Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill provides that a circuit or municipal court may require an offender to make a contribution to a private, nonprofit organization or to a law enforcement agency if the court determines that the person has the financial ability to make the contribution. Also, this bill provides that a court may impose the same requirement on a person placed on probation.

It is possible that enactment of this bill would increase costs to the Office of the State Public Defender (SPD). Since the SPD provides representation in contested probation revocation cases, it is possible that the number of probation revocation cases that the SPD handles could increase. The SPD cannot, however, predict the number of cases it may handle if this bill is passed. The number of additional cases handled by the SPD would depend upon (1) the number of people whose probation is subject to revocation as a result of failure to make a contribution and (2) of those people whose probation is subject to revocation, the number of persons who would qualify for SPD representation. Even so, the SPD does not anticipate a significant increase in its costs as a result of this bill's enactment.

The SPD has no data from which to estimate local government costs.
