1 **Relating to:** commending the University of Wisconsin-River Falls for its
2 contributions to the quality of life in Wisconsin over the past 125 years.

3 Whereas, in 1874 a State Normal School was established in River Falls to train
4 teachers for northwestern Wisconsin, making the school the fifth public higher
5 education institution in the new State of Wisconsin; and

6 Whereas, through the past 125 years, the University of Wisconsin-River Falls
7 has taken tremendous strides as a comprehensive institution of higher learning to
8 expand its educational offerings to more than 40 undergraduate and graduate
9 programs in education, the sciences, humanities, liberal arts, business and
10 agriculture; and

11 Whereas, its student body has expanded from a few hundred men and women
12 attending classes in a single building to a population now numbering more than
13 5,600 persons on a campus of 25 buildings; and
