Statement of Need

Chapter NR 20 has been rewritten to rearrange sections, clarify rules, eliminate redundancy and conflicting rules on specific waters and to make minor substantive changes. Currently, exceptions to seasons, length limits and other "special" regulations are scattered throughout the chapter. The proposed revision will make ch. NR 20 more "user friendly", particularly for internal use, but will also make interpretation easier for the courts and customer service staff.

The rewritten chapter makes numerous minor changes, corrections and clarifications as detailed in the analysis that is a part of the rule.

Modifications as a Result of Public Hearing

There were no modifications.

Appearances at the Public Hearings and Their Position

Public hearings were held in Fitchburg on November 11, 1998 and Green Bay on November 12, 1998. No one appeared at the public hearings.

Response to Legislative Council Rules Clearinghouse Report

The recommendations were accepted.

Final Regulatory Flexibility Analysis

The proposed rule will not directly affect small business; therefore, a final regulatory flexibility analysis is not required.

ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN

CREATING RULES

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board adopts an emergency order to create NR 20.33(5) relating to special closure of the sturgeon spearing season if harvest reaches or exceeds 80% of the total allowable harvest.

Statutory authority: ss. 29.014, 29.192(3), 227.11(2)(a) and 227.24, Stats.
Statutes interpreted: s. 29.192(3), Stats.

This order establishes total allowable harvest levels for sturgeon, by sex and maturity, on Lake Winnebago and establishes department authority to close the sturgeon spearing season within 24 hours if actual harvest of sturgeon meets or exceeds 80% of the total allowable harvest.

SECTION 1. NR 20.33(5), as affected by Natural Resources Board order FH-56-98, is created to read:

NR 20.33(5) SPECIAL CLOSURE OF THE STURGEON SPEARING SEASON. (a) *Conditions for season closure.* The department shall close the season for spearing sturgeon on Lake Winnebago if the actual harvest meets or exceeds 80% of the total allowable annual harvest of 400 adult female sturgeon, 400 juvenile female sturgeon or 2150 male sturgeon.

(b) *Announcement and notice of season closure.* The season closure shall be announced by a department press release to local media and to the official state newspaper on the day that actual harvest meets or exceeds 80% of the total allowable annual harvest, based upon the registration of harvested sturgeon pursuant to s. NR 20.10(9). The department shall post notice of the closure in the vicinity of Lake Winnebago and provide other notice deemed reasonable by the department.

(c) *Effective date of season closure.* The season closure shall take effect at 6:00 p.m. on the day following issuance of the department press release announcing the season closure in par. (b).

Finding of Emergency

The department of natural resources finds that an emergency exists and the foregoing rule is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety or welfare. The facts constituting this emergency are:

Winter water clarity in Lake Winnebago has been improving steadily over the last decade at a rate faster than anticipated, which has substantially increased the potential for overharvest of sturgeon by spearers. Even with the new harvest restrictions passed in 1996, exceptionally clear water during the 1998 spearing season resulted in a total harvest of 2,051 fish, which was in excess of our total allowable harvest goals. An emergency order is needed to prevent overharvest of sturgeon during the 1999 season while permanent rules are being developed for implementation in the year 2000.

The foregoing rules were approved and adopted by the State of Wisconsin
Natural Resources Board on January 27, 1999.

The rules contained herein shall take effect upon publication in the
official state newspaper, as provided in s. 227.24(1)(c), Stats.

SUMMARY OF BILL/RULE - The Department is proposing to develop a safe harvest system for sturgeon spearing that will address some of the outstanding issues facing the Lake Winnebago system sturgeon fishery. The Department's ultimate goal is to ensure that safe harvest levels are not exceeded by implementing newly established statutory authority to set safe harvest levels for the sturgeon fishery. Department personnel--primarily Fisheries Management & Habitat Protection, and Law Enforcement--will participate in rule development and conduct these hearings in the normal course of their assigned duties. The rule being promulgated is based on biological and sociological findings and public comments and will have no adverse impact on the fisheries of the state.

The following assumptions were made in arriving at this fiscal estimate:

- The proposed rules will not affect relations with local units of government or other state agencies.
- No liability or revenue fluctuations are anticipated.
- No staffing is required by state or local units of government.
- State DNR law enforcement personnel will enforce these rules during the normal course of their duties.
- No fee collection is involved.

ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD
REPEALING AND RECREATING AND AMENDING RULES

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board adopts an order to repeal and recreate ch. NR 20 and amend NR 21.02(16) relating to sport fishing regulations

Statutory authority: ss. 29.014(1) and 227.11(2), Stats.

Statutes interpreted: ss. 29.014(1) and 29.041, Stats.

Section 1 repeals and recreates chapter NR 20, and makes the following minor changes and corrections:

Creates a definition for "Lake Michigan tributaries"; clarifies a definition for the "Lower Wisconsin River" in order to consolidate currently conflicting descriptions; creates a definition for "Mid Lake Reef complex"; creates a definition for "Major Green Bay tributaries"; creates a definition for "panfish" to include bluegill, black crappie, white crappie, yellow perch, pumpkinseed and adds green sunfish, orangespotted sunfish and warmouth; creates a definition for "trout streams"; makes minor corrections to the lake trout season on Lake Michigan tributaries to match the Lake Michigan regulations; removes bays of the St. Louis River, Douglas County from the inland regulations and places them under Wisconsin-Minnesota boundary waters; clarifies the daily bag limit for panfish on outlying waters and their tributaries (most inland and outlying waters will have a daily bag limit of 25 in total); clarifies the opening date for trout and salmon on certain tributaries to Lake Superior to make it more consistent from year to year; clarifies the prohibition on hook and line lake sturgeon fishing for Lake Winnebago System waters; clarifies the closure of the rough fish spearing season on Lake Winnebago system waters; clarifies the intent of the gear restrictions for the early catch and release trout season to require artificial lures with barbless hooks while fishing on all trout streams during this period, regardless of the species sought; modifies the hours of the early catch and release season for trout so the season ends at 6 p.m. on the Friday preceding the general open season, rather than 4:59 a.m. on the day of the general open season; corrects an omission on gear restrictions for upper Neenah Creek to require artificial lures only; includes all waters of Jefferson County under the category 3 trout regulations; clarifies the description of the portions of the Pecatonica River, Iowa County, having a continuous open season for hook and line fishing; clarifies the waters of Castle Rock flowage that are open to trolling; corrects the name of the railroad line running along the Wisconsin side of the Mississippi and St. Croix Rivers to reflect a recent name change from the Burlington Northern Railroad to Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railroad; includes outlying waters in the requirement to mark live boxes with the name and address of the owner; eliminates the requirement to sign trout stamps to accommodate the new automated licensing system; removes channel catfish from the list of detrimental species

on Lake Winnebago System waters; and adds bullheads to the list of detrimental fish species in Yellowstone Lake, Lafayette County.

Section 2 modifies the definition of Wisconsin-Minnesota boundary waters to include bays of the St. Louis River estuary and corrects the name of the railroad line running along the Wisconsin side of the Mississippi and St. Croix Rivers to reflect a recent name change from the Burlington Northern Railroad to Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railroad.

Subchapter I Purpose and Definitions

NR 20.01 Purpose. This chapter establishes open and closed seasons, bag limits, possession limits, size restrictions and other rules governing the taking of fish in the inland and outlying waters of Wisconsin.

NR 20.03 Definitions. In this chapter:

(1) "Angler" means any person engaged in fishing.

(2) "Artificial fly" means a single hook dressed with fur, feathers, hair, silk, tinsel, thread or similar material to imitate the natural food of fish.

(3) "Artificial lure" means a spoon, spinner, jig, plug or other fish bait made of hair, feathers, cork, wood, rubber, metal, plastic or other synthetic materials, or

combinations of these materials. An "artificial lure" may not include natural or organic food stuffs such as corn, marshmallows, dough, cheese, meat, living or dead organisms or parts of those items, except hair, feathers, cork, wood or rubber.

(4) "Attached", for the purpose of s. NR 20.10, means affixed to the sturgeon immediately in front of the tail.

(5) "Barbless hooks" means hooks with no barbs, or hooks with barbs that have been compressed to be in complete contact with the shank of the hook.

(6) "Business day" has the meaning given it in s. 421.301 (6), Stats.

(7) "Current validated sturgeon carcass tag", for the purpose of s. NR 20.10, means an unused tag of the current year validated according to the requirements of s. NR 20.10 (5).

(8) "Daily bag limit" means the maximum number of fish that may be reduced to a person's possession in one day.

