Rather, let the greatest among you, be as the youngest, and the leader, as the servant. For who is greater; the one seated at the table, or the one who serves? Is it not the one seated at table? And yet I am among you, as the one who serves."

2002 was truly a difficult year for leaders in Church, Government and Corporate America. But beyond being true to our word, may we be true to the word. May we be true to the word made flesh. The one who came that first Christmas is the one who comes to us this Christmas, this Inauguration Day. For he comes to dispel our darkness, to fill us with light, to serve rather than be served to give his life in ransom for us all. He is the one who makes all things new, the True Leader who makes all life complete. May each of us – with our own unique responsibilities and ministries – take part if the best of that mission! In that affirmation in that challenge, LET US PRAY:

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for including prayer in your very important and historical day in the life of the State of Wisconsin. Specifically, I would like to thank the Speaker of the House, John Gard, for his friendship and for the gracious invitation allowing me to be a part of this Inauguration Day.

For those who believe, we know that Christmas is not just one day, nor is it simply a three-week liturgical season wherein we still find ourselves today. Rather, it is a way of life! For we believe that where two or three are gathered in God's name, when we call upon the name of the Lord, he is truly borne again in our midst.

In the spirit of Christ, then, I call upon the words of Saint Luke the Evangelist whose words were chosen for the Feast of the Holy Innocence within the Christmas season. I believe Luke's words can shed light on our assembly today.

Almighty and Eternal God, You have revealed your glory to all nations. God of power and might, -- of wisdom and justice, through you, authority is rightly administered, laws are enacted -- and judgement is decreed.

We pray for the governor of our state, for the members of the legislature, for judges, all elected civil officials – especially those new to their office this day and all others who are entrusted and guard and celebrate our political welfare. May they be enabled by your powerful protection to discharge their duties with honesty and ability.

We likewise commend to your unbounded mercy all citizens of Wisconsin and the United States; may we be blessed in the knowledge and sanctified in the observance of your holy law. May we be preserved in union and in that peace which the world cannot give or take away. And finally, after enjoying the blessings of this life, may we be admitted to join those who celebrate eternal life.

We pray to you our Almighty God who lives and reigns with our Word made flesh and in the unity of your Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever, AMEN.

#### **REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER**

"Today is a very humbling experience for me. I want to thank each of you for your support, faith and friendship as we prepare for the next two years.

Today is a day where each of us in our own way can celebrate being given the honor of serving the people of Wisconsin in the State Assembly. I have always believed that most people really don't understand the toll it can take on a family to run for public office. However, each of us in this room share an understanding of the time and effort it takes to put your name on the line and run for the Legislature.

That is why it is always so great to see so many family members attend the swearing in ceremonies. We share the bond of never being able to look at a parade the same again, of learning all the many creative ways that people can prepare chicken.... and just how many homes have very hungry dogs. We also share the bond of understanding just how wonderful it is to have regular people put so much faith in you to get good things done for our state. That to me has always been the best part of this job, when some person bumps into you on the street and asks for some small amount of help or advice because they believe in you. They may not know us very well but they believe we will do whatever we can to get something done for them.

I have had many, many people from my district over the years give me tremendous motivation to work hard for them. From people baking me bread and bringing it to my office hours to getting an occasional hug at a parade or in the grocery store because people want you to know that they are with you. State Government may seem like it is a thousand miles away from them but they pay attention. I have been blessed with what I always call the best district in the state because the people are so hard working, honest and decent. The little towns of Lena, Coleman, Pound, Oconto, Pulaski, Peshtigo and Marinette are filled with people who want us to succeed. Today, I believe, is mostly a day for families. There will be plenty of days where we will spend quality time together debating legislation intensely and we may even argue once or twice about memorializing Congress.... but today is about family. I want to thank each and every friend and family member here today for supporting those of us who have been elected. Your support makes every battle easier and the load much lighter on the toughest days.

