Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate:			
This bill would make three changes to the existing law regarding county, town, and city/village zoning.			
A AND CONTRACTOR OF THE CONTRA			
1. When a proposed zoning ordinance, zoning petition, or zoning amendment has the potential to affect the allowable			
 use of any property, the notice for such action would need to include either a map showing the affected properties, or, 			
 a map showing the affected properties, or, a description of the affected properties and language to the effect that a map can be obtained from the local 			
zoning office.			
2. County, town, and city/village zoning departments would need to maintain a list of persons who request notice of proposed zoning actions. Local units of government may charge a fee for persons requesting to be on this list.			
3. Town meetings on zoning ordinances, petitions, and amendments would be subject to class 2 notice under ch. 985, Wis.Stats. This change appears to make towns requirements consistent with that of counties, cities and villages.			
We do not see fiscal impacts for the Department of Administration. This bill would indirectly impact Municipal			
Boundary Review (MBR) as it relates to §66.023, Wis. Stats., municipal boundary agreements. §66.023(7m), Wis.			
Stats., allows municipalities to develop zoning ordinances to regulate lands within the agreement area. Notice of the			
zoning proposed for the agreement area would probably improve the quality of these agreements and MBR's analysis			
because of increased public participation.			
This bill would have some fiscal impacts for local governments. There are costs involved in maintaining the notification lists/notifying interested parties and, for towns, in complying with the class 2 notice requirement.			
Municipalities may charge a fees to persons requesting to be on the notification list. Since a number of			
municipalities already maintain lists of landowners interested in zoning, the significance of this bill is that it			
mandates these practices statewide.			
The cost for towns to comply with the class 2	notice requirement, ap	pears to be minimal.