(9) "Department" means the department of natural resources.

(10) "Dip net" means a piece of netting suspended from a round or square frame that does not exceed 8 feet in diameter or 8 feet square.

(11) "Fish length" means the distance from the tip of the snout in a straight line to the utmost end of the tail fin fully compressed.

(12) "Fishing" or "fish", when used as a verb, means to take, capture, kill or attempt to take, capture or kill any variety of fish in the waters of the state.

(13) "Fishing shelter" means any building, tent, vehicle, shanty or similar enclosure used for the purpose of fishing.

(14) "Game fish" has the meaning found in s. 29.001(41).

(15) "Green Bay" means those waters of Lake Michigan located to the west of the Green Bay-Lake Michigan line. For the purposes of s. NR 20.20, Green Bay shall mean Green Bay, Sturgeon Bay, Sawyer's Harbor, the Sturgeon Bay ship canal from Sturgeon Bay to a line located in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 22, T27N, R26E, Door county, commencing at a point on the southwest shore of the Sturgeon Bay ship canal directly beneath the center of the Wisconsin public service company power line and extending in a northeasterly direction beneath and parallel to the center of the power line to a point on the northeast shore of the ship canal and the Fox river from its mouth up to the dam at DePere.

(16) "Green Bay-Lake Michigan line" means a line commencing at the northwest side of the Northport dock where it joins the shoreline in section 33, T33N, R29E; then running northeasterly to the range light (signal light) on Plum island; then running along the north and west shore of Plum island to the U.S. coast guard station; then running northerly to the southwesterly point on Shellswick dock, which is located on Lobdell's point on Washington island; then running along Shellswick dock to the shoreline of Lobdell's point; then running along the west shore of Washington island to Boyer's Bluff light; then running north to its terminus at the Wisconsin-Michigan boundary line.

(17) "Lake Michigan" means those waters of Lake Michigan located east of the Green Bay-Lake Michigan line.

(18) "Lake Michigan tributaries" means the Pike river and its tributaries, Kenosha and Racine counties; Kewaunee river and its tributaries excluding Little Scarboro, Scarboro, Roger and Casco creeks, Kewaunee county; Milwaukee river upstream to the Chair Factory dam in the village of Grafton, Milwaukee and Ozaukee counties;

Menomonee river upstream to the 45th street drop structure in the city of Milwaukee, Milwaukee county; and all other tributaries to Lake Michigan upstream to the first dam or lake.

(19) "Lake Winnebago system" means Buttes des Morts lake, Winneconne lake, Poygan lake, Winnebago lake and all their tributaries from their mouths upstream to the first dam including the Fox river from Lake Winnebago upstream to the dam above Princeton and all its tributaries from their mouths upstream to the first dam and the Wolf river from its mouth upstream to the dam in the city of Shawano and all its tributaries from their mouths upstream to the first dam including Cincoe lake, Partridge Crop lake and Partridge lake in Calumet, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Marquette, Outagamie, Shawano, Waupaca, Waushara and Winnebago counties.

(20) "Lower Wisconsin river" means the Wisconsin river including all sloughs, bayous, flowages and tributaries from their mouths upstream to the first highway bridge in Columbia, Sauk, Dane, Iowa, Richland, Grant and Crawford counties upstream from the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe railroad tracks in Grant and Crawford counties..

(21) "Major Green bay tributaries" means Duck creek upstream to the first dam above the Pamperin park foot bridge in the village of Howard excluding its tributaries, Suamico river upstream to CTH HS, East river upstream to Hoffman road (CTH XX) excluding its tributaries, Brown county; Peshtigo river upstream to the Peshtigo dam, Little river upstream to Radar road, Marinette county; Little Suamico river upstream to CTH J excluding tributaries, Pensaukee river upstream to CTH J excluding tributaries, Oconto river upstream to Stiles dam excluding tributaries except Little river, Little river upstream to state highway 141 excluding tributaries, Oconto county.

(22) "Mendota lake" means Mendota lake, Cherokee lake, Warner Park lagoons, Pheasant Branch creek from its mouth upstream to county highway M, Sixmile creek from its mouth upstream to state highway 19 in sec. 8, and Yahara river from its mouth upstream to state highway 19, Dane county.

