As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On November 1, 2000 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was -\$1.38 million. This shortfall increased to -\$2.40 million on November 14, 2000, to -\$3.63 million on November 30, 2000, and continued into the month of December. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On November 1, 2000 the <u>University Trust–Income Fund</u> balance was –\$40 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$131 thousand on November 3, 2000, and continued until November 6, 2000 when the balance reached \$1.56 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Utility Public Benefits Fund, and University Trust–Income Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

Section 165.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires the Department of Justice to report on the performance of cooperative county-tribal law enforcement programs receiving aid under this section. This letter constitutes our report.

For more than a decade, the Department has awarded grants for cooperative county-tribal law enforcement programs. The statutes require counties and tribes to develop joint program plans. The Department requires plans to include resolutions of support for the plan adopted by county boards and tribal governing bodies, to signify cooperation and mutual commitment.

This program pays for a variety of law enforcement services to Indian communities across Wisconsin. Grants have been used for the costs of patrol, investigation, crime prevention, law enforcement training, alternatives to drug abuse and gang involvement, diversity training and cultural awareness education, computer technology and water rescue and other emergency equipment. Several grants are awarded to programs that include tribal police departments, while most generally help pay for services provided by county sheriffs to Indian reservations and communities.

The Department restructured the allocation process for this program beginning in CY2000. A formula that includes factors that measure crime rate, tribal unemployment and tribal population of each county-tribal program area now assists us in arriving at eligible grant awards. The result has been a more even distribution of awards to county-tribal programs across the state.

The amount appropriated for this program inState Fiscal Year 2000 was \$708,400, the same as the prior year's funding. Grant moneys come from Indian gaming receipts as appropriated in the biennial budget. In Calendar Year 2000, the Department issued 16 awards totaling \$708,400.

The County-Tribal Law Enforcement Grant Program continues to help local law enforcement provide needed services in Indian communities. In addition, this program helps build a cooperative atmosphere and positive relationship between law enforcement and tribal governments and communities. Departmental staff is available to discuss this report and this important program.

As part of our ongoing audits of the Wisconsin Works (W–2) program required by s. 49.141(2g)(a), Wis. Stats., we have completed an evaluation of Wisconsin Shares, the State's child care subsidy program. This program, which is administered by the Department of Workforce Development, was created by 1995 Wisconsin Act 289 to assist W–2 participants and other low–income working families in paying for child care.

In fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000, approximately 33,000 families and 60,500 children participated in the program at a cost of \$191.3 million in federal and state funds. FY 1999-2000 expenditures exceeded budgeted levels by \$10.2 million, primarily because of increased program participation that was, in part, the result of changes made in the 1999-2001 biennial budget expanding eligibility and reducing family copayments. From September 1997 through June 2000, monthly program participation increased by 83.5 percent, growing from 18,671 to 34,268. It was estimated that in 1998, approximately 14 percent of eligible children participated in the program. Given that participation rates in several other midwestern states are greater than 20 percent of those eligible, there appears to be a realistic potential for continued growth in Wisconsin if more families choose to take advantage of the program and if adequate funding remains available. However, the extent of future growth is difficult to project based on the newness of the program and the numerous changes made to it since its inception.

As part of the program, the Department also administers contracts and grants designed to improve the quality and availability of child care services. We believe that improvements in the management of these types of grants are needed to ensure that \$11.4 million in increased funding that will be provided to local entities is spent appropriately. In addition, if participation increases and expenditures continue to rise substantially, the Legislature will have to consider a variety of issues related to program funding, eligibility, and benefits.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Workforce Development and staff of the local agencies we visited. The Department's response is Appendix 4.

We have completed an evaluation of the State's recycling activities, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. State expenditures from the segregated Recycling Fund for fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000 were \$28.9 million, used primarily for grants to municipalities for the operation of recycling programs, The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) administers these grants and has primary responsibility for the State's recycling efforts.

The best data available indicate Wisconsin recycled 36 percent of its municipal solid waste in 1995, and the national average was 26 percent in that year. Wisconsin is one of few states nationally that provides substantial financial support to local programs; Wisconsin's grant payments in calendar year 2000 were \$24.4 million, Minnesota is the only other midwestern state that provides substantial state support to local recycling programs. Minnesota budgeted \$14.0 million for local grants in FY 2000-01 and achieved residential per capita recycling rates similar to Wisconsin's.

Wisconsin grants to municipalities support an average of 30.4 percent of local recycling costs and are used for a broad array of local costs, including salaries, equipment, and administration. However, our review found little relationship between the percentage of local costs covered by a municipality's grant and the municipality's recycling rate.

Although DNR is authorized 19.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) recycling positions, only 15.4 FTE reported working on recycling activities. In addition, DNR has not met a statutory requirement to audit at least 5.0 percent of grants provided to municipalities each year. We include a recommendation that DNR devote its 0.5 FTE recycling auditor position exclusively to audits of municipal recycling grants and suggest DNR report to the Legislature on the relationship of its authorized positions to local recycling efforts.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DNR, municipal recycling managers, and staff with recycling-related responsibilities in the Department of Commerce and the University of Wisconsin-Extension.

The Honorable, The Senate:

As directed by 1997 Wisconsin Act 154, the Department and the Statewide Trauma Advisory Council is submitting a joint report on the development and implementation of a statewide trauma care system to the Legislature, Joint Committee on Finance (JFC), Governor and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Board. In addition, Act 154 directs the Department to seek the advice of the Statewide Trauma Advisory Council and to

develop and implement a Statewide Trauma Care System no later than July 1, 2002. The Department is prohibited from promulgating rules relating to the Statewide Trauma Care System until the JFC has approved the report.

National and state data show that traumatic injury is a serious public health problem. It is the leading cause of death of individuals between the ages of 1 and 44 and is the fourth leading cause overall. The goal of a trauma care system is to reduce suffering, disability, death and the cost associated with traumatic injury. The Statewide Trauma Care System Plan establishes a conceptual framework from which a Statewide Trauma Care System can be developed.

The Advisory Council engaged in extensive discussions regarding funding the Statewide Trauma Care System. These discussions examined several funding sources and also focused on the need for not only stable trauma system funding, but also stable Emergency Medical Services (EMS) as a whole, since trauma will be integrated administratively within the Bureau of EMS and Injury Prevention.

To establish a stable funding for the Emergency Medical Services as a whole, including the trauma system, the Department proposes a \$1 increase in each motor vehicle registration fee and to use the new funding that is generated, to support the Statewide Trauma Care System and all current administrative costs for the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Injury Prevention in the Division of Public Health. This proposal is based on recommendations developed by the Advisory Council in the Statewide Trauma Care Plan report. Justification for the proposed use of motor vehicle registration fees to support the statewide trauma system include the facts that:

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of injury-related deaths.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death of individuals between the ages of 1 and 44.

Motor vehicle registration pays for EMS systems and trauma in other states.

Motor vehicle crashes potentially impact all the citizens of Wisconsin.

The large number of motor vehicles spreads this cost across a large base and as a result, no single entity bears an unreasonable cost. A detailed listing of the use of these funds is provided in Appendix I.

As an alternative, the Committee could choose to fund only the additional costs associated with the trauma system. This would require \$540,000. Under this option, the Department proposes an increase of \$1.00 to the driver's license registration fee to generate approximately the amount of funding needed. A more detailed listing of the use of the funds under this alternative is provided in Appendix II.

- b. Enforce information technology contract terms for software license compliance in the state's information technology infrastructure where necessary.

- d. Provide management oversight for agency education initiatives pertaining to software license compliance and United States copyright law.

The following information is provided for your consideration and review pursuant to 301.03(6m) WI STATS. The figures below cover the period from January 1, 2000 to December 31, 2000.

- 1. There were 50 inmates transferred involuntarily from a prison to a mental health institute under 51.20(13)(A)4. The average length of stay was 217 days. All but three inmates were committed for outpatient treatment. One inmate was committed to inpatient treatment upon reaching his mandatory release date. There were no voluntary transfers from a prison to a mental health institute.
- 2.4,924 inmates underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs and 55 inmates were treated with psychotropics on an involuntary basis. The types of medications used include antipsychotic drugs, antidepressant drugs, mood stabilizers, anti-parkinsonian medications, and medications for side effects.
- 3.Mental health services, both psychiatric and psychological, are available at all the major institutions. Services include individual and group therapy, chemotherapy, psychiatric, psychological, and neuropsychological evaluations, crisis interventions, sex offender groups, domestic abuse groups, anger management groups, and cognitive interventions programs. Inmates who need more intensive mental health services are transferred to the Special Management Unit at Columbia Correctional Institution, the Wisconsin Resource Center, or one of the Mental Health Institutes.

Despite my youth, I came to Madison with a great deal of confidence, idealism and hope – qualities given to me by my hometown. The people of Elroy raised me. Taught me my values. And instilled in me the importance of putting people first.

Elroy common sense guided me as a legislator and a governor. And those same values will guide me as I serve the president of this great country as Secretary of Health and Human Services. Washington is a long way from Elroy, but Elroy will never be far from me. It's who I am.

And so this man from Elroy humbly comes before you one last time tonight to talk about our great state and its future.

We've done remarkable things inside and outside this grand old building. Just think back for a moment to the state of our state in the mid–80s.

Remember when our good friends down in Illinois mocked our troubled economy? They even went so far as to put up a billboard on the border saying, "When the last business leaves Wisconsin, please turn out the lights."

Well my friends, the lights are on in Wisconsin and burning brighter than ever.

In fact, I hope our friends in Illinois didn't let the toll gate hit them in the bumper when they moved their families and businesses to Wisconsin by the truckload.

Illinois companies are moving to Wisconsin for our more positive business environment – there are almost 50 in the Kenosha Business Park alone. Illinois families are coming for our great schools and unmatched quality of life. And the poor are venturing north for a good job and greater opportunity, not a bigger welfare check.

We've even taken to beating up on their sports teams. Let's see, since 1986, we've gone to two Super Bowls, three Rose Bowls and a Final Four. Down in Illinois, they still haven't found a quarterback.

I engage in this lighthearted teasing of our good friends and neighbors because it illustrates how much we've built Wisconsin since the days when they teased us.

My, how far we have come together.

We've come so far that we can all claim with great pride tonight that in the year 2001 the state of the state is that of the nation's leader. Name the issue and Wisconsin is leading the way.

Many states claim they're the best, but only one state can back it up. We follow our bold words with bold deeds. During my confirmation process, it was heartwarming to hear how often senators recognized Wisconsin as the nation's leader in innovation.

We took office with one clear mission: To build our economy. And this has remained our No. 1 priority – even in the good times.

We recognized that without strong businesses and good jobs, we can't provide a high quality of life for our families. We can't afford the social programs that help those in need or great public schools for our children.

Let's take a look at the strong economy we built: 800,000 new jobs; 95,000 new manufacturing jobs; a record 3 million people working – the highest percentage in America; unemployment cut by more than half to 3.3 percent; a jobless rate below the national average a record 156 straight months; and a median household income of nearly \$46,000, well above the national average.

What a turnaround! No Company mirrors our comeback better than Wisconsin's very own Harley Davidson. Since 1986, Harley grew its earnings from \$4 million to \$348 million; increased employment from 1,200 to 3,700; opened four new facilities; and saw its stock price grow from 33 cents a share to \$40. Please welcome Ken Sutton and Wayne Curtain from Harley.

Wisconsin is once again the place where eagles soar and Harleys roar!

We're enjoying the longest period of sustained economic growth in our history.

To those who try to downplay our economic success by giving the credit to good times nationally, let us be clear about one thing: Wisconsin built its economy first, and the nation followed.

Look at these charts, particularly the period from 1987 to 1992.

When the country fell into recession in the early 90s, Wisconsin was one of only a few states not to feel the sting. Our job creation grew while the nation's fell, and our unemployment rate dropped while the nation's rose.

We did not benefit from an economic boom – we helped create the economic boom.

How did we build this economic engine? By what I call the Four Ts of the Great Turnaround: Our 'Tude, the slang for Attitude, Tax Cuts, Transportation and Teaching.

We set a new tone, where success was the only option. We began believing we could achieve anything, then worked together to make it happen.

Don't for a second discount the importance of our attitude change, for it transformed how companies looked at Wisconsin. We made it clear Wisconsin was open for business and companies responded by building and growing here.

As we were adjusting our attitude, we began making investments in the right places to trigger economic growth.

We cut taxes in the very first budget and haven't stopped since.

With your help, we cut taxes 91 times totaling \$16.7 billion. These cuts saved the average

Wisconsin family \$8,400. And they infused new money into the economy to help stimulate growth and prosperity.

And tonight, we have good news to report. The state's national tax ranking has fallen to ninth in the nation, according to the latest Census Bureau figures which reflect tax year 1999.

And when the cuts we enacted for years 2000 and 2001 are factored into the equation, we can say with confidence that Wisconsin is finally out of the top 10 states.

As for state spending, our per capita rate is the 14th lowest in the nation and our state government is the third smallest. Could it be better? Absolutely. Is it bad? Absolutely not.

But let's be fair about what has driven spending – the desire to cut local property taxes.

In 1995, the state picked up two-thirds the cost of local schools and we've maintained that percentage ever since. That costs money. But we made this commitment to cut property taxes \$1.2 billion initially and keep them under control in future years.

And without the cost controls we placed on local school spending, property taxes would be \$2 billion higher right now.

So let's put this in the proper perspective: Spending went up at the state level so taxes could go down at the local level.

What's most impressive is the state took on the extra burden of local school spending and still made substantial cuts in state taxes.

That's quite a feat. And it's a testament to our fiscal discipline.

But if some partisans are still intent on playing games with the spending issue, let me remind them of this fact: Every budget I submitted to the Legislature has come back with more spending — \$1.6 billion to be exact. And my 1,900 vetoes pared \$287 million. Also, I set aside more money for a rainy day in every budget, but the Legislature spent it.

So, perhaps it is time for a cap on state spending.

But back to the four Ts. Along with adjusting our attitude and cutting taxes, we stimulated our economy by investing in our roads.

When we came in, Wisconsin was largely a network of inefficient and dangerous two lane highways. So we built strategic corridors of four–lane roads that are delivering remarkable economic benefits for communities. From 1990 to 1996, more than 87 percent of the 1,900 manufacturing developments in Wisconsin occurred within five miles of a Corridors 2020 highway. And these plants created 90 percent of the new manufacturing jobs in our state.

We built the roads and the jobs followed. The correlation couldn't be clearer, nor could the payoff on the investment.

We also increased spending on mass transportation by 140 percent, helping our workers get to and from their jobs. And we are leading the nation into an exciting new era of high–speed passenger rail with the help of Amtrak.

We've taken a balanced approach to moving our products and people in Wisconsin.

The fourth T, and perhaps the most important, is teaching. Educating our children and workers.

As the nation's Education State, we have long recognized that education must be the foundation for individual success. If we were going to create more jobs, we needed to develop the skilled workers to fill them.

So we invested in our schools like no other time in our history – and that's saying a lot.

We now spend \$7.8 billion dollars each year on public schools – an increase of 141 percent. And the state contribution to schools has grown from \$1 billion to nearly \$5 billion. In addition, we increased other state aids and credits by 230 percent; raised per pupil spending to \$9,000 annually; spent \$47.2 million more in the SAGE program to reduce class sizes; made our teachers among the best paid in the Midwest and America; invested in teacher development and created a salary bonus for national certification.

No state is making a greater, more consistent investment in its public schools than Wisconsin.

We've learned, however, that just spending more money doesn't buy you more success in the classroom. Nowhere was this more evident than in Milwaukee Public Schools, which were lagging behind. This despite the state increasing its aid to MPS by 55 percent and funding 82 percent of its costs.

So we targeted our efforts to building up Milwaukee. We started with the principles that every student can learn and parents must be empowered with more choices.

This philosophy spawned some of the nation's most innovative education reforms.

Charter schools. Public school choice. Private school choice for Milwaukee. Charter schools operated by the city of Milwaukee, UW–Milwaukee, and the Medical College of Wisconsin and MPS.

Nowhere in America does a parent have more choices than in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

And it's making all the difference.

Parents are now more involved in their children's lives. The public schools are rising to the challenge of competition. And the entire city of Milwaukee is more dedicated to improving the quality of its schools.

There is no doubt in my mind that Milwaukee will become the national model for renewing urban education in America within a few years. I have often used this podium to challenge MPS, but tonight I want to applaud its leaders and educators. Please recognize Superintendent Spence Korte and board vice president Ken Johnson. They are working together to make sure all schools measure up and no child is left behind.

And I urge this Legislature to extend the same array of choices to the state's other urban communities. Have the courage to give these parents the same opportunity as Milwaukee.

The Milwaukee challenge also prompted a statewide debate about the need for higher standards and greater accountability in our schools.

Thus, we came together to create the first set of education standards and the first graduation test. And I applaud the UW System for making passage of the test a requirement for admission.

To help our students achieve; we invested wisely in technology programs like TEACH — a great equalizer that gives rural and urban schools the same access to courses and teachers.

We also provided better job training for our students with the nation's first School-to-Work and Youth Apprenticeship programs.

Our Youth Options program began our quest for a seamless system of schools, where a student can move easily from high school to technical college to the university system – all while getting real work experience. This must be the model for education in the 21^{st} century.

We're also building the Schoolhouse of Tomorrow by pumping unprecedented money into our facilities, from our kindergartens to university research labs. We made sure our two-thirds commitment covered construction costs so small communities could afford new schools and building improvements.

As a result, the state has helped pay for 363 school projects and increased its construction funding by 650 percent.

And we've built our UW System campuses into cutting–edge institutions by helping to finance 4,025 building projects totaling nearly \$2 billion in capital investment.

The payoff is the nation's best–educated, skilled workforce. Our students graduate in high demand.

What makes Wisconsin so special, though, is that in our fine progressive tradition, we have made wise use of our economic success. Yes, we aggressively cut taxes for our families, but we also invested in our future by helping those in need.

Nowhere is our state's social contract more evident than in health care, where we consistently have one of the highest percentages of people with health coverage.

But when our workers can't get or afford health insurance, the state provides a helping hand in the form of BadgerCare. This program allows hard—working families like Todd and Catherine Dobbratz to buy into the state health plan in a way that doesn't tax others or bankrupt government. Now the Dobbratzes have health coverage for themselves and their four children. And I applaud the Legislature for taking swift, bipartisan action to make this program whole. It's a great way to start off the new session.

During my senate confirmation process, there was no program senators in both parties were more interested in than BadgerCare. They wanted to know how we did it and could it be replicated nationally. I don't know the answer but something tells me I'm going to find out. Once again the nation is looking to Wisconsin to solve a problem once deemed unsolvable.

And thanks to your help, we're giving seniors the choice of getting long-term care in their homes through Family Care. And Pathways to Independence is freeing the disabled to pursue careers without the fear of losing life-sustaining health benefits.

But I would be remiss – and in big trouble at home – if I didn't mention the tremendous strides we are making in women's health in Wisconsin. We created an Office of

Women's Health, expanded access to health care, and invested more in research. And I'm pleased to announce I was able to bring GE Medical Systems and UW Hospital together to install two digital mammography machines at UW Health Centers this spring. These machines detect breast cancer at such an early stage it will save hundreds of lives.

Another example of making the latest in medical technology available to Wisconsin women.

Now we also have before us the challenge of making prescriptions drugs affordable to low–income seniors. With both parties and houses publicly committed to addressing this problem, I am confident a solution can be reached. The existing budget constraints, however, clearly place the first priority on helping those seniors in greatest need. Let's make it happen.

Our most recognizable and successful social reform, however, is welfare.

They said you couldn't end AFDC. It was impossible to develop a more compassionate and effective way of helping the poor.

Well, we proved the cynics wrong and showed that every person has value. We rejected a system that discriminated against women and cast them off into a corner of society.

Instead, we took them by the hand and showed them a better way. And an entire nation followed.

W–2 is far and away our most compassionate accomplishment – the greatest change in social policy in 60 years.

We made welfare reform work because we did it right. We brought welfare mothers to the table and asked them what prevented them from working.

With their counsel, we invested up front in the programs needed to move them from dependency to self–sufficiency: child care, health care, transportation, training, food stamps, tax credits and individualized counseling.

Just look at childcare. We increased spending from \$12 million to more than \$200 million, and there are no waiting lists as a result.

Now we're taking childcare to the next step with our Early Childhood Excellence Centers that provide high quality learning for low-income children. These centers will set a new standard in early childhood development – putting at-risk children on more solid footing as they enter school. A model for this concept is SC Johnson and its Next Generation Now center in Racine. I'd like to thank Helen Johnson–Leipold for SC Johnson's leadership.

Welfare reform is succeeding beyond our grandest expectations.

Yes, our caseloads are down a remarkable 94 percent. Only 6,496 families remain on cash assistance.

But more important is the fact these families are better off. No their lives aren't perfect yet. But they are better off as a whole.

Just look at the data.

• Our first leaver's study showed that 70 percent left the rolls for a job.

• The average wage is \$7.42 – more than two dollars above the minimum wage.

• The average family on AFDC was 30 percent below the poverty level. Through W–2, they're 30 percent above poverty.

• The child poverty rate has dropped by 20 percent.

• Wisconsin ranks as the fourth best state in the country for children.

• Our overall poverty rate is the fifth lowest; our gap between rich and poor is the fourth smallest.

Clearly, welfare reform is lifting families up. Helping them to succeed. And giving them a higher quality of life. Leilani Duarte, who was part of those first luncheons at the Residence, is proof.

Our challenge is not over, however.

The genius of W–2 is its flexibility and its ability to evolve. And evolve it must.

W–2 helped thousands of families get jobs. Now it must focus on helping them climb the ladder of opportunity to greater self–sufficiency. It must put resources toward helping families stay in the workforce and not slip backwards.

The Division of Economic Support is already in the process of making this transformation and I urge you to support their efforts.

We must not rest until we help these families attain their full share of the American Dream. That is the great promise of W-2.

Our strong economy also allowed us to raise our quality of life through a great outdoors, safer neighborhoods and preservation of our proud farm heritage.

As we created 800,000 new jobs, our tougher environmental standards led to a reduction of industrial pollution by nearly 25 percent.

We cleaned our environment with nationally recognized programs such as the Clean Water Program, recycling, brownfield recovery and the Great Lakes Protection Fund.

We ignited a new era of environmental stewardship in Wisconsin by growing more forest land than at any time in our

state's recorded history; preserving more land for public enjoyment — 256,000 pristine acres; extending the Stewardship Fund by \$460 million and another 10 years; and creating two new Centennial State Parks to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the State Park System. I'd like to thank Dick Steffes and Sue Black of the DNR and Todd Montgomery of the State Parks Friends for their help preserving this land.

We also brought the elk and trumpeter swan back to Wisconsin; while removing the bald eagle, timber wolf, Canada Lynx, Cooper's Hawk and Tremblay's salamander from the endangered species list.

Our vibrant natural resources help make Wisconsin a popular tourist destination.

We increased our tourism promotion budget from \$1 million to \$12.5 million. And the payoff is an economic impact of \$9 billion by the tourism industry. Tourist spending is up 51 percent as more visitors keep coming back more often.

And one of our greatest tourist attractions is the State Fair. You've already seen the aesthetic changes made to the park this summer. And there are even more ambitious plans to modernize the grounds. Please make the State Fair Park renovation a priority – we'll reap the benefits for generations.

We also have a great opportunity to build a world–class History Center that will make sure the story of Wisconsin and its people live forever. I am forwarding the \$75 million project in the budget and plan to raise private money for it as well. This project must also include an underground parking facility.

The History Center will build upon the Overture Project, Monona Terrace, and Capitol Restoration and Veterans Museum improvements – making Madison and the Capitol Square a premiere tourist destination.

I'm just worried there'll be so many fun things to do around here; no work will get done.

The quality of life in our neighborhoods matches that of our great outdoors thanks in large part to our zero tolerance approach to crime.

We restored public confidence in the criminal justice system with truth in sentencing, strengthened our juvenile code by replacing a soft touch with tough love, and kept sexual predators off our streets until they're deemed not to be a threat.

While no one likes to build prisons, there is an unmistakable correlation between rising prison populations and the lowest crime rates in 30 years. When the bad guys are behind bars, they're not committing crimes.

But our goal remains to make a criminal's first visit to prison his last. Our cutting–edge work programs give prisoners a skill and work ethic so they can leave prison with the ability to get a job and stay out of trouble. And drug and alcohol treatment programs help keep them sober.

As we look to the future, every prison must have a work program that trains every prisoner. Otherwise, these criminals will just keep coming back. And let's bring all our prisoners back within two years and upgrade the prison health care system in this budget.

Down on the farm, things are looking up. We are America's Dairyland: the largest producer of cheese, dry whey and sweetened condensed milk. Our cheeses are recognized as the best in the world.

We produce 23 billion pounds of milk and boast twice as many family farms as any other state. All this despite federal dairy policies that punish Wisconsin farmers and discourage them from farming.

Wisconsin remains the dairy leader because of our commitment to family farming.

Our conversion to use value assessment saved farmers \$41 million in property taxes last year alone – money that could be plowed back into new equipment and technology. I'd like to introduce Chuck and Kathy Garfoot of Verona, who credit use value for allowing them to stay on their land rather sell it in rapidly developing Dane County.

We also increased the farm credits by \$29 million; created a permanent tax credit of up to \$1,000; eliminated the inheritance taxes; and made health care costs fully deductible.

And parents can now pass their farm onto a child without paying onerous capital gains taxes.

We also protected the right to farm with legislation ensuring new neighbors and developments don't infringe upon family farmers and their operations.

For the future, we need to keep our farmers competitive by allowing them to expand.

Larger farms are the only way some farmers – and farm communities – will be able to survive. And many of our cheesemakers desperately need more milk. Just because a farmer wants to grow his herd, doesn't mean he isn't a family farmer. We can't be afraid to expand our dairy operations.

So as we look back on the past 14 years, we have indeed come a long way.

We struck the right balance between cutting taxes and investing prudently in our people.

We developed a winning formula and executed it together.

But behind the statistics are real people, like:

• Matthew Neary, a UW–Stout student pursuing his dream of a career thanks to Pathways.

• Eugene Bingenheimer, who gets quality care at home, thanks to Family Care

• Doctors Anthony D'Alessandro and Paul Volek along with the Nachreiner family, who are making Wisconsin one of best organ donor states in America.

• Wausau Benefits CEO Fred Moore, Board Chairman Dwight Davis and employees Jay Aniker and Chris Thomas – a company that's succeeding with the state's partnership.

• Patricia Burgess, a W-2 participant and her caseworker Barbara Atkins.

• Ben and Debi Heisner, Mineral Point farmers carrying on our agriculture heritage.

• Milwaukee LaFollette Elementary principal Flora Odom–Flagg, and her students Vallory Tole and Welisha Frelow; and Messmer High principal Jeff Monday and students LaTosha Cooper and Juan Youngblood. These schools and educators are showing that all children in Milwaukee can succeed and meet high expectations.

• And finally the Ruttig and Hussey families, who on this very stage were promised major tax cuts in the last budget, address. We're proud to say we delivered for you.

These are the faces of our success in Wisconsin.

They're why we all got into this profession. To help people. To make their lives better.

And that's exactly what we've done together.

As they leave us tonight, let us thank these citizens for helping make Wisconsin a better place in their own way.

Now to the future. As we set a course for the next decade, we must keep investing in the

Four Ts. As always, I have a plethora of ideas on exactly how to do that.

First and foremost, it is important that Wisconsin maintain its aggressive attitude on economic development by investing in the new economy. Our competitors are no longer Illinois and Minnesota. They are also California, Colorado, Washington, Europe and the Pacific Rim nations.

Wisconsin stands to become America's Biotech Prairie and we mustn't let one high tech company escape our state in search of a better climate. We must nurture cutting–edge biotech companies like Third Wave Technologies, which is about to go public. Third

Wave exemplifies the great potential for this industry in Wisconsin. I'd like to thank Rocky Ganske and Stephanie Vavra for joining us tonight.

We must aggressively pursue more venture capital so the ambitious high-tech and biotech entrepreneurs have the resources to bring their discoveries to market.

We must continue investing wisely in our universities: Keep the Biostar program on pace.

Double the number of information technology graduates. And create a Master's degree in biotechnology at UW–Madison.

And, as best you can give available resources, move forward with the Madison Initiative, Milwaukee Idea and Chippewa Valley Initiative. All are strategic plans geared toward developing the jobs and workers of tomorrow through public–private partnerships in their regions. I'd like to introduce UW–Eau Claire Chancellor Donald Mash, UW–Madison Chancellor John Wiley and UW President Katherine Lyall and thank them for their leadership.

We can't afford to waste the newfound synergy between our universities and private sector if we want to grow the technology industry in Wisconsin.

And keep looking to cut taxes. While tax cuts may be hard to come by this session, it doesn't mean you shouldn't try. If money is found, a priority must be placed on stimulating new economic growth – just as we did in 1987.

A hub exemption is vital to the competitiveness of our Wisconsin–based airlines. Modern commerce demands easy access to air travel, which makes Midwest Express an economic jewel that gives us a leg up on our competitors. If possible, find a way to create tax–free Technology Zones in regions of the state. They can set the Biotech Prairie on fire by providing a tremendous financial incentive for high–tech companies to locate and grow in Wisconsin. The payoff will be thousands of new jobs and taxpayers.

And single factor should be another priority, so our businesses aren't tempted to move to a neighboring state.

Then don't forget the importance of transportation. Even in the new economy, moving commerce will demand a strong road system.

No road project is more important than the Marquette Interchange, through which a majority of our state's commerce travels. This Legislature must commit itself to getting this project off the ground promptly, or commerce in our state will suffer.

Vital to the Marquette project is repairing the Hoan Bridge, which is to serve as a major relief valve for traffic while the Marquette is closed. We're working closely with the federal government to get emergency funds to fix the northbound lanes. And I have instructed the Department of Transportation to get the southbound lanes ready for traffic by mid–February, a target that can be met safely.

And I'm looking for some lawmakers to take up the charge of high–speed passenger rail in Wisconsin. We need to get a high–speed route established from Chicago to Milwaukee and Madison, ultimately going to other areas as well. It simply doesn't pay anymore to drive from Madison or Milwaukee to Chicago. Trains are a fast and cheap alternative.

The state recently purchased the Milwaukee Amtrak station and plans to remodel it into a beautiful intermodel facility. And if we build an Amtrak stop at Mitchell Field, we will quickly establish Milwaukee as the third airport serving the Chicago region.

Finally, our commitment to education must never waiver. Therefore, this budget will maintain the state's commitment to two-thirds local school funding.

And let's move beyond the fear of accountability. Challenge our kids to meet the high standards we set for them. Make the state graduation test mandatory.

Tonight I challenge the state to solve another one of society's unsolvable problems.

Let's eradicate illiteracy in Wisconsin.

We're setting up reading academies to train teachers in the best ways to teach children to read. And we're developing web-based reading methods for elementary school teachers.

Eliminating illiteracy will require the dedicated effort of us all – from parents to teachers to employers and churches. It'll take more people like Tori Rader of the Brown County

Literacy Council, Dottie Heitke of the Stateline Literacy Council, and Barbara Manthei who leads the state's literacy effort. Let's come together and make Wisconsin the first state where everyone can read. There's no greater legacy we can leave our next generation.

Finally, I would like to add to the equation for future success, two Es: energy and efficiency.

We must make sure the trails we blaze tomorrow are well lit and capable of powering commerce in Wisconsin. This means producing enough energy.

Let me be clear: There is no issue more crucial or critical to Wisconsin's future right now than energy. We're running out of it. Plain and simple. And Wisconsin is not alone, for Alan Greenspan warned last week of a national crisis in energy production.

In Wisconsin, we simply don't have enough power plants and transmission lines.

Just presuming a very modest 3 percent growth in demand for electricity, Wisconsin's electricity needs will exceed its generating capabilities in just two short years. But our economy keeps growing at a 5 to 6 percent pace. And what happens if an existing power plant goes down for maintenance or repairs?

Ladies and gentlemen, we have no margin for error.

We've built some plants in the last few years, and our deregulation efforts have been hailed nationally as among the smartest - in stark contrast to California. But this has only allowed us to get by.

We need to immediately pursue a balanced course of building more power plants and erecting more transmission lines. And we need a natural gas pipeline to make our supply more reliable. We can do all of these without harming the environment, despite what the fear mongers claim. We've proven this in the past.

Without enough energy, not only will our existing businesses suffer; all those high-tech companies we want to attract will go elsewhere. High-technology runs on raw power not wood stoves.

Even the Wall Street Journal wrote a few days ago that states are aggressively using energy as a powerful new tool in recruiting business.

The stakes are high: If this chamber does not heed this clarion call to action, it will put the economic future of this state at great peril.

Next, we must become more efficient. At every level of government, we need to do a better job of delivering the services our people demand at a price we can all afford.

And there's no better time to start than this budget when revenues will be lower than expected.

Thanks to the hard work of Don Kettl and his commission, we now have a road map to smaller, more efficient government – from Elroy to Juneau County to Madison. The commission's recommendations, including how we better distribute revenue between state and local government, will be included in the upcoming budget. Don is with us here tonight after completing another thankless task for our state.

Tonight, I want to focus on the five most "radical and bold" ideas — the catalysts for truly modernizing our government for a new century.

1.) Create incentives to collaborate. In our forefathers' zeal for strong local control, they created too much government. And this has led to overlapping services.

By engaging in regional collaboration for the delivery of services, governments can reap significant savings without sacrificing quality. For example, do neighboring communities really need separate mass transit systems? Or separate waste collection services?

I can tell you right now, that the amount of money the state can send back to communities and spend on programs isn't going to grow in this budget. The economic windfall isn't there. So there's no better time for local governments to collaborate and develop savings. 2.) Demand performance and accountability. We would improve harmony and performance by more clearly defining the roles of state and local government.

For example, the state might assume responsibility for providing human service programs and contract with local government to deliver them. The state would pay local government based on its performance. The more efficient the delivery, the greater the financial reward.

The result would be greater accountability, better service and less friction.

3.) Performance–based education. There is no area that state and local government spends more money on than schools. But we need to do a better job of making sure that money gets directly into the classroom by giving greater operating flexibility to every local school building. And we must demand high performance. We must also continue to breakdown barriers to our seamless system of schools.

4.) A Top–To–Bottom Scrub of Government. If we are serious about reforming government, we need to dig deep and determine what we do well and what we do poorly at all levels.

We need to search and destroy regulations and programs that have outlived their usefulness; share the best practices of government; and establish performance–based management for state government.

5.) Expand e-government. Web portals for all levels of government will make it easier for citizens to access services and reduce the cost of goods the government buys.

Tonight, state government is unveiling its new, one-stop web site: <u>www.wisconsin.gov</u>.

Once on-line, an array of state services will be at your fingertips. You can renew your vehicle registration, reserve a campsite, look for a job, begin building a new business, learn how to get social services in your community, see how your child's school grades out compared to others, or plan a family trip. Every state agency is making its programs and services accessible online.

And by using the portal to buy products on-line, we will save taxpayers money.

Through reverse auctions, we can get the products we need at the lowest price possible.

In a recent auction to purchase textiles, you can see that the longer the auction went on, the lower the price dropped. We finally bought the textiles for 33 percent below the market price.

Our e-portal underscores the great efficiencies we can accomplish in government if we're bold enough to change.

Reforming government doesn't just mean making it more efficient, however.

Perhaps the area where government needs the greatest reform is in the political system.

The fall elections brought a new level of attack ads, record spending and reports of smokes–for–votes and felons voting.

Thus, it is time to quit the political posturing and pass the first Kettl Commission Report — the comprehensive campaign finance reform. It's the only bipartisan reform out there.

And let's take it a step further: Develop stronger regulations on independent ads. The

Constitution makes speech free but last-minute attack ads are costing our democracy too much. We need to strike a better balance.

Next, pass a bipartisan package of voting reforms that include: requiring a photo ID to register and vote; the training of election observers; creation of a statewide voter list; a new position at the Elections Board to help local governments conduct elections properly; and a task force to study the use of technology to increase voter participation.

We are America's good government state. The integrity of our polls must never be questioned again.

Tonight, I am pleased to announce a new project that will help increase public participation and reduce cynicism.

It's called The WisconsinEye Public Affairs Network. It will be Wisconsin's version of C–SPAN.

These small, discreet cameras will be mounted in the Assembly and Senate Chambers, providing the public with straightforward coverage of legislative proceedings. This represents the very latest in miniature digital technology.

WisconsinEye will cover hearings, press conferences and other happenings in state government and around the state. And students and educators will have a real-time window on the State Capitol.

A more formal announcement on this project is coming soon. But let me tell you now that this network will not cost the taxpayers any money. WisconsinEye will be supported by a private not–for–profit company, and Charter Communications is contributing as well.

Please welcome the network's president Jeff Roberts, its vice president Jon Henkes and Chris Fenger and Tim Vowell of Charter Communications.

And I would like to give credit to the Assembly and Senate for openly welcoming WisconsinEye into their chambers. It's a bold and courageous move.

So there you have it. Another ambitious agenda for the future. And you thought you'd get off easy tonight with me just talking about the past.

Believe me, I would love to keep going because I still have hundreds of ideas for this state.

But now it is time to pass the torch and say goodbye.

Tomorrow at noon, Scott McCallum will become the 43 rd Governor of this great state. A new era of leadership and government will begin.

Already, Scott is showing the strong decision–making that will be necessary to keep Wisconsin on a sound path. As you know, there is no budget windfall this year. The failure to heed warnings about the structural deficit and a bigger rainy day fund will make this a difficult budget session. But the lieutenant governor is one of the few people in this room not responsible for this predicament.

Thus, I encourage you to give him your full support. Being governor is not easy. But Scott McCallum is more than up to the challenge. He's a good man and I wish him well.

As for me, well, I've spoken so long tonight because deep down I really don't want this night to end. For I know tomorrow brings a new beginning.

But how do you say goodbye to a place you love so much?

I'll begin by thanking you, the people of Wisconsin, for all the courtesies and friendships you have extended my family. You have warmly given us your home and made us your neighbors. I

want to thank my children: Kelli, Tommi and Jason for standing by me. It's not easy being the governor's children, but they always carried themselves with grace and dignity.

In fact, of every success I spoke about tonight, there is nothing I am more proud of than my children. They have grown to be warm, caring adults. And the credit goes to my wife Sue Ann.

Sue and I have been through so much together, and she is such a great part of my success.

Without a doubt, I would not be standing here today without her. So please welcome my wife, who would like to say a few words of thanks.

(MRS. THOMPSON)

Thank you, for the opportunity to serve as Wisconsin's first lady for these last 14 years. It has been an honor and a privilege.

Thank you, also for supporting Tom, our family and myself. The kindness of the people of Wisconsin has been a great source of strength for all of us. We will always treasure our moments as governor and first lady.

We have developed many wonderful friendships, visited many beautiful communities and learned so much about our state.

You have heard Tom speak often of his family of more than 5 million people here in Wisconsin. That is a sentiment that we both share. No matter where we go in Wisconsin, we have always felt welcome.

I also have had the opportunity to become involved in many special programs. Women's health issues and literacy are among those that have been so close to my heart.

I plan to continue my work after I leave as your first lady. I promise you I will remain committed to women's health, both here in Wisconsin and in Washington.

Again, thank you all for your continued friendship and support.

We believe in ourselves again. We created the most sustained period of success in Wisconsin history. And we did it by working together.

There has been no greater honor in my life – and there will never be a greater honor – than to have been elected four times to serve as your governor. You made these the most special years of my career and I will miss you greatly.

I'll miss traveling this great state — the farm breakfasts, the 5K races, the softball games.

I'll miss waking up on a Saturday morning and taking a Harley Ride, or biking through our beautiful countryside. I'll miss the rides at the State Fair, Friday night fish fries, doing the electric slide with my friends in Milwaukee.

But most of all, I'm just going to miss spending time with you. You are my friends.

Together, we made a good life for ourselves here in Wisconsin.

Be proud of it. But never be satisfied. A better way is just beyond the horizon.

I love you all. Thank you and God Bless Wisconsin.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of December 2000.

On December 1, 2000 the **Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund** balance was -\$9 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$11 thousand on December 19, 2000 and continued into the month of January. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On December 1, 2000 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was -\$3.63 million. This shortfall decreased to -\$1.36 million on December 6, 2000, increased to -\$2.16 million on December 19, to -\$3.18 million on December 29, 2000, and continued into the month of January. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On December 4, 2000 the **General Fund** balance was -\$73.53 million. This shortfall increased to -\$123.27 million on December 7, 2000, decreased to -\$60.57 million on December 14, 2000, and continued until December 18, 2000 when the balance reached \$98.94 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Utility Public Benefit Fund, and General Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority. Sincerely,

In 1997 Act 27, the 97-99 Biennial Budget, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. DHFS and (for certain child care providers) counties and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to the Department, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Sections 48.685(5g) and 50.065(5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct the Department to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. Attached is the report for 2000.

THE CHAIR RULES

SENATE BILL 1

An Act to create 20.435 (4) (bv), 20.435 (4) (j), 20.435 (4) (jb), 20.435 (4) (jd), 49.477 and 49.688 of the statutes; relating to: requiring pharmacies and pharmacists, as a condition of medical assistance participation, to charge elderly persons for prescription drugs no more than specific amounts; specifying requirements for rebate agreements between the department of health and family services and drug manufacturers; requiring

the department of health and family services to seek a waiver to provide medical assistance eligibility to certain persons for purposes of a prescription drug benefit; requiring the exercise of rule–making authority; making appropriations; and providing penalties. (FE)

Senate Bill 1 was referred to the Joint Committee on Finance on January 25, 2001. The Senate Co–Chair of the Joint Committee has attempted to schedule a meeting; however, the Assembly Co–Chair has refused to concur with a meeting schedule.

There are two issues involved prior to consideration of Senate Bill 1 by the full Senate:

- 1. The first is the requirement for an "emergency statement" as required by ss. 16.47(2)
- 2. The authority of the Senate Committee on Finance to report the proposal to the Senate when the proposal was referred to the Joint Committee on Finance by the Senate.

Section 16.47(2) of the statutes requires that prior to passage of the biennial budget bill, any proposal which impacts state finances by an amount exceeding \$10,000 requires an emergency statement before either house of the legislature may take a vote on final passage of the proposal.

The fiscal impact information provided by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau indicates a cost of \$16 Million in fiscal year 2001–02 and approximately \$106 million in fiscal year 2002–03. Clearly, in accordance with ss 16.47(2), the bill requires an emergency statement.

A brief history of the "emergency statement" requirement is in order at this time. The concept was developed as the result of one of the first Legislative Council Study Committees on the Budgetary Procedure. The Legislative Council by its resolution establishing the subcommittee advised that the subcommittee "consider the feasibility of including all appropriations in a single bill". The report of the subcommittee stated: "Studies bring out an alarming trend of the large number of separately enacted appropriation bills, including the executive budget bill. The last three sessions show 84 bills in the 1943, 85 bills in 1945 and 110 bills in 1947." The subcommittee also stated: "It is often questionable whether or not all the members of the legislature have a clear picture of the financial condition of the state. Nor do they know whether or not the appropriation bills being acted upon fit into a sound pattern for the state's financial welfare."

The subcommittee reviewed a recommendation of a prior committee on the budget, chaired by the late Senator Melvin R. Laird Sr. That recommendation was to employee 5 budget assistants to advise the legislature on fiscal policy. Senator Laird was quoted as saying: "Budgetary systems are concerned with the coordination of public finances into financial plans. It is apparent that with technical assistance given, the budget can be evaluated and considered in a better legislative light."

The Legislative Council Subcommittee recommended the adoption of a proposal that would accomplish the goal of informing the members of the legislature on fiscal matters and provide for speedy and effective consideration of appropriation bills.

Assembly Bill 11 was introduced into the 1949 Legislative Session, relating to a state fiscal policy and appropriation procedures. The bill as originally introduced clearly restricted the legislature's ability to act on appropriation bills. One provision of the proposal read as follows: "No appropriation bill shall be passed by either house until the executive budget bill has passed both houses; except that the governor may recommend the enactment of an emergency executive budget bill which shall continue in effect only until the executive bill becomes effective or until the next succeeding July 1, whichever is later. There was additional language in the bill to provide for the Joint Committee on Finance to report and propose a Joint Resolution on the fiscal condition, and a requirement that appropriation bills provide a source of revenue, this last provision did not become law.

The proposal recommended by the Legislative Council was viewed by the media as; "suggestions which should make future budget requests considerably more honest". (State Journal "Under the Dome" by Sanford Goltz, date unknown)

The legislature recognized the problem with an outright restriction on its ability to pass appropriation bills prior to passage of the budget bill. Early in the 1951 session the 1949 law was modified to remove the outright restriction on the passage of appropriation bills prior to the budget bill and allow for the passage of any appropriation bill that was recommended for passage by the Joint Committee on Finance. There was no requirement of an emergency statement until 1957 when the language was amended to provide for the "emergency statement" procedure, as we know it today.

Therefore, of the original purposes outlined by the Legislative Council for restricting the consideration of appropriation bills prior to the passage of the budget, only the education of members and the heightened awareness of the fiscal impact survived. The first law enacted was an outright prohibition on the consideration of such bills prior to passage of the budget. This was repealed after only one session. The language in force today clearly is to heighten the awareness of the membership and the public that the proposal has a definite fiscal impact that may not be part of the biennial budget bill.

The authority of the Assembly to act without an emergency statement arose in a point of order raised in 1995 on Assembly 73, in which the question was raised as to the authority of the Assembly to withdraw a proposal from the Joint Committee on Finance when an emergency statement was required. The motion was to suspend the rules to withdraw AB 73 and take it up immediately. The Speaker, Representative Prosser, ruled that since the motion was to suspend the rules, the motion was valid. This clearly demonstrates that Speaker Prosser believed that one house of the legislature could act on a proposal requiring an emergency statement by suspending the rules, therefore giving credence to the authority of each house to determine its own rules of procedure.

I have found numerous occasions where a proposal has been passed by one house or the other without the required emergency statement.

The failure of the legislature to follow the procedures outlined in ss 16.47(2) does not invalidate the act. I will not quote from the various case history and parliamentary manuals on this subject as I believe it is widely understood that the Constitution grants the authority to each house of the legislature to determine its own rules of procedure and that the legislature may not bind or restrict itself or its successors as to the procedure to be followed in the passage of legislation.

The statutes are silent as it relates to the authority of the Senate Finance Committee to issue an emergency statement.

To determine what authority the Senate Finance Committee has relating to emergency statements, one needs to understand the purpose of the statements. Clearly, since 1957, when the concept of the emergency statement was placed in our statutes, its sole purpose was to make certain that the members of the legislature and the public were aware that a proposal was going to have significant impact on state finances. The law does not require any other special action to be taken other than to provide notice to an "emergency". From the history of this section of the statutes, it appears that the term "emergency" was taken from the original bill of 1949, which gave authority to the Governor to propose an "emergency" executive budget bill. There is no definition as to what constitutes an "emergency". The 1951 act only gave an exemption to the prohibition on the passage of appropriation bills, if the Joint Committee on Finance recommended the bills for passage.

The history of the Senate Committee on Finance indicates that under Senate Rule 20(4)(b), the Senate Committee on Finance has the authority to report any proposal to the Senate that the Joint Committee fails to.

The Senate Finance Committee has on occasion taken action to report proposals to the Senate. It is well established that the Senate Finance Committee has the authority to act when the Joint Committee on Finance fails to do so, for whatever reason.

On October 17, 1973, Senator Hollander raised the point of order that the Senate Finance Committee has full control over Senate proposals. The Chair ruled that the Senate Committee on Finance has full jurisdiction over bills and joint resolutions under the control of the Senate, which are referred to the Joint Committee on Finance. The Chair furthers stated: "To rule otherwise would allow the Assembly members of the Joint Committee on Finance to control the independent operation of the Senate and would violate the basic concept of bicameralism".

This Presiding Officer, while serving as Minority Leader of this Senate, raised a point of order on October 25, 1973, questioning the authority of the Senate Finance Committee to report a proposal to the Senate that had been referred to the Joint Committee on Finance.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken and stated that only the Joint Committee on Finance could have jurisdiction over legislation referred to the Joint Committee. The ruling of the Chair was appealed, and on a vote of 8 ayes and 23 noes, the ruling was not held as the judgement of the Senate. From that time forward, it has been the determination of this Senate that Senate Rule 20(4)(b) grants authority to the Senate Finance Committee to act on proposals referred to the Joint Committee on Finance.

The Senate Rules were amended by 1975 Senate Resolution 21. The resolution had bipartisan authors and a relating clause of "relating to senate committee procedures." The rule change was a direct result of the rulings of the Chair in the previous session.

It should be noted that the Joint Committee on Finance in the early 70's consisted of 9 members of the Assembly and 5 Senators. The split party control and the disproportionate representation of the Senate on the Joint Committee were a major reason for the actions taken by the Senate Finance Committee.

It is interesting to note that in the 75 Session, democrats controlled both houses of the legislature, yet the Senate, with strong bipartisan support, wanted to make it very clear, in the rules, that the Senate Finance Committee had jurisdiction and the authority to report proposals that had been referred to the Joint Committee on Finance, without restriction.

The statutes require no special action other than to include in their report to the house a recommendation that a proposal be passed and that a statement be made to the effect that they are emergency bills. It is clear that the Senate Finance Committee has the authority to report a proposal to the full Senate. The Committee has the same resources available to it as does the Joint Committee to determine the fiscal impact of proposals, and is clearly in a position to fulfill the requirements set forth in ss. 16.47(2).

The intent of the Senate Rule 20(4)(b) is clear in that it was adopted to allow the Senate to take action on any proposal that the Joint Committee on Finance has failed to report. It is also clear to the Chair that it was the intent and purpose of the Senate in the early 70's to grant full authority to act to the Senate Finance Committee. Furthermore, as stated by a previous presiding officer, to not allow the Senate Finance Committee to act would grant the authority to the Assembly Co–Chair, the authority to block the independent operation of the Senate. In addition, as supported by case history, parliamentary manuals and as demonstrated by the ruling by the Speaker in the Assembly, the Senate has the authority to determine its own rules of procedure, even if they conflict with an existing statute, as long as they don't conflict with the Constitution or infringe on the rights of individual members.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure states in section 3, paragraph 2:

The house and senate may pass an internal operating rule for its own procedure that is in conflict with a statute formerly adopted.

In Section 2, paragraph 3, Mason's also states:

Rules of procedure fulfill another purpose in protecting the rights of members. Individual members, for example, are entitled to receive notices of meetings and the opportunity to attend and participate in the deliberations of the group. Minorities often require protection for unfair treatment on the part of the majority, and even the majority is entitled to protection from obstructive tactics on the part of minorities.

I am reminded of a quote from Cushing's Legislative Assemblies, "Elements of the Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies in the United States of America:

> The great purpose of all rules and forms, says Cushing, is to subserve the will of the assembly rather than to restrain it; to facilitate and not to obstruct the expression of its deliberate sense.

Clearly the Senate has the authority, through its adopted rules, to authorize a committee to report a proposal in the same manner prescribed by law for a Joint Committee.

Therefore, it is the opinion of the Chair, that Senate Rule 20(4)(b) grants to the Senate Finance Committee the full authority of the Joint Finance Committee as it relates to the reporting of proposals referred by the Senate, to include the recommending of passage of a proposal with emergency statement attached.

The Chair rules the point not well taken.

The Board Finds:

1. Braeger Chevrolet of Milwaukee, WI claims \$2,700.00 for damages allegedly related to an incorrect WI vehicle title. The claimant acquired a 1993 GMC Suburban as a trade in vehicle for \$12,000. The claimant then sold that vehicle at a wholesale auction and received \$11,700 for the vehicle, after fees. The wholesaler who purchased the vehicle ran a check and discovered that the vehicle had a previous IL title marked as salvage. The claimant had to buy back the vehicle and get a proper WI title with salvage indicated. The claimant was then only able to sell the vehicle for \$9,000, incurring a loss of \$2,700.

The DOT recommends payment of this claim. Miguel Estrada purchased the 1993 GMC on 6/16/98, with an IL salvage title. Mr. Estrada subsequently applied for a WI title and did not note on his application that the vehicle should be titled as salvage. However, the DOT states that the title

processor should have noticed the salvage brand on the IL title and carried it forward to the WI title. The DOT believes that Pennie Wix, the DOT employee who processed the title, was negligent for not carrying forward the salvage brand.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$2,700.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation s. 20.395 (5)(cq), Stats.

2. H. Joseph Slater of Lake City, MN claims \$4,607.12 for income tax refunds for the years 1992, 1994 and 1995, which were withheld by the DOR to satisfy assessments for the years 1977-1985. The claimant states that he late filed his 1977-1985 returns in 1995. The claimant has a copy of a certified mail receipt dated 11/26/95 for 12 pages sent to E. Munson at the DOR. The claimant also has a copy of the signed, certified mail return receipt, showing that the returns were received by the DOR and a letter from E. Munson at the DOR dated several days after receipt of the certified mail, stating "(w)e have received your late filed 1977 through 1988 Wisconsin income tax returns." Despite this acknowledgement, the DOR withheld the claimant's 1992, 1994 and 1995 income tax returns to satisfy allegedly delinquent assessments for the years 1977–1985. The claimant states that he contacted the DOR and offered them the above evidence that he had indeed filed the returns in question. The claimant states that in March 2000, he received a letter from the DOR stating that the returns had never been received and that E. Munson "inadvertently listed having received late filed returns for tax years 1977 through 1988 when, in fact he meant 1986 through 1992." The claimant believes that this statement, issued by another auditor five years after Mr. Munson clearly stated he had received the returns, has no credible basis in fact.

DOR records show that the claimant has not filed 1977–1981 income tax returns. The DOR alleges that the claimant was incorrectly informed by E. Munson that DOR had received the 1977–1981 returns. The DOR states that it informed the claimant of the error in its March 2000 letter and that his refunds were held to satisfy the delinquent assessments for these years. DOR states that it has also issued an estimated assessment for 1996 that is now delinquent.

Based on additional DOR testimony at hearing, the Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of 1,702.50 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566 (1)(a), Stats.

Thomas F. Bailey of Milwaukee, WI claims 3. \$21,955.29+ for refund of an assessment made by the DOR. The claimant alleges that in 1989 the DOR took the position that civil service pension benefits for National Guard technicians were tax exempt. The DOR published this position in a newsletter, which it distributed to federal retirees in 1989. In 1995, the DOR reversed its position and mailed assessments to over 400 National Guard technicians for back taxes on pension benefits from 1989 to 1995, plus 12% interest. In August 1995, the claimant received an assessment for \$20,644.37 tax and interest on his pension for the years 1989–1993. The claimant paid DOR \$21,955.29 (the original assessment plus interest) in Noveber 1995. The claimant states that shortly after the DOR's position reversal, over 400 retired National Guard Technicians protested and objected to the DOR's action. The claimant states that this protest was so clear an unequivocal that then Revenue Secretary Bugher held meetings with representatives of the Retired National Guard community to address the issue. The claimant believes that Secretary Bugher was put on notice that the Retired National Guard community as a whole objected to and protested this action. A "test case" was presented to the Wisconsin Tax Appeals Commission, which upheld DOR's position. WTAC's decision was appealed in Dane County Circuit Court in November 1999. The court affirmed that the pensions were taxable but found that some of the petitioners had relied on DOR's advice to their detriment and ruled that DOR was estopped from seeking assessments against those individuals for tax years 1989 and after. The claimant states that he contacted the DOR but was told that he did not qualify for refund of the taxes because he had not appealed the original assessment issued in 1995. The claimant believes that it is unconscionable for the DOR to refuse to refund his money and that it was grossly unfair of DOR to issue backdated assessments to begin with, when the retired technicians had relied on DOR's 1989 statement that their pensions were tax exempt. The claimant believes that it is clear that all the retired National Guard Technicians protested this overwhelming financial burden when it was placed upon them and that this protest was clearly conveyed to both Secretary Bugher and the State Legislature by leaders of the Retired National Guard community.

The DOR recommends denial of this claim. A notice of appeal rights accompanied the assessment sent to the claimant in August 1995. No notice of appeal or letter of objection was filed when the claimant paid the assessment. The last date the claimant could have timely filed a claim for refund of the assessment was January 19, 1996. In February 2000, the DOR offered a settlement to the named litigants in the WTAC appeal (the "test case"). The terms of the settlement provided that for the years 1989-1995 the DOR would withdraw assessments and pay timely, properly appealed refund claims. In March 2000, the DOR began to offer the same settlement to other individuals in similar situations as the named litigants, provided that the individuals had timely pending appeals or timely refund claims. Since the claimant did not appeal the original assessment for 1989-1993, DOR has no authority to issue the refund he is requesting and it is DOR's position that the assessment is final and conclusive.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. However, Representative Albers and Senator Shibilski have indicated that, despite the Board's decision, they will be introducing legislation that will provide for payment of this claim and other like claims.

4. Anthony Gray of Madison, WI claims \$7,318.24 for refund of monies garnished from his wages to satisfy estimated income tax assessments for 1994–1996. The claimant states that he did not live in WI until 1995 and that he therefore believes the 1994 assessment to be illegal. The claimant's wages were garnished from 7/99 through 8/00. The claimant states that these estimated assessments were incorrect and that he was actually due tax refunds for 1995 and 1996. The claimant further alleges that he was not properly notified of the assessments by certified mail. The claimant states that he was never told that funds would not be returned to him if the assessments were found to be unjustified. The claimant also believes that the two-year statute of limitation has not actually elapsed. The claimant points to the fact that his wages were not certified until 7/13/99. He feels that the two-year time limit should begin on that date, which would extend the deadline until 7/13/01. The claimant does not believe that the two-year statute of limitations applies to his case at all. He states that, according to the notice he received, the two-year limit applies to assessments that are paid in full without objection. He alleges that he did not pay these assessments voluntarily and that the total amount was never collected in full. Finally, the claimant states that he was involved in a serious car accident on 8/17/00, which caused him to miss an appointment with his accountant and has also caused him great financial difficulty.

The DOR states that it originally contacted the claimant after receiving from his employer a copy of his Wisconsin withholding exemption certificate in which he claimed 14 exemptions. The certificate was signed by the claimant and his current address was given. According to DOR records, a DOR auditor wrote the claimant in 7/97, requesting verification of his 14 exemptions. No reply was received. The DOR states that in 9/97, the auditor notified both the claimant and his employer by mail that the DOR was voiding the exemption claim based on the claimant's failure to respond. No reply was received. The DOR states that in December 1997, the auditor sent a letter to the claimant requesting filing of 1994–1996 income tax returns. No reply was received. Another request was sent in 2/98, without reply. The DOR alleges that all of the above correspondence was sent directly to the same address at which the claimant currently resides. DOR records further indicate that in 5/98, the DOR issued estimated assessments for the delinquent tax years. In 7/98, DOR sent the claimant a request to file 1994–1997 income tax returns. The claimant called DOR and indicated that he was not a resident in 1994. He promised to file the required returns by 11/1/98. DOR records indicate that from 9/98–4/99, the claimant periodically contacted DOR and requested three extensions to file the returns, which he promised to do by 4/30/99. On 6/18/99 DOR initiated certification of the claimant's wages. The promised returns were filed on 8/24/00. The DOR states that there is not requirement that the claimant be served by certified mail. The DOR believes that all evidence indicates that he received the correspondence and assessments, since his address has not changed since the DOR first contacted him in 1997 and the claimant has made no allegations that he moved or was absent for extended periods of time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

5. Brian J. Friedman of Madison, WI claims \$420.55 for dental injuries allegedly caused by the actions of a UW–Madison Police Officer. The claimant alleges that in 1975, while he was walking on N. Lake Steet, he was detained by a UW Police Officer and taken to the UW Police office on Mills Street. He alleges that he was questioned at gunpoint and pushed by an officer, which caused him to fall and chip a tooth. He requests reimbursement for his dental bills allegedly incurred because of this injury.

The UW is unable to locate any records showing that the claimant was involved with the UW–Madison Police in the year in question. Furthermore, the claimant has presented no information documenting the cause of the dental work that the claimant underwent in 1988, over 10 years after the alleged injury. Because of these reasons and given the length of time that has passed since the alleged injury, the UW does not support payment of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. Burton A. Weisbrod of Glencoe, IL claims \$119,767.00 for the value of sick leave credits allegedly lost due to an error by the UW. The claimant was a professor at the UW–Madison. The claimant was on a leave of absence from 8/27/90 through 5/26/91 (the spring semester). He was enrolled in a state insurance plan until 7/31/90, and was covered by other

insurance while he was on leave. At the end of his leave, he submitted a letter to the UW indicating that he would be retiring on 6/30/91. He alleges that the UW erred and notified ETF that his retirement date was 5/26/91 (the last day of the spring semester). The UW admitted this error in their letter to the claimant dated 4/2/97. The claimant states that he contacted ETF in June of 1991, regarding his retirement annuity. He states that ETF never discussed the issue of sick leave credits with him because, based on the incorrect information provided by the UW, they believed that he was already retired. In order to convert his sick leave balance to insurance premium credits, the claimant would have had to be insured under a state plan at the time of his retirement. The claimant states that if ETF had informed him of this requirement, there would have still been time to re-enroll with his state insurance before his retirement date of June 30. It is the claimant's understanding that ETF routinely requests sick leave balances from the employing agency of a retiring employee and discusses the sick leave conversion policy with employees when they call to discuss their retirement. The claimant believes that that it was because of the UW's error that ETF never requested his sick leave balance and did not discuss the sick leave conversion policy with him. He states that, had he known about the option to convert his sick leave, he would have reinstated his state insurance in order to meet the requirements of the conversion rules. The claimant states that his sick leave would have been worth \$119,767 towards health insurance premiums and he requests payment of that amount.

The University of Wisconsin System recommends payment of this claim from funds of the Department of Employee Trust Funds. At the conclusion of his leave of absence, the claimant was eligible to return to employment with the UW and to re-enroll with a state health insurance provider prior to his retirement. Had he done so, he would have become eligible for the sick leave conversion program. The UW believes that when he sought pre-retirement advice from ETF, he was not properly counseled about the availability of the sick leave conversion benefit, or the requirements necessary to be eligible for it. The UW believes that the claimant was not properly advised about the sick leave benefit by ETF. The sick leave conversion program is funded by payments made to ETF by state agencies and thus the funds to support this claimant's benefit have already been paid to ETF. Finally, the UW states that the claimant's decision to retire was made, at least in part, to assist the UW and his action did result in relieving his department of a budget contingency. Given the circumstances, the UW believes it would be inappropriate to penalize the claimant by denying him the sick leave conversion benefit.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$5,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285 (1)(a), Stats. The Board further concludes that this payment is not considered full and final settlement of this claim should the claimant wish to pursue further avenues of relief.

7. S.R. and James Spitz of Clam Lake, WI claim \$23,377.14 for medical bills, disability, pain and suffering and loss of companionship allegedly related to an accident while Frances Spitz was a patient at UW Hospital. The claimants allege that in March 1996 Frances Spitz slipped and fell in a hallway after wandering unattended from her bed. The fall resulted in a broken hip, which required surgery and extensive follow up care. The claimants state that Ms. Spitz has a history of being unsteady on her feet as well as a history of and wandering. The claimants state that the University of Wisconsin Hospital staff was aware of Ms. Spitz's history because she had wandered on at least six previous admissions.

The claimants also state that UW Hospital had them sign two releases authorizing them to restrain Ms. Spitz for her own protection because the UW was aware that she had a tendency to wander off. The claimant states that because of her history, Mrs. Spitz's bed rails were required to be in the "up" position, so that she could not get out of bed while unattended. The claimants believe that UW Hospital personnel were negligent by not putting up her bed rails. The claimants attempted to file a lawsuit against the University of Wisconsin Hospital, but were unable to obtain the names of the hospital staff on duty, because the accident happened during a shift change. Because the claimants did not name a specific state employee, their Notice of Claim was denied by the Attorney General's Office. The claimants have submitted medical bills totaling \$23,377.14 for Ms. Spitz's medical care. They also request awards for pain and suffering, permanent disability and loss of companionship in the amount of \$350,000.

A Notice of Claim filed in this matter in 1977 was investigated by the Department of Justice, which denied the claim based on failure to comply with s. 893.82(3), Stats., and lack of any basis for a finding of liability on the part of any state employee. The UW recommends denial of this claim since there is nothing in the circumstances presented that indicate there was negligence on the part of a state employee and there is no equitable basis for payment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Jeral Khachi of Turlock, CA claims \$33,625.00 for 8. expenses allegedly related to his incarceration on a charge of failure to pay child support. The claimant lives in CA. His ex-wife, the custodial parent, resides in WI. The claimant states that at the time he was detained, he was gainfully employed and was making payments to his ex-wife. The claimant was picked up in May 1999 in CA and was incarcerated for over 20 days. The claimant states that he contacted his sister and had her obtain copies of the money orders sent to his ex-wife as proof that he had been making payments. The claimant states that this documentation was submitted to the Outagamie County Child Support Agency and the District Attorney's Office four days after his arrest. The claimant states that the day he was arrested was his first day at a new job, which he lost because of the arrest. The claimant was extradited to WI and incarcerated for four months before the charges were dropped. The claimant states that the DWD should have contacted him first to clear up the error before resorting to arresting him. He requests reimbursement as follows: 103 days lost work time-\$16,480. 43 days lost overtime-\$12,900. Towing and impounding of his vehicle on the day of his arrest-\$110. Air fare, bus fare and lodging for traveling to and from WI for hearings-\$1347.46, \$170 and \$467.84. State of WI extradition fees-\$2000. Public Defender fees-\$150.

DWD alleges that the claimant's ex-wife never informed the Outagamie County Child Support Agency that the claimant was making sporadic payments by money order directly to her. The DWD's computer system showed a large arrearage and the claimant's ex-wife signed an affidavit that the claimant had not been paying child support. Based on that affidavit, the case was referred to the DA's office for criminal prosecution. The claimant was picked up in May 1999 and arraigned in July 1999. He requested a trial, which was scheduled for August 24, 1999. The child support agency subsequently received verification that the claimant had been making direct payments. The criminal nonsupport provisions of the statutes require failure to pay for at least one continuous 120-day period. Because the claimant had not failed to pay for 120–days, the charges were dropped and the case dismissed. The DWD believes that there was no mistake in handling this case based on the information it received and that the state should not be held responsible for the claimant's expenses.

The Board believes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and that this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable, however, the Board concludes that the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$2,000.00 based on equitable principles. The further Board concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., that payment should be made from the Department of Workforce Development appropriation s. 20.445 (3)(a), Stats. The Board further suggests that the claimant pursue a claim against Outagamie County.

9. Jay M. Johnson of Baraboo, WI claims \$118.29 for the cost of one tire. The claimant is employed as a park facilities repair worker at Devil's Lake State Park. On June 1, 2000, there were severe flooding conditions at the park. The claimant states that because of the extremely high water, which would have flooded out a regular vehicle, he used his truck to transport park rangers to areas where park users needed assistance. The claimant states that while performing this service, he ran over a sharp rock that had washed into the roadway. The rock tore a 4–inch hole in his tire, which had to be replaced. He does not have insurance coverage for this damage and requests reimbursement for the cost of one replacement tire.

The DNR states that the claimant's truck was being used during this emergency situation because a comparable state–owned vehicle was not available. The claimant's supervisor was with him at the time. Under these circumstances, the DNR believes that the claimant's truck was being used for a legitimate state purpose. Furthermore, the DNR does not believe that the claimant was in any way negligent in this situation. The DNR states that the claimant informed his supervisor that the tire which was replaced had approximately 20,000 miles on it at the time it was damaged. Therefore, the DNR recommends payment of this claim in the reduced amount of \$96.37

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$118.29 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the from Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370 (1)(mu), Stats.

10. Kim Bown of Beloit, WI claims \$120.00 for vehicle damage allegedly related to her employment as a Probation and Parole Agent for the DOC. The claimant states that she used a state owned vehicle to perform home visits on September 18 and 19, 2000. While she was out on these home visits, her personal vehicle was parked in the parking lot at her office. The claimant states that when she returned on the morning of September 19, she discovered that the windshield on her personal vehicle was smashed. The claimant's insurance covered \$380.71 of the damage and she requests reimbursement for her \$120 deductible.

The DOC believes that the claimant incurred these expenses only because of her employment as a Probation and Parole Agent. The DOC believes that the residents in the neighborhood where she left her car more likely than not knew that the owner of the car was a law enforcement agent and that her vehicle was intentionally damaged. The DOC does not believe that Probation and Parole Agents should bear the financial burden of expenses that they incur solely and directly because they work with criminals for the benefit of the people of this state. The DOC believes that requiring agents to pay these expenses would be unfair and would undermine agent morale.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers,

agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Alvernest Kennedy of Milwaukee, WI claims \$2,799.00 for return of tax refunds intercepted to satisfy estimated assessments for business taxes from 1990 to 1995. The claimant states that he opened a business in 1990. He applied for a seller's permit but claims that he never used the permit and closed the business shortly after it opened. The claimant alleges that he was never told that he had to contact the DOR to discontinue his seller's permit. He states that he filed bankruptcy in 1997 and requests return of his income tax refunds intercepted by DOR.

The Department states that it filed estimated assessments against the claimant because he failed to file any business taxes from the years 1990 to 1995. The assessments became delinquent and the DOR intercepted the claimant's personal income tax refunds for 1995 through 1998 and his sales tax rebate check in January of 2000. The DOR states that it was not until February 1, 2000 that the claimant informed them that he had no liability because the business had never operated. The DOR alleges that when the claimant registered with the state and received his seller's permit, he was informed of his obligation to file a timely return even if there was no tax to report. The DOR states that the sales and use tax return contains a similar notice. Finally, the DOR points to the fact that the seller's permit indicates that the permit should be returned to the DOR if the seller permanently discontinues sales of taxable property and services. The claimant did not follow any of these requirements. The DOR states that section 71.75(5), Stats., prohibits them from refunding the amount collected on the original assessments because the claimant did not claim a refund within the prescribed two-year period. The DOR further states that the claimant's \$565 1999 income tax refund was withheld to satisfy a debt owed by the claimant to the Department of Workforce Development, not for payment of any DOR assessments.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Sandra C. Eselby of Oshkosh, WI claims \$613.32 for reimbursement of a Medicaid deductible, which she allegedly paid because of a DHFS error. The claimant is permanently disabled as a result of a stroke and requires 24-hour care. The claimant states that she was found eligible for Medical Assistance for a few months until she began receiving Social Security Disability benefits. In June 1999, she applied for M.A. specifically for a Community Options benefits. Program-Waiver (COP-waiver) with a Sheboygan County social worker. The claimant states that over a month passed and she did not hear from Sheboygan County so she contacted them again because of her great need for health care assistance. The claimant states that she completed an application for SSI related MA on July 23, 1999, with a Sheboygan County Economic Support worker (ESS worker). The claimant alleges that the ESS worker was not aware of the claimant's COP-waiver application. At a later hearing, the ESS worker admitted that she did not detect the COP-waiver application even though she should have. Because of this error, the ESS worker told the claimant that she would need to prepay a Medicaid deductible in the amount of \$613.23 or she would not be covered. The claimant paid the deductible on July 30, 1999. On August 9, 1999, the DHFS Division of Supportive Living informed Sheboygan County that the claimant was eligible for the COP-waiver benefits retroactive to her July 23, 1999 application. Furthermore, DHFS stated that because of the

claimant's low income, she had no COP-waiver cost share and would not have to prepay any money to the state or county in order to qualify for MA benefits. In January 2000, the Division of Hearings and Appeals found that, although an error was made, the deductible payment could not be refunded to the claimant because there was no legal mechanism through which to do so.

The Department of Health and Family Services recommends payment of this claim. The DHFS agrees with the facts as presented in the claimant's statement of circumstances. This forum appears to be the only way to reimburse the claimant for her loss and the Department believes that she should be paid on equitable grounds.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$612.32 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Health and Family Services appropriation s. 20.435 (6)(a), Stats. The Board further suggests that the Department of Health and Family Services should, to whatever extent possible, attempt to recover this money from Sheboygan County.

13. David J. Devney of Madison, WI claims \$350.00 for damage to suit allegedly incurred when he slipped and fell outside the DPI on April 11, 2000. The claimant states that he was entering the building at 10:00 AM, carrying a 30 pound printer for installation at DPI, when he slipped on ice and snow that was on the walk. The claimant alleges that the area had not been salted or sanded after early morning snow. The claimant states that he jarred his shoulder, cut his knee and bruised his elbow. He states that he tore a three-inch hole in the knee of his pants. He claims that he has contacted several companies in an attempt to have the suit repaired, however, he was told that the hole was too large to fix. The claimant also states that this particular suit is no longer being made in the same color, so it is not possible to find new pants to match the jacket. The claimant paid \$299 for the suit in 1998 and requests \$350 to account for a current higher replacement cost. The claimant believes that the building maintenance crew was negligent for not clearing the walk.

This incident was investigated on the date of occurrence. Although snow was not removed prior to the claimant's entrance into the building, the DOA believes that the claimant should have been aware of the slippery conditions. DOA believes that the claimant's decision to carry a boxed printer into the building through the snow contributed to his fall as it obscured his vision and ability to balance while walking into the building. DOA also states that there are two parking stalls available for the public to use for drop off, which are located in the parking level beneath the building. The claimant has not indicated that he tried to use these or that they were full and unusable. There were no other reports of slips or falls on this date for the Central Madison Complex.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

14. Christopher J. Kratcha of Marshfield, WI claims \$1,086.75 reimbursement for stolen personal items not covered by his insurance policy. The claimant is employed by the DNR as a Conservation Warden trainee. The claimant states that he is required to travel around the state to attend various training sessions as part of his job duties. The claimant states that in August 2000 he was scheduled to attend a weeklong training session in Sturgeon Bay. The claimant states that he drove a state owned vehicle to his brother's home in Menasha the night before the training, in order to avoid a long drive to Sturgeon Bay the morning the training session began. The claimant

alleges that, because he is in training and is frequently away from home for extended periods of time, he brings with him a number of personal items. The claimant states that his personal items were stolen from the state owned vehicle while it was parked in Menasha. The claimant requests reimbursement for items not covered by his insurance: 76 compact discs with a replacement value of \$1,086.75.

The DNR understands that the Claims Board does not ordinarily award payment for personal items lost by state employees, however the DNR believes there are special circumstances in this case. The DNR states that Conservation Warden trainees are required to live away from their homes for extended periods of time during their year–long initial training period. The DNR believes that it is therefore not unreasonable for trainees to travel with personal items not normally included in business travel. The DNR notes that the items were stolen without forced entry into the state patrol truck. According to the police report, the claimant locked both doors but left a window on the truck open approximately one inch. The DNR believes that the claimant therefore contributed to the loss and recommends payment of 50% of the claim: \$544.00.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Eleanor A. White of Stoughton, WI 15. claims \$10,280.00 for refund of an assessment made by the DOR. The claimant alleges that in 1989 the DOR took the position that civil service pension benefits for National Guard technicians were tax exempt. The DOR published this position in a newsletter, which it distributed to federal retirees in 1989. In 1995, the DOR reversed its position and mailed assessments to over 400 National Guard technicians for back taxes on pension benefits from 1989 to 1995, plus 12% interest. In February 1996, the claimant received an assessment for \$10,280 tax and interest on her husband's pension for the years 1989–1994. She paid the assessment in full. She states that she then began getting notifications about an attorney, Mr. Eugene Duffy, who was representing the National Guardsmen and fighting the DOR position reversal and backdated assessments. The newsletters and updates indicated the Mr. Duffy was representing all retired National Guard technicians. A "test case" was presented to the Wisconsin Tax Appeals Commission, which upheld DOR's position. WTAC's decision was appealed in Dane County Circuit Court in November 1999. The court affirmed that the pensions were taxable but found that some of the petitioners had relied on DOR's advice to their detriment and ruled that DOR was estopped from seeking assessments against those individuals for tax years 1989 and after. The claimant states that in early 2000, she received a notice from the DOR notifying her of a National Guard Technician Settlement. She contacted the DOR but was told that she did not qualify for refund of the 1989–1994 taxes, as provided for in the settlement, because she had not appealed the original assessment issued in 1996. The claimant believes that it is unconscionable for the DOR to refuse to refund her money and that it was grossly unfair of DOR to issue backdated assessments to begin with, when the retired technicians had relied on DOR's 1989 statement that their pensions were tax exempt. Because she received newsletters updating her on the legal fight with DOR she believed that she was included in any resulting victory and had no reason to believe that her failure to originally appeal the assessment would cause her disqualification from the settlement agreement.

The DOR recommends denial of this claim. A notice of appeal rights accompanied the assessment sent to the claimant in February 1996. No notice of appeal or letter of objection was filed when the claimant paid the assessment. The last date the claimant could have timely filed a claim for refund of the assessment was February 26, 1998. In February 2000, the DOR offered a settlement to the named litigants in the WTAC appeal (the "test case"). The terms of the settlement provided that for the years 1989-1995 the DOR would withdraw assessments and pay timely, properly appealed refund claims. In March 2000, the DOR began to offer the same settlement to other individuals in similar situations as the named litigants, provided that the individuals had timely pending appeals or timely refund claims. The DOR did send a \$183.04 settlement to the claimant for the year 1995, since that year was open to refund under the statutes at the time of first contact. Since the claimant did not appeal the original assessment for 1989-1994, DOR has no authority to issue the refund she is requesting and it is DOR's position that the assessment is final and conclusive.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. However, Representative Albers and Senator Shibilski have indicated that, despite the Board's decision, they will be introducing legislation that will provide for payment of this claim and other like claims.

The Board concludes:

The President of the Senate in the Chair.

The committee to await upon the Governor appeared with his excellency the Governor, who delivered his budget message as follows:

BUDGET ADDRESS

Speaker Jensen . . . Speaker Pro Tem Freese . . . President Risser . . . members of the Wisconsin Legislature . . . Constitutional Officers . . . Honorable Justices of the Wisconsin Supreme Court . . . members of the cabinet . . . my fellow citizens. In my inaugural address . . . delivered 19 days ago . . . I spoke

about what I called the making of Wisconsin. ... about imposing a new spending discipline on state

government.

... about the need to reduce Wisconsin's overall tax burden.

... about the need to invest more money in education.

 \ldots about the goal of keeping Wisconsin's economy strong and growing.

... about improving the quality of life for all of our citizens.

... about my commitment to protecting the environment.

My inaugural address laid out . . in very broad terms . . the values which are important to me . . . and to the people of Wisconsin.

The budget I propose to you today expresses . . . in more practical terms . . . these same values:

... living within our means.

... helping others reach their full potential in life.

... meeting our commitments.

... protecting the environment.

TUESDAY, February 20, 2001

... doing more to help businesses grow so they can create new and better jobs.

... helping families thrive.

 \ldots showing compassion for the neediest members of our society.

... working cooperatively to take care of the people's business.

For me... a budget is a statement of who we are ... and what we value ... it defines those principles we are willing to fight for. We all know that .. over the course of the next several months .. great debates will rage over how our values and our priorities are reflected in the final budget document.

But I want to make one thing very clear.

I want to work with each one of you . . . in both houses . . . in both parties . . . to make sure we all share in the making of Wisconsin and that the values we all bring to this endeavor will be reflected . . . to the greatest extent possible . . . in the final version of this budget.

The proposed budget reflects what I believe are the values all citizens of Wisconsin share . . . and I am more than willing to talk about how we can work together to reach common ground for the common good.

But you also need to know from the outset that I will not support any budget package which would impose a financial burden on Wisconsin taxpayers that exceeds their ability to pay.

Has this been an extraordinarily difficult budget to assemble? You bet.

Do I wish we could go farther or faster in some areas? Absolutely.

However, I also believe it's important for governments . . . just like our families . . . to live within their means.

The daily lives of all the citizens in this state are filled with difficult choices as they decide how to balance expenses with income.

Can they afford a new car?

A new home?

Can they cover their heating bill?

Buy enough food?

How much can they afford to save for their children's education?

Or investing for retirement?

And from these hard-working people we take taxes.

They trust us with their money and they trust us to spend their money wisely as we work not only to sustain . . . but to improve .

. . the quality of life we have all come to enjoy in Wisconsin.

We must never abuse that trust.

In my inaugural address . . . I said it's time for government to demand less so our citizens can do more for themselves and their families.

This is the time.

This is the budget.

This is when we need to make sure Wisconsin's financial house is built on a solid foundation.

We've been using the taxpayer's credit card to increase spending and we've come up short in producing the money to pay the bill...so now we've got to make some painful decisions and take steps to make sure this situation is not repeated.

I can tell you today that the 3 percent and 2.9 percent spending increases in this budget are the lowest GPR spending increases in over 30 years!

There are two over-arching themes which guided the development of the budget I present to you today.

The first is the need to control state spending and provide a mechanism to lower taxes and avoid larger budget deficits.

The second is my commitment to build an even more vibrant state economy... to invest in the creation of good paying jobs... to build upon the solid economic foundation which has been laid over the past 14 years.

I believe this budget accomplishes these goals.

My proposal to cap state spending increases at the rate of growth in personal income will get state spending under control. And . . . if you're wondering . . . the spending increase in this budget would come in well under the cap . . . if it were in place today.

My proposal to return half of all future surplus funds to state taxpayers provides a mechanism for additional tax relief.

My proposal to direct half of any future budget surpluses to the Budget Stabilization Fund will help avoid a repeat of the deficit challenge we faced in putting this budget together.

However ... I also know that others here have been at work on these same issues ... fighting for the same sound approach to spending and taxes.

When the last biennial budget was passed . . . I expressed my personal concern about the rate of spending growth in that budget.

We have now seen where excessive spending takes us.

We began this budget planning process with a structural deficit estimated to be \$475 million in the current fiscal year.

However, the nation's economic slowdown over the past few months has forced us to revise our revenue figures downward . . . and these lower revenue projections pushed the deficit up to \$557 million in each year of the upcoming biennium.

That means we have to use \$557 million of revenue growth in the first year of the upcoming biennium . . . and another \$557 million of growth in the second year just to sustain our current levels of spending.

And ... as you all know ... this \$1.1 billion structural deficit ... the largest in state history ... must be covered before a single dime is allocated for a single new program.

My friends . . . let us vow . . . right here . . . right now . . . to work together to make sure that no future governor . . . regardless of party . . . will be forced to begin a biennial budget cycle with a deficit of this magnitude.

Furthermore ... and let me say this in unambiguous words ... as long as I am governor ... I will do all I can to make sure the state of Wisconsin does not face a deficit of this magnitude again.

You also need to know that part of the equation for balancing this budget is my proposal to "securitize" the stream of payments Wisconsin is slated to receive from tobacco companies as part of the recent national settlement.

By selling the state's right to receive these payments to bond investors and by turning the bulk of their immediate payment over to the Wisconsin Investment Board to invest... Wisconsin can turn an expected \$5.6 billion in payments over the next 30 years into about \$6.8 billion over that same period of time. I am proposing that \$350 million of the amount we initially receive be used to offset the current structural deficit and that the balance be assigned to a permanent endowment fund. The earnings on the endowment fund will be used to support anti–smoking efforts and other health–related programs.

This is sound fiscal management which will yield both short and long-term financial and health benefits for Wisconsin's citizens . . . but only if we act responsibly in managing the proceeds of this settlement.

As we work together to come to agreement on this budget \dots I would ask that you not jeopardize the state's bond rating \dots or mortgage our children's future \dots by dipping further into this fund.

This is just one example of how this has been a daunting budget process . . . perhaps the most difficult budget in many years . . . but it's also provided us with some great opportunities.

And it's those opportunities I am most excited to talk about today.

The opportunity to focus on performance and productivity . . . rather than spending.

The opportunity to look for ways to further streamline government... at all levels.

The opportunity to provide more efficient and more effective services at a lower cost.

The opportunity to re–focus our priorities on those things which most need our attention and our resources.

Call it . . . the re-making of Wisconsin.

That is the opportunity this budget has presented to us . . and . . together . . we must accept the challenge.

The budget I present to you today does not shift the state's financial shortfall to other units of government...it does not raise taxes ... and it does not rely on accounting tricks to balance the books.

This is a budget built on the same principles we all learned in Accounting 101 . . . you don't spend more than you take in and you don't rob Peter to pay Paul.

It's common sense.

It's sound fiscal management.

It's our sacred obligation as public servants.

Despite the challenging budget picture . . . I am recommending major new financial investments in the following areas:

540 million more for public schools . . . to help fund school costs and continue to provide much-needed property tax relief.

\$206 million more for corrections . . . for a more compassionate and effective approach to rehabilitation and making sure that our citizens are more secure.

\$201 million more for medical assistance . . . to provide more medical services to the neediest in our state.

There is also new money to grow and build Wisconsin's economy and to help create more high–skill . . . high–wage jobs. In other words . . . more opportunities for our citizens to improve their lives by moving up the economic ladder.

• Twenty technology development zones will be created to help develop high-tech . . . high-skill . . . high-wage jobs.

 \cdot An airport hub property tax incentive will be provided to encourage airlines to create high-paying jobs in Wisconsin.

 \cdot The single sales factor approach to apportionment of corporate taxes will be phased in . . . so that Wisconsin is more competitive with our neighboring states when it comes to locating new plants and creating new jobs.

 \cdot A "Rural Initiative" to reinvigorate Wisconsin's historic commitment to small towns and farms by providing grants and start–up assistance to small business owners and family farmers.

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 \cdot Funding for the TechStar program . . . which will provide grants to a consortium of southeastern Wisconsin universities to help turn their research efforts into marketable products.

• Funding for the "Milwaukee Idea" ... which will increase the number of faculty and students enrolled at the University of Wisconsin–Milwaukee in high–demand occupational areas. This money will also provide for creation of the "Academy of Excellence" honors program on the Milwaukee campus ... which is an initiative aimed at keeping Wisconsin's best and brightest students learning ... and, hopefully, working .. right here at home ... in Wisconsin.

 \cdot Another \$11.8 million for the "Madison Idea" . . . which focuses on increasing educational options for students at the University of Wisconsin–Madison and for enhancing economic development.

• Funding will be provided to the Wisconsin Technical College System to create a 17th campus. But this one will be a virtual technical campus . . . on–line.

 \cdot The gross receipts tax on wholesale power transactions will be cut in half to help increase the supply of energy and reduce the cost.

 \cdot We will begin the process of reconstructing the Marquette Interchange in Milwaukee. This is a crucial . . . indeed indispensable . . . link for commerce flowing throughout the entire state of Wisconsin.

 \cdot Ten million dollars will be earmarked for the Canal Street project in Milwaukee to help facilitate redevelopment in the Menomonee Valley.

 \cdot \$9.1 million will be provided for infrastructure improvements around the soon-to-be-refurbished Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

Technological changes are also having a big effect on state government... and in defining the way we provide services to the people of Wisconsin.

That is why I am proposing creation of a new Wisconsin Department of Electronic Government . . . to be headed by a state Chief Information Officer . . . and which will be responsible for technology planning and project implementation.

This new department . . . which will be formed from existing divisions within DOA . . . will help incorporate emerging technologies into the workplace . . . and will help us provide better and more efficient services . . . and at a lower cost.

And when we speak of "efficiency" . . . we must take a moment to speak of Don Kettl . . . one of Wisconsin's most valuable resources.

In January . . the Kettl Commission presented its report on State–Local Partnerships and this budget includes the commission's recommendations on municipal shared revenue. These recommendations seek to eliminate incentives to spend money and . . . instead . . . put in place incentives to encourage more cooperation and efficiency. As additional savings are realized through a move to regionalized "economies of scale" . . . taxpayers can look forward to lower tax burdens.

This is not the first time Don Kettl has stepped forward to take on a difficult assignment and I know it won't be the last. Don . . . please stand up . . . and let a grateful state say "Thank you!"

Education is the most critically important component in building a successful and comfortable life . . . regardless of whatever endeavor one may chose to pursue . . . and the state has a responsibility to ensure that all of our children are reaching their highest potential.

We must not take more from this world than we need and we must make sure we preserve as much of God's beauty for those who will follow us.

At the request of several legislators including Senator George, who first requested it, we have performed a limited review of the State's settlement with Fort James Corporation for natural resource damages to the Fox River. A legal settlement between the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the Wisconsin Department of Justice, and Fort James Corporation stipulated that the State will not sue Fort James for natural resource damages arising from the release of polychlorinated buphenyls (PCBs) into the Fox River. In exchange, Fort James has agreed to provide or fund several environmental restoration projects at a cost that has been estimated to be \$7.0 million. The settlement agreement, which was signed November 15, 2000, is subject to acceptance by the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of January 2001.

