## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, a person's parental rights may be involuntarily terminated (TPR) on the grounds that he or she has been continually denied periods of physical placement or visitation of a child or juvenile who is judged to be in need of protection or services. This bill extends these grounds for TPR to include juveniles under a delinquency dispositional order.

This bill may increase the TPRs achieved for juveniles with delinquency orders. An increase in the number of TPRs could result in an increase in the Department's foster care and adoption assistance caseload and maintenance payments. However, it is assumed that the number of TPR petitions based on the grounds of continuing denial of physical placement under a delinquency order is small and that the maintenance of most juveniles under a delinquency order would be the responsibility of county human services departments. Therefore, this bill would not have a significant effect on DHFS. In addition, the bill will not increase or decerase the number of juveniles cared for by counties and therefore will have no effect.