(23) "Mid lake reef complex" means those waters of Lake Michigan within the following area: All waters bounded by a line beginning at a point where 43 degrees 7 minutes north latitude and 87 degrees 40 minutes west longitude intersect, northerly to 43 degrees 20 minutes north latitude, easterly to 87 degrees 20 minutes west longitude, northerly to 43 degrees 30 minutes north latitude, easterly to the Wisconsin-Michigan state line, southerly to 43 degree north latitude, westerly to 87 degrees 14 minutes west longitude, northerly to 43 degrees 3 minutes north latitude, westerly to 87 degrees 18 minutes, southerly to 43 degrees north latitude, westerly to 87 degrees 23 minutes west longitude, northwesterly to 43 degrees 7 minutes north latitude, and westerly to 87 degrees 40 minutes west latitude. This area encompasses the elevated areas of the lake bed commonly known as the Sheboygan reef, the Northeast reef, the Milwaukee reef, and the East reef.

(24) "Minnow dip net" has the same meaning as "dip net".

(25) "Minnow seine" means a seine that does not exceed 35 feet in length with mesh that does not exceed one-half inch stretch measure.

(26) "Minnow trap" means a device for catching minnows that does not exceed 24 inches in length and does not exceed 16 inches in width with an opening in the throat of the trap that does not exceed 1½ inches in diameter.

(27) "Muskellunge" means fish of the species *Esox masquinongy* and includes muskellunge - northern pike hybrids.

(28) "Openly exposed" means open to view by a person in a passing vehicle.

(29) "Panfish" means the following fish species: yellow perch, bluegill, black crappie, white crappie, pumpkinseed, green sunfish, warmouth and orangespotted sunfish.

(30) "Position fishing" means fishing from a boat in a manner where the fishing line extends vertically into the water while the boat is maneuvered by the use of a motor.

(31) "Possession limit" means the maximum number of a fish species that a person may possess, which is twice the daily bag limit specified in this chapter except the possession limit for trout is 10 of which no more than 5 may be a combined total of brown and rainbow trout and the possession limit for minnows is specified in s. NR 20.14.

(32) "Rough fish" has the meaning found in s. 29.001(74)

(33) "Safe harvest" means a level of harvest that incorporates an appropriate margin of safety, estimates of the population and acceptable exploitation rates which will reasonably prevent harvest of more than 35% of the population of adult walleyes or 27% of the population of adult muskellunge. The margin of safety assures that the true safe harvest is not exceeded in more than 1 of 40 cases. For waters where a population estimate has not been made, a regression model based upon population estimates from other waters will be used.

(34) "Secretary" means secretary of the department of natural resources.

(35) "Seine" has the meaning found in s. 29.522(3), Stats.

(36) "Setline" means a line with one or more hooks fastened to it and designed to be set or left unattended in the water for the purpose of taking fish.

(37) "Set or bank pole" means a pole equipped with a line with one or more hooks fastened to it, designed to be used for fishing from the banks of lakes or rivers and set or left unattended.

(38) "Spearing" means fishing with a device consisting of a shaft with an attached sharp point or points and includes devices such as spears, bow and arrow, spear guns or similar devices.

(39) "Telemetry device" means any device attached to or implanted in a fish that transmits a sonic or electronic signal.

(40) "Troll" or "trolling" means fishing by trailing any lure, bait or similar device that may be used to attract or catch fish from a boat propelled by a means other than drifting or rowing. Casting and immediate retrieval of a bait, lure or similar device while the motor is running or position fishing is not trolling.

(41) "Trout stream" means those waters designated by the department pursuant to s. NR 1.02(7).

(42) "Unattended line" means a fishing line to which no person is actively directing his or her attention.