On January 1, 2001, the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$11 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$13 thousand on January 17, 2001, decreased to -\$2 thousand on January 24, 2001, and continued into the month of February. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On January 1, 2001 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was -\$3.18 million. This shortfall decreased to -\$1.76 million on January 4, 2001, increased to -\$2.13 million on January 11, 2001, to -\$3.08 million on January 23, 2001, to -\$4.24 million on January 30, 2001, and continued into the month of February. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues.

On January 25, 2001 the <u>University Trust–Income Fund</u> balance was –\$32 thousand. This shortfall decreased to –\$24 thousand on January 26, 2001 and continued until January 29, 2001 when the balance reached \$1.95 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Utility Public Benefits Fund, and University Trust–Income Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

We have completed a review of Employment Solutions, Inc. (ESI) and 15 other Wisconsin Works (W-2) agencies as part of a comprehensive audit of the state wide implementation of the W-2 program. We have identified charges for out-of-state work and other unallowable and questioned expenditures by ESI that are similar to those we identified for Maximus, Inc., an agency that also administers the W-2 program in Milwaukee County.

We identified \$270,268 in unallowable costs that were related to ESI's activities outside of Wisconsin but charged to the W-2 program. Most were related to unsuccessful efforts to acquire a contract for administration of Arizona's welfare-to-work program. Our findings suggest the extent of ESI's out-of-state activities was greater than the agency had indicated.

Among \$3.6 million in additional transactions for ESI, we identified \$35,899 in unallowable cots and questioned another \$61,234 in expenditures charged to the w-2 program. Unallowable and questioned transactions include expenditures for entertaining ESI employees, advertising, legal services, local hotel charges, and a variety of restaurant and other food charges.

We also reviewed staff performance incentives that were charged to the W-2 program by three agencies in 1999. ESI provided substantially higher incentives that the other agencies, partly because ESI has chosen to make a portion of employees' compensation contingent upon performance. ESI's incentives averaged \$9,635 each for the 84 employees receiving them. ESI's chief executive officer received a total of \$61,645 in 1999; that amount reflects incentive payments for performance in 1998 and 1999.

Finally, we identified \$12,604 in unallowable costs and \$114,487 in questioned costs made by six other W-2 agencies.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the W-2 agencies and the Department of Workforce Development during the course of our review.

With great pleasure I present to you this report on the Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program. The program, created by section 85.53 Wis. Stats., was established by the legislature in 1997 with the requirement that the Department study its impact and report on its findings every even numbered year. This report covers the period from 1995, two years prior to the enactment of the program, through the year 1999.

The Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Program is designed for drivers who are arrested for their second or subsequent offense. It is an intervention program designed to get the offender into counseling, treatment and monitoring as soon as possible after the arrest in the belief that intervention is most effective if it happens very soon after the incident. Previously, intervention waited until the completion of court action, typically 90 to 120 days. This program brings offenders to intervention almost immediately, usually as part of the bail release process. It was hoped this early intervention would help reduce recidivism rates.

As you will see in the full report, early indications are good. It appears that offenders who successfully completed the program were less likely than non participants to be rearrested for subsequent operating while intoxicated violations and that those who were rearrested went significantly longer between arrests than non participants.

This report describes the program in each of the ten participating counties and provides a detailed explanation of its results. I commend those people who have dedicated themselves to making this innovative program a success.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

As required by 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, we have completed a limited-scope review of the fiscal year 1999-2000 funds provided to the University of Wisconsin-Madison Medical School's Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention. In the 1999-2001 biennial budget, the Center was appropriated \$1.0 million annually from the funds received as part of the State's lawsuit settlement with tobacco manufacturers, which is known as the Master Settlement Agreement. The Center uses the funds it receives to support education, outreach, and research activities related to tobacco prevention and cessation.

Overall, we found the Center has developed and implemented adequate procedures to help ensure compliance with legislative intent and general statutory requirements that funds be used only for tobacco prevention and cessation activities. However, because of delays in finalizing the State's 1999-2001 biennial budget, as well as the need for start-up time to develop the programs, few expenditures have been incurred to date. therefore, it is too early to assess the effectiveness of the Center's programs.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the University of Wisconsin staff during our review.

Pursuant to Section 109.12(2) and (3) of Wisconsin Statutes I hereby submit the department's calendar year 2000 annual report on the administration and enforcement of Sections 109.07 and 109.075 of Wisconsin Statutes. The report contains three sections. The first section lists all businesses in 2000 that notified the department of planned business closings/mass layoffs, the location of the business, type of industry involved, number of persons affected and date(s) of scheduled dislocations. The second section lists complaints pending before the department's Equal rights Division, at the beginning of 2000. It includes the complaints received during calendar year 2000, alleging violations of Wisconsin's business closing/mass layoff notification law. This section lists the name of the business, location, date the department received the complaint, date the investigation was completed (if any), whether a violation was documented and the current stats and/or outcome of the case.

The third section lists similar information for any complaints received by the department in 2000 and 2001, alleging violations that an employer failed to provide advance notification to affected employees of a cessation of health insurance benefit plans. No complaints were received in 2000 and so far one complaint has been received in 2001. The department is actively investigating this complaint at the time of this report.

On January 1, 2000, 12 business closing cases from prior years remained pending. Two of these cases remained in investigation. The Department completed both of the investigations by March 6, 2000. Both of those determinations were appealed. By May 16, 2000, the department processed both of those appeals as well as two more appeals that were still pending on January 1, 2000. Currently the Department of Justice has eight cases pending litigation to resolve those matters. The remaining four cases were closed with no violations having been found.

In 2000 the Equal Rights Division received 26 complaints alleging violations of the plan closing and mass layoff notification law. In calendar year 1999, the department received 10 complaints alleging violations of the Plant Closing law. The Equal Rights Division found violations in two of the 21 cases on which it completed investigation in 2000. Each of the three violations were referred to the Department of Justice for litigation in court. The department, in cooperation with the Department of Justice settled a fourth case against U.S. Leather, (listed a the Pfister & Vogel/Gebhardt cases), resulting in \$763,541.40 in increased wages paid to 510 workers. Five cases that were received in 2000 remain under investigation at this time.

They are as follows:

INTRODUCTION

This memorandum is in response to your request for my analysis of the potential effect of Senate Substitute Amendment 1 to 2001 Senate Joint Resolution 2, on the ability of the state to continue its regulation of hunting, fishing, trapping and taking game. The Joint Resolution, as amended, proposes to create Wis. Const. art. I, s. 26, as follows: "The people have the right to fish, hunt, trap, and take game which shall be managed by law for public good."

You have observed that the constitutional amendment, if adopted, could be used as the basis for a legal challenge to the constitutionality of existing or future statutes or administrative rules that regulate fish and game. Your concern is the extent to which challenges to fish and game regulations could potentially succeed. You have asked whether I believe that only occasional regulations that are substantially more restrictive than those in place today are likely to be found unconstitutional, or whether I believe that there is a potential for successful challenge to many of the fish and game regulations currently in place.

I cannot give a definitive, black–and–white answer to your question, because the constitutional language is brief, and does not spell out the specific legal consequences of that language. Judicial interpretation may eventually supply the answer to your question, but the outcome of court cases is difficult to predict.

However, courts frequently resort to a variety of methods to interpret constitutional provisions, and a review of those methods can suggest the outcome of a challenge to hunting or fishing regulations based on the proposed right. I have reviewed a number of these methods of interpretation, and concluded that a successful challenge to hunting and fishing regulations would most likely relate to future regulations that are much more restrictive than those currently in place. I believe it is much less likely that the regulations in place today could be successfully challenged, and I have summarized my conclusion in this memorandum. My conclusion also appears to be consistent with the intent of the supporters of the constitutional amendment—I am unaware of any arguments in legislative debate on the constitutional amendment that it should be the vehicle for overturning any current fish and game regulations.

Throughout this memorandum, for convenience, I will refer to "hunt and fish" as a description of all activities that are subject to the proposed constitutional right. The substitute amendment has been recommended by the Senate Committee on Environmental Resources and is scheduled for debate in the Senate on March 6, 2001. This is the first consideration of the Joint Resolution.

For further information, you may wish to review my Wisconsin Legislative Council Information Memorandum 00–7, *Laws on Hunting, Fishing and Trapping* (December 28, 2000).

CURRENT REGULATION OF FISH AND GAME

This section of the memorandum briefly describes the current law on hunting and fishing regulation. In particular, this discussion shows the great deference that courts currently give to state hunting and fishing regulation. This discussion is included in the memorandum because it is these legal principles that are potentially subject to change as a result of adopting the Joint Resolution.

The legal title to all wild animals is vested in the state by s. 29.011, Stats.:

29.011 Title to wild animals. (1) The legal title to, and the custody and protection of, all wild animals within this state is vested in the state for the purposes of regulating the enjoyment, use, disposition, and conservation of these wild animals.

(2) The legal title to a wild animal or carcass, taken or reduced to possession in violation of this chapter, remains in the state. The title to a wild animal or carcass, lawfully acquired, is subject to the condition that upon the violation of this chapter relating to the possession, use, giving, sale, barter or transportation of a wild animal or carcass by the owner, the ownership shall revert, as a result of the violation, to the state.

In other words, legal title to wild game only passes to an individual when the game is legally taken. Until that time, title remains with the state, and the state can confiscate any game unlawfully taken. This declaration of sovereignty is common to all 50 states and is the statutory expression of the legal principle that dates back to the early days of the English monarchy.

Although it is not so described in the statutes, the state's title to wild animals is often described in court cases as a trust for the benefit of the people. The Legislature, as the representative of the people, is charged with the authority to manage this trust. The Legislature has delegated the administrative responsibilities regarding wild animals primarily to the DNR. Most of the statutory authority of the DNR with respect to wild animals is contained in ch. 29, Stats

The basic authority of the DNR to regulate fish and game is set forth in s. 29.014 (1), Stats., which provides as follows:

29.014 (1) The department shall establish and maintain open and closed seasons for fish and game and any bag limits, size limits, rest days and conditions governing the taking of fish and game that will conserve the fish and game supply and ensure the citizens of this state continued opportunities for good fishing, hunting and trapping.

There are very few appellate court cases in Wisconsin regarding fish and game regulation. However, the Wisconsin case of *Krenz v. Nichols*, decided in 1928, is typical of the state court's approach to fish and game cases. In this case, the Wisconsin Supreme Court reviewed the state's regulation of muskrat farms. In its decision in favor of the state, the court gave great deference to the Legislature in its regulation of fish and game.

As trustee for the people, the state may conserve wild life and regulate or prohibit its taking in any reasonable way it may deem necessary for the public welfare, so long as it does not violate any organic law of the land.

It is now generally recognized that valuable wild animal life would soon be exterminated if the state should fail to conserve it and aid in its reproduction. Whenever the state has done so without trenching on private rights protected by the Constitution, such acts have been almost uniformly upheld.

Nearly every conceivable regulation for the propagation, conservation, taking, and disposal of fish and game has been upheld where no constitutional objections have stood in the way. Generally, courts have given very liberal construction to such statutes, to the end that the public welfare should be subserved. [222 N.W. 300, 303, 197 Wis. 394 (1928).]

CONSTITUTIONAL INTERPRETATION

Like statutes, constitutions are subject to judicial interpretation. Some of the tools used by courts in constitutional cases are known as "rules of interpretation." These rules are similar to the rules for statutory interpretation, but have other dimensions due to the constitutional context.

It is important to note that these are not "rules" in the conventional sense of that word. This is rather a term that lawyers use loosely to describe what could more accurately be described as an approach to analyzing the constitutional issue. Courts are not bound to follow these rules, although these rules are commonly applied in court decisions.

The express purpose of these rules of interpretation is to allow courts to implement the will of the drafters of a constitutional provision and the will of the voters who ratified it. To the extent that a court interprets a constitutional provision, it may choose not to follow the literal meaning of that provision. The flexibility that courts have when applying the rules of interpretation potentially puts legislators and electors in the position of voting for a constitutional amendment when it cannot be known how courts might ultimately decide a case arising under the proposed amendment.

The following are some examples of constitutional rules of interpretation:

- Unless a provision is ambiguous, the plain meaning prevails. If there is no ambiguity, the court may choose not to consider any evidence outside of the constitutional language at issue. Senate Substitute Amendment 1 does not appear to be ambiguous, in the sense that it can be read in two different ways. However, Senate Substitute Amendment 1 is vague in the sense that it does not precisely define the scope of the right. This may lead a court to claim that it is ambiguous (because ambiguity and vagueness are frequently mixed), and resort thereafter to other evidence of meaning.
 - *Avoid absurd results.* The issue of absurd results often arises when fact situations are presented to the court that were not envisioned by the drafters, or when there is a conflict between constitutional provisions.
 - *Extrinsic evidence related to adoption.* Courts may review the legislative history surrounding adoption of a constitutional provision to determine what was intended by the Legislature.
 - *Extrinsic evidence based on legislation on the same subject.* Courts may look to legislation interpreting constitutional provisions or to legislation that is adopted contemporaneous to the constitutional provision to determine intent.

COMMENTS ON 2001 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 2

The following are my observations regarding potential judicial interpretation of Senate Substitute Amendment 1 to Senate Joint Resolution 2. I have expressed my observations in terms of how the substitute amendment text or certain evidence related to the substitute amendment might affect the decision of a court. I have not assumed that a court might make an unexpected or unusual decision, although this is always a possibility.

• *Plain meaning of the substitute amendment.* The substitute amendment clearly does not create an absolute right to hunt and fish. The "right to fish, hunt, trap and take game" is qualified in the substitute amendment by the language that follows: "which shall be managed by law for the public

good." Although the substitute amendment creates a right, at the same time it directs the Legislature and its agent, the Department of Natural Resources, to manage that right. Therefore, the language in the substitute amendment clearly acknowledges that regulation of hunting, fishing, trapping and taking game will continue.

- Absurd results. Courts refer to rights created in the constitution as "fundamental rights." A court, in reviewing legislation that restricts a fundamental right, will not apply a presumption of constitutionality to the legislation. The state, to defend the regulation, must show that the regulation is intended to achieve a compelling governmental purpose when there is not a less restrictive alternative available. This would make it very difficult for the state to defend most fish and game regulation. However, the substitute amendment requires management of the right for the public good. It would be an absurd result for a court to acknowledge the mandate to manage the right, and make it extremely difficult for the state to regulate. It would be more likely for a court to continue to apply a standard of reasonableness to any regulation, but with something less than the almost total deference given to such regulation under current law.
- *Additional absurd results.* As noted in *Krenz*, the ongoing availability of wild animals to hunt and fish depends on state regulation to conserve the fish and game. It would be an absurd result for a court to hold that the substitute amendment negates a substantial amount of hunting and fishing regulation, which could have the effect of destroying the very activity that the substitute amendment was intended to protect.
- *Management is required for "the public good.*" This choice of language is important. The management authorized in Senate Substitute Amendment 1 is for the broad purpose of the "public good," which could include the conservation of wild animals, as well as any other issues of public health, safety or welfare. This language should allow courts to approve regulations that are based on social issues, rather than on conservation and game management. Social regulations are common in current fish and game regulations. For example, the nine–day deer gun season has no basis in deer herd management, but rather is based on tradition and public preference—a "social" regulation.
- *Judicial precedent.* Courts strongly tend to follow precedent in constitutional cases. The adherence to precedent increases the certainty that is provided by law. The *Krenz* case, cited above, is part of the Wisconsin precedent in fish and game law. This precedent suggests that courts are likely to make only modest changes to the standards for review of fish and game regulation, in that a substantial degree of judicial deference continues to be consistent with Substitute Amendment 1.
- *Legislative history.* I am unaware of any legislative history suggesting that the Joint Resolution is meant to restrict current fish and game regulation.
- *Contemporaneous legislation.* The Legislature is not currently considering any legislation to substantially curtail current hunting or fishing regulations. Assembly Bill 98, introduced by Representative Wood, expands the opportunity to catch fish with a bow and arrow near a roadway, but

that bill is narrowly focused. Senate Bill 45, introduced by Senator Moen, would prohibit the hunting of mourning doves. The outcome of legislative debate on Senate Bill 45 may suggest in part what is the Legislature's intent regarding the constitutional amendment.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #1

Relating to the Findings of the Governor's Task Force on Racial Profiling

WHEREAS, the Task Force on Racial Profiling was commissioned to study the existence of racial profiling during traffic stops in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force, chaired by Judge Maxine A. White, included law enforcement officials, the defense bar, state legislators and community leaders; and

WHEREAS, the practice of racial profiling should not be tolerated in this or any state; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force sought and received input from the community; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force utilized the expertise of both national and local law enforcement officials and racial profiling experts to educate them on training practices and the means necessary to combat racial profiling; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force recommended law enforcement should enhance training while ensuring the uniform protocol on traffic stops is followed; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force recommended law enforcement should develop means to encourage community input, including modifying their complaint policies as necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force recommends local law enforcement agencies should develop a process to collect data on traffic stops in their communities

NOW, THEREFORE, I, SCOTT McCALLUM Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, do hereby:

4. Require all law enforcement agencies in the State of Wisconsin to enact a policy prohibiting the practice of racial profiling; and

5. Require law enforcement agencies to implement the recommendations authored by this learned Task Force without delay; and

6. Require law enforcement agencies across the state to take this opportunity to identify the means necessary to implement the recommendations in cooperation with their communities.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Wisconsin Lottery's fiscal year (FY) 1998-99 and FY 1999-2000 financial statements.

Overall, total lottery sales decreased from \$428.2 million in FY 1998-99 to \$406.7 million in FY 1999-2000. Sales of instant ticket lottery games, however, increased for the first time in four years, from \$230.8 million in FY 1998-99 to \$241.0 million in FY 1999-2000.

In 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, the Legislature provided general purpose revenue to fund certain lottery expenses, including retailer commission and all administrative expenses except depreciation. These expenses totaled \$76.0 million in FY 1999-2000. The budgetary funding provision was effective only in FY 1999-2000, and it contributed to an increase in the amount available for property tax relief from \$153.9 million in FY 1998-99 to \$232.3 million in FY 1999-2000.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed a review of the use of private-sector computer consultants, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. We estimate that executive branch state agencies exclusive of the University of Wisconsin System spent \$93.6 million for information technology (IT) consulting services during fiscal year 1998-99, the last year for which statewide purchasing data are available. These services supplemented the work of 1,383 full-time equivalent state IT employees.

When agencies need to develop large new information systems, manage peak workload periods, or use special skills on an intermittent basis, use of contracted IT services is consistent with state purchasing statutes. However, agencies also routinely engage contractors to perform more routine tasks without conducting cost analyses anticipated by the statutes, largely because of past labor market conditions and restrictions on their number of authorized positions. Among a sample of 32 hourly contractors performing routine responsibilities, hourly costs of 29 were higher than those of comparable state employees, and 4 of these were more than twice the hourly cost of sate employees. In light of recent improvements in the State's ability to attract and retain IT staff, we recommend that cost analyses be performed before IT contractors are hired for routine work.

It is not uncommon for large-scale IT systems development projects to exceed original budgets for cost or time, or to perform fewer functions than originally planned. Based on our review of the professional literature, we have described a series of best practices for contracting and monitoring large IT projects.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by all of the 50 state agencies that provided information for this review, particularly the departments of Administration, Corrections, Health and Family Services, Justice, Transportation, and Workforce Development, where we conducted additional work. A response from the Department of Administration is Appendix 3.

I am pleased to submit our Annual Minority Business Report for fiscal year 2000. This year's report continues to reflect increased growth as well as the strengthening of the commitment of state agencies to further business with Wisconsin certified minority business enterprises.

State agencies spent \$63,437,323 with Wisconsin certified minority businesses for goods, services, construction, and architectural and engineering services. This represents a 13.95% spending increase over the last fiscal year.

Here are some of the highlights of the report:

- The Department of Commerce reports a total of 712 firms, up 4.5%, that met the requirements of certification in the State of Wisconsin.
- The Division of Facilities Development through its Architectural/Engineering Selection Committee,

exceeded the MBE participation goal in A/E contracting for the <u>thirteenth consecutive year</u>.

- Eighteen (18) state and quasi-state agencies spent at least 5% or more of their purchasing dollars with certified minority businesses.
- the Department of Natural Resources Clean Water Fund Loan Program for the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) also had one of its bests years yet for expending money to certified minority owned firms. MMSD expended 59.94% of its total Clean Water Fund payments or \$6,349,363 of \$10,592,056 to MBE firms certified by the Department of Commerce for fiscal year 1999-2000.
- The State of Wisconsin Investment Board showed total net commissions of \$16,821,146, of which \$1,013,233 or 6.2% was expended for financial and investment analysis and common stock and convertible bond brokerage with minority financial advisors or minority investment firms.

Out of the number of total certified minority firms, 39% or 277 firms received contracts for various commodities and services during fiscal year 1999-2000. The State Minority Business Program continues to promote MBE's and ensure that certified minority firms receive every opportunity possible to do business with the State of Wisconsin. The program is also leading the awareness of MBE's to e-commerce, including the state's vendornet program.

I am especially please with the Division of Facilities Development (DFD) total MBE participation in architectural/engineering services and construction. This fiscal year, the division surpassed \$15 million in total MBE participation.

While I am proud of the progress we have made, there is still ample room for improvement in achieving our state goal of 5% for all state agencies.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of February 2001.

On February 1, 2001 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$2 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$4 thousand on February 13, 2001, to -\$5 thousand on February 14, 2001, and continues into the month of March. As of the date of this letter, it is expected to be resolved soon. This shortfall is due to the timing of revenues. On February 1, 2001 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was -\$4.24 million. This shortfall decreased to -\$905 thousand on February 8, 2001, increased to -\$1.44 million on February 16, 2001, to -\$2.17 million on February 22, 2001, and to -\$2.76 million on February 27, 2001. This shortfall continued until March 6, 2001 when the balance reached \$425 thousand. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund and Utility Public Benefits Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

Section 13.48(2)(e) stipulates that the State of Wisconsin Building Commission shall report to the Legislature at each regular session the progress on projects authorized in the two preceding and current biennia. This report is submitted in accordance with that provision and covers the period from July 1995 through December 2000. Projects having budgets over \$100,000 are listed in detail. Those of lesser amounts have been grouped for each agency as one item for the biennium in which they were authorized.

In summary, during this five and one-half year period, the Building Commission approved projects with a total value of \$1,624,906,548.88. Of that amount, \$1,215,617,871.19 has been spent or encumbered, leaving a balance of \$409,288,677.69 to be used to complete projects in progress. The sources of funds for the projects are either cash or borrowed funds which flow through the Building Trust Fund, the Capital Improvement Fund, or agency operating budgets.

Each section of this report is organized by the state agency for which the facilities are being built. The Wisconsin State Controller's Office and user agencies have provided information presented in this report. Building Commission staff has not attempted to verify the figures that were obtained by user agencies. The staff has merely assembled the material provided by each agency and presents it for your review.

We have completed our evaluation of the Wisconsin Works program (W-2), as required by s. 49.141(2g)(a), Wis. Stats. This is the sixth and final report issued under that requirement.

W-2 is a time-limited employment assistance program administered by the Department of Workforce Development. It replaced cash entitlements provided to low-income families under Aid to Families with Dependent Children in September 1997. Through September 2000, W-2 program costs totaled \$710.4 million, of which 93.6 percent was spent by local public and private contractors for program services, benefits, and administration.

Implementation of W-2 has resulted in large declines in the number of individuals receiving cash assistance. From January 1998 through September 2000, cash assistance caseloads declined more than 50 percent, from 14,204 to 6,771 cases. However, the program's success in achieving economic self-sufficiency for participants has been mixed. Among 2,129 participants who left W-2 during the first three months of 1998, 1,377 filed 1999 Wisconsin tax returns. Of those who filed, 643, or 46.7 percent, had incomes above the federal poverty level when earned income credits were included. In addition, we found that 26.1 percent of those who left the program from January through March of 1998 had returned for cash assistance or other services by July 2000.

Before the start of a new contract period, which is scheduled to begin January 2002, the Department and the Legislature will need to consider challenges posed by returning participants and those with multiple or severe barriers to employment; how to best address the needs of those who are nearing time limits on program participation; and how to assist individuals who have entered the workforce in maintaining their employment, advancing, and raising themselves and their families out of poverty.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Workforce Development and staff of the many W-2 agencies we contacted during the course of our review. The Department's response is Appendix 15.

The biennial budget bill, 1983 Wisconsin Act 27, created s. 46.275, Community Integration Program (CIP) for Residents of State Centers. The intent of this program "is to relocate persons from the state centers for the developmentally disabled into appropriate community settings with the assistance of home and community-based services and with continuity of care. The intent of the program is to minimize its impact on state employees through redeployment of employees into vacant positions." S. 46.275 (5m) requires the Department to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance and to the Chief Clerk of each house of the Legislature describing the program's impact during the preceding calendar year on state employees into vacant positions and the number of employees laid off.

For the period of January 1, 2000 to December 31, 2000, there were 54 placements of center residents into the community. For fiscal year 2000, reductions of \$3,626,640 and 72.35 FTE were made in the budget for the purpose of CIP placement. For the period July 1, 2000 through December 31, 2000, sufficient reductions will be made in the fiscal year 2001 operating budget to reflect reductions for CIP placements. Reductions of positions and dollars have been made for calendar year 2000 with no employees being laid off during the year. Only six layoffs have occurred at the centers due to the CIP program since the program began in 1983. All other reductions have been absorbed through attrition of employees.

The Senate Committee on Organization has asked for my opinion on the compensation to be paid to the Lieutenant Governor ("Lt. Governor") upon confirmation by both houses of the Legislature. Governor McCallum has nominated State Senator Margaret Farrow to the Office of the Lieutenant Governor pursuant to article 13, s. 10 (2) of the Wisconsin Constitution.

Wisconsin Stat. s. 13.04(4) provides:

"Any incumbent member of the legislature who, during the term for which the member was elected to the legislature, by appointment or election assumes any judicial office or state civil office or position for which the compensation or other emoluments were increased during the member's current legislative term by legislative action, or by any other official action requiring the assent of or subject to veto by the legislature, shall be entitled to the compensation or other emoluments for such office or position only at the rate in effect prior to such increase."

Your request for an opinion included a memorandum from the Wisconsin Legislative Council. That memorandum states that Senator Farrow was elected to her current term in November 1998, and her term began in January 1999. At that time, the rate of pay for the Office of Lt. Governor was \$60,183 per year. The salary of the Lt. Governor is set under Wis. Stats. s. 20.923(2)(g) at 1.9% above the minimum of the salary range for executive salary group four. The Legislative Council memorandum indicates that the current salary for the Lt. Governor is \$63,672 per year. The Joint Committee on Employment Relations ("JCOER") approved two increases during Senator Farrow's current term. On June 9, 1999, and May 2, 2000, JCOER raised the minimum of the salary range applicable to executive salary group four, thereby increasing the rate of pay for the Office of Lt. Governor. JCOER approves the compensation plan under Wis. Stats. s. 230.12 (3).

The Legislative Council memorandum, at 2, concludes: "[I]t is arguable that s. 13.04(4), Stats, would limit her compensation to that provided for the Office of Lieutenant Governor prior to the increases occurring during her term. Under that interpretation, she would be limited to \$60,183 per year."

The author of the Legislative Council memorandum found there was some doubt about the application of Wis. Stats. s. 13.04(4) because one could argue that the action of a single committee, JCOER, was not "legislative action" or "other official action" as required by Wis. Stat. s. 13.04(4). Under this analysis, the purpose of Wis. Stats. s. 13.04(4) is to prohibit legislators from benefitting from a self-enacting pay increase, but since Senator Farrow was not a member of JCOER, she did not vote on the action and, thus, should not be prohibited from receiving the higher salary. That memorandum concludes, however, that notwithstanding that argument the better conclusion is that Wis. Stats. s. 13.04(4) does apply. I agree.

JCOER is created by the Legislature. Wis. Stat. s. 13.111. the Legislature has delegated certain authority to that committee. Such a delegation is proper. See Cuts v. Department of Public Welfare, 1 Wis. 2d 408, 414, 84 N.W.2d 102 (1957). (Legislature could delegate the authority to select a site for a new state boy's school to a committee.) Accord Outagamie County v. Smith, 38 Wis. 2d 24, 39, 155 N.W.2d 639 (1968). If the term "legislative action" in Wis. Stat.. s. 13.04(4) did not include actions taken by JCOER, any member of the Legislature who was not on the Joint Committee would not be subject to the statutes strictures. Under that reading of the statute, only members of the Joint Committee, by statute the leadership of both houses, Wis. Stat. s. 13.111, would be prohibited from accepting offices for which the compensation had been increased. That interpretation would mean that Wis. Stats s. 13.04(4) which on its face is applicable to all legislators, would apply only to members of the Joint Committee: the vast majority of the members of the Legislature would escape the statute's strictures by the expedient of delegating to a committee the authority to raise legislators' salaries.

In 63 Op. Att'y Gen. 128 (1974) former Attorney General Robert Warren discussed the interaction of Wis. Stats s. 13.04 and article 4, s. 12 of the Wisconsin Constitution. The opinion concluded that a legislator who was elected to a different state office during his or her term as legislator would be limited by Wis. Stats s. 13.04 to the salary prior to the increase during his or her term as legislator. The law then was essentially the same as the law now. Present Wis. Stat. s. 13.04(4) was then Wis. Stat. s. 13.04(1)(d). The salaries of the lieutenant governor and other constitutional officers were tied to the salaries in executive salary groups. Wis. Stat. s. 20.923 (1973). JCOER approved the compensation plan. Wis. Stat. s. 16.086(3)(b) (1973). The opinion assumed, quite correctly, that the actions of JCOER constituted "legislative action" or "other official action."

I must conclude that under Wis. Stat. s. 13.04(4) "legislative action" includes action by Committees of the Legislature exercising delegated legislative authority.

For these reasons, I conclude that Senator Farrow's compensation upon taking the Office of Lt. Governor must be limited to \$60,183 per year.

On August 18, 1999, the Department of Administration entered into a lease with an option to purchase with Continental 93 Fund LLC for the new State Justice Center located in Block 84 on the Capitol Square. We have concluded that the purchase of this property would be in the best interests of the State and have included authorization for this purchase in the Capital Budget, which is being introduced concurrently with this letter.

The option to purchase provides for a purchase price of \$42,600,000, if we conclude the purchase before we take occupancy of the building which is currently projected to be September 1, 2001. However, if we purchase the property after the first occupancy, our costs will be \$1.2 million higher. It also appears that the Capital Budget will not be enacted into law prior to the occupancy of the building and we will be unable to save the \$1.2 million if we wait for passage of the Budget Bill. This issue was discussed at a recent meeting of the State Building Commission. The Building Commission is of the opinion that special legislation should be considered by the Legislature authorizing this purchase before the Budget Bill is enacted.

Section 16.47, Stats., provides that no appropriation bill shall be passed by the Legislature before the Budget Bill is enacted with the exception that the Governor can recommend passage of such a bill in an emergency situation. The Building Commission discussed the requirements of this statute and concluded that this situation is an emergency.

I concur and ask that **Senate Bill 144** be considered for immediate passage before enactment of the Budget Bill. your favorable consideration of this request would be appreciated. Sincerely,

EXECUTIVE ORDER #6

Relating to the Governor's Advisory Council on judicial Selection

WHEREAS, the quality of justice in the State of Wisconsin is best maintained through the election and appointment of qualified persons to the judiciary; and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of the Governor under the Constitution and laws of the Sate of Wisconsin to appoint persons to fill vacancies in the courts until a successor is elected to such office as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to establish a procedure through which vacant judicial offices will be filled by appointment of competent, public-minded lawyers of the highest integrity; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Scott McCallum, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to the authority vested in me by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

- 7. Establish the Governor's Advisory Council on Judicial Selection; and
- 8. Provide that for the purpose of making recommendations to the Governor concerning vacancies in the courts the Governor's Advisory Council on Judicial Selection shall consist of a panel of permanent members appointed by the Governor; and
- 9. In the case of a vacancy on the Supreme Court, up to two additional members shall be appointed by the governor; however, these members shall only serve until the Council makes its recommendation as to that vacancy; and
- 10. In the case of a vacancy on the Court of Appeals, up to two additional members shall be appointed by the Governor from the Court of Appeals District in which the vacancy occurs; however, these members shall only serve until the Council makes its recommendation as to that vacancy; and
- 11. In the Case of a vacancy on the Circuit Court, the Chairperson of the Advisory Council shall appoint up to two additional members who reside in such circuit; however, these members shall only serve until the Council makes its recommendation as to that vacancy; and

- 12. Provide that all members shall serve at the Pleasure of the Governor; and
- 13. Provide that the Council shall use the following minimum standards to evaluate whether proposed nominees are qualified candidates:

a. That the person meet all legal requirements, including those in the Wisconsin Constitution, for becoming a member of the judiciary; and

b. That the person is a member in good standing of the State Bar of Wisconsin and a resident of the State of Wisconsin; and

c. That the person appointed is likely to measure up to those standards outlining the significant qualities of an ideal judge as set forth in Section 60.01 of the Wisconsin Supreme Court Rules; and

d. That the person is fair, experienced, even-tempered, and free of biases against any class of citizens or any religious or racial groups; and

e. That the person possesses sound mental and physical health such that he or she can fully and completely perform the duties of the office for which the vacancy exists;

- 14. Provide that the Governor shall designate from the Council membership a Chairperson; and
- 15. Provide that the Council shall adopt such rules concerning its operating procedures as it deems appropriate; and
- 16. Instruct and encourage the Council to solicit applications for each judicial vacancy; instruct the Council to review the qualifications of all those interested in appointment, and to provide the Governor with a list of at least three but no more that five persons who the Council regards as best qualified for the vacant position no later than six weeks after notification of the vacancy; and
- 17. Instruct the Council to keep all proceedings confidential, consistent with state law; and
- 18. Instruct the Secretary of the Department of Administration to provide the Council with sums of money that are necessary and proper for the legitimate travel and operating expenses of the Council as provided by the Joint Committee on Finance under Section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

We have completed a financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin, as requested by state agencies to meet the audit requirements of the federal Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended, and the provisions of federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133. In addition, the audit assists us in meeting state audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats. the audit covers the period from July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000. During this period, state agencies, including the University of Wisconsin System, administered \$6.3 billion in cash and non-cash federal assistance.

While, overall, we found that state agencies complied with federal grant requirements, we question \$1,027,571 in costs the State charged to federal grants and in lost interest earnings to the federal government because of various delays. The amount the State may be required to repay the federal government is likely to be less than the amount questioned because the federal government may allow the State to substitute qualified expenditures for the expenditures we question. However, the amount questioned is significantly greater that the \$688,051 we questioned in our fiscal year (FY) 1998-99 audit and the \$293,474 we questions in our FY 1997-98 audit.

We continue to have concerns at the Department of Workforce Development (DWD), which administers some of the larger and more complex federal programs. In total, we question \$934,137 that DWD charged to federal grant programs or that was lost interest earnings to the federal government because of various delays. Two of the more significant concerns relate to contracts and direct payment to clients for the Vocational Rehabilitation program.

DWD contracted with the Department of Commerce to provide funds to businesses that agreed to expand their operations and reserve newly created jobs for Vocational Rehabilitation clients. In a highly questionable practice, on September 29, 1999, the day before the grant period expired, DWD amended its contract and prepaid Commerce for services. We found the manipulation of contracts and payment procedures was done to avoid the lapsing federal funds. We consider this issue to be a material violation of federal regulations and, therefore, qualified our opinion on compliance with federal regulations and questioned \$248,732.

We also continue to have concerns with unsupported payments to Vocational Rehabilitation clients, which were previously discussed in other financial and program evaluation reports. During FY 1999-2000, DWD made over 17,000 payments, totaling over \$5 million, directly to Vocational Rehabilitation clients. We tested 56 payments made during FY 1999-2000 and found payments totaling \$12,137 were not supported by receipts or other documentation. To assess remedial action taken by DWD in August 2000, we tested an additional 22 direct payments made in October and November 2000 and found payments totaling \$8,583 were not supported. Because of the large number of direct payments made during our audit period, and the likelihood of additional unsupported payments, we believe this area to be a material weakness in DWD's internal controls.

We question a variety of other costs charged to grant programs by DWD and other state agencies. For example we question:

- \$329,107 because non-federal matching expenditures may have been applied to incorrect Vocational Rehabilitation award years by DWD;
- \$200,896 in costs DWD inappropriately charged to prior-year awards under the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, and an additional \$98,964 because of errors it made in calculating the amount of TANF funds to transfer to the Social Services Block Grant;
- \$35,718 in questioned costs for other federal programs administered by DWD;
- \$57,750 in program income that a nonprofit corporation under contract with the Department of Administration collected but did not report to the Department;
- \$22,791 in salary and fringe benefit costs the Department of Military Affairs charged to a federal grant for two employees who did not document their work effort in accordance with federal regulations; and
- \$12,640 in costs incurred by the University of Wisconsin, and \$253 by the Department of Health and Family Services.

We also reviewed cash management at the Department of Transportation (DOT). We determined that DOT did not review and liquidate encumbrances related to highway construction projects in a timely manner, resulting in up to \$811,000 in state funds being used to subsidize federal funds during FY 1999-2000, and up to \$40,000 in lost interest earnings to the State. We also note that during FY 1999-2000, DOT did not perform all of the federally required tests to verify that the materials used in highway projects meet minimum quality standards.

Our single audit report is lengthy and detailed. Therefore, we are limiting our initial distribution to those required by law to receive copies, the audited agencies, and the federal agencies to which our findings relate. This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of March 2001.

On March 1, 2001 the **Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund** balance was -\$5 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$7 thousand on March 2, 2001, to -\$8 thousand on March 23, 2001, and continued into the month of April. As of the date of this letter, it has been resolved. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

On March 2, 2001 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was -\$2.76 million. This shortfall increased to -\$2.85 million on March 2, 2001 and continued until March 6, 2001 when the balance reached \$425 thousand. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

On March 26, 2001 the <u>Wisconsin Lottery Fund</u> balance was -%595 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$4.51 million on March 29, 2001, decreased to -\$449 thousand on March 30, 2001, and continued into the month of April. As of the date of this letter, it has been resolved. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Utility Public Benefits Fund, and Wisconsin Lottery Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The revisions incorporate actions by the Board's Strategic Planning Committee modifying SWIB's management structure to follow more closely best practices used at top-performing pension funds. The changes also implement recommendations made by outside counsel and make the clear delineation between the role of Trustees as governing fiduciaries and staff as managing fiduciaries. Price Waterhouse had also suggested these changes a few years ago after their audit of the Private Placement Division.

Introduction

This memorandum is in response to your request for my analysis of the potential effect of 2001 Senate Joint Resolution 2, as affected by Assembly Substitute Amendment 1, on the ability of the state to continue its regulation of fishing, hunting, trapping and taking game. The Joint Resolution, as amended, proposes to create Wis. Const. art. I, s. 26, as follows: "The people have the right to fish, hunt, trap, and take game subject only to reasonable restrictions as prescribed by law." This is the same language as contained in Senate Joint Resolution 2, as

introduced, and prior to the adoption of Senate Substitute Amendment 1.

You have observed that the constitutional amendment, if adopted, could be used as the basis for a legal challenge to the constitutionality of existing or future statutes or administrative rules that regulate fish and game. Your concern is the extent to which legal challenges to fish and game regulations could succeed. You have asked whether the Joint Resolution would support a challenge only to regulations that are substantially more restrictive than those now in force, or whether there is a potential for successful challenge to many of the ordinary, commonly accepted fish and game regulations that are currently in place.

It is impossible to give a definitive answer to your question, because the constitutional language is brief, and does not spell out the specific legal consequences of that language. Judicial interpretation may eventually supply the answer to your question, but the outcome of court cases is difficult to predict. However, courts frequently resort to a variety of methods to interpret constitutional provisions and a review of those methods can suggest the outcome of a challenge to hunting or fishing regulations based on the proposed right. I have reviewed a number of these methods of interpretation, and concluded that a successful challenge to hunting and fishing regulations would most likely relate to future regulations that are much more restrictive than those currently in place. I believe it is less likely that the regulations in place today could be successfully challenged, and I have summarized my conclusion in this memorandum. My conclusion also appears to be consistent with the intent of the supporters of the constitutional amendment - I am unaware of any public testimony or arguments in legislative debate on the constitutional amendment that indicate an intent that it should be a vehicle for overturning any current fish and game regulations.

Throughout this memorandum, for convenience, I will refer to "hunt and fish" as a description of all activities that are subject to the proposed constitutional right. For further information, you may wish to review Wisconsin Legislative Council Information Memorandum 00–7, *Laws on Hunting, Fishing and Trapping* (December 28, 2000).

Current Regulation of Fish and Game

This section of the memorandum briefly describes the broad grant of statutory authority for hunting and fishing regulation, as well as the great deference that courts currently give to such regulations. This discussion is included in the memorandum because it is these legal principles that are potentially subject to change as a result of adopting the Joint Resolution.

The legal title to all wild animals is declared to be in the state by s. 29.011, Stats.:

29.011 Title to wild animals. (1) The legal title to, and the custody and protection of, all wild animals within this state is vested in the state for the purposes of regulating the enjoyment, use, disposition, and conservation of these wild animals.

(2) The legal title to a wild animal or carcass, taken or reduced to possession in violation of this chapter, remains in the state. The title to a wild animal or carcass, lawfully acquired, is subject to the condition that upon the violation of this chapter relating to the possession, use, giving, sale, barter or transportation of a wild animal or carcass by the owner, the ownership shall revert, as a result of the violation, to the state.

In other words, legal title to wild game only passes to an individual when the game is legally taken. Until that time, title

remains with the state, and the state can confiscate any game unlawfully taken. This declaration of sovereignty is common to all 50 states and is the statutory expression of the legal principle that dates back to the early days of the English monarchy. Although it is not so described in the statutes, the state's title to wild animals is often described in court cases as a trust for the benefit of the people. The Legislature, as the representative of the people, is charged with the authority to manage this trust. The Legislature has delegated the administrative responsibilities regarding wild animals primarily to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Most of the statutory authority of the DNR with respect to wild animals is contained in ch. 29, Stats., and DNR has implemented its authority by adopting extensive administrative rules.

The basic authority of the DNR to regulate fish and game is set forth in s. 29.014 (1), Stats., which provides as follows:

29.014 (1) The department shall establish and maintain open and closed seasons for fish and game and any bag limits, size limits, rest days and conditions governing the taking of fish and game that will conserve the fish and game supply and ensure the citizens of this state continued opportunities for good fishing, hunting and trapping.

There are very few appellate court cases in Wisconsin regarding fish and game regulation. However, the Wisconsin case of *Krenz v. Nichols*, decided in 1928, is typical of the state court's approach to fish and game cases. In this case, the Wisconsin Supreme Court reviewed the state's regulation of muskrat farms. In its decision in favor of the state, the court gave great deference to the Legislature in its regulation of fish and game.

> As trustee for the people, the state may conserve wild life and regulate or prohibit its taking in any reasonable way it may deem necessary for the public welfare, so long as it does not violate any organic law of the land.

. .

It is now generally recognized that valuable wild animal life would soon be exterminated if the state should fail to conserve it and aid in its reproduction. Whenever the state has done so without trenching on private rights protected by the Constitution, such acts have been almost uniformly upheld.

Nearly every conceivable regulation for the propagation, conservation, taking, and disposal of fish and game has been upheld where no constitutional objections have stood in the way. Generally, courts have given very liberal construction to such statutes, to the end that the public welfare should be subserved. [222 N.W. 300, 303, 197 Wis. 394 (1928).]

Constitutional Interpretation

Like statutes, constitutions are subject to judicial interpretation. Some of the tools used by courts in constitutional cases are known as "rules of interpretation." These rules are similar to the rules for statutory interpretation, but have other dimensions due to the constitutional context.

It is important to note that these are not "rules" in the conventional sense of that word. This is rather a term that lawyers use loosely to describe what could more accurately be described as an approach to analyzing the constitutional issue. Courts are not bound to follow these rules, although these rules are commonly applied in court decisions.

The express purpose of these rules of interpretation is to allow courts to implement the will of the drafters of a constitutional provision and the will of the voters who ratified it. To the extent that a court interprets a constitutional provision, it may choose not to follow the literal meaning of that provision. The flexibility that courts have when applying the rules of interpretation potentially puts legislators and electors in the position of voting for a constitutional amendment when it cannot be known how courts might ultimately decide a case arising under the proposed amendment.

The following are some examples of constitutional rules of interpretation:

Unless a provision is ambiguous, the plain meaning prevails. If there is no ambiguity, the court may choose not to consider any evidence outside of the constitutional language at issue. Senate Joint Resolution 2 does not appear to be ambiguous, in the sense that it can be read in two different ways. However, the Joint Resolution is vague in the sense that it does not precisely define the scope of the right. This may lead a court to claim that it is ambiguous (because ambiguity and vagueness are frequently mixed), and resort thereafter to other evidence of meaning.

Avoid absurd results. The issue of absurd results often arises when fact situations are presented to the court that were not envisioned by the drafters, or when there is a conflict between constitutional provisions.

Extrinsic evidence related to adoption. Courts may review the legislative history surrounding adoption of a constitutional provision to determine what was intended by the Legislature.

Extrinsic evidence related to legislation on the same subject. Courts may look to legislation interpreting constitutional provisions or to legislation that is adopted contemporaneous to the constitutional provision to determine intent.

Comments on 2001 Senate Joint Resolution 2

The following are some observations regarding potential judicial interpretation of Senate Joint Resolution 2, as amended. These observations are expressed in terms of how the text of the Joint Resolution or certain evidence related to the Joint Resolution might influence the decision of a court. I have not assumed that a court might make an unexpected or unusual decision, although this is always a possibility.

Plain meaning of the Joint Resolution. The Joint Resolution clearly does not create an absolute right to hunt and fish. The "right to fish, hunt, trap and take game" is qualified in the Joint Resolution by the language that follows: "subject only to reasonable restrictions as prescribed by law." Although the Joint Resolution creates a right, at the same time it authorizes the Legislature and its agent, the DNR, to regulate that right. Therefore, the language in the Joint Resolution clearly acknowledges that regulation of hunting, fishing, trapping and taking game will continue.

Absurd results. Courts typically refer to rights created in the constitution as "fundamental rights." Fundamental constitutional rights are those that have an essential value to individual liberty in our society. When a court determines that a particular constitutional right meets this description, the court will often apply one of the higher standards of judicial review. Restrictions on many of the fundamental constitutional rights are subject to strict scrutiny, wherein the court will not apply a presumption of constitutionality to the legislation. The state, to defend the regulation, must show that the regulation is intended to achieve a compelling governmental interest and the regulation is narrowly tailored to serve that interest. This would make it very difficult for the state to defend most fish and game regulation. However, the Joint Resolution allows reasonable restrictions. It could be considered an absurd result for a court to acknowledge that regulation of the right is permissible, but to make it extremely difficult for the state to regulate.

A more balanced approach, that harmonizes both the right and the regulation under the Joint Resolution, would be for the court to choose the intermediate standard of review. Regulations subject to the intermediate standard of review are given a presumption of constitutionality. Regulations must serve "significant" governmental interests, as contrasted with "compelling" governmental interests under the strict scrutiny standard. Regulations must be narrowly tailored, but not necessarily the least restrictive, and must leave open ample opportunities for citizens to exercise the right. Furthermore, even though a constitutional right is a fundamental right, courts recognize that not all burdens on fundamental rights bear heightened scrutiny. Some burdens may be sufficiently minor that they may be reviewed under the rational basis standard.

Additional absurd results. As noted in Krenz, the ongoing availability of wild animals to hunt and fish depends on state regulation to conserve the fish and game. It could be considered an absurd result if the Joint Resolution could be used to negate a substantial amount of hunting and fishing regulation, if the result was to restrict game management authority and thus destroy the very activity that the Joint Resolution was intended to protect.

"Reasonable restrictions" are authorized. This choice of language is important. Such restrictions could include the conservation of wild animals, as well as any other issues of public health, safety or welfare. This language should allow courts to approve regulations that respond to broader social issues, as well as conservation and game management. Social regulations are common in current fish and game regulations. For example, the nine–day deer gun season has no basis in deer herd management, but rather is based on tradition and public preference –a "social" regulation. Similarly, trophy size limits respond to angler preference rather than to fish management.

Judicial precedent. Courts strongly tend to follow precedent in constitutional cases. The adherence to precedent increases the certainty that is provided by law. The Krenz case, cited above, is part of the Wisconsin precedent in fish and game law. This precedent suggests that courts are likely to make only modest changes to the standards for review of fish and game regulation, in that a substantial degree of judicial deference continues to be consistent with Senate Joint Resolution 2, as amended. *Legislative history.* I am unaware of any legislative history suggesting that the Joint Resolution is intended to restrict or negate any of the current fish and game

Contemporaneous legislation. Senate Bill 45 and Assembly Bill 190 would prohibit the hunting of mourning doves. The outcome of legislative debate on these bills may suggest in part what is the Legislature's intent regarding the constitutional amendment. With the exception of these two bills, the Legislature is not considering any other legislation that would curtail any current hunting or fishing opportunities.

We have completed an evaluation of health care in Wisconsin's adult prisons, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. In fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000, the Department of Corrections spent \$37.2 million and employed 232.5 full-time equivalent medical professionals and other support staff to provide health care to approximately 14,900 adult inmates.

The Department currently receives as many as 1,000 requests for health services from inmates each working day, approximately 60 percent of which are for prescription refills. Staff also responded to 8,137 emergencies during FY 1999-2000. We found that approximately 5,000 inmates, or one-third of the population suffers from at least one chronic illness, and we conclude that improvements are needed in the management of chronic illnesses, contract oversight, and mental health services.

The Governor's 2001-2003 Biennial Budget Proposal provides an additional \$37.6 million in general purpose revenue and an additional 157.5 positions for prison health care, including \$17.3 million and 118.0 positions for new institutions and facility expansions. We reviewed this proposal and several alternatives to determine whether costs associated with additional prison health care staff could be offset through management improvements or other changes. We found limited opportunities and significant challenges for reducing health care expenditures as costs for certain medical services and pharmaceuticals, which are not subject to the Department's control, continue to increase.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Department of Corrections management and staff. The Department's response is Appendix 6.

On April 2, 2001 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$8 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$13 thousand on April 11, 2001 and continued until April 12, 2001 when the balance reached \$4 thousand. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

On April 2, 2001 the <u>Utility Public Benefits Fund</u> balance was –\$57 thousand. This shortfall increased to –\$61 thousand on April 4, 2001 and continued until April 5, 2001 when the

balance reached \$2.41 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

On April 2, 2001 the <u>Wisconsin Lottery Fund</u> balance was -\$674 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$1.1 million on April 3, 2001, increased to -\$2.24 million on April 5, 2001, and continued until April 6, 2001 when the balance reached \$2.3 million. This shortfall was due to the timing of revenues.

On April 6, 2001 the <u>Historical Society Trust Fund</u> balance was -\$2 thousand. This shortfall increased to -\$38 thousand on April 20, 2001, to -\$62 thousand on April 30, 2001, and continued into the month of May. As of the date of this letter, it has been resolved.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Utility Public Benefits Fund, Wisconsin Lottery Fund, and Historical Society Trust Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #12

Relating to the Creation of the Governor's Task force on Invasive Species

WHEREAS, Wisconsin has some of the most beautiful lakes, rivers and forests in the nation; and

WHEREAS, the State's natural resources must be preserved and protected for future generations; and

WHEREAS, invasive species, both plant and aquatic, are harmful in that they disrupt Wisconsin's natural ecosystem; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2000 alone, economic losses and control measures cost more than \$138 billion in the United States;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Scott McCallum, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Wisconsin, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

- 19. Create the Governor's Advisory Task Force on Invasive Species (hereinafter referred to as the "Task Force"; and
- 20. Provide that the Task Force shall consist of not more than twenty (20) members appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 21. Provide that the Governor shall designate two (2) members of the Task Force as co-chairs to serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 22. Provide that the Task Force shall have the following mission:
 - a. Evaluate the severity of the induction and spread of invasive species in Wisconsin; and
 - b. Develop a statewide control plan to combat the induction and spread of invasive species; and
 - c. Identify and obtain federal funding to be used in the implementation of the statewide plan.
- 23. Require the Task Force to prepare and submit a report to the Governor detailing its findings and recommendations; and
- 24. Direct the Department of Administration to provide the Task Force with such sums of money as are necessary for the travel and operating expenses in accordance with Section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and
- 25. Provide that the Task Force dissolve upon the acceptance of its final report by the Office of the Governor.

In accordance with s. 601.427(9), Wis. Stats., I am pleased to submit this report to the Wisconsin Legislature. This report is to evaluate the impact that 1995 Wisconsin Act 10 has had on the following:

(a) The number of health care providers practicing in Wisconsin.

(b) The fees that health care providers pay under s. 655.27 (3), Wis. Stats.

(c) The premiums that health care providers pay for health care liability insurance.

The evaluation performed included the collection and analysis of statistics regarding the number of health care providers and premiums charged for health care liability insurance. Analysis of these statistics determined the only discernable effect on these areas has been an estimated \$60.8 million dollars in reductions of fees collected under s. 655.27 (3), Wis. Stats., over the last five years. However, it was further noted that loss experience to date is too immature to validate the reduction.

The attached report provides information regarding the background of Act 10, the statistics collected and the analysis performed.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the administration of the 0.5 percent county sales and use tax, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. This tax is levied on the same goods and services affected by the State's 5.0 percent sales and use tax. The Department of Revenue administers the tax on behalf of the counties and retains 1.75 percent of the collections, as prescribed by s. 77.76(4) Wis. Stats. During calendar year 2000, the Department distributed \$215.2 million to 53 counties that imposed the tax.

The \$215.2 million that was distributed to counties in 2000 included a delayed distribution of \$13.0 million, which the counties should have received in January and February 2000 but which they did not receive until June 2000. The delay occurred because the Department did not have adequate procedures in place to ensure that all tax returns were fully processed and included in distributions to counties. We also found that the 90- to 180-day time limit for distributing county sales and use tax revenues prescribed by Wisconsin Statutes is longer than limits established by other states, and improvements in business practices and technological advances enable the Department to process returns and distribute funds to counties in significantly less time than statutory time limits allow. Therefore, we have included a recommendation that the Legislature reduce the time period for distributing county sales and use taxes to county governments.

In fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000, the Department retained \$3.9 million in administrative fees from county sales and use taxes. In reviewing the Department's time reporting system, we found that administrative fees supported 10.38 more full-time equivalent positions that were reportedly used to administer the county sales and use tax. Wisconsin's administrative fee is the second-highest among surrounding midwestern states and generates more revenue than the Department expends to administer the tax. In FY 1999-2000, \$931,600 in county sales and use tax administrative fees lapsed to the General Fund.

Funding from the administrative fee is used to support the Department's new Integrated Tax System (ITS). The administrative fee is expected to support \$8.8 million of the system's total costs, which are projected to be \$78.0 million. The amount of ITS costs to be funded by the county sales and use tax administrative fee appears to have been based on the unencumbered funds available in the appropriation for administration of the tax, rather than on an analysis of system costs and benefits.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Revenue. The Department's response is Appendix 2.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

As required by s. 13.94 (1)(de), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the Patients Compensation Fund, which insures health care providers in Wisconsin against medical malpractice claims that exceed the primary malpractice insurance thresholds established in statutes. The Fund is governed by a Board of Governors and administered by the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance. In fiscal year 1999-2000, 11,809 health care providers participated in the Fund. We have provided an unqualified auditor's report on the Fund's financial statements for fiscal years ending June 30, 2000, 1999, and 1998.

Past audit reports discussed concerns regarding the Fund's accounting deficit. Action by the Board of Governors and the Legislature and recent favorable claims experience have contributed to a significant improvement in the Fund's financial position, which showed an accounting surplus of \$27.2 million as of June 30, 2000. To address concerns being raised about actuarial estimates that affect the Fund's financial position, and to promote broader acceptance of the actuarial analyses and related decisions, we include a recommendation that a comprehensive review of the consulting actuary's methods and assumptions be performed by an independent actuary.

Further, the Fund needs to take additional steps to ensure that all health care providers are obtaining primary insurance coverage as required by statutes. Our testing disclosed several instances in which providers had not obtained the primary malpractice coverage required by statutes. These uninsured providers could be held liable for up to \$ 1 million in settlements or judgements per claim if any malpractice claims were resolved against them. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance and the contractors who assist in administering the Patients Compensation Fund program.

The Board Finds:

1. Lois A. Endres of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$2,074.32 for lost wages and sick time caused by a fall that allegedly occurred at the State Capitol Building. The claimant states that on January 1, 2001, she was exiting the State Capitol when she

slipped on ice and fell, landing on her left side. The claimant states that her companion took her immediately to the hospital, where she was treated for fractured ribs. The claimant alleges that the day was clear and sunny and that she encountered no other icy areas during her walk from Brittingham Park to the Capitol Building. The claimant believes that the state was negligent for failing to clear ice from the walkway. The claimant alleges that her injuries caused her to miss significant amounts of work. She requests reimbursement for 74.75 hours of sick time used and 11.25 hours of lost wages (after her sick time was used up). She also requests payment for \$25 in medical bills and \$96.48 for four hours of time to attend the Claims Board meeting. At her hearing, the claimant stated that she probably exited on the South or Southwest side of the Capitol and that she slipped on smooth glare ice.

The Department of Administration recommends denial of this claim. The claimant did not file a police report or contact anyone at the Capitol Building at the time of the accident and has presented no proof that the accident actually occurred at the Capitol Building.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

2. Anjelika Johnson of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$3,580.20 for lost wages. The claimant works as a Registered Nurse providing home health care for Medical Assistance patients. The claimant states that she is paid by the Department of Health and Family Services through its fiscal agent, EDS and that she is required to have a number of approvals in place before she can be paid. She states that she did not realize that one of her authorizations had expired on April 21, 2000, and that the renewal date had simply slipped her mind. EDS would not honor the claimant's request for payment of services delivered May 5 through June 12. The claimant states that she processed her renewal paperwork as soon as she found out her authorization had lapsed but that EDS would not backdate payments and could not pay her for the work performed after the expiration date. The claimant believes that there should be some allowance made for a simple mistake. She points to the fact that the work she performed was authorized by the budget and by EDS. The claimant believes that it would be helpful if reminders of authorization renewal dates could be sent to providers in order to keep a simple mistake from causing such harm. At her hearing, the claimant stated that she continued to provide home health service during the period when her authorization had expired. This was not disputed by DHFS.

The Department of Health and Family Services recommends denial of this claim. DHFS states that there was no negligence on the part of any state employee and does not believe there is an equitable basis for the claim. DHFS states that under the Wisconsin Administrative Code, all Medical Assistance providers are required to receive reimbursement authorization approval prior to provision of services. DHFS points to the fact that the claimant is not alleging that she was unaware of this requirement but that she forgot to submit her authorization renewal. DHFS points to HSF 107.03 (3)(c), which states that if prior authorization is not obtained "reimbursement shall not be made except in extraordinary circumstances such as emergency cases where the department has given verbal authorization for a service." The DHFS does not believe that the claimant's situation of forgetting to renew her authorization falls under this section. Finally, DHFS points to HSF 106.02 (9)(e), which states that the provider is solely responsible for prior authorization requests and also to HSF 106.03 (4) and HSF 107.11 (5)(e), which specifically state that services provided without the required authorizations are not covered if the authorization is not in place prior to the date of service.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$2,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Health and Family Services appropriation s. 20.435 (4)(a), Stats.

3. Arthur Polk of Montello, Wisconsin claims \$535.00 for restitution he never received. The claimant owns a warehouse that was damaged when Anatoly Nepscha broke into the building by driving his vehicle into the warehouse door. Mr. Nepscha was convicted of two counts of felony burglary and received four years of probation on both counts. The claimant states that he submitted a repair bill for his door to the court and that the court ordered Mr. Nepscha to pay restitution to the claimant in the amount of \$535. The claimant states that he contacted the Adams County District Attorney's Office at the end of Mr. Nepscha's probationary period and claims that they told him they had made an error and failed to collect restitution from Mr. Nepscha.

The State Prosecutors Office (SPO) originally filed a response for this claim stating that the claim should be more properly brought against the Department of Corrections. The SPO advised that restitution was ordered for the claimant by means of a stipulation filed in Juneau County (where the claimant was convicted). The SPO states that the Juneau County DA's Office stated that they sent a copy of the restitution order to Mauston Probation and Parole Department (Juneau County). Mr. Nepscha's actual probation supervision occurred in Adams County and would have been overseen by a Probation and Parole Office in that county.

The Department of Corrections recommends denial of this claim. The DOC alleges that the Juneau County Clerk of Court's Office never sent the Department's agent's office the order of restitution pertaining to the claimant. Consequently, no restitution was collected for the claimant. DOC states that when the claimant contacted them about the problem, the DOC wrote the court and asked that a civil judgement be issued against Mr. Nepscha on behalf of the claimant for \$535. The court did so on June 27, 2000. Section 973.20(1), Stats., provides that after probation is terminated, restitution such as that ordered for the claimant "is enforceable in the same manner as a judgement in a civil action by the victim named in the order to receive restitution..." The DOC believes that, since the claimant has received a civil judgement against Mr. Nepscha, he has the option provided for in the statute of going through the ordinary judgement enforcement process. The DOC states that the claimant has provided no evidence that he has attempted to enforce the judgement and therefore believes he has not exhausted all available legal remedies. Finally, the DOC states that it has not been shown that any Department employee or agent was negligent in the handling of this matter. The DOC states that most crime victims do not receive full restitution for the crimes committed against them and the DOC does not believe it would be wise to make the state a guarantor for restitution claims against criminals.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

4. Jack and Margot Raz claim \$154,500.00 for the purchase price of their delicatessen at Wisconsin State Fair Park. The claimants have leased land at SFP since 1977. In August 1998, the claimants state that they entered into a Business Purchase Agreement to sell their delicatessen for \$154,000 to Greg Montoto and David Flores. The claimants allege that SFP orally approved and encouraged the sale but failed to issue written

approval until almost two years later in August 2000. Prior to that approval, Montoto and Flores sued to recover their \$30,000 down payment on the basis that SFP approval of the sale did not occur in a reasonable time. The court held that the time for the approval was not reasonable and that the contract was unenforceable, ordering the claimants to return the down payment.

Wisconsin State Fair Park recommends denial of this claim. The claimants' lease with SFP specifically provides that the claimants may not sell the business without prior written consent of the SFP Board and that the Board reserves the right to grant or refuse such consent. SFP states that the claimants' assertion that SFP orally approved the sale is untrue. SFP states that, because of the lease agreement, the claimants should have been fully aware that written approval was needed from the SFP Board. Furthermore, SFP states that the SFP executive director sent a letter to the claimants in April 1999 specifically stating that "without Board action, the sale or transfer of any stand may not take place." SFP states that the Board's delay in providing written approval was reasonable. The Board was in the process of conducting a thorough examination of the operation and configuration of SFP grounds. It was not until August 2000 that the master plan for the grounds was sufficiently developed so that the Board knew whether the business intended by the buyer of the claimants' site would fit with that plan. SFP claims that the statement by the court that the approval had not come within a reasonable time is not a judgement related to the behavior of the Board but is a determination that the buyers' obligation under their agreement with the claimants could not be completed because of the delay and that the contract was therefore unenforceable.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

5. Julie and Ken Ganske of Columbus, Wisconsin claim \$3,466.31 for vehicle damage allegedly incurred while Julie Ganske was distributing literature for Circus World Museum, where she was employed. The claimant states that she was told by her supervisor that she had to use her personal vehicle to distribute information during the Great Circus Train tour. She alleges that he told her there was no money to rent an additional van and that she therefore had to use her own vehicle. She also claims that he told her that Circus World's insurance would cover any damage to her vehicle. The claimant states that damage to the vehicle was discovered at the end of the train tour weekend.

Circus World Museum recommends denial of this claim. CWM denies that the claimant's supervisor, Dale Williams, told her that she had to use her personal vehicle. CWM states that Williams discussed a number of options, including the claimant riding with another CWM employee, the claimant riding in the rented van, and the claimant using her own vehicle and being reimbursed for mileage at the standard state rate. CWM states that the claimant was never told that she must use her personal vehicle but that it was mutually decided that she would do so. CWM also denies that Williams told the claimant any damage would be covered by state insurance. CWM states that Williams did tell the claimant that CWM insurance would likely protect employees against any liability for their actions during the train tour. CWM states that the claimant made no mention of any damage during the three days of the train tour, nor did she report it during the following week. CWM alleges that the claimant told Williams that she did not know where the damage occurred. CWM believes that there is no proof that the damage occurred during the train tour and that CWM should not be held responsible for any repairs. CWM states that the claimant was paid the standard state mileage rate for use of her personal vehicle and should not receive any additional payment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. David J. Beranek of Eau Claire, Wisconsin claims \$648.77 for damage to his automobile allegedly caused by Department of Health and Family Services employees. The claimant states that on December 23, 2000, his personal vehicle was parked in the parking lot of Northern Wisconsin Center, where the claimant is employed, when it was struck by a snow plow driven by members of the grounds crew. The claimant states that the two grounds crew employees came to him and told him that they had struck his vehicle while plowing the parking lot. The claimant has been told that his vehicle will be out of service for 4 days while it is being repaired. The claimant states that he would have to rent a vehicle for 4 days at a cost of \$35 per day. The claimant has a \$500 insurance deductible but his insurance does not cover the rental vehicle.

The Department of Health and Family Services recommends payment of this claim after the actual expenses have been incurred and the claimant submits copies of the receipts for the actual repair and car rental expenses.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$648.77 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Health and Family Services appropriation s. 20.435 (2)(gk), Stats.

7. Lynette Henderson of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$4,940.00 for funeral expenses not covered by life insurance allegedly due to an error by the Department of Employee Trust Funds. The claimant's father was an annuitant of the Wisconsin Retirement System. While employed, he had applied for a disability annuity and his employer (DHFS) certified that he was disabled for purposes of waiving his life insurance premiums. This allowed Mr. Henderson to continue being covered under the group life insurance program (even after his employment terminated) and to pay no premiums as long as he was disabled. The claimant's father died in November 1997. The claimant states that her family was not notified of any cancellation of her father's life insurance. She states that her father contacted ETF to check on the status of his life insurance and received ETF's 2/34/94 letter in reply, which states that the value of his life insurance was \$7,000. At her father's death, the claimant met with an ETF employee to discuss the insurance situation. The claimant states that the ETF employee went through the file page by page and never at any time indicated that the life insurance had lapsed. The claimant states that the ETF employee specifically told her that there was \$7,000 worth of coverage and explained how to receive payment for funeral expenses. After her father's funeral, the claimant was told that ETF had made an error and that her father's insurance had been cancelled in 1988. The claimant appealed to the State of Wisconsin Group Insurance Board and was denied.

The Department of Employee Trust Funds makes no recommendation regarding payment of this claim. ETF states that in order for Mr. Henderson to continue life insurance coverage and the premium waiver granted due to his disability, he was required to submit two forms to Minnesota Life each year—a medical certification from his physician and a form concerning his current employment status. ETF states that in 1988, only the physician form was completed and returned. ETF states that Minnesota Life notified Mr. Henderson that his insurance was terminated on June 21, 1988. ETF admits that it then erred when informing Mr. Henderson that he still had life insurance coverage in 1994. A copy of the Minnesota Life letter terminating coverage was in the file but was apparently missed by ETF staff. Later inquiries about the insurance by Mr. Henderson's family were also answered in error by ETF staff, who probably relied on the earlier erroneous correspondence they found in the file, thus repeating the earlier mistake. ETF regrets that its employees erroneously advised Mr. Henderson and his family that he was covered by life insurance after June 1988. ETF has instituted procedural changes to reduce this type of mistake. ETF reminds the board that the Attorney General has issued an official opinion stating that the Claims Board lacks authority to order payment from the Public Employee Trust Fund including the ETF appropriations in s. 20.515, see 74 Op. Atty. Gen. 193, 196 (1985). ETF does not believe it should advise the board how to expend Claims Board funds and therefore declines to make a recommendation.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. J.T. Roofing, Inc. of Saukville, Wisconsin claims \$508,323.00 for extra costs allegedly incurred on a state building project at Mendota Mental Health Institute. The claimant states that during construction numerous events occurred which necessitated additional compensation. The claimant requested additional payment but was denied by the Division of Facilities Development. The claimants state that project specifications provided for removal of existing loose vapor retarder but that application of a primer, which was not required in the specifications caused loosening of additional vapor retarder that required additional work to remove (\$166,827). The claimant states that it was never informed that only two of the eight courtyards at the project would be open and claims that limited courtyard access caused delays (\$252,960). The claimant states that it was never informed that additional time would be required to gain access to the facility and that its employees had to wait on numerous occasions for 45-60 minutes to gain access to the project site, causing delays (\$14,535). The claimant states that two DFD employees, Mr. McClyman and Mr. Mohns, gave contradictory instructions thus causing delays and extra costs (\$8,976). The claimant states that it was harassed in various ways (\$65,025): The claimant states that Mr. Mohns did not review submitted drawings in a timely fashion and that he refused to accept specified materials without additional documentation; that the project was shut down early in the mistaken belief that the temperature would fall below 40 degrees when the temperature remained in the 50-65 degree range; and that Mr. McClyman made racially offensive remarks to the claimant's employees, which caused the claimant to spend extra time and effort addressing this issue with its employees, who were ready to walk off the project because of Mr. McClyman's remarks. The claimant believes that the time delays that occurred on the project were not its doing, but were the result of the project engineer's refusal to meet with the claimant to resolve issues existing in the project engineer's mind.

In December of 2000, DFD offered the claimant \$50,000 in settlement of this claim, however, the claimant rejected this offer. The DFD states that application of the primer was required in the specifications, as was removal of all loose vapor retarder. DFD states that the claimant was informed that access to the site would require specific check–in procedures and that not all of the courtyards would be accessible at any given time. DFD states that the claimant's drawings were rejected because they were incomplete and incorrect. DFD states that it required additional documentation because the claimant's materials were not clearly labeled by the manufacturer, as the specifications required. DFD states that when the project was halted for the winter, the claimant was already beyond the completion date with only about 1/3 of the project completed. There was no way to finish the project before winter weather set—in, so DFD did not believe there was any reason to take a chance on the weather and shut the project down. Finally, DFD states that there were accusations of inappropriate comments made by both DFD and the claimant's employees. DFD removed Mr. McClymen from the project and feels that was sufficient response.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

9. Danette M. Sebastian of Doylestown, Wisconsin claims \$146.32 for vehicle damage allegedly caused by negligent maintenance of the parking lot at the Department of Revenue building. The claimant states that when she arrived for work on January 30, 2001, the parking lot at her building was solid ice. The claimant's vehicle slid into a bike rack in the parking lot and her car was damaged. The claimant states that she drove 42 miles to work that morning and did not encounter any difficulties on the road until she arrived at the DOR parking lot. The claimant believes DOA does a poor job of maintaining DOR parking lots. She states that DOA crews were out at 5:30 am on the morning of her accident salting and sanding downtown office locations and she feels that a crew should have been sent to take care of the DOR parking lot as well. She requests reimbursement for her vehicle damages of \$146.32. The claimant has a \$500 insurance deductible.

The Department of Administration recommends denial of this claim. DOA states that on the day in question, the Madison area was hit by a major ice storm. DOA states that efforts to clear many parking lots in Madison area were delayed by the sheer volume of ice. The DOA does not believe there was any negligence on the part of the state or its employees.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

10. Ray Wilkinson Buick Cadillac, Inc. of Racine, Wisconsin claims \$625,864.00 for reduced profits allegedly caused by a DOT highway construction project. The claimant's business is located on Washington Avenue in Racine, WI. In the summer of 2000, the DOT conducted a widening project of Washington Avenue. The claimant states that his business experienced a reduction in traffic because of the limited access during the road construction. The claimant claims that national auto sales increased 6.3% during this period while his sales went down 12.06%. The claimant states that his business lost \$625,864 due to the road construction and requests reimbursement for his lost profits.

The DOT recommends denial of this claim. The DOT states that this road project was extremely difficult and complicated to conduct under traffic. The DOT states that the primary objective of this project was to increase the safety and flow of traffic. The DOT points to the fact that, despite the size and scope of the project, the claimant admits that drive by traffic remained at 50% to 65% of the normal volume. The DOT maintained access to the claimant's business throughout the entire project. The DOT believes that traffic interruptions and inconveniences, while unfortunate, are a part of every highway reconstruction project in the State. The DOT states that it makes every effort to keep the roads open to as much traffic as possible while balancing the safety of the public with the goals of the project. It is neither the practice nor the policy of the DOT to subsidize businesses during construction projects. The DOT points to the fact that the improvements made by this project will increase the volume of drive by traffic in the future and provide better access to the claimant's business, potentially increasing his sales in the future.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Barbara Hill of Oregon, Wisconsin claims \$500.00 for automobile damage caused when claimant's vehicle was used for work related purposes. The claimant is a supervisor at UW-Madison. In September 2000, the claimant's department had a large shipment of packages that needed to be sent out according to a previously published schedule. Arrangements had been made to deliver supplies for the shipment to Delta Storage to prepare the packages. The claimant called UW Fleet several weeks before the shipment date to arrange for a van to transport the materials to Delta Storage, however, no vehicle was available. The claimant's personal van was large enough to transport the materials and staff. The staff member chosen to drive the claimant's vehicle had a good driving record and had been previously cleared by UW Risk Management to drive Fleet vehicles. The claimant states that while the driver was backing into a darkened loading dock area at Delta, he failed to notice a black truck parked in the area and backed into it. Damage to both vehicles was minor. The repair estimate for the claimant's van is over \$600 and the claimant's deductible is \$500.

The UW System recommends payment of this claim. The claimant was forced to use her vehicle because no state vehicles were available. Ordinarily, employees who use their own vehicles on state business assume the responsibility for all repairs associated with that use. In this case, however, the UW believes there is an equitable basis for payment, since the claimant did not have access to a state vehicle and was making every effort to meet a work–related deadline.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of 500.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285(1)(i), Stats.

12. Lebanon Athletic Association of Watertown, Wisconsin claims \$1,478.79 plus interest for refund of overpayment of sales taxes. The claimant states that the treasurer of his organization made an error when filing sales tax returns in 1997. The treasurer mistakenly paid taxes on both taxable income from sales and non-taxable income from donations that had been made to the claimant's organization. The claimant states that the DOR never informed them of any delinquency but that the DOR instead contacted the local town board, who revoked the claimant's liquor license, which forced them temporarily out of business. The claimant states that a new treasurer found the error in 1999 but that the DOR would not refund the money. The claimant believes that the overpayment, which was made in error, should be returned to his organization.

The DOR recommends denial of this claim. The claimant's sales and use quarterly tax return for June 30, 1997, was not timely filed and DOR issued an assessment in September 1997. DOR records indicate that this assessment was paid in November 1997. The DOR states that it received the missing quarterly sales tax return in October 1999. The claimant requested refund of a portion of the amount previously paid on the estimated assessment. The DOR states that it denied refund of the overpayment pursuant to s. 77.58 (4)(b), Stats. The DOR states that, based on the information provided by the claimant, it appeared that the tax was not being refunded to a

customer and the request was not received until more than two years after the notice of assessment was issued.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

The Board concludes:

1. The claims of the following claimants should be denied:

The joint survey committee on **Tax Exemptions** reports and recommends:

Senate Bill 55

Relating to: state finances and appropriations, constituting the executive budget act of the 2001 legislature.

Public Policy Involved:

The provisions of the Bill relating to tax exemptions are good public policy with the exception of the provision relating to the taxation of custom computer programs. That provision should be removed from the Bill. Additionally, the provision of the Bill relating to property tax exemption for regional planning commissions should be removed from the Bill and considered as separate legislation.

independent, nonprofit entity established by the Legislature in 1996 to operate the 536-bed hospital and a number of clinics on the UW-Madison campus, as well as other outpatient clinics and facilities in the Madison area. In fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000, the Authority had revenue of \$400.0 million and operating expenses of \$395.0 million; in September 2000, it employed 4,263 full-time equivalent staff.

The Authority was created to allow increased management flexibility in hospital operations and greater competitiveness in a changing health care environment. Although it has not engaged in networking activities to the extent that had been envisioned at the time it was established, it has established relationships with a number of health care entities. It has also used the \$106.5 million in bonding authority authorized by the Legislature to engage in an aggressive building program, including construction of two outpatient clinics in Madison.

The Authority's financial performance, like that of other academic medical centers, has been mixed. Revenue in excess of expenses declined from \$13.8 million in FY 1996-97, the Authority's first year of operation, to \$5.0 million in FY 1999-2000; however, it increased during the first ten months of FY 2000-01.

The Authority is generally fulfilling its statutory mission of delivering comprehensive, high-quality health care, including charity care; providing medical instruction; sponsoring and supporting health care research; and providing medical outreach services stateside. In FY 1999-2000, the Authority transferred \$16.3 million to UW medical, nursing, and pharmacy schools and spent another \$14.7 million in support of medical education.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Authority. The Authority's response is Appendix 5.

I have approve **Senate Bill 9** as 2001 Wisconsin Act 10 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto in sections 121m and 122g.

Senate Bill 9 is Wisconsin's enactment of the National Conference of Commissioner on Uniform State Laws' revision of Article 9 in the Uniform Commercial Code. The Uniform Commercial Code generally has standardized key business processes and basic rules for credit transactions throughout the United States. The Wisconsin version of Article 9 is Chapter 409 of the Wisconsin Statutes. **Senate Bill 9** repeals and recreates Chapter 409 to streamline and modernize the statutory framework for establishing, perfecting and prioritizing liens on property.

Section 121m provides for an increase of \$442,600 PR to the fiscal year 2000-01 s.20.144 (1)(g) appropriation of the Department of Financial Institutions. This section also provides 3.0 FTE project positions to the department for fiscal year 2001-02. These resources are needed for the department to successfully implement **Senate Bill 9**. However, successful implementation of **Senate Bill 9** is jeopardized by how the bill provides these resources. There is a mismatch between the year of funding and the year the positions are authorized. Further, the timing of passage and enactment virtually ensures the \$442,600 provided for implementation would lapse within days of enactment. I object to this timing mismatch and I am partially vetoing this section so the \$442,600 can be provided in fiscal year 2001-02, when the work will actually be done.

Section 122g sets a general effective date of July 1, 2001, (or the day after publication, whichever is later) for the bill. I also object to the separate provision in this section for an earlier effective date for the appropriation provision in section 121m. This provision in section 122g would make the appropriation in section 121m effective on the day after publication. I am partially vetoing this section to provide for a uniform effective date for the entire bill.

My partial veto of sections 121m and 122g will move the funding to a year these resources can actually be used, from fiscal year 2000-01 to fiscal year 2001-02. This technical veto will ensure that the department has the appropriated funding in the fiscal year that implementation work will begin and place the 3.0 FTE project positions and the funding to implement **Senate Bill 9** in the same fiscal year.

I support Wisconsin's continued participation in a uniform commercial code. My action on this bill allows Wisconsin to adopt a significant revision to the code and to implement it successfully.

On April 30, 2001, we completed our fiscal year 1999-2000 single audit and issued our report (01-08). During the course of our audit, we identified approximately \$2.1 million in available funds that the Legislature may wish to consider during the current 2001-03 biennial budget deliberations. This amount includes potential revenue of \$1.8 million for the General Fund, \$246,000 for the Conservation Fund, and \$40,000 for the Transportation Fund.

First, if the Legislature directed the Department of Workforce Development to immediately claim all federal funds available to the State through the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program, an estimated \$800,000 in additional interest earnings would be generated during the 2001-03 biennium. These additional interest earnings could be used for any purpose.

Second, the State receives rebates related to use of certain purchasing cards it has authorized state agencies to use to make purchases of less than \$5,000. As of December 31, 2000, the State received \$285,000 in purchasing card rebates, and we estimate that an additional \$400,000 will be received during the 2001-03 biennium. If it desired, the Legislature could direct the Department of Administration to lapse the purchasing card rebates to the funds that were the source of payments for the purchases and, in the future, record the rebates as miscellaneous revenues of the affected funds. If this action were taken, approximately \$620,000 could be deposited in the General Fund, \$40,000 to the Transportation Fund, and \$25,000 to other funds.

Finally, we identified \$392,000 in General Fund encumbrances and \$246,000 in Conservation Fund encumbrances that the Department of Workforce Development is currently in the process of reviewing. We believe the majority of these encumbrances, which have been outstanding since June 30, 1999, will lapse. Therefore, the Legislature may wish to consider the availability of these additional lapses as it continues its budget deliberations.

b. The proposed site of diversion has been field inspected by Department of Natural Resources personnel. The Department is directed to conduct the field inspection within 72 hours of the request for permission to divert.

c. The on-site inspector will grant immediate written authority if the proposed diversion will not cause unduly adverse environmental effects. The inspector may authorize the proposed diversion subject to whatever conditions he or she deems necessary to ensure that there will not be unduly adverse environmental effects as a result of that diversion and other diversions on the stream. Such conditions may include but are not limited to: exact location of the diversion, rate of diversion, hours of diversion and frequency of the diversion within the specified time period.

5. That any permits authorized pursuant to this Order shall not be valid for longer than 30 days after the date of this Order, unless the state of emergency is extended by joint resolution of the Legislature.

6. That this Order is not to be construed in any manner as limiting the statutory enforcement power of the Department of Natural Resources with respect to any violations of existing section 30.18, Wis. Stats., permits, any permits issued pursuant to this Order, any conditions of any such permits, or any diversions which occur without authorization pursuant to section section 30.18, Wis. Stats., or this Order.

7. That the Department of Natural Resources is authorized to rescind any emergency diversion permits granted herein if it becomes apparent that unduly adverse environmental effects are being caused or aggravated by said permits. Any permit rescission shall be in writing to the permittee.

In accordance with s. 601.427 (9), Wis. Stats., a report is to evaluate the impact that 1995 Wisconsin Act 10 has had on the following:

(a) The number of health care providers practicing in Wisconsin.

(b) The fees that health care providers pay under s. 655.27 (3), Wis. Stats.

(c) The premiums that health care providers pay for health care liability insurance,

was submitted to the legislature in May 2001. We have revised the report to clarify some of the figures included. The original report included statements regarding both a \$100 million and \$125 million reduction in fees. The actual amount should be \$125 million, which is the actual amount of loss reduction imbedded in the ultimate loss estimates, as a result of the Act 10. This reduction in the ultimate loss estimate translates to a \$60.8 million dollar reduction in fees collected under s. 655.27 (3), Wis. Stats., over the last seven years. However, it was further noted that loss experience to date is too immature to validate the reduction. I apologize for any confusion created by the report.

The attached report provides information regarding the background of Act 10, the statistics collected and the analyses performed.

As requested by the joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the Department of Health and Family Services' (DHFS's) prior authorization process for occupational, physical, and speech therapy services provided under the Medical Assistance program. Administrative code states that prior authorization is intended to safeguard against unnecessary or inappropriate care. In 1999, approximately 6,300 individuals received therapy services that required prior authorization; these services cost \$11.2 million.

From 1995 through June 2000, the average processing time for therapy prior authorization requests increased by 6.7 percent (1.1 working days), despite a decrease in the number of requests submitted and an increase in the number of staff processing requests. Longer processing times resulted primarily from increases in the percentage of incomplete requests returned to providers. In 1995, 43.9 percent of requests were returned at least once; in 1999, the rate of return was 49.5 percent.

We also examined denial rates for therapy prior authorization requests. We found that since 1997, denial rates have been substantially higher for school-age children than for other age groups. Unlike other age groups, school-age children can obtain services without prior authorization through the School-Based Services program. The Legislature created this program in 1995 to capture Medical Assistance funds for special education services. In 1992, 62 percent of Medical Assistance expenditures for therapy services for school-age children were paid to school-based providers. Community-based therapy providers and some parents believe

that the growth of the program has made it difficult to obtain approval for therapy services outside of school and that DHFS staff are inclined to deny community–based services to children receiving school-based services. However, we found that denial rates for community-based therapy were slightly lower for children receiving therapy through the School-Based Services program than they were for children who were not receiving therapy through that program.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHFS and the Department of Public Instruction. DHFS's response is the appendix.

1.Direct the PSC to not expend any funds over this biennium for the funding of voice mail for the homeless. 2.Direct the PSC to redirect, where permissible under the laws of Wisconsin, such monies for the purpose of funding programs that serve to provide food, shelter, health care or other related services to homeless persons.

3.Direct the PSC, in accordance with its authority, to suspend any administrative rule or provision providing for the funding of voice mail service for the homeless.

I have approved Senate Bill 55 as 2001 Wisconsin Act 16 and deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State.

The bill I am signing represents many difficult decisions made by a Legislature that remained focused on concluding a budget in a timely and orderly fashion. I commend the Legislature for its civility and commitment in crafting the most important piece of legislation in this legislative session. Despite constraints in revenue growth and the unfunded costs of new programs adopted in the previous legislative session, significant progress was made in a number of key policy areas, particularly economic growth, educational quality, health care for seniors and lower taxes.

Wisconsin's taxes remain too high. The 1999–2001 state budget took a serious step toward reducing our state's income tax burden by lowering rates eleven percent and this budget continues the trend of lowering the tax burden on Wisconsin citizens. Despite the severe financial constraints faced in developing this budget, taxes are further reduced by eliminating the income tax on military pensions and implementing the federal phase–out of the estate tax. While the Legislature chose to reinstate the estate tax in fiscal year 2003–04, I intend to restore the federal phase–out schedule in my next budget.

Future tax reductions will require continued robust economic growth. This budget includes a number of measures that will propel Wisconsin's economic engine to new heights, including the creation of eight new technology development zones and one agricultural development zone; an airline hub tax exemption for Wisconsin–based airlines, Midwest Express and Air Wisconsin; \$317 million in new biotechnology facilities through the University of Wisconsin's BioStar Initiative; and \$38 million for expanded information technology and biological sciences courses and other economic stimulus initiatives at the University of Wisconsin. All of these measures were included in my budget and represent further investments in Wisconsin's economic renaissance.

This budget also continues the trend of stabilizing the property tax burden by increasing school aids and shared revenue. Property taxes as a percent of ability to pay have dropped fourteen percent since controls on school revenues began in December 1993. This reduction is the result of balancing reasonable school cost growth (that has exceeded the rate of inflation), with continued investments in educational quality.

Since 1994, the first year that the school district allowable revenue formula was in place, the state has invested over \$2.6 billion in our local schools. This funding has served to reduce property taxes and increase educational quality. State taxpayers will spend almost \$100 million in school year 2002–03 to reduce class sizes in early grades through the Student Achievement Guarantee in Education (SAGE) program. School technology has increased exponentially with the \$290 million provided since 1998 for the Technology for Educational Achievement in Wisconsin (TEACH) program. Improved educational attainment for all Wisconsin children is also being supported through an eighteen percent increase in funding for school breakfasts and investments in the private and public school choice and charter school programs.

Many other significant needs are addressed in this budget. We take the lead in health care access for seniors by establishing a new prescription drug benefit for Wisconsin's greatest generation. We provide a significant increase to the Birth to Three and Family Support programs to assist disabled children and their families. We improve the environment and support economic development through expanding the brownfields redevelopment program and providing continued funding for recycling. We have funded additional prison capacity while also supporting community corrections efforts. We fully fund child care subsidies so that low–income individuals can work and seek more educational opportunities. We protect more of Wisconsin's pristine landscape through a \$112 million expansion of the Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program.

Wisconsin is on the right path, we're reducing taxes and investing in our future. Unfortunately, the budget I received from the Legislature included a number of initiatives that could divert us from this path. First and foremost, the Legislature ignored the significant investments it has made in educational quality and listened instead to calls for a return to unfocused school spending.

Exemptions to school district allowable revenues and modifications to the qualified economic offer for teacher compensation packages will further burden Wisconsin taxpayers with no clearly defined benefit to students. Wisconsin already spends generously on a per student basis, sixth highest in the country. Growth in school district costs has outpaced inflation since the allowable revenue formula was adopted in the 1993–95 budget. Compensation for Wisconsin teachers remains among the highest in the country and our class sizes among the smallest. And, most notably and most importantly, our students are the best and the brightest.

