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Testimony to Assembly Committee on Tax & Spending Limitations

Good morning Chairman Lasee and members of the committee. My name is Brandon Scholz, President of the Wisconsin Grocers Association and I am pleased to be here this morning to support legislation which would repeal the estate tax in Wisconsin.

The repeal of the estate tax is an issue that the members of our association have worked on at the state and national level for many years. After a recent success at the federal level to phase out the estate tax by 2008, we assumed a victory. But as you know, Wisconsin did not follow suit and the estate tax in Wisconsin lives on.

The estate tax in Wisconsin is worn like a wet, heavy sleeping bag by all business owners. Critics say it is a tax on the rich—I completely disagree. The estate tax is a penalty to the entrepreneurial spirit and hard-working dedication symbolic of this country.

Grocers epitomize this entrepreneurial spirit. They have worked hard all of their life with the dream of passing their established businesses on to their children. The estate tax kills this dream.

According to the Food Marketing Institute, supermarket succession, the passing of years of hard work on to the next generation, is a top concern of family-owned supermarket retailers and wholesalers. Succession planning is long and difficult. Owners are forced to answer difficult questions about the future of a company they have worked their entire lives to create and grow. The transfer of ownership and the family dynamics are central questions in the decision to plan for the future of the business.

The shocking reality is when the owner realizes that a large portion of his or her company can be lost to estate and gift taxes. These taxes not only cover the life savings of the one who passed away, abut also the home, land, pensions, life insurance, stocks and bonds, annuities, IRAs, 401K plans and the business assets and anything else that has any economic value. The deceased has already paid income tax on that money. They have paid and collected payroll taxes and employment taxes; many have paid capital gains taxes as well.

Food retailers and wholesalers run capital intensive businesses, requiring large investments in land, stores or shopping centers, refrigeration, point-of-sale equipment, large inventories, lighting, transportation, such as fleets of trucks, etc. Owners of most family owned grocery stores plow their after tax profits back into their stores in equipment, new consumer services, associates/jobs, remodeling and new store development. Th average profit of our industry is one penny on the dollar after taxes, so you can see why the supermarket industry is particularly vulnerable to the devastating effect of this tax.

Family-owned supermarkets that do survive after the principal owner's death have already spent hundreds and even thousands to simply plan for the eventuality of estate taxes. Most grocery stores involved in planning purchase life insurance, have buy/sell agreements or provide lifetime gifts of stock. The WGA strongly believes that the resources spent planning for and paying the death tax could be used more productively to grow supermarkets, provide customers with value and create additional jobs in the economy.

Legislation to eliminate this tax will go a long way during this time of economic slowdown. The WGA urges you to pass legislation to eliminate the estate tax.