Subchapter II Prohibited Methods

NR 20.05 General restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

- (1) Fish by any means other than hook and line except as specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.
- (2) Possess or control any firearm, gun or similar device at any time while on the waters, banks or shores that might be used for the purpose of fishing.
- (3) Fish within 200 feet of any fishway, lock or dam by any means other than by hook and line in the inland waters.
- (4) Fish at any time other than during the open season.
- (5) Fish for any variety of fish in trout streams other than during the open season for trout except that rough fish may be taken by hand at any time in all waters.
- (6) Fish for, possess or control fish in excess of the daily bag limit authorized in s. NR 20.20 for that water while on the waters, banks or shores of waters or while fishing.
- (7) Possess or control fish unless they are included as part of the daily bag limit. Fish that are not released immediately shall be included as part of the daily bag limit.
- (8) Possess or control any fish in excess of the possession limit.
- (9) Possess or control fish of any size other than that authorized by the size restriction.
- (10) Use, attach or implant a telemetry device on or into a fish.
- (11) Raise, remove or otherwise tamper with another person's commercial fishing gear set in any water without permission from the licensed user. This restriction does not apply to agents of the department.
- (12) Use, possess, control, set or place in any water any live box, or similar device that might be used for the keeping of fish unless a tag of permanent material bearing the name and address of the owner or user is securely attached and is readable and legible.
Note: This restriction does not apply to receptacles carried by the angler to contain fish while fishing.
- (13) Sponsor a fishing tournament unless a permit has been obtained from the department pursuant to s. NR 20.40.

NR 20.06 Hook and line fishing. No person may do any of the following:

- (1) Fish in inland waters by the method of trolling except where specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.
- (2) Fish with more than 3 hooks, baits or lures.
- (3) Fish with any hook and line fishing tackle, bait, hooks or lures on waters where its use is not authorized in s. NR 20.20. Gear restrictions for trout and salmon on waters or portions of waters specified in s. NR 20.20 apply to all species while fishing on those waters.
- (4) Use a landing net larger than 3 feet in diameter.
- (5) Use a gaff in any manner other than for landing a fish that is legally hooked unless specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.
- (6) Fish by snagging, foul hooking or attempting to hook fish other than in the mouth.
- (7) Possess, retain or fail to immediately release fish hooked other than in the mouth.

(8) Use, possess, control, set or place any snag line or snag pole, snaghook or cluster of hooks that could be placed into or drawn through the water for the purpose of catching fish or drawing the hooks into the body of fish.

(9) Fish with an unattended line except where specifically authorized under s. NR 20.20. Failure to immediately respond to a line upon indication of a bite shall be prima facie evidence that the line is unattended.

Note: For further restrictions on the use of setlines and set or bank poles, see s. NR 20.12.

(10) Fish in open water with a free-floating or anchored buoyant device with attached hook and line that is not held or otherwise controlled by the angler.

Note: This method is commonly known as jug fishing.

NR 20.07 Special sturgeon hook and line fishing restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Possess a lake sturgeon taken by hook and line unless a hook and line lake sturgeon tag is immediately attached to the lake sturgeon and the tagged lake sturgeon is registered at a department lake sturgeon registration station by 6:00 p.m. on the day after it was taken.

Note: Hook and line lake sturgeon tags will be available at department service centers and regional offices each year prior to the open season.

(2) Remove the registration tag attached to the fish by the department until the carcass is prepared for final consumption. The hook and line lake sturgeon registration tag shall be retained by the person taking the lake sturgeon until the fish is consumed.

(3) Transport any lake sturgeon in or on any motor-driven vehicle from the time the lake sturgeon is taken to the time it is lawfully registered pursuant to sub. (1) unless the lake sturgeon is carried openly exposed and in a manner so that the lake sturgeon tag attached to the lake sturgeon cannot be handled or manipulated by any occupant of the vehicle.

(4) Transport any lake sturgeon in or on any boat from the time the lake sturgeon is taken to the time it is lawfully registered pursuant to sub. (1) unless the lake sturgeon is carried openly exposed.

(5) Obtain more than one hook and line lake sturgeon tag except that one additional hook and line lake sturgeon tag may be obtained for Wisconsin-Michigan boundary waters.

NR 20.08 Restrictions on the use of bait. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Use goldfish as bait or possess goldfish in any form or manner on any water of the state.

(2) Use alewife as bait or possess alewife in any form or manner on any water of the state except Lake Michigan and Green Bay.

(3) Release any unused bait into any waters of the state unless issued a permit pursuant to s. 29.736, Stats.

(4) Use as bait, possess or release any minnows or other fish on the waters or shores of waters that have been chemically treated for trout management when posted by department signs.

(5) Take, gather, collect, possess or attempt to take, gather or collect larvae or nymphs of aquatic insects from any trout stream for use or sale as bait except that a

licensed angler may take larvae or nymphs from trout streams by hand during the open trout season for immediate use as bait only in the trout stream from which the larvae or nymphs were taken.