I have been blessed with an incredible family of supporters from the first day I decided to run. Some of them are with me today. I want to welcome my dad Herb and my mother Dixie to the chambers today. They have stuck with me through thick and thin and have always been there for me. These two people have truly lived the American dream. Many of you know I was born in Milwaukee and lived there until I was six. Then in 1969 my parents bought a farm, never having been on a farm in their life, with 6 kids under the age of 8 and moved north, 2 days after Christmas and 1 month after having a baby, to the great little town of Lena and never looked back.

They taught me a great deal about hard work, perseverance, faith and appreciating the gifts of life. For that I will always be thankful.

On the day of my first swearing in after a special election in 1987, we had planned the event for my high school gym in Lena so my grandfather could attend. He had been fighting a difficult battle with Leukemia and I wanted him to be there. I wanted him to see how much fun it was to vote Republican because I was the first one he ever voted for. Unfortunately he passed away on that morning. My Grandma however, and many of you know her very well, Grandma Mc made me hang in there and go through with the ceremony. She is always my greatest defender and soldier. I love her dearly and have had the great honor of having her be my date at numerous events in the district. Now most of you know my wonderful wife. We met in this building and have enjoyed many wonderful moments together in politics. Everyone who knows me knows I married well above myself and am truly blessed to have my wife be my best friend and my soul mate. I am pleased to introduce my lovely wife Cate. We are blessed with two wonderful gifts from God in Libby and John Vincent. Libby has come full circle. When she was an infant and Tom Loftus was Speaker, Cate was in the Assembly. Speaker Loftus allowed a Cate and Margaret Lewis to set up a small nursery here in the Speaker's office and Libby was cared for in the office she now occasionally helps answer phones in.

Again I want to welcome everyone and thank you for coming.

Starting out as that farm kid and being elected Speaker of the Assembly is a truly humbling event in my life. I have served with so many good people. We have worked on so many challenging things.

However, the journey we are about to embark on will be unlike anything most of us have ever been through before.

I am confident the people in this room are up to the task.

The main focus of our journey should be about sharing. We need to work together in the Assembly and Senate with Governor Doyle to make the changes and reforms that the people, who elect us, expect us to make.

Because I believe – if we are going to move ahead – if we are going to be successful during this legislative session – if we are going to truly solve the challenges facing our state today.... we need to share the responsibilities for change between the Legislature and the new administration and help the people of Wisconsin understand that we all must share the burden of change – so that we can all share in the success of tomorrow.

We will move ahead not just in the sense of finding solutions to our current fiscal challenges but we will get it right in the sense that we can drive real growth in this state.

We cannot afford to forget that growth.... economic growth.... job growth.... opportunity growth is the ultimate key to truly fixing our fiscal challenges. That is the way to ensure we don't put a band-aid over the problems of the past but rather make lasting improvements.

The deficit we face today is actually a manifestation of a larger problem.... a problem that the economy is not growing as it should. Today we face economic challenges that per capita income in the Badger State is well below that of our neighbors in Minnesota and Illinois.

That is the problem because our citizens work longer hours.... and hold down more jobs.... than anywhere in the country. Our labor participation rate – that is, the percentage of our employable citizens who are in the workforce – is the highest in the country.

Our friends and family are treading water because they are willing to work more overtime.... work multiple jobs.... and have both parents in the workforce. But this cannot last, and people – the talented and the young will vote with their feet and go to other places where the incomes are better.

Governor Thompson understood that if enough people are employed in good paying full-time jobs, the state's fiscal situation will take care of itself. And now we must work together – Republican and Democrat alike – Legislature and Governor alike – to inspire growth in this state.... to give growth a place to take hold and root.

The challenges we share.... can become the opportunity Wisconsin shares tomorrow. No one can say that this will be easy. The immediate challenges – such as the deficit will mean everything reasonable should be considered. Everything should be considered because we are not raising taxes.

We will be successful if our actions – taken deliberately and taken together as partners in creating opportunity.... set the stage for true economic growth that benefits the entire state.

This growth won't just focus on a few groups or companies or individuals.... but include all sectors of our society. This growth will move us forward as a state.... taxpayers.... local governments, the University and schools – everyone that depends on a vibrant economy.

