The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed a review of the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program, which was established by 1997 Wisconsin Act 27. The program, operated by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), is intended to provide increased flexibility for facilities in complying with environmental regulations, while maintaining existing levels of environmental protection. The Legislative Audit Bureau is directed to monitor and report annually on the program.

The program allows DNR to sign cooperative agreements with facility owners and operators. No cooperative agreements were established in the program's first two years. However, in March 1999, the Department and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) signed a formal agreement stating that facilities that enter into cooperative agreements will not be subject to different EPA requirements at a later date. DNR staff believe the agreement with the EPA will encourage more facilities to consider developing cooperative agreements. Seven facilities have submitted letters of intent to join the program, and the DNR expects to sign two cooperative agreements by the summer of 2000.

Because of the limited activity in the program during its first two years, it is too early to assess its effectiveness. We will, however, continue to monitor it and issue a report in early 2001.

EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS THE STATE OF WISCONSIN OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR <u>EXECUTIVE ORDER #389</u>

Relating to the Creation of the Commission on State/Local Partnerships for the Twenty-First Century

WHEREAS, the Twenty-First Century will present new challenges to Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to assess the roles of state and local governments to insure that state and local governments are

properly structured to respond to the new challenges that will face Wisconsin in the Twenty-First Century; and

WHEREAS, it is important that there be a strong partnership between state and local governments to insure the effective delivery of services to the citizens of Wisconsin; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TOMMY G. THOMPSON, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

- 1. Create the Commission on State/Local Partnerships for the Twenty-First Century (hereinafter, "Commission"); and
- Provide that the Commission shall be composed of not more than thirty-two(32) members, appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 3. Provide that the Governor shall designate one (1) member of the Commission as its chair to serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 4. Provide that the Commission shall have the following purpose and mission:
 - a. Assess the challenges that Wisconsin will face in the Twenty-First Century; and
 - b. Assess the ability of the current structure of state and local governments to meet the challenges of the Twenty-First Century; and
 - c. Make recommendations to strengthen the partnership between state and local governments to insure Wisconsin is fully prepared to meet the challenges of the Twenty-First Century; and
- 5. Require the Commission to submit to the Governor a final report on its findings and recommendations; and
- 6. Direct the Secretary of the Department of Administration and all other state agencies to provide the Commission with administrative and support services and with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and