Can more be done? Yes. Should more be done? Absolutely. We must continue to focus on improving educational achievement for all students, from inner city Milwaukee to South Shore on Lake Superior. The bill I am signing includes relief to small school districts that must serve large geographic areas. It also supports the private school choice program, restores state funding for four-year-old kindergarten and expands charter schools. It prudently targets taxpayer dollars toward programs shown to be effective in improving student achievement.

Many school districts continue to offer wage and compensation increases to teachers that exceed the 3.8 percent that constitute a qualified economic offer. According to the American Federation of Teachers, Wisconsin ranks tenth nationally when comparing teacher salaries to annual private sector earnings. In addition, the recent Supreme Court decision upholding changes to the state retirement system will serve to provide school districts with an \$84 million windfall, much of which will translate into enhanced compensation packages for teachers.

My second major concern is the risk to our financial future by using over \$800 million of one-time funding measures to deliver a "balanced" budget. These measures include \$109 million from the intergovernmental transfer program for county and privately-owned nursing homes, \$100 million in borrowing to extend existing debt, \$50 million from reducing the statutory ending balance, \$450 million from the tobacco endowment fund and \$115 million from delaying a school aid payment. While my budget included \$350 million from the tobacco endowment fund as a "bridge" to get us to a firmer financial footing, the bill before me puts us on a bridge to financial risk and uncertainty. Financing the permanent spending supported by these one-time measures will likely consume all of the anticipated revenue growth in fiscal year 2003-04, making it extremely difficult to fund growth in existing programs such as school aids, medical assistance and the University of Wisconsin System.

These one-time measures, combined with payment shifts made in previous budgets and an unwillingness to create meaningful budget reserves, have weakened the state's standing in the eyes of financial markets. That weakness has manifested itself in a lower rating of creditworthiness on the state's bonds, raising the potential for higher borrowing costs. The financial cost of this lower rating pales in comparison to the perception that Wisconsin's finances are inherently unstable. This is not the message we want to deliver to businesses looking to expand operations or venture capitalists looking for fertile ground to grow high tech enterprises. We must act decisively to right our financial ship and keep our economy on a direction toward high wage, high skill employment.

To begin this transformation toward financial stability, I have used my veto power to eliminate the \$115 million school aid payment delay, and I have increased the statutory ending balance to 1.2 percent of appropriations and compensation reserves. We must live within our means. Just as a family cannot delay a mortgage payment without risking foreclosure, the state cannot continue to ignore today's obligations with promises to pay tomorrow.

In this budget, I remain committed to controlling school property taxes through the school district allowable revenue formula and to meeting the state's commitment to fund two-thirds of school costs. These goals must be accomplished honestly by paying the bills, as they come due, not by further shifts in paying school aids. We cannot responsibly meet these goals at the expense of the state's fiscal health and by extension threatening the stability of local government finances. While I cannot use my veto authority to restore the full 2002–03 school year payment, by law the Joint Committee on Finance must meet in June 2002 to review estimated school costs and set the school aid funding level.

I remain confident that our economy will show renewed vigor in the next two years, providing additional revenues for schools without the need to resort to budget gimmicks. However, even without further growth in revenues, I have aggressively vetoed spending increases and prudently built up the required general fund balance to ensure that the state's two-thirds school funding commitment will be met in full as it comes due.

In addition to vetoing the school aid payment delay and restoring the required general fund balance, I am acting to further improve the state's fiscal situation by directing the secretary of the Department of Administration to monitor the need for the \$100 million in debt restructuring authorized by the Legislature. We cannot afford to borrow money instead of making difficult decisions on budget priorities. In the event revenues grow faster than expected, the secretary of the Department of Administration will decide whether the issuance of these bonds is necessary.

I have also used my veto power to restore a four percent budget reduction for the Department of Public Instruction and a five percent reduction for the State Public Defender. When all state agencies, the Legislature and the courts are making budget reductions, we should not shield any administrative operations appropriations from sharing the burden. The reduction for the Department of Public Instruction exempts the state residential schools to reflect their direct service responsibilities.

The budget, as passed by the Legislature, also tapped questionable funding sources to support certain programs. For instance, use of growth in revenues from fines and forfeitures retained by counties is neither a stable nor realistic funding source for new district attorney positions. District attorneys face real world work load issues that are not addressed through unreliable funding sources. I support an increase in district attorney positions to address critical work load needs, but cannot agree to the funding source proposed by the Legislature. I urge the Joint Committee on Finance to consider meeting this need from a different source of funding through its authority under s. 13.10. My third major concern is the amount of bonding authorized in this budget. My proposed budget authorized \$522 million in new GPR-supported general obligation bonding in the 2001–03 biennium, a level calculated specifically to ensure that debt service payments would remain at 3.5 percent of total GPR revenue over the next decade. The budget passed by the Legislature contains \$564 million in new GPR-supported bonding authorizations for the 2001–03 biennium. This level of bonding means that debt service will increase as a percentage of total revenue. We should not incur new long–term debt of this magnitude. Debt service payments will increase by 9.4 percent in fiscal year 2002–03, while our GPR revenue will increase less than 4.5 percent. Therefore, my vetoes have reduced the total new bonding authorization amount by \$9 million to reduce the new debt we will incur to a more affordable level.

To improve the ending balance, I vetoed a total of \$62 million in additional GPR spending items approved by the Legislature. This is the largest amount of GPR budget savings ever realized in a biennial budget through gubernatorial vetoes and reflects the critical need to restore fiscal responsibility and stability. I also exercised a veto to increase the size of the balance we are required to maintain from 0.7 percent to 1.2 percent of GPR spending. Since many states maintain balances of at least five percent, we must continue toward the current law goal of 2 percent. The required balance is scheduled to grow to 1.6 percent as we enter the next biennium and we need to honor this commitment. Meeting this responsibility will require fiscal discipline and prudent management of resources. Therefore, I am very pleased that the budget I am signing takes a step in this direction by including a meaningful budget stabilization fund that will set-aside fifty percent of unanticipated revenues to help us avoid future budget crises.

From general purpose revenue, net spending will be \$11.4 billion in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$11.6 billion in fiscal year 2002–03, for a biennial total of \$23.0 billion. These figures represent annual spending increases of 3.0 percent and 1.7 percent, primarily due to increases in spending to meet our commitment to fund two–thirds of school costs, to reduce class sizes in early grades, to return inmates housed in out–of–state prisons to Wisconsin facilities, to implement a new prescription drug subsidy for seniors, to pay for increased child care and medical assistance costs for our low–income citizens, and to make investments in our higher education system. Total spending under the 2001–03 budget, as passed, is \$23.3 billion in fiscal year 2002–03, for a biennial total of \$46.8 billion.

I am signing this budget with a total of 315 vetoes. Many of these vetoes were needed to reduce spending by a total of \$62 million GPR. These vetoes will also reduce the structural deficit confronting the state in the next biennium. A number of these vetoes are technical in nature and were required to make provisions workable. A number of these vetoes curb the Legislature's involvement in the day–to–day management of state agencies by eliminating the most burdensome new reporting requirements. The Legislature has a legitimate interest in knowing how state programs are working, but it should not micromanage agencies or dictate agency work load through the budget bill.

The budget I introduced in February, and the Legislature passed, keeps Wisconsin moving ahead: growing our economy through lower taxes and targeted investments, improving

educational quality through innovative programs, and ensuring all citizens can access jobs, education and health care. Among the highlights are the following items:

Tax and Local Government Finance

- Eliminates the state income tax on military pensions and reduces the estate tax in fiscal year 2002–03. These changes reduce taxes by over \$37 million.
- Provides a property tax exemption for air carrier hub facilities.
- Increases the state cigarette tax by 18 cents to provide prescription drug benefits for eligible lower–income seniors.
- Provides an exemption from the sales tax for electricity sold to utilities by merchant power plants to encourage the development of adequate energy supplies in Wisconsin.
- Holds the total property tax burden per \$1,000 of personal income to 14 percent below December 1993 rates.
- Increases shared revenues, expenditure restraint payments, county mandate relief payments and small municipalities shared revenues by one percent annually in fiscal year 2002–03 and fiscal year 2003–04.
- Restores the municipal shared revenue formula in 2004 to ensure that state aid is delivered to communities with the greatest needs.
- Provides \$5.6 million in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$7.4 million in fiscal year 2002–03 to fully fund the personal property tax exemption for computer equipment. Business taxes are reduced by retaining exemptions for automated teller machines and expanding exemptions to copier and fax machines.
- Establishes a state spending cap to limit annual noneducation GPR spending increases to the increase in state personal income.
- Requires that fifty percent of unanticipated revenues be set aside in the state's budget stabilization fund to help avoid future budget crises and reduce Wisconsin's deficit under generally accepted accounting principles.
- Maintains the state's budgetary balance at 1.2 percent of spending instead of reducing the balance to a sixteen–year low of \$90 million.
- Creates a permanent endowment fund from tobacco securitization proceeds to support tobacco cessation and prevention efforts, provide interest earnings to the general fund and provide an offset to the state's \$1.2 billion deficit under generally accepted accounting principles.
- Implements full disclosure in budgeting by requiring state budget documents to state the impact of the proposed budget on future state finances and to report the estimated budget balance under generally accepted accounting principles.

Economic Development and Transportation

- Protects state residents from unwanted telephone sales calls by prohibiting telephone solicitors from calling those listed in a statewide no-call database.
- Preserves the application of the Wisconsin Consumer Act to rental purchase agreements.
- Improves highway safety and enhances economic development by increasing state and federal support for

highway construction projects and local transportation aids by over \$300 million over the biennium.

- Enumerates three new major highway projects: STH 17 in Oneida County; I–39/USH51 in Marathon County (Wausau Beltline); and STH 26 in Rock, Jefferson and Dodge counties.
- Provides over \$160 million over the biennium for reconstruction of the Marquette Interchange in the city of Milwaukee.
- Increases the basic allocations for local road improvement funding by providing a six percent annual increase for critical transportation infrastructure projects.
- Increases local transportation aids by four percent in calendar year 2002 and three percent in calendar year 2003 to meet rehabilitation and maintenance costs and to limit growth in property taxes.
- Increases state assistance to local transit systems by four percent in calendar year 2002 and two percent in calendar year 2003.
- Provides \$14 million over the biennium for brownfields assessment, remediation and redevelopment efforts.
- Creates technology development zones to enhance investment in high technology and create high-skill, high-wage jobs by providing credits against income, sales and property taxes for qualified businesses.
- Authorizes \$25 million in bonding for a biomedical technology research incubator at the Medical College of Wisconsin.
- Protects Wisconsin's critical animal agriculture industry by providing a 150 percent increase for the Johne's disease control program.
- Promotes economic development in the city of Beloit by designating a development opportunity zone and allocating \$4.7 million in tax credits to reward job creation and capital investment.
- Protects Wisconsin's agricultural and biotechnology industries by providing felony penalties for the intentional introduction of contagious disease into livestock or the intentional destruction of plants grown for commercial or research purposes.

Environmental Protection and Resource Management

- Supports efforts to protect children from pesticide exposure in schools by increasing notification requirements, ensuring pesticides are applied by licensed individuals and providing 1.0 FTE SEG position to continue and expand the Integrated Pest Management training program for school districts.
- Creates a Fox River Navigational System Authority governed by a nine-member board to repair and manage the system of locks on the Fox River.
- Enhances protection of Wisconsin's pristine natural resources by increasing bonding authorization for the Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program by \$112 million.
- Increases funding and positions for forestry operation and private forest landowner assistance by approximately \$4.5 million SEG and 15.0 FTE SEG positions in fiscal year 2001–02 and designates a chief state forester.
- Enhances control of invasive aquatic plants and animals by providing stronger enforcement authority and additional funding to the Department of Natural Resources.

- Enhances wetland protection efforts by providing \$196,900 SEG and 2.5 FTE positions over the biennium to implement the Wetlands Compensatory Mitigation program.
- Enhances local land use planning by providing additional funding for land information systems.
- Prohibits oil and gas drilling beneath the Great Lakes.
- Creates an Adopt–a–River program to encourage volunteers to oversee a section of a lake, river, wetland or ravine; conduct annual clean–ups; and ensure the long–term environmental health of the area.

Education and Training

- Provides \$380 million over the biennium to increase state aid to Wisconsin's elementary and secondary schools.
- Eliminates the delayed payment of \$115 million in general equalization aid to help restore sound fiscal practices to the state.
- Provides \$53.5 million GPR in additional funding to support full implementation of the Student Achievement Guarantee in Education (SAGE) program, which reduces class size in grades kindergarten through three, bringing the total funding of SAGE to \$95 million.
- Maintains existing level of state support for four-year-old kindergarten programs in public and choice schools.
- Provides an 18 percent increase in funding for the school breakfast program, which will allow for a significant expansion of participation rates.
- Provides a 10 percent increase in funding for the minority precollege scholarship program for middle and high school students to participate in challenging academic programs at Wisconsin's public and private colleges and universities.
- Creates a revenue limit adjustment for low enrollment districts with large geographical areas, which are experiencing declining enrollments.
- Provides \$195,000 GPR to support student organizations related to career and technical education.
- Authorizes the University of Wisconsin–Parkside to create a charter school in the Racine school district.
- Provides \$77.5 million in new GPR funding to the University of Wisconsin System, including \$38 million GPR to support initiatives for the Madison and Milwaukee campuses and to make systemwide investments that will expand enrollments in information technology and biotechnology.
- Authorizes a BioStar initiative and \$317 million in general fund supported borrowing over a ten-year period to attract federal and private funds for construction of biological sciences education and research activities at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.
- Provides \$6.4 million GPR to the Higher Educational Aids Board and the University of Wisconsin System to increase need–based financial aid programs.
- Provides \$500,000 to the University of Wisconsin Medical School for the purchase of a digital mammography machine.
- Authorizes the board of regents to use base funding to create GPR-funded faculty and academic staff positions.

- Provides an additional \$500,000 GPR over the biennium to the Wisconsin Technical College System to increase the availability of high demand courses.
- Increases funding for vocational rehabilitation services by \$2 million over the biennium, which will enable more of Wisconsin's disabled citizens to become part of Wisconsin's work force.

Human Resources

- Provides \$2 million GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$49.9 million GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 to implement the new Senior Care program, beginning September 1, 2002. Senior Care is the new prescription drug assistance program for Wisconsin residents who are 65 years of age or older and who meet certain eligibility criteria. An estimated 260,000 individuals will be eligible, making the program one of the most generous in the country.
- Provides a \$218 million increase to fully fund child care for both W-2 clients and for low-income working families.
- Provides \$17.3 million GPR over the biennium to increase funding for the Community Option Program (COP) and Community Integration Program (CIP).
- Provides a \$5 million GPR increase over the biennium for the Family Support and Birth to Three programs, which serve disabled children and their families.
- Provides an additional \$32 million GPR over the biennium to fully fund the BadgerCare program, which is available to all low–income children and their parents not covered by Medical Assistance.
- Provides an additional \$53 million SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$70 million SEG in fiscal year 2002–03 to nursing homes due in large part to their efforts to enhance the amount of federal intergovernmental transfer (IGT) funds received by the state.
- Provides an additional \$13.4 million SEG for hospitals and \$12.3 million SEG for noninstitutional providers over the biennium as a result of the receipt of the new IGT funds. **Justice**
- Provides funding to staff the following new and expanded correctional facilities: Stanley, New Lisbon, an expansion at Taycheedah, two inmate workhouses (located at Winnebago and Sturtevant), an addition to the Oshkosh segregation unit and the new Sturtevant Probation and Parole Holding Facility.
- Provides \$4.6 million GPR to increase purchase of services for offenders in the community.
- Provides \$4.2 million GPR to add 56.5 FTE probation and parole agents. The additional agents will provide an average agent to offender ratio of one agent to supervise 47 offenders.
- Provides additional resources for inmate health care needs including: the new Highview geriatric facility for male inmates, a new mental health unit for female inmates at the Taycheedah Facility, twenty additional nursing positions and staffing for 24–hour nursing coverage at the Columbia, Oakhill and Taycheedah facilities.
- Provides \$3 million GPR to increase funding for Youth Aids payments to counties. Youth Aids fund the cost of placements to juvenile correctional facilities and other juvenile delinquency related services.
- Provides \$3.5 million to improve the state's Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS).

- Provides \$450,000 GPR to increase reimbursement to counties for court interpreter services.
- Provides \$1.2 million of federal Byrne grant funds for a diversion program to encourage criminal justice agencies to collaboratively develop alternatives to incarceration for certain types of offenders.

State Government Operations

- Creates a new agency, the Department of Electronic Government, to strengthen the state's ability to plan and manage its information technology resources.
- Provides \$180 million to the general fund through eliminating vacancies, realizing savings from recent changes to the state retirement system and implementing five percent reductions in state operations appropriations to ensure a balanced budget.
- Enhances recruitment and retention in the Wisconsin National Guard by retaining a 100 percent tuition reimbursement program through a partial veto.
- Adds funding and positions to improve veterans benefits counseling.
- Provides \$45,000 annually for additional veterans benefits fairs and promotions.
- Increases tuition and fee reimbursement from 65 percent to 85 percent for veterans college and part–time study grant programs.
- Increases veterans emergency assistance grants funding by \$755,100.
- Authorizes 28.0 FTE positions and funding to staff the Southern Wisconsin Veterans Retirement Center.
- Expands veterans assistance centers by funding a new facility in Madison and expanding those at King and Southern Wisconsin Veterans Retirement Center.
- Increases funding by \$400,000 to support transportation services for disabled veterans.
- Funds a grant of \$200,000 to help establish a Milwaukee Veterans War Memorial Education Center.
- Adds 3.0 FTE and funding to strengthen enforcement in regulation and licensing.

There are also several budget provisions I did not veto that warrant discussion.

Shared Revenue - The budget bill includes one percent 1. annual increases in each of the next two years for local government shared revenue and related programs. Specifically, the bill includes a one percent increase for the 2002 payments for shared revenue, expenditure restraint, small municipality shared revenue and county mandate relief. Another one percent increase is provided to these same programs for the 2003 payments. The municipal shared revenue increases will be distributed across-the-board. Each municipality in 2002 and 2003 will receive a one percent increase over its prior year payment.

While I am approving these increases, we must not diminish our efforts to restructure the shared revenue formula. Instead, we should continue the rethinking of this billion dollar program begun by the Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission on State–Local Partnerships under Professor Don Kettl's visionary leadership. Consistent with the commission's goals, we must remake shared revenue to reward performance, increase accountability, eliminate incentives to spend, encourage cooperation and move Wisconsin toward a more competitive tax environment.

- 2. Property Tax Exemptions and Municipal Services – The budget bill includes a provision that clarifies exemptions for YMCA and YWCA facilities from local property taxes due to their status as charitable organizations. While I am very supportive of the services provided by these organizations, I am also very concerned about the impact these exemptions have on a competitive business The budget also authorizes local environment. governments to assess charges on tax-exempt organizations for certain services provided by a municipality, such as fire protection. I have used my veto power to remove this provision because it was meant to work within the broader package of reforms offered by the Kettl Commission and included in my budget, but not adopted by the Legislature. We must make progress on assigning appropriate tax status to certain organizations and implementing cost recovery mechanisms for local governments. I hope to build on the important progress made by the Kettl Commission in these policy areas and move toward meaningful change on issues of property tax exemptions, free market competition and municipal cost recovery issues.
- 3. Prescription Drugs This budget includes a new prescription drug benefit for Wisconsin seniors that leads the nation. Clearly, the prescription assistance program will meet a critical need for many low-income seniors. However, given the deficit we face in developing the 2003–05 budget, I am concerned about the program being considered an entitlement requiring increased funding every biennium. The Legislature designed the program so that if funding is insufficient to meet demand in any given year, the Department of Health and Family Services is required to create waiting lists. I am directing the department to lay out a clear and equitable process to address this legislative mandate in its administrative rules.
- 4. Chiropractic Claims The budget bill includes a provision that defines claims for payment of chiropractic services, with certain exceptions, as being overdue if not paid within thirty days after the insurer receives clinical documentation. My understanding is that property and casualty insurance or workers' compensation claims should not have been included in this requirement. I have requested the Commissioner of Insurance to work with affected parties to introduce separate legislation to clarify that this provision only applies to health insurance claims and not to property and casualty insurance or workers' compensation claims.
- 5. Child Care Subsidies Child care assistance is one of the key priorities for use of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding. However, we must not forget that the top priority for TANF funding is the Wisconsin Works (W–2) program. I am concerned that we may not always be able to fund growth in child care subsidies at the expense of the W–2 contracts and other related W–2 programs. In order to set priorities, the Legislature will, at some point, have to adopt the language I proposed allowing the administrative means if the need arises.
- 6. Recycling The budget bill increases the state recycling tipping fee to \$3.00 and provides \$24.5 million annually for municipal recycling grants in the 2001–03 biennium. At this level of support for local recycling programs,

Wisconsin has the most generous subsidy in the country. While I do not believe that tipping fees are the best funding source to support recycling costs, I am concerned that many out-of-state communities neighboring Wisconsin view our state as a dumping ground. A review of the average total tipping fees at out-of-state landfills located near Wisconsin's borders point to these landfills using tipping fees to discourage the dumping of Wisconsin waste. Wisconsin's average total tipping fee is \$38 per ton, and ranges from \$16 per ton to \$80 per ton. Average total tipping fees in Minnesota, Illinois and Michigan landfills near our state lines are \$54, \$44 and \$63 per ton, respectively. The range of tipping fees in Illinois varies from \$25 to \$152, with many of the higher cost landfills close to our border. I have retained the increase in the tipping fee to discourage other states from viewing Wisconsin as a dumping ground for their garbage.

However, I am not convinced that increasing expenditures for the current recycling programwill automatically lead to improvements in the amount of waste being recycled. Several other states have produced better results with less state support. I encourage the Department of Natural Resources to carefully review the recycling program here, and in other states, and develop a proposal for the 2003–05 biennial budget that will lead to better results without increasing expenditure levels.

7. Light Rail – The budget bill contains an extension of the prohibition on use of state or federal Interstate Cost Estimate (ICE) funds for costs related to light rail to June 30, 2002. I am not vetoing this provision, but I expect that the extension of this sunset will not affect the completion of the Kenosha–Racine–Milwaukee Transit Corridor Alternatives Analysis study that is being undertaken by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission. The use of the federal ICE funds allocated to several of the local governments in southeastern Wisconsin is governed by an agreement signed by those local governmental units. The state is not a party to those agreements and should not prevent implementation of those agreements.

I also want to commend the Legislature for improving its timeliness in completing a budget, limiting growth in spending and adopting measures I proposed to improve the state's fiscal stability. However, there is much more we can do to improve the budget process to ensure taxpayer dollars are used more efficiently to grow our economy, improve educational quality and create high skill, high wage employment. I will carefully consider such changes in my next budget.

Our state is rich in so many ways: abundant natural resources, a world class higher and elementary education system, a burgeoning technology economy, and an excellent quality of life. Wisconsin citizens also provide considerable resources to support programs at the state and local level. The bill I am signing seeks to ensure that we use those resources wisely now and in the future.

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A. EDUCATION AND TRAINING

HIGHER EDUCATIONAL AIDS BOARD

1. Minority Undergraduate Retention Grant Program Section 1382r

This section amends 39.44 (1) (b) by expanding the eligibility requirement for the Minority Undergraduate Retention Grants program to include freshmen.

I am vetoing this section because the original intent of this program is to retain students who are making satisfactory progress at postsecondary institutions. Expanding the program to freshmen significantly alters this intent and is likely to reduce grants to those students who are meeting the original intent of the program. Furthermore, freshmen students are eligible to receive grants from the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant and Tuition Grant programs, as well as the federal Pell Grant program.

2. Study on State Payment of Two Years of Postsecondary Education

Section 9101 (21g)

This section would require the Department of Administration to study the development and implementation of a tuition grant program that would pay the cost of two years of postsecondary education.

I am vetoing this provision because the Legislature does not need to create a statutory mandate to study this issue. The Legislature has the authority to direct the Joint Legislative Council, Legislative Fiscal Bureau or the Legislative Audit Bureau to undertake such a study.

3. Academic Excellence Scholarships for International Baccalaureate Degree Students Section 1381m

This provision would permit local school boards and the governing board of each private high school to award an Academic Excellence Scholarship to the senior with the highest grade point average in the International Baccalaureate Degree program.

I am vetoing this provision because it could potentially deny Academic Excellence Scholarships to students who have higher grade point averages in demanding curricula other than the International Baccalaureate Degree program. The intent of the scholarships is to reward students with the highest grade point average in their respective schools. Although I support participation in the International Baccalaureate Degree program and recognize its challenging curriculum, I do not believe it is fair to single out one program in state statute for favored treatment.

MEDICAL COLLEGE OF WISCONSIN

4. Domestic Abuse Training Requirements Section 1379t

This provision requires the Medical College of Wisconsin to increase the amount of domestic abuse training it provides to medical students.

I am vetoing this provision because the Medical College of Wisconsin already provides domestic abuse training to medical students. The provision also does not define increased training or demonstrate that current training by the Medical College is inadequate. This provision could have an unintended impact on curriculum development that could raise accreditation concerns.

In addition, the provision was apparently added to the budget bill without the involvement of the Wisconsin Coalition Against Domestic Violence, the Wisconsin Women's Health Foundation or the Department of Health and Family Services. These organizations are currently involved in a two-and-one-half year project to review domestic violence standards and protocols. It is appropriate to wait until the project is completed before considering changes to existing training efforts.

PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

5. Delay of \$115,000,000 of School Aids to July 2003

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (am)], 546m, 2767f, 2767m, 2777g, 2777r, 2779 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (am)] and 2779m [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (am)]

These sections delay \$115,000,000 of school aids that should be paid in fiscal year 2002–03 until fiscal year 2003–04. In addition, \$700,000 GPR is appropriated for interest due on the delayed aid payment.

I am vetoing these provisions because the Legislature cannot increase the amount of delayed payments without placing the state's financial future at considerable risk. Previous budgets have delayed over \$940,000,000 in payments to local governments to allow for more spending. Further increasing the amount of delayed payments weakens our standing in the eyes of financial markets, increasing the potential for higher interest costs to state and local governments due to downgrading of the creditworthiness of the state's general obligation bonds.

The payment delay reflects an inability to prioritize spending. It conceals an unwillingness to fund two-thirds of local school costs within the state's fiscal year in order to allow more spending in other areas. As difficult as the choices in this budget have been, future budget choices will be much tougher if the delay is accepted.

We should not worsen our financial fundamentals by accepting this payment shift. According to generally accepted accounting principles, Wisconsin already has the worst budget imbalance in the country. The general fund must now regularly borrow hundreds of millions of dollars for operations just to pay bills on time. We have reached the point where further payment shifts place the state's finances at extreme risk.

Jeopardizing our financial future does a disservice to Wisconsin's local governments and its citizens. Delaying decisions on the tough choices only makes those choices more difficult. This puts those dependent on state government at even greater risk in the future. All are better served by truth–in–budgeting and ensuring the state can pay its bills on time.

While I cannot use my veto authority to increase school aid, I am still committed to meeting two-thirds of local school costs. Under current law, the Joint Committee on Finance is required to set the school aid funding level for fiscal year 2002–03 by June 30, 2002. I remain convinced that the state's economy will show increased vigor in the months ahead. However, in the event that revenues do not change from current estimates, the significant savings generated by my vetoes provides sufficient revenues for the Joint Committee on Finance to buy back the school aid payment delay.

Revenue Limit Flexibility

6.

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (ac)], 2798s and 9340 (14c)

This provision allows any school board, on a two-thirds vote, to increase its allowable revenue per student above the amount that would be permitted under current law. The provision also includes an adjustment linking the maximum size of the allowable increase, measured on a percentage basis, to a district's equalized property value per pupil; the lower the property value, the larger the increase. On a statewide basis, the average increase would equal 0.78 percent of the allowable revenue per student. I am vetoing this provision because it is likely to

I am vetoing this provision because it is likely to be inadequately funded, and it will have a negative effect on the state's overall fiscal condition. The Legislature included \$15,000,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$30,000,000 in fiscal year 2002–03 to support this provision. The increase is based on the assumption that 37.5 percent of the available revenue limit flexibility will be used in 2001–02 and 75 percent in 2002–03. However, if the school boards representing the seventeen districts receiving the largest allowable increases make full use of their flexibility, the \$15,000,000 provided in 2001–02 to cover the state's two-thirds share will be exceeded. Any shortfall could increase local property taxes. If all districts make full use of the available flexibility in both years, the state would fall \$33,000,000 short of its commitment to fund two-thirds of the added spending. In addition, districts already have the authority to exceed limits through the referendum process.

This budget will include a \$53,450,000 increase in funding for the Student Achievement Guarantee in Education (SAGE) program, which will greatly expand the state's efforts to reduce class size in grades kindergarten through three. This will bring total funding of the SAGE program to \$95,029,600 in the 2002-03 school year. In addition, my veto of the provision that would have reduced funding for four-year-old kindergarten programs (see Department of Public Instruction, Item #7) will put more state resources into this important early learning program. Furthermore, the per student inflationary increases allowed under current law will add almost \$600,000,000 in state and local school spending over the biennium. School districts will also be receiving an estimated \$84,000,000 in credits under a premium holiday related to unfunded accrued liabilities within the Wisconsin Retirement System, authorized in 1999 Wisconsin Act 11. In addition, I have approved funding to allow small districts serving large geographic areas to exceed the allowable school revenue limits.

The most recent national survey of school spending by Education Week magazine ranks Wisconsin sixth in spending per student. Clearly, this budget increases the state's already strong commitment to elementary and secondary education. Funding additional revenue limit flexibility, beyond these commitments, would severely strain the state's resources and increase local property taxes. By lining out the Department of Public Instruction's s. 20.255 (2) (ac) appropriation for general equalization aids and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$15,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$16,000,000 in fiscal year 2002–03, I am partially vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. This partial veto retains \$14,000,000 in fiscal year 2002–03 to fund the cost of my veto of changes to the four-year-old kindergarten membership count (see Department of Public Instruction, Item #7). I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

7. Four–Year–Old Kindergarten Membership

Sections 2749m, 2761d, 2761g, 2764m, 2779 [as it relates to the amount of any revenue limit increase], 2788m, 2798L, 9140 (10f) and 9340 (8h)

This provision reduces state funding for four-year-old kindergarten programs, beginning in the 2002-03 school year, by reducing the maximum full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment count that is eligible for state aid from 0.5 FTE to 0.3 FTE per enrolled pupil in a regular program and from 0.6 FTE to 0.4 FTE in an expanded program. The provision also includes a revenue limit exemption that would authorize school boards to increase local property taxes to offset the loss in state support.

I am vetoing this provision to restore the current level of state support for four-year-old kindergarten. Research has shown that early education is an important factor in academic achievement as students progress through the educational system. This is especially true for from economically disadvantaged pupils backgrounds. As we expect our children to learn more, we need to give them more opportunities to learn. Four-year-old kindergarten programs can serve as a valuable companion to the Student Achievement Guarantee in Education (SAGE) program, which reduces class size in grades kindergarten through three. Working together these programs can provide children solid foundation for continued with а achievement.

Under a separate veto of the revenue limit flexibility provision (see Department of Public Instruction, Item #6), I have also reversed the \$14,000,000 reduction in general equalization aids related to this provision. By deleting only \$16,000,000 of the \$30,000,000 included by the Legislature to fund the revenue limit flexibility provision in fiscal year 2002–03, \$14,000,000 is available to maintain the current level of support for four–year–old kindergarten programs.

While this lower reduction restores the funding to reflect the costs of these programs, it is not possible through a veto to properly split the funding between the appropriations affecting public schools and the Milwaukee Parental Choice program for four-year-old kindergarten programs. Based on current estimates of fiscal 2002–03 costs, \$700,000 vear of the \$14,000,000 restored through this veto should be added to the appropriation for the Milwaukee Parental Choice program. The proper distribution of these funds can be addressed when the Joint Committee on Finance meets in June 2002 to determine the general equalization amount for fiscal year 2002-03.

8. High School Graduation Test

Sections 2703m, 2707m and 2718m This provision delays implementation of the high school graduation test from the 2002–03 school year to the 2004–05 school year.

I am vetoing this provision to restore the implementation date to the 2002–03 school year. The Department of Public Instruction has been developing the high school graduation test for the past several years and is nearing completion of a version that it planned to pilot in the 2001–02 school year. School districts and pupils have also been preparing for implementation. To delay the test at this late date is unfair to those who are expecting implementation in 2002–03. It also damages the state's credibility with the educational community, which has made a considerable investment in getting ready for the test.

In addition, a two-year delay would require the department to repeat much of the work that has already been done at an additional cost to state taxpayers. Finally, it is critically important that greater accountability at a statewide level be

expected from a system educating over 850,000 pupils at a cost that will exceed \$8 billion by the 2002–03 school year. The high school graduation test is an important part of that accountability.

It is not possible, through a veto, to restore the \$9,300,000 included in my original budget request for continued development and implementation of the test. However, the federal government is currently considering funding to support the federal testing initiative in grades three through eight. Should that funding become available, the department should be able to reallocate existing state support for testing in the elementary grades to the high school graduation test. If additional federal funding is not forthcoming, I will propose separate legislation to address the implementation of the high school graduation test.

9. Calculator Use on Statewide Fourth–Grade Examination Sections 2709m and 9340 (16c)

This provision prohibits pupils, beginning in the 2002–03 school year, from using calculators while taking the statewide fourth–grade examination.

I am vetoing this provision because one of Wisconsin's model academic standards, which were developed under a process approved by the Legislature, requires fourth-grade pupils to "select and efficiently use appropriate computational procedures such as . . . using a calculator." The current fourth-grade examination already includes a mathematical section where calculator use is prohibited. While I fully support the development of strong mathematical skills that do not rely on the use of a calculator, I also recognize that being able to use a calculator properly is both necessary in today's society and allows pupils to solve more complicated and interesting problems.

10. Study on School Financing

Section 9140 (10k)

This provision requests the Joint Legislative Council to conduct a study of school financing.

I am vetoing this provision because the Legislature already has the authority to request a study without a nonstatutory provision.

11. Special Education Study

Section 9140 (10fm)

This provision requests the Joint Legislative Council to conduct a study of the criteria used to determine a pupil's need for special education services.

I am vetoing this provision because the Legislature already has the authority to request a study without a nonstatutory provision.

12. University of Wisconsin Special Education Study

Sections 1351zb and 2638m

This provision requires the board of regents to direct the University of Wisconsin–Madison's School of Education and Department of Neurology to study methods of identifying and remediating special education pupils with dyslexia and irlen syndrome and to distribute the completed report to each school district.

I am vetoing these provisions because the Legislature and the university have the authority to conduct a study without a budget provision. Furthermore, while I believe this research could be of significant value, the University of Wisconsin does not require statutory language to conduct studies. In light of the potential value of research on dyslexia and irlen syndrome, I strongly encourage the board of regents to direct that such a study be done.

13. Minority Group Pupil Scholarships

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (3) (fz)]

This provision increases funding for minority group pupil scholarships by \$450,000 GPR in fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03.

I am partially vetoing this provision because I object to providing a 29.5 percent increase to this program at a time when the state faces significant fiscal constraints. By lining out the Department of Instruction's s. 20.255 Public (3) (fz) appropriation for minority group pupil scholarships and writing in smaller amounts that delete \$450,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$297,500 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03, I am vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. This will still provide the Minority Group Pupil Scholarship program with a ten percent increase in fiscal year 2002-03. The program also received a 45 percent increase in the 1999–2001 biennial budget.

14. Wisconsin Educational Opportunity Program Study Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (1)]

(a)]

This section provides \$50,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 to the Department of Public Instruction to study the effectiveness of the programs that comprise the Wisconsin Educational Opportunity Program.

I am vetoing this provision because the department can conduct this study without being required to do so by statute.

Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in the Conference Committee amendment to the bill. By lining out the department's s. 20.255 (1) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes the \$50,000 GPR provided for this purpose in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing that part of the bill which funds the Wisconsin Educational Opportunity Program study. The appropriation under s. 20.255 (1) (a) is also reduced by my veto of the department's exclusion from base budget reductions (see Department of Public Instruction, Item #18). Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

15. Aid to Public Library Systems

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (3) (e)]

This provision increases funding for public library systems by \$250,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03.

I am vetoing this provision because it increases expenditure authority for this appropriation at a time when the state is experiencing significant financial constraints. In addition, aid to public library systems received an 11.3 percent increase in the 1999–2001 biennial budget.

Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in the Conference Committee amendment to the bill. By lining out the Department of Public Instruction's s. 20.255 (3) (e) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes the \$250,000 GPR provided for this purpose in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing that part of the bill which funds the increase to public library system aids. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

16. Library Service Contracts

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (3) (ea)]

This provision increases funding for library service contracts by \$97,300 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$125,300 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03.

I am vetoing this provision because it increases expenditure authority for this appropriation at a time when the state is experiencing significant financial constraints. In addition, payments for library service contracts received a 7.6 percent increase in the 1999–2001 biennial budget.

Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in the Conference Committee amendment to the bill. By lining out the Department of Public Instruction's s. 20.255 (3) (ea) appropriation and writing in smaller amounts that delete the \$97,300 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and the \$125,300 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing that part of the bill which funds the increase to library service contracts. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

17. Wisconsin Educational Services Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

Sections 181m, 371b, 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (1) (b), s. 20.255 (1) (c), s. 20.255 (1) (gb), s. 20.255 (1) (gh), s. 20.255 (1) (gL), s. 20.255 (1) (gs) and s. 20.255 (1) (gt)], 541r, 542, 545d, 545f, 545h, 545j, 545L, 1381g, 1381p, 1381r, 1416 [as it relates to the Wisconsin Educational Services Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing], 1489m, 1789b, 1789c, 1789d, 2639m, 2660m, 2660r, 2660t, 2661m, 2661p, 2661r,

2661t, 2662g, 2764c, 2779s, 3938s and 9140 (3q)

These provisions would expand the mission of the Wisconsin School for the Deaf by creating the Wisconsin Educational Services Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. The purpose of this program would be to serve as a statewide educational resource for children with hearing impairments and their families.

I am vetoing these provisions because they would create future funding expectations at a time when the state is experiencing significant financial constraints. Any expansion of the Wisconsin School for the Deaf's mission would necessitate additional financial input from the state to implement. I am reluctant to commit in advance to such a use of state resources given current state financial trends.

In addition, this proposal was included in the budget without the type of full legislative study conducted by the Joint Legislative Council prior to the expansion of the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped's mission in the 1999–2001 biennial budget. I do not oppose a legislative analysis of expanding the Wisconsin School for the Deaf's mission.

The effect of this veto will be to delete any changes to current law and to restore the Wisconsin School for the Deaf's existing mission.

18. Base Budget Reduction

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (1) (a)]

This provision provides \$12,502,400 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$12,747,400 in fiscal year 2002–03 for the Department of Public Instruction's central office operations. Although there is no language in the bill that authorizes this level of funding, the restoration of the five percent base reduction proposed in my budget request was included in Conference Committee amendment to the bill.

By lining out the department's s. 20.255 (1) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$723,000 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$723,000 in fiscal year 2002-03, I am vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (1) (a)] to provide for a base budget reduction of four percent in each year of the biennium. The appropriation under s. 20.255 (1) (a) is also reduced by my veto of the Wisconsin Educational Opportunity Program study (see Department of Public Instruction, Item #14). There is no compelling reason to exclude the department's central office operations from any base budget reductions. A base budget reduction to the department's central operations will have no impact on the financial resources available to individual school districts. This veto retains the exemption from base reductions for the two residential schools operated by the department and requires a smaller reduction to the department's central operations than what is required of most other state agencies. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

TEACH WISCONSIN

19. Museum Eligibility for Telecommunications Access Program Services

Section 1416 [as it relates to museums]

This provision would allow museums to participate in TEACH's telecommunications access program, which is funded by the universal service fund.

I am partially vetoing this provision because the cost of the expansion would lead to additional charges on consumers' monthly phone bills at a time when universal service fund charges to consumers are significant. In addition, the definition of museum is vague and overly broad. The effect of this veto will be to delete museum eligibility for TEACH's telecommunications access program.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

20. Nonresident Student Tuition and Base Reduction

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.285 (1) (a)] and 9156 (3pn)

Section 9156 (3pn) requires the board of regents to increase nonresident undergraduate tuition by 2.5 percent in each year of the 2001–03 biennium in addition to the regular tuition increases approved by the board.

I am partially vetoing this provision to increase the amount of the surcharge to five percent in each year. I believe the high quality of a University of Wisconsin education justifies increasing tuition for nonresident undergraduates. For example, the University of Wisconsin-Madison's nonresident undergraduate tuition is currently \$6,000 less than the nonresident tuition charged at the University of Michigan. Even with a five percent annual surcharge, the difference would still be approximately \$4,500.

The increased revenue obtained from the five percent surcharge will allow for additional reductions to the state's general purpose revenue spending, thereby helping to improve the state's overall fiscal condition. By lining out University of Wisconsin the System's s. 20.285 (1) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$2,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$4,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03, I am vetoing the part of the bill that reflects my intent to use the additional revenue from increasing the nonresident undergraduate tuition to replace GPR. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

21. Transfer of Credits Between the University of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin Technical College System

Sections 1351x and 1370m

Section 1351x requires the University of Wisconsin System institutions to accept all general education credits transferred from both the Wisconsin Technical College System and from within the University of Wisconsin System, as well as credits included in cooperative agreements between the two systems. The provision also authorizes the Assembly and Senate Committees on Higher Education to block credits on a case–by–case basis, by a majority vote. Section 1370m requires the Wisconsin Technical College System to accept credits transferred between its campuses and from the University of Wisconsin System institutions.

I am vetoing sections 1351x and 1370m because I believe the University of Wisconsin System and Wisconsin Technical College System should continue to expand the number of transferable credits through the plan developed under the 1999–2001 biennial budget act. I fully support increasing the ease of movement between Wisconsin institutions of higher learning. As the economy becomes more knowledge-based, many workers with less than baccalaureate degrees are finding it necessary to pursue additional postsecondary education in order to advance in their careers. However, in order to maintain the academic quality of both systems, I believe it is more appropriate for the decisions to be made through existing negotiations between the two systems than by legislative mandate. I urge the University of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin Technical College Systems to continue their dialogue toward establishing a credit transfer policy.

I am retaining the provision that requires regular reporting on progress in implementing the credit transfer plan. This should provide policymakers with up–to–date information on credit transfer arrangements.

22. Sex Offender Notification

Sections 1351zd, 3352p, 3352w and 9311 (7c)

Section 3352p requires the Department of Corrections to immediately provide to the board of regents detailed information regarding registered sex offenders who are either employed by the University of Wisconsin or are students attending a University of Wisconsin institution. Section 1351zd requires the board of regents to provide the information received from the Department of Corrections regarding registered sex offenders to students attending the institutions at which the registered sex offenders are employed or attend and to the students' parents or guardians.

I am vetoing this provision in its entirety. While I agree with the intent of this provision to protect the well-being of students at the University of Wisconsin, I am concerned that the provision as drafted may not accomplish its intended purpose. By limiting the information to registered sex offenders who are employed by or attend the University of Wisconsin, the provision does not provide students with information about other registered sex offenders who may live in the same community, but are not associated with the university. Should a registered sex offender be a threat to the safety of students, it is as likely to be someone not affiliated with the University of Wisconsin as it is a fellow student or employee. Current law authorizes law enforcement agencies to provide other organizations with the same information required under this provision if the law enforcement agencies determine that providing this information is necessary to protect the public. In the case of the University of Wisconsin, the information provided could include registered sex offenders not affiliated with the university. I request that the board of regents make use of the authority under current law to obtain information on registered sex offenders in those communities where the university has a presence.

In addition, I urge the Department of Corrections to consider adding the University of Wisconsin to the list of organizations to which the department can directly provide information on request under the s. 301.46 (4) (a) 14. If the department has legal concerns about its authority under this provision, I will support the introduction of legislation to include the board of regents on the statutory list. The effect of this veto will be to provide students with more comprehensive information on registered sex offenders than would be provided under this provision.

23. Resident Tuition for Certain Undocumented Persons

Section 1360m

This section provides an exemption from nonresident tuition to citizens of other countries who are not citizens of the United States, if they graduate from a Wisconsin high school (or receive a Wisconsin graduation equivalency), reside in the state for three years following high school graduation and submit an affidavit of their intent to apply for permanent residency as soon as they are eligible.

I am vetoing this provision because under the federal Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996, aliens who are not lawfully present in the United States are not eligible for any postsecondary education benefit based on residency in a specific state unless all legal residents of the United States are eligible for the same benefit. Under this act, all nonresident students would be eligible for resident tuition if that benefit is provided to persons living in Wisconsin who are not citizens or permanent residents of the United States. I object to potentially obligating state taxpayers to subsidize the tuition of out–of–state students.

Similar legislation passed by the California Legislature was recently vetoed by Governor Gray Davis due to concerns about the requirements of federal law and the potential cost to the state. While I appreciate the academic accomplishments many noncitizens have made in Wisconsin high schools, until Congress changes the eligibility status of undocumented persons for this benefit, the focus of taxpayer subsidized postsecondary education needs to remain on students who are legal residents of the state.

24. Provide Full Fringe Benefits to Certain Limited Term

Appointments at the University of Wisconsin–Madison

Section 9156 (3e)

This section requires the University of Wisconsin–Madison to provide paid vacation and sick leave benefits to limited term appointment employees (LTEs) who meet the requirements of participating employees as defined in section 40.02 (46).

While I support the pilot program to convert fifty long-term LTE positions to permanent status, included under another provision of this bill, I am vetoing the extension of benefits to other LTE employees who are not granted permanent status. Extending benefits to these employees raises issues with respect to the classified civil service system, to LTE positions in other state agencies, which are excluded by this provision, and to the cost of this expansion. This is an issue that should only be considered after a complete and objective analysis, including a review of the results of the fifty LTE conversion pilot program.

25. Tribal Logo Development

Section 1351t

This provision creates a requirement that the Robert M. La Follette Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Wisconsin–Madison develop a tribal logo that is representative of federally recognized American Indian tribes and bands in Wisconsin for use on official state notifications of grants funded all or in part by Indian gaming receipts.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. It is not appropriate to assign the task of developing a tribal logo to a school of public policy. In addition, the development of and use of a tribal logo for state notifications does not require a statutory mandate.

26. Domestic Abuse Training Requirements

Section 1351za

This provision requires the University of Wisconsin System board of regents to increase the amount of domestic abuse training it provides to medical and nursing students.

I am vetoing this provision because the University of Wisconsin already provides domestic abuse training to medical and nursing students. The provision also does not define increased training or demonstrate that current training by the university is inadequate.

In addition, the provision was apparently added to the budget bill without the involvement of the Wisconsin Coalition Against Domestic Violence, the Wisconsin Women's Health Foundation or the Department of Health and Family Services. These organizations are currently involved in a two-and-one-half year project to review domestic violence standards and protocols. It is appropriate to wait until the project is completed before considering changes to existing training efforts.

27. Study of Postsecondary Education Commission Section 9101 (21jm)

This section requires the Department of Administration to conduct a study of the feasibility of creating a Postsecondary Education Commission to provide a comprehensive and coordinated framework for all postsecondary education and training and report the study results to the Legislature by January 1, 2003.

I am vetoing this provision because the Legislature does not need a statutory mandate to study this issue. The Legislature has the authority to direct the Joint Legislative Council, Legislative Fiscal Bureau or the Legislative Audit Bureau to undertake such a study.

28. Aquaculture Demonstration Facility

Section 1349v

This provision prohibits any person from releasing sturgeon raised in an aquaculture demonstration facility into any natural body of water in the state.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary and may inhibit research. Under existing law, the rearing of lake sturgeon in an aquaculture facility is limited to the Department of Natural Resources. In addition, current law prohibits any person from releasing fish into the waters of the state without a permit from the department and also explicitly prohibits the release of any species of lake sturgeon. I believe these existing provisions adequately protect the state's natural fish stock.

The original intent of the Joint Committee on Finance was to limit the prohibition to commercially-bred sturgeon. However, as drafted, the provision applies to all sturgeon. Given the broad wording of the initiative, concerns have been raised that it could have a chilling effect on the ability of researchers in their efforts to improve the quality and productivity of fish farming in the state. The effect of this veto will be to maintain current law. I would consider legislation that was more narrowly drafted.

WISCONSIN TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM

29. Funding for Assistive Technology Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (cs)] and 582w

These sections create a new annual appropriation and provide \$300,000 GPR in the 2001–03 biennium to expand the availability of assistive technology to technical college students and graduates.

While I believe that individuals with disabilities are part of the solution to Wisconsin's skilled labor shortage, I am vetoing these provisions in their entirety because of the fiscal constraints facing the state. In addition, the budget includes a \$2,000,000 GPR increase for vocational rehabilitation services in the Department of Workforce Development. This program was recently praised by federal officials as a national leader in providing vocational rehabilitation services. The additional funding should greatly improve access to assistive technology for those citizens who need it and help more individuals with disabilities enter the state's work force.

30. Funding for Grants for Additional Course Sections

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (er)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (er)] provides \$750,000 GPR annually to increase funding in the Grants for Additional Course Sections appropriation. This program awards grants to help technical college districts add course sections in areas of high demand. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in the Conference Committee amendment to the budget bill.

I am vetoing this provision to reduce the size of the increase to \$250,000 annually because I object to providing a 34 percent increase to a program that is just completing its first year of operation. I am sympathetic to the frustrations of students who are on waiting lists to take courses that are in high demand. My veto will still provide an 11.4 percent increase in this grant program. This will enable technical colleges to further increase course sections to meet student and employer demands but in a more fiscally prudent way. By lining out the Wisconsin Technical College System's s. 20.292 (1) (er) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$500,000 GPR provided for this purpose in each year, I am partially vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

31. Funding for Additional Incentive Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (dc)] and 1374m

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (dc)] provides \$750,000 GPR annually for Incentive Grants. Section 1374m requires the Wisconsin Technical College System Board to award this amount to technical college districts that are at or near the 1.5 mill property tax levy limit.

I am vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.292 (1) (dc)] because I object to increasing GPR spending to support new eligibility categories for Incentive Grants at a time when the state faces significant fiscal constraints. I support expanding the eligible uses of Incentive Grants to include addressing limited fiscal capacity, but this must be done through the efficient and effective management of existing resources. By lining out the Wisconsin Technical College System's s. 20.292 (1) (dc) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$750,000 GPR provided for this purpose in each year, I am vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

I am partially vetoing Section 1374m so that the board retains the authority to award Incentive Grants for this purpose, but without the need to promulgate rules. This will provide the state board with additional flexibility in allocating Incentive Grants within the eligible categories.

32. Modify the Composition of the Committee that Appoints the Milwaukee Area Technical College District Board Section 1369m

Section 1369m modifies the composition of the committee that appoints the Milwaukee Area Technical College district board. This section would require the four appointment committee members selected by the Milwaukee Board of School Directors to be members of the Milwaukee Board of School Directors.

I am vetoing section 1369m because this provision contradicts an existing statutory requirement, which is retained in the budget bill, that Milwaukee Board of School Directors appointments to the committee reflect the distribution of women and minorities within Milwaukee. Since the composition of the elected Milwaukee Board of School Directors does not necessarily always reflect the distribution of women and minorities, requiring the Milwaukee Board of School Directors' four appointments to be board members makes it difficult to meet this goal. The effect of this veto will be to retain the authority of the Milwaukee Board of School Directors to make appointments that do, to the extent possible, reflect the distribution of women and minorities in Milwaukee.

33. Domestic Abuse Training Requirements

Section 1370n

This provision requires the technical college district boards to increase the amount of domestic abuse training they provide to nursing students.

I am vetoing this provision because Wisconsin's technical colleges already provide domestic abuse training to nursing students. The provision also does not define increased training or demonstrate that current training by technical colleges is inadequate.

In addition, the provision was apparently added to the budget bill without the involvement of the Wisconsin Coalition Against Domestic Violence, the Wisconsin Women's Health Foundation or the Department of Health and Family Services. These organizations are currently involved in a two-and-one-half year project to review domestic violence standards and protocols. It is appropriate to wait until the project is completed before considering changes to existing training efforts.

B. ENVIRONMENTAL AND COMMERCIAL RESOURCES AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND

CONSUMER PROTECTION

1. Telephone Solicitation Regulation

Sections 2429d, 2437b, 2439b, 2443b, 2444b [as it relates to the manner of the

recipient's request and to contributions, donations, grants or pledges], 2446b, 2446f [as it relates to penalty amounts] and 2819b [as it relates to contributions, donations, grants or pledges]

These provisions relate to new regulations creating a "no–call" database maintained by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Section 2429d establishes a supplemental forfeiture not to exceed \$10,000 for violations of the telephone solicitation regulations involving calls to the elderly or disabled.

Sections 2437b and 2439b define the terms "affiliate" and "nonprofit organization," respectively. Section 2443b prohibits nonprofit organizations or their employees or contractors from making telephone solicitations to residential customers who have provided a no–call request to the nonprofit by telephone, mail or facsimile. Section 2444b [as it relates to the manner of the recipient's request] allows calls in response to the recipient's express written request.

Section 2446b creates a private cause of action for violations of the telephone solicitation provisions. Section 2446f [as it relates to penalty amounts] establishes penalties of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for each general violation and not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$10,000 for each violation of the no-call provisions.

Section 2819b [as it relates to contributions, donations, grants or pledges] defines telephone solicitation to include calls made to solicit contributions, donations, grants or pledges.

I am vetoing sections 2439b and 2443b and partially vetoing sections 2444b [as it relates to contributions, donations, grants or pledges] and 2819b [as it relates to contributions, donations, grants or pledges] because I object to the regulation of requests for contributions by nonprofit organizations and charities.

I am vetoing section 2429d and partially vetoing section 2446f [as it relates to penalty amounts] to provide for penalties of \$100 per violation because the penalties included in the bill are excessive. Each call in violation of the law is a separate offense, so with my veto, frequent violators face large total forfeitures while businesses that make occasional mistakes will not face penalties that could threaten their ability to remain in business. Furthermore, the elderly and disabled supplemental forfeiture already applies to a variety of fraudulent and deceptive practices targeted at these individuals. It is not necessary to impose a penalty that would apply to possibly mistaken telephone calls.

I am vetoing section 2437b because the definition is vague, leaves loopholes to the telephone solicitation restrictions and fails to allow legitimate calls by certain businesses. I am requesting the department to define the term "affiliate" in administrative rule in consultation with the Legislature, consumer groups and businesses.

I am vetoing section 2446b because it is unnecessary. The bill allows the department to investigate violations and bring actions to prohibit further violations or collect forfeitures. Since individual monetary damages from telephone solicitation are generally low, the allowance of a private cause of action could encourage frivolous litigation.

I am partially vetoing section 2444b [as it relates to the manner of the recipient's request] because requiring a potential customer to make an "express written" request for a call would prevent businesses from responding to voicemail, email or facsimile messages by potential customers.

My vetoes retain the creation of a no-call database and the ability of the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to investigate and assess penalties for violations. It is important that individuals be able to control the types of telephone calls they receive, but this must be balanced against the right of organizations and businesses to contact potential contributors and customers. My vetoes create this balance by providing individuals the opportunity to be listed in the no-call database while allowing nonprofit organizations and businesses to continue to operate and determine which method of contacting individuals is most cost-effective.

2. Arsenic in Wood

Sections 2394p [as it relates to the report to the Legislature and the promulgation of rules] and 9104 (2k)

These provisions require the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection and the Department of Commerce, by June 30, 2002, to report to the Legislature the results of their review of the scientific evidence concerning the likelihood that wood treated with arsenic is harmful to the environment or to human health. If the departments determine that there is substantial likelihood of such harm, the departments must jointly promulgate rules restricting the use of arsenic treated wood. Violations of these rules will be subject to a forfeiture of not more than \$500. In addition, the departments must submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance recommending ways to keep arsenic treated wood from being used in picnic tables, park benches and playground equipment.

I am partially vetoing these provisions to remove the requirements that the departments submit a report to the Legislature and Joint Committee on Finance and promulgate rules. I object to the additional reporting burdens on the departments and to the specific requirements regarding forfeiture amounts and the departments' regulation of arsenic treated wood. Since the departments have not yet studied the issue, it is premature to specify details of future regulation of arsenic treated wood. If the departments find evidence of potential harm, I expect that they will work together and with other affected departments and groups to address the issue.

3. K–12 Integrated Pest Management

Sections 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.115 (7) (rm) and 20.285 (1) (s)], 426p, 582k, 1357k and 2395t [as it relates to school

integrated pest management plans, written notice and reporting requirements, prohibitions, and the department reporting requirement]

These provisions require school boards to propose and implement plans for using integrated pest management practices for pest control on school grounds. School boards would be required to provide 72-hour written notice to employees and students who may be present in the application area and to the parents of those students. School boards would be required to maintain detailed records on their pesticide use and to make those records available to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection and interested persons. School districts would be prohibited from using pesticides unless nonchemical methods of pest control have failed; for routine use; or for aesthetic or cosmetic purposes. School districts would also be prohibited from using pesticide fumigation. The department would be provided 2.0 FTE SEG positions and associated funding from the agrichemical management fund. Finally, the University of Wisconsin-Extension would be provided funding from the agrichemical management fund to give assistance to school districts.

I am partially vetoing these provisions because they will impose an excessive financial and administrative burden on school boards and districts for recordkeeping and reporting. I am concerned that these additional burdens will reduce the success of the K-12 integrated pest management training program that is currently administered by the department. Fifty-four Wisconsin school districts percent of representing approximately 72 percent of students have participated in the program to date. To further improve this program, my vetoes retain the requirements that schools post a notice of pesticide application during and for 72 hours following application and that all pesticide application in schools be performed by licensed applicators.

4. Pet Regulation and Inspection Positions

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (2) (j)], 2881b [as it relates to penalties], 2881d, 2881e [as it relates to license taxes], 2881k and 2881L

These provisions relate to the regulation of pet dealers, pet breeders, animal shelters and kennels. Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (2) (j)] provides \$135,500 PR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$271,100 PR in fiscal year 2002–03 for 7.0 FTE PR positions for licensing and inspection. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in a Joint Committee on Finance amendment to the bill. Section 2881b establishes penalties for operation without a license and other violations. Sections 2881d, 2881e, 2881k and 2881L change dog license fees.

I am vetoing sections 2881d, 2881k and 2881L and partially vetoing sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (2) (j)], 2881b and 2881e because the prescribed penalties and taxes are burdensome to pet owners and businesses.

By lining out the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection's s. 20.115 (2) (j) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$135,500 PR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$271,100 PR in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing the creation of 7.0 FTE PR positions because they are not needed at this time. The inspection and licensing provisions have a delayed effective date. The inspection program will be developed over the next two years and the number of staff needed will not be known until the program is fully established. If necessary, the department may submit a request for additional staff in the next biennial budget. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds and not to authorize the 7.0 FTE PR positions.

5. Johne's Disease Testing

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (2) (c)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (2) (c)] provides an additional \$400,000 GPR annually to subsidize the testing of cattle for paratuberculosis (or Johne's disease).

I object to this increase because it is excessive given the state's fiscal condition. However, I recognize the importance of this critical testing program to animal agriculture and am retaining an increase of \$150,000 GPR in each year over the current funding level of \$100,000 GPR annually (a 150 percent increase in funding). By lining out the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection's s. 20.115 (2) (c) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$250,000 GPR in each year, I am vetoing the part of the bill that funds part of this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

6. Drainage District Funding

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.115 (7) (i)], 423g and 2351h

These provisions require the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to create and maintain a secure Internet site where drainage districts may post engineering projects in order to obtain bids electronically for engineering services. The department must promulgate rules setting fees to cover the costs of the Internet site. Revenues from the fees would be deposited in and expended from a new appropriation.

I am vetoing these provisions to remove the requirement for the department to create and maintain the Internet site and charge fees and to eliminate the associated appropriation. I object to this provision because it increases costs to property owners located in drainage districts and restricts the department's ability to work with drainage districts to best address their needs.

7. Tobacco Minimum Markup Violations

Section 2430L [as it relates to cigarette wholesalers]

This provision allows an association of cigarette wholesalers to bring an action on behalf of a person injured or threatened with injury by a violation of the tobacco minimum markup law. The minimum markup law prohibits tobacco or motor fuel sellers from selling their products below cost.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the ability of cigarette wholesalers to bring an action on behalf of the person injured or threatened with injury. With passage of this bill, individual businesses that are injured or threatened with injury may bring an action under the minimum markup law and extending that right to uninjured third party wholesaler associations is unnecessary.

8. Food Advisory Council

Sections 168e and 2403e

These provisions establish a food advisory council within the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection composed of representatives of the department, industry and academia. The council is required to meet quarterly and to advise the department concerning issues related to providing a safe and wholesome food supply in Wisconsin.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary and duplicative. The department can and does meet regularly with industry and academic representatives regarding food safety in Wisconsin.

9. Producer Security Effective Date

Section 9404 (1) [as it relates to s. 221.0320 (2) (a) (intro.)]

Section 9404 (1) [as it relates to s. 221.0320 (2) (a) (intro.)] establishes an effective date of January 1, 2002, for the provision affecting grain warehouse keepers.

I am partially vetoing section 9404 (1) [as it relates to s. 221.0320 (2) (a) (intro.)] because it establishes the wrong effective date. The correct date of September 1, 2002, is established in section 9404 (4).

10. Producer Security Payment Schedule

Section 2813 [as it relates to s. 126.48 (1), (2) and (4)]

These provisions establish the schedule by which milk contractors, including qualified producer agents, must submit payments to producers. The provisions are part of the comprehensive overhaul of producer security regulation and the new producer security fund.

I am partially vetoing section 2813 [as it relates to s. 126.48 (1), (2) and (4)] because these provisions establish the wrong monthly payment schedule for qualified producer agents. By this veto, qualified producer agents will be subject to the same payment schedule as other milk contractors.

COMMERCE

11. Minority Business Certification Program

Sections 321j, 1111j, 1346t, 1372i, 1406w, 2001r, 2002m, 2003t, 2003vp, 2003vq, 2003wm, 2003wq, 2026k, 2307h, 2307i, 2307j, 2307ji, 2744m, 2760m, 3020h, 3020i, 3020j, 3020k, 3035x, 3037p, 3037q, 3037r, 3095j, 3097e, 3098v, 3141d [as it relates to the awarding of HIV prevention grants to organizations operated by minority group members], 3619sd, 3619sg, 3619sj, 3619sm, 3619sp and 3710j

These provisions extend the Department of Commerce's minority business certification process to make department certification the standard for other units of state and local government, including the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, Department of Transportation, counties, Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District, public libraries and school boards.

I am vetoing sections 321j, 1111j, 1346t, 1372i, 1406w, 2001r, 2002m, 2003t, 2003vp, 2003vq, 2003wm, 2003wq, 2026k, 2307h, 2307i, 2307j, 2307ji, 2744m, 2760m, 3020h, 3020i, 3020j, 3020k, 3035x, 3037p, 3037q, 3037r, 3095j, 3097e, 3098v, 3619sd, 3619sg, 3619sj, 3619sm, 3619sp and 3710j and partially vetoing section 3141d [as it relates to the awarding of HIV prevention grants to organizations operated by minority group members] to maintain the current minority business certification system.

While I recognize that a uniform statewide minority business certification process would be beneficial, I object to including these provisions in this budget because they leave significant issues unresolved including potential conflicts between federal and state requirements that may result from the expanded scope of the certification program. I am requesting the Departments of Commerce and Administration to perform a thorough review of the process of minority business certification and to propose a uniform certification process in the next biennial budget. The plan should consider all affected groups including businesses; minority organizations; and federal, state and local governments.

12. Joint Committee on Finance Zone Approval Process

Sections 3708m [as it relates to the Joint Committee on Finance] and 3713 [as it relates to the Joint Committee on Finance]

These sections establish a technology zone program and an agricultural development zone program. The Department of Commerce is authorized to designate these zones with the approval of the Joint Committee on Finance.

I am partially vetoing these sections to remove the Joint Committee on Finance approval requirement because it would infringe on executive branch authority to manage programs and would cause unnecessary delays in the designation of the zones.

13. PECFA Interest Cost Reimbursement

Sections 2470p, 2470r and 9310 (1x)

These provisions repeal the two-tier reimbursement structure for PECFA claims and replace it with a maximum interest reimbursement of prime rate minus one percent on all loans.

I am vetoing these provisions to return to the current law two-tier rate schedule because I object to state taxpayers having to absorb significant interest cost subsidies to PECFA claimants. The two-tier schedule reimburses interest costs at the prime rate minus one percent for applicants with gross revenues of less than or equal to \$25,000,000 in the previous tax year, and at four percent for applicants with gross revenues of greater than \$25,000,000 in the previous tax year. With limited PECFA funds available to reimburse claims each year, it is appropriate for the state to focus its limited resources on assisting owners and operators of petroleum storage tanks with fewer financial resources in order to ensure loans can be obtained to conduct environmental remediation. Since large companies are often able to self-finance PECFA cleanup costs, maintaining a lower interest reimbursement rate for these companies will help the fund remain solvent.

14. PECFA Rules for Arbitration and Mediation Recommendations

Sections 9110 (2x) and 9110 (2y)

These provisions direct the Department of Commerce to submit administrative rules for its arbitration process to the Legislative Council staff by May 1, 2002, and to submit recommendations for a process to mediate disputes over PECFA decisions to the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, 2002.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to this infringement on executive branch authority to manage programs and because they are unnecessary. Current law already instructs the department to promulgate rules for arbitration. Additionally, if the department determines that mediation is a cost–effective and efficient way to handle disputes, it can study the possibility and suggest solutions.

15. Brownfields Grant Program Section 3631m

This section requires the Department of Commerce to semiannually consider brownfields grant applications and awards.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the Legislature excessively managing agency programs. The department is best able to assess whether or not it is plausible and/or advisable to award brownfields grants on a semiannual basis.

16. Gaming Economic Development Earmarks

Sections 451 [as it relates to the earmarks for the Lincoln Park Center, the Keyes Peak Recreation Center and

the Great Lakes Forestry Museum] and 9110 (1), 9110 (10fk) and 9110 (10p)

These sections earmark or require funding from the Department of Commerce's gaming economic development and diversification program to the M7 Development Corporation for construction of the Lincoln Park Center, to the Keyes Peak Recreation Center for a construction project and to the Great Lakes Forestry Museum to develop a facility for educating the public about the history of forestry in the state.

I am vetoing sections 9110 (1), 9110 (10fk) and 9110 (10p) and partially vetoing section 451 [as it relates to the earmarks for the Lincoln Park Center, the Keyes Peak Recreation Center and the Great Lakes Forestry Museum] because they are inconsistent with the primary focus of the development economic gaming and diversification program, compromise the award selection process and limit the Department of Commerce in its efforts to create and retain jobs in Wisconsin. Local communities, organizations, businesses and individuals associated with the identified programs can continue to compete for funding through the wide array of economic development assistance offered by the department.

While funding for the Lincoln Park Center was included in my budget, I object to removing the requirement that the M7 Development Corporation obtain matching financing from the city of Milwaukee.

17. Wisconsin Development Fund Earmarks

Sections 438m [as it relates to the grant to the Clearwater Lake Distilling Company and the allocation to the Menominee Tribe] and 9110 (10eg)

These provisions earmark or require funding from the Wisconsin development fund for an economic development project for the Menominee Tribe and for a grant to the Clearwater Lake Distilling Company for a project that uses potato waste in vodka distillation.

I am partially vetoing section 438m and vetoing section 9110 (10eg) because they are inconsistent with the primary focus of the Wisconsin development fund, compromise the award selection process and limit the Department of Commerce in its efforts to create and retain jobs in Wisconsin. Local communities, organizations, businesses and individuals associated with the identified programs can continue to compete for funding through the wide array of economic development assistance offered by the department.

18. Minority Business Finance Program Earmark

Section 439c

This section requires funding from the Minority Business Finance program for grants to the Multicultural Center of Greater Green Bay for programming to educate community businesses and nonprofit organizations in recruiting and retaining a multicultural work force. I am vetoing this section because it compromises the award selection process and limits the Department of Commerce in its efforts to promote minority business development in Wisconsin. I support minority business development in the state and feel that all minority businesses should have equal chance to receive funding. Local communities, organizations, businesses and individuals associated with the identified program can continue to compete for funding through the wide array of economic development and minority business assistance offered by the department.

19. Community–Based Economic Development Earmarks

Sections 439, 9110 (8x) and 9110 (8y) These sections earmark funding from the Community–Based Economic Development Program for Gateway Technical College for costs related to a consortium for a manufacturing training center and for CAP Services, Inc., to provide technical assistance and management services to small businesses.

I am vetoing these sections because they compromise the award selection process and limit the Department of Commerce in its efforts to promote economic development in Wisconsin. Furthermore, the department already provides training programs and technical and managerial assistance to small businesses. Local communities, organizations, businesses and individuals associated with the identified programs can continue to compete for funding through the wide array of economic development assistance offered by the department.

20. Grant to Westby Fire Department Section 9110 (10d)

This section requires the Department of Commerce to make a Community Development Block Grant to the Westby Fire Department for costs related to the purchase of a new fire engine and the construction of a new fire station. The grant is to be made only in the event that the Federal Emergency Management Agency does not make a fire grant to the fire department.

I am vetoing this section because it is inconsistent with federal rules and regulations concerning the awarding of Community Development Block Grant funding. The state receives funding from the federal government based on a set of goals and objectives. then solicited Applications are from municipalities and awarded based on a competitive scoring process that must conform to federal regulations. Earmarking funds from this program is inconsistent with federal law and risks the loss of federal funding.

21. International Division Audit Section 9132 (5g)

This section requests the Joint Legislative Audit Committee to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to perform a financial and performance evaluation audit of the Department of Commerce's Division of International and Export Services.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary. The division and its overseas

offices have been regularly evaluated by independent consultants. Furthermore, the division is subject to periodic financial audits by the Legislative Audit Bureau, as are other agencies.

22. Office of Economic Strategy Report

Section 9110 (8z)

This section requires the Department of Commerce to submit a report to the Legislature concerning a plan to create an Office of Economic Strategy. The office would be responsible for coordinating all state government efforts and activities related to economic development.

I am vetoing this provision because it creates an unnecessary burden on the department. Furthermore, the department is already charged with the responsibility to foster the growth and diversification of the economy of the state and to serve as the central agency and clearinghouse for economic development activities.

23. Fire Suppression Grant Program Section 3664m

This section creates a fire suppression grant program in the Department of Commerce. Under the program, the department may award up to \$250,000 from Community Development Block Grant funds annually to first–responder fire departments that serve areas with populations under 6,000. The grants may be used for equipment and training materials.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The department is currently authorized to make such grants to fire departments under the Community Development Block Grant program. Most awards already go to areas with populations under 6,000. Imposing additional population and funding restrictions unnecessarily reduces administrative flexibility.

24. Certified Capital Companies Administration Lapse

Section 442g

This section lapses the unencumbered balance in the certified capital companies administration appropriation to the general fund at the end of each fiscal year. Funds in the appropriation derive from fees charged to certified capital companies for administration of the program.

I am vetoing this section because the fees have been collected for the purpose of administering the certified capital companies program, and the proposed transfer would limit the resources available for this purpose.

25. Certification of Crane Operators

Sections 2447x, 2490b, 2490f, 9110 (9q), 9110 (9qq), 9110 (9qr), 9310 (2q) and 9410 (2q)

These sections prohibit the operation of cranes over fifteen tons without a valid operator certificate and require the Department of Commerce to certify private crane operator certification programs. The sections include exceptions for training, the uniformed services, personal use, emergencies and public utilities. The requirements do not apply where they are inconsistent with a collective bargaining agreement. Operation of a crane without a certificate is punishable by a \$500 fine or up to three months imprisonment.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary. Crane operators are subject to regulation by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Costly and duplicative state training requirements would not improve safety. Furthermore, the regulation has the potential to increase construction costs and reduce employment opportunities in the construction trades by prohibiting otherwise properly trained and qualified tradespersons from operating crane equipment.

26. Fire Dues Distribution

Sections 2490r, 2495m and 2497m

These sections prohibit the Department of Commerce from withholding fire dues payments from a municipality because of the municipality's failure to meet eligibility requirements. The prohibition will be removed after the department promulgates rules modifying the eligibility requirements. The rules must be approved by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee and must be based on the recommendations of a forthcoming Legislative Audit Bureau performance evaluation of the fire dues program. I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary. The department has been examining the fire dues distribution program independently and is able to promulgate necessary rule changes without a formal requirement to do so. The ability to withhold fire dues payments is required for the department to oversee the fire safety efforts of municipalities.

27. Storage and Handling of Ammonia

Section 2449d [as it relates to pollution control devices]

This provision exempts facilities where ammonia is used in pollution control devices from the Department of Commerce's rules regarding the safe storage and handling of ammonia.

I am vetoing this provision because these facilities often store large quantities of ammonia. Exempting them from regulation would create an excessive safety hazard.

28. Milwaukee Development Opportunity Zone

Sections 2146, 2147p, 2177, 2178p, 2191 and 2192p [as they relate to the use of credits to offset the income from partnerships', companies' or corporations' business operations or directly related business operations]

These provisions limit partners, members of limited liability companies and shareholders of tax-option corporations to using the tax credits available in the Milwaukee Development Opportunity Zone to offset taxes attributable to their income from all of the partnership's, company's or corporation's business operations or directly related business operations. I am vetoing these provisions to allow partners, members of limited liability companies and shareholders to use the affected tax credits to offset all of their income. This change removes an unintended limitation on the use of the tax credits and is in keeping with the original intent of the Milwaukee Development Opportunity Zone.

LAND USE

29. Land Information Board and Land Council Changes

Sections 163, 164, 165, 166, 167, 200b, 201c, 1999n, 2001n, 4039b, 4041b [as it relates to the effective date], 4059b, 4059g and 9459 (5r)

These provisions add members to the Wisconsin Land Council, extend the deadline for submission of a report concerning the continuation and combination of the council and the Land Information Board, and extend the sunset of both the council and the board to September 1, 2007.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to the extension of the report deadline. The report was required in 1997 Wisconsin Act 27, and the council and board have sufficient time to begin and complete the required report by September 1, 2002. I object to the addition of three members to the council and the extension of the sunset for both the council and the board prior to receipt of the required report. After reviewing the report, I will consider the future of the council and board.

30. Wisconsin Land Information System

Sections 342m, 342n, 343r and 4041b [as it relates to s. 16.966 (5)]

These provisions require the Land Information Board to promulgate rules to create and maintain a land information system and require the Department of Administration to contract for operation and maintenance of such a system.

I am vetoing these provisions because they put an administrative burden on the Land Information Board and infringe on executive branch authority to manage programs. Under this budget bill, the staff provided to the Land Information Board is reduced by 2.0 FTE PR positions. In addition, the board and the Wisconsin Land Council are required to submit, no later than September 1, 2002, a report concerning the issue of continuation and the feasibility of combination of their function.

31. Release of Smart Growth Data *Section 9101 (19b)*

This section requires the Department of Administration to make the initial release of state land information submitted to the Land Information Board by May 31, 2002.

I am vetoing this section because the deadline is unrealistic. The board would receive the information by March 31, 2002, and the department would not be able to prepare the information for release until the board has determined how the information should be integrated and presented to the public. In addition, the budget bill reduces funding and positions allocated to the Land Information Board. I am requesting that the board and the department strive to make this information available in a reasonable timeframe.

32. Comprehensive Planning Grants

Sections 332 [as it relates to establishing a deadline and opening applications to public inspection] and 395 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (1) (cm)]

These provisions increase funding to the Department of Administration for comprehensive planning grants by \$157,900 GPR annually. The provisions also require the department to establish a deadline for receipt of applications and to open all applications received by the department to public inspection after the deadline.

I am vetoing these provisions because they increase expenditure authority for this appropriation at a time when the state is experiencing significant financial constraints. Furthermore, I object to legislative interference in the way the department currently conducts the application process.

The effect of this veto will be to delete the provisions allocating additional funding to the department for comprehensive planning grants and establishing further administrative requirements. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes the funding increase, the purpose of this funding was included in the Conference Committee amendment to the bill. By lining out the Department Administration's of s. 20.505 (1) (cm) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$157,900 GPR provided for this purpose annually, I am vetoing that part of the bill which funds the increase to comprehensive planning grants. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

33. Property Development Rights Sections 3862w and 9309 (5z)

These provisions allow the seller of property development rights lasting longer than thirty years to bring an action to recover the difference in the sale price of the property development rights and value of those rights.

Retaining and protecting Wisconsin's agricultural, natural, recreational and open spaces has become a very important issue in recent years. The purchase of property development rights is a voluntary agreement that places deed restrictions on a property to ensure that the parcel will remain agricultural or open space. I am vetoing these provisions because of the potential dampening effect they could have on the purchase of property development rights, especially by nonprofit organizations and local units of government.

34. Dane County Regional Planning Commission Sunset

Section 4046s

This section repeals the October 1, 2002, sunset date of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission as established by 1999 Wisconsin Act 9. I am vetoing this section because I object to the repeal of the sunset prior to receipt of the task force report required by 1999 Wisconsin Act 9. The task force is to study and make recommendations regarding the creation of a multicounty regional planning commission. I will review the continuation or modification of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission after receiving that report.

NATURAL RESOURCES

35. Creation of a Department of Forestry

These sections create a Department of Forestry from the Department of Natural Resources' current Division of Forestry, effective July 1, 2002. The new department would be responsible for six major state forests (Northern Highlands-American Legion, Flambeau River, Black River, Brule River, Governor Knowles and the Coulee Experimental forest) and some smaller forests. The Department of Forestry would also oversee several tree nurseries, local governmental and private forestry assistance, forest health, and fire management as well as grants, loans and payments to certain towns, counties and private forest owners. The "southern forests" (Point Beach, Havenwoods and five units of the Kettle Moraine State Forest) would continue to receive support from forestry revenues and would remain under the jurisdiction of the Department of Natural Resources Bureau of Parks for operations and maintenance.

Prior to July 1, 2002, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, could appoint a secretary to head the new department, who could then appoint one unclassified division administrator, a deputy secretary and an executive assistant. The number of division administrators within the Department of Natural

Resources would be reduced from seven to six. The operational budget of the Department of Forestry, excluding aids and debt service appropriations, would be over \$54,100,000 and include 619 positions.

The Department of Forestry would consult and cooperate with other state agencies, especially the Department of Natural Resources. The two departments would confer on funding issues, the Warren Knowles-Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program, grant awards, environmental clean-up activities, outdoor recreation policies, proposed laws that affect snowmobiles, approval of National Forest boundaries, leases and treaties with the federal government establishing state forests, the Natural Areas Preservation Council activities and in all other areas where the departments' interests and responsibilities overlap. Like other agencies, the Department of Forestry would be required to keep the Governor informed of its actions and activities, to obtain the Governor's approval before acquiring new lands and to meet set conditions for selling or trading public land.

The Department of Forestry would have the same powers as other state agencies to accept gifts, grants, bequests, devises or donations. The Department of Forestry would have the authority to extend or consolidate lands under its supervision, to grant or acquire easements to areas of state forests, to acquire land to furnish access to state forests, to determine the value of donated lands, to lease lands in state forests and to designate special use areas within state forests. Twice each year, the department would be required to inspect trail signs and designated The department would manage features. forestry fund support of wildlife management and habitat development, private and county forestry, urban land conservation, forest law, fire suppression, county forest administrator grants, and distribution of federal national forest income payments.

The department would pay aids in lieu of taxes for properties under its jurisdiction, as well as debt service, for the acquisition and development of state forests. A forestry land endowment fund would be created to parallel the Department of Natural Resources' natural resources endowment fund.

Responsibilities transferred from the Department of Natural Resources to the Department of Forestry would include gypsy moth eradication, plant protection, forestry education and grants to Wisconsin cooperatives, support of the Conservation Corps, forestry-related environment education grants, reforestation, forestry recording fees, forest fire emergencies and reimbursements related to timber sales contract oversight. The Department of Forestry would support the resource aids and debt service payments formerly provided by the forestry account of the conservation fund.

Under the provisions of the new department, state forest rangers would be classified as law enforcement officers and as such, would have additional general authority. On July 1, 2002, the staff, assets, liabilities, obligations, rules and orders primarily associated with the Department of Forestry would vest in that agency, as determined by the secretary of the Department of Administration. All incumbent Department of Natural Resources employees relating primarily to the functions of the Division of Forestry would be transferred to the Department of Forestry. The secretary of the Department of Administration would also determine which incumbent Department of Natural Resources employees that relate primarily to general administration and program support would be transferred to the Department of Forestry. After determining these employees, the secretaries of the Department of Natural Resources and the Department of Forestry could submit a request to the Joint Committee on Finance to transfer monies between the departments' GPR, FED, PR and SEG appropriations to reflect the personnel transfer.

I am vetoing these provisions to retain forestry-related activities and programs in the Department of Natural Resources. I object to the duplication of effort and reduced accountability to the public for management of Wisconsin's abundant natural resources that would result from creation of a separate department. Forests are an important and integral part of Wisconsin's environment, history, culture and economy. In addition to providing valuable timber, Wisconsin's forests also support wildlife, endangered resources, recreational opportunities for residents and visitors, and lake and river ecosystems. These forests improve water quality and aquatic habitat by reducing erosion and regulating water temperatures. In order for a separate Department of Forestry to adequately manage the state's forest resources, staff would need to be reallocated to provide expertise in fish and wildlife, endangered resources and recreational issues. Also, the Department of Natural Resources would need to reallocate staff to address forestry-related management issues on properties such as the Willow. Chippewa and Turtle–Flambeau Flowages.

Separation of forestry management from the Department of Natural Resources would also result in each department having to devote fee and other segregated revenues to activities for which the revenues were not originally collected. Federal regulations restrict the use of fish and wildlife fee revenue to the state agency responsible for fish and wildlife management. Therefore, the Department of Forestry would be required to use forestry revenues or to find an alternative revenue source to complete wildlife-related activities in the forests. Likewise, the Department of Natural Resources would be required to expend fish and wildlife, endangered resources, parks, recreational vehicle and other segregated revenues on forestry-related activities on land under its jurisdiction. The departments could agree to jointly manage these state lands, though this would result in foresters reporting to wildlife managers and vice versa.

Creation of a separate department would result in the same problems it is purported to solve.

I also object to the creation of a new state police force, the state forest rangers. State forest rangers would be the equivalent of conservation wardens. Having two equivalent police forces in the same areas of the state would lead to public confusion and could result in uncoordinated law enforcement. For example, a snowmobiler could be stopped multiple times within a relatively short period of time by a conservation warden for a routine check on land under the Department of Natural Resources' jurisdiction and then by a state forest ranger on land under the jurisdiction of the Department of Forestry. Having separate police forces would also reduce accountability, as the public would have two possible contacts with which to register a complaint. Investigations of complaints would take more time, as each department would need to determine if the complaint is correctly filed against one of its officers, or should have been filed with the other department.

Wisconsin's forests are vital to the well-being of the state, its residents and visitors because of their impact on the state's history, economy (both through timber harvesting and tourism and recreational use), environment and culture. I support the continued improvement in management of this significant component of the quality of life for Wisconsin's citizens. Under the budget bill, funding for forestry activities and programs in fiscal year 2001-02 will increase by \$4,514,400 SEG and 15.0 FTE additional forester positions are authorized. The division administrator of the Division of Forestry will be designated the chief state forester and will be required to be a professional forester. Funds within the Warren Knowles-Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program will be set aside to match federal funds for protection of forested lands, and public education and awareness of forestry issues will be increased through a new kindergarten through twelfth grade education curriculum and public education program. Since my veto cannot restore funding in the Department of Natural Resources forestry-related appropriations, I request the Department of Natural Resources to review the funding needs for fiscal year 2002-03 and submit either a request for corrective legislation or a request for supplemental funding to address funding and position needs for forestry-related programs, assistance and activities.

I recognize the serious concerns raised by the forestry industry and other interested groups concerning the diversion of forestry account resources and the lack of adequate attention by the Department of Natural Resources to the importance of a sustainable forest industry in Wisconsin. The bill I am signing includes considerable funding increases to support more positions in the field to meet the planning and management needs of private and industrial forest land owners. To continue to better address these serious concerns, I am directing the secretary of the Department of Natural Resources to increase efforts to serve the needs of forest land owners and Wisconsin's forest industry.

36. Recycling

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.285 (1) (tb) and (tm)], 3222e, 3222f, 3222g, 3222h, 3222m, 3222p, 3222q, 3222r, 3225c, 3225f, 3226k, 3227e, 3619k, 3619m, 3619n, 3619s, 9137 (1k) and 9137 (1km)

These sections make the following changes to Wisconsin's recycling program:

- Convert the existing grant distribution formula to a per capita formula, with a rate of \$5.30 per capita;
- Limit grant amounts to eligible costs incurred two years earlier and prorate grants if available funds are insufficient;
- Create a recycling efficiency incentive grant program, funded with \$1,900,000 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03 and reduce the per capita rate for responsible units ineligible for recycling efficiency incentive grants by \$1.50 per capita;
- Create a pilot program to identify workable alternatives for compliance with the landfill bans which became effective in 1995;
- Modify the Department of Natural Resources' audit requirement to require the department to annually review, in with University cooperation the of Wisconsin-Extension, at least 5 percent of grant recipients for compliance with the landfill bans and effective recycling program criteria and to identify ways for the responsible unit to become more efficient and effective;
- Prohibit solid waste facilities from accepting solid waste from a building containing five or more dwelling units or a facility not providing for collection of recycled materials;
- Require the Recycling Market Development Board to give priority to projects that seek to use materials that either constitute a relatively high volume of solid waste generated in the state or are hazardous to human health and the environment; and
- Allocate up to \$200,000 annually in forgivable loans for projects that have an exceptional potential to meet one of the existing four eligibility criteria but do not comply with fiduciary responsibility criteria established by Recycling Market Development Board or the Department of Commerce

Section 3222m [as it relates to the reporting requirement] requires the Department of Natural Resources to submit two reports concerning the pilot program for compliance with banned materials to the Legislature and the Joint Committee on Finance. The first would be submitted by January 1, 2003, and the second by January 1, 2005. I am partially vetoing this section to remove the reporting requirement because it places an unnecessary administrative burden on the department.

Sections 3222p and 3222q replace the department's current audit requirement with a

requirement to review, in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin-Extension, at least five percent of grant recipients to ensure compliance with landfill bans and effective recycling program criteria and to identify activities, methods or procedures that would make the responsible unit's program more efficient or effective. Section 3222r requires the department to annually report to Joint Committee on Finance on the number of recycling programs reviewed. I am vetoing sections 3222q and 3222r and partially vetoing section 3222p to remove the University of Wisconsin-Extension's participation, the list of items for which the review would be conducted and the reporting requirement. I object to the infringement on the executive branch's ability to manage programs. I also object to requiring the University of Wisconsin–Extension to participate in a review that could be viewed as regulatory. The University of Wisconsin–Extension provides technical assistance and educational support to responsible units and creating a situation in which the University of Wisconsin-Extension could be viewed as a regulatory entity could undermine its relationship with responsible units.

Section 3222e allows the Department of Natural Resources to promulgate rules regarding incidental amounts of materials banned from landfills and specifying the minimum elements for coordinated program delivery. Sections 3222f, 3222g and 3222h prohibit solid waste facilities from accepting solid waste with more than an incidental amount of recyclable waste and section 3227e imposes fines for violations. Sections 3226k and 9137 (1k) create a recycling efficiency incentive grant program to provide grants to responsible units which engage in coordinated program delivery. I am vetoing sections 3222f, 3222g, 3222h, 3227e and 9137 (1k) and partially vetoing sections 3222e and 3226k to remove the solid waste facility enforcement requirements and the recycling efficiency incentive grant program requirements. I object to placing the burden of enforcing recycling laws on solid waste facilities. Enforcement is a governmental responsibility, and it is unfair to punish a solid waste facility or hauler for not knowing all contents of the waste it receives. I also object to the restrictions placed on the department's ability to develop a recycling efficiency incentive grant. My vetoes retain \$1,900,000 for grants under this program, and I am requesting the department to solicit input from the public, responsible units, businesses and other interested groups on development of this program.