State of Wisconsin Joint Legislative Council Madison

December 20, 2002

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

Last summer, the Joint Legislative Council created the Special Committee on Improving Wisconsin's Fiscal Management and directed it to examine ways for Wisconsin to improve its ability to manage its finances using modern financial management and policy practices in the context of the budget process. Two of the major problems with Wisconsin's current budget process addressed by the Special Committee are that our state budget has been consistently enacted considerably after the beginning of the first fiscal year to which it applies and that the state budget contains too much policy.

These problems have many consequences. Tardy state budgets complicate the implementation of state programs, impede or preclude budgeting by local units of government, and undermine public confidence in the Legislature. Excessive policy in the budget threatens to weaken the legislative branch by undermining the standing committee process, reduces public scrutiny and analysis of policy items added to the budget late in the budget process, and obfuscates legislators' voting records given the "all-exclusive" nature of budget bills.

At its December 18, 2002 meeting, the Special Committee voted to recommend this letter and the attachments to it to address these two problems. The recommendations are implemented primarily through modification of the 2003-04 biennial session schedule and the creation of two joint rules, an Assembly rule and a Senate rule.

# Recommended Schedule for the Development of the Biennial Budget

The Special Committee recommends the attached schedules for the development of the future biennial budgets. These schedules are based on the recommendations of Robert Lang,

December 9, 2002

Director, Legislative Fiscal Bureau, who prepared a model schedule for the 2003-05 Biennial Budget in response to a request from a committee member.

The recommended schedules for biennial budgets after the 2003-05 fiscal biennium vary depending on whether an incumbent governor or, a newly elected governor proposes the executive budget bill. The schedule for a newly elected, nonincumbent governor allows up to an additional two weeks to prepare and deliver the executive budget.

Given the current extraordinary fiscal condition of the state and the fact that Governor-Elect Doyle is not an incumbent Governor, the Special Committee recommends that the Legislature provide an additional two weeks for Governor-Elect Doyle to prepare his executive budget and set the date under s. 16.45, Stats., for the delivery of his budget message to be Tuesday, February 11, 2003. This delay would push back by up to two weeks each of the activities in the development of the next biennial budget that occur after the Governor's budget message, as reflected in the last column in the enclosed table. If the Legislature and the Governor adhere to the recommended schedule for the development of the 2003-05 Biennial Budget, then the Legislature should complete its work on this budget by July 3, 2003 and the Governor should approve the bill with any partial vetoes by July 28, 2003.

To ensure a timely review by the governor of an enrolled budget bill, the Special Committee also recommends that JCLO modify the session schedule so that the governor generally has 21 days to review an enrolled budget bill, irrespective of when the Legislature passes the bill. This 21-day period is incorporated into the three recommended schedules in the enclosed table and is composed of a 15-day informal review period and the six-day formal review period authorized under the State Constitution.

For the 2003-04 Biennial Session schedule, the Special Committee recommends that JCLO incorporate into the session schedule language such as that presented below relating to the presentation of an enrolled executive budget bill to the governor. For subsequent biennial sessions, the Special Committee recommends that, to be consistent with the recommended schedules, JCLO substitute for the fixed date in this language (July 22, 2003) either June 24 of the odd-numbered year or, if the governor is a newly elected, nonincumbent governor, July 8 of the odd-numbered year.

Proposed 2003-04 Biennial Session Schedule Language on Presentation of an Enrolled Executive Budget Bill to the Governor

Budget bill to governor. After an executive budget bill introduced under section 16.47 (1) of the statutes has been passed by both houses in regular, extraordinary, or special session, the chief clerk of the house in which it originated shall present the enrolled bill to the governor for approval on the later of:

1. July 22, 2003, or

2. Fifteen days after the enrolled bill is signed by the appropriate officer or officers certifying to its passage.

In addition, implementation of the schedules for the post 2003-05 biennial budgets will require amendments to current law. The Special Committee has recommended a draft proposal, WLC: 0045/4, which contains the amendments noted in the third and fourth columns in the enclosed table. These amendments relate to the dates for the transmittal of the Building Commission's recommended capital budget to the Joint Committee on Finance and the delivery of the Governor's budget message and a report on the timeliness of the submittal of agency budget requests. The Special Committee will be forwarding this draft to the Joint Legislative Council introduce the bill into the 2003-04 Legislature.

