Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate:

This bill allows a school board to require that a pupil be examined by a physician only if the school board mails a schedule of examinations to the pupil's parent or guardian at the beginning of each school year and obtains the written consent of the parent or guardian for a specific examination. The school board may conduct an additional examination if it mails the pupil's parent or guardian a revised schedule and obtains the written consent of the pupil's parent or guardian to conduct the additional examination.

The department is unaware of any school board that currently requires periodic health examinations by physicians. Unless districts begin this practice, this bill has no fiscal effect. If districts were to require periodic examinations by physicians, they would incur some costs related to mailing schedules, obtaining and verifying parent or guardian written consent forms. Because it is unknown how many school districts may choose to conduct physical examinations by physicians, the local fiscal effect of this bill is indeterminable.