Sections 3225c and 3225f establish a per capita grant formula beginning with grants awarded for 2002. Grants would be awarded on a per capita basis at a rate of \$5.30 per capita. Beginning with grant year 2005, recipients that are not eligible for a recycling efficiency grant would be awarded grants at a rate of \$3.80 per capita. I am vetoing these sections because I object to the effect redistribution will have on many communities. Smaller, rural communities in particular would receive less funding than under the current formula; whereas large, urban communities would gain additional funding. This redistribution is not based on the cost–effectiveness and efficiency of the local programs, merely population.

Section 9137 (1km) provides the Department of Natural Resources with 1.0 FTE SEG position to be funded with existing monies. I am vetoing this section because with the significant base budget reductions to the department included in this budget bill, it is inappropriate to require the department to further reallocate funds for this position.

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.285 (1) (tb) and (tm)] provides funding for recycling education and solid waste research. I object to this funding because the limited resources for recycling should be focused on implementation of effective programs. By lining out the University of Wisconsin's s. 20.285 (1) (tb) and (tm) appropriations and writing in \$0, I am vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

Sections 3619k, 3619m, 3619n and 3619s require the Recycling Marketing Development Board to give priority to projects that involve recovered materials that constitute a relatively high volume of solid waste generated in the state or that are hazardous to human health or the environment; to annually allocate up to \$200,000 for forgivable loans for projects that have exceptional potential to meet one of the qualifying considerations, but do not comply with the board's or the Department of Commerce's criteria for meeting fiduciary responsibilities; and in consultation with the Council on Recycling, to annually establish a list of materials for which the board may award financial assistance. I am vetoing these sections because they create additional administrative burdens for the board and infringe on the board's authority to determine how to best use its limited resources.

My vetoes retain the increase in the state tipping fee to allow the recycling program to continue and to begin exploring different approaches to the current program. The Department of Natural Resources should closely monitor the pilot program for compliance with landfill bans and the recycling efficiency incentive grant program. The effects of these programs should be considered in the proposal I am requesting the department to submit for the 2003–05 biennial budget.

37. Brownfields Staff

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (2) (mq)]

This provision appropriates \$242,400 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$306,900 in fiscal year 2002–03 for 5.0 FTE SEG two–year project waste management specialist positions to geo–locate brownfields properties and update the Department of Natural Resources' Web–based registry of closed sites. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes this increase, the purpose of this funding was included in a Joint Committee on Finance budget motion.

I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (2) (mq)] because I object to the increase in the number of positions related to this program. The department has received a total of 25.0 FTE positions in the last two budgets (7.0 FTE positions in the 1999–2001 biennial budget and 18.0 FTE positions in the 1997-99 biennial budget) for brownfields program activities and should use those resources as effectively as possible. The department has streamlined the work load at PECFA sites in order to provide additional staff and resources for brownfields work. By lining out the Department of Natural Resources' s. 20.370 (2) (mg) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$242,400 SEG provided in fiscal year 2001–02 and deletes \$306,900 SEG provided in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds and not to authorize the 5.0 FTE SEG positions in fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03.

38. Land Recycling Loan Program Site Assessments

Section 3168n [as it relates to site assessments and investigations]

This provision directs the Department of Natural Resources to accept site assessments and investigations as eligible costs under the program for applicants able to demonstrate that remediation will be necessary.

I am partially vetoing section 3168n [as it relates to site assessments and investigations] to remove the requirement that the department accept site assessments and investigations as eligible costs because it is unnecessary. Under the program, reimbursement for previously incurred site assessment expenses is available as part of an overall project loan. Additionally, the department's Site Assessment Grant Program provides grant funding to eligible applicants for initial investigations of contaminated properties.

39. Land Recycling Loan Program Intent to Apply

Sections 3168p and 3168r [as it relates to the notice to apply]

These provisions repeal the requirement that applicants submit a notice of intent to apply for financial assistance under the program to the Department of Natural Resources by December 31 of the preceding fiscal year.

I am partially vetoing section 3168r [as it relates to the notice to apply] and vetoing section 3168p because these provisions are unnecessary. Under current law, the department has the ability to waive this notice requirement if an eligible applicant makes a written request for a waiver.

40. Regulation of High–Capacity Wells

Sections 3160v [as it relates to s. 281.17 (1) (c) 2.] and 9137 (1x)

These provisions direct the Department of Natural Resources to condition approval of high–capacity wells for bottled drinking water based on possible adverse effects to the quality and quantity of state waters, and to prepare an environmental impact statement with each approval of a high–capacity well for bottled drinking water. Additionally, new requirements on high–capacity wells are retroactively applied to all wells approved by the department on or after September 1, 2000.

I am partially vetoing section 3160v [as it relates to s. 281.17 (1) (c) 2.] and vetoing section 9137 (1x) because these provisions are unnecessary and because I object to applying them retroactively. First, the department already has an established environmental analysis and Under this process, an review process. environmental impact statement is prepared for all major actions that will significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Since not all high-capacity wells will significantly impact the human environment, and their potential to do so depends upon the location, aquifer type and rate of withdrawal, conditioning each approval on an environmental impact statement and a study of possible adverse effects is excessive. Second, applying these new restrictions to already issued permits would hurt businesses that have moved forward and based plans around those permits. I recognize that there are serious concerns about the impact of these wells and believe that the existing Department of Natural Resources' requirements combined with the new permit process for wells that produce water for bottling which I am retaining in this bill will adequately

protect the state's interests. 41. Legislative Council Studies

Sections 9132 (1q) and 9132 (2x)

These sections request that the Joint Legislative Council study high–capacity well usage as well as the need to modify state laws to address the impacts of groundwater usage.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary. The Joint Legislative Council can conduct these studies without a nonstatutory law requiring them to be performed.

42. Residential Well Air Filtration Sections 3160g and 9437 (6p)

These sections require an owner of a residential well to install an air filter to prevent airborne bacteria from contaminating the well water if the well was constructed on or after January 1, 2003, or if water from the well tests positive for bacteria. I am vetoing these sections because I object to requiring well owners and the Department of Natural Resources to invest substantial time and effort in a program of unproven value. There is no solid evidence that these filters will bring about the intended public health benefit, or that they will even work correctly. Further research on the public health protection offered by these filters and potential alternatives is needed.

43. Elcho Land Spreading Grant

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (6) (dc)], 615t and 3207v

These provisions provide an annual \$25,000 GPR grant to the Elcho Sanitary District #1 to subsidize wastewater treatment costs for residents of that community. The district received financial hardship assistance in early 1999 from the Clean Water Fund Program for the purpose of constructing a wastewater treatment facility. A portion of the financial assistance was provided as a grant and the remainder as a loan with an interest rate of 0.823 percent.

I am vetoing these provisions because they set a bad precedent. The Clean Water Fund Hardship Program uses formulas that consider costs but will not always result in user rates at exactly the target of 2 percent of median household income. Communities must establish and maintain user charges sufficient to make payments on their obligations even if all forecasted revenues do not materialize or if costs are greater than predicted. The Clean Water Fund Program has over 400 loans to Wisconsin communities and it would be unfair to single out the Elcho Sanitary District #1 for this grant.

44. Municipal Flood Control and Dam Rehabilitation

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (7) (da)], 621h, 962 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (7) (da)], 962b [as it relates to s. 20.370 (7) (da)], 967 [as it relates to municipal flood control and riparian restoration grants], 967e [as it relates to municipal flood control and riparian restoration grants] and 1345cm [as it relates to promulgating rules]

These sections provide \$9,000,000 of general obligation bonding authority in a new appropriation for municipal flood control and riparian restoration cost–sharing grants. The sections also create a new grant program to match federal funds for rehabilitation of flood control dams and allocate \$500,000 of the bonding authority for these grants.

I am vetoing section 621h and partially vetoing sections 395, 962, 962b, 967 and 967e to remove the separate appropriation and bonding authority for municipal flood control and riparian restoration. I object to the separation of funding for municipal flood control from urban nonpoint pollution abatement issues. Combining the funding for these two programs recognizes the effect of storm water control and pollution abatement measures on flooding and gives the Department of Natural Resources and the Natural Resources Board more flexibility to direct funds to maximize water quality and quantity improvements.

Recognizing the need for rehabilitation of flood control dams in western Wisconsin and around the state, I am retaining the \$500,000 set-aside to match federal funding for dam rehabilitation. To allow the department and counties to maximize the amount of federal funding received by the state and expedite the awarding of grants, I am partially vetoing section 1345cm to remove the requirement that the department promulgate rules for the grant program.

45. Funding Notices of Discharge

Section 3173j

This provision would require the Department of Natural Resources to provide a cost–sharing grant to an animal feeding operation to correct unacceptable practices identified in a notice of discharge.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to singling out animal feeding operations which

have violated pollution control laws for special consideration under this program. These animal feeding operations should compete for this funding like any other entity. Furthermore, requiring the department to make cost–sharing grants in this manner would be in direct violation of federal law, which bars this practice in some cases.

46. Watershed Center

Sections 1066d and 1358m

These sections would require the Department of Natural Resources to provide \$150,000 SEG annually to the University of Wisconsin System for the establishment and operation of a watershed management center at the University of Wisconsin–Stevens Point.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary and are not a cost-effective use of water resources account monies. Given the limited revenues available in the water resources account of the conservation fund, it would not be prudent at this time to expand the uses of this account to support a new center. The university may pursue watershed research or establishment of such a center without a statutory directive.

47. Wisconsin Waters Initiative

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (4) (ax)], 600r and 9137 (2t)

These provisions create an appropriation to receive funds from the environmental fund for providing computer accessible water resources management information and allow the Department of Natural Resources to submit a proposal to the Joint Committee on Finance concerning the continued development of a system to provide computer accessible water management information. If the committee does not notify the department within 14 days of submittal of the request that a meeting would be scheduled to review the proposal, the new appropriation and the appropriation under s. 20.370 (4) (aq) would each be supplemented by \$100,000 SEG.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to the infringement on executive branch authority to manage programs. This information is important for water management and planning activities. Therefore, I encourage the department to pursue cost–effective continued development of this system with existing funds allocated for this project.

48. Lake Management Grant for Fish Lake

Section 9137 (8q)

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to provide a lake management grant to Dane County for water quality and lake level improvements for Fish, Mud and Crystal Lakes. The grant would not be subject to the statutory limitation on the portion of project costs that may be funded.

I am vetoing this section because it infringes on the department's authority to decide which projects, and associated funding, will provide the best management of Wisconsin's lakes. I also object to the waiver of the 75 percent limitation. Dane County can continue to compete for funding through the various assistance programs provided by the department.

49. Stewardship Earmarks

Sections 1034h, 1034hm [as it relates to s. 23.197 (7)], 1034pm, 1039bv, 1039fm, 1039k, 1039km, 1039m, 1039s and 9107 [as it relates to (1) (i) 2.]

These provisions require the Department of Natural Resources to do the following under the Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program:

- Provide up to \$175,000 SEG for the development of a recreational area on Keyes Lake in Florence County;
- Provide \$60,000 SEG to the city of Hillsboro and waive the 50 percent matching requirement for the development of a camping and recreational area near the Hillsboro and Northeastern Spur Trail;
- Provide \$135,000 SEG to acquire conservation easements along the Plover River in Marathon County and Portage County;
- Provide \$648,100 SEG to Milwaukee County to redevelop the beach at Grant Park;
- Provide \$25,000 to the city of Menasha for the purchase of land to be used for a skateboard park facility in Winnebago County; and
- Provide up to \$200,000 SEG in matching funds for the development of a conservation law enforcement museum.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to the infringement on executive branch authority to manage programs and because these provisions are unnecessary. The department currently reviews grant applications under several criteria that take into account the importance of the property for recreational and conservation purposes. These criteria and the requirement for a local match for grants ensure that local projects are planned and supported by the communities affected by the projects. Circumventing this process undermines the integrity of the Stewardship 2000 Program.

50. Forest Legacy Program Funding Section 1034k

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to set aside not less than \$12,000,000 from the land acquisition subprogram of the Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program. These funds may be obligated only to provide matching funds for the purchase of land or easements under the federal Forest Legacy Program.

By striking the digit "1", I am partially vetoing this section to limit the set aside amount to not less than \$2,000,000. I object to the amount of funding being set aside because this requirement limits the department's flexibility in determining the best use of the Stewardship 2000 Program funds. In addition, the Forest Legacy Program matching requirement is 25 percent of the program costs. Although I strongly support the conservation of Wisconsin's forested land, the

state is not expected to receive enough federal funding for the department to obligate the total amount of the proposed set–aside. If additional federal funding becomes available, I am requesting the department to set aside additional Stewardship 2000 Program funds to maximize the amount of federal dollars coming to the state.

51. Stewardship Appraisal Requirements Section 1035g

This section requires governmental units or nonprofit organizations to submit at least one appraisal to the Department of Natural Resources if they request a Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program grant to purchase land which the department estimates has a fair market value exceeding \$200,000. The department is required to also obtain a separate independent appraisal.

I am vetoing this section because it creates an unnecessary burden on the department. The department did not receive any additional resources to obtain and review these appraisals. Requiring the department to manage this requirement with existing funds may result in delays in awarding grants to applicants.

52. Stewardship Purchase Notification

Sections 1038q, 1038qc and 9437 (1z) [as it relates to s. 23.14 (1m)]

These sections require the Department of Natural Resources to notify, in writing, affected local units of government of any acquisition of land or interest in land at least thirty days prior to completion of the acquisition.

I am vetoing sections 1038q and 1038qc and partially vetoing section 9437 (1z) [as it relates to s. 23.14 (1m)] because they unduly limit the department's ability to work with sellers and to expedite the protection of sensitive environmental areas.

53. Chiwaukee Prairie–Carol Beach Acquisition

Section 1038saq

This section prohibits the Department of Natural Resources from promulgating administrative rules or establishing a department policy that imposes a specific maximum purchase price per parcel or per acre for real property that the department acquires within the Chiwaukee Prairie–Carol Beach National Natural Landmark. I am vetoing this section because it limits the department's flexibility to determine how best to use limited resources to protect and preserve sensitive areas of the state.

54. Signage for Fishing Easements Section 1038dg

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to place a sign on any property where the department acquires an easement allowing public access for fishing. The sign must inform the public that the easement allows public access to the body of water for fishing.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary and infringes on the property owner's rights. The department may erect signs on property with fishing easements at its own discretion and in cooperation with the property owner.

55. Forestry Demonstration and Education Center

Sections 1038r, 1038sam and 9437 (1z) [as it relates to s. 23.14 (2)]

These provisions would require the Department of Natural Resources to notify the Joint Committee on Finance of any proposed acquisition, for a forestry demonstration and education center, of rights in lands that are part of Milwaukee County grounds.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to legislative intrusion in this area. In addition, sufficient oversight procedures already exist in cases where large, expensive land purchases are being made and do not require additional legislative oversight.

56. World Paper Center

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (5) (ax)], 603rb and 9137 (8mk)

These provisions would allocate \$250,000 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 to the Paper International Hall of Fame, Inc., to renovate the Atlas Mill and retitle it the World Paper Center.

I am vetoing these provisions because I object to expending state fiscal resources for this purpose. By lining out the Department of Natural Resources' s. 20.370 (5) (ax) appropriation, I am vetoing that part of the bill which funds the renovation of the Atlas Mill. The effect of this veto will be to delete all funding for this purpose.

57. Great Lakes Forestry Museum

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.375 (2) (rq)], 603q, 603r, 629do, 629dom, 9137 (5mk), 9437 (3mk) and 9437 (3mkx)

These sections require the Department of Natural Resources and the proposed Department of Forestry to award grants of up to \$150,000 to an organization known as the Great Lakes Forestry Museum to develop a facility in the city of Rice Lake for educating the public about the history of forestry and logging in this state. In addition, within six months of receiving the grant, the grant recipient is required to submit a report to the Department of Natural Resources or the Department of Forestry detailing how the grant proceeds were used.

I am vetoing these sections because I object to expending state fiscal resources for this purpose. Forestry revenues should be focused on the protection, acquisition, development, operation and maintenance of forests of the state. Although Wisconsin's rich history of forestry and logging is important, other funds should be found to support this facility.

58. Managed Forest Land Eligibility Sections 2247d, 2247h, 2247p, 2247t and 9337 (3f)

These sections modify criteria used to define a parcel of land that is capable of producing merchantable timber for designation as managed forestland.

I am vetoing these sections because they inappropriately expand the use of the managed forest land program. Managed forest land receives preferential tax treatment because it is dedicated to timber production and recreational use. Allowing more land that is not favorable to timber production to enroll in this popular program would endanger its original focus and purpose.

59. Urban Forestry Grant Earmarks

Sections 9137 (5vy), 9137 (5x) and 9137 (5y)

These sections earmark funding within the urban forestry grant program for tree planting demonstration projects in the cities of Waupaca, Milwaukee and Racine.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary and unduly infringe on executive branch authority to manage programs. The cities may continue to compete for grants through the established grant review process.

60. Urban Land Conservation Grant

Sections 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.370 (5) (ay) and 20.375 (2) (sm)], 1036bx, 1036c, 1036d, 1036e, 1036em [as it relates to the grant amount and the purposes of the grant], 1036f [as it relates to the grant amount and the purposes of the grant], 1036g, 1036h, 1036j, 1036k, 1036m, 1036n, 1036p, 1036q, 1036r, 1036s, 1036t, 1036u, 1036v, 1036w and 1036y

These sections increase the amount of an annual grant to the Urban Open Space Foundation and modify the requirements the foundation must comply with in order to receive the grant.

I am partially vetoing sections 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.370 (5) (ay) and 20.375 (2) (sm)], 1036em [as it relates to the grant amount and the purposes of the grant] and 1036f [as it relates to the grant amount and the purposes of the grant] because the increase is excessive and unnecessary. By striking "of \$150,000" in the amended language of section 1036f and by lining out the appropriations under ss. 20.370 (5) (ay) and 20.375 (2) (sm) and writing in \$75,000 for this purpose in each fiscal year, I am notifying the Legislature of my intent to veto the increase in the I am also requesting the grant amount. Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds. In addition, I am requesting the Department of Natural Resources to continue to provide an annual grant of \$75,000 to the foundation.

I am vetoing sections 1036bx, 1036c, 1036e, 1036g, 1036h, 1036j, 1036k, 1036m, 1036n, 1036p, 1036q, 1036r, 1036s, 1036t, 1036u, 1036v, 1036w and 1036y to retain the current requirements the foundation must meet to receive the grant. I object to the expansion of the activities the grant funds may support because they are redundant. The department already has an urban forestry grant program to address these issues and the foundation may compete with other nonprofit organizations for land acquisition grants through the Warren Knowles–Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program.

61. Sustainable Forestry Grant Program Rules

Section 1153s

This section allows the Department of Natural Resources to make grants to counties having forest land to fund the cost of activities related to improving the sustainable forestry on the land. The section specifies that the department will promulgate rules to include the following: establish criteria to award grants; maximum amount of grant available to each recipient; activities for which a grant may be awarded; required match from counties; and a method for establishing priorities for awarding grants or providing partial grants.

I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the requirement for the department to promulgate rules to establish criteria and procedures for awarding sustainable forestry grants to provide the department with more flexibility in administering and establishing rules for this program.

62. Conservation Fund Transfers

Section 585m, 624m, 9237 (3k) and 9237 (5z)

These sections transfer \$15,000 SEG from the fish and wildlife account to the endangered resources account and \$200,000 SEG from the forestry account to the *Natural Resources Magazine* account. All accounts are within the conservation fund.

I am vetoing these sections because the transfers are inappropriate and unnecessary. Each account receives revenues collected from citizens of the state for a specific purpose. Although the transfers would enhance funding for endangered resources and *Natural Resources Magazine* activities, the monies were not collected for these purposes.

63. State Parks Concessions Report Section 9137 (4z)

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to submit a report to the Governor and the Joint Committee on Finance by October 1, 2002, on the operation and profitability of concession operations in the state parks. In addition, the department is to investigate the option of contracting with the private sector for concession services.

I am vetoing this section because this provision would limit the department's ability to effectively administer the operation of concession services at state parks. The department continually evaluates these operations and investigates options for providing concession operations. In addition, several of these operations are now provided by not–for–profit charitable organizations and such a provision could adversely affect their fund–raising capabilities.

64. Perrot State Park Bridge Study Section 9137 (8m)

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to conduct a study and submit a report to the Legislature by June 30, 2002, on the feasibility of constructing a bridge at Perrot State Park that would provide access by park users to Trempealeau Mountain.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary. The department is already looking at the feasibility of the proposed bridge as part of the master planning process in cooperation with local units of government and other interest groups.

65. Mountain–Bay State Trail Access Section 1153m

This section allows the town of Weston to establish a public access site to the Mountain–Bay State Trail and prohibits the Department of Natural Resources from requiring the closure of another public access site to offset the opening of the new site.

I am vetoing this section because opening another public access site along a state trail without closing an existing access site may pose a safety hazard for recreational users of the state trail system. I will support such a provision if it can be demonstrated that it will not pose a safety hazard.

66. Park and Forest Beaches

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (1) (es)], 585k, 600p and 9437 (1z) [as it relates to s. 20.370 (4) (aw)]

These provisions create an appropriation to provide \$150,000 SEG annually from the Department of Natural Resources' Division of Land for the operation, development and maintenance of beaches at state park and southern forest properties.

I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (1) (es)] to eliminate \$150,000 SEG in fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03. I am vetoing these provisions because this is not an appropriate use of motor boat gas tax revenues.

67. State Trail Funding

Section 590m [as it relates to trail operation]

This section creates an appropriation funded by all–terrain vehicle (ATV) registration fee revenue for operation and maintenance of trails in state parks and southern forests.

I am partially vetoing this section to limit the expenditure of ATV revenue to the maintenance of these trails. I object to the use of this fee revenue for trails that may not be open to ATV riders. However, I recognize the need to maintain these heavily traveled trails. I encourage the Department of Natural Resources, to the extent possible, to focus these funds on trails open for recreational vehicle use.

68. Hunting and Fishing in State Parks

Sections 1162h, 1162p, 1162t, 1162w and 1162wm

These sections require the Department of Natural Resources to open all state parks to hunting and fishing if the park has received any funding from the fish and wildlife account of the conservation fund at any time during the preceding ten years. The Natural Resources Board may exempt a state park from this requirement. I am vetoing this provision because this is a policy issue that should be addressed by the Natural Resources Board as part of its public hearing process. In addition, I have concerns pertaining to the safety of other persons using the state parks during designated hunting seasons.

69. Recreational Boating Earmarks

Sections 605 [as it relates to Black Point Estate, a recreational fishing pier, the Wausau Whitewater Course and a museum in Racine], 605b, 605c, 848r, 962 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (5) (c)], 972m, 1036yr, 1036yt, 9107 [as it relates to (1) (p) 2. and 3.], 9137 (4x), 9137 (5e), 9137 (6g), 9137 (7f), 9137 (8k), 9437 (2q) and 9437 (2x)

These provisions make various earmarks of funding from the recreational boating facilities aids appropriation for grants to:

- Village of Whiting for a recreational fishing pier;
- City of Wausau to upgrade the Wausau Whitewater Course;
- City of Racine for the Discovery Place Museum;
- City of Racine for dredging the Root River;
- City of Oconto for dredging the Oconto River; and
- City of Marinette for improvements to boat launching facilities on the Menominee River.

The provisions also repeal an earmark of recreational boating aid and general obligation bonding authority for Black Point Estate.

I am vetoing sections 605b, 605c, 1036yt, 9137 (4x), 9137 (5e), 9137 (6g), 9137 (7f), 9137 (8k), 9437 (2q) and 9437 (2x) and partially vetoing sections 605 [as it relates to a recreational fishing pier, the Wausau Whitewater Course and a museum in Racine] and 9107 [as it relates to (1) (p) 2. and 3.], because I object to the infringement on the Department of Natural Resources' and Waterways Commission's authority to decide which projects, and associated funding, will provide the best recreational opportunities to the many users of Wisconsin's waters. In addition, the funding earmarked for a museum in the city of Racine is excessive. Under the budget bill, the city of Racine will receive a separate grant of \$1,000,000 of general obligation bonding authority for this project.

I am vetoing sections 848r, 972m and 1036yr and partially vetoing sections 605 [as it relates to Black Point Estate] and 962 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (5) (c)] to retain the earmarked funding and general obligation bonding authority for Black Point Estate. I object to the removal of these funds because Black Point Estate reflects an important part of Wisconsin's culture and history. This project would not be eligible for funding without these earmarks and although the future of the estate is still under discussion, these funds should remain available to preserve the estate in whatever manner is decided.

70. All–Terrain Vehicle Ambassador Program

Section 1066ar

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to establish a program to award grants to organizations that meet specified qualifications, including that the organization is a nonprofit corporation that is tax–exempt under section 501 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code. In addition, the section requires grant recipients to use the grant monies to enhance all–terrain vehicle law enforcement safety and education programs.

I am partially vetoing this section because I object to the requirement that eligible grant recipients be from a nonprofit corporation that is tax–exempt under section 501 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code. Without this veto, many of the organizations that would benefit from receiving these grants would not be eligible because they are organized as social all–terrain vehicle groups.

71. All–Terrain Vehicle Warden Report

Section 1066atk

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to submit an annual report to the Joint Committee on Finance on how the increase in conservation wardens has benefited the department's efforts to enforce laws relating to the operation of all-terrain vehicles and to educate the public on these laws.

I am vetoing this section because it places an unnecessary administrative burden upon the department.

72. Chief Warden Authority

Section 1038bq

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to designate a conservation warden as the chief warden. The chief warden will direct, supervise and control conservation wardens and the performance of their duties.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the infringement on the executive branch's authority to manage programs. I am requesting the department to follow–up on public complaints against a warden's actions to ensure accountability of the wardens.

73. Determination of Fish and Wildlife Fee Use

Section 1117m

This provision would allow the Joint Committee on Finance to determine what constitutes an eligible administrative expense in regard to the management of fish and wildlife resources in the state.

I am vetoing this provision because I object to legislative interference in executive branch functions. Moreover, federal auditing processes are already in place to ensure that the Department of Natural Resources does not misuse fish and wildlife fee revenues for its administrative functions.

74. Commercial Fishing Suspended License

Section 1184m

This section authorizes a commercial fishing license holder to retain a license without conducting any commercial fishing operations in Green Bay for one period of up to seven years. The section also exempts a commercial fishing license holder from the minimum catch requirements during the seven-year period.

I am vetoing this section because it infringes on the Department of Natural Resources' and the Natural Resources Board's authority to protect and manage the fisheries of the state for the benefit of all residents and visitors. The department and the board are working to address the concerns of commercial fishing license holders and the declining fish populations in Green Bay and other Great Lakes waters. I request the department and the Natural Resources Board to continue working with the commercial fishing license holders and other users of these resources on this issue.

75. Fish Ladder Exemption

Sections 1340r and 1345c

These sections prohibit the Department of Natural Resources from requiring the city of Jefferson to include a fish passage as part of a dam safety project and require the department to provide the city with a grant for the dam safety project.

I am vetoing these sections because they set an undesirable precedent by providing assistance to a project that does not comply with requirements established to protect Wisconsin's aquatic resources. I am requesting the department to continue working with the city of Jefferson to address this issue.

76. Sturgeon Fishing Season Limit

Sections 1197g, 1197h and 9437 (4v)

These sections specify that a license for sturgeon spearing may not be issued beginning October 1 and ending on the last day of the open season for the spearing of rock or lake sturgeon except to a person who is a Wisconsin resident who turns fourteen–years–old during that period or a state resident serving in the U.S. armed forces.

I am vetoing these sections because this is a policy issue that should be addressed by the Natural Resources Board during its public hearing process.

77. University of Wisconsin–Stevens Point Bear Biologist

Sections 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.285 (1) (k) and 20.370 (1) (mu)] and 1351zf

These provisions provide \$24,000 in each fiscal year for an additional position at the University of Wisconsin–Stevens Point. The provisions also require the board of regents to ensure that the position focuses on bear hunting research and data collection. Although there is no language authorizing the position increase, the purpose of this funding was included in a Joint Committee on Finance amendment to the bill.

By lining out the appropriations and writing in smaller amounts that delete \$24,000 in each

fiscal year, I am vetoing the parts of the bill which fund this position. I am also vetoing section 1351zf to remove the requirement that the position focuses on bear hunting research. I object to having the Legislature define specific job description responsibilities in statute. Agencies need to retain the flexibility to prepare and modify job descriptions without obtaining legislative approval. However, in light of the interest in this area, I request that the board of regents consider addressing this issue within existing resources. In addition, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

78. Group Deer Hunting

Sections 1171gb, 1171gd, 1171gf and 1171gh

These sections allow bow hunters to group hunt for antlerless deer after the close of the regular gun deer season.

I am vetoing these sections because the extension of group deer hunting privileges to bow hunters is unnecessary. Bow hunting for deer is traditionally a solitary pursuit. To improve chances of harvesting a deer, bow hunters reduce the number of factors that may alert a deer to their presence, including wearing camouflaged clothing and hunting individually. These factors make group bow hunting for deer unnecessary and a safety concern.

79. Outdoor Wildlife Heritage Fund

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (1) (Lu)], 589i, 1110m and 1119z

These provisions create an outdoor wildlife heritage trust fund to receive gifts, grants, bequests or other contributions. Monies deposited in the fund may be expended for activities and programs listed in Chapter 29, Wisconsin Statutes.

I am vetoing these provisions because creating a separate fund for these monies is unnecessary. Donations may currently be made to the Department of Natural Resources exclusively for these programs and activities and are accounted for separately.

80. New Positions

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (4) (aq) and (9) (mu)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (4) (aq) and (9) (mu)] provides \$70,000 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$87,000 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03 for an additional 2.0 FTE SEG positions in the Department of Natural Resources. The positions consist of 1.0 FTE SEG position for a Wisconsin River coordinator and 1.0 FTE SEG program assistant position for the Medford ranger station.

Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the purposes of this funding were included in Joint Committee on Finance and Senate amendments to the bill.

By lining out the Department of Natural Resources' appropriations and writing in smaller amounts that delete the following amounts from s. 20.370 (4) (aq), \$46,000 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$55,000 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03 and s. 20.370 (9) (mu), \$24,000 SEG in

fiscal year 2001–02 and \$32,000 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03, provided for these purposes, I am vetoing the parts of the bill which fund these 2.0 FTE SEG positions. I object to having the Legislature manage agency programs and reduce departmental flexibility by directing the allocation of staff. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot the funds and not to authorize the 2.0 FTE SEG positions.

81. Geographic Management Requirements

Sections 1042g and 1042i

Section 1042g requires the Department of Natural Resources to include the LaCrosse–Bad Axe Watershed and the Kickapoo River Watershed in the same management unit if the state is divided for management purposes. In addition, section 1042i requires the department to include Crawford and Vernon counties in the region that covers the west central part of the state for management functions.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The sections infringe on executive branch authority to manage department resources.

82. On–line Bidding for the Automated License Issuance System

Section 1158m

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to post specifications for the operation of an automated license issuance system on an Internet site maintained by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. In addition, the section specifies that the Internet site provide a means for contractors to electronically post bids and view bids posted by other contractors.

I am vetoing this section because such a system would be difficult to maintain and the provision limits the Department of Natural Resources' flexibility in awarding the contract to the most qualified bidder.

83. Tourism Funding Section 1066y

This section prohibits the Department of Natural Resources from expending monies appropriated from the conservation fund to support a program or activity of the Department of Tourism.

I am vetoing this section because it unduly limits the Department of Natural Resources' ability to work in conjunction with another state agency to promote Wisconsin's natural resources and recreational opportunities.

84. Privatization of Geographic Information Systems Study

Section 9132 (2z)

This section requests the Joint Legislative Audit Committee to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to perform a performance evaluation audit of geographic information systems mapping services provided by the Department of Natural Resources. The audit must analyze the degree to which the department's services compete with private mapping services and the cost–effectiveness of the services provided by both the department and private businesses.

I am veroing this section because it is unnecessary. The Joint Legislative Audit Committee has the authority to decide which audits are appropriate. Also, such a study should include the geographic information systems services offered by all state agencies. I request the Department of Electronic Government to review geographic information systems services offered by state agencies and their cost-effectiveness.

85. Administrative Funding Report Section 9137 (4y)

This section requires the Department of Natural Resources to prepare a report for the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, 2002, that explains the department's reasoning for distributing administrative costs among the department's programs and how the method is viewed as being equitable. In addition, the report is to propose alternatives to the distribution process that the department believes may result in a more equitable distribution of administrative costs.

I am vetoing this section because a formal report is unnecessary. However, I am requesting the department to continue to review its methodology and to share this information with interested parties.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC LANDS

86. Land Purchase

Sections 1039b, 1088e, 1088m and 1088r

These sections allow the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands to purchase land in the state and require the board to submit a request to the Joint Committee on Finance for approval of any proposed land purchase under a 14–day passive review process. If the committee takes no action during this 14–day passive review, the board may purchase the land. If the committee does schedule a meeting, the land may be purchased only upon its approval.

These provisions restrict a land purchase by the board to no more than 10,000 acres of land in any five-year period. Within five years of a land purchase by the board, the Department of Natural Resources may offer to exchange land under its jurisdiction for the land purchased by the board or the department must pay the board for the land and the board must transfer jurisdiction over the land to the department.

Under these provisions, land exchange transactions between the board and the department would be exempt from current law provisions requiring the Natural Resources Board to make a finding that the department lands are no longer needed for conservation purposes before they may be transferred. The provisions would also exempt any land transaction related to the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands' land purchases from current law provisions requiring the

Governor's review and approval of Department of Natural Resources' land transactions.

I am vetoing these sections entirely for three reasons. First, the provisions do not limit Board of Commissioners of Public Lands to the one-time acquisition of the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation land in Marinette County. Instead, the board is granted continuing authority lands associated to acquire with any hydroelectric project. I object to including this expansion of the authority major and responsibility of the board in the budget. Such an expansion should be deliberately considered as separate legislation. Second, as this is an ongoing authority, the provisions put an excessive burden on the Department of Natural Although Resources. the Warren Knowles-Gaylord Nelson Stewardship 2000 Program currently provides adequate funds for land purchases, it is unknown if funding will always be available to meet the department's obligations under these provisions. Forced or untimely acquisition could adversely affect the department's ability to protect lands around the state. Third, this purchase may have significant fiscal implications for the trust funds managed by the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands. These fiscal implications could include a reduction in library aids supported by the common school fund of at least \$1,000,000 annually.

I recognize that preserving the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation land in Marinette County for public recreation and natural resources protection is important to residents and visitors to the state. This budget bill contains a significant increase in funding for the Stewardship 2000 Program. Therefore, I am requesting the Department of Natural Resources to work to ensure that this land is preserved and protected for the state of Wisconsin through use of the Stewardship 2000 Program.

STATE FAIR PARK BOARD

87. Board Membership

Sections 183h and 183i

These sections remove the June 30, 2003, sunset date for legislative membership on the State Fair Park Board.

I am vetoing these sections because the sunset date was agreed to as part of the State Fair Park master plan building program. The program is proceeding on schedule, and there is no need to mandate continued legislative membership on the board.

Current law requires board members to have particular affiliations with business, agriculture, tourism and the city of West Allis but allows the appointment of one nonaffiliated member. I am willing to consider appointing two members of the Legislature to the board in the event that two additional nonaffiliated seats are added to the board.

TOURISM

88. Tourism Earmarks

Sections 629n, 630 [as it relates to s. 41.11 (7)], 1400q and 9151 (1mk)

Sections 629n and 9151 (1mk) allocate \$35,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 for a grant to the New Berlin Historical Society for costs related to moving the historic Youmans home. Sections 630 [as it relates to s. 41.11 (7)] and 1400q allocate \$20,000 annually on an ongoing basis for a grant to the Wild Rivers Interpretive Center for costs related to the distribution of state tourism materials.

I am vetoing sections 629n, 1400q and 9151 (1mk) and partially vetoing section 630 [as it relates to s. 41.11 (7)] because these sections are inconsistent with the primary focus of the tourism marketing program and limit the Department of Tourism's flexibility in promoting Wisconsin tourism.

89. Kickapoo Valley Reserve Report Sections 1263h and 1404f

These sections require the Kickapoo Valley Reserve Board and the Lower Wisconsin State Riverway Board to submit a joint report to the Building Commission and the Joint Committee on Finance. The report must include recommendations on how revenue may be generated to cover the operational costs of the boards. The report must also include a resubmission of plans for building facilities.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary. The Kickapoo Valley Reserve Board has already developed plans for a visitor center, funding for which is provided in this budget. The Lower Wisconsin State Riverway Board has no immediate plans for a visitor center. Furthermore, the Kickapoo Valley Reserve Board is already working to enhance user fee Also, the Lower Wisconsin State revenue. Riverway Board is primarily a regulatory board with oversight over timber harvesting and the development of land along the Lower Wisconsin River. The Lower Wisconsin State Riverway Board does not manage wildlife areas or camping sites in the riverway and, therefore, has no opportunity to collect user fees. Finally, federal regulations restrict the use of hunting and fishing license revenue. Funding either of these boards with license revenue would result in the loss of federal revenues.

90. State Historical Society Promotions

Sections 1400n and 1400r

These sections require the Department of Tourism to advertise historic sites and state parks and allow the State Historical Society to use program revenue funds to meet joint effort marketing grant program match requirements. The department's administrative rules currently prohibit the use of state funds to meet match requirements.

I am vetoing section 1400n because it is unnecessary. The department already advertises historic sites and state parks. Imposing a requirement would limit the department's flexibility in promoting Wisconsin tourism. In addition, I am vetoing section 1400r because it undermines the purpose of the joint effort marketing program which is to pair state funds with private funds and, thereby, allow public funds to promote the maximum number of attractions.

TRANSPORTATION

91. Administrative Appropriation Reductions

Section 9152 (2cd)

This section requires the Department of Transportation to submit a plan to the Joint Committee on Finance that allocates reductions of \$3,530,800 in fiscal year 2001-02 among the department's SEG, SEG-S, PR and PR-S appropriations to reflect credits to the department's appropriations made by the Department of Employee Trust Funds to implement a provision of 1999 Wisconsin Act 11, less any amounts lapsed in fiscal year 2000-01 as a result of credits made in that year. In addition, the department's submission to Joint Committee on Finance is to include a plan for lapsing \$800,000 annually from the department's 2001–03 appropriations for departmental and operations, management highway administration and planning, the delivery cost portion of other highway appropriations, the Division of Motor Vehicles, and the Division of State Patrol. The department may not implement the plan until it is approved by Joint Committee on Finance as submitted or as modified.

I am partially vetoing this section to request that the plan be submitted to the Department of Administration secretary for approval rather than the Joint Committee on Finance to eliminate the need for additional legislative oversight. Upon approval of the plan, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to lapse the savings from identified reductions to the transportation fund.

92. General Transportation Aid Distribution

Sections 632m, 632n, 2345m, 2345n, 9159 (3q) and 9452 (10q)

Sections 2345m and 2345n suspend the general transportation aids distribution formula for aid distributed in calendar year 2002 and calendar year 2003. In addition, sections 632m, 632n, 9159 (3q) and 9452 (10q) require the Department of Transportation to pay \$8,420.92 to the city of La Crosse as partial reimbursement for a penalty that was assessed against the city for tardy filing of its 1999 annual report.

I am vetoing sections 2345m and 2345n because suspending the general transportation aids distribution formula continues to penalize some local governments due to previous penalties or changes in reported costs.

In addition, I am vetoing the provision requiring the department to reimburse the city of La Crosse for a penalty that was assessed against the city. This requirement is unnecessary since the department has already made payment for the claim as required in a ruling by the State Claims Board. The effect of this veto will be to reduce expenditures in the sum sufficient appropriation under s. 20.395 (1) (ar) by \$8,400 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to reestimate expenditures by this amount.

93. Mass Transit Aid Overpayments Section 9152 (3mp)

This section waives the repayment of overpayments for state transit operating aids previously distributed by the Department of Transportation to the city of Rhinelander.

I am vetoing this section because I object to the precedent it sets for other recipients to avoid repaying excess state transit aid received. This would lead to a drain on transportation revenues and the unfair distribution of transit aids among communities.

94. Aviation Career Education Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (2) (ds)] and 2615x

These sections provide \$25,000 SEG in each of fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03 in appropriation s. 20.395 (2) (ds) for the administration of the Aviation Career Education program. In addition, the sections require the Department of Transportation to offer the program in the city of Green Bay if there are interested and eligible applicants in the city.

While I strongly support the Aviation Career Education program, I am vetoing additional expenditure authority because this use of taxpayer dollars is unwarranted during this period of tight transportation revenues. Therefore, I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (2) (ds)] by writing down the allotted amounts by \$25,000 SEG in each of fiscal years 2001-02 and 2002-03, and I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to not allot these funds to this appropriation. The effect of this veto will be to reduce expenditures in the Department of Transportation's appropriation under s. 20.395 (2) (ds) by \$25,000 SEG in each of fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03. In addition, I am vetoing section 2615x because it is not necessary. Applicants may already petition the department to expand the program to include the city of Green Bay if there are interested and eligible applicants in the city.

95. Expressway Policing Aids

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (1) (gq)]

This section provides \$94,600 SEG in the 2001–03 biennium for expressway policing aid to Milwaukee County.

I am vetoing this provision because the allocation of these aids is not based on the cost to administer the program. Therefore, I am requesting the Department of Transportation to review current policies related to allocating funds for expressway policing aids and to find an equitable means of relating program expenses with the aid amounts. In addition, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to place \$31,200 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$63,400 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03 into unallotted reserve in the Department of Transportation's appropriation under s. 20.395 (1) (gq) to lapse to the transportation fund.

96. Local Road Improvement Program

Sections 649m, 2346m, 9152 (4x) and 9152 (4z)

Section 2346m requires the Department of Transportation to give priority to town road improvements that have been requested due to damage as a result of heavy motor truck loads. In addition, section 9152 (4x) requires the department to allocate \$25,000 SEG in the 2001–03 biennium to the town of Menasha for construction of a recreational trail and section 9152 (4z) allocates \$609,000 SEG to the village of Pleasant Prairie for street improvements before making any other allocations of funds under the Local Road Improvement Program.

I am vetoing section 2346m because this provision is arbitrary and should be addressed through separate legislation. In addition, I am vetoing sections 9152 (4x) and 9152 (4z) because these provisions circumvent the required approval process for allocating funds under this program and construction of a recreational trail should not be an allowable use of these funds.

97. Unofficial Detour Claims

Sections 2308m and 9352 (1f)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to pay claims submitted by local governments for damage to any gravel road that the department determines was caused by the road's use as an unofficial detour around a state trunk highway construction project. This provision also includes what information is to be included on the claim by the local government and a list of specific factors that the department must consider when evaluating such claims.

I am vetoing this provision since it places an unnecessary burden on the department's administrative staff and the transportation fund. This provision would be a burden because it would be difficult for the department to determine which road motorists may use as unofficial detour routes.

98. Transportation Economic Assistance Program

Sections 2308h and 9152 (4v)

Section 2308h requires the Department of Transportation to give priority to funding applications under the Transportation Economic Assistance program for applicants that have expressed a willingness to accept a loan for all or part of the state share of the project. In addition, this section prohibits the department from allocating more than 80 percent of the total amount of state funds and loan repayments appropriated to the program for making grants. Section 9152 (4v) requires the department to waive a requirement for a local match and award a grant of \$410,000 in January 2002 to Brown County, the city of Green Bay and the village of Ashwaubenon for reconstruction of a local road. I am vetoing section 2308h because it places an unnecessary financial burden upon the department and any applicants requesting state assistance under the Transportation Economic Assistance program. In addition, I am vetoing section 9152 (4v) because it circumvents the approval process for projects funded by the Transportation Economic Assistance program and results in the inequitable distribution of program funds.

99. Transportation Enhancements Projects

Sections 9152 (4c) and 9152 (4nk) Section 9152 (4c) requires the Department of Transportation to award a grant from federal enhancement funds to the city of Wausau for the City Square Park Pedestrian Pathway project if the city contributes at least twenty percent of the project's cost. In addition, Section 9152 (4nk) requires the department to award a grant for the Clayton Pedestrian Facility if the town of Clayton contributes at least fifteen percent to the project's cost.

I am vetoing these sections because they undermine the department's authority to award grants under the federal transportation enhancements program. In addition, approval of these projects will delay completion of other projects that are eligible to receive funding.

100. Roadway Improvements in the City of Ladysmith

Sections 654p, 654r, 9152 (3d) and 9152 (5g)

Section 9152 (3d) allocates \$200,000 from the SEG-funded highway and local bridge assistance appropriation to fund a local road project in the city of Ladysmith if the city contributes an amount equal to at least twenty percent of the project's cost. In addition, the other sections allocate \$480,000 from state and federal funds provided for railroad crossing improvement and protection projects to construct an underpass under the railroad tracks in the city of Ladysmith.

I am vetoing these sections because they are unnecessary. The provisions circumvent established policies, processes and eligibility requirements for funding local road projects and may impair the safety of other railroad crossings by reallocating funds from other high priority railroad crossing projects.

101. Passenger Rail Restrictions Section 2311g

This section prohibits the use of bond proceeds authorized for passenger rail improvements between Milwaukee and Green Bay or Milwaukee and Madison or for passenger rail station improvements on any project unless state funds are limited to twenty percent of the project's cost and Amtrak or another applicable railroad has agreed to provide passenger rail service along these routes.

I am vetoing this section because it may adversely influence Wisconsin's ability to fully utilize federal funds for passenger rail development in this state and the Legislature already has oversight of passenger rail expenditures. This veto maintains the requirement that the Department of Transportation receive approval from the Joint Committee on Finance before using authorized bond proceeds along specified passenger rail routes.

102. Safety Contracts

Sections 2340t and 9352 (3y)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to receive approval from the Joint Committee on Finance before entering any contract relating to alcohol or traffic enforcement activities that are funded with federal transportation safety funds.

I am vetoing these sections because they create an unnecessary administrative burden upon the department that may delay the approval and implementation of safety–oriented programs.

103. Federal Highway Formula Aid Section 2305m

Section 2305m requires the Department of Transportation secretary to submit a plan for approval to the Joint Committee on Finance if the department's most recent estimate of federal highway funds the department will receive are three percent more or less than amounts provided in the schedule for appropriations under s. 20.395 for that fiscal year.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. Current law requires the department to submit a plan to the Joint Committee on Finance if the amount of federal funds received is five percent more or less than what was provided in the schedule for appropriations under s. 20.395.

104. Major Highway Program

Sections 1080, 2297 and 2309

Section 1080 requires the Department of Transportation to provide a life-cycle cost statement for each proposed major highway development project presented to the Transportation Projects Commission for consideration for enumeration. Sections 2297 and 2309 would limit the amount of revenue bond proceeds used in the major highway program to a maximum of 55 percent over any three consecutive fiscal years.

I am vetoing section 1080 because life-cycle costs for highway projects are difficult to project and the existing major highway project approval process ensures projects are only recommended for enumeration if warranted. Furthermore, I am vetoing sections 2297 and 2309 since these provisions unnecessarily limit the department's flexibility in funding major highway construction projects.

105. Long–Range Surface Transportation Investment Planning Committee

Section 9152 (3b)

This section creates a Long–Range Surface Transportation Investment Planning Committee that will gather information relating to state and local needs for surface transportation planning, involve the participation of relevant groups, assess the long-range funding needs for surface transportation programs, develop a multiprogram state surface transportation investment plan, and prepare a report containing the committee's evaluation, findings and recommendations. Members of the committee are to be nominated by the Assembly speaker and Senate majority leader and appointed by the Governor from specified transportation related groups.

I am vetoing this section because the Department of Transportation is currently completing twenty-year plans for all major modes of transportation in the state. Creating the proposed planning committee would replicate this process and place an unnecessary administrative burden on department staff.

106. Highway Development Projects

Sections 2302c, 2302e, 2302g, 2302gg, 2305k, 9152 (3e), 9152 (3h) and 9152 (6bg)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to complete construction of USH 10 by December 31, 2013, and construct an interchange at the intersection of STH 57 and CTH P and at the intersection of USH 141 and CTH B as part of major highway projects. In addition, the sections do the following:

- Exempt a portion of USH 12 from being widened until December 31, 2011, during any reconstruction or repair;
- Widen a portion of USH 12 to five lanes without requiring a local matching contribution for project costs;
- Require reconstruction of a portion of STH 100 by June 30, 2003, and completion of the Hanson Road bridge project by December 31, 2003; and
- Allocate up to \$300,000 of federal funding for specified improvements to a project on USH 51 in the city of Madison.

I am vetoing these sections because approval of these projects may delay and increase costs and safety concerns associated with other important projects that have already been scheduled for completion. In addition, modifications to major highway projects that have already been enumerated may adversely affect the design and environmental processes used in selecting these projects for enumeration. The USH 51 project in Madison poses safety concerns. Regarding the Hanson Road bridge, I recognize that thousands of jobs and economic growth will be served by the project and I am requesting the Department of Transportation secretary to expedite the time line. I am also requesting that the secretary review the timetable for the USH 10 project to ensure that construction is completed as soon as possible.

107. Corridor Grant Program

Sections 654t and 2310m

These sections require the Department of Transportation to administer a highway corridor grant program that awards grants from the Major Highway Development program to local governments for highway corridor planning activities. The department may not expend more than \$500,000 in any fiscal year under this program.

I am vetoing these sections because this program is unnecessary. Local planning grants are currently available through the Office of Land Information Services in the Department of Administration. Funding these new grants from the Major Highway Development program will limit the amount of funding available for enumerated major highway projects and may delay the construction of these projects.

108. Southeast Wisconsin Freeway System

Sections 656k, 657k, 658t, 2303b and 9152 (5x)

Section 2303b provides definitions for "interim "Marquette Interchange,' repair," "reconstruction," "rehabilitation" and the "Southeast Wisconsin freeway" to specify that any southeast Wisconsin freeway rehabilitation projects may only be funded from the Department of Transportation's appropriations under s. 20.395 (3) (cr), (cw) and (cy) as created under this act. In addition, this section limits expenditures under these appropriations by the Department of Transportation to no more than \$160,643,900 in the 2001-03 biennium and no more than \$45,918,500 in any fiscal year thereafter, for the Marquette Interchange reconstruction project, unless the expenditure of more funds is approved by the Joint Committee on Finance.

The department may exceed the expenditure limit for the 2001–03 biennium or for fiscal years thereafter to meet project deadlines if the department makes a subsequent reduction in allocations for the Marquette Interchange reconstruction project by an equal amount. In addition, the department may transfer funding for the southeast Wisconsin freeway rehabilitation project between the state and federally funded appropriations to minimize project costs. However, the department must receive approval from Joint Committee on Finance before transferring funds from appropriations supporting the state rehabilitation program to the southeast Wisconsin rehabilitation program. The department is also required to submit its proposed relocation agreement with Aldrich Chemical Company, Inc., to the Joint Committee on Finance for approval. This agreement is to include a provision identifying the responsible party for remediation of any environmental contamination on the property.

This section also includes several requirements that must be met during reconstruction of the Marquette Interchange. These requirements include constructing and keeping open during the reconstruction project, interchanges at the intersection of 13th Street and I–94 and the intersection of Plankinton Avenue and I–794; requiring reconstruction work to be performed on a 24-hour basis; and requiring the redesign of the Marquette Interchange and I–94 in Milwaukee and Waukesha counties to allow for vehicle capacity expansion for up to thirty years. Section 9152 (5x) requires the department to submit to the Joint Committee on Finance a request to transfer monies from the SEG, SEG–L and SEG–F appropriations that allocate funds for the state highway rehabilitation program to the southeast Wisconsin freeway rehabilitation appropriations to account for expenditures associated with rehabilitation of the freeway system. The department's request, and the committee's action on the request, may not include funding allocated for projects in other parts of the state or other funding that is not allocated to rehabilitation of southeast Wisconsin freeways.

The Department of Transportation needs to maintain flexibility to properly fund reconstruction projects that are part of the southeast freeway system. Therefore, I am partially vetoing section 2303b and vetoing section 9152 (5x) to remove provisions that limit the department's ability to reallocate expenditures from the southeast Wisconsin freeway rehabilitation appropriations created under this act to provide the department with more flexibility in allocating these funds towards projects identified as having the greatest need. I am also vetoing provisions that limit expenditures for the Marquette Interchange, after the 2001-03 biennium, to ensure that reconstruction of the Marguette Interchange is not delayed. In addition, I am vetoing provisions requiring the department to construct interchanges, allow expansion capacity to meet projected traffic capacity needs and requiring 24–hour construction of the Marguette Interchange. These provisions work against the department's efforts to reach a consensus with community members on the Marquette Interchange's reconstruction plan and could further delay reconstruction and increase costs associated with this project.

109. West Canal Street Reconstruction Funding Sections 655 and 9152 (5y)

This section requires the Department of Transportation to request up to \$5,000,000 in tribal gaming revenues in its 2003-05 biennial budget request if additional funds are needed in the 2003-05 fiscal biennium to complete the West Canal Street project. The section specifies that if a request for additional funds is made, the department's shall include request а recommendation for statutory changes to require the city of Milwaukee to make a matching contribution equal to the amount of the grant to be awarded by the department in the 2003-05 biennium.

I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the requirement for the department to request additional funding for the West Canal Street reconstruction project in the 2003–05 biennium. In addition, I am partially vetoing the provision that specifies that the city of Milwaukee will be required to make a matching contribution if additional funds are received in the 2003-05 biennium for the West Canal Street reconstruction project. I am vetoing these provisions because they limit flexibility in addressing funding for this critical project. The

level of future local government contributions will be dependent on the scope of the project and the capacity of other funding sources to address this important infrastructure need. I remain committed to the funding goals included in my original budget proposal and intend to ensure completion of this project in the 2003–05 biennium.

110. Locations of Highway Rest Areas Sections 2307f, 9152 (3wy) and 9352

(3wy) These sections prohibit the construction of rest areas along a state trunk highway at a location that is within five miles of an exit from the highway that provides access to motorists' services. In addition, the Department of Transportation is required to use any savings realized under this provision to reopen previously closed rest areas or to keep areas proposed for closure that do not meet these restrictions open. This restriction does not apply to rest areas located within five miles of the state border or to any rest area near the village of Belmont in Lafayette County.

I am vetoing this provision because it may adversely affect our efforts to maintain public safety on state roadways by requiring the removal of existing rest areas as those facilities become inadequate to meet public demand. In addition, this provision is inefficient because it would prohibit the construction of rest areas that are already scheduled for construction and require reopening other facilities that have been closed.

111. Traffic Signals and Streetlights

Sections 9152 (6dd), 9152 (6dg) and 9152 (6x)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to install traffic signals at the intersection of USH 63 and West Beaver Brook Avenue in the city of Spooner and STH 38 and Oakwood Road in the city of Oak Creek. In addition, the sections require the department to install a streetlight at the intersection of STH 27 and STH 71 in the town of Little Falls.

I am vetoing these sections because they circumvent normal approval processes and may impose additional safety hazards for motorists without full review and study by the department. Therefore, I am requesting that the department to work in cooperation with local officials to determine if the installation of the traffic signals and streetlight is warranted.

112. Erection of Signs

Sections 9152 (6b), 9152 (6e), 9152 (6h), 9152 (6pp), 9152 (6q) and 9152 (6s)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to erect several signs, including:

- A specific information sign on I–94 for Tenuta's Delicatessen and Liquors if the word "liquor" does not appear on the sign;
- Directional signs for the Wayland Academy along USH 151 and the Clear Lake All Veterans' Memorial and Cemetery along USH 63;

- Signs along I–43 identifying the city of Delavan as a "Historic Downtown";
- Signs along STH 29 and STH 107 identifying the area known as "Little Chicago"; and
- Directional signs along I–43/894 for downtown Greendale.

I am vetoing these sections because these items circumvent established policies, processes and eligibility requirements in statutory and administrative law. In addition, the installation and ongoing operating costs to maintain these signs will place an additional burden on the transportation fund.

113. Agricultural Tourism Facilities Section 2340y

This section requires the Department of Transportation to develop and implement a plan to promote and maximize the erection of agricultural tourism signs along highways in Wisconsin to identify and provide directional information to any agricultural tourism facility located in Wisconsin. The section also requires the department to consult with the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection while developing and implementing the plan.

I am vetoing this section because it is overly broad and could reduce safety on Wisconsin's highways. However, I recognize the importance of these facilities to the state and request the Departments of Transportation; Tourism; and Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to consider these facilities when promoting Wisconsin's agricultural and tourism industries.

114. Speed Limit Restrictions

Sections 3442g, 3442h, 3442j, 3442k, 3442m, 3456m and 3456p

These sections designate the speed limit along portions of STH 58 in the city of Mauston as 35 miles per hour and 45 miles per hour along certain portions of STH 58 in the town of Lisbon. In addition, the sections prohibit the Department of Transportation from modifying these established speed limits and extend current law provisions related to the posting of speed limits and forfeitures for exceeding those limits to these newly established speed limits.

I am vetoing this provision because it bypasses current law for designating speed limits on highways and is not appropriate for inclusion in the budget bill. I encourage the department to assess the speed limits in this area in order to address the safety concerns of the communities along this transportation corridor.

115. Highway Reports and Studies

Sections 2296m, 2302k, 2302m, 2305g and 9152 (5yq)

These sections require the Department of Transportation to submit to specific entities the following reports: a biennial report showing transportation revenues and funding for transportation programs for at least fifteen years preceding the report; an annual report on the schedule for construction of enumerated major highway projects; and a biennial report on the condition and performance of state trunk highways. In addition, the department is required to do a study on the STH 11/USH 14 transportation corridor and allocate \$200,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 from appropriations for major highway projects to conduct a location study and environmental assessment for a STH 15/USH 45 project. The sections also waive the current law provision requiring the department to get approval from the Transportation Projects Commission before conducting an environmental impact statement or environmental assessment on a potential major highway development project.

I am vetoing the provisions requiring the department to provide reports because they are unnecessary and place an additional administrative burden on the department. I am vetoing the provision requiring the department to conduct a study of STH 11/USH14 and STH 15/USH 45 because these projects undermine the Transportation Projects Commission's authority to oversee the development of potential major highway projects. In addition, appropriating funds from the major highway appropriations to fund a study for STH 15/USH 45 may delay the construction of other enumerated major highway projects. However, I recognize the need for these and other critical mobility projects around the state. As such, I request the Department of Transportation secretary to consider alternatives to accelerate Transportation Projects Commission's review of these important projects.

116. Stillwater Bridge Project Section 2296p

Section 2296p requires the Department of Transportation to develop and submit a proposal to the Joint Committee on Finance specifying the amount of anticipated expenditures to be made by the department for mitigation in connection with the Stillwater Bridge project across the St. Croix River. This section also specifies that, if the department determines expenditures will exceed the amount anticipated, it must submit a proposal to the Joint Committee on Finance for unanticipated expenditures.

I am vetoing this section because it adds an unnecessary step in the process of approving the Stillwater Bridge project and could further delay or jeopardize the completion of a new bridge.

117. Bridge Designations

Sections 2307k and 2307r

These sections require the Department of Transportation to designate and mark the I–43 bridge across the Fox River as the "Leo Frigo Bridge" and to designate and mark the USH 45 bridge across the south branch of the Embarrass River as the "Gateway to the North."

I am vetoing these sections because they are policy items that should be addressed through separate legislation.

118. Outdoor Advertising

Sections 2308sr, 2308st and 2340vg

Section 2340vg allows for the trimming or removal of vegetation located in a highway right–of–way under the Department of Transportation's jurisdiction if the vegetation prevents an operator of a vehicle traveling on the highway from seeing, for six uninterrupted seconds, a business or sign located adjacent to the highway right-of-way. In order to trim or remove vegetation the person must obtain a permit from the department, pay the cost of trimming or removing the vegetation, and replace any removed vegetation with comparable vegetation along the same highway right-of-way. In addition, the section specifies that no state funds may be expended for the trimming or removal process. The section requires the department to grant or deny any application for a permit within thirty days of receipt of the application. Sections 2308sr and 2308st require the department to exempt an advertising sign that is owned by a religious organization and a sign that has been permanently removed, even if the department is not notified, from being assessed an annual sign permit fee as established in administrative rule. I am vetoing these provisions because the public and other interested parties have not been allowed adequate input in the development of this policy. Many of the proposed changes can be through administrative addressed rules. Therefore, I am requesting the department improve its current permit review and approval process, and solicit and review comments from the public, affected businesses and landowners, and state agencies to determine if changes to the department's administrative rules are necessary.

119. Motor Vehicle Studies and Reports

Sections 2340k, 9152 (3k) and 9152 (5z) Section 9152 (3k) requires the Department of Transportation to conduct a study and report on implementing a statewide automated drivers' license testing program. In addition, sections 2340k and 9152 (5z) require the department to study and prepare a report, in consultation with the Department of Electronic Government, on the department's computerized information systems and the department's plan for utilizing its data processing resources. The department is required to report its findings to the Joint Committee on Finance in fiscal year 2001–02. As part of its approval of the report, the committee may transfer up to \$2,000,000 from appropriation under s. 20.395 (5) (cq) to the appropriation under s. 20.395 (4) (aq) for the purposes of a consultant study of the department's computerized information systems and information technology needs.

I am vetoing sections 2340k and 9152 (3k) because they are unnecessary and provide too much legislative oversight of the department's operations. In addition, I am partially vetoing section 9152 (5z) to allow the Department of Administration secretary to transfer up to \$2,000,000 from the Department of Transportation's appropriation under s. 20.395 (5) (cq) to the Department of Transportation's appropriation under s. 20.395 (4) (aq) in fiscal year 2002-03 for the purpose of conducting a consultant study of the Department of Transportation's computerized information systems and information technology needs. I am requesting the Department of Transportation to submit a report analyzing its computerized information systems and its plan for utilizing its data processing resources to the Department of Administration secretary upon its completion.

120. Low Speed Vehicles

Sections 2114c, 2972k, 3020q, 3020r, 3020s, 3020t, 3020u, 3219L, 3219v, 3390u, 3390v, 3390x, 3390y, 3407e, 3407h, 3407p, 3407r, 3407v, 3408t, 3408v, 3408y, 3409n, 3409r, 3442d, 3445be, 3445bk, 3445bp, 3456mg, 3456nm, 3456s and 3816m

These sections create a new classification of motor vehicle called a "low-speed vehicle." A low-speed vehicle is a motor vehicle, as defined by federal law, which complies with applicable equipment standards, but does not include a golf cart. This provision generally makes low-speed vehicles subject to the same regulations applicable to other motor vehicles including the following: requiring vehicles to be manufactured to meet federal safety standards; subject dealers, distributors, manufacturers and transporters to the same regulations that apply to motorcycles; exempt low-speed vehicles from the state's property tax; and requires low-speed vehicles to be registered with the Department of Transportation. The provision treats low-speed vehicles differently from most other motor vehicles in the following respects: low-speed vehicles are operable on roadways having a speed limit under 25 miles per hour, except that local authorities may allow their operation on highways having a speed limit between 25 and 35 miles per hour; low-speed vehicles are prohibited from operating on state trunk highways or connecting highways unless they are operated in a designated crossing zone.

I am vetoing this provision because of safety concerns associated with operating a low-speed vehicle on local streets even if the speed limit is 25 miles per hour or less. I also object to the circumvention of the authority of local governments to regulate the use of these vehicles on local roads. While I support the creation of a new classification for low-speed vehicles, this policy should be developed with input from local governments and the public and be addressed in separate legislation.

121. Motorcycle Requirements

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (4) (aq)], 3390yd, 3390yw, 3406p, 3445dg and 3445dm

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (4) (aq)] provides \$406,000 annually for the motorcycle, moped and motor bicycle safety program and sections 3390yd, 3390yw and 3406p establish specifications for the color and size of a motorcycle license plate. In addition, sections 3445dg and 3445dm specify that the stop lamp on a motorcycle must be red and may be able to emit a blue light in the center of the lamp.

While I support the motorcycle, moped and motor bicycle safety program, this use of taxpayer

dollars is unwarranted during this period of tight transportation revenues. Therefore, I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (4) (aq)] to eliminate \$406,000 SEG in fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03. The effect of this veto is to provide \$53,900,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$53,892,200 in fiscal year 2002–03 for departmental management and operations expenditures.

I am vetoing the provisions pertaining to the size and color of a motorcycle license plate and color of a motorcycle stop lamp because these policy issues should be addressed as separate legislation. In addition, current federal motor vehicle safety standards indicate that the blue dot in the middle of the red motorcycle brake light is not permissible for sale or use.

122. Vehicle Extrication Training Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (5) (ds)], 671h, 2337k, 3410k, 3411k, 3412k, 3413k, 3414k and 9452 (2f)

These sections create an appropriation to make an annual grant of \$375,000 beginning in fiscal year 2002–03 to a nonprofit corporation that has experience in providing training to teach vehicle extrication techniques. In addition, these sections increase the fee for vehicle operator's license search requests by \$2.20.

I am vetoing section 2337k that requires the Department of Transportation to make an annual grant for vehicle extrication since the grant would duplicate similar services already provided by the Wisconsin Technical College System. Therefore, I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (5) (ds)] and section 671h to eliminate the appropriation used for allocating these grants.

In addition, I am vetoing sections 3410k, 3411k, 3412k, 3413k, 3414k and 9452 (2f) to remove twenty cents of the fee increase, thereby reducing the fee increase to \$2.00 per request. Since the intended use of the twenty cent fee increase was to fund the vehicle extrication grant program, it is no longer necessary and would only serve to place an additional cost upon persons eligible to receive this information.

123. Designation of Overlength Truck Routes

Section 9152 (5c)

Section 9152 (5c) lifts restrictions on motor truck lengths for portions of STH 107 and other specific county trunk highways until the Department of Transportation has had an opportunity to review these routes to determine if the routes should be designated as overlength truck routes under administrative rule.

I am vetoing section 9152 (5c) because it bypasses the administrative rule process that designates truck routes as overlength truck routes. Allowing overlength truck travel on these routes before requiring a full assessment by the department and a public hearing may lead to premature wear on the roadway and other driver safety problems.

124. Oversize and Overweight Vehicle Permit Fees

Sections 3446k, 3447k, 3448k, 3449k, 3450k, 3451k, 3452k, 3453k, 3454k, 3455k and 9452 (3k)

These sections increase the surcharge on oversize and overweight vehicle permits from ten percent to fifteen percent effective with permits issued after December 31, 2001, and extend the expiration of this surcharge from July 1, 2003, to March 1, 2009.

I am vetoing these sections because the fee increase places an unnecessary financial burden on our state's commercial motor carrier industry. requesting the Department am of Transportation to work in cooperation with the commercial motor carrier industry and other interested parties to develop a funding alternative that will fully support implementation of an automated oversize and overweight vehicle permitting system. This veto will allow the ten percent surcharge on oversize and overweight vehicles to expire on July 1, 2003.

125. Farm Progress Days

Sections 2339, 2339m and 2340i

These sections exempt any sponsor of Farm Progress Days from a provision that allows the Department of Transportation to charge sponsors of public events, that charge an admissions fee, for security and traffic enforcement services provided by state patrol officers. The sections also require the department to promulgate rules specifying sponsorship eligibility and what events qualify as Farm Progress Days.

I am partially vetoing this provision because it establishes a precedent for other special public event sponsors to request an exemption from paying for services provided by state patrol officers. The effect of this partial veto is to allow the department to charge public event sponsors a fee for security and traffic enforcement services if an admission fee is charged for the event.

126. Passive Alcohol Sensors

Section 2882m

This section prohibits the use of a passive alcohol sensor by a law enforcement official for the purposes of detecting the presence of alcohol in a person's breath unless the person consents to its use.

I am vetoing this section because the use of these sensors may assist law enforcement personnel in deterring persons from driving while intoxicated or under the influence of alcohol. However, I do have concerns pertaining to the accuracy of these instruments and to ensuring that privacy rights are considered. Therefore, I am requesting the Department of Transportation to work in cooperation with other agencies and local law enforcement agencies to conduct a study on the effectiveness and use of these devices. Furthermore, this policy should be developed with greater input from law enforcement agencies and the public and be addressed in separate legislation.

127. Fireworks Possession, Sale and Enforcement

Sections 2599m, 2599mg, 2881ae, 2881af, 2881ag, 2881ah, 2881aj, 2881ak, 2881am, 2881an, 2881ap, 3427t and 3427tg

These sections authorize resident wholesalers to sell regulated fireworks to any nonresident person if the nonresident person gives the wholesaler a signed statement indicating that the fireworks are for use outside this state. The sections also authorize nonresident persons to transport fireworks to an out-of-state location and to stop in any Wisconsin municipality for up to twelve hours while en route to the out-of-state destination. The section specifies that a person who intends to lawfully sell regulated fireworks may possess the fireworks without first obtaining a fireworks permit. In addition, state traffic patrol officers are authorized to enforce the permit requirement for the possession and use of fireworks on highways and to issue uniform traffic citations for violations of the permit requirement. However, the authority to seize fireworks that are possessed and are used in violation of fireworks statutes or ordinances is removed unless the violation is subject to criminal penalties. The sections prohibit courts from forwarding a record of conviction for any violation of the permit requirement to the Department of Transportation and prohibit the department from assessing any demerit points against driving records for convictions for violations of the permit requirement.

I am vetoing these sections because this is a policy issue that should be addressed through separate legislation to allow for further public input and discussion.

128. Public Safety Radio Program Sections 2321m and 2321p

These sections require the Department of Natural Resources to make quarterly payments to the Department of Transportation if it provides radio services to the Department of Natural Resources and the provision would limit the Department of Transportation's expenditures for the program to fifty percent of the cost or \$138,000, whichever is less.

I am vetoing these provisions because they circumvent a previous agreement made between these two agencies and may leave the public safety radio program underfunded since the Department of Transportation is the primary user of the program's radio services. This veto will require payments for the public radio system to be based on the level of each agency's usage.

WISCONSIN HOUSING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

129. Development Reserve Fund Authorization

Section 3125c

This section requires the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority to include in its annual report to the Legislature recommendations for maximum expenditure amounts for the loan programs guaranteed by the Wisconsin development reserve fund. The Joint Committee on Finance may adjust the submitted amounts. The authority may request adjustments to the amounts during the year under a 14-day passive review process.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary and reduces the administrative flexibility of the authority. Guarantee requirements under the programs can change rapidly. To efficiently administer the Wisconsin development reserve fund, the authority must be able to adjust guarantee amounts across programs quickly.

C. HUMAN RESOURCES

BOARD ON AGING AND LONG-TERM CARE

1. Volunteer Ombudsman Position Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.432 (1) (kc)], 688d and 721w

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.432 (1) (kc)] and 688d provide funding for 1.0 FTE PR-S volunteer ombudsman coordinator position. Section 721w requires the Department of Health and Family Services to transfer \$35,300 PR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$40,200 PR in fiscal year 2002-03 to s. 20.432 (1) (kc) to fund the position. I am vetoing these sections because the expansion is unnecessary at this time. In addition, the civil money penalty funding from s. 20.435 (6) (g) is needed by the department for current nursing home monitoring costs and to create a reserve for future monitoring costs. I have retained the provision in the budget bill that requires the department to seek approval from the federal government to use civil money penalty funding for the ombudsman position. If the department receives federal approval and if the revenues are sufficient to support monitoring costs and the ongoing costs for the coordinator, the board can request the position and expenditure authority under ss. 16.505 and 16.515. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to authorize the 1.0 FTE PR-S position.

HEALTH AND FAMILY SERVICES

2.

Intergovernmental Transfer Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (wm)], 717bd, 1776m and 1778

These sections relate to the use of nursing home intergovernmental transfer (IGT) funds for payments to county nursing homes and to other nursing homes receiving reimbursement under Medical Assistance. These sections specify that if less than \$115,200,000 in revenue from the IGT program is received in a given fiscal year, the Department of Health and Family Services may only make a supplemental payment to counties of \$37,100,000. This provision also allows the department to make a payment up to \$77,100,000 if more than \$115,200,000 in IGT revenues are received in a given fiscal year. Finally, these sections create a new sum sufficient appropriation in which any

unanticipated or otherwise unappropriated IGT revenues are to be deposited, to be used only for supplemental payments to county or other nursing homes.

The budget as passed by the Legislature assumes annual IGT revenues will be significantly less than \$115,200,000. Counties would receive an increased supplemental payment only if revenues are more than \$115,200,000, yet if even slightly less revenue is available, the counties would receive no increase in the supplement. At the same time, the Legislature appropriated IGT revenues to pay fully for the increased payment, which is inconsistent with maintaining this \$115,200,000 threshold in state statutes.

With respect to the new appropriation for unanticipated IGT revenues, this provision will create significant pressure to expend these revenues in the 2001–03 biennium, exacerbating a cost–to–continue problem. The intent of the administration was to dedicate the vast majority of unanticipated IGT revenues to county and other nursing home payments for use in future years. With the Medical Assistance budget facing a \$220 million structural deficit at the start of fiscal year 2003–04, any IGT revenues received above what have already been appropriated should not be expended unless an unforeseen problem arises.

Therefore, I am digit vetoing sections 1776m and 1778, eliminating the \$115,200,000 threshold and thus removing this inconsistency from the budget. Also, I am partially vetoing sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (wm)] and 717bd to specifying remove language this new appropriation for unanticipated IGT funds as a sum sufficient appropriation. By default, as outlined in s. 20.001 (3) (a), this appropriation will operate as an annual appropriation which can only be increased by an act of the Legislature or by an emergency action as specified under s. 13.10. Furthermore, I direct the department, working cooperatively with the county and other nursing homes, to pursue separate legislation clarifying that the vast majority of any unanticipated IGT funds will be dedicated to future county and other nursing home payments.

3. Supplemental Hospital Payment

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (w)]

Section 395 appropriates a supplemental payment to hospitals participating in the Medical Assistance (MA) managed care initiative. Although there is no language in the budget bill authorizing this supplement, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize the increases in this area.

All hospitals serving MA or BadgerCare recipients received a rate increase in the 2001–03 biennial budget using intergovernmental transfer funds. I see no reason to retain an additional supplement for facilities participating in the MA managed care initiative. Therefore, I am vetoing this provision and decreasing the Department of Health and Family Services' appropriation under s. 20.435 (4) (w) by \$71,000 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and by \$74,500 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

4. Joint Committee on Finance Authority to Supplement BadgerCare

Sections 1836g and 1836r

These sections authorize the Joint Committee on Finance to supplement the BadgerCare benefits appropriation under s. 13.10 from any other appropriation after the administration has submitted a proposal to reduce or stop program enrollment in the event of a projected funding shortfall. Under current law, the Department of Health and Family Services is required to limit enrollment in the program if the program is projected to exceed its budget, and BadgerCare may be supplemented only through an act of the full Legislature, signed by the Governor into law. In its first two years, the BadgerCare program experienced rapid caseload growth which left the program facing budget shortfalls. Fully funding BadgerCare required separate legislation in fiscal year 2000-01 as well as additional increases in the 2001-03 biennial budget. However, caseload growth in the program has stabilized, and the need for future supplements is less likely.

If, however, there is unanticipated growth in the BadgerCare program, it is appropriate to consider reducing or stopping program enrollment. If both the Legislature and administration agree that sufficient funds exist to supplement the program, then separate legislation can still remedy any shortfall. Therefore, I am vetoing these sections, to eliminate the Joint Committee on Finance's authority to supplement the BadgerCare program from any other state appropriation because it is unnecessary.

5. BadgerCare Funding Study Section 9123 (9wo)

This provision requires the Department of Health and Family Services to produce a report for the Joint Committee on Finance on the potential for long-term savings under the BadgerCare

program, to be completed by January 1, 2002. I support finding ways to reduce program costs in BadgerCare and other health care programs, but this provision does not provide the department sufficient time to complete a comprehensive review of the program. Therefore, I am partially vetoing this provision and am directing the department to complete its review of the BadgerCare program by January 1, 2003. Furthermore, I direct the department to submit a copy of the report to the secretary of the Department of Administration as а cost-containment proposal to be considered during the 2003–05 biennial budget process.

6. Medical Assistance Estate Recovery Audit

Section 9132 (3w)

This section requests that the Joint Committee on Audit direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to study the estate recovery program administered by the Department of Health and Family Services. The Joint Committee on Audit currently has the authority to request such a study if it deems an evaluation is needed, making this budget provision unnecessary. Therefore, I am vetoing this provision.

7. Provider Fraud and Abuse Administrative Rules Section 9123 (15k)

This provision requires the Department of Health and Family Services to craft proposed administrative rules for new Medical Assistance fraud and abuse provisions within nine months of the budget bill's effective date. I feel nine months is not sufficient time for the department to develop proposed administrative rules. Therefore, I am vetoing section 9123 (15k) and am directing the department to submit its proposed rules to the Joint Legislative Council staff by January 1, 2003.

8. Grants for Case Management Services for Children with Asthma

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (5) (ca)], 718s and 3142m

These sections authorize a \$150,000 GPR annual grant to Milwaukee County to provide case management services to children with asthma. I am vetoing this provision because the Department of Health and Family Services is investing significant resources into Medical Assistance (MA) services for asthma treatment. Furthermore, asthma is a statewide medical issue and its treatment and control is not well through geographic served earmarks. Therefore, I am vetoing these sections and eliminating this special grant to Milwaukee County.

Medical Assistance as well as the BadgerCare program currently cover case management services for children with asthma, including comprehensive assessments of the child's needs, the development of an individualized case plan and on-going monitoring of the child. The department also encourages health maintenance organizations (HMOs) to report on the asthma care received by MA and BadgerCare recipients in their respective areas of service and will begin including performance measures tracking asthma care in the department's contracts with HMOs. These initiatives represent just a few of several state programs that address asthma issues.

9. Standards for Health Maintenance Organizations Sections 1787m, 1787ma, 9323

Sections 1787m, 1787mg, 9323 (15k) and 9423 (12p)

These sections require all health maintenance organizations (HMOs) serving Medical Assistance (MA) and BadgerCare recipients within a specific zip code to have a sufficient number of primary care providers available within thirty miles of that zip code. This provision was intended to broaden the number of primary care providers to which MA or BadgerCare recipients have access. While I support ensuring recipients have sufficient access to care, this policy item will not have any measurable effect on access issues.

The Department of Health and Family Services currently requires these HMOs to have a sufficient number of primary care providers within twenty miles of the zip code in which they serve recipients. I feel that a narrower radius is more beneficial to participants in that it ensures more providers are available closer to an individual's home. Furthermore, by specifying a radius in state statute, the department's authority to administratively respond to unique geographical access issues would be limited. Therefore, I am vetoing these sections and retaining the department's current authority to address primary care access issues through its administrative authority.

10. Medical Assistance Income Limit for Medically Needy Recipients

Sections 1797g, 1797j, 1798g, 1800m, 1804g, 1804m, 1805d, 1815g, 1815j, 9323 (10d) and 9423 (6d)

These provisions provide \$500,800 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in order to expand Medical Assistance (MA) eligibility by increasing the income limit for medically needy recipients by the annual increase in the consumer price index. This change would not be effective until January 1, 2003.

Under current law, individuals who are not categorically eligible for MA can "spend down" their incomes to the medically needy limit to qualify for assistance. Some families have difficulty obtaining and maintaining coverage under this provision because the spend down threshold is capped at 133 percent of the Aid to Families with Dependent Children income limit in 1996, which is \$596 for a family of two. While I am sympathetic to families who have difficulty obtaining services under the medically needy criteria, the tight fiscal constraints faced by the state make additional expansions of the MA program problematic. Since these annual adjustments will be only partially implemented in fiscal year 2002–03, they will add approximately \$500,000 GPR to the structural deficit facing the state at the start of the 2003-05 biennium. Therefore, I am vetoing these provisions to maintain the current income threshold for those seeking MA under the medically needy eligibility category. Furthermore, I am requesting that the Department of Administration secretary place \$500,800 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03 in unallotted reserve in appropriation s. 20.435 (4) (b) to lapse to the general fund.

11. Transfer of Medical Assistance Funds to Community Options Program

Sections 1778d, 1778h, 1778p and 1778r

These sections require the Department of Health and Family Services to submit annually a report to the Joint Committee on Finance on the utilization of nursing home beds funded by Medical Assistance (MA) program benefits. These provisions further require the department to submit an annual proposal to the Joint Committee on Finance, under 14-day passive review, to transfer MA funds to the Community Options Program (COP) if the report shows decreasing MA nursing home bed utilization. The specific amount the department must transfer to COP is equal to the decrease in nursing home bed utilization over the prior two fiscal years multiplied by the average cost of a nursing home bed in the most recently completed fiscal year. This provision does not require the Joint Committee on Finance to consider the overall fiscal condition of the MA program before approving this transfer.

Under current law, the department may transfer surplus MA funds budgeted for nursing homes to COP, but such transfers may occur only if there is an overall surplus in the MA benefits appropriation. While T support community-based strategies for providing long-term care services, I object to this requirement to transfer MA funds to COP even if the MA budget is in deficit. Such a transfer would simply worsen a deficit which can only be filled by purpose appropriating additional general revenue. Transfers made in one fiscal year should not be dictated by occurrences in prior years, because the factors contributing to the situation in the past may not recur or persist in the present.

Therefore, I am vetoing these provisions, reinstating the Department of Health and Family Services' current authority to transfer MA nursing home funds to COP if a surplus in the entire MA program exists.

12. Health Insurance Supplement for Community Disability Service Providers

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (bu)], 707r, 707s, 9123 (13q) and 9423 (15r)

These sections provide a \$250,000 GPR supplement in fiscal year 2001–02 to providers under the home- and community-based waiver programs to meet the costs of providing employee health insurance. While acknowledge that health insurance costs can be significant for these facilities, such costs are not unique to these providers. Any health care provider, company or small business faces similar cost pressures, and I see no justification for providing a special supplement only to community-based waiver program providers. Therefore, I am vetoing these sections and eliminating the supplement.

13. Medical Assistance Speech Therapy Services

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (b) and (bc)]

This provision includes a 76 percent increase in rates paid for speech therapy services, costing \$250,000 GPR and \$354,000 FED in fiscal year 2002–03. Although there is no language in the

budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize funding increases in this service area.

Although I understand and appreciate the value of speech therapy services, I cannot justify a rate increase of this magnitude, given the fiscal constraints of the budget. Rates for includes noninstitutional providers, which speech therapy services, were already increased in the budget by 2.5 percent in each year. Further rate increases cannot be justified given the current fiscal situation of the state. Thus, I am decreasing the Department of Health and Family Services' appropriations under s. 20.435 (4) (b) by \$246,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 and s. 20.435 (4) (bc) by \$4,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. This veto is part of a larger write-down of the Medical Assistance appropriation. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

14. Adult Day Care Certification Fee Section 1791i

This section removes the Department of Health and Family Services' authority to change the fee for the certification of adult day care facilities through administrative rule. Under current law, the department charges a fee equal to a flat rate of \$89 plus a variable rate of \$17.80 multiplied by the number of clients the facility serves. The department's practice is to multiply this variable rate by the maximum number of individuals a facility is capable of serving, not necessarily the actual number of persons receiving adult day care services. The budget bill changes this fee to a flat rate of \$100 per facility.

While I support changing the fee, I object to removing the department's authority to change the fee through administrative rule. By setting the fee at a flat rate per facility, the revenue received by the department for administering this license will be reduced from approximately \$31,600 PR per year to \$5,000 PR per year. This reduction leaves the department with virtually no funds to monitor these facilities. While I understand that the current fee may be considered excessive by facilities equipped to serve large numbers of individuals, I maintain the department should have the ability to reasonably increase its fees so that it may respond to future program needs.

Therefore, I am vetoing the section to retain the department's authority to change the fee through administrative rule. Under this veto, any increase to the fee must be approved through the rules process which is overseen by the Legislature.

15. Licensure for Respite Facilities

Sections 1877g, 1877h, 1877i, 1894r, 1897g, 1900b, 1900c, 1900d, 1900e, 1900f, 1900g, 1900h, 1900i, 1900j, 1900k, 1900L, 1900m, 9123 (18f) and 9423 (18f)

These sections would require the Department of Health and Family Services to create a new type of licensure for facilities serving individuals with similar disabilities over the age of two. Facilities receiving this license would be allowed to provide respite, residential care to both children and adults, serving up to ten individuals under a single license. Under current law, a facility seeking to provide these services would need to obtain licenses both as a group or foster home and as a Community-Based Residential Facility. The intent of these sections was to allow a provider to serve both adults and children under only one license. However, since these provisions do not extend coverage to children under Chapter 48 of state statutes, which provides legal rights for children in out-of-home placement settings, a facility seeking this new respite licensure would still have to obtain a group foster home license in order to legally provide respite care for children.

While I support efforts to improve the access to respite care for both adults and children, I object to this provision because it replaces one form of dual licensure with a new dual licensure. This new licensure category is not likely to result in any additional flexibility to providers than available under current law and administrative rules. Furthermore, the department has the authority to waive portions of current license rules in order to accommodate providers demonstrating a unique need.

Therefore, I am vetoing these sections, eliminating this new form of respite licensure. I am further directing the department to develop a waiver process for facilities seeking to serve individuals with similar disabilities over the age of two, in order to find new strategies to improve the supply of respite care in Wisconsin.

16. Fees for Health Care Records

Sections 2850bg, 2850bh, 2850bi, 3872x, 3872y, 9123 (14g) and 9423 (16f)

These provisions require the Department of Health and Family Services to develop uniform rules by January 1, 2003, on fees to be charged for providing copies of health care records. The language identifies all of the items to be considered in establishing such charges.

I am vetoing these provisions because they are duplicative. Current law already provides the department with the authority to develop such rules. I am directing the department to develop these rules in conformance with the intent of the provisions being vetoed and submit these rules to the Department of Administration secretary for review and, with his concurrence, forward the rules to the standard rule–making process.

17. Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) Funding Sections 3140c and 3140m

Section 3140c requires that all funding for life care services and early intervention be granted to the AIDS services organizations throughout the state. I am partially vetoing this section to ensure that the Department of Health and Family Services can continue to provide grants to a variety of organizations including, but not limited to, the AIDS services organizations. This section also includes housing assistance as an eligible service. I am partially vetoing this provision to retain the current allowable services because housing assistance can be funded from other sources. Section 3140m authorizes funding for an African–American family resource center in Milwaukee targeting AIDS prevention efforts to families. I am vetoing funding in fiscal year 2002–03 so that an ongoing commitment is not made to this organization and requesting that the Department of Administration secretary place \$62,500 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in unallotted reserve in the Department of Health and Family Services' appropriation s. 20.435 (5) (am) to lapse to the general fund.

18. Statewide Trauma System

Sections 174p, 670, 2850ag, 9123 (12r), 9123 (12s) and 9152 (2t)

These provisions require the Department of Transportation to provide federal highway safety funds to the Department of Health and Family Services to fund two project positions to develop the statewide trauma system and to provide grants to regional trauma councils as established through these provisions. Although I support the statewide trauma system, I am vetoing provisions relating to this transfer of funds because I believe these federal funds are more appropriately used to improve highway safety. Dedication of these funds to the trauma system program would also result in reductions in other highway safety which grants, is I am also vetoing the counterproductive. requirement that regional trauma advisory councils be established because there will not be funding to support these councils.

19. Assessment on Small Employer Insurers

Section 2850dm, 2850Ldc, 2850Ldm, 2850Le [as it relates to the small employer insurer assessment], 2850Lem, 2850Lj [as it relates to the small employer insurer assessment], 2850Ln [as it relates to the small employer insurer assessment] and 3766r

These provisions establish a penalty that would be assessed on small employer insurers that terminate health coverage and whose enrollees subsequently enroll in the Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan (HIRSP). The penalty would be used to reduce the policyholders' premiums and the assessment on insurers that is currently part of the financial support for HIRSP. I am vetoing these provisions because they are directly counter to our efforts to encourage a broader market for health care policies sold to small businesses. It would also be administratively difficult to calculate the penalty, which could actually increase HIRSP program costs because the Department of Health and Family Services would have to contract for additional actuarial services.

Section 3766r eliminates the Commissioner of Insurance's ability to grant exceptions to certain regulations that pertain to the small employer insurers market. I am vetoing this section because I object to the limitation it places on the commissioner's ability to protect policyholders.

20. Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan Study

Section 9123 (16mn)

This section requires the Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan (HIRSP) board of governors to study alternative funding sources for the HIRSP program and submit a report on its findings by January 1, 2002, to the standing committees of the Legislature that examine health-related issues and to the Joint Committee on Finance. I am vetoing this provision because another study of this issue is unnecessary. When this program was transferred from the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance to the Department of Health and Family Services, the Governor's Office, the Legislature, the board, service providers and insurers all worked together to establish funding that is equitable for all affected parties.

21. Disease Aids Rebate Section 1838c

This section establishes a rebate program for drug manufacturers that participate in providing drugs under the disease aids program similar to the rebate program under Medical Assistance (MA). However, unlike the MA rebate program, this rebate language would exempt manufacturers for a ten-year period from a penalty which is assessed when their drug prices are higher than the consumer price index. This would result in fewer dollars available to support the program and would be very difficult to administer. As a result, I am vetoing this section so that the rebate program is the same as the MA rebate program.

22. Vital Records Fees

Sections 2095g, 2095h, 2095i and 2096c

These provisions change the fees charged for vital records for events that occurred before 1930. Marriage, divorce and death record charges would change from \$7 to \$3 and birth certificates would be reduced from \$12 to \$3. Additional copies of any of these records would be \$1. While such a change would be beneficial to genealogists who conduct record searches, it reduces revenue to the vital records section which sets its rates to cover program expenses. More importantly, the change in fees would result in reduced revenue to the Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board which receives \$7 from the \$12 charged for a birth certificate to support its program. Because of the loss in revenue and the inequity of charging two sets of fees, I am vetoing these sections.

23. Cash Accounting for Certain Appropriation Section 248t

This section exempts the conditional and supervised release appropriation, s. 20.435 (2) (bj), from state accounting standards that require state agencies to use accrual accounting so that a service provided in June of one fiscal year would be paid in July of the next fiscal year. This change allowed one month of the program's funding to be lapsed on a one-time basis. While the funds cannot be restored, I am vetoing this section so that funds can be properly accounted for as required under state accounting standards. Should program funding budgeted in fiscal year 2001–02 be insufficient, there are processes under which the Department of Health and Family Services can seek reallocation of base funds for use in this program.

24. Sexually Violent Persons' Mail Section 1993n

This section specifies that mail which is considered to be privileged, such as from an attorney, sent to sexually violent persons at the Sand Ridge Secure Treatment Center must be opened in the presence of the person. It also authorizes staff, if they have reason to suspect that the mail could cause a security problem, to open and read nonprivileged mail. I am partially vetoing this section to allow staff to open any mail outside the presence of the person and inspect it for contraband. Opening mail in the presence of the person could create security problems and interfere with the person's treatment program.

25. Lie Detector Tests

Section 1967p

This section allows staff at the Sand Ridge Secure Treatment Center to administer lie detector tests to sexually violent persons as part of their treatment plan. The language also specifically prohibits staff from asking the person about offenses committed for which the person was not convicted. One of the goals of treatment is for these people to take responsibility and acknowledge the sexual crimes they have committed. Not being able to question the predator about these past incidents is detrimental to achieving treatment goals. Patient advocates have expressed concerns about staff asking about specific details of a previously undetected crime that could result in new charges being brought. As part of a compromise with that group, the Department of Health and Family Services proposed that staff could question the predator about previous incidents but not about specific details such as the victim's name or the place the assault took place. As a result, I am partially vetoing this section and requesting the Department of Health and Family Services to seek legislation restoring the language in the original, agreed–upon proposal.

26. Community–Based Waiver Programs

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (b) and (7) (bd)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (4) (b)] appropriates \$2,898,600 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$6,796,800 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 to fund: (a) 388 new placements in fiscal year 2001–02 and an additional 300 placements in fiscal year 2002–03 for the Community Integration Program for persons with developmental disabilities (CIP 1B); (b) a daily rate increase from \$48.33 to \$49.67 in fiscal year 2001–02 and from \$49.67 to \$50.33 in fiscal year

2002–03 for CIP 1B; and (c) a daily rate increase from \$40.78 to \$41.86 in fiscal year 2001–02 and from \$41.86 to \$42.23 in fiscal year 2002-03 for the Community Integration Program for persons relocated or meeting reimbursable levels of care (CIP II). Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (bd)] appropriates \$2,851,300 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$7,147,300 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03 for 1,000 new placements in fiscal year 2001–02 and 960 additional new placements in fiscal year 2002–03 for the Community Options Program–Waiver (COP–W). Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize funding increases in CIP 1B, CIP II and COP-W.

Given the future deficit created in this budget by unfunded commitments to program expansions, I cannot support the funding increases in these programs at the levels approved by the Legislature. However, because I understand the of providing alternatives importance to institutional care, I am approving an increase of \$3,760,900 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$7,394,100 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 to fund: (a) 250 new CIP 1B placements in calendar year 2002; (b) a daily rate increase for CIP 1B from \$48.33 to \$49.67 in fiscal year 2002-03; (c) a daily rate increase for CIP II from \$40.78 to \$41.86 in fiscal year 2002–03; and (d) 1,000 new COP-W placements in calendar year 2002.

Wisconsin has made a significant investment in community–based programs and services and I want to continue that commitment. This increase will provide reasonable growth for the community–based waiver programs but at a level that is within the state's financial means. In addition, it is important to note that the budget includes a 2.5 percent annual increase for personal care and home health agencies who provide services to individuals in the CIP 1B and CIP II programs.

Thus, I am decreasing the Department of Health and Family Services' s. 20.435 (4) (b) appropriation by \$1,989,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$3,855,400 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. This veto is part of a larger write–down of the Medical Assistance appropriation. I am also decreasing the department's s. 20.435 (7) (bd) appropriation by \$2,694,600 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

27. Community–Based Residential Facilities

Section 1504r

This section repeals the provision allowing counties to establish more restrictive conditions for Community Options Program (COP) waiver funding in Community–Based Residential Facilities. I am vetoing this section because I want counties to retain the flexibility to administer the COP waiver program in a manner that meets their community needs and priorities.

28. Legislative Council on Developmental Disabilities Recommendations

Sections 174g, 174h, 9123 (16r), 9123 (16rq) and 9123 (16rs)

Section 174g adds four members of the Legislature, one each designated by the Assembly speaker, the Senate majority leader and the minority leader of each house of the Legislature and appointed by the Governor to the Council on Developmental Disabilities. I am vetoing section 174g because federal law requires that a minimum of sixty percent of the council's membership consist of persons with developmental disabilities, their parents or guardians. The addition of four legislators will require the appointment of an additional six individuals to meet federal requirements, which will decrease the effectiveness of the council by increasing its size from 26 to 36 members.

Section 174h requires that the Council on Developmental Disabilities, by January 31 of each year, submit a report to the Legislature on an evaluation of waiting lists compiled by the Department of Health and Family Services for services for persons with developmental disabilities. I am vetoing this section because the council currently evaluates the waiting lists and its evaluation is available to all interested parties. Section 9123 (16r) requires the department to develop a plan to administer and fund services for people with developmental disabilities. The plan, which must be submitted to the Department of Administration for the 2003-05 biennial budget, must include the following provisions: (a) consolidate administration of both institutional and community-based services within the department's subunit responsible for community-based services for people with developmental disabilities; (b) combine funding under the Medical Assistance (MA) program for institutional services and community-based waivers for people with developmental disabilities into one appropriation, to the extent possible under federal law; and (c) ensure that funding in the MA appropriation not be tied to any specific program or service setting and be individually tailored to enable the person to live in the least restrictive environment appropriate to his or her needs and preferences.

Section 9123 (16rq) requires the department to determine whether any new federal waivers under the MA program are necessary to administer funding for MA services as described in section 9123 (16r). The department shall apply for any waivers of federal MA statutes and regulations that the department determines are necessary to administer funding for MA services as described in 9123 (16r).

I am vetoing sections 9123 (16r) and 9123 (16rq) because the department is in the best position to determine the organizational structure that will most efficiently strengthen the delivery system for individuals with long-term care needs, including the developmentally disabled. In addition, placing institutional and community-based funding in one appropriation and having administration of institutional and community-based services in a single subunit of the department will not necessarily improve services for the developmentally disabled.

Section 9123 (16rs) requires the department, as soon as possible before July 1, 2002, to seek waivers of federal MA statutes and regulations that are necessary to implement a pilot program for long-term care of children with disabilities. If the federal waivers are received, the department is required, as soon as possible before July 1, 2002, to seek enactment of statutory language to implement the pilot program.

While maintaining the language that requires the department to seek the waiver and enactment of statutory language, I am partially vetoing this section to remove the requirement that it do so as soon as possible before July 1, 2002. I am concerned that the department will not be able to have the federal waiver approved by July 1, 2002. I am directing the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services, if the waiver is received, to submit enabling legislation to the Department of Administration for the 2003–05 biennial budget.

Section 9123 (16rs) also provides that, if the waivers are granted, that the pilot program do the expand eligibility under the MA following: community-based waiver, Birth to Three and Family Support programs to include children with severe disabilities and long-term care needs and children eligible for MA with high medical costs; expand MA coverage of services to include services focused on the needs of children with developmental disabilities and their families; and require the department to provide transitional services to families whose children with physical or developmental disabilities are preparing to enter the adult service system. I am partially vetoing this section to remove these provisions because I object to expanding the MA program and am concerned about the fiscal impact in the 2003-05 biennium if the department must provide the transitional services. However, I want children and families to receive the transitional planning needed to enter the adult system. I am therefore requesting the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services to ensure that transitional planning is part of the federal waiver request.

29. Family Care

Sections 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.432 (1) (k) and 20.435 (4) (b), (bm) and (bn) and (8) (a)], 1520d, 1520e, 1520w and 4060c

Section 395 [as it relates to ss. 20.432 (1) (k) and 20.435 (4) (b), (bm) and (bn) and (8) (a)] appropriates \$255,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$4,012,100 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 for the following: (a) \$3,032,100 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 for expansion of the Family Care pilot program to Kenosha County; (b) \$700,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 as start–up funds for expansion of Family Care to five additional counties in the 2003–05 biennium; (c) \$5,000 GPR in each fiscal year for administrative costs associated with the Council on Long–Term Care; and (d) \$250,000 GPR in fiscal year

2001–02 and \$275,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 for a Family Care external advocacy program that the Department of Health and Family Services contracts for with the Board on Aging and Long–Term Care and 1.0 FTE PR–S position to administer the program. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize funding increases for these purposes.

Family Care is a pilot program designed to test a new model for the provision of long-term care services. It involves an extensive redesign of the current system, which is often fragmented and confusing. While preliminary evaluations appear to be quite positive, the program's significant costs compel me to delay further expansion until the full evaluation of the program is completed in September 2002. With this evaluation, we should have better information to understand the cost effectiveness of the program, both in terms of the cost per person served as well as the overall cost of the pilot compared to current programs, and the quality of services received by participants and their families.

To reflect the elimination of funding for Kenosha County and the funding for the expansion to five additional counties in the 2003–05 biennium, I am decreasing the following Department of Health and Family Services' appropriations: s. 20.435 (4) (b) appropriation by \$2,963,700 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03, s. 20.435 (4) (bn) appropriation by \$33,400 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 and s. 20.435 (8) (a) appropriation by \$735,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. This veto is part of a larger write–down of the Medical Assistance appropriation. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

Sections 1520d, 1520e, 1520w and 4060c extend the sunset date for the Council on Long-Term Care from July 1, 2001, to July 1, 2003. I am vetoing these sections because 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 created the council primarily to advise the department on the development of the Family Care pilot program, and the development phase is complete. The secretary has the administrative ability to seek advice from groups and individuals interested in Family Care implementation and other long-term care issues. Thus, I am decreasing the department's s. 20.435 (8) (a) appropriation by \$5,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$5,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

Finally, I object to funding for a separate external advocacy program for individuals applying for, or enrolled in, Family Care. The department has grievance procedures in place that individuals can utilize if they are not satisfied with their Family Care eligibility or level of services. Thus, I am decreasing the department's s. 20.435 (4) (bm) appropriation by \$250,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and by \$275,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 and the Board on Aging and Long-Term Care's s. 20.432 (1) (k) appropriation by \$500,000 PR-S in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$550,000 PR-S in fiscal year 2002-03. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to authorize the 1.0 FTE PR-S position for the Board on Aging and Long-Term Care.

30. Elder Abuse Services

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (dh)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (dh)] appropriates \$1,500,000 GPR in each fiscal year for funding to counties for direct services for the elderly who have been determined to be abused or neglected. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize the funding increase. I object to the funding increase in fiscal year 2001-02. The Department of Health and Family Services contracts with counties on a calendar year basis and I am willing to approve a \$750,000 increase in fiscal year Thus, I am decreasing the 2001–02. department's s. 20.435 (7) (dh) appropriation by \$750,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

31. Life Span Respite Care

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (br)]

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (br)] appropriates \$112,500 GPR in each fiscal year for the Life Span Respite Care program. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize the funding increase. I object to the funding increase for this program. A fifty percent increase in funding is unwise when the state faces a significant structural deficit in the 2003–05 biennium. In addition, an evaluation of this new program is to be completed by June 1, 2004, and it is prudent to wait for the results before considering additional funding. Thus, I am decreasing the Department of Health and Family Services' s. 20.435 (7) (br) appropriation by \$112,500 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$112,500 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

32. Mental Health Systems Change Grants

Section 1562

This section details the requirements that the Department of Health and Family Services must meet in administering mental health systems change grants. I am partially vetoing this section to remove language that limits the awarding of these grants to a nonprofit, tax–exempt corporation or a county because I want the Department of Health and Family Services to have the flexibility to award grants to the best

applicants, regardless of organizational structure.

33. Community Support Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (bL)] and 1971L

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (7) (bL)] and 1971L appropriate \$1,000,000 GPR in each fiscal year as the state share of Medical Assistance benefits for the Community Support Program. I object to the funding increase in fiscal year 2001–02. The Department of Health and Family Services contracts with counties on a calendar year basis and I am willing to approve a \$500,000 GPR increase in fiscal year 2001–02. Thus, I am decreasing the department's s. 20.435 (7) (bL) appropriation by \$500,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

34. Community–Based Psychological Service Program Section 9123 (8d)

This section requires the Department of Health and Family Services to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance on the status of the implementation of the Community-Based Psychological Service Program. The report must be submitted by the first day of the sixth month after the effective date of the budget bill. I am vetoing this section because this service, if implemented, would be a new Medical Assistance benefit that must be offered as an entitlement. This service was authorized by the Legislature with the expectation that counties would pay the state share. However, in the event that counties would not adequately fund or make available the services, the state would be responsible for assuring adequate access to the benefit statewide.

35. Drug Prevention and Intervention Grant

Section 1557v

This section requires the Department of Health and Family Services to distribute \$30,000 GPR in each fiscal year to the Career Youth Development Center for drug prevention and intervention programs for middle and high school athletes in the Milwaukee public school system. I am vetoing section 1557v because, while the provision has laudable goals, the state cannot afford the associated costs in this budget. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to place \$30,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$30,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in unallotted reserve in the Department of Health and Family Services' appropriation s. 20.435 (7) (bc) to lapse to the general fund.

36. Milwaukee Child Welfare Operations

Sections 1618r and 9123 (12zk)

Section 1618r requires the Department of Health and Family Services to promulgate rules regulating the administration of child welfare services in a county having a population of 500,000 or more. The rules must include provisions for: (a) contracting processes; (b) grievance procedures; (c) caseload ratios; (d) standards for the provision of services; and (e) citizen participation. Section 9123 (12zk) requires that the rules be submitted to the Legislature no later than the first day of the ninth month beginning after the effective date of the budget bill.

I am vetoing these sections because the Department of Health and Family Services has existing policies, procedures and standards which address the areas identified in section 1618r. In addition, I want the department to focus existing resources on the management of the child welfare system in Milwaukee, rather than the administrative work load associated with promulgating administrative rules.

37. Kinship Care Funding Supplementation

Section 1629x

This section authorizes the Joint Committee on Finance to supplement the kinship care appropriation under s. 16.515 if the amounts budgeted for the program are insufficient to fund benefit payments to all eligible families. I am vetoing this provision because the biennial budget provides a level of funding that fully funds the projected kinship care caseload. In addition, the Department of Health and Family Services has the administrative flexibility to reallocate funding among counties if waiting lists become a problem.

38. Medical Assistance For Foster Care Adolescents

Sections 1799f, 1968d, 1968dh, 9323 (16f) and 9423 (17g)

These sections extend Medical Assistance (MA) eligibility to any individual who is at least nineteen years of age but under twenty years of age and who, on his or her eighteenth birthday, was in foster care or treatment foster care, as determined by the Department of Health and Family Services. They also give second priority for county substance abuse services to individuals who are twenty years of age and were eligible for MA under the provision contained in section 1799f and give first priority for county mental health services to individuals who are twenty years of age and were eligible for MA under the provision contained in section 1799f. These provisions are effective on January 1, 2003. I am vetoing these provisions because I am very concerned about the advanced funding commitments created by this extension of MA In addition, I am directing the eligibility. department to conduct a cost benefit analysis to determine if the extension of MA benefits is cost effective in the long run. Based on the results of this study and if revenue is available in the 2003–05 biennium, I am willing to reconsider this MA eligibility issue.

39. Targeted Case Management Reimbursement Lapse

Section 9223 (5zk)

Section 9223 (5zk) requires the Department of Administration secretary to lapse \$3,008,300 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$3,328,500 in fiscal year 2002–03 from Medical Assistance (MA) reimbursement of the cost of providing targeted case management services to children whose care is not eligible for reimbursement under Title IV–E of the federal Social Security Act.

I am partially vetoing section 9223 (5zk) to delete the requirement that revenues for the lapse come from reimbursement of the cost of providing targeted case management services to children whose care is not eligible for reimbursement under federal Title IV-E. The Department of Health and Family Services has recently determined that it is uncertain whether the targeted case management reimbursement revenues will be sufficient to satisfy the required lapse amounts. In addition, some counties are currently claiming MA reimbursement for targeted case management and using the federal revenues to fund social services, particularly for children with mental health needs. Counties would lose these revenues if they were lapsed under section 9223 (5zk). The effect of this veto will be to allow the department to use income augmentation revenues to meet the required lapse and allow counties to continue to use the targeted case management funds.

40. Income Augmentation

Sections 732q, 1557jd, 1557k, 9123 (9bk) and 9323 (16k)

Sections 732q,1557jd and 9323 (16k) require the Department of Health and Family Services to perform activities to augment the amount of federal moneys received by the state and prohibits the department from contracting with any person to perform these augmentation activities. Section 9123 (9bk) authorizes 1.0 FTE FED position, funded with income augmentation revenues, to perform income augmentation activities. I am partially vetoing section 732q and vetoing sections 1557jd, 9123 (9bk) and 9323 (16k) because I want the department to have the flexibility to augment federal income in a manner that maximizes the amount of revenue the state receives from the federal government. The work of the vendor currently under contract with the department has enabled the state to receive over \$102,000,000 in additional federal revenue. I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to authorize the 1.0 FTE FED position in fiscal year 2001-02 and not to allot \$43,800 FED in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$49,700 FED in fiscal year 2002–03 for the cost of the position.

Section 1557k repeals the current law provision that allows the department to submit a plan to the Department of Administration secretary for use of income augmentation revenues for purposes other than the operational costs exclusively related to augmenting federal income. I am vetoing section 1557k because I want the administration to retain the flexibility to use income augmentation funding to meet state and department needs with the approval of the Joint Committee on Finance.

41. Food Pantry Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (3) (fp)], 701h, 1568b and 9123 (4h)

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (3) (fp)], 701h and 1568b: (a) appropriate \$750,000 GPR in each fiscal year for grants to food pantries to purchase, store, transport and distribute food to needy households; (b) specify that the total amount of each grant cannot exceed \$15,000 and that each grant awarded be in proportion to the number of persons served by the food pantry; (c) specify the criteria for allocating funding between rural food pantries and the rest of the state; (d) specify the requirements for a food pantry to be eligible for a grant; (e) limit the amount that the Department of Health and Family Services may use for administration of the program to five percent of the total amount appropriated; and (f) require each grantee to submit a report to the department on how the funds were used and require the department to compile the reports and submit the results to the Legislature. Section 9123 (4h) requires the department, within ninety days after the effective date of the budget bill, to submit a plan to the Joint Committee on Finance, under a 14-day passive review process, for distributing grants to food pantries.

I am concerned about the future funding commitment created by this new program. I am vetoing the second year funding of \$750,000 GPR and directing the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services to ensure that applicants receive funding on a one-time basis and that the funding be used for emergency assistance. I am vetoing the provisions that specify a \$15,000 limit on a grant, the criteria for awarding grants to individual food pantries and allocating grants between rural pantries and the rest of the state, and the requirements for food pantries to be eligible for a grant. The department, because of its expertise in the state's food programs, is best able to determine how the funds should be allocated to meet the needs of individual communities. I am directing the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services to develop a distribution method and to distribute grants to the state's existing emergency food assistance programs that meet the state and federal standards.

I am vetoing the provision that restricts state administrative costs to five percent of the amount appropriated because it limits program flexibility. I am directing the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services to limit administrative costs to five percent and to set aside \$50,000 for distribution and storage of federal bonus food. This will ensure that the state has the necessary funding for the next delivery of federal bonus food. I am also vetoing the provision that requires the grantees to submit a report to the department on the use of the funds and requires the department to compile the reports and submit them to the Legislature because the funding will be one-time and for emergency assistance. The department can summarize the results of the program in its annual hunger report which is submitted to the Legislature. Finally, I am vetoing section 9123 (4h) because I want the department to quickly distribute the grants for emergency assistance.

42. Publicity for Alzheimer's Disease Registration and Funding for Assistive Technology

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (6) (a)], 721r, 721s, 725, 726p, 726q, 1568c, 9123 (15j) and 9423 (18j)

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (6) (a)], 721r, 721s and 1568c appropriate \$30,000 GPR in each fiscal year for the Department of Health and Family Services to publicize the existence of a program administered by a nongovernmental entity that registers persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related dementias and provides identification products in order to facilitate the safe return of persons who become lost or wander. Although there is no language in the budget bill that authorizes these increases, the Legislature passed a motion and an amendment during its deliberations to authorize the funding increase.

I am partially vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.435 (6) (a)] and vetoing section 1568c because, while this provision has laudable goals, the state cannot afford the cost of a publicity campaign in this budget. In addition, the department currently funds the Alzheimer's Family and Caregiver Support program and provides funding for training and information on Alzheimer's disease. Thus, I am decreasing the department's s. 20.435 (6) (a) appropriation by \$30,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$30,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

Sections 721r, 721s, 725, 726p, 726q, 9123 (15j) (a), (b), (c) and (d) and 9423 (18j) provide one-time funding for the following: (a) \$15,000 GPR annually to the Department of Health and Family Services for technical assistance; (b) \$15,000 GPR annually to Easter Seals for specialized assistance to persons in the agricultural industry; (c) \$20,000 GPR annually for the Wheelchair Recycling program; and (d) \$150,000 GPR annually to Independent Living Centers. I am vetoing sections 726p, 726q and 9123 (15j) (a), (b) and (d) and 9423 (18j), and partially vetoing sections 725 and 9123 (15j) (c) because this funding increase is unreasonable. The net effect of these vetoes is to only provide \$20,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 for the Wheelchair Recycling program.

The department currently provides funds to Independent Living Centers and Easter Seals for assistive technology projects. I am concerned that the projects in this budget proposal are ongoing despite only receiving one-time funding. I am directing the secretary of the Department of Health and Family Services to ensure that the grant for the Wheelchair Recycling program involves only one-time projects.

Because sections 721r and 721s contain language related to both publicity activities for Alzheimer's disease registration and the objectionable portions of the assistive technology initiative, I am partially vetoing section 721r and vetoing section 721s.

I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to: (a) place \$15,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$15,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in unallotted reserve in appropriation s. 20.435 (6) (a) to lapse to the general fund; (b) place \$15,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$35,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in unallotted reserve in appropriation s. 20.435 (7) (bc) to lapse to the general fund; and (c) place \$150,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$150,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$150,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$150,000 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 in unallotted reserve in appropriation s. 20.435 (7) (c) to lapse to the general fund; appropriation s. 20.435 (7) (c) to lapse to the general fund.

TOBACCO CONTROL BOARD

43. Tobacco Control Board Membership

Sections 173p, 173r, 173s and 9423 (12mk)

These provisions require that the Tobacco Control Board have fifteen members, including one legislator from each party in both houses and the Attorney General or his designee. I am vetoing these provisions because they unreasonably limit the executive branch. Board members must have the necessary backgrounds to ensure the state's tobacco control efforts are effective.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

44. W–2 Contract Prohibitions

Sections 1660d and 9358 (8c) [as it relates to s. 49.143 (2g)]

Section 1660d removes flexibility that the Department of Workforce Development currently has to manage resources for the Wisconsin Works (W–2) program, by prohibiting the department from transferring funds initially allocated for cash benefits to pay for costs associated with providing direct services to W–2 participants and administration of the W–2 program.

Section 1660d also stipulates that funding provided under a W–2 contract could not be expended by a W–2 agency for public relations activities, unless those activities are directly related to providing community outreach and informing participants about the services available under the W–2 program.

I object to this provision because it prevents the department from reallocating resources to the areas where they may be most needed, in order to manage the W–2 program efficiently and serve W–2 participants effectively. In addition, the prohibition on public relations spending is duplicative of federal law; the department currently administers a test to determine whether a W–2 agency's public relations. Further, it is unclear what activities constitute "community outreach," as the term is not defined.

I am vetoing section 1660d in its entirety, and partially vetoing section 9358 (8c), as it relates to s. 49.143 (2g), thereby maintaining current law. This will ensure that the department has the management tools necessary to administer the W–2 program efficiently and effectively.

45. Review of Expenditures and Reallocations

Sections 255p, 1716m, 1716o, 1716q, 1716s, 1716v and 1718

These sections eliminate the Department of Workforce Development's current authority to transfer funds from one allocation to another allocation under the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program [under s. 49.175 (1)] with approval from the Department of Administration secretary. Instead, these provisions stipulate that the department must meet certain requirements and obtain approval from both the Department of Administration secretary and the Joint Committee on Finance in order to reallocate funds under the TANF program. In addition, the department would be required to report annually to the Department of Administration secretary and the co-chairs of the Joint Committee on Finance on TANF expenditures for the previous fiscal year.

The transfer authority, which exists under current law, allows the department flexibility in making adjustments to its public assistance allocations, which are funded primarily with GPR and the federal TANF block grant. This flexibility is necessary in maintaining the department's ability to manage and respond to needed changes in the Wisconsin Works (W–2) program.

I am vetoing all of the new requirements concerning reallocation of funds, so that the department will retain the flexibility to reallocate resources as needed in order to administer the program efficiently and serve W–2 participants effectively. As with current practice, I direct the department to not request any reallocation that transfers more than ten percent from one allocation to another. I would be willing to support separate legislation to restore Joint Committee on Finance review of any transfer greater than ten percent.

I am also vetoing the requirement that the department submit annual reports on TANF expenditures Department to the of Administration secretary and the co-chairs of the Joint Committee on Finance, because I believe that it is unnecessary to require the report in statute. However, I do feel that such a report would provide useful information; therefore, I am directing the department to submit an annual report to the Department of Administration secretary on TANF expenditures for the previous fiscal year.

46. W–2 Contingency Fund Section 961r

This section creates an appropriation for the Joint Committee on Finance to supplement appropriations for cash benefits for Wisconsin Works (W–2) participants, child care benefits, and kinship care and long–term kinship care benefits. While I do not object to the contingency fund itself, I disagree with the purposes for which the fund may be used, as specified in the bill. Historically, the intent of the W–2 contingency fund was for cash assistance payments only, as a safeguard against times of economic downturn and increased caseloads.

The bill removes over \$12,000,000 associated with community reinvestment funds from the 1997–99 W–2 contracts, some of which was held by W-2 agencies as their own contingency funds. Further, as a means of fully funding the anticipated costs of the Wisconsin Shares child care subsidy program, the Legislature modified funding in the W-2 contracts from what my proposed budget included, by reducing funds for direct services and administration and by providing no increase for cash benefits. Given these reductions to the W-2 contracts and the loss of community reinvestment dollars for W-2 agencies, it would seem prudent to provide the contingency fund for the purpose that W-2 agencies suggest it would be most needed, namely, cash benefits.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove child care benefits and kinship care and long-term kinship care benefits as eligible uses for the W-2 contingency fund, in order to reserve the fund for the purpose for which it is most needed.

47. Changes to W–2 Geographical Regions in Milwaukee County Section 1660g

This section requires the Department of Workforce Development to consult with the Milwaukee County Department of Human Services prior to implementing any changes to the Wisconsin Works (W–2) geographic regions in Milwaukee County. The department would also be required to hold at least one public hearing in each of the Milwaukee W–2 regions that would be affected by any proposed change. I object to this provision because it is unnecessary for the Legislature to add this type of requirement to the statutes. The department will solicit feedback and input from all affected parties on any plans to change the geographic regions in Milwaukee County.

I am vetoing this section to maintain current law.

48. Performance Bonuses and Performance Standards for W–2 Agencies

Sections 9158 (9e) (b) and 9158 (9e) (d) Section 9158 (9e) (b) specifies in session law the amount that the Department of Workforce Development would be required to include in Wisconsin Works (W–2) contracts for performance bonuses for W-2 agencies that meet performance benchmarks, based on criteria established by the department. Section 9158 (9e) (d) codifies in session law several performance standards that the department would be required to include in W-2 contracts. The standards would be used to determine whether a W-2 agency meets benchmarks for base contract terms, restricted and unrestricted bonuses and renewal of contracts under the right-of-first selection option.

I object to specifying in law the amount the department must build into contracts for bonuses, because such a requirement would prohibit the department from adjusting performance bonuses, which may become appropriate as the program changes.

While I support the use of performance standards in the decision-making process, I object to including specific performance standards in law. The department already includes several performance criteria in the contracts with W-2 agencies. Further, I believe the department should have the flexibility to adjust benchmarks and change standards as the W-2 program evolves.

I am vetoing sections 9158 (9e) (b) and 9158 (9e) (d) in their entirety. This will allow the department to set standards, measure the performance of W-2 agencies and award bonuses to W-2 agencies as the department deems appropriate. More generally, it will provide the department with the flexibility it requires to administer the W-2 program effectively.

49. Oversight of W–2 Agencies in Milwaukee County

Section 1660e

This section requires the department to provide certain oversight and coordination services for Wisconsin Works (W–2) agencies in Milwaukee County. Specifically, the Department of Workforce Development would be required to monitor compliance with W–2 contracts, provide technical assistance to W–2 agencies and assist in coordination among those agencies for services offered to W–2 participants in Milwaukee County.

Currently, the Milwaukee Private Industry Council (PIC) receives \$1,000,000 annually to provide these functions for Milwaukee W–2 agencies. In my proposed budget, I reduced funding for the Milwaukee PIC by \$500,000 each year, with the idea that while this function is valuable, it could be performed at a lower cost. The Legislature removed all funding for the Milwaukee PIC and specified in the budget bill that the department conduct these oversight and coordination activities.

While I believe that these oversight and coordination activities are important, I object to specifying in statute that the department itself must be responsible for performing this function.

I am vetoing this section, but I also am directing the department to either conduct the oversight and coordination activities itself, or contract with a provider to perform this valuable function for Milwaukee W–2 agencies.

50. Community Youth Grants

Sections 1700b and 9158 (8x)

Section 1700b allocates an additional \$500,000 each fiscal year in Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding above what my budget provided for community youth grants. Section 9158 (8x) specifically earmarks the \$500,000 in each fiscal year for grants to the Wisconsin Chapters of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. Community youth grants are administered by the Department of Workforce Development and are generally awarded on a competitive basis. The grants are intended to fund programs that improve the social, academic and employment skills of youth who are eligible to receive TANF benefits. For this reason, I do not object to providing some funding for grants to the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. However, I do not agree with earmarking such a large portion of what is essentially a competitive grant program for one organization. Further, the TANF fund is constrained by several spending pressures at this time and cannot support excessive spending on additional programs.

I am partially vetoing the amount earmarked for the Wisconsin Chapter of Boys and Girls Clubs of America in each fiscal year of the 2001–03 biennium, so as to reduce the amount from \$500,000 to \$50,000 in each fiscal year. I am also partially vetoing the amount allocated for community youth grants in fiscal year 2002–03 so as to reduce the amount from \$500,000 to \$50,000. Further, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to place \$450,000 into unallotted reserve in appropriation s. 20.445 (3) (md) in 2002–03. This veto will have the effect of providing \$50,000 in each fiscal year specifically for grants to the Wisconsin Chapter of Boys and Girls Clubs of America, and of adding \$450,000 in fiscal year 2002-03 to the TANF balance.

51. After–School Care Grant Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (kn)], 560d, 743dc, 1714d, 2779m [as it relates to s. 20.255 (2) (kn)] and 9140 (6w)

These sections allocate \$150,000 of Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) block grant funding for transfer from the Department of Workforce Development to a newly created appropriation in the Department of Public Instruction, for an after–school care grant program beginning in fiscal year 2002–03. Under this new grant program, school boards would be able to apply to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to fund an after–school care program for TANF–eligible children who would otherwise be unsupervised by an adult in the afternoon after school.

I believe that children who would normally be unsupervised after school hours would benefit from a program like this; thus, I do not object to the idea of the program itself. However, the TANF fund is currently constrained by several spending pressures, ranging from cash assistance, to education and job skills training, and other work supports, especially child care benefits. While providing after–school care for all children is a worthwhile goal, the TANF fund cannot support spending on additional programs at this time.

I am vetoing this section to delete this new grant program, in order to conserve resources for the many important programs that are currently supported with TANF funds. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary to place these funds into unallotted reserve in s. 20.445 (3) (md).

52. Study of Unclaimed Impounded Vehicles

Section 9158 (3f)

This section requires the Department of Workforce Development, in consultation with the Department of Transportation and local governmental entities, to conduct a study of the feasibility of a program that would provide or sell unclaimed impounded vehicles to low–income individuals at below–market prices. The departments would be required to submit the findings of the study to the Joint Committee on Finance and other appropriate standing committees by June 30, 2002. The Legislature provided no funding to the Department of Workforce Development to conduct the study.

I object to this provision, because, while the study may produce valuable information, it is not one of the department's priorities for use of its base resources.

I am vetoing this section to remove the requirement that the department conduct this study.

53. Prevailing Wage Law

Sections 2026nz, 2026p, 2026r, 2558i, 2558j, 2558m, 2559d and 9458 (3z)

These sections affect the prevailing wage law, which requires workers employed on state or local public works projects to be paid the prevailing wage, as determined by the Department of Workforce Development, for the worker's trade or occupation in the area where the project is located. Specifically, these provisions would: (a) include wage data from public works projects where the wage paid is higher than the current prevailing wage in the annual wage rate survey; (b) require contractors and subcontractors to allow any individual to have access to their payroll records for projects subject to prevailing wage law to the same extent as if those records were public documents subject to the open records law; (c) prohibit the department from establishing swimming pool installer as a separate job classification; and (d) require the department to modify the metal building assembler job classification to include work on prefabricated, packaged metal buildings among the duties of that job classification.

I am vetoing sections 2026p and 2558j because including public works projects in the annual wage rate survey would violate the principles on which prevailing wage laws are based. Prevailing wage laws are intended to ensure that workers on public building projects are paid wages comparable to wages paid by the private sector for similar work. Including public construction projects when computing the prevailing wage rate would artificially inflate the prevailing wage rate for the county.

Sections 2026r, 2558m and 2559d require contractors and subcontractors to allow access to their payroll records for projects subject to prevailing wage laws. Under current law, if an individual has questions regarding a contractor's records for a public building project, that individual may request the department to examine the payroll records. Following the investigation, the payroll records become public documents and may be examined by any I am vetoing these provisions individual. because allowing any individual to obtain payroll records directly from contractors would create an unnecessary burden on private employers. If individuals wish to obtain these documents, they need only to file a request with the department. Current law gives the department the power to establish prevailing wage rate job classifications and the power to establish the prevailing wage for those job classifications. Sections 2026nz, 2558j and 9458(3z) would require the department to modify the metal building erector job classification and prohibit the department from establishing a swimming pool installer job classification. I am vetoing these provisions because the statutes should not be used to modify the job classifications of selected occupations. If an individual or organization would like to create, delete or modify a job classification, then that individual or organization can file a request with the department. The department will then seek comment from individuals and organizations that would be affected by the change. It is inappropriate to include these changes through a process that does not allow the people and businesses who will be affected a chance to comment on the proposed change. I am sensitive to concerns about how prevailing wage data are calculated, and I encourage the department to review and evaluate its methodology for computing the prevailing wage rate.

54. Grant to the Milwaukee Metropolitan Fair Housing Council – Discriminatory Lending Practices

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.445 (1) (a)] and 9158 (10c)

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.445 (1) (a)] provides \$150,000 GPR for the Department of Workforce Development to award a grant to the Milwaukee Metropolitan Fair Housing Council for the investigation of predatory residential real estate lending practices in Milwaukee County. As a condition of receiving these funds, the Milwaukee Metropolitan Fair Housing Council would be required to submit a report evaluating the results of the investigation to the department by January 1, 2004.

By lining out the department's s. 20.445 (1) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$150,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02, I am vetoing the part of the bill which funds this provision. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds. I object to this provision because it is more appropriate to select an organization to conduct the study through an open and objective process rather than through targeted legislation. This is also an issue that may be better served by a broader review that involves significant input from policy experts, lenders, homebuyers and the general public. In addition, it has not been demonstrated that the council lacks the resources to internally fund a study. My veto is not intended to reflect on the quality of work and level of commitment to fair housing of the Milwaukee Metropolitan Fair Housing Council.

D. JUSTICE

CIRCUIT COURT

1. Family Court Counseling Fee

Sections 3832k and 9309 (4w)

These provisions increase the family court counseling service fee for custody and physical placement studies from \$300 to \$500. A court may order these studies when a custody or placement case has been contested.

I am vetoing these provisions because the fee increase is excessive, has not been justified and may inhibit involved parties from exploring their full range of legal options. The effect of this veto is to retain current law.

2. Admitting Health Care Records into Evidence in a Trial or Proceeding

Sections 3872v and 9309 (7p)

This provision reduces the time period during which a party must either serve health care records or notify the other parties of the location where records can be inspected or photocopied from forty days to twenty days in order for the health records to be admitted into evidence at trial without testimony by the custodian of the records.

I am vetoing this provision because the change in the time period has not been justified and is unreasonable.

3. Civil Action for Domestic Abuse or Sexual Assault

Section 3871x

This provision provides that any person, who suffers damage as the result of intentional conduct that constitutes sexual assault or as a result of domestic abuse, has a cause of action against the person who causes the damage.

I am vetoing this provision because the definition of who has a cause of action is very broad and due to its complexity this issue should be addressed in separate legislation. Further, language pertaining to domestic abuse restitution has been included in the budget to provide victims of domestic abuse broader legal avenues to address this problem.

CORRECTIONS

4. Telemarketing and Data Entry Sections 3325g and 9311 (7k)

These provisions specify that the Department of Corrections may not enter into a contract or other agreement if, in the performance of the agreement, a prisoner would perform data entry or telemarketing services and would have access to any personal identifying information of an individual who is not a prisoner. Personal identifying information is defined in s. 943.201 as a name, address, telephone number, driver's license number, social security number, employer or place of employment, employer identification number, mother's maiden name, or identifying number of a depository account.

I am vetoing these provisions to retain the current programs. These programs have many procedures in place to prohibit inmate access to social security numbers, financial data and information that could serve to identify a juvenile. Inmates currently employed in the telemarketing program make calls to previous donors on behalf of charities that have contracted with the Department of Corrections. The inmates inquire as to whether the donor is interested in donating again. The response is forwarded to the charity, who follows up with the donor if interest in donating is expressed. Inmates identify themselves and receive no personal information during the call.

Inmates employed in the data entry program are able to enter data into a computer, but are not able to retrieve data. Careful screening is conducted to ensure inmates with a propensity for committing a financial crime involving personal identifying information would not be hired. Inmates are prohibited from having access to social security numbers, credit card numbers, other financial data and information that would identify a juvenile. Verifiers conduct random checks of entered data and can identify who entered data for any record, and inmates are searched each day to make sure no information is taken with them.

Elimination of these programs will reduce the department's ability to provide meaningful work experience to inmates and result in increased inmate idleness. Inmates are carefully screened prior to being selected for the programs and are closely monitored while they are employed. The personal privacy of the general public is not being compromised under current law. Inmates involved in these programs have access to no more information than is readily available in a telephone book.

5. Residence of Sex Offenders on Parole or Extended Supervision Sections 3329m, 3354g, 3354r, 3357m, 3385r, 3389m, 3389p, 3389q, 3389r, 3389s, 3389t, 3389u, 3389v, 3389w, 3389x and 3389y

These provisions require serious sex offenders to live in a residence approved by the Department of Corrections or the Parole Commission as a condition of extended supervision or parole. They also require the department and the Parole Commission to work cooperatively to minimize the residential population density of sex offenders who are on probation, parole, extended supervision or placed on supervised release as a sexually violent person. I am partially vetoing these provisions because they would limit the department's ability to provide effective offender treatment and community protection. I am vetoing all provisions that relate to the Department of Corrections' utilizing specific criteria when placing sex offenders because these provisions are already in administrative rule or are part of internal departmental procedures. I am vetoing the provision that would require agreement of the sex offender before the department could place the offender in an approved residence because it would limit the department's ability to provide treatment to the offender and compromise the department's ability to ensure community protection. I am vetoing the Parole Commission from the requirement to minimize the residential density of sex offenders because the Division of Community Corrections is responsible for coordinating the placement of offenders in the community.

The effect of this veto will be to require the Department of Corrections to minimize the density of sex offender residential populations while leaving the department with the flexibility needed to make appropriate placements.

6. Inmate Rehabilitation and Aftercare

Section 3333j

This provision would allow the Department of Corrections to permit one or more community-based organizations to operate an inmate rehabilitation program in any departmental facility. As part of this provision, organizations seeking to operate such a facility would need to submit a detailed proposal, the department would be required to establish policies providing organizations with reasonable access to inmates, the department would be required to evaluate the program and contractors would be allowed to terminate an inmate's participation in the program.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove limitations on the department's ability to restrict an inmate's participation and to remove the ability of the contractor to terminate an inmate from the program without the involvement of the department because it limits the department's flexibility and undermines the department's authority. The current language provides a nonprofit community-based organization with broad authority to suspend or terminate an inmate's participation in a rehabilitation program, but the department would only be allowed to restrict an inmate's participation if necessary for the security of the facility or the safety of the inmates or the public. The Department of Corrections is charged with supervising the custody and discipline of all inmates in state correctional facilities. As the official caretaker, the department needs to maintain order and control in correctional facilities. By removing the restrictions, the department and the contractor can jointly determine whether an inmate's participation in a rehabilitation program should be restricted.

The effect of this veto will be to permit community-based organizations to operate inmate rehabilitation programs in departmental facilities but not allow a contractor to unilaterally terminate an inmate's participation in the program.

7. Inmate Health Care Reports and Procedures

Sections 3329p, 3329q, 3329r, 3329s, 3329t, 3329u, 9111 (3c), 9111 (3cb), 9111 (3cc) and 9111 (3cd)

These provisions require the Department of Corrections to do all of the following:

- Submit reports to the Joint Committee on Finance by January 4, 2002, regarding the following: a review of all professional medical services contracts to determine whether costs can be controlled, plans to provide continuing education for health care staff, additional training in the delivery of controlled medications for correctional officers and the collection of monies from reimbursement available in health care services contracts.
- Submit a report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee and the Joint Committee on Finance by the first day of the second month after the effective date of the bill on the progress toward meeting the standards selected as the basis for health care delivery to inmates.
- Prepare written contracts for all health care vendors for delivery of basic health services at correctional institutions and submit any contract, agreement or extension over \$500,000 to the Joint Committee on Finance for prior approval.
- Evaluate the effectiveness of efforts to allocate mental health resources to inmates in an equitable and efficient manner, to evaluate the outcome of random medical chart reviews conducted by a physician to ensure proper medical procedures are followed, and to evaluate efforts to negotiate Medical Assistance rates for eligible inmates.

I am vetoing these provisions because the reporting requirements and deadlines impose a burdensome work load without additional resources at a time when agency budgets are limited. The Department of Corrections is actively working to implement these provisions as recommended by the Legislative Audit Bureau.

8. Inmate Death in Custody Reporting Act Requirements Section 3330g

This provision requires the Department of Corrections to comply with guidelines established by the U.S. Attorney General under 42 USC 13704 (2) in reporting, on a quarterly basis, information regarding the death of any person in the custody of the department, including inmates incarcerated in facilities located outside this state, and to provide this information to the Wisconsin Attorney General at the same time that it is submitted to the U.S. Attorney General.

I am vetoing this provision because the Department of Corrections is currently compliant with inmate death in custody reporting requirements under federal law to maintain eligibility for federal grant funding.

9. Inmate Tracking System and Integrated Corrections System Requirements

Sections 3329e, 3330c, 3330d, 3330e and 3330f

These provisions require the Department of Corrections to create and maintain an inmate tracking system that includes the inmate's criminal history, medical and mental health history, alcohol and other drug abuse history, victimization history, violence history, education and vocational history, religion, marital status, and status of all of his or her children. They also require the department to collect and maintain information that determines the number of inmates that return to prison due to a probation or parole revocation and whether the revocation is due to the inmate committing a new crime or violating a condition or rule of probation or parole.

These provisions require the department to publish adult and juvenile statistical information on its Internet Web site. The required adult information includes total population, population in each institution, commitments to and releases from the adult correctional system, average sentence length, offenses, race, gender, educational level, marital status, parental status, religion, and county of commitment. The required juvenile information includes total population, population in each institution, average population, admissions to and releases from the juvenile correctional system, offenses, race, gender, average age, and county of commitment.

These provisions also require the department to create and maintain an Intranet site with the medical histories of all inmates sentenced to Wisconsin state prisons. It requires the site to be completed no later than June 30, 2003, and to include prescriptions, laboratory reports and x-rays ordered for each inmate.

I am vetoing these provisions because the requirements impose an undue burden and timing requirement on the development of the integrated corrections system (ICS). The department is just beginning the development of ICS and needs to maintain the flexibility to determine how it will be designed and the order in which elements will be added. The Department of Corrections currently has several computer systems, making it difficult to pull information together to create reports of the type required by these provisions. The ICS will be one complete system that encompasses the existing systems and adds new elements that will allow the department to synthesize information from all aspects of corrections. If the department does not have the flexibility to design elements of the system, the result will be a system that is not fully

integrated, making it difficult to present information in a useful manner and increasing the costs of ICS. The department will be able to provide information as phases of ICS are completed.

10. Gender–Specific Treatment Programs and AODA Services

Sections 3327q, 3329x, 9111 (6e) and 9111 (7d)

These provisions require the Department of Corrections to offer the same level of alcohol and other drug abuse treatment (AODA) to male and female inmates and to work with the Department of Health and Family Services to develop a gender-specific treatment program for addressing individual treatment needs of female inmates. The departments are required to submit a report with a program plan regarding the gender-specific treatment program to the Legislature by July 1, 2002. The Department of Corrections is required to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance no later than six months after the effective date of the subsection comparing the alcohol and other drug abuse evaluation and treatment services provided to women to those provided to men.

I am vetoing these provisions because the Department of Corrections is currently exploring gender–specific treatment programs and comparing the level of alcohol and other drug abuse services for male and female inmates as part of an internal work group on female offender needs. In addition, the reporting requirements and deadlines imposed by these provisions would create a burdensome work load without additional resources at a time when agency budgets are limited.

11. Performance Evaluations for Substance Abuse Intervention and Treatment Grants

Sections 1483j and 3327r

These provisions require the Department of Corrections and the Department of Health and Family Services to evaluate and develop performance standards for substance abuse intervention and treatment services.

I am vetoing these provisions because both departments currently evaluate as many substance abuse programs as possible within available resources, including a requirement to evaluate at least twenty percent of programs that receive Community Block Grant funding. The departments are also working to conduct effective evaluations of more programs. In addition, these requirements impose a burdensome work load without additional resources at a time when agency budgets are limited.

12. Community Reintegration Facility

Section 9111 (3g)

This provision requires the Department of Corrections to prepare a feasibility study of the creation of a transitional placement facility for parolees. The department is required to submit the study and a funding proposal to the Joint Committee on Finance.

I am vetoing this provision because it imposes additional work load and reporting requirements on the Department of Corrections at a time when agency budgets are limited. The department will continue to look at the creation of a transitional placement facility as a possibility for the future.

13. Reduce Funding for the Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center

Section 1491

This provision directs the Department of Corrections to transfer \$1,379,300 GPR in each of fiscal years 2001–02 and 2002–03 and \$2,694,400 PR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$2,947,200 PR in fiscal year 2002–03 to the Department of Health and Family Services to pay for services provided for juveniles placed at the Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center.

I am vetoing in part the provision that transfers PR funding to the Department of Health and Family Services because new population estimates indicate a declining juvenile population. These new estimates do not support the current funding levels or current population levels at the Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center. The veto will strike out the new fiscal years and amounts, thereby restoring the current language that directs the transfer of \$2,489,300 in fiscal year 1999–2000 and \$2,489,900 in fiscal year 2000–01.

In accordance with s. 46.057 (2) it is my intent with this veto for the Department of Health and Family Services to charge the Department of Corrections not more than the actual cost of providing services for juveniles placed at the Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center. The Department of Corrections will compensate the Department of Health and Family Services as specified in s. 20.410 (3) (hm). Based on current population projections this cost is estimated to be \$1,817,200 PR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$2,070,000 PR in fiscal year 2002–03.

14. Juvenile Justice Study

Section 9111 (6c)

This provision creates a committee to study the costs to the state of assuming responsibility for the operation of the juvenile justice system from the counties by January 1, 2004. The provision requires the committee to report its findings, conclusions and recommendations to the Legislature by May 1, 2003, and to include in its report legislation for the assumption by the state of all or part of the operating costs of the juvenile justice system and the elimination of youth aids payments.

I am vetoing this provision because the timeframe for assuming that responsibility is unrealistic and the Blue–Ribbon Commission on State–Local Partnerships for the 21st Century has already addressed much of what the committee would be required to study.

DISTRICT ATTORNEYS

15. Vehicle Fines and Forfeitures for Additional Prosecutor Positions

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.475 (1) (g)], 781m, 1996f, 1996h, 1996j and 9113 (1q)

These provisions create a new annual appropriation and authorize \$1,135,000 PR in the 2001–03 biennium from vehicle–related fines, penalties and forfeitures under Chapters 341 to 347, 349 and 351 to fund an additional 14.55 FTE PR assistant district attorney positions beginning January 1, 2002, in Ashland, Brown, Chippewa, Columbia, Dane, Jefferson, Kenosha, Juneau, La Crosse, Manitowoc, Marathon, Outagamie, Rock, Sauk and Winnebago counties and to increase the Pepin County elected district attorney by 0.20 FTE PR position.

I am vetoing these provisions because the identified funding source is contrary to the state's commitment to pay for prosecutor positions, limits revenues for county judicial operations and requires all counties to forego revenue increases to aid a few counties. Since 1990, the state has been committed to funding the salary and fringe benefit costs of prosecutors and the funding source identified by the Joint Committee on Finance reneges on this commitment. The proposed shift in financing would set a bad precedent by requiring the counties to bear the responsibility of paying for prosecutor positions. Also, these provisions unfairly freeze the amount that counties may retain from fines and forfeitures at the level collected in state fiscal year 2000-01. Finally, requiring all counties to provide funding for prosecutor positions while only a few would receive the positions would be inequitable.

I recognize and support the need for additional prosecutorial resources. By vetoing this provision, it is my intent that the need for additional prosecutor positions be addressed in a s. 13.10 meeting, which will give the Joint Committee on Finance the opportunity to consider a more appropriate funding source for prosecutor positions.

16. Assistant District Attorney Positions for Restorative Justice Programs

Section 4031p

This section authorizes 2.0 FTE PR–S project assistant district attorney positions annually to establish restorative justice programs. Funding comes from the federal Edward Byrne Memorial Law Enforcement Assistance Program and penalty assessment match funds administered by the Office of Justice Assistance. Under this section, Milwaukee County and a county to be determined by the Attorney General, in consultation with the Department of Corrections, will each receive 1.0 FTE assistant district attorney position to serve as a restorative justice coordinator. I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the discretion of the Attorney General to select the second county to receive an assistant district attorney position for restorative justice efforts. Because one of the central themes of restorative justice is exploring alternatives to incarceration, the Department of Corrections is better equipped to make the determination of which county should implement such a program.

JUSTICE

17. Post–Conviction and Post–Commitment DNA Testing

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.410 (1) (be)], 676r and 4028j

These provisions relate to GPR funding to cover the costs of post–conviction and post–commitment DNA tests and the ability of the courts to order the State Crime Lab to accept biological evidence for preservation.

I am partially vetoing these provisions to eliminate the GPR appropriation at the Department of Corrections that would have been used to cover the costs of post–conviction and post–commitment DNA testing if a defendant is determined indigent because of the severe funding constraints facing the general fund.

It is my intent to grant the courts authority to order the Department of Justice to cover such costs with program revenue from the crime laboratories and drug law enforcement assessments authorized under s. 165.755 and DNA surcharges authorized under s. 973.046. Accordingly, the Department of Justice may submit a request under s. 16.515 near the end of each fiscal year to use the appropriation under s. 20.455 (2) (kd), drug law enforcement, crime laboratories and genetic evidence activities.

I am also partially vetoing these provisions to eliminate the ability of the crime lab to prohibit the courts from ordering a transfer of evidence for the purpose of preservation. I am vetoing this provision because it undermines the court's discretion regarding the preservation of biological evidence and its ability to designate who shall preserve such evidence.

18. Attorney General Authority in Civil Rights Actions and Inquests

Sections 1996m, 2854m, 4033g, 4033k, 4033n, 4034b, 4034c, 4034d, 4034f, 4034g, 4034h, 4034j, 4034m, 4034n, 4034p, 4034r, 4034t, 4034u, 4034v, 4034w and 4034y

These provisions authorize the Attorney General to investigate alleged civil rights violations, order and participate in inquests, request autopsies and medical examinations, and bring actions for injunction.

I am vetoing this provision because it is duplicative and unnecessary. District attorneys have this authority under current law. Wisconsin's district attorneys have provided commendable service to the residents of this state regarding the defense of individual and civil rights and granting the Attorney General the same authority would serve no useful purpose.

19. Law Enforcement Training on Alzheimer's Disease Recognition Section 2858p

This provision specifies that, of the 48 hours of biennial recertification training required for law enforcement officers, at least one hour of training be dedicated to recognizing the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease and other related dementia. I am vetoing this provision because the Law Enforcement Standards Board should determine if this addition to the curriculum for officer recertification training is needed. The Law Enforcement Standards Board under the Department of Justice establishes minimum training standards and develops the training curriculum for Wisconsin's law enforcement officers. I encourage the board to review its curriculum on the recognition of Alzheimer's disease and other dementia as part of its ongoing curriculum development function.

20. AFIS Workstation Grant Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.455 (2) (kh)], 770n, 770p, 855n, 855p, 9131 (2c) and 9431 (1c)

These provisions provide penalty assessment revenue in fiscal year 2001–02 to create a grant program in the Department of Justice to fund the purchase of automated fingerprint identification system (AFIS) workstations by local law enforcement agencies and to cover the initial costs of installing a BadgerNet line.

I am vetoing these provisions because projected revenues from the penalty assessment surcharge would not be sufficient to support any new programs. This action is also necessary to cover the lapse of \$875,200 in penalty assessment revenues to the general fund in fiscal year 2001–02.

It should also be noted that I am providing \$3,540,200 over the biennium from various state and federal funding sources to improve and upgrade the statewide AFIS system to better serve Wisconsin's law enforcement agencies.

OFFICE OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE

21. Federal Byrne Anti–Drug Enforcement Program

Sections 327n, 395 [as it relates to s. 20.395 (5) (jt)], 672L, 1375r, 2340q, 9101 (21j) and 9101 (22w)

These provisions earmark funding to provide one-time community justice center planning grants, to expand the pretrial intoxicated driver intervention grant program under the Department of Transportation and to fund a crime prevention resource center at the Fox Valley Technical College.

I am vetoing these earmarks because they subvert the existing grant application review and approval process for federal Byrne funding administered by the Office of Justice Assistance. This action ensures that use of these funds will conform to federal regulations and will restore the set–aside for the Governor's Law Enforcement and Crime Commission and discretionary special project funding for local law enforcement agencies to the greatest extent possible.

22. Penalty Assessment Surcharge Balance Transfers

Sections 9201 (6c), 9211 (2c) and 9240 (1c)

These provisions require the transfer of 85 percent of the unencumbered balances from certain appropriations on June 30, 2001, to the penalty assessment surcharge receipts 20.505 appropriation under s. (6) (i). Appropriation accounts affected by the transfer are the aid for alcohol and other drug abuse programs appropriation at the Department of Public Instruction, the victim services appropriation at the Department of Corrections and three appropriations at the Office of Justice Assistance used to match funding from the federal Byrne anti-drug program.

I am partially vetoing these provisions to increase the required balance transfer from 85 percent to 100 percent. This action is necessary to cover the lapse of \$875,200 in penalty assessment revenues to the general fund in fiscal year 2001–02 and to ensure that enough funding is available for ongoing programs that are supported by revenues from the penalty assessment surcharge.

23. Southern Oaks Girls School Mental Health Unit Funding Section 9201 (5v)

This provision directs the Department of Administration secretary, to the extent permitted under federal regulations, to transfer \$433,100 PR–S in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$541,700 PR–S in fiscal year 2002–03 in federal Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant funds from the Office of Justice Assistance to the Department of Corrections to operate the mental health unit at the Southern Oaks Girls School.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary to earmark these funds through the budget process. The Office of Justice Assistance has funding available for this purpose and these funds have already been allocated for this purpose.

STATE PUBLIC DEFENDER

24. Base Budget Reductions and Reporting Requirements

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.550 (1) (c)] and 9139 (2q)

These provisions provide funding for the State Public Defender's office and require the State Public Defender to submit a quarterly report and a s. 13.10 request if a funding shortfall occurs in any of its appropriations.

In my budget I recommended a five percent GPR state operations base budget cut for most state agencies and branches of government and I intended for all agencies and branches to absorb these reductions in their budgets. However, the Legislature partially restored the five percent cut to the State Public Defender's budget and added 59.3 FTE GPR positions. Funding was shifted from the private bar appropriation to the trial representation appropriation to fund these positions. The effect of the Legislature's changes results in base budget reductions of only 0.528 percent in fiscal year 2001–02 and 4.4 percent in fiscal year 2002–03.

I object to some of the modifications made to the five percent reduction and the creation of the 59.3 FTE GPR positions. I am vetoing this provision because additional savings are needed and a contribution by all state agencies is essential to this effort. By lining out the State Public Defender's s. 20.550 (1) (c) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$2,894,800 GPR in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$373,100 GPR in fiscal year 2002-03, I am vetoing section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.550 (1) (c)] to provide a base budget cut of five percent in each year of the biennium and I am deleting the funding for the additional 59.3 FTE GPR positions. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds and not to authorize the additional 59.3 FTE GPR positions. I am also vetoing section 9139 (2q) to remove the report requirement because it is no longer applicable due to the reduction in funding. All agencies should have the same ability to make emergency requests under s. 13.10. Singling out the State Public Defender for a special report and s. 13.10 request authority is unnecessary and inequitable to other agencies faced with similar reductions.

Since 1997, the caseload for the State Public Defender has remained stable. However, during this same time period, the number of cases assigned to State Public Defender staff as a percentage of total cases has been reduced by 6.7 percent while the number of cases assigned to the private bar has increased by 6.7 percent. By returning to the 1997 assigned caseload ratios, the State Public Defender should be able to implement the base budget reductions without any reductions in positions. According to the State Public Defender, it is more efficient for State Public Defender staff to prosecute a case than the private bar. Therefore, I am requesting the State Public Defender to implement this reduction through improved efficiencies rather than personnel reductions.

SUPREME COURT

25. Court Interpreter Program

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.680 (2) (a)] and 9147

These sections provide \$97,800 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$100,800 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03 and 1.0 FTE two–year project interpreter coordinator position.

I am vetoing section 9147 in its entirety because the cost is excessive. All branches of government need to prioritize and seek efficiencies in the use of taxpayer funding. By lining out the Supreme Court's s. 20.680 (2) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$97,800 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$100,800 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing the portion of the bill that funds the two–year project interpreter coordinator position. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds and not to authorize the additional 1.0 FTE position. My vetoes retain the \$456,200 GPR increase in the state reimbursement rate to counties for court interpreters.

26. Prison Impact Assessment

Sections 97m, 114v and 395 [as it relates to s. 20.765 (3) (d)]

These provisions require the Legislative Fiscal Bureau to provide prison impact assessments for any bill or, upon request, any bill draft that creates a felony or modifies the period of imprisonment for a felony. Funding and positions are also provided to support this requirement.

I am vetoing these provisions because the cost is excessive and other fiscal impact requirements included in the budget will provide estimates of the cost of criminal legislation. By lining out the Legislature's s. 20.765 (3) (d) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$101,500 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$113,300 GPR in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing the requirements and the additional positions. Furthermore, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds and not to authorize the additional 2.25 FTE GPR positions.

27. Court Commissioner Education Section 3780g

This provision requires court commissioners to participate in programs of continuing education and requires that the court commissioners be charged a fee by the Supreme Court for the costs of the continuing education classes.

I am partially vetoing this provision to remove the requirement that court commissioners be charged the fee. This veto will maintain the current billing status, with the fee being assessed to the county where the court commissioner is employed.

28. Appropriation Modifications

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.680 (2) (a)] and 926r

These provisions convert the general program appropriation for the director of state courts from an annual to biennial appropriation.

I am vetoing these provisions in order to maintain the stricter fiscal controls provided under annual appropriations and to continue to adequately monitor appropriation expenditures. The effect of this veto is to retain current law.

E. STATE GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

ADMINISTRATION

1. Vacant Positions in State Government

Section 9101 (26n)

This provision requires the secretary of the Department of Administration, within thirty days of the budget's effective date, to determine vacant positions of various funding sources in executive branch agencies as of July 1, 2001; determine the associated salary and fringe benefit costs; and lapse these amounts to the respective appropriation and fund balances. In addition, the authorized positions determined by the secretary are deleted.

My budget recommendations to the Legislature included GPR state operations base appropriations reductions of five percent for most state agencies. Since the budget was introduced, agency managers have been planning how to implement these cuts. Many are holding authorized positions vacant in anticipation of using them to help meet the funding reductions. While these five percent reductions involve GPR, agencies with other funding sources have been holding vacancies in program revenue and segregated funds so that employees may be reallocated in order to minimize layoffs. The cuts of vacant positions and associated funding proposed by the Legislature place an additional burden on agencies in that the dollars associated with many vacancies have already been accounted for in agency planning.

I understand that the estimated GPR savings of \$7,900,000 annually related to this provision are needed to maintain the general fund balance. However, estimated savings from vacant positions in other funding sources that would lapse to those sources would be of no benefit to the general fund.

For these reasons, I am partially vetoing this provision to give the department secretary and state agencies needed flexibility to implement the several general fund reductions and lapses in the budget. Specifically, my partial veto deletes the thirty-day deadline for determining vacant positions; removes non-GPR funding sources from the lapse requirement; eliminates the requirement that individual appropriations be part of the secretary's determination and implementation of GPR lapses: and strikes the requirement that vacancies identified be deleted. I am also vetoing the limitation of this lapse provision to only the executive branch, since I believe all branches of state government should share responsibility for reducing costs in each fiscal year. The effect of this partial veto will give the secretary flexibility to apportion the required general purpose revenue lapse equitably among all agencies.

2. Dues and Membership Lapses Section 9101 (22k)

This provision requires the secretary of the Department of Administration to determine the amount spent by each state agency in fiscal year 2000–01 for membership dues for any state or national organization and to lapse twenty percent of those amounts from each affected agency appropriation.

This language, as presented, provides no latitude regarding the appropriations or respective amount of required lapse that must be assessed. Because there are appropriations that exist solely for payment of a dues or membership fee which will require all of their budgeted resources in the 2001–03 biennium, I find the requirement to take twenty percent of each and every such appropriation to be overly restrictive. I am therefore partially vetoing the provision in a way that will permit the Department of Administration secretary to apportion the provision's overall required lapse on a more flexible basis across agencies and their appropriations. The fiscal effect of this veto will be neutral, since the total required amount will be lapsed.

3. Audit of State–Owned Aircraft Usage

Sections 9132 (3y) and 9159 (3y)

These provisions request the Joint Legislative Audit Committee to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct a performance evaluation audit of aircraft usage by state agencies. If the bureau does not initiate this audit by December 1, 2001, the Department of Administration, Department of Transportation and Department of Natural Resources are directed to conduct a joint study to determine how reductions can be made in the costs associated with use of aircraft by state agencies.

I object to the required Legislative Audit Bureau study because I believe the three state agencies involved can perform this study adequately. I am, therefore, partially vetoing these provisions to remove the Legislative Audit Bureau study, but leave in place the requirement that the three agencies do the evaluation and report the results to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature.

4. University of Wisconsin System Fleet Merger

Section 9156 (3s)

This section transfers to the Department of Administration the assets and liabilities of the board of regents of the University of Wisconsin System relating to its fleet maintenance functions at the Madison campus, as determined by the secretary of the Department of Administration.

I am vetoing this section because it is An interagency committee is unnecessary. already studying how to optimize state fleet maintenance and is working toward this same goal. the Combining University of Wisconsin-Madison Department and of Administration fleet maintenance operations at this time would be premature until those study efforts have been completed.

5. Procurement Conversion to Program Revenue

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (1) (kf)] and 817

This provision creates a new biennial appropriation for support of central procurement operations.

I believe that a biennial appropriation does not provide enough flexibility to carry out the goals of the program. I am, therefore, partially vetoing this provision to give the Department of Administration greater flexibility in providing procurement services. The effect of this veto will be to change the biennial appropriation to continuing.

6. Procurement Services Audit

Section 9132 (2ak)

This section requests the Joint Legislative Audit Committee to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct a performance evaluation audit of procurement services provided by the Department of Administration to state agencies.

I am vetoing this section because it is unnecessary. The Legislature does not need nonstatutory authority to direct that a Legislative Audit Bureau study be conducted.

7. Purchasing Card Rebates

Sections 227q and 9101 (19r)

This provision requires the Department of Administration to credit any rebates received by state agencies through the use of the purchasing card to the fund from which the purchase was incurred.

The budget includes the conversion of funding for the state procurement program from GPR to program revenue. Among the intended sources available to agencies to fund the charges for the central procurement bureau are internal savings realized through the use of innovations such as the purchasing card. Requiring agencies to lapse such savings contradicts the original concept of converting state procurement functions to program revenue. It also would act to discourage agencies from trying to use technology in their operations. For these reasons, I am vetoing the purchase card rebate requirement.

BUILDING PROGRAM

8. Retainage on Public Works Contracts

Sections 321m, 2026m and 9359 (10b)

These provisions reduce the percentage of payments withheld on public works contracts from ten percent to five percent.

I am vetoing this provision because it is contrary to the industry standard of ten percent on such payments and reduces the state's ability to manage state building projects by decreasing the incentive of contractors to complete projects in a satisfactory manner. The effect of this veto will be to retain the ten percent standard, which is current law.

9. Wisconsin History Center Reporting Requirement

Section 9107 (7x)

This provision requires that at least \$75,000,000 in gift, grants or other receipts funding be secured before any bonds are sold for the Wisconsin History Center project. It also requires that the Building Commission notify the Joint Committee on Finance when this gift funding has been secured which is then subject to the fourteen–day passive approval authority of the Joint Committee on Finance before the Building Commission may authorize any public debt for the project.

I believe the Building Commission should remain the sole state government body responsible for oversight of building projects. I object to the requirement that this project be subject to the additional review and approval of another legislative committee. Therefore, I am vetoing this provision.

10. Facility Operating Cost Estimates

Sections 104m and 227m

These sections require the Department of Administration to provide the Building Commission with a statement of anticipated annual operating costs and other information for each building project proposed for enumeration. They also prohibit the Building Commission from recommending any project for enumeration in the authorized state building program unless the commission adopts and provides an estimate of the anticipated annual operating costs or the increased annual operating costs, plus the anticipated annual debt service costs of all projects in the first full year following their completion, and the revenue source for these costs.

I am vetoing these sections because the Building Commission already collects this information and includes these costs as part of its recommendations on the authorized state building program through the Department of Administration. The commission and the department are committed to addressing anticipated operating costs when considering building projects for approval.

11. Distributed Generation Units Section 319s

This section requires the Department of Administration to investigate the potential of incorporating and using distributed generation units in any state building project that is expected to cost \$5,000,000 or more. The department is required to consider the cost effectiveness of these units, their potential for statewide power generation capacity and their potential for cost savings to the state. The department is also required to report its findings, together with its recommendations and the reasons for its recommendations, to the Building Commission prior to the commission's consideration of a project.

I am vetoing this section because the Department of Administration already reviews the feasibility of using this type of generation in larger building projects and incorporates such units when found to be cost–effective.

12. Restrictions on Acquisition Through Lease Purchase

Sections 108b, 108c, 108e, 994e and 9307 (1x)

These provisions prohibit the state from entering into a lease–purchase agreement that contains an option for the state to purchase a building constructed for purposes of initial occupancy by the state, unless construction and purchase of the facility is enumerated in the state building program prior to entering into the lease–purchase agreement.

I am partially vetoing these provisions because they place an unnecessary restriction on the Building Commission's ability to sign lease-purchase agreements on behalf of the state. The Legislature is represented on the Building Commission and is fully aware of lease–purchase agreements as they are considered and signed by the Building Commission.

13. Sale of Residual State Property

Sections 107m, 107mm, 107n, 107nm, 107p, 107pm, 983m, 983mn, 2307jn, 2307jp and 9459 (5s)

These provisions require each state agency that has jurisdiction over residual state property to solicit bids for the sale of that property no later than the end of a two-year period beginning on the effective date of the bill. They also require that any agency selling residual state property during that two-year period would have to sell the property to the highest responsible bidder, if any, who offers to pay at least the fair market value of the property. Residual property is defined as vacant state-owned land, including any improvements on that land, which is not utilized under any statutory program or any plan or proposal of a state agency. Annually, no later than September 1, each state agency that sold a parcel of residual property would be required to file a report with the cochairpersons of the Joint Committee on Finance that specifies the location and size of each parcel sold, the date sold, the estimated fair market value of the parcel sold, sales price and the allocation of the proceeds of the sale. The requirement for the sale of residual property would not apply to property that is leased to a person other than a state agency on the effective date of the bill, if the terms of lease preclude the sale of property during the term of the lease, until the lease expires or is modified, renewed or extended, whichever occurs first. Finally, current law governing the sale of the surplus property by the Building Commission is subject to the requirements relating to the sale of residual property. These provisions would sunset on March 1, 2004.

I am vetoing these provisions because they place unnecessary time constraints on state agencies that may prevent them from realizing the full value of any state property sold. In addition, existing state policies on the sale of surplus land are adequate.

14. Utility Service Cost Allocation Study

Section 9107 (12w)

This provision requires the Building Commission to direct the Department of Administration to contract with a private person to study the extent of utility services provided to state programs funded by program revenue and to determine whether the charges made to the programs utilizing this service are fairly compensating the state for the cost of the service provided to the The report must include any programs. recommendations for changes in allocation of charges for utility services. The department must report the results of the study, together with any recommendations included in the study report, to the cochairpersons of the Joint Committee on Finance no later than July 1, 2002.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The Building Commission and the Department of Administration have the authority under current law to conduct a utility service cost allocation study.

15. Revision of Enumerated Projects

Section 9101 (20z)

In this provision, the Legislature requires the Department of Administration's Division of Facilities Development and the Building Commission to revise the enumerated projects listed in the authorized state building program. At the second quarterly s. 13.10 meeting of the Joint Committee on Finance, the Department of Administration must provide the Joint Committee on Finance the recommendations of the Building Commission to revise the 2001-03 authorized state building program to reflect the reduction of \$13,100,000 general fund supported borrowing provided in the budget bill. The Joint Committee on Finance is required to introduce appropriate legislation required to implement any revisions approved by the committee.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The legislative members of the Building Commission can introduce appropriate legislation required to make changes in the authorized state building program if such changes are deemed necessary. I believe the Building Commission should remain the sole state body responsible for oversight of building projects. I object to the requirement that changes in the authorized state building program be subject to s. 13.10 review prior to being introduced as separate legislation.

16. Restriction on General Fund Supported Borrowing

Section 392p

This section prohibits the level of general fund supported borrowing that is authorized in any biennium, excluding borrowing for the purpose of refunding previously authorized bonds, from exceeding 3.5 percent of the estimated taxes of the first year of the biennium.

I am vetoing this section because I believe the formula provided is unworkable and does not recognize that the cost of borrowing is controlled by the amount of annual debt service on bonds issued, not the principal amount of the bonds issued. The proposed formula does not take into account the different forms of borrowing the state enters into, which have different interest costs, as well as different amortization periods, affecting both the interest cost as well as the average life of the debt. Most importantly, the section does not recognize the time variability of debt issuance. Debt authorized by the Legislature in this budget may not be issued for several years. Moreover, the overall bonding increase included in the bill, passed the Legislature, as by is two-and-one-half times what would be allowed under the proposed formula. Wisconsin is one of the few states with a constitutional limitation on the amount of debt that it can incur. I am striking this section which attempts to create a different standard.

17. Wausau State Office Facility Study

Section 9107 (12mk)

This provision requires a study of the feasibility of constructing a state office facility in the Wausau area.

I am vetoing this provision because it is unnecessary. The Building Commission is already authorized to conduct studies on the feasibility of constructing state office facilities.

ELECTIONS BOARD

18. Recall Elections of City, Village, Town or School District Officials Sections 94f, 94i, 94L, 94p, 94s, 3828m and 9359 (11q)

These provisions revise the procedures for recalling city, village, town or school district officials. I am vetoing these provisions in their entirety because I believe changes in the procedures for recalling these officials should be adopted through separate legislation.

19. Lease of Electronic Voting Equipment

Sections 906m, 9101 (20x), 9115 and 9129 (1x)

These provisions require the Department of Administration to enter into a master lease on behalf of the Elections Board to obtain sufficient electronic voting equipment suitable for use in municipalities that employed a punch card electronic voting system at the 2001 spring election. I am vetoing these provisions because the department should make the determination as to whether use of master leasing is appropriate to replace punch card voting systems.

ELECTRONIC GOVERNMENT

20. Appropriation Structure

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.530 (1) (g), (is), (it), (kf), (kL) and (kr)], 914, 9101 (7) and 9201 (4v)

These provisions establish appropriations in the new Department of Electronic Government. In my budget recommendations to the Legislature, I proposed that the department have one continuing appropriation with which to conduct general program operations. I did this because the new direction the state must take in managing its information technology resources requires both the broader authorities vested in the chief information officer position heading the agency and the financial flexibility inherent in a continuing appropriation.

The Legislature adopted several of the recommended changes in powers and duties recommended for the chief information officer. However, it approved an annual appropriation instead of continuing. By applying my partial veto, the continuing appropriation authority which I originally recommended will be retained. Because my partial veto simplifies and eliminates several appropriations under the new department, I also am partially vetoing some of the language relating to appropriation transfers. I

am doing this to clarify that the secretary of the Department of Administration has full authority to ensure that appropriate assets and liabilities of operations and programs previously in the Department of Administration are transferred to the new department. Further, my veto is intended to give the secretary of the Department of Administration full authority to determine any question that might arise with respect to treatment of appropriation revenues and expenditures in the new department.

21. Administrative Rule to Set Fees Section 1030d

The Department of Electronic Government created in the budget derives its funding through the assessment of fees for various services and activities. This section requires the department to establish all fees and charges through the administrative rule process. I am removing this requirement with my partial veto because it will unnecessarily burden the chief information officer in expeditiously implementing the agency's mission.

22. Chief Information Officer Vote on Information Technology Management Board

Section 176

This section creates the Information Technology Management Board which is attached to the Department of Electronic Government. The chief information officer is given membership on the board which is limited to a nonvoting status. I object to this limitation because I believe the chief information officer should be a full participating member. I am, therefore, vetoing the provision to remove the nonvoting status for the chief information officer.

23. Ethics Board Procurement Authority

Sections 275m and 355m

The Department of Electronic Government is authorized to oversee and provide technical assistance and training to small agencies. Provisions added in the budget permit the State Ethics Board an exemption from department oversight. The board may utilize any funding made available for small agency support to obtain assistance or training from any source. I am vetoing these provisions because the department should retain authority to determine the form and source of technical assistance for these agencies.

24. Veterans Museum Distance Learning Support

Section 1030m

This provision requires the Department of Electronic Government to administer a program providing outreach and training to veterans through a satellite system that is linked to five remote locations throughout the state.

I am vetoing this requirement because it is unnecessary. I believe that the Departments of Veterans Affairs and Electronic Government will mutually explore and pursue the best ways to use technology to assist veterans. The department will work with the Department of Veterans Affairs to increase outreach to veterans regarding veterans services and benefits and to provide training to Department of Veterans Affairs employees and to county veterans service officers. However, the new department should be allowed to decide how to accomplish this task after an assessment of how best to provide this assistance.

EMPLOYEE TRUST FUNDS

25. Private Employer Health Insurance Coverage Program Changes and Funding

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.515 (2) (a)], 910t, 1400mm, 3741amb, 3766ec, 3766ef, 3766em, 9327 (3q) (a) [as it relates to s. 635.05 (1)] and 9427 (3q) [as it relates to s. 635.05 (1)]

These sections provide funding for the start-up costs associated with the private employer health care coverage program, restrict the variance in health insurance premium rates which insurers are allowed to charge small employers and revise the definition of small employer. One provision requires the state life fund to provide an interest-free loan to the general fund in the amount of \$850,000. The same amount is appropriated under the Department of Employee Trust Funds. The loan is to be paid back from program receipts or from the general fund if the program receipts are not sufficient within a reasonable period of time. Another provision reduces the variance permissible in health insurance premiums charged by insurers to plus or minus ten percent of the midpoint rate for small employers with similar case characteristics. A third provision revises the statutory definition of small employer to incorporate an eligible employee standard present under current state law.

I am partially vetoing these provisions for the following reasons. The additional premium rate variance restrictions may have the effect of increasing costs to many small businesses that currently provide health insurance benefits to their employees. Therefore, I am striking out the rate band change. Also, I object to funding this program by an interest-free loan from the state life fund to the general fund. The life fund's assets are owned by the policyholders and are managed by the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, which has investment guidelines which such a required loan may violate. Therefore, I am vetoing the loan provision, and by lining out the Department of Employee Trust Funds' s. 20.515 (2) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$850,000 GPR in fiscal year 2001–02, I am deleting the funds appropriated for this program. I am also requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds. The Department of Employee Trust Funds, Office of the Commissioner of Insurance and State of Wisconsin Investment Board should explore arranging a loan which addresses needed program costs and conforms with the investment requirements of the board. Finally, I am vetoing the change in definition of small employer. I do so because the new

definition would not meet the requirements of the federal definitions under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996.

EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS

26. Funding for Shared Human Resources System

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.512 (1) (k)], 910d and 9129 (1m)

These provisions change the appropriation for the shared human resources system from continuing to a sum certain. In addition, these provisions prevent the Joint Committee on Finance from supplementing the appropriation above \$16,000 until provided a number of reports.

I object to the change in appropriation status because I believe a continuing appropriation is better suited to the requirements of maintaining the system. I also am concerned that the requirements to prepare and submit additional reports as a condition for having supplemental funding requests considered will unnecessarily delay implementation of the shared human resources system. I am, therefore, vetoing these provisions in their entirety. The effect of my veto will retain the current law continuing appropriation.

LEGISLATURE

27. Legislative Hotline

Sections 102p, 2304p and 9432 (1z)

This provision prohibits the Legislature from maintaining a toll–free telephone service for use of the public to contact members of the Legislature.

The legislative hotline provides a convenient means for the public to contact members of the Legislature. Eliminating this central point of access could discourage citizens from communicating with their legislators. For this reason, I am vetoing deletion of the legislative hotline.

28. Emergency Rule Changes

Sections 3034d, 3034j and 3034k

This provision changes the initial length of time that emergency administrative rules may be in effect from 150 to ninety days. It also modifies the maximum extension of the effective period from 120 days to 180 days. Also included is a new requirement that any proposed administrative rule must be submitted to the Revisor of Statutes and the Secretary of State within thirty days after legislative review is complete.

I am vetoing this provision because it places unnecessary restrictions on the executive branch and the emergency rule process.

29. Legislative Council Studies

Sections 9132 (4b) and 9132 (4z)

Section 9132 (4b) requests the Joint Legislative Council to study how juries are selected, including what actions are needed to increase the participation of racial and ethnic minorities on juries so that juries reflect the racial and ethnic composition of the areas from which the juries were selected. Section 9132 (4z) requests the council to study how state government, the state's research universities and the state's business community can foster economic development in this state by assisting industries and businesses that are based on science and technology.

I am vetoing these provisions because they are unnecessary. These studies can be completed without a nonstatutory requirement.

30. Capstone Certificate Program Reimbursement Funding

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.765 (1) (a)]

This section provides \$9,500 GPR annually to the Assembly to reimburse staff members who participate in the Capstone Certificate Program. This program provides professional development courses to staff members of the Legislature.

I am vetoing this section because providing funding to only one house of the Legislature would discourage other staff members from participating in the program. By lining out the s. 20.765 (1) (a) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount, I am deleting \$9,500 each year for the Capstone Certificate Program.

MILITARY AFFAIRS

31. National Guard Tuition Grant Program

Sections 1024bg, 1024c, 1024m, 9336 (2gk) and 9436 (1gk)

These sections reduce the reimbursement percentage for the National Guard Tuition Grant program from 100 percent to 85 percent. They also make grant recipients ineligible for tuition reimbursement if they are members of the U.S. armed forces, including the National Guard, for ten years or more and make guard members eligible for grants after June 30, 2005, only if they attend University of Wisconsin System schools, schools participating in the Minnesota–Wisconsin reciprocity agreement or any technical college.

I am vetoing these sections in their entirety because they will have an adverse affect on maintaining a strong National Guard. I am committed to maintaining a 100 percent tuition grant reimbursement program for the National Guard in Wisconsin. The program is a vital recruitment incentive. While I cannot restore funding for the current law reimbursement rate through a veto, I will support legislation that provides full funding of the program at a 100 percent reimbursement level.

32. Badger Challenge Program Section 9159 (1) (b)

This provision prohibits the Department of Military Affairs from submitting a request to reduce funding for the Badger Challenge Program as part of the department's general purpose revenue appropriation reduction for state operations.

I am vetoing this provision because it will have an adverse affect on the department. Every other state agency that must reduce general purpose revenue funding in state operations may request to reallocate its reduction to any other general purpose revenue appropriation for state operations within the agency. It is inequitable to prohibit the Department of Military Affairs from requesting to reduce general purpose revenue in the Badger Challenge Program when other state agencies are not restricted in such a manner.

REGULATION AND LICENSING

33. Regulation of Closing Agents

These provisions newly regulate real estate closing agents and require that all trust accounts used by closing agents be interest–bearing. The interest earned by these trust accounts would be transferred to the Department of Administration to provide grants to alleviate homelessness.

I am vetoing these provisions in their entirety because the licensing requirements do not respond to a demonstrated need and will add little additional protection for consumers.

34. Regulation of Cemeteries

Under current law, if a cemetery is abandoned, the respective city, town or municipality having jurisdiction is obliged to assume care for the property. These provisions change the law to require that if a cemetery in Milwaukee County is abandoned or neglected for a period of six months, the city, town or municipality in which the cemetery is located must report the problem to a cemetery authority. The authority then has 90 days (plus one 90–day extension) to address the situation. If the cemetery authority does not succeed with a remedy, a court may appoint a trustee to manage the cemetery and correct existing problems.

The provision also creates a new Cemetery Management Insurance Trust Fund. This fund would consist of revenues collected in Milwaukee County from a \$10 filing fee for death certificates and a \$1 surcharge on certified copies of death certificates. The amounts available are to be used to fund activities of the trustee appointed to manage the neglected or abandoned cemetery.

I am concerned that the trustee's ability to adequately maintain the cemetery will be linked to the new Cemetery Management Insurance Fund balance. Currently, no other state requires a fee to file a death certificate. This fee could provide a disincentive for individuals to file a death certificate, which could impact the official number of deaths for Milwaukee County as well as limit the liquidity of the new fund.

Also, there has not been a formal inventory to estimate how many neglected cemeteries might require management by a trustee. Nor has there been a study to determine the trustee costs for managing a neglected cemetery. The provision provides no alternate means of payment of trustee costs should the insurance fund become depleted.

For these reasons, I am vetoing this provision in its entirety. Although local units of government in Milwaukee County are naturally concerned with the costs in assuming control of an abandoned cemetery, the provisions in the budget proposal offer questionable relief and would likely prove to be insufficient to accomplish their goals.

35. Evaluation of Credentialing Fees Section 9132 (3v)

This section requires the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct a review to evaluate the methodology used by the Department of Regulation and Licensing for recalculating administrative and enforcement costs as part of fee setting for issuing and renewing credentials.

I am vetoing this section because this review can be completed without a session law requirement.

36. Inclusion of an Institutional Pharmacist on the Pharmacy Examining Board

Sections 182q, 182r and 9443 (2x)

This provision changes the makeup of the Pharmacy Examining Board to require that one of the seven members appointed to the board shall be employed as an institutional pharmacist.

I am committed to the appointment to the board of individuals who represent diverse aspects of the profession. However, I object to having membership dictated by statute, in this case, and am, therefore, vetoing this provision. Appointments to the board will continue to show the proper balance of interests without this requirement.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

37. Regional Veterans Claims and Benefits Coordinators

Sections 1451m, 1451n, 1451p, 1451r and 9157 (5mk)

These provisions prohibit the Department of Veterans Affairs from employing more than eight regional coordinators, more than seven claims officers, more than two mobile claims officers, and more than one claims officer in each of the department's other three regions. In addition, the department is required to study the need for additional mobile claims officers and regional coordinators with the focus of each study to be on needs outside of the southeastern regional service area. Finally, the provisions require that the department consult with and receive the concurrence of a county veterans' service officer organization before submitting a request to the Joint Committee on Finance under a 14-day passive review procedure for additional regional coordinator positions if both the department and the organization find that more positions are needed.

These sections unduly constrain the current statutory authority of the Veterans Affairs Board which oversees the operations of the department and limits the ability and flexibility of the secretary of the department to analyze and accommodate the changing demographics and needs of Wisconsin's veterans. I object to restrictions and am vetoing these provisions. Currently, five committees comprised of eighteen representatives from the County Veterans Service Organization and 21 veterans service organizations provide counsel and recommendations on department programs and The board also receives public processes. testimony. This is sufficient oversight. The proposed language mandating consultation or concurrence from advocacy groups regarding internal staffing management is unacceptable.

38. Veterans Outreach Initiative

Sections 788s, 788sf, 792j, 1458m and 9157 (6c)

These provisions require the Department of Veterans Affairs to provide funding for federal benefits dispute training for the Wisconsin Chapter of Vietnam Veterans of America, Inc., and to provide funding to the Armitage House for homeless veterans in Onalaska, Wisconsin.

I am vetoing the requirement to provide funding to the Wisconsin Chapter of Vietnam Veterans of America, Inc., because I object to the duplication this creates in services already available under existing department programs. The National Vietnam Veterans of America Office has approved the department's use of contractual claims training in place of National Vietnam Veterans of America sponsored training to meet accreditation requirements. There is no need for additional funding to support other training for this purpose.

I am also vetoing the requirement to provide funding to the Armitage House in Onalaska, Wisconsin. Although it is a worthy project and one that could be considered for increased funding in the future, I believe it is inappropriate to require the department to provide a grant to one specific program housing homeless veterans when the department already operates the Veterans Assistance Program which provides housing and veterans rehabilitation services to homeless veterans in several locations around the state.

