fund rather than redirect revenue to the Youth Aids appropriation. The diversion of funds from Youth Aids is counter-productive in that it only hinders efforts to reform youthful offenders to prevent them from serving in adult facilities.

Community Intervention Program

Milwaukee County strongly opposes the transfer of the Community Intervention Program from the Department of Corrections to the Department of Health and Family Services. The County also strongly opposes the redefinition of this very successful program.

The First Time Offender Program (FTOP) was developed by Milwaukee County using funds from the Community Intervention Program. The FTOP is a highly successful program where the juvenile rearrest rate is 16% for participants, compared to a 57% rearrest rate for juveniles in a control group who have not participated in the program.


Counties across Wisconsin tout this program and its success. With that success in mind, Milwaukee County requests that this program remain with DOC and that funding be increased to continue serving Wisconsin's juvenile offender population.

Probation and Parole Facility

The Governor has proposed to provide bonding authority to build a 600 bed probation and parole facility. When originally announced, the facility was proposed to be built in Milwaukee County or Southeastern Wisconsin. Milwaukee County's correctional facilities are experiencing extreme overcrowding and much of the strain on the system relates to holding state violators of probation and parole. Milwaukee County strongly supports building a state probation and parole facility and urges that it be built in Milwaukee County where the greatest probation and parole population is located.



Attached is a letter that I would like to send to the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee regarding the 600-bed parole and probation facility proposed in the Governor's capital budget recommendations. As you know, the focus of our last committee meeting (April 9, 1997) was on this issue as we toured the Milwaukee County Jail and looked at the impact of the parole and probation problem on counties in southeastern Wisconsin. In addition, it is important to note that that 44% of the inmates in the state corrections system come from Milwaukee County.

With this in mind, I would like to send a copy of the attached letter to the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee.

Dear Rep. Jensen and Sen. Burke:

On Wednesday, April 9, the Assembly Committee on Corrections Facilities met at the Milwaukee County Courthouse annex to discuss the proposed state budget. In particular, the committee heard testimony from individuals interested in the proposal made by Governor Thompson to build a 600-bed facility in southeastern Wisconsin to hold parole and probation violators.

Prior to the public hearing, the members of the committee (and representatives from the Department of Corrections) toured the Milwaukee County Jail. As of that day, 1427 inmates were being held in a facility that was originally built to hold 798 inmates. Of the 1427, 333 were individuals who had violated the terms of the parole or probation. When we include inmates at the Milwaukee County House of Corrections, the number of inmates who have violated the terms of their parole or probation rises to 669 (as of April 9, 1997).

At the public hearing, we hear testimony from Milwaukee County Sheriff Lev Baldwin who highlighted this problem and raised the ultimate question of public safety as the current jail is no longer able future growth in the jail population.

After hearing the testimony and seeing the statistics provided the sheriff's department, we feel strongly that the proposal to build a 600-bed facility in southeastern Wisconsin should remain in the budget. To not approve this proposal would be a major threat to public safety in southeastern Wisconsin.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter.