#### **Recommendations on Policy in the Budget**

The attached Joint Resolution, WLC: 0079/2, Assembly Resolution, WLC: 0101/1, and Senate Resolution, WLC: 0102/1, relate to policy in the budget. Joint Rule 51m, created by WLC: 0079/2, directs the Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) to identify specified types of policy items in drafting requests from the Department of Administration (DOA) for the executive budget bill and to notify DOA of this identification. The affected types of policy items are those that propose either of the following:

- A primarily nonfiscal policy that either has no or minimal state fiscal effect or, if it has a state fiscal effect, has policy implications that outweigh any potential fiscal effect.
- A private or local measure subject to the constitutional requirement that the measure be considered in a single subject bill.

Once an executive budget bill is introduced, the LRB must then report to the co-chairs of the Joint Committee on Finance (JFC) a list of the items in the introduced bill that contain these types of policy.

Joint Rule 28, created by WLC: 0079/2, directs the co-chairs of the JFC to identify the same types of policy items in an introduced executive budget bill and to request the LRB to draft the items as a separate bill for introduction by the specified leaders. Once the co-chairs have identified these items, the JFC may not recommend the passage of the bill if the bill contains any of these items.

To deal with legislative consideration of an executive budget bill after the JFC review, the Special Committee also recommends the creation of Assembly Rule 55m and Senate Rule 52m, as set forth in WLC: 101/1 and WLC: 0102/1, respectively. These companion rules establish that neither of the houses may consider an amendment or substitute amendment introduced in that house to an executive budget bill that contains either a nonfiscal policy that has no or minimal state fiscal effect or a private or local measure subject to the constitutional requirement that the measure be considered in a single subject bill.

The Special Committee also considered alternative ways to ensure broader participation by the Legislature in the development of the JFC's budget recommendations. Part of the committee's discussion focused on procedures to involve legislators who are not on JFC in reviewing important issues that are not separated from the executive budget bill.

To that end, the Special Committee endorsed the creation of working groups as part of the JFC review of an executive budget bill. These working groups would include both JFC and non-JFC members and be empowered to review and make recommendations to JFC on a range of broad issues.

The Special Committee asks you and the other members of JCLO to endorse the above recommendations and work to ensure their timely implementation in your respective house in the upcoming and subsequent sessions. Implementation of these recommendations will also require that the session schedule that JCLO prepares for each Legislature reflects the appropriate dates and related changes.

Thank you for your consideration of these important changes to the state's budget process.

#### 2001 Senate Joint Resolution 2

## **ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 16**

*To create* section 26 of article I of the constitution; **relating to:** the right to fish, hunt, trap, and take game (first consideration).

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That:

**SECTION 1.** Section 26 of article I of the constitution is created to read:

[Article I] Section 26. The people have the right to fish, hunt, trap, and take game subject only to reasonable restrictions as prescribed by law.

SECTION 2. Numbering of new provision. The new section 26 of article I of the constitution created in this joint resolution shall be designated by the next higher open whole section number in that article if, before the ratification by the people of the amendment proposed in this joint resolution, any other ratified amendment has created a section 26 of article I of the constitution of this state. If one or more joint resolutions create a section 26 of article I simultaneously with the ratification by the people of the amendment proposed in this joint resolution, the sections created shall be numbered and placed in a sequence so that the sections created by the joint resolution having the lowest enrolled joint resolution number have the numbers designated in that joint resolution and the sections created by the other joint resolutions have numbers that are in the same ascending order as are the numbers of the enrolled joint resolutions creating the sections.

**Be it further resolved, That** this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election.