39. Veterans Emergency Aid Pilot Program

Sections 788s, 9157 (8c) and 9457 (3c) These provisions establish a Veterans Emergency Aid Pilot Program in Monroe County. This program requires the department to provide a grant of \$20,000 to the Monroe County Veterans Service Office to administer an emergency assistance program to low-income veterans receiving services from the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Tomah or at the Veterans Assistance Center in the same location. The program would allow the Monroe County Veterans Service Officer to determine eligibility of veterans for aid, which may consist of emergency services such as transportation services, food or temporary housing.

I am vetoing this program because it duplicates existing federal, state and local emergency aid facilities, programs and services to low-income veterans currently in use in Monroe County and surrounding counties. Discharge planning programs from the Veterans Administration Medical Center and Veterans Assistance Center at Tomah offer adequate referral services for veterans in transition from those facilities into, and around, Monroe County. The department currently operates the Veterans Assistance Program, which offers services to homeless veterans, and the Subsistence Aid Grant Program, which offers financial assistance for the same transportation services, food and temporary housing as the proposed emergency aid pilot program would provide. In addition, the proposed program would establish an inequitable use of a veterans trust fund allocation to one county and may establish a precedent in which multiple counties may pursue funding for similar purposes.

F. TAX, FINANCE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

ADMINISTRATION

1. Division of Gaming – License Requirements for Simulcast Racing

Sections 3713c, 3713d and 3713e

These provisions change the license requirements for simulcast racing. These sections would increase the number of live race performances from 250 to 275 performances, remove the requirement that simulcast wagering be conducted at a track only as an adjunct to live performance wagering and remove the requirement that simulcast revenues could not be a primary source of revenue.

I am vetoing these sections because I am concerned about this expansion of gaming. These sections could give rise to a virtual off-track betting facility at a racetrack. I believe such an expansion is beyond the scope envisioned in the constitutional amendment that originally authorized pari-mutuel wagering at racetracks. Such an expansion does not belong in the budget but should instead be subject to extensive legislative scrutiny and should be considered as separate legislation.

BUDGET MANAGEMENT

2. Budget Stabilization Fund, Cash Building Projects Fund and "Buy Down" of School Aid Payment Shift

Sections 103, 245, 395 [as it relates to s. 20.867 (6) (a) and (q)], 980c, 1104n, 1145d, and 9101 (25j) [as it relates to the cash building projects fund]

These sections create a cash building projects fund and specify an allocation of unanticipated tax revenues. Unanticipated revenues are split three ways under these provisions. One–half of unanticipated revenues are paid to the budget stabilization fund. Of the remainder, the first \$115,000,000 is used to annually reduce the amount of the \$115,000,000 June school aid payment shift. Any residual amount after paying the \$115,000,000 is paid to the cash building projects fund.

I am vetoing these provisions because the payment flow to the cash building projects fund is badly flawed. Before any funds are actually paid to that fund, the unanticipated revenues must exceed \$230,000,000 in a year. This seems unlikely in most years. Even in years this would occur, only a small amount of any unanticipated revenues would actually be allocated to the fund. I am also vetoing these provisions because I am concerned with the "buy down" provisions of the school aid payment shift. The provisions preserve the \$115,000,000 payment shift permanently and only reduce the amount shifted by one-half of unanticipated revenues in any one year. Rather than use a gain in revenues to permanently restore the payment, the payment shift is allowed to continue as an unfunded commitment in future years.

The fiscal future of the state is better served by investing unanticipated revenues toward paying its bills on time and building budget reserves. By vetoing this provision, I am maximizing the amount of revenues allocated to the general fund balance and placing the state on firmer financial footing.

3. Statutory Minimum Balance

Sections 392m and 9101 (25j) [as it relates to establishing the statutory minimum balance for fiscal year 2002–03]

These provisions reduce the statutory minimum balance from 1.4 percent of general fund appropriations and compensation reserves to \$90,000,000.

I am vetoing this provision because the reduction in the minimum balance would jeopardize the financial soundness of the general fund. At \$90,000,000, the minimum balance would be less than one percent of general fund appropriations. This is inadequate as a financial reserve to preserve a balanced budget. As a result of my veto, the minimum balance would be increased to 1.2 percent for fiscal year 2002–03.

The state of Wisconsin has one of the weakest financial reserves of any state in the nation. Unlike the vast majority of states, Wisconsin has failed to build budget balances or set–aside revenues in a stabilization fund. During the last biennium, recognizing this weakness, the Legislature saw fit to adopt a staged approach to building higher budget balances. This biennium, the Legislature chose to retreat from this objective by adopting a minimum balance that is the lowest in years.

If Wisconsin had developed adequate reserves in times of surplus, some of the difficult decisions made in this budget would be unnecessary. To avoid retreating on the budget balance, I am partially vetoing these sections to preserve the budget balance standard in place for fiscal year 2000–01.

EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS COMMISSION

4. Qualified Economic Offer

Sections 2609L, 2609m, 2609p, 2609t and 9317 (8m)

These sections make three major changes to Wisconsin's qualified economic offer provision, which affects the collective bargaining process between school boards and teachers unions. First, section 2609L requires a qualified economic offer to maintain all conditions of employment that existed in the previous contract. Second, section 2609m requires a qualified economic offer to maintain all permissive subjects of borrowing that existed in the previous contract. Third, section 2609p requires that school boards submit qualified economic offers on a timely basis. Section 2609t requires the Employment Relations Commission to establish a methodology for assessing the validity of qualified economic offers, and section 9317 (8m) makes the changes first apply to petitions for arbitration on the effective date of the budget act.

I am vetoing these sections in their entirety because their potential economic and policy impact has not received any objective review or analysis. Before any changes are made to the qualified economic offer provision it is critical to know what impact they will have on the state's financial commitment to support elementary and secondary education and on school district revenue limits.

It is also important to analyze how the changes will effect the collective bargaining process itself. For example, requiring school boards to maintain all permissive subjects of borrowing may increase the reluctance of school boards to include these subjects in future contracts. Maintaining all conditions of employment, no matter how innocuous, could result in otherwise qualified offers being invalidated on technicalities. Depending on the interpretation, requiring school boards to submit qualified economic offers on a timely basis could force school boards to impose qualified economic offers instead of actively bargaining with teachers unions. In addition, making this provision apply to petitions for arbitration filed after the effective date creates a double standard between districts that have already settled their contracts for the 2001–03 contract period and those that have not.

The collective bargaining process is very complex and has significant implications for both the financing and management of the state's public school system. Major changes to the process must not be made without careful study and review. Including these changes in an omnibus budget bill without objective analysis or public hearings is not good public policy.

I recognize that state programs need to be reviewed periodically and sometimes require revision. I would support efforts to provide for a comprehensive and objective study of Wisconsin's qualified economic offer law.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

5. Regulation of Rent–to–Own Agreements

Sections 3020p, 3020v, 3021v, 3021w, 3492f, 3492r, 9120 (1d), 9320 (1d) and 9420 (1d)

These sections remove rental purchase companies from the jurisdiction of the Wisconsin Consumer Act and create Subchapter XI of Chapter 218 under which these companies would be licensed and rental purchase agreements regulated. The sections also authorize the Department of Financial Institutions to promulgate rules regarding certain licensing fees required under Subchapter XI.

Merchants who offer credit sales and merchants offering rental purchase agreements should be regulated to guarantee a level playing field for the merchants and fairness for consumers. Although these provisions recognize that the rental purchase industry offers a service that is in some ways different from credit sales, they do not sufficiently recognize the issues common to both rental purchase and credit sales merchants. One of these issues is disclosure of annual percentage rates. Without full disclosure of these rates, comparison shopping by consumers becomes even more difficult. These provisions fail to address this essential issue of consumer fairness.

I am vetoing these sections entirely because these provisions do not adequately address the common issues of consumer protection and because I object to the inclusion of this substantial and important policy change in the budget. The rental purchase industry offers consumers a valuable service and the unique features of this service should be recognized. Revisions to acknowledge the appropriate manner and substance of the regulation of rental purchase companies should be considered as separate legislation.

GENERAL FUND TAXES

6. Internal Revenue Code Update

Beginning in tax year 2001, these sections, with three exceptions, provide that state individual and corporate income and business tax provisions referenced to the federal Internal Revenue Code (IRC) would refer to the code in effect on December 31, 2000, rather than to December 1999, as under current law.

The Legislature intended to exclude the three federal law changes that relate to the deductions for environmental remediation costs, donations of computer equipment and the treatment of foreign sales corporations. However, the bill as passed by the Legislature excludes these provisions only for tax years prior to 2001. It inadvertently adopts them for 2001 and subsequent years. In so doing, there could be a decrease in tax revenue not intended by the Legislature.

I am vetoing these sections to avoid the potential revenue loss. This would keep the revenue estimates in accord with the estimates the Legislature considered in passing the budget.

I recognize the inherent complexity of the Internal Revenue Code. I request the Legislature to reconsider the IRC update as it intended and pass the update as separate legislation.

7. Sales Tax Exemption for Water Slides

Sections 2246nm and 9444 (3w)

This provision provides a sales and use tax exemption for commercial water–park slides including support structures, attachments and parts. The exemption reduces general fund revenues by \$90,000 in 2001–02 and by \$120,000 in 2002–03.

I am vetoing this section because I object to such a narrowing of the sales tax base. This is a highly selective exemption for one form of construction and maintenance of entertainment or recreational structures. This favors a single industry among a variety of industries providing recreation

8. Individual Income Tax Exclusion for Military Pensions

Sections 2142m and 2142n

Starting in tax year 2002, these sections exclude from taxation all payments, other than surviving spouse benefits, received from the U.S. military employee retirement system that are not excluded under current law.

I object to the exclusion of surviving spouse benefits from this new tax benefit. Under current law pre–1964 military pension and surviving spouse benefits are not taxed. It is inequitable to broaden the exemption to include only post–1963 military pension and to not include post–1963 surviving spouse military retirement benefits. My partial veto of this section will make these surviving spouse benefits tax exempt.

9. Estate Tax

Section 2200L

This section requires persons who prepare an estate tax return for deaths occurring after December 31, 2002, to prepare a return under this newly decoupled Wisconsin estate tax. Other provisions in the bill decouple the Wisconsin estate tax from the federal estate tax beginning in fiscal year 2003–04. Because estate taxes are due nine months after a death, the relevant date for deaths should have been for deaths occurring after September 30, 2002.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove the December 31, 2002, date because it does not reflect legislative intent. This partial veto realizes the Legislature's intent to begin the new, separate Wisconsin estate tax in fiscal year 2003–04 by requiring estate tax preparers to prepare returns under the decoupled Wisconsin tax in fiscal year 2003–04. It is my intent to rescind the decoupling of Wisconsin's estate tax from the federal estate tax in my 2003–05 biennial budget.

10. Artistic Endowment Foundation Tax Credits

Sections 2148m, 2150d, 2150t, 2175, 2179d, 2179h, 2193d, 2193h and 2205n

Sections 2148m, 2150d, 2150t, 2175, 2179d, 2179h, 2193d and 2193h provide a nonrefundable individual, corporate and insurance company tax credit for contributions to the Artistic Endowment Foundation created in this budget.

Under this credit a tax filer could claim ten percent of the amounts contributed to the artistic endowment fund. The maximum credit is \$50 (\$100 for married couples filing jointly) or \$500 for the corporate tax credit.

Section 2205n requires the Department of Revenue to provide for an income tax form provision that would allow a taxpayer to contribute additional funds to the Artistic Endowment Foundation. These additional contributions would reduce a taxpayer's refund or increase a taxpayer's payment for tax liability. support the new Artistic Endowment Foundation, but I object to the new ten percent credit as it doubles the amount of the current five percent itemized deductions credit. Many contributions or expenses that are eligible for the current five percent credit are as worthy of tax code benefits as are contributions to the arts. I support the arts, but I do not believe Wisconsin should provide a new and exceptional tax benefit to artistic contributions. I am vetoing these sections to eliminate this new credit. As a charitable contribution, contributions to the Artistic Endowment Fund will be eligible for the current five percent itemized deductions credit.

I am vetoing section 2205n entirely because I object to the requirement that the Department of Revenue should modify the tax forms as indicated in section 2205n. The above veto of the credit removes the need for the department to modify the tax forms.

11. Baseball Park District Income Tax Checkoff

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.566 (1) (hp)] 917r, 2153g, 3037m, 3037n and 9344 (8x)

These sections:

- Provide funding for the Department of Revenue's administration of voluntary payments for professional baseball park districts.
- Define voluntary payments for these districts and establish the procedure for making such contributions to a baseball park district on the income tax return. These additional contributions would reduce a taxpayer's refund or increase a taxpayer's payment for tax liability.
- Specify how the department must handle taxpayer conditional donations and errors such as failures to remit correct amounts or refunds insufficient to pay the designated contribution.
- Structure the collection and distribution of any such contributions for administrative expenses and to retire bonds issued for the initial construction of such baseball park facilities.
- Provide for refunds of such donations under specific circumstances.

I am vetoing these sections entirely because I object to this checkoff. Wisconsin should strive to simplify and reduce the length of income tax forms. This provision will increase the complexity and length of our forms. This veto will not prevent taxpayers and other interested parties from contributing to a baseball park district. Therefore, this checkoff is not needed and this veto eliminates the provision.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

12. Promulgation of Rules to Facilitate the Production of Distributed Energy

Section 9142 (2zq)

These provisions direct the Public Service Commission to promulgate rules on distributed energy by the first day of the ninth month after the effective date of the budget.

I am vetoing this section to give the commission flexibility in developing these rules. The technical requirements for engineering, electric reliability and safety set elsewhere in the bill are extensive. The bill also adds review and analysis by an advisory panel in addition to the review already required by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. To ensure there is adequate time for complete review and analysis of these rules, I am partially vetoing this section to remove the nine month deadline.

13. Technical Veto – Telecommunications Regulation Section 3011d

This provision was among a series of changes I recommended regarding the Public Service Commission's enforcement authority against telecommunications providers. The Joint Committee on Finance decided to remove the proposal from the budget. However, due to a drafting error this section of the proposal remained in the bill.

I am vetoing this section to conform the bill to the record of legislative intent.

14. Voice Mail for the Homeless Section 395 [as it affects s. 20.155 (1) (q)]

This provision provides funding from the universal service fund. This includes \$20,000 each year for voice mail for the homeless.

By lining out the Public Service Commission's s. 20.155 (1) (q) appropriation and writing in a smaller amount that deletes \$20,000 SEG in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$20,000 SEG in fiscal year 2002–03, I am vetoing the funding for voice mail for the homeless. Relative to the overall needs of the homeless, this is a luxury. Funds for homeless services should first be allocated for food and shelter. It is ironic that working families are called upon to pay for voice mail services they cannot afford for themselves.

This is not an area requiring state involvement. It can be handled through private donations and corporate contributions. In many states, and even in Wisconsin, telecommunications providers have stepped forward to provide the homeless with voice mail.

15. Wisconsin Advanced Telecommunications Foundation Contributions

Section 9142 (3mk) (d)

This provision would allow telecommunications providers to pass assessments related to the

Wisconsin Advanced Telecommunications Foundation (WATF) onto a customer's bill in the form of a surcharge. A telecommunications provider could only levy such a surcharge if the bill states that the surcharge is being assessed because of the telecommunications provider's failure to contribute to the WATF prior to its dissolution.

I am vetoing this provision because it would result in additional charges on consumers' phone bills at a time when consumers are already paying significant state and federal charges on their bills. The effect of this veto would be to delete telecommunications providers' ability to pass remaining WATF assessments onto consumers.

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

16. Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program

Sections 2205m and 9144 (2x)

These sections require the Department of Revenue to work with the Internal Revenue Service and the University of Wisconsin–Extension to undertake a volunteer income tax assistance program. The program is to encourage volunteering by the state's financial and legal professionals, provide training for the volunteers, and assist in creating mobile sites to offer income tax assistance to rural and underserved areas.

I am making two partial vetoes to these sections. First, I am vetoing the requirement that the department assist in the creation of mobile sites because this may not be the best means to serve all rural and underserved areas of the state. With my veto, the department will be able to examine other means of service delivery and consider the cost and benefit of each option. Second, I am vetoing the requirement that sufficient volunteers be recruited by January 1, 2002, to meet the demand for tax assistance services. I am vetoing this provision because the department will not be able to perfectly discern the level of demand for services by this date. If necessary, the department may need to recruit additional volunteers after January 1. Both of my partial vetoes of these sections reflect the Department of Revenue's ongoing effort to serve Wisconsin residents in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

SHARED REVENUE AND TAX RELIEF 17. Municipal Shared Revenue

Payments

Section 2281e

This section specifies that each municipality in calendar years 2002 and 2003 shall receive a one percent increase in its shared revenue payment compared to the payment the municipality received in the previous year. It also specifies that in 2004 and thereafter, each municipality shall receive a shared revenue payment equal to the payment it received in 2003.

I am partially vetoing this section in two ways. I am partially vetoing the section to eliminate the freeze in shared revenue payments that the section creates beginning in 2004. I am vetoing this provision because the shared revenue formula should be allowed to redistribute state aid according to need over time. Without my veto, payments would remain static forever into the future regardless of whether a municipality gains tremendous property wealth or loses a large share of its tax base. With my veto, shared revenue payments will increase for those municipalities with greater needs.

I am also using a partial to veto to eliminate an ambiguity in the language. I am vetoing the phrase "under this section" because deleting this phase will clarify that the one percent across-the-board increases provided in 2002 and 2003 include the utility component of shared revenue but exclude small municipality shared revenue. This technical correction was recommended by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau to ensure that this section's language reflects legislative intent.

18. Exclude Lafayette County from Maximum Constraint

Section 9344 (9m)

This section specifies that the exemption of Lafayette County from the maximum constraint provision of the shared revenue formula shall first apply to the shared revenue payments made in November 2001.

I am partially vetoing this section to move the initial applicability of the Lafayette County exemption from the 2001 to the 2002 payments. I am making this partial veto because it is disruptive to change shared revenue payments this late in counties' 2001 fiscal year. Without this partial veto, shared revenue payments for nineteen counties will be reduced in November 2001 to amounts below those anticipated by these counties when they set their 2001 budgets. As a consequence, these counties could end up in deficit situations by no fault of their own. My veto avoids this concern. By shifting the first year to which the exemption applies to 2002, counties will have adequate time to incorporate all of the bill's shared revenue provisions into their budget planning.

Because my veto moves the first year of the Lafayette County provision to coincide with the first of two back-to-back increases in shared revenue under the bill, I expect no county to experience, solely as a result of the exemption, a decline in its 2002 payment compared to 2001. This is because I am signing into law increases in county shared revenue payments that exceed the amount of funding that the Lafayette County exemption reallocates. For the 2002 payments, I am approving increases in county shared revenue and county mandate relief payments that total \$1,897,400. The Lafayette County exemption will redirect to that county approximately \$1,200,000 of this increase. The additional aid will more than offset the amount redistributed by the exemption and will largely flow to the specific counties impacted by the Lafayette exemption. The bill's second increase in county shared revenue and county mandate relief totaling \$1,916,400 in 2003 should further relieve concerns over the redistributive impact of the Lafayette County exemption because it provides an additional increase after the Lafayette County exemption is already implemented. Only a small portion of the 2003 increase is expected to go to Lafayette County. Lafayette County's need for assistance is clear. Lafayette County imposed the second highest tax rate of all counties on the December 2000 property tax bills. The first and third highest, Menominee and Florence, were previously exempted from the maximum constraint. In 2001, the county's operating levy was the highest permissible under the county mill rate limit. By far, Lafayette County is the most negatively under impacted county the current minimum/maximum provisions of the shared revenue formula. In 2001, the county is receiving only sixteen percent of the amount it is entitled to under the equalization formula.

The county's situation is not new. Lafayette County has been on the maximum constraint for years. As the county with the largest share of its property value in agricultural land, the fall in farmland values in the 1980s hit the county's tax base very hard. The county's 2001 tax base is virtually identical to what it was twenty years ago. In 1981, the county's equalized value was \$682,437,900. In 2001, it is only one percent higher, at \$690,737,800. During this same time period, the tax base of all counties statewide increased by 177 percent. Adjusted for inflation, Lafayette County's tax base is half of what it was twenty years ago.

I am not content, however, with the means the Legislature chose to assist Lafayette County. Exempting a county from the maximum constraint is a crude on/off switch for adjusting state aid. This approach provides only two choices: allowing a county to be punished by the constraint or allowing it to gain substantially without regard to the needs of others. Consequently, I encourage the Legislature to consider other means to adjust the maximum constraint. Other approaches could create a more equitable situation rather than an environment in which each county subject to the maximum seeks to become the next exception.

19. Special Charges for Municipal Services

Sections 2022tL, 2022w, 2022x, 2023 and 9359 (8z)

These sections allow municipalities to impose special charges for services available, regardless of whether the services are actually rendered, by allowing municipalities to allocate all or part of the cost of the services to properties served or eligible to be served.

I am vetoing these sections because the imposition of a charge for services not rendered blurs the line between fees and taxes. I am also concerned that this provision will have a negative impact on the activities of many nonprofit organizations because the provision would broaden the scope of charges that could be applied to tax–exempt property. While this provision would help municipalities finance public services, it could hinder private entities that produce public benefits. I am especially concerned that this provision would lead to reductions in programs that help the homeless, the disabled and other populations assisted by the many nonprofit organizations across the state. I do hope, however, that a dialogue between municipalities and the owners of tax–exempt property will occur that will produce an acceptable means to ensure that municipalities are enabled to adequately finance public services without impairing the benevolent efforts of our nonprofit organizations.

20. Automatic Teller Machines

Sections 2108q and 9344 (23k)

sections exclude automatic These teller machines from the property tax exemption for computer equipment beginning January 1, 2002. I am vetoing this provision because it will lead to higher fees for Wisconsin residents to use automatic teller machines by increasing the costs of operating the machines. I am also vetoing this provision because it is an unnecessary intrusion into the Department of Revenue's administrative responsibility to apply the computer exemption fairly and uniformly to all property. As a result of my veto, GPR expenditures under the sum sufficient appropriation to reimburse local governments for the tax base lost by the computer exemption under s. 20.835 (1) (e) will increase by an estimated \$1,117,500 in fiscal year 2002-03.

21. Area Cooperation Compacts Section 2022t

This section requires municipalities in standard metropolitan statistical areas to enter into area cooperation compacts with other municipalities or counties in the same region. The compacts will produce savings to taxpayers by improving cooperation in service delivery. Beginning in 2003, each municipality will be required to enter into an area cooperation compact with at least two municipalities and/or counties to perform at least two governmental services. Beginning in 2006, each municipality will be required to enter into an area cooperation compact with at least four municipalities and/or counties to provide at least five governmental services. An exception is provided for municipalities with less than two adjacent municipalities.

I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the broader compact requirement that begins in 2006. As a result of my veto, the compacts will be with at least two local governments for at least two services for 2003 and each year thereafter. I am vetoing the broader requirement beginning in 2006 because it is premature. Municipalities should be given greater opportunity to gain experience with this new means for seeking cooperative gains before it is expanded. Although my veto eliminates the mandate for broader compacts, broader compacts will not be prohibited. Indeed, I encourage local governments to fully explore all opportunities to create savings by working together.

22. Annexations Creating Town Islands

Section 2019n

This section allows a city or village to create a town island by annexation if an intergovernmental cooperation agreement or a cooperative plan for boundary change applies to the territory that is annexed in creation of the town island.

Intergovernmental cooperation agreements can cover a wide range of concerns. I am partially vetoing this section to eliminate the use of these agreements to create town islands because the provision does not specify that the agreement must cover boundary issues. My veto prevents the use of agreements related to nonboundary concerns from being inappropriately applied to this section. As a result of my veto, a city or village may create a town island by annexation, but only if a cooperative plan for boundary change between the city or village and the town exists and the plan applies to the land that is annexed.

23. Classification of Certain Property as Swamp and Waste

Sections 2114m and 9344 (28v)

These sections require undeveloped land to be classified as swamp and wasteland if the land is not classified as agricultural or productive forest land and the land is part of a parcel where the other part of the parcel is enrolled in the Managed Forest Program.

I am vetoing these sections because they undermine the property tax system while providing no tax relief. Except for agricultural property, real property is assessed at market value. Consequently, no property impacted by these sections would receive a property tax reduction. In addition, determining the classification of land based on the characteristics of adjacent land rather than the characteristics of the land itself weakens the uniformity of the property tax system.

STATE TREASURER

24. Changes in Statutory Appropriations

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.585 (2) (tm)] and 920x

These sections convert а continuing appropriation to an annual appropriation for Program administrative College Savings expenses. I object to this conversion because it is premature. The current appropriation structure was approved less than four months ago in 2001 Wisconsin Act 7. Also, this change may be programmatically unwise. The Legislature's first choice of a continuing appropriation type for these administrative expenses was sound and, until we have more experience with the program, I believe that a continuing appropriation is most suitable for these program expenses. For these reasons, I am partially vetoing these sections to restore this appropriation as a continuing appropriation.

TOBACCO SECURITIZATION PERMANENT ENDOWMENT FUND

25. Technical Veto to Remove Erroneous Cross–Reference Section 940

This section creates the appropriation for the annual transfer from the permanent endowment fund to the general fund.

I am partially vetoing this section to remove a cross–reference to a section that does not exist. This correction conforms Senate Bill 55 to the intent of the Conference Committee.

TRIBAL GAMING ALLOCATIONS

26. Health and Family Services – Minority Health Program Section 2848r

This section provides \$250,000 in tribal gaming funding for a minority health program. Of this funding, \$200,000 will be used for grants to improve minority health and \$50,000 will be used for a public awareness campaign. I am vetoing the grant funding in fiscal year 2002–03 because I believe the ongoing funding commitment is excessive. As a result, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary to place \$200,000 in unallotted reserve in fiscal year 2002–03 in appropriation s. 20.435 (5) (kb) to lapse to the tribal gaming appropriation, s. 20.505 (8) (hm), at the end of that fiscal year.

27. Office of Justice Assistance – County–Tribal Law Enforcement Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.505 (6) (kr)], 859r, 859s, 890g, 890h, 9101 (21k) and 9401 (3k)

These provisions create a cooperative county-tribal law enforcement grant program funded with Indian gaming receipts and administered by the Office of Justice Assistance. The new program will provide Vilas County with \$210,600 PR-S annually to support a law enforcement agreement with the Lac du Flambeau and provide Oneida County with \$50,000 PR-S annually to support a law enforcement agreement with the Lac du Flambeau.

I am vetoing these provisions because both counties already participate in existing law enforcement grant programs. Vilas County receives funding for an agreement with the Lac du Flambeau under the cooperative county-tribal law enforcement grant program under s. 165.90 in the Department of Justice. Oneida County has received statutorilyestablished maximum award amounts through the Office of Justice Assistance's county law enforcement grant program under s. 16.964 (7). Furthermore, these earmarks would provide disparate treatment for these two counties compared to other recipients of Indian gaming receipts for tribal law enforcement efforts. By creating a fourth separate but related grant program for tribal law enforcement assistance

using Indian gaming receipts, these provisions are unnecessary and duplicative.

28. Natural Resources – Trout Management

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (1) (jk)]

This provision appropriates \$20,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$150,000 in fiscal year 2002–03 for the study and reintroduction of the coaster brook trout.

By lining out the appropriation and writing in a smaller amount in fiscal year 2002-03, I am limiting the appropriation to \$20,000 in each fiscal year. I am vetoing this provision because I am concerned about the depletion of tribal gaming revenue. Appropriations from tribal gaming revenue in fiscal year 2002-03 exceed the revenues taken in that year. Without restraint, there will be a mismatch between revenues and expenditures for the next fiscal year. Further, funding for introduction should await the findings of the study. If the findings are favorable, full reintroduction should also be supported by fish and wildlife revenues. In addition, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

29. Natural Resources – Wild Crane Study

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.370 (1) (kk)] and 9137 (6f)

This provision appropriates \$30,000 in each fiscal year for the study of crop damage by wild cranes.

By lining out the appropriation and writing in smaller amounts that delete \$10,000 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$30,000 in fiscal year 2002-03, I am limiting the appropriation to \$20,000 in fiscal year 2001–02 only. I am vetoing this provision because I object to the continuing nature of this study. Funds were appropriated for such a study in the last biennium as well. That study was to have been completed by July 1, 2001, and this should not become a continuing obligation. There should be adequate revenues remaining to complete the study and report the In addition, I am requesting the findings. Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

30. Tourism – Kickapoo Valley Reserve, Law Enforcement Services

Section 395 [as it relates to s. 20.380 (2) (kc)]

This provision appropriates \$31,300 in fiscal year 2001–02 and \$41,800 in fiscal year 2002–03 to provide law enforcement services for the Kickapoo Valley Reserve.

By lining out the appropriation and writing in a smaller amount in fiscal year 2002–03, I am limiting the appropriation to \$31,000 in each fiscal year. I am vetoing this provision because I am concerned about the depletion of tribal gaming revenue. Appropriations from tribal gaming revenue in fiscal year 2002–03 exceed the revenues taken in that year. Without restraint, there will be a mismatch between revenues and expenditures for the next fiscal

year. This veto limits the amount provided in fiscal year 2002–03 to the amount appropriated in fiscal year 2001–02. This should be sufficient to provide the necessary services. In addition, I am requesting the Department of Administration secretary not to allot these funds.

31. University of Wisconsin–Extension – Grazing Education Grants

Sections 395 [as it relates to s. 20.285 (1) (kj)], 580t, 890n and 1356g

These provisions create and fund a grazing education grant program of \$100,000 annually. The program would provide grants for education and technical assistance on intensive grazing.

I am partially vetoing these sections because I am concerned about the depletion of tribal gaming revenue. Appropriations from tribal gaming revenue in fiscal year 2002–03 exceed the revenues taken in that year. Further, such technical assistance to agriculture has been a long–standing mission of the University of Wisconsin–Extension. This assistance should be provided from its base resources. A new program is not warranted.

32. Workforce Development – Trade Masters Pilot Program

Section 2560r

This provision creates the Trade Masters Pilot Program. It also provides that an evaluation be submitted to the Legislature by July 1, 2010.

I am partially vetoing this provision because I find the nine year deadline excessive. Instead, I am the Department of Workforce directing Development to explain how the funds were spent at the conclusion of the fiscal year. Moreover, an independent evaluation of the program can be done on a continuing basis as necessary by the Legislative Audit Bureau or the Performance Evaluation Office in the Department of Administration.

The Honorable, The Senate:

The Audit Bureau is required by statute to contract for the performance of an actuarial audit of the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) at least once every five years. After a formal request-for-proposal process, the Audit Bureau awarded a contract to an actuarial firm, Milliman USA, to perform the most recent actuarial audit. The audit has been completed and the actuary's audit report, much of which is quite technical, and a response from the Department of Employee Trust Funds and its consulting actuary have been released.

In its report, Milliman USA concluded that the actuarial method used to determine WRS liabilities and funding requirements is reasonable and appropriate for the WRS. Further, Milliman USA concluded that the actuarial functions of the WRS are being adequately performed and that the WRS actuarial assumptions are reasonable.

Milliman USA also offered observations on trends in contribution rates, noting that contribution rates in the

protective categories have declined more steeply than in other employment categories. An effect of declines in contribution rates have been to provide reduced values for separation, death, and money purchase retirement benefits for participants. Suggested alternatives for addressing these trends would require legislative action.

Copies of the actuarial report have been distributed to members of the Joint Audit Committee, the Retirement Research Committee, the Department of Employee Trust Funds and its board, and to others required by law to receive copies. If you are interested in receiving a copy of the report, please contact our office and request a copy of the 2001 actuarial report of the Wisconsin Retirement System. The report is also available on line at www.legis.state.wi.us\lab\windex.htm.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of July 2001.

On July 23, 2001 the <u>General Fund</u> balance was -\$148.6 million. This shortfall continued until July 31, 2001 when the balance reached a positive \$3.4 million. During this period, the <u>General Fund</u> balance reached a low of -\$162.1 million on July 25, 2001. This shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures that occurs each July, and the delay in issuing the 2001 Operating Note.

On July 6, 2001 the <u>College Savings Program Trust Fund</u> balance was -\$2 thousand. This shortfall continued until July 31, 2001 when the balance reached a positive \$48 thousand. The shortfall was due to the initial start-up of the fund and a delay in the transfer of revenues into the fund.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

At the request of several legislators, we have completed a review of Brown County's financial condition. Concerns about the county's financial condition were raised in late 2000, when county officials projected a \$3.9 million budget deficit for 2001 and larger deficits in subsequent years. In mid-2001, the county revised its budget estimates and projected a smaller deficit for 2002, as well as for future years. Nevertheless, Brown County is likely to face financial challenges in the future.

Brown County's total expenditures have grown by 27.1 percent from 1995 to 1999. Despite this substantial increase, its 1999 per capita expenditures have, in most cases, been typical of counties with populations over 100,000. In addition, Brown County's financial condition has been satisfactory since 1995: the county had a surplus in its general fund for four of the past six years; it has had an adequate undesignated balance in its general fund at year-end; it has a low level of outstanding debt; and its bond rating has be "Aa1," the second-highest attainable.

In 2001, Brown County's corrections expenditures are expected to increase significantly, largely as the result of the June opening of a new jail. We estimate that costs associated with housing inmates in 2001 may be as much as \$20 per day more than was spent for housing inmates in 2000, when many inmates were housed in out-of-county facilities.

Brown County provides more services than most other counties. To address the county's projected budget deficits in the future, county officials will need to either control expenditures or enhance revenues. We have identified several areas they may wish to consider.

We have completed a review of the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program, which was established by 1997 Wisconsin Act 27. This pilot program, operated by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is intended to provide increased flexibility for businesses in complying with environmental regulations, while maintaining existing levels of environmental protection. The Legislative Audit Bureau is required by statutes to monitor and report annually on this pilot program.

The program allows DNR to sign up to ten cooperative agreements with businesses. No cooperative agreements were established during the program's first two years. Of the nine companies that submitted letters of intent to joint the program, three have withdrawn or chosen to pursue their objectives within existing regulations. In February 2001, an agreement with Wisconsin Electric Power Company became the first to be executed under the program. Agreements with the remaining five companies are in various stages of development.

Both DNR staff and program participants identified challenges associated with the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program. These challenges include encouraging businesses to participate despite the time required to advance through the application process and reach a signed agreement, the uncertainty of the final outcome for program participants, and the process involving the federal Environmental Protection Agency. Addressing these challenges will be important because the Legislature will likely be asked to consider a new flexible environmental management program, known as Green Tier, which has been proposed by a DNR-appointed committee to enhance the environmental performance of companies.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DNR during our review.

We have completed a financial audit of the Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes for fiscal year 1999-2000, at the request of the Department of Health and Family Services. We are able to provide unqualified opinions on the Institutes' financial statements. The financial statements show that, on an accrual basis, Mendota Mental Health Institute had net income of \$2.8 million and Winnebago Mental Health Institute had net income of \$3.0 million.

For several years, the Department did not have an adequate system to accumulate and summarize information on patient revenues and accounts receivables. In January 1999, the Department began implementing a new \$525,000 billing and accounting system; however, its automated billing functions are not yet properly working, which has resulted in delays in billing and collection activities. The Department is taking reasonable steps to solve the problems with the system and reduce the delays, which we will continue to monitor in our future audits of the Institutes. In addition, we recommend improvements for the Department's process for developing and documenting estimates of patient revenues and receivables.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #24

Relating to the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board

WHEREAS, Article V, Section 6 of the Wisconsin Constitution vests in the Governor the exclusive and discretionary power to grant pardons, commutations and reprieves; and

WHEREAS, it is advantageous to the clemency applicants, the public and the Governor to have an informed review of each application for clemency; and

WHEREAS, such an informed review may ably be performed by a board of advisors; and

WHEREAS, all concerned will benefit from a uniform application process;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this state, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby re–create the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board according to the following guidelines:

- 1. Membership. The Governor's Pardon Advisory Board shall consist of no more than seven members who serve a term of one year at the pleasure of the Governor.
 - (a) One member shall be appointed by the Governor to represent the Attorney General.
 - (b) One member shall be appointed by the Governor to represent the Secretary of the Department of Corrections.
 - (c) The Governor's Legal Counsel or his/her designee shall be a voting member and shall chair the board.
- 2. Functions and Operations. The Board shall review applications for executive clemency and make recommendations to the Governor as to each.
 - (a) Hearings

- The Board shall hold a public hearing on each qualifying application at which hearing the applicant shall be heard.
- (2) Hearings shall be held subject to the discretion of the chair, at a date and place set at least two weeks in advance of the hearing.
- (b) Recommendations to the Governor
 - (1) After a hearing is concluded, the Board shall meet in closed executive session, as permitted by Wiscosin Stats. s. 19.85(1)(a), to arrive at a recommendation on the application. Four members constitute a quorum for executive action by the board.
 - (2) The factors the Board shall weigh in its decision include, but are not limited to, the severity of the offense, the time passed since discharge or conviction, the applicant's need for clemency and the applicant's activities and conduct since the offense.
 - (3) The chair shall convey to the Governor in writing the Board's recommendation for each application, along with dissenting recommendations, if any, and reasons given for each.
- 3. Manner and Form of Applications
 - (a) Scope
 - (1) These rules shall govern all applications for any form of clemency by an person except infividuals currently incarcerated.
 - (2) All applications for any form of clemency to which these rules do not apply shall be governed by Wisconsin Statutes Sections 304.08 through 304.11.
 - (b) Form and Contents

g.

- (1) Applications for any form of Clemency shall be in writing, signed by the person seeking clemency, notarized by a notary public and submitted to the Governor.
- (2) Applications shall contain the following information:
 - a. the name of the applicant
 - b. the applicant's current address and mailing address if different
 - c. the applicant's date of birth
 - d. the exact form of clemency sought
 - e. the conviction(s) from which relief is sought
 - f. the court that imposed sentence (county and branch)
 - the date of sentencing
 - h. the sentence imposed
 - i. the place of incarceration (if applicable)
 - j. a description, in the applicant's own words, of the circumstances of the crime
 - k. a statement of any facts which the applicant believes justify clemency, including activities since conviction, employment history and information pertaining to the applicant's need for clemency
 - 1. subsequent contacts with law enforcement
 - m. whether the applicant has applied for clemency in the past and what date the application was decided by the Governor
- (3) The Governor, through the office of Legal Counsel, may set other conditions,

requirements and procedures in relation to the application process, including but not limited to, prerequisites and conditions for applying for clemency.

- (c) Service of Notice
 - The applicant shall serve on the judge of the court of conviction and on the district attorney of the county of conviction, a notice of application which shall contain the information required in the application by s. 3(b) of this order.
 - (2) Service of notice may be by mail, but the Governor's office must be given proof of service by providing a copy of the notice as signed or stamped by the person upon whom notice was served.
- (d) Court Records
 - (1) The applicant shall obtain and provide to the Governor's Office certified copies of the following court records for all convictions for which the person is seeking clemency:
 - a. The indictiment, information or complaint; and
 - b. The judgment of conviction and sentencing
 - (2) If copies of any of the required court records are unavailable, the applicant shall submit to the Governor's Office a letter from the clerk of courts of the county of conviction stating that copies are unavailable.
- (e) An application shall be complete when it contains the information and documents required by subsections (a), (b) and (c) of this section.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

At the request of the Department of Health and Family Services, we have completed a financial audit of the Health Insurance Risk–Sharing Plan (HIRSP) for fiscal year (FY) 1999–2000. HIRSP provides medical insurance for nearly 11,500

policyholders who are unable to obtain coverage in the private market. We have provided an unqualified opinion on HIRSP's financial statements and have followed up on issues raised in prior audits.

One of these issues relates to overpayment of prescription drug claims. From July 1998 through January 2001, the Department did not have controls in place to ensure that policyholders and pharmacies were reimbursed for prescription drugs at HIRSP–allowed rates. As a result, HIRSP overpaid drug claims by an estimated \$5.5 million. The Department has reinstated system controls to reimburse drug claims at HIRSP–allowed rates, and it plans to begin recovery of overpayments in fall 2001. However, because of these efforts, at least 160 pharmacies have withdrawn from the program. The Department has recently implemented an on–line pharmacy claims processing system, which it expects will help to address pharmacy concerns and streamline the drug claims process.

Another major issue pertains to HIRSP's funding approach. In April 2001, the Board of Governors voted to implement an accrual–based funding approach in response to our prior audit recommendations, and following extensive debate. HIRSP's actuary projects that in fiscal year (FY) 2001–02, the change from a cash–based to an accrual–based approach will require policyholders, insurers, and health care providers to provide an additional \$16.6 million to fund an accumulated accounting deficit. An excess policyholder premium reserve will fund the policyholders' share; the required contributions paid by health care providers are expected to meet their share; and insurers will fund their share through their semi–annual assessments. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department and the plan administrator for HIRSP. A response from the Department is Appendix 2.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of August 2001.

On August 1, 2001 the **General Fund** balance was -\$74.2 million, This shortfall continued until August 21, 2001 when

the balance reached a positive \$290.0 million. During this period, the <u>General Fund</u> balance reached a low of -\$202.2 million on August 15, 2001. This shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures and the delay in issuing the 2001 Operating Note.

The General Fund shortfall was not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

Attached is the report on the environmental Cooperation Pilot Program as required by section 299.80 (16)(b) Wis. Stats., to be provided to the governor and the legislature. The report describes the success of the program, my recommendation on continuation of the program and the recommended changes that should be made to the program. We have used the information contained in the Legislative Audit Bureau Letter, DNR analysis of the Pilot Program and consultation with our stakeholders as the basis for the report and recommendations.

Development of these agreements has been far more difficult than was initially envisioned but the results have been more instrumental in defining meaningful change that can be replicated and delivered on an ongoing basis. WEPCO, Cook Composites and Polymers, Northern Engraving, Packaging Corporation of America, Madison Gas & Electric and International Truck and Engine have been leaders. They have been the pioneers doing the research and development work that was necessary to get this program going. Their generosity with their resources, patience with research and development time frames, creativity with seemingly insurmountable odds, energy dedicated to stakeholder interests and dogged perseverance have defined practical systems that can deliver regulatory flexibility that most can only conceptualize.

Over the course of the last two years, we have seen a significant increase in use of environmental management systems, known principally as a concept at the start of the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program. We have also seen a significant decreased suspicion of regulatory flexibility, interested persons, groups at the corporate level and measurable environmental performance. As a result of increase acceptance and reduced suspicion, we have been able to execute agreements over the course of the last year, move the negotiations along for other agreements and more effectively engage the United States Environmental Protection Agency. We have executed the first agreement in February 2001 and will sign the second agreement today. We have several other agreements that are in progress and several companies who are interested in further discussions.

Progress is being made and practical experience is being gained. This program is providing the practical experience needed to influence innovation discussions at the national level and prove the benefit of regulatory flexibility, public involvement and environmental performance measurement at the state level. Consistent with the DNR strategic plan, I am recommending that the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program continue as a pilot through June 30, 2006, pursued as a simple, separate piece of legislation. The staff and the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program Advisory Group have made recommendations for program modifications. Those recommendations should be presented as separate legislation or as a part of the 2003-05 Budget, if staffing recommendations are included. The language should be based on a working group review, seeking changes that would compliment Green Tier legislation should it pass or meet regulatory innovation needs in the absence of Green Tier.

The results of the program and the recommendations are described in greater detail in the attached documentation. I would be happy to meet with you to answer questions and provide additional detail on the information contained in this letter and the attached report. Thank you for the opportunity to share this information.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2001. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40(3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$207.5 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$58.4 million higher than the \$149.1 million estimate that was projected in the final Chapter 20 fund condition statement. In addition, this reflects only minor variations from the gross ending balance of \$197.8 million estimate for fiscal year 2001 by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau in its summary of 2001 Act 16.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$10.063 billion compare to \$10.946 billion in the prior year, a decrease of \$883 million or 8.1 percent. This decrease is the result of reductions in income tax rates and other changes to state tax laws made in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9. General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$11.078 billion compared to \$11.270 billion in the prior year, a decrease of \$192 million or 1.7 percent. This reduction reflects the one-time sales tax rebate distributed in fiscal year 2000. If the rebate is excluded, fiscal year 2001 spending increased by \$506.9 million or 4.8 percent.

General-purpose revenue spending increases in fiscal year 2001 were largely driven by increases in three areas: School Aids increased by \$239.9 million, Corrections increased by \$94.1 million, and UW System increased by \$93.2 million.

In fiscal year 2001, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 60.3 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 16.1 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 9.4 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 14.2 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December 2001. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of September 2001.

On September 17, 2001 the **General Fund** balance was –\$99.7 million. The following day, September 18, 2001 the **General Fund** balance reached a positive \$83.9 million. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures and the delay in issuing the 2001 Operating Note.

The General Fund shortfall was not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Board Finds:		

1. Jerome Schmidt of Brookfield, Wisconsin claims \$7,072.20 for property damage allegedly incurred during the Highway 33 construction project in West Bend in 1997. The claimant states that in July 1999 the floor drain in his building backed up and he began to experience drainage problems. The claimant believes that these problems are caused by damage to the sewer lateral leading from his building. The claimant states that he hired plumbers to excavate the sewer lateral and found that the pipe was damaged under the sidewalk, which had been installed as part of the construction project. The claimant also states that, prior to the project, his sewer lateral was attached to the old storm sewer but that the lateral was not reconnected after the project was complete. The claimant states that, according to a letter from the City of West Bend, a new storm sewer main was installed but the sanitary sewer main was not affected, contrary to the assertion by DOT that a new sanitary sewer main was installed. The claimant alleges that there is no evidence that any damage to the building lateral was caused by his excavator as DOT alleges. He states that the lateral was excavated north of the sidewalk, that the damage to the lateral was underneath the sidewalk, and that there was no damage to the lateral in the area of excavation. He provides affidavits from four individuals who were present during the excavation to support these assertions. The claimant points to the fact that DOT's own records show that the contractor apparently damaged the sewer lateral while installing a new water lateral nearby and that they supposedly repaired the damage. The claimant has received no documentation from DOT regarding the exact nature of this damage or the alleged repairs. The claimant states that, contrary to DOT's assertion, he never received a letter regarding the construction project and points to the fact that DOT has been unable to produce any documentation of the letter that was allegedly sent. The claimant believes that DOT's contractor damaged the sewer lateral, failed to repair the damage and did not connect the claimant's lateral to the new storm sewer as they should have. He requests reimbursement of \$3,472.20 for his expenses to determine the cause of the drainage problems and \$3,600.00 for the estimated costs of repairing the lateral and properly connecting it to the storm sewer.

DOT recommends denial of this claim. DOT does not believe that the sidewalk or parking lot construction associated with the highway project would have affected the claimant's sewer lateral in any way, since it was located approximately 5' below the surface. DOT does not have any evidence to support the claimant's assertion that, prior to the construction project, his sewer lateral was connected to the old storm sewer main. DOT states that the construction project involved the installation of a new sanitary sewer main. DOT further states that, because the purpose of the claimant's sewer lateral is to dispose of "gray water", it falls under the City of West Bend's policy, which states that sewer laterals are the responsibility of the property owner and must be connected to the sanitary sewer main. DOT also alleges that there is evidence that the contractor hired by the claimant damaged the lateral during the excavation. DOT states that its records show that the project contractor did damage the claimant's sewer lateral during installation of the nearby water lateral but that the damage was repaired. DOT states that it sent a letter to all property owners in the project area requesting that they identify any private utilities that might be affected by the construction and that the claimant did not reply. However, DOT could not produce a copy of the letter and states that it would have been hand delivered to the building rather than sent to the address of the owner of the building.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$3,472.20 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation s. 20.395 (3)(cq), Stats.

Check Cashing Corporation of Racine, Wisconsin 2. claims \$9,983.78 for damages related to the cashing of a SSI benefit check. On August 31, 2000, Frances M. Jones presented a SSI benefit check in the amount of \$9,983.78 at the claimant business. The claimant cashed the check and was informed on September 9th by its bank that the state had put a stop payment on the check, effective September 6th, and that the check would not be honored. The claimant contacted DHFS and was told by the SSI department that the check was issued for the wrong amount and that Ms. Jones was only due a much smaller benefit of approximately \$5300. SSI also stated that Ms. Jones knew that the check was an error and that she was not supposed to cash it. The claimant contacted the Racine Police Department and took steps to pursue charges against Ms. Jones, however, the DA's office felt that there was not sufficient proof of intent to commit a crime and Ms. Jones was not charged. The claimant believes that it is an innocent third party and that it should not pay for the state's error. The claimant believes that it should at least be immediately reimbursed for the amount of SSI benefits legitimately owed to Ms. Jones.

DHFS recommends denial of this claim. Based on the Department's information, Ms. Jones attempted to cash the check at another business earlier that day. That check cashing business verified the check prior to cashing it and was informed that the check was an overpayment and that a stop payment was in place. That business declined to cash the check. Ms. Jones then apparently went to the claimant in a second attempt to have the check cashed. An informal survey of check cashing establishments in the Madison area shows that their policy is to verify the validity of checks the size of this one. Based on a conversation with the Racine Police Department, DHFS believes that Ms. Jones may have been personally acquainted with the staff at the claimant business, which perhaps resulted in a lessening of their diligence in verifying the status of this unusually large check. The amount actually due Ms. Jones was \$4,283.78. SSI benefit funds may only be paid to eligible program recipients or their representative payees, therefore, DHFS is unable to issue a check to the claimant. DHFS believes that the claimant should seek reimbursement from Ms. Jones, who fraudulently cashed a check for money to which she knew she was not rightfully entitled.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$2,500.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Health and Family Services appropriation s. 20.435 (7)(ed), Stats.

Shirley A. Anderson of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims 3. \$1,800.00 for vehicle damage allegedly caused by a Department of Health and Family Services employee. The claimant, who also works for DHFS, states that her vehicle was parked at her state office building in Waukesha on February 22, 2001. She had taken a state vehicle to complete her job duties and left her personal vehicle in the state vehicle assigned space. She states that when she returned with the state vehicle on February 23, she discovered that her van had been hit and damaged. There was another state vehicle in the parking space adjacent to the claimant's personal vehicle. She states that she contacted the driver of the other state vehicle and was told by that individual that they did not hit her car. The claimant states that she contacted the police. The claimant alleges that the height of the adjacent state vehicle's bumper and the damage on her vehicle was the same and that there were black marks from the state vehicle's bumper on her van. The claimant believes that a state employee hit her vehicle and that she should therefore be reimbursed for the full amount of the damages. She requests reimbursement of \$1800. Her insurance deductible is \$500.

The Department of Health and Family Services recommends denial of this claim. A State Risk Management investigation determined that the state vehicle adjacent to the claimant's car was not the cause of the damage. Risk Management believes that the damage on the claimant's van is not consistent with the size and shape of the state vehicle's bumper. The police report indicates that the driver of the adjacent state vehicle claims to have backed the state vehicle directly out of the stall into an empty stall behind her and therefore could not possibly have struck the claimant's vehicle. There was a report from a witness who stated that she had seen this driver back the car straight out of the stall into the stall behind her. The officer also indicated that "The damage to the van was most severe near the rear wheel well and decreased in severity as the scrape went forward. This indicates the striking vehicle most likely struck the van at the wheel well and went forward. It does not appear a vehicle backing out of the stall next to the van would have caused the damage. Another state vehicle was also parked next to the claimant's van that day and the driver of that vehicle indicated that she did not strike the claimant's vehicle and that her state car was undamaged. The Department does not believe there is sufficient evidence as to how the vehicle was damaged to hold DHFS responsible for the claimant's damages.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

4. Scott Rouse of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$1,241.00 for overpayment of taxes. The claimant states that he failed to file income tax returns n 1992 and 1993 because of three hospital stays. The claimant states that his has been disabled since a stroke in 1978. He claims that his health problems prevented him from filing his 1992 and 1993 returns. The Department garnished his wages and intercepted tax refunds. The claimant filed the missing returns in January 2001. The claimant apologizes that it took so long to file the returns. He believes that he should be refunded this money since his returns show that he would not have owed any taxes for those years but would have actually received refunds. He requests return of \$750 garnished from his wages, the intercepted \$180 in refunds, and his \$311 in refunds from 1992 and 1993.

The Department of Revenue recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that this claim involves an assessment initiated by DOR based on a federal audit of the claimant's 1991 return and estimated assessments based on his failure to file returns in 1992 and 1993. DOR states that a combined assessment for all three years was issued on December 8, 1995, with a due date of 1996. DOR states that it worked diligently to located the claimant, who moved frequently, as often as three times in eight months. DOR records show several promises by the claimant to file returns beginning in January 1998. DOR states that it intercepted the claimant's 1997 and 1998 income tax refunds, certified his wages in 1998 and again in 2000, and intercepted his 1998 sales tax rebate. DOR states that the claimant has contacted the Department more than once a month since August 1999 but failed to file the requested returns until January 12, 2001. Based on DOR's calculations of the actual liability for 1991 and the late filing fees and collection fees for 1992 and 1993, DOR over-collected \$881.43. DOR cites section 71.75(5), Stats., which prohibits it from refunding the amount collected on the original assessment since no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year time period. In addition, DOR cites section 71.75(2), Stats., which does not allow for return of the 1992 and 1993 refunds (\$120 and \$99) because of the four-year statute of limitations.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

5. Craig R. Pajari of Cloquet, Minnesota claims \$3,229.94 for monies levied from his account as well as attorney's fees and mileage. The claimant states that the DOR levied his bank account in the amount of \$2,709.44 for payment of back taxes. The claimant states that he has since proved that he did not owe any taxes to the State of Wisconsin for the years in question. He requests return of the money taken from his account as well as \$300 in attorney's fees and \$220.50 for mileage (31.5 cents per mile) traveling from Cloquet, MN to Madison, WI to resolve this issue.

The Department of Revenue recommends denial of this claim. The claimant failed to timely file income tax returns for the years 1993 through 1996. An estimated assessment for 1993 was issued in November 1996, with a due date of January 6, 1997. Estimated assessments for 1994 and 1995 were issued in November 1997, with a due date of January 5, 1998. An estimated assessment for 1996 was issued on November 30, 1998, with a due date of February 1, 1999. The claimant's bank account was levied in August 2000 in the amount of \$2,709.44. In March 2001 the claimant provided documentation that his

1993 income was \$2,706 and provided a copy of his 1996 Minnesota residence return. In April 2001 the claimant filed his 1994 and 1995 returns, each with refunds claimed that could not be issued due to the four–year statute of limitations. DOR states that s. 71.75(5), Stats., prohibits it from refunding the amount that was collected on the original assessments since no refund was claimed within the prescribed two–year period and recommends denial of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. Arthur W. Johnson of Whitewater, Wisconsin claims \$7,501.01 for overpayment in taxes due to failure to file income tax returns for the years 1988 through 1994. The claimant states that he and his wife purchased their first farm in 1987. He states that they were not aware of how to handle tax issues related to the farm and that they therefore put off filing returns. In 1997 the claimant states that he realized that he would need to hire an accountant to take care of the overdue taxes. The claimant states that it took the accountant almost a year to get the taxes done and that the claimant's wife suffered two strokes during that year, leaving him to run the farm alone. The claimant states that the accountant, who was supposed to complete all the missing returns, only completed returns for three years. The claimant states that he has an unresolved dispute with the accountant over this matter. The claimant believes that the DOR hounded him for the returns and then used the statute of limitations as an excuse not to return his overpayments.

The Department of Revenue recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that two separate estimated assessments were issued in February 1996, one for 1988 through 1991 and one for 1992 through 1994. The assessments were referred to collections in May 1996. DOR records indicated that the claimant began contacting DOR in June 1996 to discuss his account. DOR states that the claimant filed returns for 1994 through 1997 in October of 1998. The farmland credit allowed for these four years, \$6582.00, was applied to the delinquent estimated assessments for 1988 through 1993. The 1988 through 1993 returns were filed in November of 1999, almost four years after the original assessment. DOR states that section 71.75(5), Stats., prohibits them from refunding the amount that was collected on the original assessment since no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year period. The claimant also refers to a motor vehicle fuel tax refund of \$939.01. DOR believes that the claimant may have thought that he could apply for a motor vehicle fuel tax refund for the State of Wisconsin on his federal income tax return. That is not the case. The State of WI requires a separate refund claim, which must be filed within one year of the date of purchase. No such claim has been filed with DOR.

The Board concludes that the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$289.63, for payment of motor fuel credit for the years 1996–1998 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Claims Board appropriation s. 20.505 (4)(d), Stats.

7. Richard W. Hennecke of Waukesha, Wisconsin claims \$5,000.0 for damages related to his retirement from state service. The claimant states that he was informed by DETF that he was eligible to retire on June 30, 1998. The claimant states that DETF employees informed him, both verbally and in writing, that he would be eligible to continue his state life insurance at his current rates. The claimant states that he was told by DETF that he had to work in each of five calendar years to be eligible to continue benefits. He states that since he was verbally assured and confirmed in writing that his life insurance

would continue and since he was eligible to continue all other benefits, he had no reason to suspect that DETF had given him incorrect information. Furthermore, the claimant believes that he was eligible to continue his life insurance. He points to s. 40.02(25)(a), Stats., which defines eligible employee for the purposes of insurance as someone who has participated in the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS) for at least 6 months. The claimant participated in WRS beginning on 6/27/94 and was therefore an eligible employee for purposes of insurance on 12/27/94. The claimant states that the statute does not rely on insurance "effective dates" to determine eligibility. Since he was eligible and participating in WRS in 1994, the claimant believes that he meets DETF's requirement of being covered in each of five calendar years. The claimant was offered a conversion life insurance policy by DETF after the error was discovered, however, that insurance was significantly more expensive than his state policy (\$58.83 annually per \$1000 coverage versus \$0.52 annually per \$1000 coverage) and would have cost him over \$2300 more per year. The claimant states that he is requesting \$5,000 because that is the Claims Board payment limit and is also the approximate cost of burial. The claimant believes that either DETF is incorrectly defining "eligible employee" for purposes of insurance contrary to s. 40.02(25), Stats., or they simply gave him the incorrect information. The claimant alleges that he made his decision to retire based on DETF's statements about his eligibility to continue benefits and requests payment in the amount of \$5,000.

DETF does not make any recommendation on this claim. DETF acknowledges that its employee incorrectly advised the claimant that he was eligible to continue his life insurance and that she provided this information in writing. However, DETF believes that because the claimant was previously informed that he had to be covered by state insurance for five years in order to be eligible to continue his insurance and because no premiums were ever deducted from the claimant's retirement checks, he should have been aware that an error had been made. DETF states that the claimant was not eligible to continue his life insurance benefits because his insurance was not effective until 1/1/95 and that this effective date was clearly stated on the claimant's application and in a confirmation letter sent to the claimant after his insurance application was processed. After DETF's error was discovered DETF did offer the claimant a conversion insurance policy for which he would have been eligible but he declined. Finally, the claimant has provided no documentation for the \$5000 amount he is claiming. DETF acknowledges that it gave the claimant incorrect information and that he might have given that information, provided in writing, more weight than previous information he had received. 74 Op. Atty. Gen 193, 196 (1985), provides that the Claims Board lacks the authority to order payment from the Public Employee Trust Fund. Since any payment for this claim would have to come from the Claims Board appropriation, DETF declines to make any recommendation regarding payment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. Ronald P. Bristol of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$250.00 for lost property. The Department of Administration, Division of Facilities Development, employs the claimant as a HVAC Control Specialist. On March 28, 2001, the claimant was performing a site inspection at a Department of Health and Family Services facility in Mauston, WI. He states that he left his coat, with his sunglasses, keys and gloves in the pocket, in the upper floor mechanical room, along with the coats of the

other employees performing the inspection. He states that when they returned to the mechanical room, he found that his coat was missing. The claimant submitted a claim to his insurer and requests reimbursement of his \$250 deductible.

The Department of Administration recommends denial of this claim. DOA believes that it would set a bad precedent to pay this claim and does not believe that the state should be held liable for personal items lost by employees. DOA also states that, to the best of its recollection, these types of claims have not been granted in the past.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Member Rothschild not participating.*)

Amy Merrill of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$100.00 for 9. vehicle damage allegedly related to her employment with the Department of Corrections. The claimant is a Probation and Parole Agent for the DOC. She states that on April 26, 2001, she parked her car in the office parking lot on Allied Drive. She was out of the office all morning at a meeting, to which she rode in a co-worker's vehicle. When she returned to the office at 1:45 PM, she noticed that a passenger side window on her vehicle was smashed. She informed her supervisor, contacted the Madison Police and her insurance company. The repairman told her that two rocks had been thrown through the window to cause the damage. The claimant states that the office is located in a high risk neighborhood and that there are often many unsupervised children playing in the area, including in the parking lot amidst the vehicles. The claimant states that her supervisor indicated that they had been having problems with vandalism over the last several weeks. The claimant also states that many neighborhood residents are very aware of which vehicles are driven by parole agents. She requests reimbursement for her insurance deductible. The cost to fix the window was \$258 and the claimant's deductible was \$100.

DOC recommends payment of this claim based on equitable grounds. DOC agrees with the facts as stated by the claimant. DOC believes that this claimant incurred these expenses only because she works for this agency as a Probation and Parole Agent. DOC believes that it is very likely that residents of the neighborhood knew that the owner of the vehicle was a law enforcement representative and intentionally damaged the vehicle. DOC feels that it cannot allow Probation and Parole Agents and their families to bear the financial burden of expenses they incur solely and directly because they work with criminals for the benefit of the people of Wisconsin. This would be unfair and would undermine agent morale. DOC supports payment of the claim and is willing to pay the amount requested by the claimant.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$100.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Corrections appropriation s. 20.410 (1)(a), Stats.

10. Randall & Cindy Jaskot of Dousman, Wisconsin claim \$303.49 for refund of tax assessment. The claimants state that on November 17, 1995, the company that he worked for transferred Randall Jaskot to Wisconsin from Illinois. The claimants state that they were told that the company would continue to pay Illinois taxes and that they did not need to worry about Wisconsin taxes. The claimants state that they believed what they were told because this was a \$100M company that had transferred people all the time. The claimants now regret that they relied on the company's assurances. They state that there was no malicious attempt on their part to avoid paying

their taxes and therefore request return of the \$303.49 assessment.

The Department of Revenue recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that an estimated assessment was issued in September 2000 for failure to file a timely WI income tax return for 1995. The assessment was referred to collections in December 2000. The return was filed on April 26, 2001. The taxpayers were assessed the collection fee, late filing fee, and interest as imposed by state statute. The 25% negligence fee was not imposed after consideration was given for the claimants' circumstances.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. PACE Local 7–0765 of New Berlin, Wisconsin claims \$5,326.51 for refund of overpayment of taxes. The claimant states that two successive Financial Secretaries for its organization failed to file tax returns for withheld payroll taxes and make the appropriate payments to the Department of Revenue. This problem occurred between mid 1995 and October 1999. DOR has refunded \$5,391.38 in overpayments, plus \$341.70 in penalties. The claimant requests reimbursement of the remaining overpayments, totaling \$5,326.51, which DOR has refused to issue due to the two–year statute of limitations under s. 71.75(5), Stats. The claimant does not believe that the legislature intended that DOR use that section to deny refunds to ignorant taxpayers based on over–collection of taxes.

DOR recommends denial of this claim, which involves estimated assessments based on failure to file employee withholding tax reports from 1995 through 1999, specifically, the third and fourth quarters of 1995 and the first and second quarters of 1996. Estimated assessments for these four quarters were filed in January, April, June and September 1996, respectively. Tax reports for all four assessments were filed on October 22, 1998. DOR states that s. 71.75(5), Stats., prohibits it from refunding the amount that was collected on the original assessments since no refund was claimed within the prescribed two–year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Kenneth C. Ketterer of Indialantic, Florida claims \$7,487.20 for overpayment of taxes related to the sale of a Wisconsin condominium in 1983. The DOR issued an estimated assessment based on an adjustment to his 1983 tax return. The claimant issued assessments for both the claimant and his wife, however, no monies were ever collected on his wife's assessment. The claimant states that he and his wife moved to Florida in 1983 and that they have lived at their current address in Indialantic, FL for many years. He states that in March 1994 they were informed by their mutual fund that DOR had levied \$7,487.20 from their account for payment of back taxes. The claimant alleges that this was the first they were ever informed that there was a problem with their WI taxes and that they never received any notices from DOR. The claimant does not believe that DOR made a reasonable attempt to locate them and points to the fact that they had lived at their current address for many years and that the mutual fund had their correct address. The claimant alleges that they wrote DOR three times in 1994 to find out why the money was taken but never received any reply. The claimant states that they were then contacted by a collection agency in May 2000 regarding the assessment issued against his wife. The claimant states that they immediately responded and sent DOR the required documentation to show that they did not owe the taxes assessed. He alleges that they tried to clear up the issue with DOR but that it took numerous phone calls and a certified letter before DOR finally responded four months later. The claimant points to the fact that they responded promptly to the May 2000 contact, resolving the issue to DOR's satisfaction within 16 days. The claimant believes that DOR has been extremely unresponsive and did not make a reasonable effort to locate his current address. The claimant states that, had they received the earlier notices, they would have responded to them promptly and request reimbursement of the amount levied from their account.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that the claimant filed a 1983 part-year Wisconsin resident tax return showing an address in Miami, Florida in March of 1984. In September 1986 DOR sent a letter to the claimant at that Miami address regarding the 1983 sale of their WI property. DOR received no reply. In December 1986 DOR issued an assessment, which was referred for collection in 1987. DOR states that over the course of the next seven years, various notices and letters were sent to the claimant at the Miami address and there is no record in DOR files that the claimant ever responded. On March 23, 1994, DOR received funds from the claimant's mutual fund to satisfy the debt. DOR states that it has no record of any correspondence from the claimant until his wife's assessment became an issue in 2000. DOR further states that this claim is for the entire amount levied from the claimant's account. Based on the information provided by the claimant, DOR calculates his revised liability to be \$3,095.18 and his wife's to be \$170.10, therefore, DOR believes the correct amount of overpayment is only \$4,221.92, not \$7,487.20 as the claimant is requesting.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$4,221.92 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566 (1)(a), Stats.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the Department of Transportation's bridge inspection program, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. In fiscal year 2000–01, the Department spent approximately \$2.2 million in segregated funds to inspect state-owned bridges, including an estimated \$1.2 million to hire consultants from the private sector

The Department's written policies for inspecting the 4,858 state-owned bridges are generally consistent with federal regulations and other national guidelines, and state staff meet federal bridge inspection qualifications. The Department does not, however, adequately monitor bridge inspection costs or valuate the cost-effectiveness of its use of consultants by comparing their costs to the costs of inspections performed by state staff. It also does not use the most recent data on bridge traffic to measure the condition of state bridges. We have included recommendations to address these concerns.

The Department has increased staff time devoted to bridge inspection. However, we found that from January 2000 through August 2001, 15.9 percent of routine bridge inspections and 8.0 percent of inspections of structurally deficient bridges were not completed within the two-year period required by both state and federal law. Therefore, we have also included a recommendation that the Department ensure inspections are completed in a timely manner. National bridge experts have determined that the Department could not have foreseen the failure of the Hoan Bridge in Milwaukee in December 2000. We found, however, that the Department had not conducted routine inspections of the bridge as frequently as required by law. The Department estimates that the bridge repair work will cost approximately \$15.8 million.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department. The Department's response is Appendix 3.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, as directed by s. 25.17(51m), Wis. Stats. As of December 31, 2000, the Investment Board managed a total of \$67.0 billion in investments that included assets of the Wisconsin Retirement System, the State Investment Fund, and five smaller insurance and trust funds.

The Investment Board has recently been successful in exceeding its performance benchmarks for the Fixed Retirement Trust Fund, which represented 81.8 percent of the assets under its management in 2000. However, the Fixed Retirement Trust Fund's long-term returns continue to lag those of other large public pension funds. As of June 30, 2000, its five-year returns ranked last among ten funds we surveyed.

We focused our analysis on the Investment Board's Opportunity Portfolio for the Fixed Retirement Trust Fund, which is a higher-risk portfolio that has focused on private equity investments in emerging markets in Asia and Eastern Europe. The portfolio, which has assets of approximately \$1 billion, has failed to meet its performance benchmarks and is not meeting expectations of earning higher returns that the Investment Board achieves through its more traditional investments. In light of the lagging returns and controversy surrounding certain investments in South Korea, support for the portfolio among members of the Board of Trustees is divided. Another area of concern is the Board of Trustees' involvement in the Opportunity Portfolio. Of particular concern is the fact that some trustees own public stock in entities associated with the portfolio, These interests have previously not been publicly disclosed. We suggest that to avoid the appearance of conflicts of interest, the Investment Board revisit its policies to ensure trustees comply with provisions of the State Ethics Code.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Investment Board. A response from the Board's Executive Director is Appendix 5.

3. Provide that the Governor shall designate one (1) member on the Commission as chair to serve in this capacity at the pleasure of the Governor; and

a. Report on the current state of the Society's historic sites; and

b. Access economic operating models used by the sites; and

c. Assess models on interpretation used by the sites; and

d. Assess current promotional activities for the Society's historic sites; and

e. Assess the sites' stewardship of collections, which include historic buildings, major museum collections, and archives; and

5. Require the Commission to prepare and submit a report to the Governor detailing its findings and proposing recommendations for the operation of the Society's historic sites while not increasing current state funding levels; and

6. Require the Commission to submit periodic reports to the Governor as the chair deems necessary and a final report to the Governor no later than July 1, 2002; and

7. Direct the Wisconsin Historical Society to provide the Commission with administrative and support services; and 8. Direct the Department of Administration to provide the Commission with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with Section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

9. Provide that the Commission shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor.

a.identify the basic financial knowledge and skills which are appropriate and necessary for the successful entry into the financial marketplace by Wisconsin's youth;

b.catalog existing successful efforts of financial education by state agencies and private/non-agency organizations;

c.assess the adequacy, nature and extent of financial and economic education in Wisconsin and determine whether and where gaps exist in the education infrastructure;

d.foster communication and cooperation between existing entities and programs in financial education; e. identify topics and audiences which could be better served by financial education efforts in Wisconsin; and

f.suggest ways to meet the needs identified by the task force.

3. Provide that DFI will be responsible for guidance and administrative support to the Task Force; and

j. two school administrators;

k. an educator;

l. a student

m. two representatives of private foundations;

n. two representatives of banks;

o. a representative of credit unions;

p. a member of the securities industry;

q. a representative of Americans for Consumer Education and Competition (ACEC);

r. a representative of the Wisconsin Jump Start Coalition;

s. an entrepreneur;

t. a representative of a Center for Economic Education; and

u. five at-large members; and

Under the terms of a contract with the Legislative Audit Bureau, the Lewin Group has completed its second report on implementation of the Family Care Pilot program. Its first implementation report was released in November 2000. The Legislature authorized the Family Care program—a redesign of Wisconsin's long-term care system for the elderly and adults with physical and developmental disabilities—in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9. Act 9 also directed the Audit Bureau to contract with an organization other than an agency of the State to evaluate the pilot program. In addition to the enclosed report, the Lewin Group will provide a report on the program's impact and cost-effectiveness, as well as additional reports on program implementation, in the 2001-03 biennium.

The Family Care program is being piloted in nine counties. Jackson, Kenosha, Marathon, and Trempealeau counties operate Resource Centers, which provide information and referral services to both consumers and providers of long-term care services. Fond du Lac, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Portage, and Richland counties operate both Resource Centers and Care Management Organizations (CMOs), which coordinate care and manage capitated payments for those determined to be eligible for the Family Care benefit. Expenditures for the Resource Centers and CMOs totaled \$32.2 million in calendar year 2000; expenditures are expected to increase in 2001 as enrollment is projected to increase from 2,875 individuals in March 2001, the first quarter in which all five CMOs were operational, to 5100 individuals by the end of 2001.

The Lewin Group notes that since November 2000, the Department of Health and Family Services and the pilot counties have made considerable progress in implementing Family care, although the counties are at different stages in terms of program processes, capacity, and enrollment. In January 2002, the counties will implement a final program

element, an independent enrollment broker, as proposed by the Department and approved by the federal government. The Lewin report points out a number of areas that need to be addressed as the pilots continue, including outreach, provider relations, care management, quality assurance, and cost.

We appreciate the cooperation and courtesy of the Department of Health and Family Services and the many county staff, citizen members of long-term care councils, and provider representatives who have worked with the Lewin Group throughout the evaluation process. We have completed a financial audit of the Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001. The program provides financing for payment of claims under the Wisconsin Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. This financial audit was performed at the request of the Department of Commerce, which audits and pays PECFA claims, and the Department of Administration, which issues the program's revenue bonds and commercial paper.

As necessary parts of the financial audit, we reviewed the Revenue Obligations Program's control procedures, assessed the fair presentation of the Statement of Changes in Program Assets, and reviewed compliance with applicable laws and regulations. We were able to provide an unqualified auditor's report on the program's financial statemet and notes, and we found no reportable instances of weaknesses in the internal control structure or instances of noncompliance.

The State issued \$230 million in debt in fiscal year 1999–2000 and another \$20 million during our audit period. The debt proceeds, along with petroleum inspection fees in excess of debt service requirements, have allowed the Department of Commerce to reduce a backlog of unpaid PECFA claims from \$196 million as of January 1, 2000, to less than \$15 million as of June 30, 2001. However, as of June 30, 2001, the Department of Commerce had yet to review for approval approximately \$20 million of claimed costs, and it continues to receive new claims every month.

We have completed a best practices review of local government operations, as directed by s.13.94(8), Wis. Stats. This report describes the development and implementation of electronic government services by local governments in Wisconsin.

Most local governments have already met a recommendation of the Blue–Ribbon Commission on State–Local Partnerships for the 21st Century, commonly known as the Kettl Commission, that all local governments serving populations of more than 25,000 have Web sites by June 30, 2002. Only 2 of 71 local governments with this population do not currently have Web sites. Further, 54 of 77 local governments with populations between 10,000 and 25,000 have Web sites.

E–government holds the potential to improve government services by making them less costly, more convenient, and more accessible to the public. Of the Web sites we reviewed, two–thirds are used primarily to publish information such as agendas and minutes of government meetings on line.

Increasingly, however, communities are developing features that allow interaction between residents and the government by allowing residents to send e-mail to local officials; print forms and applications; and in some cases, pay parking tickets or other fees on line using credit cards.

Our report highlights best practices for communities to use in making their Web sites as widely accessible as possible, making them easy to use, and addressing security and privacy concerns.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the many Wisconsin county and municipal officials who responded to an electronic survey we conducted, as well as to additional questions.

In fulfillment of the requirements set forth under s. 9101(26n), I am notifying the Joint Committee on Finance of the Department of Administration's (DOA) action taken to lapse funding related to vacant positions in state government. This lapse plan totals \$7,948,300 in each fiscal year. The nonstatutory provision gives the DOA secretary the latitude to determine each agency's lapse amount and requires each agency to lapse the amount identified. I have apportioned the reduction on the same basis as the five percent state operations reductions were determined, with certain exclusions.

Agencies were informed of the amounts that they were required to lapse in my September 24, 2001, memorandum relating to the implementation of budget cuts and lapses. The reduction for the vacancy lapse amounts to a 1.47% state operations reduction for most state agencies. Positions in the Division of Care and Treatment Facilities in the Department of Health and Family Services, small agencies and the Circuit Courts have been exempted from this reduction. The lapse amount for each agency is listed in the attachment.

The following applicants received full pardons or conditional pardons in 2001:

Aaron Foreman, convicted of Possession of THC with Intent to Deliver and sentenced on 6/21/91 to two years probation, nine months jail with Huber rights and a fine, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 3-2 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 10, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

John Gonsalves, convicted of Battery to a Police Officer and sentenced on 6/30/75 to eighteen months probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 10, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Kenneth Rucker, convicted of Delivery of Controlled Substance and sentenced on 8/17/81 to three years prison (stayed), four years probation, ten weekends in jail, restitution and costs, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 4-1 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 10, 2001 (Conditional pardon to possess firearms that are discharged from the shoulder), because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

William Grosskreuz, convicted of Theft and Operating a Motor Vehicle without the Owner's Consent and sentenced on 8/18/58 to two years imprisonment on each count (concurrent), recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Paul Karlen convicted of Theft by Fraud, Fraudulent Writing, and Forgery and sentenced on 5/13/91 to four months jail, twelve years probation and restitution, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 4-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

David Krings, convicted of Delivery of a Controlled Substance was sentenced on 1/13/87 to two years probation and restitution, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-1 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Stephanie Taylor, convicted of Public Assistance Fraud and sentenced on 1/6/71 to a fine, recommended by the Governor's

Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 4-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because she is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Gregory Kelly, convicted of Battery and sentenced on 9/9/86 to two years imprisonment, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 3-1 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Jake Lasee, convicted of Possession of Cocaine with Intent to Deliver and sentenced on 9/19/97 to six months imprisonment (five months stayed) and three years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 3-1 to be denied a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001 (effective February 1, 2011 and shall only become effective if there is no subsequent contact with the criminal justice system), because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

William Manthey, convicted of Misconduct in Office and sentenced on 8/18/92 to two years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 2-1 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Bryan Morgan, convicted of Delivery of Marijuana and sentenced on 6/15/87 to three years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Raymond Thomas, convicted of Delivery of Cocaine and sentenced on 3/10/86 to two years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Duane Tracy, Sr., convicted of Breaking and Entering and sentenced on 1/17/62 to no more than eighteen months jail, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 4-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on January 30, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Ralph Goss, convicted of Burglary and sentenced on 4/30/58 to thirty months probation, restitution and suspension of driver's license, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 6-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on June 22, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Jerome Kososki, convicted of Breaking and Entering and theft and sentenced on 8/9/72 to three years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 6-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on June 22, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Thomas Harder, convicted of Burglary and sentenced on 12/4/81 to thirty days jail and two years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on August 23, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Gregory Schmidt, convicted on Burglary and sentenced on 5/11/70 to three years probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be

granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on August 23, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Allan Weyer, convicted on Intentionally Taking and Carrying Away Moveable Property Without Consent and sentenced 7/27/77 to eighteen months probation, recommended by the Governor's Pardon Advisory Board by a vote of 5-0 to be granted a pardon, was granted a pardon on August 23, 2001, because he is a productive member of society and otherwise deserving of extraordinary relief.

Introduction

Section 565.45, Wisconsin Statutes, requires the Department of Revenue to submit a biennial report to the legislature regarding the impact on lottery operations of the 10% expense limitation under s. 25.75(3)(b).

Defining the Expenditure Limitation for Lottery Operations

Section 25.75(3)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, requires that expenses for the operation and administration of the lottery not exceed 10% of gross lottery revenues unless approved by the Joint Committee on Finance under s. 13.10.

Gross lottery revenues include gross revenues from the sale of lottery tickets and lottery shares under ch. 565 and retailer applications fees imposed under s. 565.10(8).

Expenses include:

1. amortization of capital expenditures;

2. payments to vendors under s. 565.25(2)(a) for on-line services and supplies;

3. operating expenses of the Department of Revenue under s. 20.566(2)(r)

Expenses exclude Department of Justice law enforcement expenses appropriated under s. 20.455(2)(r).

On-Line Vendor Fees

Effective June 15, 1997, a five-year contract with GTECH Corporation is in effect to determine on-line vendor fees. Under this contract on-line vendor fees are determined using a fixed base amount with an additional variable component amount that is based on sales.

Lottery General Program Operations

The accompanying chart illustrates administrative expenses, gross lottery revenues and the percentage of expenses of gross lottery revenues for Fiscal Year 1998 through 2001:

<u>Summary</u>

Total administrative expenditures as determined in accordance with Section 25.75(3)(b) in FY00 and FY01 were \$32,410,239 and \$33,579,382 respectively. These amounts represent 7.97% of gross lottery revenues for FY00 and 8.32% of gross lottery revenues for FY01. Amounts for both years are well within the 10% limitation imposed by Section 25.75(3)(b).

In addition, the Board considered changing the payment funding source for the claim of Kenneth C. Ketterer, which was previously approved for payment from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566(1)(a), Stats., on September 21, 2001.

In addition, the Board considered a motion to refer the innocent convict claim (s. 775.05, Stats.) of Frederick Saecker to a hearing examiner.

The Board Finds:

1. Alicia Bowman of West Allis, Wisconsin claims \$156.00 for uninsured medical expenses related to a fall at the UW–Milwaukee Union. The claimant alleges that she approached a stairwell and saw a custodian mopping the landing below. She alleges that there were no "wet floor" or caution signs displayed. She states that she began to descend the stairs and slipped on the third step, falling down the stairwell and injuring her arm. She alleges that after the accident she

noticed drops of water on the steps, as though the custodian had carried a dripping mop down the stairs. She believes that this was what caused her fall. The claimant further states that when she returned to that area later in the day "caution, wet floor" signs had been placed at the top and bottom of the stairwell. The claimant believes that the UW custodian was negligent in not posting caution signs in the area, especially at the top of the stairwell.

The UW states that at the time of the incident, a custodian was mopping the landing between two flights of stairs. The UW alleges that the cart containing the mop bucket, marked with the words "wet floor," was blocking the upper entryway to the stairwell and that another warning sign was posted just below the landing, near the lower stairwell. The UW alleges that the claimant had to move the mop cart out of the way to enter the stairwell. The UW also claims that she was wearing "flip–flop" shoes and carrying a large backpack, which may have contributed to her fall.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$156.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285(1)(h), Stats.

2. Patrick D. Horkan of Prairie du Sac, Wisconsin claims \$1,700.00 for Farmland Preservation Credit for the 1981 tax year. The claimant states that he was not able to get the appropriate form signed in time and that DOR therefore denied his Farmland Preservation Credit. The claimant believes that this money is rightfully his.

Because the tax year involved is so old, DOR records are very limited, however, DOR records do indicate a number of contacts with the claimant regarding this issue. According to the DOR's information, the claimant filed his 1981 income tax return in May 1983. The DOR has no record indicating that the taxpayer ever filed a Schedule FC for his Farmland Preservation Credit. According to the Wisconsin Statutes, a 1981 FPC claim had to be filed by December 31, 1982. The DOR states that even if its records are incorrect and the claimant did file his Schedule FC with his 1981 return, the return was filed past the December 31, 1982, deadline and the claimant would therefore not be entitled to the FPC. According to the Department's records, the claimant has contacted the DOR four times since 1984 requesting an explanation as to why he did not receive the credit. The DOR has responded to each inquiry, explaining the December 31, 1982 deadline.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

3. Willie J. Wilks of Waseca, Minnesota claims \$10,439.19 for return of funds levied from his bank account to satisfy estimated tax assessments for the years 1993 through 1996. The claimant states that he was incarcerated during this period and never received any notices from the DOR. He further states that he did not earn enough money to necessitate filing during most of those years. The claimant states that when he did complete his 1993 through 1996 taxes, he owed no taxes for those years.

The DOR states that the claimant failed to file personal income tax returns for the years 1993 through 1996. Estimated assessments were issued for these years. The DOR states that it requested income tax returns from the claimant based on the fact that DOR records showed that he had received large interest payments indicating a filing obligation. The DOR states that the claimant failed to respond to multiple hearing notices over a four-year period. On November 17, 2000, the department levied the claimant's bank account and collected \$10,439.19 to satisfy the delinquent assessments. The claimant filed the taxes for the years in question in May 2001, with no tax due. The DOR is prohibited from refunding the overpayment by s. 71.75(5), Stats. All notices were sent to the address of the claimant's spouse. This house is owned jointly by the claimant and his wife. The claimant's spouse resides there and has been receiving the claimant's mail. The DOR, however, cannot verify that she actually forwarded the notices to the claimant. The DOR states that if the Claims Board feels this mitigates the circumstances, The DOR would not object to payment of the claim.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$5,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Claims Board appropriation s. 20.505(4)(d), Stats.

4. Pastori M. Balele of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$1,033.00 for return of monies garnished from his pay for costs associated with a court case filed by the claimant against the State of Wisconsin six years ago. The claimant alleges that the court judgment garnishing his wages for court costs was actually a void judgment and that the DOA therefore illegally garnished his wages. The claimant alleges that in–house copying and printing costs are not recoverable under state law and that the court was therefore not authorized to award these costs to the State of Wisconsin. He requests return of the \$1,033 garnished from his wages, plus the court filing fee.

The DOA states that the claimant provides no evidence that the judgment was void beyond his bald assertion to that effect. In Weingerd v. Rinehart, 114 Wis.2d 557 (Ct. of App. 1983), the Court held that a judgment is not void unless the court rendering it lacks subject matter or personal jurisdiction, or a party was denied due process of law. The Court further held that a party could waive any error that would form the basis for relief on a claim that a judgment is void. In Wengerd, failure to take subsequent action on a judgment for three years constituted a waiver. In this instance, the claimant was presented with a detailed bill of costs four and a half years ago. At that time, he had 10 days to file objections to those costs but did not do so. At any time between 1995 and the present, the claimant could have challenged the judgment but did not do so. The DOA believes that the claimant's failure to object, especially as his wages were being garnished more than five years ago, constitutes a waiver at this stage. The DOA believes that the claimant's claim is premature and that this is not the proper venue for him to object to the court judgment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Member Rothschild not participating.] **5. Marquita Phillips** of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims

\$2,158.00 for return of 2000 income tax refund, which was taken to satisfy outstanding estimated assessments for the years 1990–1994. The claimant states that she never received any notice of the assessments. She states that she moved in late August 1996 and did not file a change of address notice with the

Post Office. She was then incarcerated from May 1997 until March 1999 and states she did not receive any notices regarding any tax delinquency during that time. Finally, the claimant points to the fact that she did not have any taxable income during the 1990–1994 period in question and therefore would not have owed any taxes for this period.

The DOR recommends that this claim be denied. DOR records indicate that estimated assessments were issued on June 24, 1996, for failure to file 1990 through 1994 income tax returns. The original assessments were mailed to the claimant and the Department has no record that these statements were returned as undeliverable. The first delinquent tax notice was sent to the claimant in early September 1996. The claimant provided the information necessary to adjust her account on July 25, 2001. Because this information was provided more than two years after the assessment date, the DOR is not able to issue a refund pursuant to s. 71.75(5), Stats.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. *[Members Albers and Rothschild dissenting.]*

6. James A. Mentek, Jr. of Appleton, Minnesota claims \$1,022.23 for costs allegedly related to a lawsuit against the State of Wisconsin. The claimant states that, after erroneous rulings by the Circuit Court and Court of Appeals, his case was reversed by the Wisconsin Supreme Court, which ruled that the state had denied him meaningful judicial review by relying on a statute that was inapplicable to his case. The case was remanded back to the Circuit Court. The claimant states that he attempted to recover his costs associated with the suit but was denied costs by the Clerk of the Supreme Court. The claimant believes that since he won his case, he is entitled to recover the costs associated with bringing his lawsuit. The claimant agrees that there is a long-standing rule that litigants cannot recover costs from the state. However, the claimant states that s. 809.25(4), Stats., provides for costs "against the respondent before the Supreme Court when the judgment of the Court of Appeals is reversed..." The claimant believes that the word "respondent" is all inclusive and does not preclude the state. The claimant believes that the DOJ made unreasonable and unjustified arguments in his case and that he should be awarded his court costs.

The DOJ recommends that this claim be denied. The DOJ states that it is a long-standing rule that litigants are not entitled to recover costs from the state, even when they win and that departure from this rule could prove quite expensive. The DOJ points to the fact that the claimant is an aggressive prison litigator, who has sued the state a dozen times. The DOJ believes that the claimant would need little incentive to increase his pace. The DOJ believes that it made fair legal arguments in the claimant's case and that the reasonableness of the state's argument was supported by the fact that the state won in the Court of Appeals. The fact that the Supreme Court disagreed does not mean that the state's arguments were unreasonable.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. **7. Geoffrey T. Hermsen** of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$354.66 for medical bills related to an injury sustained at the Milwaukee State Office Building. The claimant states that he was approaching the building at 8:00 AM on September 6, 2000, when he slipped on some fresh grass clippings on the sidewalk. He states that he fell against the stairs and dislocated his shoulder. The accident was witnessed by several other people. The claimant requests reimbursement for his ambulance bill and ensuing medical treatment.