NR 20.09 Spearing restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Possess or control any bow, spear or similar device while on any water or on the banks or shores of any water that might be used for the purpose of fishing except as specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.

(2) Use, possess or control any bow, spear or similar device from sunset to sunrise while on the waters or on the banks or shores of any waters.

(3) Spear any game fish except that white bass, yellow bass, rock bass, panfish and bullheads may be speared while skin diving or scuba diving in inland waters during the open season for rough fish spearing on waters specified in s. NR 20.20.

NR 20.10 Special sturgeon spearing restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Take, capture, kill or attempt to take, capture or kill sturgeon on Lake Winnebago system waters by any means other than spearing with a spear thrown by hand from inside a fishing shelter placed on the ice during the open season specified in s. NR 20.20 (73)(e).

(2) Fish with or possess a fishing pole, hook and line or other similar devices that might be used for the purpose of catching fish within any fishing shelter containing an ice hole larger than 12 inches in diameter or square during the open season for spearing sturgeon on waters specified in s. NR 20.20(73)(e).

(3) Cover ice holes cut, used or maintained for sturgeon spearing pursuant to s. NR 20.11(2) with a fishing shelter except during the period from 48 hours before and continuing through the open season for sturgeon spearing.

(4) Possess a validated sturgeon carcass tag unless it is attached to a legally killed sturgeon while sturgeon spearing.

(5) Possess a speared sturgeon unless immediately validating the sturgeon carcass tag by splitting the marks designating the month, day, time and location of kill. Failure to completely validate the sturgeon carcass tag renders the possession of the sturgeon illegal and the sturgeon carcass tag invalid. A sturgeon carcass tag shall be issued with each sturgeon spearing license and shall remain intact until the spearer spears a sturgeon.

(6) Transport any sturgeon in or on any motor-driven vehicle from the time the sturgeon is taken to the time it is lawfully registered pursuant to sub. (9) unless the sturgeon is carried openly exposed and in a manner so that the sturgeon carcass tag attached to the sturgeon cannot be handled or manipulated by any occupant of the vehicle.

(7) Possess a speared sturgeon unless the person who spears and tags the sturgeon accompanies the sturgeon carcass during transport until the sturgeon has been registered pursuant to sub. (9).

(8) Possess a sturgeon speared from lakes Butte des Morts, Poygan or Winneconne under s. NR 20.20(73)(e)2.b. outside the following area unless the sturgeon has been registered pursuant to sub. (9): from the intersection of highways 110 and 21 in Oshkosh west on highway 21 to highway 116; north on highway 116 to county highway

B; west on county highway B to county highway D; west on county highway D to highway 49; north on highway 49 to county highway H; east on county highway H to highway 10; east on highway 10 to highway 110; south on highway 110 to county highway M; south on county highway M to highway 116; east on highway 116 to highway 110; south on highway 110 to highway 21.

(9) Possess a sturgeon speared from Lake Winnebago under s. NR 20.20(73)(e)2.c. outside the following area unless the sturgeon has been registered pursuant to sub. (9): from the intersection of highways 10 and 114 in Menasha, east on highway 114 to highway 55; south on highway 55 to U.S. highway 151; south on U.S. highway 151 to Scott street in Fond du Lac; west on Scott street to highway 45; north on highway 45 to Main street in Oshkosh; north on Main street to Waugoo avenue; east on Waugoo avenue to Bowen street; north on Bowen street to North Shore drive; north on North Shore drive to county highway A; north on county highway A to highway 114 in Neenah; east on highway 114 to the intersection of highways 10 and 114 in Menasha.

(10) Possess a sturgeon unless each person who has speared a sturgeon during the open season for spearing sturgeon shall exhibit the sturgeon, with the person's sturgeon carcass tag attached as required by s. 29.237, Stats., to a warden or other authorized department personnel at an official sturgeon registration station. Sturgeon shall be intact and registered at a station on Lake Winnebago if speared in Lake Winnebago. Sturgeon shall be intact and registered at a station on Lake Butte des Morts, Winneconne or Poygan if speared in Lake Butte des Morts, Winneconne or Poygan. Sturgeon shall be exhibited at a sturgeon registration station not later than 6:00 p.m. on the day speared. The registration tag shall remain attached and locked to the sturgeon until the carcass is prepared for final consumption.

