SUMMARY OF WPI POSITION AND REQUEST

For Senator Gary George - May 9, 1999

WPI'S NEED - \$100,000 annually from appropriate part of state budget.

The funds could be a portion of budgets earmarked for Commerce, Administration and/or Workforce Development. (Attachment 1)

WI BENEFITS -

- Return on investment from federal budget - specifically a grant made to WPI (and 80 other centers in various states) that provides for a dollar-for-dollar match of state funds. Therefore, a 100% return.
- Significant leverage of dollars through new contracts to firms throughout the state, and emphasis on small disadvantaged & woman owned firms. (Attachment 2)
- Better competitive position with neighboring states, especially Minnesota that provides over \$1 million annually for its "sister" program.
- Job creation associated with new contracts. (Attachment 3)
- Workforce development & Technology Transfer (see Attachment 1)

WISCONSIN BENEFITS - WISCONSIN PROCUREMENT INSTITUTE

The Wisconsin Procurement Institute (WPI) has been serving companies in this state for over twelve years with marketing, education and consulting services. WPI programs make meaningful contributions toward several of Wisconsin's strategic goals—technical workforce development, technology transfer, electronic commerce and economic development.

Wisconsin's Needs - WPI's Response

Wisconsin faces an annual gap between federal taxes spent-versus-raised of about \$5 billion. Other acknowledged state needs include emphasis on technical workforce development, better use of electronic commerce and increased employment in some rural and urban areas, with emphasis on minority- and women-owned businesses.

The federal contracts awarded to all firms working with WPI, compiled for the last five years, have totaled well over a billion dollars, translating to significant job creation. WPI returns federal dollars directly to the state from the authorizing federal budget. This means that for each dollar "raised" in Wisconsin, and used in behalf of our firms, a matching dollar is contributed.

WPI has established its value as a specialized nonprofit organization, proving itself in:

Workforce Development

EXAMPLE - Through a partnership between WPI and Rehabilitation For Wisconsin (RFW), supported with a small development grant through the state's Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR), WPI identifies government contracts that provide new jobs for persons with disabilities. The pool of disabled workers in Wisconsin resides in various Community Rehabilitation Programs (CRP's) throughout the state— an untapped pool, estimated to be about 30,000 individuals, who are not employed or need increased hours.

Technology Transfer

EXAMPLE - A partnership exists between WPI and the Northwest Wisconsin Manufacturing Outreach Center (NWMOC), based at the University of Wisconsin – Stout. This joint effort has expanded outreach capability to companies in thirty-three Wisconsin counties in the northwest quadrant of the state. Proper assessment leads to effective consultation and identification of technology transfer needs, leading to business growth.

Electronic Commerce (EC)

EXAMPLE - For three years, WPI has enjoyed a partnership with the Electronic Commerce Resource Center (ECRC) in Cleveland, OH to plan and conduct educational programs where electronic commerce (EC) is the focus. Assistance is offered through hands-on computer courses and to individual companies, in response to technology, organizational and workforce needs. After assessment of in-house systems/ capability, and insertion of adequate technology, WPI assists the firms in finding contract solicitations and placing appropriate bids.

1 At the locations indicated, amend the substitute amendment as follows:

2 ✓ 1. Page 286, line 3: delete "and 560.175" and substitute ", 560.175 and 560.26".

3 ✓ 2. Page 1394, line 11: after that line insert:

4 "SECTION 2980m. 560.26 of the statutes is created to read:

5 **560.26 Wisconsin Procurement Institute grants.** (1) Subject to sub. (3), ✓

6 the department shall make grants annually from the appropriation under s. 20.143

7 (1) (c) ✓ to the Wisconsin Procurement Institute if all of the following apply:

8 (a) The Wisconsin Procurement Institute uses the ^{grant} proceeds to further its efforts

9 to secure federal government contracts and ~~to~~ create jobs in the state.

1 (b) The Wisconsin Procurement Institute submits a plan to the department for
2 each grant detailing the proposed use of the grant and the secretary approves the
3 plan.

4 (c) The Wisconsin Procurement Institute enters into a written agreement with
5 the department that specifies the conditions for use of the grant proceeds, including
6 reporting and auditing requirements.

7 (d) The Wisconsin Procurement Institute agrees in writing to submit to the
8 department the report required under sub. (2) by the time required under sub. (2).

9 (2) If the Wisconsin Procurement Institute receives a grant under this section,
10 it shall submit to the department, within 6 months after spending the full amount
11 of the grant, a report detailing how the grant proceeds were used.

12 (3) The department may not make grants under sub. (1) that exceed \$100,000
13 in total in any year.