The DOA recommends payment of this claim. The DOA notes that there were grass clippings on the sidewalk in the area where the claimant fell and that the grass had been recently mowed. The DOA further notes that the pavement in the area was dry. The DOA believes that the grass clippings left on the walkway may have contributed to the claimant's accident and recommend that he be reimbursed for his medical expenses.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

8. Terri Nielson d/b/a Tech Trak Consulting of Reedsburg, Wisconsin claims \$10,842.00 for damages allegedly related to the termination of a contract with the DOA. The claimant, through her company, entered into a contract with the DOA to provide technical writing services at a rate of \$39 per hour. The claimant states that the term of the contract was July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000, and required the claimant to provide the DOA with up to 2,000 hours of technical writing services for a total of \$78,000. The claimant states that in mid May of 2000 the DOA informed her that the contract would be terminated on May 31, 2000. The claimant alleges that this termination was done without her consent and that she never requested to be relieved of her projects. She claims that she understood the contract as providing her with full-time work for one year and that she would not have entered into the contract had this not been the case.

The DOA recommends that this claim be denied. The DOA contends that, when construing the contract as a whole, it is clear that it was to be open-ended, depending on the need for and quality of the claimant's services. The DOA states that the purchase requisition, which in essence is the contract, followed standard purchasing requirements. The DOA points to the fact that the total cost of the contract is estimated based upon the potential hours at the hourly rate. The DOA states that this was obviously not a final, firm contract amount or it would not have been estimated. Moreover, the DOA states that if the contract had been for a fixed 2,000 hours/\$78,000, the DOA would not have paid the claimant by monthly invoice, as was the case in this instance. The DOA states that the claimant was paid on a monthly basis specifically in order to track the work performed and allow the DOA to review the work and, if necessary, terminate the contract at any time. Finally, the DOA states that the reason for the termination of the contract was the claimant's failure to perform her assignment after approximately 1700 hours of work under the contract. The DOA alleges that the claimant requested to be removed from the web-hosting project to which she was assigned. When notified that she was ceasing work on the project without finishing it, the DOA chose to terminate the claimant's services. The DOA states that the contract did not guarantee that the claimant would receive work for the full 2,000 hours or that she would receive the absolute amount of \$78,000.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. [Member Rothschild not participating.] 9. West Side Garage, Inc. of Berlin, Wisconsin claims \$2,579.34 for lost value of vehicle allegedly related to an error by DOT employees. The claimant received a 1999 pick up truck in trade, which was appraised for \$18,000. The Wisconsin Vehicle Title was not marked salvage. The claimant states that when it attempted to sell the vehicle, it was discovered that the vehicle had been previously titled in Missouri as salvage and that the salvage brand from the MO title was not carried forward to the new WI title issued by the DOT. The claimant has since sold the vehicle, and claims a loss of \$2,579.34.

The DOT recommends payment of this claim in the amount of \$2,579.34. After conducting an investigation of the claim, the DOT does find negligence on the part of its employee, Nancy Davis, for not carrying forward the Missouri salvage brand and instead issuing a clean Wisconsin title.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$2,579.34 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation s. 20.395(5)(cq), Stats.

10.James Cape & Sons, Inc. of Racine, Wisconsin claims \$1,483,781.60 for additional construction costs allegedly incurred on a DOT construction project. The claimant alleges that, after they began construction work, the DOT notified them that the DOT would not allow the claimant to use excavated material for trench backfill. The claimant alleges that this is contrary to their interpretation of the contract, which they claim does allow for use of excavated material as backfill. The claimant also alleges that the DOT failed to provide them with access to the right of way, as provided for in the contract, thereby causing a delay in the project. The claimant alleges that the DOT failed to ensure that existing power lines and railroad tracks were relocated so as to avoid any interference with the project, and that the claimant incurred additional costs as a result of the delays.

The DOT requests that this claim be denied. The DOT states that the contract specifications require that trenches be backfilled with granular backfill. The DOT states that the claimant is an experienced state contractor and was well aware that the state always requires the use of granular backfill in such situations. The DOT alleges that specific conversations with the claimant indicate that they were aware that they would need to use granular backfill in the project. The DOT also alleges that at a meeting in April 1995, an employee of the claimant specifically admitted that he bid the project as using granular backfill. The DOT states that the claimant did have access to the right of way and that the contract did not require the DOT to ensure that the existing power lines and railroad tracks be relocated so as to avoid interference with the progress of the project. The DOT states that the contract advised the claimant to contact utilities and required the claimant to utilize applicable and safe construction methods when working around utility lines.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Michael & Mary Brown of Brookfield, Wisconsin claim \$88.12 for damage to tire allegedly caused by negligence of the DOT. The claimant states that at 10:30 PM on December 8, 2000, he was driving through a construction zone on Greenfield Avenue in Waukesha County. He states that there was a pole–style lane divider bent into his lane, which he had to swerve to avoid and that when he swerved, he hit a large pothole and damaged his tire and rim. The claimant states that he contacted the road contractor in charge of the project and was told that they would not pay the bill. He requests reimbursement for his tire damage.

The DOT recommends that this claim be denied. The DOT states that the area in which the accident occurred was at that time in a construction zone. The DOT states that all state construction contracts have a hold harmless agreement, which says that the contract will indemnify and save harmless the state from all claims brought because of damages received by any person on account of any act, omission, neglect or misconduct of the contractor. Therefore, the DOT believes that any responsibility to address claims of negligence resulting in damage rests with Zignego, Inc., the prime contractor on this project. The DOT finds no negligence on the part of any state employee.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes that the claimants' remedy rests with the contractor, Zignego, Inc.

12. Bryce Garrett of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$157.80 for court costs incurred by the claimant. The claimant, an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution, alleges that the DOC wrongly charged him with a violation of Wisconsin Administrative Code. The claimant appealed the discipline imposed on him, and filed a Writ of Certiorari in Dane County Circuit Court. The claimant states that Dane County Circuit Court reversed the decision of the DOC to discipline the claimant and ordered that the discipline be expunged from his correctional file. The claimant requests reimbursement for his court filing fee and the sheriff's fee to serve papers on the DOC. The claimant states that he will file two more lawsuits if the Claims Board does not pay this claim. He claims that the typical inmate lawsuit costs the state \$4,100 and believes that the board should pay the claim rather than have the state incur \$8,200 in lawsuit costs.

The DOC requests that this claim be denied. The claimant filed a motion for costs under s. 814.245(3), Wis. Stats., which the court denied, finding that the DOC was substantially justified in its position and that the claimant was therefore not entitled to costs. In addition, the DOC states that the claimant failed to serve the motion for costs on the assistant attorney general who represented the DOC in these matters. The DOC believes there is no legal basis to grant this claim. The claimant has not presented any reason why the Claims Board should ignore the circuit court decision or s. 814.25, Stats.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Reconsideration of funding source for payment of claim of Kenneth C. Ketterer against the Department of Revenue. On September 21, 2001, the Claims Board decided to pay the claim of Kenneth C. Ketterer against the Department of Revenue in the amount of \$4,221.92. The Board further indicated that this payment should be made from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566(1)(a), Stats. The Department of Revenue has requested that the Board reconsider their decision to pay the claim from DOR funds and instead consider paying the claim from the Claims Board appropriation s. 20.505(4)(d), Stats.

After reconsideration of the funding source for payment of the claim, the board declines to change its previous decision to pay the claim from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566(1)(a), Stats.

Consideration of motion to refer innocent convict claim of Frederick Saecker to a hearing examiner. Frederick Saecker has filed an innocent convict claim under s. 775.05, Stats., with the Claims Board. Claims Board Chairperson, Alan Lee, has made a motion that the claim should be heard by a hearing examiner designated by the board, rather than by the entire Claims Board. The hearing examiner would conduct the hearing for the claim and would submit a proposed Findings of Fact and Decision to the Claims Board for their approval.

After consideration of the issue, the Board concludes that the claim of Frederick Saecker should be considered by a designated hearing examiner, who will then submit to the Board a proposed Findings of Fact and Decision for their approval.

Attached to this letter is the EdVest College Savings Program Annual Report for the 2000-2001 Fiscal Year. Legislation for the EdVest program requires the Office of the State Treasurer to annually report to the Governor and the Legislature on the program. This fourth annual report includes summaries of the required actuarial valuation, prepared by Milliman & Robertson, Inc. and a program audit prepared by the PriceWaterhouseCoopers, LLP as well as discussions of the key developments in the program over the past fiscal year.

The most significant event of the year for the program involved the implementation of state legislation designed specifically to give EdVest new authority to take advantage of benefits and flexibility currently allowed under federal law. The legislation provided broader eligibility and coverage for the program, created a new state tax deduction for parents, expanded the number of investment options, eliminated the residency requirement and established protection of eligibility for state financial aid. It directed the state to contract with a private firm to assist with the new program. At the conclusion of a national search, Strong Capital Management of Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin was selected as the EdVest program manager. A second partnership was developed with American Express, which offers a slightly reconfigured "tomorrow's scholar" version of the program through its financial advisors nationwide. After a period of intense planning and development, as well as passage of state legislation to formally provide the trust fund structure necessary for operation [2001 Wisconsin Act 7] the EdVest program was relaunched in May, 2001.

These program improvements were an immediate success with the public, proving that we are now meeting the college savings needs of families nationwide. By the close of the fiscal year on June 30, there were 5,337 EdVest accounts and assets under management totaled \$21.5 million. For your information, the program has continued to grow dramatically and as we are near the end of the calendar year we have over 45,000 accounts and \$230 million under management.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 37

Relating to the Creation of the Governor's Task Force on Jails and Community Corrections

WHEREAS, holding probation and parole violators accountable for their disruptive behavior enhances the safety of communities throughout Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Sheriffs and the Wisconsin Department of Corrections must work together to maximize the efficiencies of community corrections; and

WHEREAS, through a cooperative effort, Wisconsin Sheriffs, the Department of Corrections and the residents of Wisconsin can realize the benefits of more efficiency in conducting community corrections;

NOW, THEREFORE, I SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

- 1. Create the Governor's Task Force on Jails and Community Corrections (hereinafter "Task Force") and shall consist of twelve (12) members appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 2. Provide that the Governor shall designate one (1) member of the Task Force as chair to serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 3. Provide that the Task Force shall have the following mission:
 - a. Study the current policies and procedures related to probation and parole holds; and
 - b. Seek means of efficiency in community corrections for Wisconsin Counties and the Wisconsin Department of Corrections; and
 - c. Generate solutions and the necessary means of implementation;
- 4. Require the Task Force to draft a final report due to the Governor by January 10, 2003; and
- 5. Direct the Department of Administration to provide the Task Force with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with Section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and
- 6. Provide that the Task Force shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor;

The committee to await upon the Governor appeared with his excellency the Governor, who delivered his budget reform message as follows:

BUDGET REFORM ADDRESS

Citizens, colleagues and friends. Mr. Speaker, Mr. President and distinguished members of the Legislature, thank you for hosting this joint session.

Before I get to the matter at hand, I want give special thanks to my wife, First Lady Laurie McCallum, for her support and understanding during these demanding times;

To Margaret Farrow, a good friend and a great lieutenant governor;

And to the members of my Cabinet, whose leadership and resolve will be evident to all in the coming weeks as they have been to me over this past year.

I come before you today to talk about our economic future, and to lay the foundation for a bold and unprecedented initiative that reforms and reshapes the roles of state and local government.

Our immediate task is solving a 1.1 billion–dollar shortfall – a shortfall brought on by the national recession and the resulting downturn in the Wisconsin economy.

While it is of little consolation, at least 40 states won' t meet their budget estimates this year. Legislatures across the country have been forced to react to recession and domestic security developments.

In August, when I signed the bipartisan budget that now must be adjusted, Wisconsin's economy was showing signs of rebounding, especially the manufacturing sector. But the cowardly acts of terrorists on September 11 forestalled any realistic chance for recovery at the end of the year.

I have been talking and listening with people all across Wisconsin since Sept. 11. People are concerned about their future, and some are more than a little pessimistic about Madison's ability to fix this problem. This should not be the case.

I relate this sentiment because I believe our mission in this special session goes beyond the act of balancing a budget. Our decisions will not be about now – but about shaping a better tomorrow for the hard–working families of this state.

That's why my plan that you will soon have before you is called the "Budget Reform Act of 2002." This debate is not just about a budget.... It is about the great people who make up the great state of Wisconsin.

People know government has a role in their lives, but too often they view government as too unmanageable, too ineffective, too costly, and above all, too unaccountable.

My Budget Reform Act is about making government less costly, more manageable, more effective and more accountable.

Seldom have the stakes been higher for Wisconsin. What we say and do in the coming weeks will have a direct impact on the lives of hard–working Wisconsinites... from the teacher in La Crosse to the factory worker in Milwaukee... from the logger in Hayward to the nurse in Racine...the waitress in the Fox Valley, the poultry farmer in Barron... to the auto worker in Janesville.

Our decisions will have a direct impact on the millions of everyday Wisconsinites who have a simple wish of a financially secure future for their children.

No one pretends the road ahead will be smooth. These are hard choices, to be sure. But our path is clear. Just as thousands of Wisconsin families are adjusting their personal budgets, state and local governments must follow suit and begin to live within their means.

It is important that everyone understands how we spend the hard–earned dollars of the hard–working men and women of Wisconsin – the taxpayers.

Wisconsin ranks 6th among states in the amount of aid provided to local government. This accounts for over 60 percent of spending ... AND is a major reason Wisconsin taxes are higher than in other states.

Sixteen percent goes to financial assistance for individuals in programs such as Medical Assistance, Wisconsin Works, and student aid.

The University of Wisconsin System's share is 9 percent, Corrections is 8 percent and the remaining state government operations are 7 percent.

This Budget Reform Act refocuses how we spend the taxpayers' money. My solution reflects the core values of every Wisconsin citizens:

I won't raise taxes. Taxes already are too high.

I will prioritize spending.... My family and your family have to live within a budget... so should government.

I have 3 kids, and I want to ensure that my children get the best education in the country... that's why education is one of our highest priorities....

Growing up in Fond du Lac, my dad was a factory worker and later a letter carrier, and my mom worked as a store clerk and a bank teller. My parents taught me the importance of being compassionate to our neighbors who might not be as fortunate as you and me, and that's why my plan protects the neediest of the needy.

I want to Build Wisconsin and provide citizens with good jobs. I want my children and your children to have a good job, too.

And I want to keep us safe.

These are values that I cherish, and these principles should be our guiding light in the days and weeks ahead. Let me start by telling every citizen in Wisconsin what is NOT in my Budget Reform Act. There will be no tax increase.

No sales tax increase.

No income tax increase.

No property tax increase.

No corporate tax increase.

No tax increase, period!

I will do everything to protect the taxpayer from the Big Spenders who mistakenly think they can spend without limit ... the hard–earned dollars of hard–working Wisconsinites.

Wisconsin's future is bright and full of opportunity and promise. The hopes and dreams of all Wisconsin will not be rained on. Wisconsin will NOT become the Number One tax state in the country.... NOT on my watch.

In this time of economic crisis, we will not increase taxes to feed spending habits. It is time all of government in Wisconsin ... all of government in Wisconsin ... begins to live within its means.

That's exactly what my Budget Reform Act does. I have set priorities. I will call for reform. And I will do this with a balanced plan that I lay before you today. There are substantial cuts to government spending. But there also are a number of essential services that I am declaring off-limits from any spending reduction. My priorities are clear:

I will fully fund elementary and secondary education.

I will fully fund smaller class sizes, school breakfast and special education.

I will fully fund our new senior care program to help seniors with prescription drugs.

I will fully fund medical assistance. BadgerCare. FamilyCare. community aids.. and many other programs that directly serve our neediest citizens.

Wisconsinites understand that their future is in the hearts and minds of our children, and that's why I will maintain full state support for schools. We will continue to fully fund two-thirds of local school instruction.

Wisconsinites are quick to lend a helping hand to the neediest of the needy. That's why I have exempted direct assistance to our most vulnerable citizens. This is exactly the wrong time to reduce funding to programs that provide a safety net for people who can't help themselves.

In response to the tragic events of Sept. 11, I will continue to work aggressively to keep citizens safe. My Budget Reform Act contains a domestic security initiative that will strengthen the state's readiness on many different fronts, including grants to local police and fire departments for equipment and training, and money for the creation of a statewide trauma system that links the front–line personnel with doctors and medical specialists.

September 11th changed our lives in countless ways. among the most important lessons we have learned are how we sometimes take for granted the service of our public safety officials. When we talk about domestic security, these men and women serve on the front line.

One of the keys to building a stronger economy in Wisconsin is to increase the skill level of Wisconsin's work force. My Budget Reform Act helps displaced workers and protects ongoing economic development. I urge this Legislature to act quickly on an important plan that I outlined earlier this month, an emergency 8–week extension of benefits for unemployed workers.

In these challenging times, government spending must be reduced in the most fair manner possible.

Here's how I will do that.

State government operations will absorb the largest share of the belt–tightening with an 11.5 percent reduction in spending. Incidentally, the Governor's Office budget is reduced 16.5 percent.

The Budget Reform Act reduces the Department of Corrections budget by 6 percent. This was a difficult decision, and the cuts are deep. But I stress that we will continue to keep Wisconsin safe from the criminals who want to ruin our quality of life.

New institutions that were authorized in the budget must be delayed. While elimination of out–of–state contract beds remains a priority, eliminating the budget deficit must come first.

The Budget Reform Act also will reduce the University of Wisconsin and Technical College System budgets by 4.5 percent each. I don't want these reductions passed on to students, so tuition increases above the already–approved 10 percent level must be passed by the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee.

The final component is a 4 percent reduction to local government budgets in calendar year 2002.

These are tough decisions, but they ARE manageable, and more importantly, the right thing to do. When implemented, they will set the stage for an even greater and more vibrant Wisconsin.

My plan does contain a warning, however. Because we are reigning in spending, you are going to hear a new kind of defeatism from the Big Spenders who believe government spending can only go up, never down.

Have you heard the term "Buyer, Beware?" I offer a slightly different twist: "Taxpayer, Beware!" the spenders will make claims of big property tax increases and the elimination of vital services.

But don't be fooled by their rhetoric. Don't let the defeatists defeat you.

When you hear the complaints of Big Spenders, realize that my Budget Reform Act places strict property tax limits on local governments. Spending reductions will not mean property tax increases. Let me repeat, because this is critical: my Budget Reform Act places strict property tax limits on local governments. Spending reductions will not mean property tax increases.

And let me say this to the Big Spenders: If you can't live without a property tax increase, take your case directly to the taxpayers with a referendum. Let the working people decide.

When you hear the complaints of Big Spenders, recognize that I am not asking local government to do anything different than what state government is expected to do – and what families and businesses have been doing for months: Live within their means.

State government operations budgets are being reduced 11.5 percent, and we will continue to deliver essential services. Local government budgets are being reduced only a third of what state government is absorbing... they should not have to stop essential services like fire and police protection and garbage collection. To the contrary. My Budget Reform Act includes language that directs local governments to protect the health and safety of our citizens.

Every taxpayer fully expects local government to handle these reductions responsibly and continue to provide essential services.

The Budget Reform Act balances the budget for this biennium, but I will not stop there. The budget shortfall allows us to look at costly decisions that we can no longer afford. We must learn from this, or we will be right back in a financial predicament next year. So today, I am forwarding to you a bold plan that completely restructures the state and local financial partnership... a plan that forces a major examination of how local governments are funded, organized and provide services.

Here's what I'm talking about.

Within a 10-mile radius of downtown Appleton, there are over 50 units of government – including 3 counties... 4 cities... 5 villages... 8 school districts... 16 towns... and 19 sanitary districts.

Who do you suppose is paying for all this? The hard–working families of Appleton are footing this bill for this overlap.

The Kettl Commission set the stage for changing the state and local government relationship, but many circumstances prevented the Commission report from being adopted. The greatest barrier to the Kettl Commission recommendations was lack of urgency. We just didn't have to do it. We could afford to do everything. We could afford more government. We could afford to be the third–highest tax state. We could afford to have too much government.

Well, fellow Wisconsinites, we can't afford it anymore.

My Budget Reform Act takes Kettl from debate to ACTION by recommending that we:

 \varnothing Phase out the current shared revenue program over the next three years

 \varnothing Borrow \$794 million from tobacco endowment revenues as a bridge only to replace a portion of shared revenue in the transition period

\varnothing develop A REPAYMENT SCHEDULE FOR THE ENDOWMENT

 \varnothing Establish within my Administration a mandate appeals process for local governments

 \varnothing Create a Blue Ribbon Commission on local government finances to review local government spending, delivery of services, state mandates and local revenue sources.

The goal of the commission is accountability, efficiency and the best return for the taxpayers' dollar.

Proceeds from the sale of tobacco revenue bonds provide a unique opportunity to help in the transition to a new relationship between local government and the citizens they serve.

The spenders will say there is no support for cutting local government. If that is your argument, then I ask: Is there

support for breaking promises to our schools that will result in larger class sizes and reduced services for special education?

Is there support for turning our backs on your most vulnerable neighbors – the elderly, the disabled and the poor who covet dignity and independence?

Is there support in your community for increasing taxes to feed a government that spends too much as it is?

While funds are short, I realize there will not be a shortage of critics of my Budget Reform Act. I welcome the discussion, but I also say this to the Big Spenders who want to spend more money: Tell me specifically where you will get that money. A critic without a solution is of no value in this debate.

My Budget Reform Act is the right thing to do. My Budget Reform Act is fiscally responsible, and more importantly, it is right for Wisconsin.

This is a pivotal time in Wisconsin's fiscal history, and I urge this Legislature to act quickly and without hesitation for the future of Wisconsin's families. There is much work to be done.

Join me in being creative, determined and unafraid to face the critics. Join me in answering the critics who say it can't be done. Join me in protecting the taxpayers, not the Big Spenders.

The people we represent are ready to chart a new course. They want a government that serves them well – not a government that obstructs common–sense solutions.

They want a government that will validate their trust, not engage in petty politics and spread distrust.

I will meet this great challenge.... I will reach beyond the commonplace and not fall short for lack of courage.

Working together, we will reduce government spending at every level and begin living within our mean....

We will bring the most sweeping, fundamental reforms in our government structure since Wisconsin became a state...

And we will do this WITHOUT RAISING TAXES!

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau

The Honorable, The Legislature:

As requested in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 and directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the activities and expenditures of Wisconsin's regional hazardous materials (hazmat) response teams. This evaluation was undertaken and largely completed before the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. In light of nationwide

concerns about terrorist activity involving weapons of mass destruction, including biological or chemical agents, we have issued a separate letter to the Committee outlining the role of hazmat teams in responding to terrorist threats and the availability of federal funding to enhance state and local preparedness.

Wisconsin has a well-established response network of eight regional hazmat teams that are jointly funded by the State and by local fire departments. These teams are trained and equipped to respond to incidents requiring the highest level of skin and respiratory protection. Wisconsin's statewide response coverage, ongoing training of hazmat personnel, and established response protocols and procedures provide a solid base for current efforts to develop and implement additional plans to respond to potential terrorist threats from chemical or biological agents.

In fiscal year 2000-01, the State, through the Department of Military Affairs, provided \$1.4 million in general purpose revenue to the regional hazmat teams. Wisconsin's hazmat expenditures have been significantly higher than those of other states. The Legislature may wish to review the roles of the hazmat teams and methods of allocating funds among them, as well as the possibility of developing alternative funding sources for their activities.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the eight regional response teams and the Department of Military Affairs. The Department's response is Appendix 4.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #39

Relating to the Creation of the Governor's Task Force on Small Business Regulatory Reform

WHEREAS, small business is Wisconsin's largest employer and greatest generator of jobs; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's 100,000 small businesses are a key sector of Wisconsin's economy, providing more than 1.2 million jobs and \$21 billion in payroll income; and

WHEREAS, 96 percent of Wisconsin businesses employ fewer than 100 employees; and

WHEREAS, regulations can be disproportionately burdensome to small businesses which have limited resources to meet the high costs of compliance in comparison to larger businesses;

NOW, THEREFORE, I SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

1. Create the Governor's Task Force on Small Business Regulatory Reform (hereinafter "Task Force") consisting of twelve (12) members appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and

2. Provide that the Governor shall designate two (2) members of the Task Force as Co–chairs to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and

3. Provide that the Task Force shall have the following mission:

a. Examine the existing statutory provisions, administrative rules and other state policies related to the regulatory process and recommend actions or legislative changes needed to ensure efficient and cost effective regulations; and

b.Assure smaller businesses achieve regulatory compliance without unnecessary expense or inconvenience; and

c. Review ways to reduce the negative impact of state rules and regulations on small businesses; and

4. Require state agencies to analyze the impact of their regulatory actions on small entities and determine if a rule will have a significant economic impact on a substantial level of small businesses; and

5. Direct the Department of Commerce to provide staff support to the Task Force; and

6. Direct the Department of Administration to provide the Task Force with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with Section 20.505(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

7. Provide that the Task Force issue a report to the Governor within one year of the first meeting date; and 8. Provide that the Task Force shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of December 2001.

On December 3, 2001 the <u>General Fund</u> balance was -\$26.8 million. This shortfall continued until December 14, 2001

when the balance reached a positive \$43.1 million. During this period, the <u>General Fund</u> balance reached a low of -\$60.4 million on December 13, 2001. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 10, 2001 the <u>Agricultural Producer Security</u> <u>Fund</u> balance was -\$109 thousand. This shortfall continued through December 31, 2001 when the balance reached -\$122 thousand. The shortfall was due to the initial start-up of the fund and a delay in the transfer of revenues into the fund. The negative fund cash balance has been resolved in January 2002.

The General Fund and Agricultural Producer Security Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the Forestry Account, which supports forestry and other activities in the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and eight other state agencies. In fiscal year (FY) 2000-01, revenues deposited to this account totaled \$69.0 million. Over 80 percent of these revenues were generated by a statewide forestry mill tax of \$0.20 per \$1,000 of property value, which is imposed on all owners of taxable property. The forestry mill tax is the only property tax levied by the state.

Revenues from the forestry Account support a variety of activities designed to protect and enhance the 16.0 million acres of private and public forestland in Wisconsin. Most Forestry Account expenditures are for forestry activities such as forest fire protection and control and assisting with management of county forests. However, a substantial amount of Forestry Account expenditures also fund DNR administrative costs. In FY 2000-01, \$18.7 million was spent for administration, representing 27.8 percent of DNR's Forestry Account expenditures. This total included \$6.5 million in administrative costs for forestry activities, which was charged directly to the Forestry Account and \$12.2 million in department-wide administration and support services costs. DNR expenditures from the forestry Account supported a total of 644.1 full-time equivalent DNR employees, of which 449.7 worked directly in support of forestry activities. We note \$4.5 million in Forestry Account expenditures by DNR and other state agencies supported programs that had no direct relationship to forestry.

The Managed Forest Law program provides property tax relief to owners of forestland in exchange for commitments to implement sound forestry practices on their land. The program has grown rapidly: applications increased from 1,831 in 1997 to 3,251 in 2001, or by 77.6 percent. As a result of Managed Forest Law program growth, DNR staff have not been able to address their ongoing management responsibilities and, as of August 2, 2001, over 12,000 practices related to sound forest management on 187,165 acres had not been completed in the years specified by the forestry management plans. The increasing number of program participants has also increased DNR's workload. In 2001, the Legislature authorized 23.0 additional full-time equivalent positions to address ongoing workload concerns.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Natural Resources. The Department's response is Appendix 4.

We have completed a review of the activities of the Technology for Educational Achievement in Wisconsin (TEACH) Board, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. In fiscal year (FY) 2000-01, the TEACH Board spent \$61.3 million, including \$44.4 million in general purpose revenue, on programs to invest in educational technology equipment and to train teachers and others in the use of educational technology.

The TEACH Board is following its statutory mandate to support the development of educational technology in Wisconsin. TEACH Board programs are strongly supported by K-12 school districts and other educational agencies, and the TEACH Board has provided a significant amount of funding since its creation in the 1997-1999 biennial budget. Despite TEACH Board efforts to increase reporting, limited information is available on how funds have been used and on program effectiveness, We have included a number of questions the Legislature may wish to address as it considers reporting requirements for K-12 school districts, the effect of new technology on TEACH Board programs, and the level of support to be provided for the programs in the future.

We appreciate the cooperation and courtesy extended to us by TEACH Board management and staff. The response of the TEACH Board's Executive Director is Appendix 4.

In 1997 Act 27, the 97-99 Biennial Budget, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. DHFS and (for certain child care providers) counties and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to the Department, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Section 48.685(5g) and 50.065(5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct the Department to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. Attached is the report for 2001.

The President of the Senate in the Chair.

The committee to await upon the Governor appeared with his excellency the Governor, who delivered his state of the state message as follows:

STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

Citizens, colleagues, guests and friends. Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, distinguished members of the Legislature, members of the Supreme Court, constitutional officers, cabinet members, Lieutenant Governor Farrow, First Lady Laurie McCallum, and family.

In keeping with time-honored tradition, I come before you tonight to report on the state of the state. I am pleased to report that the state of our state reflects the will of our people... and like the state of our state.... Our will is strong.

Our fellow citizens are looking to the future with courage, confidence and hope..... And I am optimistic that what we do in the coming year will move Wisconsin toward an even brighter tomorrow.

There is energy and optimism throughout the land, and as elected representatives of the people, we must recognize that our citizens feel the winds of change. The people I have talked to the past year across Wisconsin do not fear change or reform. In fact, they expect it and accept it.

From welfare reform to extended unemployment benefits to SeniorCare, Wisconsin has embraced a tradition of change.

Tonight, I also want to talk with you about what we can do together – not as Republicans and Democrats, or state and locals, or rural and urban–dwellers, but as Wisconsinites – to build a better future for our children and ourselves.

As we gather in this historic chamber, it is time to put differences behind and embrace a new spirit of partnership between state and local government and between local governments.

The past six weeks have been tumultuous. There are not easy answers or quick fixes as we put our fiscal house in order. But I believe now is the time to forge a new relationship between all units of Wisconsin government... a relationship based on mutual respect... on collaboration.... And on the principle that by working toward a common goal, we can renew our state's spirit and health.

So, tonight I extend my hand in the spirit of friendship and cooperation to begin this important journey. Working together toward a common purpose, we can achieve the oldest hopes of our ancestors — caring and safe communities, loving families and prosperity for all.

I am optimistic about the future because during the past year, I witnessed over and over the true Wisconsin spirit... a spirit driven by goodness and compassion.

Let us now pause to reflect on a moment in time that will remain etched in our collective memories.

The Senate reconvened. Senator Risser in the chair.

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE [March 5, 2002]

On a Tuesday morning last September, we awoke to a beautiful, crisp Wisconsin day. Our thoughts were on the Packers' recent win over Detroit... on the upcoming day..... And we awoke to the sounds of our children scrambling down the stairs, still excited about the start of a new school year.

Our peace and tranquility were shattered when we saw on television the images of horror and anguish. The sounds... the pictures of destruction... the terror and the suffering that were immediately and forever seared into our memory.

Since that day, we have lived in an age tarnished by the evil of a few... and yet invigorated by the goodness of so many.

Within hours of the attack, we saw the true spirit of America and the true Wisconsin spirit.

We saw members of the Wisconsin National Guard, specially trained to respond to any threat, join ranks with state and local law enforcement officers to quickly begin keeping us safe.

We saw firefighters from Wisconsin travel to Ground Zero in New York City to lend a helping hand in the rescue and recovery efforts among the crumpled steel of the twin towers.

We saw people in every walk of life, in every city and every town in Wisconsin, attend prayer services, pitch in with bake sales and roll up their sleeves to donate blood.

We saw local government doing its part in the war against terrorism by taking immediate action as our "first responders." To all who displayed the strong leadership and steady hand to keep Wisconsin safe during that time, I speak on behalf of all Wisconsin in extending to each of you a heart–felt "thank you!"

Tonight, on the 165th anniversary of the Wisconsin National Guard, 833 members of the Wisconsin Army and Air National Guard are on active duty in Wisconsin, in the continental United States and around the world.

They are part of our response to September 11th and the Department of Military Affairs' continuing, long-term involvement across three fronts — protecting Wisconsin's security, homeland defense, and fighting international terrorism.

I would like you to meet some of the fine men and women representing Wisconsin in our war against terrorism. They show the diversity of activities in our common defense. They are mothers and fathers, brothers and sisters. Please hold your applause until after I've introduced them:

Lt. Col. Tim O'Brien is an F–16 pilot and is the fighter squadron commander of the 115th Fighter Wing of Madison.

Tech. Sgt. Tony White is a KC–135 boom operator with the 128th Air Refueling Wing of Milwaukee who has flown missions both overseas and here in the United States since Sept. 11.

Master Sgt. Tina Christenson is a radio communications specialist with the 128th Air Control Squadron from Volk Field who helped protect the skies over Chicago for more than three months.

Sgt. First Class Joseph Chapa has been on duty at Milwaukee's Mitchell International Airport as a member of Task Force Noble Badger. He represents the units assigned to airport security.

And Chief Warrant Officer Dave Molitor is the 829th Engineer Detachment commander. Twelve soldiers from this detachment, located in Richland Center, were ordered to active duty in November and deployed to "an undisclosed location" in central Asia. They are now located in Kandahar.

Ladies and gentlemen, please join me in showing our appreciation for these brave men and women.

All of America and all of Wisconsin have been tested and challenged over the past 13 months in many ways.

Seventeen counties in western Wisconsin were tested by floodwaters of the mighty Mississippi a year ago... and destructive tornadoes tested our resolve in western and northern Wisconsin.

We were tested by terrorism and a faltering national economy that took its toll on Wisconsin and 44 other states, causing budget shortfalls and forcing a serious re–examination of our spending habits at every level of government.

But with each test, and at every turn, we witnessed the Wisconsin character at work. We saw Wisconsinites react to adversity with optimism and determination to overcome every challenge so that Wisconsin can be a better place to live and raise a family.

There are countless examples of where the Wisconsin character prevailed the past year, including many where the stage extended beyond our borders.

Just a few weeks ago, the entire world watched in wonder as our very own homegrown Casey FitzRandolph of Verona and Chris Witty of West Allis competed in the Salt Lake City Olympic games. Of course, we all know that Casey and Chris were golden.

Both Casey and Chris are competing in Europe and can't join us tonight, but that won't stop us from celebrating their success of what it took to win gold.

Jeff and Ruthie FitzRandolph have spent thousands of hours molding their son's character and work ethic. As a parent and coach myself of three very athletic and active children, I know the difficulties of balancing work with the demands of instilling in your child a competitive spirit that they will carry with them in life.

There are many sacrifices that Jeff and Ruthie have made to help Casey along his path to Olympic glory, and tonight we pay homage to their dedication and their commitment. Ladies and gentlemen, it is my distinct pleasure to recognize tonight Jeff and Ruthie FitzRandolph.

There is another individual with us in the chamber who knows a thing or two about adversity. This was supposed to be a "rebuilding" year for Badger basketball – we had a new coach with a new system, a group of young players and one of the toughest schedules in the country.

But with each game, the Wisconsin character emerged. We watched the new coach and the determined players react to adversity with confidence and conviction to overcome every challenge thrown their way.

The result is Wisconsin's first big ten title since 1947! The Badgers also became the first UW team since 1941 to beat every conference team in the same season. The coach, Bo Ryan, is the winningest first–year coach in Wisconsin history with 18 wins and only the seventh coach in Big Ten history to win the conference championship in his first year.

And just today, Bo was named Big Ten coach of the year. Ladies and gentlemen, Bo Ryan. I also want to recognize Marquette basketball coach Tom Crean for the great job he has done this year... coach Crean is in Cincinnati tonight and couldn't join us, but he deserves our thanks for a job well done.

We accomplished much under this dome last year, primarily by putting political differences aside and working together for the common good. Let me take a moment to highlight a few of these accomplishments:

I was pleased to have been able to bring together key legislators, the business community, sportsmen, sportswomen and environmental groups to craft a consensus and pass a law to protect our wetlands and our environment. It is the first of its kind in the nation. Two individuals who played key roles were Republican Representative Neal Kedzie of Elkhorn and Democrat Senator Jim Baumgart of Sheboygan.

Working in a spirit of bipartisanship with A.A.R.P., the Coalition of Wisconsin Aging Groups and countless Democrats and Republicans, we passed a prescription drug benefit program for nearly 300,000 Wisconsin seniors that will serve as a national model in senior health care.

Last year, I introduced a fiscally sound, balanced and realistic budget for the state, which kept spending increases to the lowest level in more than 30 years, held the line on taxes, and protected our core priorities of education and helping the state's neediest citizens. These principles paved the way for a bipartisan budget agreement in August.

I want to acknowledge Republican Assembly Speaker Scott Jensen of Waukesha and Democrat Majority Leader Chuck Chvala of Madison.

I also want to acknowledge the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee – Republican Representative John Gard of Peshtigo and Democrat Senator Brian Burke of Milwaukee – and thank them for getting the budget passed in the shortest time in more than six years.

And earlier this year, Wisconsin became the first state in the country to provide extended benefits to unemployed and displaced workers.

There were other accomplishments, as well.

We have taken huge strides in our relationship with the state's tribal governments. I would like to acknowledge the tribal chairmen with us tonight.

We have continued to move people from welfare to work. Just last week I joined President Bush and Secretary Tommy Thompson in announcing a welfare reform agenda that will help more welfare recipients achieve independence through work, protect children and strengthen families.

We invested in smaller class sizes Because smaller class sizes have proven to be an effective learning environment for children. Thanks to the efforts of this Legislature, SAGE will allow more than 500 schools to reduce class sizes in grades K through 3.

We have provided our youngest children with every opportunity to reach their full potential by investing in 4-year-old kindergarten.

We are taking the necessary action to make Milwaukee the jewel of Wisconsin, and are taking steps to make southeast Wisconsin a world–class economic powerhouse.

When we build Milwaukee and southeast Wisconsin, we build all of Wisconsin. That's why we must improve the Menomonee Valley, through the redevelopment of Canal Street.

We will be helping revitalize downtown Milwaukee.

The Marquette Interchange is the heart of Wisconsin's transportation system, and we have finalized plans for the largest capital project in our state's history.

State Fair Park is becoming self–sufficient and a year–round attraction, thanks to the steps I've taken.

UW–Milwaukee is becoming a first–class institution nationally, with the help of our budget.

And the consortium of five universities through the new TechStar program will combine academics and business to create economic growth.

Working together in a bipartisan fashion, legislative members of the Building Commission were influential in getting the first Biostar project approved, a project that keeps UW–Madison at the forefront of biotechnology. I applaud Senators Risser, Meyer and Roessler, and Representatives Hoven, Vrakas and Plale.

Wisconsin taxpayers saved \$62.9 million through the aggressive use of my veto pen – the highest veto amount ever for a biennial budget signed into law.

I unveiled a comprehensive energy package that serves the economic interests of the state and preserves our resources and environment.

In the aftermath of 9–11, statewide price gouging at gas stations was stopped after I personally directed investigators to identify known offenders immediately.

A few weeks after the cowardly attacks on America, I established an anti-terrorism task force to address current and future terrorism issues in Wisconsin.

And all of us did our part throughout the year to ensure that the Packers returned to the NFL playoffs after a short – but painful – absence. And while they didn't go all the way, it sure was a fun ride.... And the Pack will be back!

That is a list of accomplishments of which we can all be proud And the best is yet to come.

In my inaugural address last year I introduced the principles that would guide me as your governor – holding the line on government spending, no tax increases, improving education, building wisconsin through economic development and job creation, and assisting our seniors and the neediest of the needy.

The executive budget I sent to you last year also reflected these principles, and they are the foundation of my budget reform act, which I unveiled Jan. 22.

I believe so strongly that these principles reflect the core values of all Wisconsinites that I state them again.

One, we must always put the hard–working men and women of Wisconsin – the taxpayers – first.

Two, we have a responsibility to provide the best education for our children. That's why I exempted schools from cuts in my Budget Reform Act. My goal is to make Wisconsin schools the best in the world. We will get there because of the best teachers in the world.

Teachers like Tenia Jenkins, whose dedication and professionalism exemplify our teachers and staff throughout Wisconsin's schools. Tenia has been a teacher for 30 years, the last 20 at the Malcolm Shabazz Alternative High School in Madison.

Tenia embodies the Wisconsin spirit... she is a true pioneer. She taught the first African–American history and women's classes in Madison's traditional high schools and continues to be a well–known advocate for young people and a mentor to parents.

Ladies and gentlemen, Tenia Jenkins.

Three, we will create high–paying jobs that reward high–skilled labor, the kind of labor that has become the hallmark of the Wisconsin work ethic.

And four, we have an absolute responsibility to care for people who can't care for themselves. That's why I protected the SeniorCare prescription drug program and the Medical Assistance programs in the Budget Reform Act.

Tonight, I want to put a face on why I made this decision relating to Medical Assistance. Dr. Kevin Izard is a family practitioner from Milwaukee. He is a Wisconsin Medical Society member from the Capitol Drive Health Care Center, where 90 percent of his practice is with Medicaid patients. Dr. Izard, you have dedicated your life to serving the urban poor... and for that, Wisconsin thanks you. Ladies and gentlemen, Dr. Kevin Izard.

Today, we are in the midst of a challenging special session. Government must do what all Wisconsin families do when they gather around the kitchen table and look at their budgets – live within its means.

I said it wouldn't be easy, but that it is time to make tough decisions and limit government spending while protecting services for those who need us the most – our children, the elderly and the disabled.

You might recall that, in my budget reform act speech, I predicted this would be a controversial package because it holds the line on taxes and dramatically reins in government spending at every level.

Tonight, I repeat my pledge to the hard–working men and women of this state: I will continue to oppose any budget solution that includes higher taxes.... And I will continue to push for greater efficiency in government.

My plan calls for bold reform of the state and local partnership. Those who argue that the shared revenue program should be preserved in its current form ignore the fact that much has changed in state and local finances in the last 30 years.

From a state budget perspective, there is little doubt the state and local partnership needs to be reformed because the current system is not sustainable. It is time Wisconsin has this much-needed discussion.

In town halls and city councils across the state, and right here in the Capitol, already the debate has changed from how we spend money to how we can save money.

In fact, during the past six weeks I've seen a number of leaders step to the plate and initiate discussions on making government more efficient.

Some leaders have had great success in this area in the past, and their efforts to save money through consolidation and the merger of services with neighboring governments is gaining new momentum.

These architects of change include Ripon Mayor Robert Somers, who says every elected official –regardless of constituency – must listen to taxpayers and continue to cut spending.

And Wausau's Linda Lawrence, who was pushing a merger plan before the Budget Reform Act was unveiled and now wants to accelerate her plan to save Wausau taxpayers money.

And Appleton's Tim Hanna...who continues to push city staff and city leaders to pursue a regional strategy. A strategy based on coordination of services that promote stronger community partnerships and provide greater value for citizens.

Another architect of change who has understood for years the need to consolidate services is Waukesha County Executive Dan Finley. Dan has called for a new countywide department of public safety to manage their dispatching system.

In Madison, Mayor Sue Bauman has proposed budget cuts and is working diligently with Dane County officials to strengthen efforts to consolidate city and county functions.

South Milwaukee's David Kieck is exploring consolidation with Cudahy and St. Francis leaders for police dispatch and emergency crews.

Neenah's Ken Harwood has taken steps toward merging their fire department with that of nearby Menasha.

There have been discussions about saving taxpayers money in Marathon County, too.... Officials there want to consolidate county parks and forestry departments.

Brown, Outagamie and Winnebago counties are talking about consolidating landfill and recycling programs, and Price County officials adopted a hiring freeze and froze spending on capital equipment.

Former Milwaukee County Executive David Schulz said there is a new spirit of public engagement for reforming and ultimately reinventing local government in Milwaukee and Wisconsin.

I quote: "For more than two centuries, our tradition in the United States has been one of constantly reinventing our society and government. If Milwaukee and Wisconsin can do so now, then the future will be bright with promise and opportunity." End quote.

And Racine County Executive Jean Jacobson, a Kettl Commission member who has had success with consolidations and mergers, recently was asked by other municipalities to provide insight on how to get people to cooperate.

Quote: "Put them in a room together, give them a little coffee and something to eat. We have to put our politics at the door. It's just good, plain common sense. After the governor's message, we're all going to be crying together.... We might as well work on solutions together."

Ladies and gentlemen, the debate has changed!

And we must continue to move the focus from protecting government institutions to protecting the working people of Wisconsin.

The debate has changed.

To all local officials, I say this tonight: Let's work together \dots because we share a common goal – shaping a better tomorrow for the hard–working families of this state and giving taxpayers the best return on their dollar.

I am committed to working with town boards, county executives, village presidents and mayors across Wisconsin to develop long-term solutions for efficiency, cooperation, consolidation and accountability at every level of government – both state and local.

The budget reform act contains language to create a task force to address this very issue. But because the debate has so clearly moved from spend to save, we must move forward with the task force immediately.

Reform itself must begin now.

I will create, by executive order, the Governor's Task Force on State and Local Government, to be headed by Milwaukee's Tim Sheehy.

The goal of the task force will be to build a better Wisconsin through state and local partnerships.

The task force will consist of those who are willing to roll up their sleeves and work together for the greater good of Wisconsin's taxpayers. My first appointments will be those representing local government.

The first charge of the task force is to conduct a thorough review of state mandates. We must eliminate all mandates that are barriers to consolidation and merging local government functions.

We must make it easier for local governments to consolidate and become more efficient. We must identify financial incentives for local government to consolidate services where possible. We need to reward economic development and growth.

Every study has shown, and few people disagree, that we have too much government in Wisconsin. We now need to approach the problem in a reasonable fashion.

As we ponder important fiscal issues, there are other matters that will command our attention this year.

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE [March 5, 2002]

In the coming months we will accelerate our efforts within Wisconsin on issues concerning terrorism and security. Wisconsin stands to receive as much as \$20 million in federal aid this year for domestic security.

I recently met with Homeland Security Director Tom Ridge. He delivered a clear message: As we move forward to protect our families through new law enforcement measures, our statewide efforts must focus on regional needs within our borders.

Local officials will play a crucial role as "first responders," and we must recognize that what works in Milwaukee or Port Washington may not work in La Crosse... and vice versa.

Cooperation, regionalization and accountability – these are themes that will dominate the landscape this year.

In the coming months, I will focus on economic development and education, two separate policy areas that are driven at the local level... And two policy areas that, for the first time ever in Wisconsin, are now linked as one.

For too long, the debate over financing education has pitted educators against the business community. Last year, I moved to bridge that gap by bringing many of the state's key players from both sides together for discussions.

I knew such a meeting was risky, but I moved forward because I believe that when the children of Wisconsin receive the education they deserve, other goals – a strong economy, lower crime rates, healthier families, and fewer demands on government – are within easy reach.

Today, with educators and business breaking the old "politics as usual" mold, the dynamics have dramatically changed in this state

The partnership of business and education is moving forward with unshakable determination.

I applaud all the individuals involved in this discussion for their willingness and their courage in the face of criticism to work together to bring Wisconsin schools and Main Street closer together.

I remain optimistic that this new dynamic and the fruits of our labor will pay benefits now and for many years to come.

We live in a globally competitive environment; the pace of change is rapidly increasing and the stakes are growing higher. Many of our neighboring states have recognized this and are positioning themselves.

We must move quickly, too.

Later this spring, I will unveil a statewide business plan as part of my Build Wisconsin program. The plan's foundation will be based on the economic development model of "clusters."

A cluster is a related technology or industry where the elements necessary for prosperity – the ideas, research, capital, workforce and government support – exist in one place. Instead of focusing on individual companies, clusters focus on regional economies and on related firms and supporting infrastructure.

Some of the clusters Build Wisconsin will pursue include agriculture, biotechnology, finance, insurance, information technology and data processing, manufacturing, papermaking and forest products, medical devices, automotive and tourism.

The good news is that Wisconsin's per capita income in the 1990's grew slightly faster than the per capita income of the Midwest and the nation.

And the cost of living is significantly lower in Milwaukee than in our main border-state competitors, Minneapolis and Chicago.

But on the other end of the spectrum, in the year 2000, Illinois and Minnesota workers earned more each year than the

hard-working men and women in Wisconsin. That is unacceptable. We must do better.

We must set our goals high.

My vision for Wisconsin's future is expansive, but not expensive: we can make government at all levels work better and smarter. We will continue holding the line on spending and taxes so that Wisconsin moves out of the top five highest–tax states by 2003 and out of the top 10 by 2006.

With a statewide business plan as our roadmap, our goal will be to raise Wisconsin's per capita income above the national average by the end of 2005 and surpass Illinois and Minnesota in wages earned by the end of the decade!

In times of challenge, we must keep sight of our goals. In the coming years, we will build on our past successes to enhance our economic vitality and preserve our quality of life.

As I reflect on our state of the state, I am bolstered by the belief that the goodness and strength of our people will prevail. The future is ours to make. While some states may fret and worry about the future, the Wisconsin spirit will serve as our beacon for a prosperous and healthy Wisconsin.

Recently, I was asked what Wisconsin might look like in 10 years.

I see a future with a vibrant business climate that will continue to create good–paying jobs.

I see a thriving economy with nationally renowned companies opening their doors.... And a highly skilled workforce.

I see schools where children are challenged. Teachers are given the respect they deserve. And accountability is the common denominator for our entire school system.

I see children and families with health care and childcare.

I see top-notch academic programs producing first-rate students and leaders.

I see a national biotechnology center in Wisconsin.

I see basketball championship banners hanging from the rafters of the Kohl Center and the Bradley Center.

I see the Lombardi Trophy back at its rightful home – Lambeau Field... the same year the Badgers win the national championship on the gridiron.

I see families exploring open space, swimming at our pristine beaches, fishing in our lakes and riding on our bike paths.

I see a world–class transportation system that quickly and smoothly moves people and goods around and into Wisconsin... And moves products out.

I see farmland where young children learn to carry on the historic legacy of the family farm from their parents and grandparents.

I see visitors and residents celebrating Wisconsin's ethnic and cultural diversity from Superior to Kenosha ... from Marinette to Monroe.

I see great days ahead for men and women of will and vision.

But most of all, I see a Wisconsin in the shining light of a rising sun... fresh from the burning, creative hand of God.

Thank you very much. God bless you, and God bless Wisconsin.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #40

Relating to the Creation of the Task Force on State and Local Government

WHEREAS, Wisconsin is facing a budget shortfall that may reach beyond \$1.1 billion in the 2001-2003 Biennium; and

WHEREAS, the Budget Reform Bill of 2002 was introduced to rectify this shortfall; and

WHEREAS, one provision of the Budget Reform Bill of 2002 is to phase out shared revenue with repeal of the program completed by fiscal year 2005; and

WHEREAS, it is important to have a forum for discussing and addressing fundamental change to the state and local governments relationship;

NOW, THEREFORE, I SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

1. Create the Task Force on State and Local Government (hereinafter, "Task Force"); and

2. Provide that the Task Force members are appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and 3. Provide that the Governor shall designate one (1) member on the Task Force as its chair to serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the Governor; and 4. Provide that the Task Force shall review and answer questions in the following areas:

A. To review government organization, including the size and number of governments;

B.To review efficiency and consolidation of government services;

C. To review land use, boundaries and annexation; D. To review finances and taxations of state and local government;

E.To review state mandates that are barriers to consolidation; and

F. To identify financial incentives for local governments to consolidate services, where possible; and

5. Make recommendations to strengthen the partnership between the state and local governments to ensure Wisconsin is fully prepared to meet the challenges of the Twenty-First Century; and

6. Require the Task Force to submit to the Governor a final report on its findings and recommendations by February 2003; and

7. Direct the Secretary of the Department of Administration and all other state agencies to provide the Task Force with administrative and support services and with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with section 20.505(4)(ba) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

8. Require the Task Force to disband once the Governor has accepted its final report.

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the State's vehicle emissions testing program in southeastern Wisconsin. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) determines the parameters of the program in accordance with federal Clean Air Act requirements, while the Department of Transportation (DOT) is responsible for administering the State's contract with a private firm that operates the testing stations. In calendar year 2001, approximately 784,000 vehicle emissions tests were

performed at a total cost of \$11.2 million. Motorists pay no fee for testing, which is supported by federal funds, the State's Transportation Fund, and general purpose revenue.

Wisconsin implemented its vehicle emissions testing program to comply with the federal Clean Air Act and to reduce ozone levels. Currently, the program requires most vehicles registered in Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Sheboygan, Washington, and Waukesha counties to be tested every two years. Although testing is a federal mandate, states have some discretion in designing their programs. Overall, Wisconsin's program is more stringent than the applicable federal model. As a result, DNR officials believe federal air quality standards will be attained in 2002, five years earlier than the federal deadline. The Legislature could consider changing the current program as long as the changes would have no significant effect of emissions levels. We have suggested several options for the Legislature to consider.

We found several areas in which DOT's management of the contract with the private testing firm was inadequate. For example, DOT has not attempted to renegotiate contract payments despite testing volumes 14.7 to 18.2 percent below those anticipated when the contract began in 1995. In addition, the contractor has failed to meet waiting time standards at a number of testing stations over the course of the contract, but DOT has not pursued liquidated damages for these violations.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DNR and DOT. The agencies' responses are appendices 5 and 6.

The 1999-2000 Biennial Budget bill contained a provision that instructed the Department of Commerce to evaluate the operation of section 101.143(4)(cm) of the statutes and to report the results of the evaluation to the joint legislative audit committee, to the joint committee on finance and to the appropriate standing committees of the legislature, no later than the first day of the 14th month beginning after the effective date of this subsection.

Although the department recognizes the importance of the development and evaluation of a usual and customary costs schedule, it has encountered difficulties in developing data necessary to create such a schedule based on past costs. As a result, we are still in the process of fully implementing the usual and customary cost schedule described in section 101.143(4)(cm). Based on early analysis, the department did implement a competitive bidding process for all commodity services to obtain market-driven cost data. Having now developed an approach to determining usual and customary costs with limited data, the department is reporting on its schedule for full implementation including a date for evaluating the effects of the schedule of costs.

The department has developed a draft schedule of usual and customary costs for consultant activities from available data on hourly rates for consultant employees and from estimates of the typical hours involved in each activity. Estimating is the customary method in the industry for creating budgets for such activities. The department has used staff with experience in the consulting field to estimate the time typically involved in key activities. It proposes to obtain additional input from an advisory committee that includes staff from consulting firms to further refine the usual and customary cost schedule before implementing the schedule by administrative rule.

In the attached report, the department has also identified potential implementation problems. This will enable the department to determine what data can be gathered during implementation to evaluate the impact of those problems.

We appreciate your efforts to control costs in the PECFA program and are available to provide any additional information that you might wish regarding current operations and future evaluation reports relating to usual and customary costs.

On February 25, 2002, the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was minus \$1,000. This shortfall continued until February 26, 2002, when the balance reached a positive \$11,000. The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfall was not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

I am pleased to be able to present to you, for distribution to the Wisconsin Senate, the annual evaluation report on the Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program. The program, created by section 85.53 Wis. Stats., was established by the legislature in 1997 with the requirement that the Department study its impact and report on its findings every even-numbered year.

The Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program is intended for offenders who are arrested for their second or subsequent OWI (Operating While Intoxicated) offense. Their participation may be voluntary or court ordered, the program may support 2nd or 3rd or greater offenders, it may have exclusions for felons or may not. It is an intervention model designed to get the offender into counseling, treatment and monitoring as soon as possible after the arrest. The program is individual to each community.

As you will see in the full report, no county that has begun a program has dropped the program. Offenders who successfully completed the program were less likely than non-participants to be re-arrested for subsequent operating while intoxicated violations. Those who were re-arrested went significantly longer between arrests than non-participants. Currently there are three counties and a multi-county effort on a waiting list for funding to begin programs. I commend those people who have dedicated themselves to making this innovative program a success. There are no "silver bullets" in eradicating intoxicated driving, but I feel this effort is a vital piece in the total transportation safety effort.

We have completed a financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin, as requested by state agencies to meet the audit requirements of the federal Single audit Act of 1984, as amended, and the provisions of federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133. In addition, the audit assists us in meeting state audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats. The audit covers the period from July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001.

Federal funds administered by the State have been steadily increasing over the past five years. During fiscal year (FY) 2000-01, state agencies, including the University of Wisconsin (UW) System, administered \$7.2 billion in cash and non-cash federal assistance. This is \$1.9 billion, or 35.8 percent, more than the \$5.3 billion in federal assistance state agencies administered in FY 1996-97. Five large agencies – the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS), the Department of Workforce Development (DWD), UW System, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of Public Instruction – administered 88.1 percent of the federal financial assistance and 22 of the State's 29 major federal grant programs.

Most state agencies have complied with federal grant requirements and have taken steps to address concerns raised in prior years. We question a total of \$124,829 in costs that were inappropriately charged to federal grants and in interest earnings lost to the federal government because of delays in returning unspent federal funds. These questioned costs represent a very small portion of total federal financial assistance and are significantly less that the \$1,027,571 we questioned in our FY 1999-2000 audit.

DHFS administers some of the largest and most complex programs funded with federal funds. One such program, foster Care, is typically operates by counties.However, DHFS both administers and operated the program in Milwaukee County. Milwaukee County performed foster care provider licensing services under a contract with DHFS during our audit period.

Our review identified serious internal control concerns with payment Milwaukee County provider licensing, documentation and eligibility, and other matters. For example, 3 of 11 licensing files we reviewed contained no evidence that required criminal record checks had been performed, and 7 files had missing, incomplete, or otherwise deficient materials related to licensing. We also found exceptions in 19 of the 49 Milwaukee County case files that we reviewed for documentation of payments to providers. In total, we questioned \$33,0075 in foster care payments. DHFS has already repaid the federal government for these exceptions. However, it is likely that a large portion of the approximately 6,700 other Milwaukee County case files also contain undocumented payments and other deficiencies. Because some of our findings represent a continuation of previously noted problems, and because of both an increased rate of exceptions and the potential for material questioned costs had all of the cases been tested we consider these issues to be the most serious internal control weaknesses identified during our audit.

DHFS recognizes the importance of these issues and is taking steps to resolve them. It has already contracted with a new licensing agency and has reassigned responsibility for managing foster care cases at two case-management sites.

In our FY 1999-2000 single audit report, we noted serious concerns with DWD's administration of the Vocational Rehabilitation program, including issues with third-party contracts and direct payments to clients. DWD is making progress in addressing these deficiencies. For example, it has ceased its questionable practice of requiring certain third-party contractors to bill for costs before they are incurred. In addition, DWD has developed reasonable policies to restrict direct payments to clients and is establishing a central unit to process these payments. For the current audit period, we question just \$786 in direct payments that did not meet documentation requirements.

We also questioned \$10,000 in interest the State earned at the expense of the federal government because DWD delayed returning unspent Vocational Rehabilitation program funds, and \$45,741 the State received because of errors DWD made in calculating transfers from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families grant to the Social Services Block Grant. Other questioned costs include \$5,412 in charges and lost interest related to the student financial aid programs at UW System, and \$29,815 in excess reimbursements to school districts under the School Breakfast Program, which is administered by the Department of Public Instruction.

Our single audit report is lengthy and detailed. Therefore, we are limiting our initial distribution to those required by law to receive copies, the audited state agencies, and the federal agencies to which our findings relate. This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of March 2002.

On March 25, 2002 the **General Fund** balance was -\$80.6 million. This shortfall continued through March 31, 2002 when the balance reached -\$231.2 million. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, in combination with the overall budget shortfall.

On March 26, 2002 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$2 thousand. This shortfall continued through March 31, 2002 when the balance reached -\$3 thousand. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool

and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has historically been known as a progressive State practicing ethics in government that are beyond reproach; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Code of Ethics for Public Officials declares that high moral and ethical standards are essential to the conduct of free government; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Code of Ethics, campaign finance and elections laws further Wisconsin's tradition of clean and open government by setting standards of conduct for State public officials; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin residents demand that public officials operate their offices and conduct their campaigns with integrity and honesty;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this state, and specifically by Section 14.019 of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

4. Create the Governor's Task Force on Ethics Reform in Government (hereinafter "Task Force") consisting of six

(6) members appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and

- 5. Provide that the Governor shall designate two members to be the co-chairs to serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- 6. Provide that the Task Force shall have the following mission:
 - (a) Examine the existing statutory provisions, administrative rules and other State policies related to Wisconsin's Code of Ethics, campaign finance and election laws; and
 - (b) Examine the Federal Hatch Act as it may apply to State senior appointed officials and top legislative aides; and
 - (c) Recommend changes that will strengthen Wisconsin's Code of Ethics, campaign finance and election laws, and enhance Wisconsin's reputation for integrity in Government; and
 - (d) Recommend changes that will improve the clarity, enforceability and fairness of Wisconsin's Code of Ethics, campaign finance and election laws; and
- 7. Direct the Department of Administration to provide the Task Force with such sums of money as are necessary for travel and operating expenses in accordance with Section 20.505(4)(ba) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and
- 8. Provide that the Task Force issue a report to the Governor, which includes suggested legislation for a possible Special Session, within three months of the first meeting date; and
- 9. Provide that the Task Force shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

Pursuant to ss. 25.17(14r), Stats., I have attached copies of SWIB's recently revised Investment Guidelines and a summary of the changes.

Some of the revisions this time incorporate actions taken by the Board to implement recommendations made by outside consultants. The recommendations included restructuring the alternative investments' and private placements' portfolios, clarifying further the role of Trustees as governing fiduciaries and staff as managing fiduciaries, and creating additional internal portfolios to manage the retirement funds. Some of the revisions address concerns that the Legislative Audit Bureau raised when it conducted the biennial 1999–2000 performance audit.

Finally, we have added a new guideline that will allow SWIB to index of the smaller funds that we manage – the Patients Compensation Fund, the State Life Insurance Fund, the Local Government Property Insurance Fund and the Historical Society Fund. SWIB has the authority under the statutes and rules of the Commissioner of Insurance to invest these funds through externally managed index funds.

We have marked substantive changes or new provisions to the document. In addition, I have attached a brief summary of the changes.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have been monitoring the construction costs of Miller Park, the stadium for the Milwaukee Brewers Baseball Club, at the request of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The Southeast Wisconsin Professional Baseball Park District has been responsible for overseeing the design and construction of the stadium and is currently overseeing operations. Construction was originally anticipated to be completed by March 1, 2000, but a crane accident in July 1999 that killed three workers and caused extensive damage resulted in a one-year delay in the stadium's opening.

Through December 2001, the District spent \$413.9 million on project construction, or \$13.4 million more than budgeted. In addition, the District spent \$14.2 million in 2001 for post-construction operations and maintenance, and it budgeted \$11.1 million for these costs in 2002.

A 30-year lease agreement between the District and the Brewers provides for the creation of a fund to pay for repairs and improvements to the stadium. The lease also requires the District to contribute \$3.85 million annually to support stadium maintenance. However, we note that public funds paid to help the Brewers support stadium maintenance costs will instead be paid to the team's lenders. We suggest the District work with the Brewers to ensure that needed repairs and maintenance projects are completed and that the public's investment in the project – for which we now estimate costs will total \$1.0 billion through 2030 - is adequately protected.

the District met the majority of its statutory goals for the participation of minorities and women in the stadium construction work. However, we identified several management issues regarding the District's operations, including the use of a private skybox in the stadium, its contract with a private consulting firm that does not tie payments for stadium management services to the amount of work actually completed, and the adequacy of documentation for some expenditures. We suggest improvements be made in all of these areas.

I stand behind the accuracy of the information included in this report and the professionalism of my staff in completing this review. The District's response is Appendix 2.

The Board Finds:

1. Jennifer McFarland of Verona, Wisconsin claims \$270.00 for reimbursement of her insurance deductible and other expenses related to damage to her car. The claimant parked her vehicle on N. Carroll Street on July 31, 2001. When she returned to her car, she found that a tree branch had fallen on the vehicle, crushing the roof and part of the bike rack, and shattering the windshield and front passenger side window. According to Capitol Square Tree Condition Report, the tree was marked to be "watched" by an arborist eighteen months prior to this incident. The claimant states that it took three and a half weeks to repair the vehicle, during which time, she had a co–worker drive her to work. She requests reimbursement of her \$250 insurance deductible plus the \$20 that she paid to the co–worker for gas money.

DOA recommends denial of this claim. DOA does not believe that there was any negligence on the part of the state. The tree in this incident was being watched, but had not been targeted for removal by an arborist. The tree was scheduled to be pruned this spring and that pruning has been completed. DOA states that there was no stormy or windy weather on the day of the accident. DOA also points to the fact that the claimant would have had incurred gas expenses to get to work in her own vehicle even if her car had not been damaged, therefore, there is no reason she should be reimbursed for the gas money she gave her co–worker.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Member Rothschild not participating.*)

2. John (Jack) L. Stebbins of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$12,536.80 plus interest for wages and benefits allegedly lost because of an employment grievance filed by the claimant. Claimant states that he has been an LTE (40%) with the UW Computer Services Division since 1979. He states that in January 1996 he filed a grievance against his immediate supervisor and requested that he be reassigned to another supervisor. Claimant alleges that he was assigned to a new office with a new title but that there was not enough work for him to do in this new position. He claims that he requested additional work from July through December 1996 and was repeatedly told to be patient. Claimant states that in December 1996 he complained to Assistant Vice Chancellor Erika Sander and Provost/Vice Chancellor Ken Watters. He alleges that he was told to be patient until a new bureau director took office in July 1997. He states that he was restored to his former position in July 1997 and alleges that he was promised by Ms. Sander that he would receive compensation for his lost back pay in the form of a higher future salary. He claims that from 1998 through 2001 he was assured that the back pay issue was being worked on and would eventually be resolved. In July 2001 he met with the new Provost, John Wanat, who referred him to the bureau director, Joe Douglas. Claimant states that Mr. Douglas showed him a 1997 memo received by Douglas in 1997, which indicated that the claimant had been told by Watters and Sander that he would not receive back pay. The claimant denies ever being told this by Ms. Sander and Mr. Watters but alleges that he was continually led to believe that the back pay issue would be resolved in his favor. Claimant states that, at the UW's suggestion, he did try to find additional part-time work in 1996 but that he was unsuccessful in obtaining hours equivalent to the work he allegedly lost. The claimant believes that he was effectively "fired" because of the grievance he filed against his supervisor.

The UW recommends denial of this claim. The UW states that the claimant requested the transfer and agreed to the change in his duties as part of his grievance settlement. The UW alleges that during a 1997 meeting with Ms. Sander and Mr. Watters, the claimant was clearly told that back pay was not possible because of his employment status as an LTE. The UW states that the claimant is working under a fundamentally flawed assumption that he has some entitlement to a certain level of employment for a specified period of time. The UW states that the claimant, as an LTE, has no fixed employment contract and no right to receive any specific number of hours of employment in any given time period. The UW denies that there was every any commitment by the UW to grant back pay to the claimant. The UW states that Ms. Sander did feel some sympathy for the claimant but that Mr. Watters made it clear that the claimant would not receive back pay.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$4,200.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285 (1)(a), Stats.

Al Glish of Crivitz, Wisconsin claims \$2,955.46 for 3. unpaid restitution owed to him by a probationer, Heather Luedke, at the time of her discharge from probation. In September 1992, Ms. Luedke and others engaged in a variety of criminal activities, including stealing a van from the claimant's auto sales business. Ms. Luedke was convicted of Criminal Trespass to Dwelling and Criminal Damage to Property and ordered to pay restitution to the claimant and others. The claimant alleges that the Probation and Parole Agent in charge of Ms. Luedke later discharged her from supervision without ensuring that a civil judgment was put in place for the unpaid restitution. The claimant states that he has exhausted all other known sources of remedy but that he has been unable to collect restitution. The claimant states that he has collected only \$12.87 in restitution from Ms. Luedke.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC states that in July 1997 Ms. Luedke's Probation and Parole Agent requested that the court enter a judgment for restitution in the form of a memorandum to the court requesting that Ms. Luedke be removed from probation and that the court enter a civil judgment for restitution. DOC states that the court completed and signed the petition but that the court failed to mark any boxes indicating the court's findings and order. DOC states that they did not submit an amended order, as requested by the court, because at that time Ms. Luedke had already been released from probation for 18 months and DOC was no longer in the position of requiring her to make payments.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of 2,500.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Corrections appropriation s. 20.410 (1)(a), Stats.

4. James D. Minniecheske of Tigerton Dells, Wisconsin claims \$1,543.61 plus interest for return of restitution money taken by DOC. The claimant was ordered to pay restitution after being convicted of a crime. He challenged the restitution order and the Circuit Court amended the judgment of conviction to remove the restitution order but did not order reimbursement of the money that had been collected from the claimant during and after his incarceration. The Circuit Court decision was upheld by the Court of Appeals and Wisconsin Supreme Court. The claimant notes that the Appeals Court stated, "we agree with Minniecheske that there must be a remedy that can enable him to successfully recover the money the State improperly seized...he could file a claim with the state claims board, which is specifically authorized to remedy claims such as those Minniecheske asserts." The claimant states that the delay in bring this claim before the Claims Board was caused only by the claimant waiting until all appeals had been exhausted in court. The claimant states that he filed the claim several months after learning of the Supreme Court's action. He does not believe that two months is an unreasonable delay in bringing a claim. The claimant requests return of the \$1,543.61 in restitution that was improperly taken from him and also requests payment of 12% interest dating from July 1, 1996.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC points to the fact that the Appeals Court did not order the State or Claims Board to pay the claimant, but only suggested the Claims Board as a potential avenue for recovery. DOC believes that there has been an unreasonable delay in bringing this claim before the board, as the Court of Appeals issued its decision over three years ago. DOC states that the Supreme Court denied review of the case in 1999, not several months ago, as alleged by the clamant. DOC also believes that granting this claim would constitute unjust enrichment because the money collected from the claimant was paid to the Fred Cox, the party to whom the claimant was ordered to pay the restitution. DOC simply acted as a conduit for the restitution between the claimant and the victim of his crime; the money was not paid to DOC. DOC states that the claimant paid only \$2,312.21 of the \$27,719 that he was ordered to pay Mr. Cox. DOC believes that since the money was never had by the state, DOC is not a debtor in this situation, and the state therefore does not consent to suit pursuant to s. 775.01, Stats. DOC believes that the doctrine of Sovereign Immunity bars payment of this claim. DOC also states that, in addition to the outstanding restitution still owed to Mr. Cox, the claimant also owes approximately \$1,900 in restitution to the Village of Tigerton and that any payment made by the board should be applied to the claimant's outstanding restitution balances. Finally, DOC states that the claimant has provided no support for his request for payment of 12% interest.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Michael and Helen Grimmenga of Watertown, 5. Wisconsin claim \$14,387.23 for return of monies garnished from their wages to satisfy a delinquent tax assessment. The claimants state that Helen Grimmenga's employer, Community Action Coalition, incorrectly overstated her earnings for the 1991 tax year. The claimants further state that Helen, who handled the taxes, struggled with illness for several years and eventually became completely disabled in 2000. They claim that their original tax records were damaged by flooding in their basement, so they needed to re-do all of their taxes and request additional copies of their W-2 forms, which took a considerable amount of time. They allege that they have attempted to settle the dispute with DOR but that DOR lost their returns and information several times. They request return of the money overpaid and barred from refund by the two-year statute of limitations.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that this claim involves not only an audit of the claimants' 1991 return, based on the above-mentioned employer error, but also questions regarding Schedule C expenses for 1992 returns, and failure to file 1993 and 1994 returns. DOR states that the claimants did not reply either to the letters sent in June 1995 and October 1995, or to the estimated assessment sent in February 1996. DOR records indicate that certification of the claimants' wages began in April 1997, after the claimants failed to respond or to appear at an informal hearing. DOR states that the claimants filed for amnesty in August 1998 and at that time filed their 1993 and 1994 tax returns and cleared up the 1991 error. DOR states that the 1992 portion of the assessment remained outstanding and that certification therefore was continued until October 1998, when the delinquent account was adjusted. DOR states that after adjustment of the account the claimants received refunds of \$1,779.63 (Michael) and \$1,269.06 (Helen) and that they also received a refund of \$1,018.77 under the 1998 amnesty program (representing the money collected during the amnesty application period). DOR states that the total amount collected from both claimants and closed to refund is \$14,387.23. Finally, DOR points to the fact that the claimants agreed to relinquish any right to further petition for review of the liability when they applied for amnesty in 1998. DOR states that the limitations under the amnesty program supercede the two-year statute of limitations.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Member Albers dissenting.*)

6. Carl Renikow of Wausaukee, Wisconsin claims \$6,295.00 for refund of overpayment of taxes. The claimant admits that he did not file his 1996 taxes on time. He states that his son was born 6 weeks early, spent one month in ICU, and that that the resulting medical care left the claimant with large medical bills not covered by his insurance. He alleges that he thought it would not be a problem filing the returns late, since he knew that he would not owe any taxes, but instead would be getting a tax refund. He is not requesting payment of any refunds, only of the amount overpaid through garnishment of his wages. He states that he never realized that he would have to fight to get the overpayment back and believes that he should be reimbursed for the overpayment, since he never owed any taxes for 1996.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR issued an estimated assessment for the claimant's 1996 taxes in December 1998. DOR records indicate that the claimant filed the return in January 2001. DOR records also show that between February 1999 and the time the return was filed, the department had numerous contacts with the claimant, levied his bank account, intercepted refunds and certified his wages and that all of DOR's notices were sent to the claimant's correct address. DOR states that the two–year statutory deadline for requesting a refund was December 7, 2000, and that the claimant did not file the returns until January 25, 2001. DOR states that s. 71.75(5), Stats., prohibits them from refunding the amount collected on the original assessment, since no refund was claimed within the two–year period prescribed by the statute.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

7. Waukesha School District of Waukesha, Wisconsin claims \$803,149.00 for adjustment in school aid for the years 1995 through 1998. In November 2000, Ameritech prevailed in a claim against the City of Pewaukee for the return of taxes paid in 1995–1998. The claimant's portion of that liability was \$1,050,605. The claimant had to pay back this amount to the City of Pewaukee and, to cover the expense, had to levy an additional tax against the district's taxpayers. The claimant has determined that its equalized valuation would have been changed for the years affected by this litigation. The claimant points to the fact that there is a statutory procedure for

retrieving lost school aids, however, the statute applies only o manufacturing property. The claimant believes that the language of the statute is too limiting and that, in fairness, the claimant's should be afforded the same remedy. The claimant's calculations show that it would have been eligible for an additional \$803,149 in state aid from the DOR and requests reimbursement in that amount.

DPI recommends payment of this claim. DPI believes that the district is without blame in this situation and should be held harmless and reimbursed by the state. DPI's calculations differ slightly from those of the claimant and show that the claimant would have received \$803,105.00. However, DPI requests that any payment not be made from the school aid fund, because such payment would reduce the aid available to other school districts.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that it has no statutory authority to pay the requested school aid adjustment. DOR also states that DPI does not have the statutory authority to make an adjustment in the district's school aid in this situation without statutory changes by the legislature. DOR states that it is common practice that property should be construed as taxable under the statutes, therefore, the DOR assessor was following proper guidelines when assessing Ameritech's property, despite the fact that the assessor's determination was later overturned by the court. DOR believes that it has performed its duties under the statute and that, because of the statutory impediments, this claim should be denied.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Members Albers*, *Rothschild, Taylor, and Lee dissenting.*)

Oueen Wigham of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$2,068.00 for medical bills related to an accident allegedly caused by conditions at a road construction project in the City of Milwaukee. The claimant alleges that a road construction project in her neighborhood was poorly managed, placed residents at the neighborhood at risk and caused them great stress and mental anguish. She alleges that because of the project, sidewalks and driveways were removed, leaving the claimant and her son trapped in their home. She alleges that residents on the street were placed in danger because emergency vehicles would not have been able to come down the street because the road was torn up on both sides. She states that on October 11, 2000, she slipped and fell because of the muddy conditions and lack of sidewalks. The claimant believes that this project was shoddily handled because of the neighborhood and does not believe that road projects in other neighborhoods would have been conducted in this fashion. She requests reimbursement for the medical bills she incurred because of her fall.

DOT recommends that this claim be denied. DOT states that this was a federally funded, City of Milwaukee project and that the role of the state was to ensure that the correct federal/state process was followed. DOT states that the City of Milwaukee designed the construction specifications and oversaw the work of their contractor and that the state was not involved until after the construction was complete. DOT states that the city sent out proper notices to the residents of the street, held appropriate public hearings, and addressed safety issues. Records indicate that the city responded to safety concerns by including special provisions related to removal of sidewalks and driveways in the project contract. DOT records indicate that in December 2000 the claimant wrote to the DOT District 2 Highway office demanding \$250,000 for the pain and suffering of herself, her son and her neighbors. At the same time, she was participating in a suit against the City of Milwaukee in the amount of \$125,000 (that claim was denied by the City). Subsequently, the claimant pursued a claim against the project contractor, Milwaukee General. Milwaukee General settled that claim and paid \$2,000 to the claimant for her medical bills from October 2000 through January 2001. DOT points to the fact that the bills the claimant has submitted appear to be the same bills for which she has already been compensated by Milwaukee General. DOT does not believe there is any negligence on the part of the state and, since the claimant has already been reimbursed for her medical bills, no equitable reason to pay this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Andry Rasmussen & Sons, Inc., of Drummond, Wisconsin claims \$4,703.00 for grant funds awarded for replacement of a septic system under s. 145.245, Stats. The claimant is a plumbing and heating business located in Cable, WI. The claimant states that in June 1996, Gary Marousek (dba Gary's Fireside) applied for grant funds for replacement of his septic system. The claimant states that it installed the new system for Mr. Marousek in July 1996 at a cost of \$15,521.30. The claimant alleges that Mr. Marousek received a grant check from the state in September 1997, in the amount of \$4,703.00 but that Mr. Marousek never paid this amount, or any other amount due for the system, to the claimant. The claimant states that the Department of Commerce collected the grant award from Mr. Marousek by way of a small claims judgment against him because he failed to use the funds for the purpose for which they were provided. However, the claimant states that rather than using the reclaimed grant money to reimburse the claimant for a portion of its costs installing Mr. Marousek's system, the state retained the funds. The claimant believes that it is wrong for the Department to reclaim those funds for the state rather than using the funds for partial payment of the claimant's costs incurred in installing the new septic system.

Commerce has no objection to the payment of this claim. The Department understands the equitable arguments made by the claimant and the claimant's belief in the general purpose of the grant funds. However, Commerce believes that it is prohibited from making payments to persons not specifically identified as eligible for payment of funds under s. 145.245, Stats. This statute appears to apply to "owners" of property and does not appear to apply to service providers, such as the claimant.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$4,703.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Commerce appropriation s. 20.143 (3)(de), Stats.

10. Karyn Behrens of Presque Isle, Wisconsin claims \$4,532.00 for Homestead Tax Credits for the years 1996 through 1998. The claimant states that she filed her taxes late for those years because she was suffering from severe depression and post–traumatic stress disorder related to recovered memories of child abuse. The claimant alleges that she was barely able to deal with day to day tasks such as laundry, dishes, and household paperwork, much less handle her taxes, because of debilitating mental health issues. When the claimant did file her taxes, she received a letter from DOR denying the Homestead Tax Credits unless she submitted additional information. The claimant admits that she missed the deadlines set by DOR for getting the information to them both because of her severe illness and also because her former

landlord had moved and it took her some time to track him down again. Because she missed the deadlines, DOR denied her Homestead Credits. The claimant states that she later spoke with an accountant, who recommended re-filing the taxes. He stated that the three-year statute of limitations had not expired for those tax years and thought that she might be able to then get her Homestead Credits back. The claimant states that she re-filed the 1996-1998 taxes but that DOR then requested the same information that they she had previously submitted for her Homestead claims. The claimant alleges that she sent the information to DOR three times (once by Certified Mail with confirmation of receipt) and that they still denied receiving the information and denied her Homestead Credits. The claimant believes that there are extenuating circumstances because of her severe mental illness, difficulty in finding her landlord, and DOR's errors. She requests payment of her Homestead Credits for 1996–1998, plus interest.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. The claimant did file a written appeal to DOR's July 2001 notice denying her 1996 Homestead Credit pending submission of additional information. However, DOR states that the claimant did not submit the additional information prior to the deadline. DOR records indicated that they denied her 1996 credit in November 2001. DOR states that the denial notice notified the claimant that she had 60 days to file an appeal, but that she did not do so. DOR records also indicated that the claimant did not appeal either the initial denial notice or the final denial notice for her 1997 and 1998 Homestead Credits. DOR points to the fact that s. 71.88 (1)(a) and (b), Stats., provides avenues for taxpayer appeals and states that denials that are not appealed by the taxpayer become "final and conclusive." Regarding the claimant's request for interest, DOR points to s. 71.55 (4), Stats., which states that no interest is allowed on any Homestead Credit payment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. *(Member Albers dissenting.)*

11. Brenda Brown of Milwaukee, Wisconsin claims \$3,738.26 for return of Homestead tax credits intercepted by DOR to satisfy a delinquent tax assessment. The claimant states that she did not work in 1992 and therefore was not required to file an income tax return for that year and did not owe any taxes. She alleges that she never received the letter that DOR claims to have sent in October 1993. Finally, the claimant states that she suffers from mental illness and has very poor eyesight. She requests return of the money taken by DOR.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that the agency received an incomplete 1992 income tax return from the claimant on October 20, 1993. DOR claims that it sent the income tax form back to the claimant, along with a letter requesting additional information. DOR states that the form sent back to the claimant contained a 10/20/93 DOR date stamp. In addition, DOR states that between October 1993 and April 2001, there was much activity regarding the claimant's account and that all notices and correspondence were sent to the claimant's current address. DOR records indicate that various bankruptcy proceedings involving the claimant halted DOR's collection efforts periodically, but that DOR did intercept the claimant's 1997 through 2000 Homested Tax Credits and applied them towards her delinquent account. DOR points to the fact that when the claimant finally submitted her completed 1992 return in April 2001, she did so using an exact copy of the original form returned to her in 1993, showing the DOR date stamp. DOR believes this confirms that, contrary to the claimant's assertions, she did indeed receive the October 1993 letter.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Donald J. Titoni of Lake Geneva, Wisconsin claims \$236.30 for return of tax refunds withheld to satisfy an outstanding assessment. The claimant alleges that he made no earnings in 1994 and 1995 and therefore was not required to pay taxes. He states that DOR later came after him for not filing taxes for those years and intercepted his 2000 federal and state tax refunds. He requests return of those refunds.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR states that it issued an estimate assessment in September 1997 based upon the claimant's failure to file 1994 and 1995 tax returns. DOR records indicate that the estimated assessment was sent to the claimant's current address and was not returned as undeliverable. DOR alleges that the claimant did not respond either to the assessment notice or to the subsequent hearing notice sent in June 1998. DOR states that the hearing notice was returned by the post office as undeliverable and that DOR was unable to locate another address for the claimant. DOR turned the account over to OSI Collections services in February 2000. OSI records indicate that the claimant contacted them in April 2000 but did not resolve the account. DOR claims that the claimant contacted them in May 2000 and was told what he needed to do to resolve his account. DOR states that the missing returns had not yet been filed by February 2001, so DOR applied the claimant's 2000 state refund to the delinquent account. In March 2001, the DOR notified the claimant that they would also be seizing his 2000 federal refund. DOR records indicate that the claimant contacted DOR on March 13, 2000 and was again told that he needed to file 1994 and 1995 returns. DOR states that it did not hear from the claimant again until January 2002, when he contacted them to discuss his account again. DOR records indicate that the claimant finally provided the information needed to resolve his account at this time. DOR states that the claimant did not appeal the assessment within 60 days, as required by section 71.88, Stats., and that he did not file a claim for refund of any overpayments within 2 years of the assessment, as required by section 71.75(5), Stats.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

13. Jin-Yi Cai of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$600.00 for replacement of a wooden desk allegedly damaged by movers. The claimant is employed by the University of Wisconsin. He claims that when university hired movers moved his office to another floor, the broke his 72" wooden desk beyond repair. The desk belonged to the claimant personally and he states that it was in excellent condition prior to the move. He was present at the incident and believes that the movers pulled too hard on the legs and did not empty all of the contents, which caused the desk to collapse. He requests \$600 for the cost of replacing his broken desk with one of similar size and style.

The UW recommends payment of this claim in the reduced amount of \$100, based on equitable principles. The UW states that the desk was being moved in connection with the relocation of the claimant's office and that the desk was the personal property of the claimant. The UW states that the UW instructed staff to empty all desks, cabinets and other furniture items prior to the move and that the claimant apparently failed

to do so. The UW states that the movers have indicated that the desk was in poor condition before they tried to move it. The UW believes that, based on the condition of the desk and its depreciated value, payment of no more than \$100 should be made to the claimant for the damage sustained.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

14. Gregory G. Dieckman of Sparta, Wisconsin claims \$500.00 for vehicle damage caused by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. His car was parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged his vehicle. Claimant requests reimbursement for his insurance deductible in the amount of \$500.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

15. Amy J. Georgeson of Camp Douglas, Wisconsin claims \$500.00 for vehicle damage caused by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. Her car was parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged her vehicle. Claimant requests reimbursement for her insurance deductible in the amount of \$500.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

16. Daniel Gonnering of New Lisbon, Wisconsin claims \$500.00 for vehicle damaged caused by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. His car was parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged his vehicle. Claimant requests reimbursement for his insurance deductible in the amount of \$500.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

17–18. James Sampson of Camp Douglas, Wisconsin claims \$100.00 each for two vehicles damaged by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. Both his and his wife's cars were parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged his vehicles. Claimant requests reimbursement for his insurance deductibles in the amount of \$100 per vehicle.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

19. Mary Snider of Tomah, Wisconsin claims \$50.00 for vehicle damage caused by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. Her car was parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged her vehicle. Claimant requests reimbursement for her insurance deductible in the amount of \$50.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

20. Patrick Walsh of Elroy, Wisconsin claims \$100.00 for vehicle damage caused by a hailstorm. Claimant is employed at Camp Douglas. His car was parked on the base during work hours when a hailstorm struck the area, which included golf ball sized hail that damaged his vehicle. Claimant requests reimbursement for his insurance deductible in the amount of \$100.

DMA recommends denial of this claim. DMA feels that there is no state responsibility for damage caused by an act of nature over which it has no control. DMA is concerned about the precedent that would be set by payment of claims for damages caused by acts of nature. DMA also states that they have no available state funds with which to pay the claims related to this storm, neither can it use any federal funds to cover the damages. DMA realizes that it is the usual policy of the Claims Board to charge the agency for payment of claims and states that it is in no position to absorb any non–budgeted expenses at this time.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

21. Luis A. Nieves of Winnebago, Wisconsin claims \$855.46 for return of money taken for restitution by DOC. The claimant was an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution in August 2001 when he fashioned a weapon out of the stem of his eveglasses and injured himself with that weapon. The claimant alleges that he was mentally unstable at the time and that DOC did not provide him with adequate mental health services. The claimant was charged restitution by DOC for the cost of transporting him to UW hospital and his treatment there. The claimant states that this restitution is contrary to Wisconsin Administrative Code 316 (sic). He claims that only a judge can order this type of restitution. He further claims that his injuries could have been treated at the institution and did not warrant transport to UW hospital. He also alleges that no specially trained personnel were used during his transport. The claimant requests return of the \$855.46 that was taken from his account.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The claimant's injuries were self-inflicted and his own actions caused DOC to incur additional expenses. DOC states that health services personnel at the prison assessed the claimant's injury and determined that he should be transported to the UW Hospital. DOC states that, because of the claimant's previous conduct, he had to be transported wearing an electronic monitoring device that required accompaniment by specially trained staff. DOC claims that it also incurred damages for the cost of the claimant's emergency room care and replacement of his glasses. DOC states that restitution was ordered pursuant to DOC 303.84(1)(k), Wis. Adm. Code because of the claimant's violation of the rules set forth in DOC 303.35, .45 and .58., Wis. Adm. Code. Finally, DOC points to the fact that these expenses were caused by the claimant's own actions and recommends denial of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

Patricia Richards of Racine, Wisconsin claims 22. \$200.45 for damages to an automobile parked at Kenosha Correctional Center. The claimant states that the rear windshield of her father's vehicle was smashed by a resident of the neighborhood. She states that she borrowed the car to get to work and that on January 24, 2002, when she returned to the vehicle, she discovered that someone had thrown a large piece of concrete through the rear window. She states that surveillance video of the parking lot shows a young man walking into the area, throwing the rock through the window and then running off. The claimant states that the day prior to this incident, several windows at the center were broken by a vandal. She states that she has paid for repairs to her father's vehicle and has no insurance coverage for this damage. She requests reimbursement of the cost of the repairs.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC believes that the damage to the vehicle was a result of random vandalism. DOC states that the vehicle was not in DOC's care, custody or control and that the claimant does not allege negligence by any DOC agent, officer or employee. Finally, DOC does not believe that there are any equitable grounds to pay this claim. Vandalism is an unfortunate occurrence, which, due to its commonality, requires that individuals protect themselves by obtaining insurance. DOC recommends that the claimant pursue this claim with her insurer.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

23. Jerry V. Smith of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$131.87 for damage to his vehicle allegedly incurred in the DOR parking lot. The claimant, a DOR employee, states that there was an unmarked and uncapped rebar sticking up from the grass directly behind a parking stall in the DOR lot. Claimant claims that the rebar scratched his vehicle when he backed into the parking space. Claimant states that he applied for a parking permit over a year before the DOR building was completed and that he never received a copy of an application. He states that he was never informed that he should not back into parking stalls and that there are no signs in the parking lot stating the "no backing" policy. Claimant believes that the lack of signs violates Adm 1.04, Wis. Adm. Code, which requires DOA to post signs regulating parking at state office buildings. Claimant states that since this incident, all the rebar in the parking lot has been capped with a rubber orange cover. He further alleges that DOA was negligent in using rebar to mark for snowplows, when most companies use a rubber-coated antennae which would not damage vehicles. Claimant does not have insurance coverage for his damages and requests reimbursement of the cost to repair his vehicle.