(11) Attempt to register a sturgeon unless the license information can be verified. The station operator shall complete and retain the registration portion of the sturgeon license, lock a registration tag to the carcass immediately in front of the tail and remove the validation portion of the sturgeon carcass tag leaving the remainder of the sturgeon carcass tag attached to the sturgeon.

NR 20.11 Ice fishing and fishing shelter restrictions. (1) No person may construct, place, use, maintain or occupy a fishing shelter on the ice of any waters of this state unless:

(a) The name and residential address in the English language of the person owning or using the fishing shelter is legibly painted or permanently affixed on the outside of the fishing shelter with block lettering a minimum of one inch square and in contrasting colors.

(b) The door can be readily opened from the outside while the shelter is occupied.

(c) The person is actively using the fishing shelter and it is removed from the ice daily and when not in use on the Fox river downstream from the DePere dam, Brown county.

(d) The fishing shelter is removed from the ice daily and when not in use after March 5 on inland waters south of highway 64.

(e) The fishing shelter is removed from the ice daily when not in use after March 15 on inland waters north of highway 64 and all other outlying waters.

(2) No person may cut, use or maintain a hole larger than 12 inches in diameter or square for the taking of fish in any manner through the ice except for spearing fish in Lake Superior, sturgeon spearing, taking fish with dip nets, taking minnows with minnow traps or skin or scuba diving.

(3) The department or its agents may direct that fishing shelters be removed from the ice by a date earlier than specified in subs. (1)(d) or (1)(e) if it has reason to believe that the ice has become unsafe for travel.

NR 20.12 Setline and set or bank pole restrictions. (1) GENERAL RESTRICTIONS. No person may use, set, lift, attend or possess any set or bank pole or setline on any water unless:

(a) Its use is specifically authorized by a set or bank pole license issued under s. 29.531(1), Stats., or a setline license issued under s. 29.533(1), Stats. No person may use, set, lift, attend or possess set or bank pole or setline licensed to another person.

(b) Its use in that water is specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.

(c) A white setline flag at least 10 inches square bearing the number of the license authorizing its use in figures at least 3 inches high and attached to a flag staff that extends at least 3 feet above the surface of the water or bank is placed and maintained at one end of the setline. The flag staff may not exceed 2 1/2 inches in diameter and shall be marked with 2 inch to 6 inch wide alternating horizontal black and white bands. When a buoy is used to hold the setline's flag staff the buoy shall be cylindrical in shape, 15 inches or less in diameter and marked with 2 inch to 6 inch wide alternating horizontal black and white bands. No person may place a setline flag, flag staff or pole in the main channel of any navigable waterway.

(d) A metal tag stamped with the number of the license authorizing its use is securely attached directly to each set or bank pole and to the flag staff of each setline.

(2) GEAR, FISHING METHODS AND BAIT. No person may do any of the following:

(a) Use, set, lift, attend or possess more than 5 set or bank poles.

(b) Use, set, lift, attend or possess more than one setline while on the waters of this state except as provided in ss. NR 21.12(1) (a) and 22.12(1).

(c) Use, set, lift or attend a set or bank pole equipped with more than one line, which may not have more than 2 hooks.

(d) Use, set, lift or attend a setline with more than 25 hooks.

(e) Use, set, lift, attend or possess any set or bank pole or setline between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise.

(f) Use or set a set or bank pole or setline unless it is lifted and the catch removed at least once each day following the day it was set unless a longer period is authorized by the department or its agents.

(g) Use, set, lift or attend a set or bank pole or setline while in possession of hook and line fishing equipment.

(h) Use, set, lift or attend a set or bank pole or setline that has stainless steel hooks or is equipped with any hooks that have a gap between the shank and the point smaller than 3/4 inch except that on the Mississippi river stainless steel hooks may be used and there is no hook size restriction.

(i) Use whole or live fish as bait on set or bank poles or setlines on Lakes Butte des Morts, Little Butte des Morts, Winnebago and Winneconne, Winnebago county, Lake

Poygan, Waushara and Winnebago counties and the Black river, Jackson, LaCrosse and Trempealeau counties.

(j) Use live crawfish or whole or live fish less than 5 inches in length as bait on set or bank poles or setlines

(3) RESTRICTIONS ON HARVEST. (a) No person may take, retain, kill or possess any fish or other animal taken on a set or bank pole or setline other than catfish, rough fish or turtles.

