Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill provides that whenever a bill is introduced in either house of the legislature that would have an impact on personal privacy, any standing committee to which the bill is referred must not hold a public hearing on the bill or report the bill until a privacy impact statement is prepared and received. The department of public instruction (DPI) would be required to provide such an impact statement if requested by the department of administration (DOA). The statement describes the impact upon personal privacy that would result from enactment of the bill and analyzes the desirability of that impact from the standpoint of public policy. The bill also permits either house of the legislature, under rules of that house or joint rules, to request DOA to order the preparation of a privacy impact statement with respect to any bill before that house, either in its original form or as affected by one or more amendments.

Costs to the department will be dependent on how many bills are referred for the preparation of privacy impact statements, and will be associated with staff time in the impact statement preparation. It is assumed that these costs will be able to be absorbed within the agency's budget. Because it is unknown how many bills or amendments would be referred to the department for the preparation of privacy impact statements, the fiscal effect of this bill is indeterminable.