DOA, which regulates the parking lot at the DOR building, recommends denial of this claim. DOA alleges that users of state building parking lots are encouraged not to back into stalls. DOA further claims that this information is stated on the back of the Parking Permit Application. DOA states that O'Brien Trucking, Inc., put the rebar alongside the curbs of the stalls in order to assist them when snowplowing.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Member Rothschild not participating.*)

24. Joseph Steier, Jr. and Margaret Lindstrom of Oconto, Wisconsin claims \$1,027.85 for damage to truck and batteries allegedly caused by DNR employees. The claimants land was being used by the DNR to store rocks for a project at a nearby stream. The claimants state that on August 8, 2001, claimant Lindstrom witnessed DNR personnel damage their truck by hitting the vehicle with a large boulder. Claimant Lindstrom states that she went out to inspect the damage and found that three batteries stored near the truck had also been run over and damaged. The claimants state that they were told that day by DNR personnel that DNR would cover the damages and that someone would contact them within several weeks. Claimants allege that no DNR employee ever contacted them and that they began calling and leaving messages at the DNR station in Oconto Falls. Claimants state that it took over three months before they finally got a response from DNR. Claimants state that State Risk Management denied payment of their claim in January 2002. They request \$800 for repair of their truck and \$227.85 for replacement of the damaged batteries.

DNR recommends partial payment of this claim. DNR acknowledges that while loading a boulder, a DNR employee dropped it onto the ground, where it hit the claimants' truck. However, DNR does not support reimbursement for the damaged batteries. DNR claims that claimant Lindstrom gave a statement to a DNR employee, which indicated that the batteries had been run over by Jim Francis, a private contractor working on the project. DNR states that damage to the batteries was unrelated to the dropped boulder and not the fault of any DNR employees. DNR recommends payment of \$768.78, the low bid for the truck repairs. Finally, DNR points to the fact that they could have recommended subtracting the cost of painting the vehicle's right front quarter panel, since it was unpainted at the time of the incident. However, DNR will not do so in recognition of the claimants' cooperation in allowing the state to use their land for this project. DNR recommends that payment of \$768.78 be made from s. 20.370(4)(ma), Stats.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$1,027.85 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370 (4)(ma), Stats.

25. T & N Transfer, Inc., of Cobb, Wisconsin claims \$846.00 for damages allegedly incurred because of an error by DOT personnel. The claimant's employee, a semi driver, was stopped for a routine inspection in Iowa. The Iowa police officer checked the driver's license and was informed by the Wisconsin DOT that it was suspended. Based on this information, the officer took the driver "out of service." The claimant states that it had to incur additional expenses to send two drivers to Iowa, one to finish the delivery and one to bring the out of service driver back to Wisconsin. Because of the delay to finish the job, the claimant also lost another delivery job in the amount of \$450. Shortly after the incident, the claimant received a fax from DOT admitting that the driver's operating privileges had been suspended in error and apologizing for any inconvenience. The claimant requests reimbursement of the costs incurred because of the DOT error.

DOT recommends payment of this claim in the reduced amount of \$726.00. DOT has found negligence on the part of a DOT employee for failing to reinstate the driver's operating privileges in 1997. DOT states that it has verified with the claimant that they did not pay the \$120 in lost wages to the suspended driver and therefore recommends that the claim be reduced to \$726.00.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$846.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation s. 20.395 (5)(cq), Stats.

The Board concludes:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit and biennial program evaluation of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Wisconsin Lottery's fiscal year (FY) 1999-2000 and FY 2000-01 financial statements.

We also reviewed an incentive-based compensation program for retailers that the Wisconsin Lottery modeled after other states and implemented in January 2000. In addition to the basic commission rates, the Retailer Performance program provides up to an additional 1.0 percent of total sales as compensation to eligible retailers. The program, which provided \$3.9 million in retailer compensation in FY 2000-01, has three components: a sales incentive, winning ticket incentive, and short-term incentives for particular games or sets of games.

There is little evidence that the Retailer Performance program is effective in increasing either lottery sales or the number of retailers selling lottery tickets. Based on other states' experience, the program was projected to increase lottery sales by \$24.9 million in the 1999-2001 biennium; instead, sales decreased by \$27.2 million. The number of retailers selling Wisconsin Lottery tickets has not increased since the program's implementation. However, because several factors influence ticket sales, it is difficult to determine whether the program mitigated larger declines in sales that would have otherwise occurred.

The Retailer Performance program has increased retailer compensation costs. Before the program was implemented, retailers earned approximately 5.9 percent of Wisconsin Lottery sales. In FY 2000-01, retailers earned 7.1 percent of sales, the highest rate among seven midwestern states. As costs for retailer compensation increase, the amount of lottery proceeds available for property tax relief decreases.

The Wisconsin Lottery plans to modify the Retailer Performance program in 2003 and will likely focus more on short-term incentives, which lottery staff believe have the greatest potential to affect sales. To increase the program's effectiveness and reduce its costs, we provide recommendations such as eliminating or reducing incentive payments when retailers' overall lottery sales decline.

At its meeting April 5, 2002 the Board of regents accepted the attached report for submission to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3).

Section 36.11(22)(b), Wis. Stats., requires the Board of Regents to submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature annually on the methods each UW System institution used to disseminate information to students on sexual assault and sexual harassment.

The law requires UW System institutions to incorporate into their orientation programs for newly entering students oral and written information on sexual assault and sexual harassment, including information on: (1) sexual assault by acquaintances of the victims; (2) the legal definitions and penalties for sexual assault; (3) generally available national, state, and campus statistics on sexual assault; (4) the rights of victims; and (5) protective behaviors including methods of recognizing and avoiding sexual assault and sexual harassment. In addition, each institution must annually supply to all students enrolled in the institution printed material that includes information on all of these topics.

This law was enacted in April 1990 and this is the twelfth report to be compiled for the legislature since its enactment.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of April 2002.

On April 1, 2002 the <u>General Fund</u> balance was -\$231.1 million. This shortfall continued until April 19, 2002 when the balance reached a positive \$78.0 million. During this period, the <u>General Fund</u> balance reached a low of -\$359.8 million on April 10, 2002. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, in combination with the overall budget shortfall.

On April 1, 2002 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$3 thousand. This shortfall continued until April 12, 2002 when the balance reached a positive \$5 thousand. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of May 2002.

On May 8, 2002 the <u>General Fund</u> balance was -\$4.7 million. This shortfall continues until May 9, 2002 when the balance reached a positive \$66.5 million. The shortfall was due to the timing of revenues and expenditures, in combination with the overall budget shortfall.

On May 23, 2002 the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$1 thousand. This shortfall continued through May 31, 2002. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(dm), Wis. Stats., we have completed our first annual financial audit of the State Fair Park, which is administered by a 13-member board and is attached to the Department of Tourism for administrative purposes. We have issued an unqualified opinion on State Fair Park's fiscal year (FY) 2000-01 financial statements. We found that State Fair Park's total revenues increased 21.9 percent, from \$13.1 million in FY 1995-96 to \$15.9 million in FY 2000-01. However, total expenditures increased at a greater rate and exceeded revenues in three of the last six fiscal years. The Pettit National Ice Center's failure to make \$371,785 in rent payments contributed to a FY 2000-01 deficit, but even if all rent payments had been made, the increase in State Fair Park's expenditures still would have outpaced the increase in its revenues.

Expenditures increased largely because construction of new facilities and improvements to existing facilities increased debt service costs. From FY 1995-96 through FY 2000-01, State Fair Park incurred \$12.7 million in construction costs that will be repaid with program revenue, and its annual debt service costs increased 72.1 percent, from nearly \$1.2 million to \$2.0 million. State general purpose revenue (GPR) funded an additional \$17.1 million in construction costs, and GPR debt service payments will be approximately \$1.0 million annually through FY 2016-17. State Fair Park is assuming additional debt by undertaking an aggressive building program to renovate and replace other aging facilities. It will include a new exposition center, which is being built and will be managed by a not-for-profit corporation created by the State Fair Park Board; a renovated Milwaukee Mile grandstand; a new building known as the Wisconsin Heritage Hall, which will serve as a showcase for Wisconsin products; and the Agriculture Village, which will include new or remodeled livestock facilities.

Successful changes to fairgrounds operations and major facilities improvements may allow State Fair Park to become fore financially secure in the future. However, even though all of the new building projects except the Agriculture Village are expected to be self-supporting, debt associated with the building program may represent additional financial risk for both State Fair Park and the State. Efforts to privatize operations, such as the creation of the exposition center's not-for-profit corporation, are increasing State Fair Park's independence at the same time the State is assuming additional financial risk. Consequently, the Legislature may wish to ensure it retains adequate oversight of the State's investment in State Fair Park.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by State Fair Park staff. A response from State Fair Park is Appendix 4.

We have completed a financial audit of the Division of gaming within the Department of Administration and have issued an unqualified opinion on its budgetary-based financial statements for fiscal years (FYs) 2000-01 and 1999-2000. The Division regulates the State's racing, Indian gaming, and charitable gaming activities. Later this year, we will issue an evaluation of the Division's oversight and regulatory authority.

We note the Division's financial activity has changed significantly from prior years as a result of two events. First, the gaming compacts between the State and the 11 Native American tribes within Wisconsin were recently renegotiated. As a result, while the division received a total of \$350,000 annually in tribal regulation revenue prior to FY 1999-2000, the tribes agreed to pay an additional \$21.7 million in FY 1999-2000 and \$24.0 million in FY 2000-01. Second, a 1999 constitutional amendment requires the Division to transfer unencumbered appropriation balances related to racing and bingo operations to the Lottery Fund at year-end. In FYs 2000-01 and 1999-2000, the Division transferred a total of approximately \$6.5 million to the Lottery fund.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of June 2002.

On June 17, 2002, the **General Fund** balance was -\$727.4 million. This shortfall continued through June 30, 2002, when the cash balance closed at -\$421.9 million. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, in combination with the overall budget shortfall.

On June 1, 2002, the <u>Wisconsin Health Education Loan</u> <u>Repayment Fund</u> balance was -\$1,000. This shortfall continued until June 24, 2002, when the balance reached a positive \$6,000. During this period, the <u>Wisconsin Health</u> <u>Education Loan Repayment Fund</u> balance reached a low of -\$2,000 on June 3, 2002. The shortfall was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

At the request of the joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of the Milwaukee Metropolitan

Sewerage District. The District is a special-purpose municipal corporation that provides sewer services to the City of Milwaukee and most of Milwaukee County, as well as to all or parts of a number of municipalities in surrounding counties.

The District's \$2.3 billion sewer improvement program, including the 19.4 mile Deep Tunnel and related improvements, has significantly reduced both the number and the volume of sewer overflows, and the District has not violated the combined sewer overflow provisions of its wastewater discharge permit since 1994. However, the program has not achieved the results anticipated when it was designed. Sanitary sewer overflows continue, and more than twice the predicted number of combined sewer overflows has occurred since the Deep Tunnel began operation. Since 1994, a total of 13.2 billion gallons of untreated wastewater has been discharged into Milwaukee-area waterways because of a combination of large storms, stormwater infiltration into sewers, capacity issues in the Deep Tunnel and the District's sewers and treatment facilities, and operational policies that have exacerbated overflows. For example, a total of 107 million gallons of untreated wastewater was discharged since June 1999 during six overflows that occurred because the District's contractor had temporarily turned off Deep Tunnel pumps while switching to a lower-cost source of electricity.

The District is in the process of implementing a \$786.4 million building program that is intended to reduce sewer overflows by constructing additional wastewater capacity, increasing treatment plant capacity, and improving the performance of the sewer system. It also plans to spend \$410.0 million on watercourse improvement projects. To date, completed projects have had significantly higher costs than the District anticipated.

We found that the District's sewer system and the Deep Tunnel have reduced the amount of pollutants entering waterways, and water quality has improved within the combined sewer area. However, water quality outside the combined sewer area has not improved since 1994 because of sewer overflows and nonpoint and other pollution sources. Neither Lake Michigan nor Milwaukee-area rivers currently meet designated water quality standards specified in federal and state law.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the District's staff during the course of our audit. The District's response in Appendix 5.

As required by s. 13.94(1)(dg), Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope fiscal and compliance review of the dental clinics grant provided by the Department of Health and Family Services to the Marquette University School of Dentistry for fiscal year (FYs) 1999-2000 and 2000-01. Under this grant, Marquette University received general purpose revenue funding of \$2.8 million in each year to provide dental services to low-income individuals at clinics in various locations throughout Wisconsin.

Overall, we found Marquette University has developed and implemented adequate procedures to help ensure compliance with statutory and grant requirements. In addition, we found state funds were expended for services normally considered a part of comprehensive general dental treatments.

However, we note that because the Marquette Dental School clinics have expanded their services, and because of a change in the way that Marquette University allocates costs, dental clinic expenditures exceeded revenues by \$3.1 million in FY 1999-2000 and nearly \$4.3 million in FY 2000-01. Marquette University absorbs the deficit each year with revenue generated from other sources, such as tuition. Nevertheless, because the State provides support to Marquette University through various means, including tuition aid payments, we believe it is important that these annual deficits be monitored.

The clinics' future financial condition may be affected by three factors: the construction of a new Marquette Dental School facility the continued expansion of services, and increasing patient fees. Marquette University began construction on a new \$30 million facility in March 2001. When construction is complete, the dental clinics' operating costs will likely increase as new dental equipment is purchased and additional faculty members are hired. Within the last two years, Marquette Dental School also began providing community-based outreach services on the Oneida Indian Reservation in Green Bay and within the Elder Care Program of Dane County. Although these services and other outreach programs planned for the future allow Marquette Dental School to fulfill its community service mission and treat more patients, they do not generate revenue and, therefore, contribute to the overall clinic deficit. Marquette University staff have indicated they plan to increase clinic fees in FY 2002-03 to help offset their operating costs, but at this time, they are uncertain how much the fees will increase. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Marquette University staff during our review.

As required by s. 39.15(2), Wis. Stats., we have completed our review of the Medical College of Wisconsin, Inc., for fiscal years (FYs) 1999-2000 and 2000-01. During this biennium, state general purpose revenue funds paid to the Medical College for tuition aid totaled approximately \$8.0 million, and the Medical College received an additional \$6.7 million in general

purpose revenue for the development and operation of its family practice residency program.

Overall, we found that the Medical College was in compliance with statutory requirements related to tuition aid. Students for whom the Medical College claimed tuition aid were certified by the Higher Educational Aids board as Wisconsin residents and were eligible to receive this state aid. We also found that the Medical College gave preference in admissions to Wisconsin residents, and promoted minority student access.

However, when reviewing expenditures related to the family practice residency program, we identified \$13,420 in costs that could be considered excessive or inappropriate entertainment expenditures. Because the Medical College was not specifically prohibited from using state funds for these types of expenditures, we do not believe the Medical College can be required to repay the State for them. However, we encourage the Medical College to ensure that in the future, state-funded expenditures are reasonable, directly benefit the family practice residency program, and are consistent with general purchasing guidelines for state agencies. To ensure the reasonableness of costs, the Legislature may also wish to further define the program's objectives and allowable costs in state statutes.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff within the Medical College of Wisconsin and the Higher Educational Aids Board during our review.

We have completed a limited-scope review of the dental education contract between the State of Wisconsin and the Marquette university School of Dentistry for fiscal years (FYs) 1999-2000 and 2000-01. In each of these two years, the State provided \$1,167,000 in tuition aid to Marquette University for 100 Wisconsin residents enrolled in the undergraduate dental education program. Under 2001 Wisconsin Act 16, the per capita aid payments remain at \$11,670, but total program funding increased to \$1,342,100 in FY 2001-02 and \$1,517,100 in FY 2002-03 to enable more dental students to receive tuition aid.

Overall, we found that Marquette University was in compliance with its contract with the State and with requirements set forth in s. 39.46, Wis. Stats. During our review, we found the students for whom Marquette University claimed tuition aid were certified by the Higher Educational Aids Board as Wisconsin residents and were eligible to receive this state aid. In addition, we found that Marquette University expended state funds only for the undergraduate dental school program, gave preference in admissions to Wisconsin residents, and promoted minority enrollment.

As required by s. 229.8273(6), Wis. Stats., we have completed our first review of the Green Bay/Brown County Professional Football Stadium District's efforts to meet contracting and hiring goals for minorities and women in the Lambeau field reconstruction project. Statutes require the District to establish goals for contracts awarded to minority-owned and women-owned businesses. In addition, statutes require the contractors hired for the project to establish goals for the employment of minorities and women. To meet these objectives and facilitate the involvement of targeted businesses and individuals in the reconstruction project, the District required the creation of the Targeted Business Participation and Workforce Diversity Program. The Legislative audit Bureau is required to review these efforts on an annual basis.

Based upon our initial review, we believe that to date, the District has made a good-faith effort to meet its statutory goals. Through December 2001, measurable progress had been made toward:

- awarding 15 percent of the value of contracts that are financed by bond proceeds to minority-owned businesses, and 5 percent to women-owned businesses; and
- working to hire minorities and women related to the construction project so that 15 percent of the new employees hired specifically for the project are minority group members and 5 percent are women.

Through December 2001, a total of \$9.1 million in professional and construction contract dollars has been paid to targeted businesses. Of this amount, 13.4 percent was paid to minority-owned businesses and 3.4 percent was paid to women-owned businesses. These percentages are somewhat lower than the statutorily established goals of 15.0 percent and 5.0 percent, respectively. Of the 610 new hires working on the project 114 (18.7 percent) were minority group members, and 29 (4.8 percent) were women. This currently exceeds the statutory hiring goal for minorities and is slightly lower than the hiring foal for women.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed a financial audit of the Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes for fiscal year 2000-01, at the request of the Department of Health and Family Services. We are able to provide unqualified opinions on the Institutes' financial statements. The financial statements show that, on an accrual basis, Mendota Mental Health Institute had a net loss of \$360,835 and Winnebago Mental Health Institute had a net loss of \$502,963.

We also reviewed the Department's progress in implementing its billing and accounting system for the Institutes and improving its process for estimating revenue and receivable balances. During prior years, we reported that technical problems associated with the system resulted in significant billing and collection delays and accounting problems. The Department is taking reasonable steps to address these technical issues. However, additional direction from management may be needed to improve the timeliness and effectiveness of the Department's collection efforts. As the result of continuing concerns with the Department's process for estimating patient revenues and receivables, one-time adjustments totaling \$14.6 million were required to correct reporting errors in both Institutes' patient receivable balances.

EXECUTIVE ORDER #52

Relating to the Dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission

WHEREAS, Wisconsin identified the need to address land use, water quality, transportation and environmental issues on a regional basis more than 40 years ago by authorizing the creation of regional planning commissions;

WHEREAS, all but six of Wisconsin's 72 counties participate in multi-county regional planning commissions, which have proved to be a valuable resource for local and state government in identifying emerging trends that must be addressed through sound planning;

WHEREAS, the only counties in Wisconsin that are not included in a multi-county regional planning commission are the five counties that border on Dane County, specifically, Sauk, Dodge, Columbia, Jefferson and Rock counties;

WHEREAS, the Dane County Regional Planning Commission is the only regional planning commission in Wisconsin that serves only one county rather than a region;

WHEREAS, the Dane County Regional Planning Commission was created by 1970 Executive Order 22 by Governor Warren Knowles;

WHEREAS, the inclusion of only one county in the Dane County Regional Planning Commission led to concerns being expressed by towns and small communities in Dane County that the Commission was unfairly dominated by the urban ares of the county;

WHEREAS, these concerns have grown over time, and resulted in 1998 in adoption of resolutions by 35 communities in Dane County that invoked their right under the statutes to dissolve the Dane County Regional Planning Commission and to withdraw their communities from the jurisdiction of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission;

WHEREAS, certified copies of all 35 resolutions were filed with the Office of the Governor in August 1998 and have been found to be in proper form;

WHEREAS, efforts were made to avoid the need for dissolution by reconstituting the Dane County Regional Planning Commission through adoption of provisions in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 that changed the membership of the Commission and established a separate Task Force to review the possibility of creating a multi-county regional planning commission; **WHEREAS**, the chair of the Task Force has now reported to me by letter dated August 8, 2002, indicating that the work of the Task Force is completed, and on the basis of its review, recommending dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission;

WHEREAS, before a multi-county regional planning commission may be created to serve the six counties in South Central Wisconsin, the Dane County Regional planning Commission should be dissolved;

NOW, THEREFORE, I SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, and specifically by Section 66.0309 (15) of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby:

1. Find, pursuant to sec. 66.0309, Wis. Stats., that:

A. I have received certified copies of thirty-five (35) resolutions that recommend the dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission;

B. such Resolutions were adopted by the governing bodies of a majority of the local units in the region of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission;

C. adequate provisions have been made for the payment of the debts and outstanding expenses of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission.

2. Based on the foregoing findings, I hereby issue the following:

CERTIFICATE OF DISSOLUTION

I SCOTT McCALLUM, as Governor of the State of Wisconsin, hereby issue this Certificate of Dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission, and hereby declare, order and determine that the Dane County Regional Planning Commission shall cease to exist; this Certificate shall be effective as of and for October 1, 2002, and I:

- 1. Direct the Department of Natural Resources and other state agencies, for all purposes, to treat the communities in Dane County as if they are not part of a regional planning commission and further direct the Department of Natural Resources to assume the duties of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission in the implementation of the Federal Clean Water Act;
- 2. Create the Governor's Special Commission on Regional Planning in South Central Wisconsin (hereinafter the "Special Commission"), consisting of the County Board Chairpersons (or their designees) of the Counties of Sauk, Columbia, Dane, Rock, Jefferson and Dodge, and one representative of municipal government from each of the listed counties;

- 3. Direct that the Special Commission shall be chaired by Mark Bugher, Director, UW Research Park;
- 4. Provide that the Special Commission shall have the following mission: To meet regularly in the fall of 2002 and report to me no later than November 1, 2002 with a plan stating the conditions under which a regional planning commission that includes these six counties may be created, said Special Commission to solicit input and views of local units in the six-county region; and
- 5. Provide that the Special Commission shall dissolve when its final report is accepted by the Governor.

As requested by the Public Service Commission (PSC), we have completed a financial audit of the Universal Service Fund, which was established to ensure that all state residents receive essential telecommunications services and have access to advanced telecommunications capabilities. Our audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the Fund's financial statements and related notes for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001 and 2000.

The Universal Service Fund is funded through assessments of telecommunications providers, which totaled \$19.6 million in fiscal year (FY) 2000-01. The largest program supported by the fund is the Educational Telecommunications Access Program, which is administered by the Technology for Educational Achievement (TEACH) Board. During FY 2000-01, \$10.5 million, or 59.4 percent of total fund expenditures, was spent on

subsidies and grants for data lines and video links for schools, libraries, and others under this program.

Other programs supported by the Fund are operated by the PSC. Historically, expenditures for these programs have been significantly less than annual program budgets. For example, in FY 1999-2000, the budget for PSC-operated programs was \$8.0 million, but expenditures totaled only \$2.7 million. Although expenditures increased 69.3 percent during FY 2000-01 as the result of the implementation of new programs, modification of existing programs, and increased outreach efforts, PSC expenditures and outstanding encumbrances totaling \$5.8 million were less than the budget of \$6.9 million during FY 2000-01. As the result of recent legislation, the PSC may not assess nor than \$5.0 million in FY 2003-04, and \$6.0 million in FY 2004-05 and each year thereafter for PSC-operated programs.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff at the PSC, TEACH, and the Fund's administrator, Williams Young, LLC, during the audit.

We have completed an evaluation of the full-time open enrollment program, as directed by s. 13.94(11), Wis. Stats. Under the program, students may apply to attend school in any K-12 public school district in the state, regardless of whether they live in that district. Families of students who transfer from their local district do not pay tuition. However, a local district loses state aid for each student who transfers to another district and gains state aid for each student who transfers from another district.

In the 2001-02 school year 9,457 students, or 1.1 percent of all public school students, participated in the program. Although participation increased significantly during the first four years of the program, it is still too early to determine whether public schools have improved as a result of district competition to retain and attract students. Few districts report developing new or innovative programs in response to the program, perhaps because most school districts gained or lost 20 students or less. Similarly, fiscal effects of the program have been limited to those districts that experienced significant participation. In 2001-02, 308 of 426 school districts in Wisconsin had net gains or losses of less than \$75,000.

Although parental satisfaction with the program appears to be high, several issues related to open enrollment pose challenges for the program's future. First, the Legislature may wish to carefully consider the costs associated with funding the education of home-schooled students under proposals for on-line virtual schools that accept students from across the state. In addition, school district staff are concerned about the increasing administrative burden of processing open enrollment transfer applications, and program rules related to special education are under federal review.

We appreciate the cooperation and courtesy extended to us by the department of Public Instruction management and staff. The response from the Superintendent of Public Instruction is Appendix 4.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of July 2002.

On July 1, 2002, the **General Fund** cash balance closed at negative \$381.8 million. This negative balance continued through July 31, 2002, when the balance closed at negative \$616.7 million. The **General Fund** cash balance reached a low of negative \$835.8 million on July 25, 2002. The negative balance was due to the overall budget shortfall, in combination with the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On July 22, 2002, the **<u>Common School Income Fund</u>** cash balance closed at negative \$0.4 million. This negative balance continued until July 31, 2002, when the balance reached a positive \$0.2 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and the Common School Income Fund negative cash balances were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Honorable, The Legislature:

At the request of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed a review of Milwaukee County government. Milwaukee County includes 19 cities and villages and is Wisconsin's largest county, with a population of 940,164. In 2002, it budgeted for 7,082.7 full-time equivalent positions to provide government services through 26 departments. Expenditures for 2002 are estimated to be \$1.1 billion.

Changes to retirement benefits for county employees that were enacted in November 2000 have raised questions about the adequacy of oversight for the Milwaukee County Employees' Retirement System. Enhanced retirement benefits are currently estimated to increase retirement benefit cost by \$53.5 million for the four-year period covered by the current wage and benefit package. We analyzed several options for improving control and accountability over decisions pertaining to pension benefits, including participation in the Wisconsin Retirement System, other restructuring options, increased state control, improvements to county activities such as the preparation of fiscal notes, and separating pension changes from other wage and benefit negotiations.

We also identified areas for improvement and efficiencies in county board procedures, the county's budgeting and hiring process, and information technology. For example, Milwaukee County does not budget for its employees' accumulated sick leave payments, and from January 1 through August 9, 2002, it spent \$5.6 million for these payments because of a large number of retirements. We have included a recommendation for Milwaukee County to more accurately budget for the cost of accumulated employee sick leave at the time of retirement.

Finally, we have identified areas for potential consolidation of services within the Department of Parks, and we have suggested that the Sheriff's Department recover more of its costs for providing security and traffic control services at special events and that the county seek additional private support for the zoo and its arts and cultural facilities.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Milwaukee County staff and the assistance provided by the Milwaukee County Department of Audit. The response of the Milwaukee County Executive is in the appendix.

The Wisconsin Land Council (WLC) and the Wisconsin Land Information Board (WLIB) are submitting the attached *Report* to the Governor and Legislature in compliance with the provisions of s. 16.023 (2), Wis. Stats., and 1997 Act 27, Section 9101 (11m).

This Report details WLIB and WLC statutory charges and accomplishments, documents benefits, recommends future directions and functions to continue progress on the statutory charges, and, notes areas of common interests between the WLIB and WLC. It also details impacts of the WLIB sunset and WLC sunset, provides alternatives to the sunsets and concludes with the WLC and WLIB recommendations for continuing the functions past the September 1, 2003, sunset. A brief Summary is included at the beginning of the Report.

From their examinations, the WLIB and WLC determined that important work remains to be done and agreed that their functions need to continue beyond the September 1, 2003, sunset. The WLIB and WLC strongly support maintaining the current distribution of funding for operations and local aids.

The WLC and the WLIB studied and vigorously discussed the feasibility of combining their functions but did not reach consensus on a recommendation. The WLIB vote to combine their functions failed on a 6-6 vote. The WLIB subsequently voted 7-5 to recommend lifting the sunsets of the WLIB and WLC and preserve the continuity of both bodies. The Wisconsin Land Council voted 15-1 to sunset the WLIB and WLC and combine current WLIB and WLC statutory responsibilities and functions under one new entity with three statutorily defined working groups.

The WLC and WLIB would like to express their appreciation for the opportunity to examine their charges and accomplishments, reevaluate activities and future directions, and, provide the Legislature and the Governor with their recommendations. We are pleased to forward this Report for your consideration.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 57

Relating to an amendment of Executive Order No. 52

WHEREAS, Wisconsin identified the need to address land use, water quality, transportation and environmental issues on a regional basis more that 40 years ago by authorizing the creation of regional planning commissions; and

WHEREAS, all but six of Wisconsin's 72 counties participate in multi-county regional planning commissions, which have proven to be a valuable resource for local and state government in identifying emerging trends that must be addressed through sound planning; and

WHEREAS, the only counties in Wisconsin that are not included in a multi-county regional planning commission are the five counties that border Dane County, specifically, Sauk, Dodge, Columbia, Jefferson and Rock counties; and

WHEREAS, the Dane County Regional Planning Commission is the only regional planning commission in Wisconsin that serves only one county rather than a region; and

WHEREAS, the Dane County Regional Planning Commission was created by 1970 Executive Order 22 by Governor Warren Knowles; and

WHEREAS, the inclusion of only one county in the Dane County Regional Planning Commission led to concerns being expressed by towns and small communities in Dane County that the Commission was unfairly dominated by the urban areas of the county; and

WHEREAS, these concerns have grown over time, and resulted in the 1998 adoption of resolutions by 35 communities in Dane County that invoked their right under the statutes to dissolve the Dane County Regional Planning Commission and to withdraw their communities from the jurisdiction of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, certified copies of all 35 resolutions were filed with the Office of the Governor in August 1998 and have been found to be in proper form; and

WHEREAS, upon receipt of the petitions from a majority of the municipalities in the region and on the finding that adequate provisions have been made for the payment of the debts and outstanding expenses for the regional planning commission the Governor is mandated to dissolve the commission; and

WHEREAS, in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, section 9158(8w)(e) the Legislature directed that the Dane Count

Regional Planning Commission would be dissolved at the latest on October 1, 2002; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, section 9121(1w) directed the Governor to appoint a task force to study and make recommendations regarding the creation of a multi-county regional planning commission to replace the Dane County Regional Planning Commission after its dissolution; and

WHEREAS, the chair of the Task Force has now reported to me by letter dated August 8, 2002, indicating that the work of the Task Force is completed, and on the basis of its review, recommended dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, I found that adequate provisions have been made for the payment of the debts and outstanding expenses of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission and that these provisions were not clearly understood by some individuals; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I SCOTT McCALLUM, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of this State, do hereby:

Reiterate that adequate provisions have been made for the payment of the debts and outstanding expenses of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission and list those provisions below.

1.In 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 the Legislature made provisions for the dissolution of the Dane County Regional Planning Commission.

2. Those provisions were, "All unexpended funds of the commission on that date [date of dissolution] shall be applied to any outstanding indebtedness of the commission. If any outstanding indebtedness of the commission remains after the application of the unexpended funds to such debts, the remaining indebtedness shall be assessed to Dane County. If the commission has no outstanding indebtedness and has unexpended funds, such funds shall be returned to the cities, villages, towns or county that supplied them."

3.I found the plan, which was accepted by the Legislature, to be an adequate plan for any debts or funds of the Commission.

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2002. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40(3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$53.8 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$181.3 million lower than the \$235.1 million estimate that was projected in the final Chapter 20 fund condition statement. The lower balance was the result of lower than expected tax revenues.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$10.020 billion compared to \$10.063 billion in the prior year, a decrease of \$43 million or

0.4 percent. This decrease is the result of reductions in income tax rates and other changes to state tax laws made in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9 combined with a general slowdown in the economy. General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$11.259 billion compared to \$11.078 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$181.0 million or 1.6 percent.

General-purpose revenue spending increases in fiscal year 2002 were largely driven by increases in three areas: School Aids increased by \$139.6 million (3.2 percent), Medical Assistance increased by \$77.3 million (7.8 percent), and Corrections increased by \$14.9 million (1.9 percent) overall.

In fiscal year 2002, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 60.3 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 16.8 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 8.6 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 14.3 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2002. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of August 2002.

On August 1, 2002, the **General Fund** cash balance closed at a monthly low balance of negative \$682.2 million. The negative balance continued through August 31, 2002, when the balance closed at a negative \$151.6 million. The negative balance was due to the overall budget shortfall, in combination with the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On August 1, 2002, the <u>Common School Income Fund</u> cash balance closed at a monthly low balance of negative \$0.2 million. This negative balance continued until August 5, 2002, when the balance reached a positive \$1.2 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On August 15, 2002, the **Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund** cash balance closed at a monthly low balance of negative \$4 thousand. This negative balance continued until August 27, 2002, when the balance reached a positive \$11 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, the Common School Income Fund, and the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund negative cash balances were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Board Finds:

1. Donald W. Smith of Madison, Wisconsin claims \$31,214.08 for the value of sick leave credits for which he was not eligible due to his retirement date. The claimant served as an assistant attorney general for 26 years. He retired in August 1996 because of health problems. He states that he tried to put off his retirement as long as possible because he knew that the legislature was considering an increase in the amount of sick leave credits that could be converted to pay health insurance premiums after retirement. However, negotiations for the new contract, which would include the increased sick leave credit provision, went far beyond the contract expiration date of June 1995. The claimant states that he was an active member of the Wisconsin State Attorneys Association (WSAA) when the contract expired. In light of his many years of service to the state, the claimant asks that he be awarded the value of the extra sick leave credits.

DETF does not believe it is appropriate to advise the Claims Board on the payment of this claim, since the board does not have the authority to make any payment from DETF funds. This claim relates to the sick leave accrual provisions in the 1997–1999 contract with the WSAA. The contract took effect on December 29, 1997, but provided for retroactive application to July 6, 1997. The claimant, however, retired eleven months prior to the retroactive date. DETF states that the claimant has no legal grounds for relief but appears to be basing his request on his years of service to the state.

DOJ states that, although it sympathizes with the claimant's health concerns and appreciates his many years of service, it cannot recommend payment of this claim. Based on the provisions of the contract, which only provided retroactive benefits to July 1997, DOJ correctly calculated the claimant's accrued sick leave at the time of his retirement.

At the request of DETF, DER concurs with DETF's analysis of the claimant's ineligibility for increased sick leave earnings. DER believes that the negotiated contract with WSAA did not permit retroactive benefits to the claimant and that the claim does not have merit based on the claimant's retirement date.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Member Shibilski* dissenting. Member Lee not participating.)

2. John Komassa of Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin claims \$5,368.73 for attorney fees related to his employment at the Nevin State Fish Hatchery. The claimant states that his duties at the hatchery include keeping the premises free from all animals because they can spread disease to the hatchery's fish or fish eggs. On November 19, 2001, the claimant noticed a stray cat in the fish hatchery building. The claimant states that the cat was unkempt, did not have tags and appeared to be feral. The claimant states that he was bitten in his initial attempt to catch the cat. The bite punctured the skin on the claimant's hand, despite the fact that he had put on heavy work gloves. The claimant states that he realized that he would be at risk for rabies

and that the cat would have to be caught and killed in order for it to be tested. Unable to capture the animal alive, the claimant struck the cat with a metal object, which resulted in its death. The Dane County District Attorney subsequently charged him with mistreatment of an animal. The claimant contacted the DNR to obtain legal representation but was informed that, because he was charged with a crime, the state could not provide representation. The claimant obtained his own attorney at a cost of \$5,338.39 to defend himself against the charges, which were eventually dismissed. The claimant believes that he was performing his duties and that his actions were appropriate to the situation and requests reimbursement for his attorney's fees.

DNR recommends payment of this claim. The claimant had been instructed by his supervisor to take whatever measures necessary to keep the hatchery disease-free and to keep all animals out of the premises. At other hatcheries, disease outbreaks have required destruction of fish causing monetary losses of tens of thousands of dollars. The claimant contacted the Fitchburg Police Department for assistance in getting the animal tested for rabies. The Fitchburg Police referred the claimant to the Dane County Humane Society. It was the Human Society that pressed the Dane County Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney to file against the claimant. DNR was not able to provide the claimant with representation because he was charged with a crime and the claimant had to borrow money to pay for an attorney. The DA's office dismissed the charges against the claimant without comment on March 22, 2002. DNR points to the fact that until this time the claimant was the subject of a mean spirited hate-mail campaign and that his case was the subject of much media attention, including newspaper articles and radio talk shows. Throughout this incident, DNR believes that the claimant behaved professionally and, to his credit, declined to take part in the heated public debate surrounding his case. DNR feels that the claimant did not deserve to be prosecuted for simply trying to do his job and that he should not have to bear the cost of defending himself for an act that was not criminal and which was in the best interest of the state.

The Board concludes that a reasonable attorney's fee is \$200 per hour and therefore the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$4530.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370 (4)(mu), Stats.

3. Lynn Kirschbaum of Glen Haven, Wisconsin claims \$14,370.00 for crop damage caused by deer. The claimant states that his property adjoins property where the landowners do not allow sufficient hunting to adequately control the deer population. The claimant alleges that deer from these neighboring properties have been causing significant damage to his corn crop for many years. The claimant states that from 1995 through 2000, he did participate in the Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claim Program (WDACP). He alleges that the program only paid for a portion of his damages and that it took too long to get the money. He also states that he had problems with the hunters that he was forced to allow onto his land under the program and that the hunters would only shoot bucks, not does, which did not sufficiently impact the deer population. Because of his dissatisfaction with the WDACP, he decided not to participate in the program in 2001. He alleges that he made numerous requests to DNR for assistance but that they were unwilling to cooperate because he had not signed up for the WDACP.

DNR recommends denial of this claim. DNR does not dispute that deer have caused damage to the claimant's crops. However, DNR states that it is not responsible for the individual acts of wild animals and points to the fact that there is no right under common law to compensation for deer damage. DNR points to the fact that there was previous statutory authority for payment for certain damages done by deer, however, that statutory program was repealed in 1980. DNR states that this statutory authority was replaced by the WDACP, which is a voluntary program administered by the counties. The DNR points to the fact that the claimant has participated in this program in the past and has received substantial payments for his damages under the program. DNR states that the claimant has also been issued permits to shoot deer causing damage to his property. DNR states that the claimant decided not to participate in the WDACP in 2001; he apparently decided to deal with the problem by leasing hunting rights on his property. DNR believes that the claimant was apparently not satisfied with the results of this attempt and is now trying to collect payment, despite the fact that he has not filed the statutorily required notice under the WDACP. DNR also suggests to the board that there would be large numbers of potential claimants in similar situations as Mr. Kirschbaum. Finally, DNR points to the fact that the Claims Board has denied numerous similar claims in the past. DNR does not believe that this claim is different from those that were previously denied and believes that there is no equitable reason to pay his claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

4. Meer Electric, Inc., of Richfield, Wisconsin claims \$8,713.95 for damages allegedly relating to a contract for classroom renovations at UW-Milwaukee. The claimants did not include the cost of concrete cutting and patching in their bid for this project. The claimants allege that they told Mitch Hyra from the Division of Facilities Development (DFD) that their bid price did not include the cutting and patching costs. The claimants state that when they received the contract for signature, there was no indication in the contract that the cost of concrete cutting and patching was not included. The claimants state that, on the advice of their attorney, they typed additional language on the contract indicating that this work was not included. The claimants allege that when they returned the amended contract to DFD, the state signed the contract without comment. The claimants believe that this indicates that the state accepted the additional language. The claimants state that, after the project was started, the state told them that they had to perform the concrete cutting and patching work or lose the contract. The claimants hired the general contractor to perform the work. The claimants have tried to receive additional payment for this work from DFD but their requests have been denied.

DOA recommends denial of this claim. DFD points to the fact that the claimants admit that they omitted the concrete cutting and patching work in their bid. DFD alleges that the claimants added unsolicited language to the contract, which altered the provisions of the contract, without calling the change to the state's attention. DFD states that the alteration was not apparent and was not discovered until after the state had signed the contract. DFD states that, when it discovered the modification in the contract, it immediately contacted the claimants. DFD claims that it informed the claimants that the state could treat the situation as a bid error or the claimants would need to perform the work without alteration to the original bid price. The contractor chose to do the work at the bid price but would now like to be reimbursed. DFD believes that it cannot condone the claimants' behavior and therefore requests that the Claims Board support DFD's previous denials of this claim.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$5,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Administration appropriation s. 20.866 (2)(z), Stats. (*Member Rothschild not participating.*)

5. Michael Barnhardt of Waukesha, Wisconsin claims \$3,590.21 for return of money garnished from his wages to satisfy estimated income tax assessments for the years 1983–1986 and 1988–1989. The claimant states that he owed no taxes for those years and would have received refunds in the amount of \$415 if he had filed his tax returns. He realizes that he should have filed and is not requesting payment of the refunds but feels that the \$3,590.21 garnished from his wages is an excessive penalty to pay, especially considering the fact that the state was offering an amnesty program at the time it was garnishing his wages. The claimant states that he never intended to defraud the state. He further claims that it was very difficult for him to resolve this dispute with DOR because he was traveling out of state on business and DOR has no 1-800 telephone number. The claimant believes that the amount garnished by DOR was excessive considering the fact that he owed no taxes for the years in question and he requests return of that money.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that department sent the claimant a request to file the income tax returns in July 1991 but that no response was received. DOR therefore issued estimated assessments in October 1991. DOR states that the claimant called the department in May of 1994 and that he was told at that time that he needed to file the returns. DOR states that it received no returns and therefore began certification of the claimant's wages in February 1997. DOR records indicate that the claimant again contacted the department in March and April of 1998 and that he was again informed of the need to file the returns to resolve the issue. DOR states that on April 30, 1998, the claimant alleged that he had filed the returns but that DOR informed him that no returns had been received. DOR records indicate that the returns were received on September 23, 1998. DOR requested additional information for two of the returns in September and October 1998 and certification of the claimant's wages ended in November 1998.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

6. Cabinet Country, Ltd., of Janesville, Wisconsin claims \$31.00 for bank fees related to an electronic withdrawal from its bank account made by DOR. A taxpayer attempting to make a payment to DOR by electronic transfer submitted their Federal Employer Identification Number to DOR, however, they transposed several numbers, resulting in the electronic transfer being taken from the claimant's bank account in error. The claimant believes that DOR should have corroborated the information prior to making the transfer. Although DOR refunded the money taken from the claimant for the \$31 in overdraft fees charged by the claimant's bank. The claimant requests reimbursement for these fees.

DOR recommends payment of this claim. As soon as DOR determined that an error had occurred, they reimbursed the funds taken from the claimant's account. However, DOR does not have the statutory ability to reimburse the claimant for the fees and recommends that the Claims Board does so.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the amount of \$31.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566 (1)(a), Stats.

7. Don Charles Dietz of Lakeview, Arkansas claims \$398.36 plus interest for money levied from the his account to satisfy an assessment based on a DOR adjustment to his 1986 income tax return. The claimant states that he paid \$5,000 for equipment to the Maid Rite Corp., but that the equipment was never delivered. The claimant alleges that Maid Rite sent him a \$5,000 refund check, which bounced. He states that he deducted the \$5,000 bad check on his 1986 federal and state tax returns. He states that the deduction was allowed by the IRS but not allowed by DOR. The claimant alleges that he sent a copy of the bad check to DOR in 1987. He also alleges that DOR agents have repeatedly told him, both in writing and during phone conversations that the deduction was allowable but that they were going after him anyway because he "could afford to pay." He believes that DOR agents have a personal vendetta against him and states that no one from DOR has ever explained to him why the \$5,000 deduction was not allowed. He also believes that DOR personnel improperly disclosed his personal financial information to a third party. He requests return of the \$398.86 taken from his account, plus 12% interest from 1986.

DOR believes that this claim should be denied. DOR states that it made adjustments to the claimant's 1986 taxes, adding back \$392 in additional income and disallowing the \$5,000 bad debt deduction. DOR states that, under Wisconsin law, a debt is not considered a deductible "bad debt" until it is proven to be uncollectible. DOR states that the claimant provided no proof that he had made appropriate attempts to collect the \$5,000 from Maid Rite and that those attempts had been unsuccessful. Based on the adjustments, DOR issued an assessment for \$398.86 in May 1989. The assessment was due July 31, 1989, and DOR records indicate that no timely appeal was filed by the claimant. (An assessment for \$227.47 relating to the claimant's 1985 taxes was also made at the same time, disallowing a duplicate \$2,000 IRA deduction, which the claimant claimed on both his federal and state taxes. The claimant does not dispute the 1985 adjustment.) DOR states that it has communicated with the claimant for over 13 years, responding to more than 25 letters and numerous e-mails from him. DOR further alleges that in his correspondence, the claimant made it clear that he had no intention of ever paying the assessments. DOR states that after many unsuccessful collection attempts (including the use of an out of state collection agency) the department was finally able to levy an account of the claimant's in 2001. DOR took \$1,384.57 to satisfy the 1986 assessment (and \$790.17 for the 1985 assessment). DOR records indicate that it extended the due date for the levy in order to give the claimant time to file a petition for compromise but that he repeatedly submitted incomplete forms and never demonstrated in his petition any inability to pay the assessments. DOR eventually levied the account in December 2001. DOR did reduce the interest charged on the assessments from 18% to 12% and refunded \$464.61 to the claimant. DOR states that the adjustments made to the claimant's 1986 return were correct under Wisconsin law and believes that there is no basis for payment of this claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Members Albers, Lee, Rothschild and Shibilski dissenting.*)

8. HGM Architecture, Inc., of Oshkosh, Wisconsin claims \$3,608.58 for elimination of interest and penalties assessed on its late filed withholding tax. The claimant states that from September 1996 through December 1999, its employee,

Kathryn Eisenreich, embezzled funds from the claimant. The claimant states that Ms. Eisenreich used the state tax withholding funds to cover up her theft and that she also hid mail from DOR and paid the penalties interest incurred on late filings. The embezzlement was discovered and Ms. Eisenreich was convicted. She requested a court hearing to attempt to get her restitution amount lowered. The court set a preliminary restitution amount but provided that the amount would be reduced should the state decide to reduce the interest and penalties charged to the claimant. The court instructed the claimant to come before the Claims Board and request such a reduction. The claimant requests elimination of the penalties and interest assessed by DOR.

DOR does not object to partial payment of this claim. DOR states that the claimant is no longer able to recover money from DOR relating to this incident because of the two–year statute of limitations under s. 71.75(5), Stats. DOR further states that, if the claimant had filed a claim for refund within the two–year time limit, DOR would have reduced the interest and refunded the penalties charged against the claimant. Because of the circumstances, DOR does not object to a refund of the penalties and a reduction of the interest from 18% to 12%. DOR calculations show that this would result in a \$1,560.09 refund to the claimant. DOR is unable to refund this money because of the statute of limitations but would not object to payment of this amount by the Claims Board.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of 1,560.09 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Revenue appropriation s. 20.566 (1)(a), Stats.

9. Mary E. Redlinger of Glendale, Wisconsin claims \$584.01 for return of overpayment for a 1997 tax liability. The claimant states that she filed an amended 1997 tax return in September 2001, which reduced the amount of tax that she owed for her 1997 taxes. The claimant alleges that she has had financial difficulty because the state has been late or inconsistent in sending her alimony payments, which are garnished from her ex-husband's paychecks. The claimant states that DOR garnished her paychecks for the 1997 liability but that her amended return resulted in an overpayment of \$584.01. The claimant asserts that, contrary to DOR's assertions, section 71.75(5), Stats., does not apply to her overpayment. The claimant believes that s. 71.75 applies only to the return of tax refunds, not to the return of money overpaid on a tax liability. The claimant states that she was never due a tax refund on her 1997 taxes; her amended return only reduced the amount of tax that she owed, but she still owed taxes. Since she is not requesting return of any tax refund, she does not believe that the two-year limit in s. 71.75 applies to her claim.

DOR recommends denial of this claim. DOR records indicate that on April 8, 1998, the claimant filed her 1997 tax returns, showing a tax due of \$2,911.00, but that no payment was submitted with the return. DOR sent a bill to the claimant several weeks later but no payment was received. DOR sent the claim to collections on June 5, 1998. In August 1998 the claimant entered into an installment agreement but failed to make any payments. The claimant later filed bankruptcy but the tax debt was not dischargeable under the bankruptcy filing. After dismissal of the bankruptcy, DOR again attempted to collect the debt by certifying the claimant's wages. The claimant asked for and was again granted an installment agreement, but she again failed to ever make any payments on the debt. DOR again began certification of her wages on September 14, 2000. On September 19, 2001, the claimant filed an amended 1997 return. The amended return changed the claimant's tax liability from \$2,911 to \$1,586, a reduction of \$1,325. All monies overpaid by the claimant were refunded to her, with the exception of \$585.01, which was not refundable under s. 71.75(5), Stats. DOR states that this statute does apply to the claimant's situation because it prohibits DOR from returning any money that was collected on the original assessment no refund was claimed within the prescribed two-year period.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

10. Carolyn Carty of Spokane, Washington claims \$5,122.99 for damages allegedly incurred due to negligence by the Department of Corrections. The claimant, a former Madison resident, alleges that DOC failed to adequately notify the Madison public that Jeffrey Jackson, a paroled sex-offender, had absconded from his halfway house. The claimant alleges that Mr. Jackson was at large for four days before the public was warned that he was in the area. The claimant states that she met Mr. Jackson at a Labor Ready job center and that, unaware of his status as an escapee, she invited him to stay in her home. The claimant states that she felt sorry for Mr. Jackson because he claimed to be homeless and out of work. The claimant states that she is particularly vulnerable to victimization by individuals such as Mr. Jackson because of prior sexual assaults that left her both mentally and physically disabled. The claimant states that, because of DOC's alleged failure to warn the Madison public, she was unaware that Mr. Jackson was an armed and dangerous individual. The day after Mr. Jackson stayed with the claimant and her son, her son saw a news report about Mr. Jackson's status as an escaped parolee. The claimant alleges that this caused her great personal trauma to the extent that she longer felt safe in Madison and was compelled to to move back to her home state of Washington. She believes that DOC failed to adequately notify the public and requests reimbursement for her costs to move to Washington.

DOC believes that this claim should be denied. DOC points to the fact that the claimant willingly invited a complete stranger into her home and is therefore solely responsible for any alleged trauma she suffered from being exposed to Mr. Jackson. DOC states that the claimant has provided no evidence that DOC in any way failed in its duties to provide notice of Mr. Jackson's escape. Mr. Jackson absconded from his halfway house at 11:46 AM on April 6, 2001. DOC records indicate that by 12:12 PM on April 6, it had issued an apprehension order for Mr. Jackson and had notified the Madison Police Department by 12:39 PM. DOC also issued a second apprehension order on April 9. Mr. Jackson was apprehended on the morning of April 10. The claimant alleges that this incident forced her to move, however, statements made by Mr. Jackson after his arrest indicate that the claimant had told him she was planning on renting her apartment because she needed money to "get out of town." DOC points to the fact that the claimant admits that Mr. Jackson never threatened or injured her and that at no point while he was in her home did she ever feel endangered. DOC believes that it is clear that the claimant has suffered no actual harm from her encounter with Mr. Jackson. The claimant chose to invite a stranger into her home, a choice she later regretted. DOC does not believe that it should be held responsible for the claimant's own error in judgment.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

11. Jason Marshall of Spokane, Washington claims \$5,000.00 for damages allegedly incurred due to negligence by the Department of Corrections. The claimant is the fiancé of

Carolyn Carty, who has also filed a claim relating to this incident. The claimant, a former Madison resident, alleges that DOC failed to adequately notify the Madison public that Jeffrey Jackson, a paroled sex-offender, had absconded from his halfway house. The claimant alleges that Mr. Jackson was at large for four days before the public was warned that he was in the area. The claimant states that Ms. Carty met Mr. Jackson at a Labor Ready job center and that, unaware of his status as an escapee, she invited him to stay in her home. The claimant states that, because of DOC's alleged failure to warn the Madison public, Ms. Carty was unaware that Mr. Jackson was an armed and dangerous individual. The claimant alleges that Ms. Carty's encounter with Mr. Jackson caused her great personal trauma to the extent that she no longer felt safe in Madison and was compelled to move back to her home state of Washington. The claimant accompanied Ms. Carty back to Washington. He believes that DOC failed to adequately notify the public and requests reimbursement for his costs to move to Washington.

DOC believes that this claim should be denied. DOC points to the fact that Ms. Carty willingly invited a complete stranger into her home and is therefore solely responsible for any alleged trauma caused by her contact with Mr. Jackson. DOC also believes it is noteworthy that none of the police reports, probation and parole records, or news accounts relating to this event ever mentioned the claimant's name. Based on his own statements, the claimant never even met Mr. Jackson. DOC believes that it is clear that the claimant has suffered no harm from the incident involving Ms. Carty and Mr. Jackson. DOC states that the claimant has provided no evidence that DOC in any way failed in its duty to provide notice of Mr. Jackson's escape. Mr. Jackson absconded from his halfway house at 11:46 AM on April 6, 2001. DOC records indicate that by 12:12 PM on April 6, it had issued an apprehension order for Mr. Jackson and had notified the Madison Police Department by 12:39 PM. DOC also issued a second apprehension order on April 9. Mr. Jackson was apprehended on the morning of April 10. DOC believes that none of its actions affected the claimant personally and that the claimant has provided no evidence of negligence by DOC. If the claimant believes he should be reimbursed for his moving expenses, he should be asking Ms. Carty to reimburse him, not the State of Wisconsin.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

12. Alphoncy Dangerfield of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$1,126.44 for property allegedly improperly destroyed by DOC. The claimant was transferred from Oshkosh Correction Institution (OCI) to Columbia Correctional Institution (CCI). During the move, some of his personal property was designated as contraband and confiscated. The claimant states that he was told that his property would be sent to him at CCI within a month after the move. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint when he did not receive his property. He states that the Complaint Examiner found that his property had been incorrectly designated as contraband and should be returned to him, however, the property had been destroyed and was therefore not returned. The claimant does not believe that his court dismissals have any bearing on his claim because they were based on filing technicalities and, therefore, the case was not judged on its merits. The claimant alleges that his missing property included books, shoes, a calendar, photos, magazines, and an 800-page transcript that would cost him \$1,000 to replace.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC records indicate that the claimant was told to pack his personal

belongings prior to being transferred to CCI but that he refused to do so. DOC states that the claimant was informed that if he failed to pack his property, it would be confiscated and treated as contraband. The claimant continued to refuse to pack his property, therefore, OCI staff packed his property and confiscated it. The property was ultimately destroyed. DOC states that the claimant has already pursued the appropriate avenues for recourse. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint and the Complaint Examiner did find that, although the claimant acted inappropriately in refusing to pack his belongings, the property should not have been designated as contraband. The claimant has filed several small claims actions in Winnebago County, which were dismissed because the claimant failed to file properly. The claimant later filed a motion for a trial de novo, which was granted. The Court granted DOC's motion to dismiss for lack of jurisdiction in May 2000. The claimant filed an appeal, which was dismissed because he failed to pay filing fees. DOC believes that the claimant has exhausted his administrative remedies and attempted to bring his case to court. DOC believes that the Claims Board should not overlook the claimant's failure to properly bring his case in court. Finally, DOC points to the fact that in April 2000, it provided the claimant with a copy of the missing court transcript, a fact which the claimant neglects to mention when he requests payment of \$1,000 for the cost of replacing the same transcript. DOC believes that the claimant's failure to be forthright and his failures in court warrant denial of his claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

13. Myron Edwards of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$853.20 for the cost of a transcript allegedly lost by DOC. The claimant, an inmate at Green Bay Correctional Institution (GBCI), was transferred to Supermax Correctional Institution (SMCI) in early 2002. He alleges that when his property arrived at SMCI in March, the copy of his trial transcripts, which had been sent to him by the Public Defender's Office, was missing, along with some other items. He states that shortly thereafter, the Public Defender's Office asked him to provide the transcript, which they needed in connection with his appeal. The claimant filed a complaint with the Inmate Complaint System, which was eventually dismissed in June 2002. The claimant states that he cannot afford to pay for another copy of the transcript, which would cost \$0.40 per page. The claimant refutes the DOC's statement that he might have gotten rid of his transcript either by giving it to another inmate or mailing it out. The claimant states that the transcript would be of no use to anyone else and that if he had mailed it out, it would have required special postage, which would be documented in DOC's mail records. The claimant states that he needs a copy of the transcript in order to effectively pursue his appeals and request payment of \$853.20, the cost of obtaining another copy.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC records indicate that in August 2001 the claimant was transferred from Columbia Correctional Institution (CCI) to GBCI. At that time, the claimant's property inventory showed that he had legal materials in his property but did not specify any transcripts. At the time of his transfer to GBCI the claimant acknowledged receipt of all of his property. In January 2002, the claimant was transferred from GBCI to CCI and then to SMCI two days later. DOC records indicate that when the claimant's property was inventoried at GBCI prior to the transfers, there were no legal materials in the claimant's property. The claimant's Inmate Complaint was dismissed in June 2002. The Corrections Complaint Examiner determined that there was no evidence that DOC ever had possession of the allegedly missing transcript. (Other property reported as missing was found and returned to the claimant.) DOC records indicated that at one time prior to the transfer the claimant had some unspecified legal materials in his possession but that at the time of the transfer, no legal materials were found in the claimant's cell. DOC states that an inmate is responsible for his own property. At any time the claimant might have mailed out the transcript, thrown it out, given it to another inmate, or otherwise disposed of it, or it could have been stolen. DOC believes that there is no evidence that it has possession of the trial transcripts or was negligent in handling the claimant's property in the transfer to SMCI.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

14. Berrell Freeman claims \$45.80 for for cost of photos allegedly lost or stolen by DOC personnel. The claimant is an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution. He alleges that, on December 20, 2001, a Corrections Officer confiscated 45 photographs from his cell and told the claimant that they would be placed in his property box. He claims that on December 26, 2001, when he was going through his property box, he discovered that someone else's photographs were in his box and that his 45 photos were missing. The claimant states that he purchased the photos in October and submits copies of two disbursement requests as proof that he purchased the pictures. The claimant also submits as evidence a statement from a fellow inmate, Ronald C. Jackson, indicating that Mr. Jackson's photos had been found in the claimant's property box. The claimant states that the property box was at all times in the possession of DOC. The claimant states that DOC 306.15 and 306.16 require that DOC reimburse him for any property that they damage during a search of his cell. He requests reimbursement for the missing photographs and the cost to mail this claim.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The Inmate Complaint Review System investigated the claimant's allegations and denied his claim. The ICRS investigation found that there are numerous photos in the claimant's property box that match the description of the allegedly missing photos. DOC states that the claimant has never submitted any evidence proving that any specific photos are missing. The claimant has submitted copies of two October disbursement requests indicating the purchase of photos, however, DOC states that these receipts could be for any of the photos in the claimant's property box and in no way prove the existence of the allegedly missing property. DOC also states that the written statement provided by inmate Jackson does not prove the existence of any missing photographs. DOC does not believe that the claimant has supplied any proof of his loss and therefore recommends denial of the claim.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

15. Dennis Gonzalez of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$15.75 for cost of replacing property allegedly stolen from his cell by a DOC employee. The claimant, an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution, states that he had a copy of the DOC Administrative Code in his cell. He claims that he last used the document at the end of October and that he noticed it was missing on November 15. The claimant alleges that no one other than DOC staff has access to his cell and that DOC staff conducted a search of his cell on November 4. The claimant

further alleges that one of the officers who conducted the November 4 search has either lost or stolen the claimant's property on previous occasions. He claims that the code was taken on that date and believes that it was done to harass him and to sabotage his legal appeals.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint alleging that a DOC officer intentionally removed pages from his copy of the DOC Administrative Code. The complaint was reviewed and appealed. Both the Institution Complaint Examiner and the Reviewing Authority found no merit to the claim and noted that the claimant provided no documented evidence that the pages alleged to be taken were taken while the code was under DOC control. This decision was upheld by the DOC Secretary's Office. DOC believes that the claimant has submitted no new factual information relative to the claim that would justify the Claims Board coming to a decision contrary to the findings of DOC's Inmate Complaint Review System.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

16. Dennis Gonzalez of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$19.69 for cost of replacing items allegedly destroyed improperly by DOC. The claimant, an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution, states that he was mailed documents to be used in his court case. The documents, 1 copy of a newspaper article and 8 pages of a photocopied publication, were denied as contraband mail by the institution mailroom and were not delivered to the claimant. The claimant alleges that he submitted a memo to the institution mailroom requesting that the documents be sent to a specific individual. The claimant states that he was told the documents were mailed out but then was later told that the documents had been destroyed. The claimant does not have a receipt for the items because they were copied and sent by someone else. However, he submits a price guide from Kinko's as proof of the value of the items. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint about the issue, but DOC rejected the complaint.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The claimant filed an Inmate Complaint relating to a number of non-delivery notices he received for contraband mail. Pursuant to DOC regulations, the complaint was rejected because it dealt with multiple issues and instances. The claimant later reduced his complaint to the specific non-deliverable mail items related to this claim and the Corrections Complaint Examiner (CCE) conducted a review of the complaint on the merits. The CCE's investigation found that, although there were requests from the claimant that other items of non-deliverable mail be mailed out of the institution there was no request relating to the non-deliverable mail specifically referred to in the claimants Inmate Complaint (and this claim). DOC states that there were multiple non-delivery notices dated 12/5/01, some of which related to other mail items that are not the subject of this claim. Along with his Inmate Complaint, the claimant submitted a copy of a memo dated 12/6/02 to the institution mailroom. However, this memo requested the mailing out of documents consisting of one photocopied newspaper article and two photocopied publication pages, not one newspaper article and eight photocopied publication pages as claimed in his inmate complaint. DOC believes that this memo refers to another notice of non-deliverable mail. DOC's 12/5/01 notice of non-deliverable mail relating to this claim also contains the note that this was the second time the sender had mailed contraband to the claimant, so, DOC points out, there had obviously been a previous non-delivery notice sent to the claimant relating to items from this sender. DOC states that it did receive requests to mail out non-deliverable mail on 12/6/01 and 12/9/01, both of which related to other non-delivery notices, each for 8 pages of documents. DOC states that those requests were responded to appropriately and the documents were mailed out per the claimant's instructions. DOC states that the claimant is attempting to use requests and responses relating to non-delivery notices and non-deliverable mail that are not the subject of this claim in an attempt to deceive the Claims Board. The CCE found no evidence that they ever received a mail-out request from the claimant for the documents specifically mentioned in this claim. Because no request was received within the required time limit, the non-deliverable documents were destroyed.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

17. Dennis Gonzalez of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$78.22 for magazines and catalogs allegedly lost by DOC. The claimant is an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution. He alleges that, over the course of several months, he had a number of magazines and catalogs put in his property box, which was solely under the control of DOC personnel. He claims that these publications were unread and in mint condition. He states that he later realized that some of the publications were missing and filed a complaint with the Inmate Complaint Review System. The claimant believes he should be fully reimbursed for all of his missing property.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The Inmate Complaint Examiner's investigation found that several of the allegedly missing publications were still in the property box, several had been sent out of the institution on a visit, and several were items for which the claimant had no proof of ownership. The ICE did find that some publications were missing and the claimant was reimbursed for those items as follows: April, June and September Maxim at \$1.50 per issue = 4.50; December and January <u>FHM</u> at \$1.25 per issue = \$2.50; and Three issues of <u>Sporting News</u> at \$1.19 per issue = \$3.57; for a total reimbursement of \$10.57. It is DOC's position that the claimant has pursued the appropriate administrative review and has received the entire amount to which he is justified. DOC believes that he has provided no new evidence or legal authority that would support a determination by the Claims Board contradictory to the findings of DOC's Inmate Complaint Review System.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

18. Dennis Gonzalez of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$214.00 for value of photos allegedly taken or lost by DOC personnel. Claimant is an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution. He claims that during a cell search on 10/2/01, photos were taken from his cell because he was over the limit for such items. He states that the photos should have been put in his property box but that he later discovered that the photos were not in his property box. He states that the photos were in the sole care of DOC and that DOC is therefore responsible for their loss. He states that the missing photos comprised 20 celebrity photos, which will cost \$114 to replace, and 10 personal photos of friends and family, for which the claimant requests \$100 compensation.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. The Inmate Complaint Examiner (ICE) initially found that all of the photos had been returned to the claimant, but the Corrections Complaint Examiner (CCE) determined that some of the photos were indeed misplaced. The CCE recommended that the complaint be returned to the ICE for further investigation and an amended response. The ICE determined that DOC personnel had lost 16 celebrity photos. The claimant was reimbursed \$92 for those photos. The CCE notified the claimant that if he was not satisfied with the ICE's new decision on his complaint, he could file an appeal. The claimant failed to file any appeal within the 10–day time limit. DOC therefore believes that the claimant failed to exhaust his administrative remedies. DOC further states that the claimant has already received all reimbursement to which he is entitled in this matter. DOC does not believe that the claimant has presented any new evidence or legal argument to justify awarding him any additional money.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

19. Dennis Gonzalez of Boscobel, Wisconsin claims \$224.00 for replacement of glasses allegedly broken by DOC personnel. The claimant, an inmate at Supermax Correctional Institution, alleges that he was attacked, without provocation, by institution guards. The claimant states that while he was being removed from his cell, the guards repeatedly slammed his head into the wall, injuring him and breaking his glasses beyond repair. The claimant denies that he was resisting the guards. He claims that they did not give him any orders but attacked him for no reason. He requests the cost of replacing his glasses and sunglass clip–ons.

DOC recommends denial of this claim. DOC points to the fact that in his "statement of circumstances" the claimant never even mentions his broken glasses, but instead, complains of alleged injuries for which he is not requesting reimbursement. DOC states that the claimant, in fact, refused medical attention at the time of the incident. DOC also states that the claimant neglects to mention his own disruptive behavior during the incident. DOC states that during the incident the claimant repeatedly ignored the officers' orders to cease shouting at another inmate and to face forward. The officers' statements indicate that when the claimant refused to follow orders, they placed him in a compliance hold. Both officers stated that the claimant resisted the compliance hold and, in response, they pressed him to the wall at which time his glasses were broken. DOC believes that it was the claimant's own behavior that provoked the incident, which resulted in the broken glasses. DOC states that had the claimant simply obeyed orders and not resisted, no damage would have occurred.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

20. Mt. Sterling Cheese Coop., of Mt. Sterling, Wisconsin claims \$6,590.48 for value of milk lost because of an incorrect test used by DATCP inspector. The claimant states that during the March 2002 quarterly antibiotic residue testing of the claimant's goat's milk, the DATCP inspector used a test not appropriate for testing goat's milk. The results of the test came back positive for antibiotic residue and the claimant was instructed by DATCP to dump 21,939 pounds of milk. The claimant later learned that the state had used the wrong test. The claimant's milk has successfully passed subsequent testing for antibiotic residue. He requests reimbursement for the value of the milk wrongly dumped because of DATCP's error.

DATCP does not object to payment of this claim. The DATCP inspector used the Charm II Competitive test to test the claimant's goat's milk for antibiotic residue. DATCP states that a miscommunication between the FDA and DATCP resulted in DATCP confusion regarding the approval status of the Charm II test for goat's milk. (The test was approved for testing cow's milk, but not goat's milk.) DATCP acknowledges the error and admits that it should not have used the Charm II test for testing goat's milk.

The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$5,000.00 based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment of \$2,500 should be made from the Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection appropriation s. 20.115 (1)(a) Stats., and \$2,500 should be made from the Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection appropriation s. 20.115 (8)(km), Stats.

21. Eugene L. Schupbach of Mauston, Wisconsin claims \$79.13 for damaged tire. The claimant is employed at Volk Field. For security reasons, DMA had placed orange traffic–control posts at the entrance to Volk Field after September 11, 2001. On January 9, 2002, as the claimant was entering the main gate, his right rear tire caught a flange on the removable orange post, which damaged the tire beyond repair. The claimant believes that the post was placed too close to the guard house and posed a safety hazard. The claimant does not have insurance coverage for the damage.

DMA recommends payment of this claim. After the terrorist attacks on September 11, barriers were placed at the front gate of Volk Field. These barriers were intentionally positioned to slow approaching vehicles to a crawl as they approached the gate. The barriers are made from steel pipes, which slip into other steel pipes buried in the pavement. The upper steel pipe has a flange on it that sticks out to keep it in proper position. This system allows for the barriers to be easy removed and reinstalled. On the day of the claimant's incident, the barriers were in place. DMA has confirmed that the claimant's tire was damaged beyond repair. DMA believes that since the barrier pole, an obstacle installed by DMA, is the cause of the damage, the claimant should be reimbursed for his damages.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

22. Donald Wollheim of Watertown, Wisconsin claims \$157,947.30 for damages related to a contract for employment at the UW Medical School (UWMS). The claimant states that he was offered a contract for a full-time position from 11/1/00 through 6/30/03 by UWMS and the UW Medical Foundation (UWMF). After accepting the offer, the claimant moved his family to Wisconsin and purchased a home here. The claimant states that in 2/01 he was orally informed that his contract would be terminated on 4/30/01 but that there was no reason given for the termination. He states that on 3/12/01, he received a letter regarding the termination of his contract, which named the Academic Staff Policies and Procedures (ASPP), as the authority for termination of the contract. The claimant alleges that the ASPP was never made a term of either the offer of employment or the contract. The claimant's 10/12/00, appointment letter refers to the Academic Staff Rules, however, no such named document exists. The claimant also states that he was also never provided with the ASPP, either at the time of the offer or any other time during his employment. The claimant also points to language in the ASPP, which provides that, if a probationary period applies to the position, it "shall be stated in the appointment letter." The claimant states that there was no language regarding a probationary period in either the appointment letter or in his contract. The 3/12 letter also referred to problems with the claimant's application for hospital privileges. During the week of 3/5/01, the Columbus

Community Hospital's (CCH) Board of Directors took action to delay the claimant's application for hospital privileges. The claimant states that he did apply for privileges in a timely fashion, as the contract required, but that he has no control over the actions of the board. In fact, the claimant believes that UWMS and UWMF staff, who serve the board, delayed his application in an attempt to provide justification for termination of his contract. The claimant believes that the UW had an obligation to inform him of the probationary period, as provided in sections 2.02 and 2.04 of the ASPP but failed to do so. The claimant requests reimbursement for his lost income and benefits relating to the alleged breach of contract.

The UW recommends denial of this claim. The UW states that the 10/12/00 appointment letter set forth additional terms of the contract, stating in part, "Enclosure A describes the privileges and benefits of this appointment...Please read this information carefully as it sets forth obligations and conditions to which you are agreeing in accepting this appointment." Enclosure A stated, "You will be a member of the Academic Staff and entitled to privileges and benefits as outlined in the Academic Staff Rules..." The UW states that the Academic Staff Rules are contained in the ASPP, which states in section 2.04, "Initial fixed term appointments...shall include a period of evaluation of at least six months...during which appointee may be dismissed at the discretion of the individual making the appointment and without right of appeal. The duration of the period shall be specified in the appointment letter. If the appointment letter does not specify the period of evaluation, the evaluation shall be for a period of six months." The UW alleges that the claimant's supervisors became concerned about his performance during the first six months of his employment. They further learned that CCH would not be extending the claimant's temporary hospital privileges and that the claimant had not obtained permanent hospital privileges as required by his contract. The UW believes that the offer and appointment letters provided the claimant with proper notice of the probationary period. The UW believes that it was incumbent upon the claimant to carefully read all documents relating to the conditions of his employment contract and that he failed to do so. The UW therefore believes that there has been no breach of contract as the claimant alleges.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

23. Lyndon Weberg of Tuscon, Arizona claims \$548.75 for attorney's fees allegedly incurred because of incorrect information given to him by DETF. The claimant states that some time prior to October 2001, he called DETF's toll free hotline to find out how to get his ex-wife removed as a beneficiary on his disability annuity. The claimant alleges that DETF told him that he needed to obtain an attorney and get a Qualified Domestic Relations Order (QDRO). He also alleges that DETF told him his monthly annuity amount would increase as a result of the removal of his ex-wife, but that he would not be able to name a new beneficiary. The claimant states that he retained an attorney and sought a QDRO based on DETF's statements. The claimant alleges that a number of months then passed, during which DETF told him they were recalculating his monthly annuity. DETF allegedly then told the claimant that everything he had been told earlier was incorrect-his monthly annuity would not increase and he would be able to name a new beneficiary. The claimant alleges that he hired the attorney solely because of what DETF told him, which later turned out to be incorrect. The claimant also points to the fact that he has since been given the same incorrect information by staff at the DETF hotline.

DETF does not feel it is appropriate to specifically advise the Claims Board regarding payment of this claim, since the board does not have the authority to pay the claim from DETF funds and any payment would therefore have to be made from Claims Board funds. DETF points to the fact that the claimant is apparently unclear as to precisely when he made the phone call regarding he QDRO. DETF phone logs show four calls prior to October 2001. A June call and an August 2nd call were from the claimant and a July call was from the claimant's current employer, all three calls relating to other issues. On August 13 the claimant's attorney called and asked to discuss the claimant's account. He was told that DETF could not discuss the claimant's records without the appropriate release but the attorney and DETF staff did discuss, in general terms, how the filing of a QDRO could affect an annuity. DETF phone logs show a call from the claimant on October 30, 2001, relating to the filing of a QDRO. DETF admits that during this call the hotline staff gave the claimant incorrect information regarding how the QDRO would affect his annuity. However, DETF believes that, based on the phone logs and other documents, it appears that the claimant hired his attorney prior to the conversation in which he received incorrect information, which occurred on October 30. The QDRO was signed on October 23 and the claimant's attorney had called on the same subject in August. Although the phone logs could be incorrect, DETF has found no evidence of an earlier call discussing the QDRO, as the claimant alleges. Furthermore, DETF points to the fact that the billing submitted by the claimant from his attorney indicates past due balances going back over a number of months, which seems to indicate that the majority of the work performed by the during May and June (\$356.25), and July (\$135.00). Although a DETF employee did discuss QDROs in general terms with the claimant's attorney in August 2001, DETF believes that it is unfortunate that the claimant's attorney did not obtain the appropriate release. If he had done so, he would have been able to discuss the specifics of the claimant's annuity prior to obtaining the QDRO.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

24. Terri L. Nielson/Tech Trak Consulting of Reedsburg, Wisconsin claims \$10,842.00 for reconsideration of her claim, which was previously denied by the board on December 7, 2001. There was a mistake made in processing the claim and the claimant was not afforded an opportunity to respond one of the memos from DOA. Because of this error, the claimant requested that the board reconsider the claim based on the additional information submitted in response to the DOA memo. DOA declines to issue any additional response and stands by its original submissions.

The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employees and this claim is neither one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles. (*Members Rothschild and Albers not participating.*)

The Honorable, The Legislature:

At the request of the Department of health and Family Services, we have completed a financial audit of the Health Insurance Risk-Sharing Plan (HIRSP) for fiscal year (FY) 2000-01. HIRSP provides medical insurance for approximately 15,300 policyholders who are unable to obtain coverage in the private market. We have provided an unqualified opinion on HIRSP's financial statements and have followed up on issues raised in prior audits.

One of these issues relates to HIRSP's financial stability. Recent actions taken to implement an accrual-based funding approach in response to our prior audit recommendations will help to address an accounting deficit of \$8.2 million. However, increasing enrollment and claims costs will present continuing challenges to the future management and funding of HIRSP. Enrollment increased 27.1 percent and claims costs increased 24.2 percent during FY 2001–02.

Second, in earlier audits we reported on the overpayment of prescription drug claims for prescriptions dispensed from July 1998 through January 2001. The Department has taken several steps to prevent additional overpayments and to improve its pharmacy claims process, including implementing an on-line processing system and separating drug coinsurance provisions. The Department also took steps to recover the \$5.2 million of overpayments we identified. However, as part of the 2001-03 Budget Reform Act, the Legislature directed the Department to discontinue its recovery efforts. As a result, the overpayments remain a cost that is shared by policyholders, insurers, and other health care providers.

Concerns identified during the current audit suggest that the Department needs to remain diligent in improving its financial management. Inadequate procedures and communication regarding claims data and the actuarial process led to an estimate of actuarial loss liabilities that was materially in error in HIRSP's financial statements. Further, ongoing billing problems suggest that the Department needs to increase its monitoring of administrative billings by the plan administrator, EDS.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department and the plan administrator for HIRSP. A response from the Department is Appendix 2.

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of September 2002.

On September 1, 2002, the <u>General Fund</u> cash balance was negative \$151.6 million. The negative balance continued until September 13, 2002, when the balance closed at a positive \$74.5 million. On September 16, 2002, the <u>General Fund</u> cash balance again fell negative, and closed at a monthly low balance

of negative \$292.6 million. The negative balance continued until September 20, 2002, when the balance closed at a positive \$24.4 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund's negative cash balances were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitation and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

The Honorable, The Senate:

We have completed a financial audit of the Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002 and 2001. The program provides financing for payment of claims under the Wisconsin Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. This financial audit was performed at the request of the Department of Commerce, which audits and pays PECFA claims, and the Department of Administration, which issues the program's revenue bonds and commercial paper.

As necessary parts of the financial audit, we reviewed the Revenue Obligations Program's control procedures, assessed the fair presentation of the Statement of Changes in Program Assets, and reviewed compliance with applicable laws and regulations. We were able to provide an unqualified auditor's report on the program's financial statement and notes, and we found no reportable instances of weaknesses in the internal control structure or instances of noncompliance.

Between January 2000, when the program was created, and June 30, 2002, the State issued \$280.25 million of revenue obligations under the program. This debt has allowed the State to reduce a backlog of approved but unpaid PECFA claims. However, the Department of Commerce continues to receive claims and, as of June 30, 2002, had a backlog of over \$30 million in approved claims awaiting payment. In addition, nearly \$50 million in claims had been received but not yet reviewed and approved.

We have completed a biennial performance evaluation of the Department of Administration's Division of Gaming, as required by s. 13.94(1)(eg), Wis. Stats. The Division regulates the State's Indian gaming, pari-mutuel racing, and charitable gaming activities. In FY 2001-02, its expenditures totaled \$3.8 million in program revenue.

Indian gaming represents the most significant gaming activity in Wisconsin and is the state's largest source of gaming revenue. In 2001, tribal gaming revenue totaled \$970.9 million, and tribal gaming profits totaled \$428.3 million. Under the terms of renegotiated compacts that took effect from 1998 through 2000, tribal revenue from gaming has increased, and the tribes have provided more revenue to the state: in addition to annual payments of \$350,000 to help fund oversight and regulatory activities, they have agree to pay \$24.0 million in FY 2000-01 and again in FY 2001-02. These payments are to be used for purposes that include economic development initiatives to benefit Native Americans in Wisconsin and tourism marketing.

The Division conducts three types of reviews – compliance audits, financial audits, and inventory reviews – to monitor gaming activities at tribal casinos. However, it has not conducted each type of review for all casinos. For example, the Division has conducted financial audits but not compliance audits at three casinos that account for 27.1 percent of the 14,354 electronic gaming devices operating in Wisconsin in August 2002. Compliance audits determine conformity with compact provisions. We have included recommendations to improve the Division's oversight of Indian gaming and have provided options the Legislature and the Governor may wish to consider for strengthening the Division's regulatory authority.

Declining attendance at Wisconsin's two remaining racetracks has contributed to a decline in racing revenue for the state. Revenue from bingo and crane games has also declined in recent years. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the department of Administration's Division of Gaming. The Division's response is Appendix 4.

We have completed follow-up to our audit of the Wisconsin Works (W-2) program (report 01-7), as first requested by Senator Moore. Specifically, we reviewed the processes used by the Department of Workforce Development and W-2 agencies to sanction W-2 program participants.

We reviewed statewide data on sanctions issued by W-2 agencies and found that the overall rate at which participants are sanctioned has declined from 31.4 percent of the statewide caseload in October 1999 to 20.0 percent in October 2002. However, Milwaukee County W-2 agencies continue to sanction at rates higher than other agencies.

The Department has taken reasonable and appropriate steps to remedy problems associated with the inappropriate sanctioning of W-2 participants. However, a significant number of errors persist. For example, although W-2 agencies identified 614 inappropriately sanctioned cases from September 1997 through March 2001 that resulted in underpayments of \$115,792, we estimate that W-2 agencies made errors in assessing the appropriateness of sanctions imposed for an additional 127 cases, which also resulted in underpayments. Furthermore, we estimate that sanction policy was applied incorrectly without resulting in underpayments for an additional 320 cases. The timeliness of W-2 agency reviews of inappropriate sanctions is also a concern. We found that W-2 agencies had not yet reviewed 168 of the 263 potentially inappropriate sanctions issued since April 2001; half of these were issued before November 2001.

We have included a series of recommendations to address the ongoing problems we identified, including a recommendation for the Department to report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee by May 1, 2003, on its progress in addressing these concerns.

Attached to this letter is the EDVEST College Savings Program Annual Report for the 2001-2002 Fiscal Year. Legislation for the EDVEST program requires the Office of the State Treasurer to annually report to the Governor and the Legislature on the program. This fifth annual report includes summaries of the required actuarial valuation, prepared by Milliman USA, and a program audit prepared by PriceWaterhouseCoopers, LLP as well as discussion of the key development in the program over the past fiscal year.

The most significant event of the year for the program involved the full implementation of state legislation designed specifically to give EDVEST new authority to take advantage of benefits and flexibility currently allowed under federal law.

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The legislation provided broader eligibility and coverage for the program, created a new state tax deduction for parents, expanded the number of investment options, eliminated the residency requirement and established protection of eligibility for state financial aid. At the conclusion of a national search, the program contracted with Strong Capital Management of Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin to provide broad administrative services as the EDVEST program manager. A second partnership was developed with American Express, which offers a slightly reconfigured "tomorrow's scholar" version of the program through its financial advisors nationwide.

These program improvements were an immediate success with the public, and as of June 30, we were meeting the college savings needs of nearly 100,000 families nationwide with over \$450 million in assets under management. I'm proud to relate that our success enabled the program to repay its entire start-up loan to the state. All early operating subsidies were also repaid and the program is now entirely self-supporting.

In its authorization of the Family Care pilot program in 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, the Legislature also directed the Legislative Audit Bureau to contract with an organization other than an agency of the State to evaluate the pilot program. Under the terms of a contract with the Audit Bureau, the Lewin Group, Inc., has completed its third report on implementation of the Family Care pilot program. The first two implementation reports were released in November 2000 and November 2001. In early 2003, The Lewin Group will also provide a report on the program's outcomes and cost-effectiveness. A final implementation report is expected in June 2003.

Family Care is operating a pilot program, under the terms of federal waivers, in nine counties. Jackson, Kenosha, Marathon, and Trempealeau counties operate Resource Centers, which provide information and assistance concerning services and program operations to both consumers and providers of long-term care services. Fond du Lac, La Crosse, Milwaukee, Portage, and Richland counties operate both Resource Centers and Care Management Organizations (CMOs), which coordinate care and manage capitated payments for those determined eligible for the Family Care benefit. Eligibility is limited to the elderly and adults with physical and developmental disabilities whose financial and functional status meet established criteria.

This third implementation report notes the progress made in implementing the Family Care model in the pilot counties, as well as issues the State and the counties will need to address as program expansion is considered. For example, to ensure unbiased information is available to consumers making decisions about long-term care services and to comply with federal requirements, a Family Care enrollment consultation function was established in 2002 in each of the five counties operating CMOs. The number of inquiries to Resource Centers continues to exceed goals established by contract, and CMOs have worked to expand the availability of service providers to better meet their members' needs. Finally, waiting lists for home and community-based waiver services have been eliminated in each of the five counties operating CMOs. Total program enrollment has increased from 5,485 in March 2002 to 6,302 by July 2002, with over 97 percent of these enrollees eligible for Medical Assistance.

We appreciate the cooperation and courtesy of the department of Health and Family Services and the many county staff, citizen members of local long-term care councils, and provider representatives who have worked with The Lewin Group throughout the evaluation process. The Honorable, The Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the Department of Health and Family Services' regulation of nursing homes and assisted living facilities, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. As of June 30, 2001, there were 462 nursing homes and 2,114 assisted living facilities in Wisconsin; approximately \$1.0 billion in federal and state Medical Assistance (Medicaid) funds helped to support the cost of care provided to residents in these long-term care facilities. In fiscal year (FY) 2000-01, 80.2 percent of the Department's 215.7 full-time equivalent staff with regulatory responsibility for long-term care were regional regulatory staff. Expenditures for regional regulatory staff totaled \$12.5 million.

Although both nursing homes and assisted living facilities are inspected by state staff, there are significant differences in the oversight provided. Nursing homes are inspected under a well-established process that is dictated by federal regulations designed to ensure quality, occurs frequently, and employs teams of inspectors that include registered nurses who evaluate resident care. In contrast, the regulatory system for assisted living facilities, which is controlled entirely by the state, is less-established, and each inspection typically involves a single inspector who is not required to have medical credentials. Furthermore, as of June 30, 2001, 47.1 percent of assisted living facilities had not been visited by inspectors for any reason for at least a year. During our review period, there was an increase in the number of citations the Department issued to assisted living facilities, in part because of the implementation of new state regulations, and complaints about assisted living facilities

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increased 82.1 percent. In contrast, nursing home complaints decreased 3.0 percent. We provide options for the Legislature to consider if it is not satisfied with the current regulatory process for assisted living facilities.

We also reviewed the enforcement process for both nursing homes and assisted living facilities, which can include financial penalties, restrictions on new admissions, and other sanctions. Although prompt imposition of penalties is considered an effective method of compelling compliance, 64.6 percent of FY 2000-01 nursing home citations for which forfeitures could be assessed were awaiting review by the Department. Other available enforcement options have rarely been used. We include several recommendations to improve the current enforcement process.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Health and Family Services and the Department of Justice. A response from the Department of Health and Family Services is Appendix 7.

We have completed a financial audit of the Unemployment Reserve Fund for fiscal years 2001-02 and 2000-01. This audit was performed at the request of the Department of Workforce Development, which administers the Fund.

As necessary parts of the financial audit, we reviewed the Fund's control procedures, assessed the fair presentation of its financial statements, and reviewed compliance with applicable laws and regulations. We were able to provide an unqualified auditor's report on the Fund's financial statements, and we found no instances of material weaknesses in the internal control structure or material instances of noncompliance.

The Unemployment Reserve Fund's cash balance related to taxable employers declined \$236 million from \$1.71 billion as of June 30, 2001 to \$1.47 billion as of June 30, 2002. This cash balance is used to determine the tax rate schedule to apply to taxable employers. Since the cash reserves continue to exceed the amount that allows employers to be taxed under the lowest rate schedule, the Fund continues to charge employers the lowest authorized tax rates.