Note: All game fish taken on any set or bank pole or setline shall be immediately returned to the water except catfish taken in compliance with this section.

(b) The size, bag and possession limits for catfish and rough fish established in s. NR 20.20 shall apply to all persons who fish with set or bank poles or setlines.

(4) SALE OF FISH AND TURTLES. No person may sell any fish or other animal taken on a set or bank pole or setline except the following:

(a) Rough fish.

(b) Turtles.

(c) Catfish taken from lakes Winnebago, Butte des Morts, Little Butte des Morts, Winneconne, Poygan, the Fox river downstream from lake Butte des Morts to the DePere dam, and the Wolf river from 500 feet below the Shawano dam downstream to its mouth.

NR 20.13 General netting restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Possess, control or operate in any manner any net, seine or similar device that might be used for the purposes of fishing at any time while on any water or on the banks or shores of any water except as specifically authorized in this section, s. NR 20.14 or s. NR 20.20.

(2) Set, use or operate a dip net or seine from sunset to sunrise unless specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20.

(3) Set, use or operate more than one dip net.

(4) Set, use or operate a dip net in any manner other than by raising and lowering it vertically while fishing.

(5) Fish in any other manner while operating a dip net or seine.

(6) Fish with hook and line from any boat that has a dip net attached.

(7) Leave a dip net or seine unattended within 25 feet of the edge of the water on outlying waters, Lake Michigan tributaries, Green bay and its tributaries.

(8) Sell, barter or trade in any manner any sucker taken with a dip net or seine.

NR 20.14 Minnow collecting restrictions. No person may do any of the following:

(1) Set, use or operate any net, trap or similar device for the taking of minnows other than minnow seines, minnow dip nets and minnow traps as authorized in s. NR 20.20 unless issued a permit by the department under s. NR 20.39 pursuant to s. 29.516(1), Stats.

(2) Set, use, or operate any minnow seine, minnow dip net, minnow trap or similar device for the taking of minnows in any water unless specifically authorized in s. NR 20.20 or s. NR 20.39. Minnow seines or minnow dip nets of any type or description may not be set, used or operated in any trout stream unless a permit is issued by the department under s. NR 20.39.

(3) Set, use or operate minnow traps in any water that has been chemically treated to reestablish a trout fishery.

(4) Set, use or operate minnow traps unless a label or tag bearing the legible name and address of the operator in the English language is securely attached.

(5) Set, use or operate minnow traps unless they are raised and the minnows are removed from them at least once every 48 hours from all waters except trout streams.

(6) Set, use or operate minnow traps in trout streams during the closed season for trout except licensed bait dealers issued a permit by the department under s. NR 20.39. The permit authorizing placement of minnow traps in trout streams during the closed season for trout shall specify conditions on raising the traps and removing minnows.

(7) Set, use or operate more than 3 minnow traps in trout streams during the open season for trout except licensed bait dealers.

(a) No more than a total of 20 minnow traps may be set, used or operated by licensed bait dealers during the open season for trout when removing minnows from one or more trout streams unless issued a permit by the department under s. NR 20.39.

(b) Minnow traps set, used or operated on trout streams during the open season for trout shall be raised and the minnows removed from them at least once every 24 hours.

(8) Possess or control more than 600 minnows at any time unless licensed as a bait dealer under s. 29.509, Stats.

Note: The possession and transportation of legally taken minnows is permitted throughout the state.

Subchapter II

Authorized Methods, Open Seasons, Daily Bag Limits and Size Restrictions on Specified Waters

NR 20.15 Early catch and release season for trout. Except where specifically restricted in s. NR 20.20, there is an open season for trout in all streams from March 1 at 5:00 a.m. to the Friday immediately preceding the first Saturday in May at 6 p.m. during 1997, 1998 and 1999 but the daily bag limit and possession limit for trout is 0 and only artificial lures with barbless hooks may be used for any species of fish while fishing on trout streams during this period.

Note: The early catch and release seasons during 1997, 1998 and 1999 do not apply to spring ponds, ponds or lakes.

NR 20.20 County and statewide table. In this section, subs. (1) through (72) list waters or portions of waters by county and specify authorized methods, open seasons, daily bag limits and size restrictions for the taking of fish that are exceptions to the general rules specified in sub. (73).
