## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill would create penalties for either those who intentionally misuse a household product or altered household product, or those who purchase the product for another person while knowing that person intends to misuse the product.

We have checked with the Legislative Reference Bureau, and there is a typo in the bill that will require a Chief Clerk's correction. The bill references the penalty which causes death as a Class I misdemeanor, but it should reference the penalty as a Class I felony.

If a person gives a household product to another person who dies as a result of misuse, the penalty could result in prison time not to exceed three years and six months (a Class I felony), but all of the other penalties in the bill are misdemeanors which would result in imprisonment in county jails, not state prisons.

It is not possible to determine how many people would be convicted of a Class I felony under this bill, or how long they would be placed in a state prison. The FY02 annual cost to house an inmate in a Department of Corrections institution was approximately \$26,000.
