Topic: Corrective Sanctions – Purchase of Services.

Current Language

Current language at §938.533(2) relating to the corrective sanctions program provides that the Department shall provide an average of \$3,000 per year per slot to purchase community-based treatment services for each participant.

Proposed Change

Amend §938.533(2) to specify that the Department would be required to provide to an amount up to an average of \$3,000 per slot.

Corrective sanctions program. From the appropriation under s. 20.410 (3) (hr), the department shall provide a corrective sanctions program to serve department shall place a program participant in the community, provide intensive surveillance of that participant and ~~provide an average of \$3,000 per year per slot to purchase community-based treatment services for each participant.~~ The amount of community-based treatment services provided may not exceed an average of \$3,000 per slot. The department shall make the intensive surveillance required under this subsection available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and may purchase or provide electronic monitoring for the intensive surveillance of program participants.....

Effect of the Change

This change will allow the Department to provide less than \$3,000 per slot for the corrective sanctions program if that level of funding is not required to serve the eligible population.

Rationale for the Change

The current language provides that the Department shall provide an average of \$3,000 per year per slot. This should be changed to reflect the fact that the Department does not currently expend an average of \$3,000 per slot. There may be other community resources or private insurance that provide for treatment services for persons in corrective sanctions. For the 2001-2003 biennium, \$2,500 will be budgeting for each slot based on the previous fiscal year's expenditure.

CORRECTIONAL SYSTEM

JUVENILE CORRECTIONAL SYSTEM

Under DOC provides a corrective sanctions program for juveniles who have been placed under the supervision of DOC. Under the corrective sanctions program, DOC must place a participant in the community, provide intensive surveillance of the participant, and provide an average of \$3,000 per year per slot to purchase community-based treatment services for each participant. This bill requires DOC to provide an average of *not more than* \$3,000 per year per slot to purchase those services.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

2 SECTION 1. 938.533 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:

3 938.533 (2) CORRECTIVE SANCTIONS PROGRAM. From the appropriation under s.

4 20.410 (3) (hr), the department shall provide a corrective sanctions program to serve

1 an average daily population of 136 juveniles, or an average daily population of more
2 than 136 juveniles if the appropriation under s. 20.410 (3) (hr) is supplemented
3 under s. 13.101 or 16.515 and the positions for the program are increased under s.
4 13.101 or 16.505 (2) or if funding and positions to serve more than that average daily
5 population are otherwise available, in not less than 3 counties, including Milwaukee
6 County. The office of juvenile offender review in the department shall evaluate and
7 select for participation in the program juveniles who have been placed under the
8 supervision of the department under s. 938.183, 938.34 (4h) or (4m), or 938.357 (4).
9 The department shall place a program participant in the community, provide
10 intensive surveillance of that participant, and provide an average of not more than
11 \$3,000 per year per slot to purchase community-based treatment services for each
12 participant. The department shall make the intensive surveillance required under
13 this subsection available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and may purchase or provide
14 electronic monitoring for the intensive surveillance of program participants. The
15 department shall provide a report center in Milwaukee County to provide on-site
16 programming after school and in the evening for juveniles from Milwaukee County
17 who are placed in the corrective sanctions program. A contact worker providing
18 services under the program shall have a case load of approximately 10 juveniles and,
19 during the initial phase of placement in the community under the program of a
20 juvenile who is assigned to that contact worker, shall have not less than one
21 face-to-face contact per day with that juvenile. Case management services under
22 the program shall be provided by a corrective sanctions agent who shall have a case

1 load of approximately 15 juveniles. The department shall promulgate rules to
2 implement the program.
