BACKGROUND

The Office of the Secretary oversees and supervises the operations of the entire Department of Regulation and Licensing, and therefore the salary, overhead, and fringe expense of the Office of the Secretary is spread equally over the total number of new and renewed licenses (total issued licenses.)

Credentialing Fees—Background Information

At your request, we have gathered some background information the Joint Legislative Audit Committee may find useful in considering an audit of credentialing fees set by the Department of Regulation and Licensing. During the 2003-2005 biennial budget process, the Department indicated that their current methodology for establishing credentialing fees was inadequate and that it was not possible to determine whether fees were accurately representing the Department's costs. Subsequently, the Legislature inserted a proposal in the budget bill for the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct an evaluation of the Department's credentialing fees, which was included in 2003 Wisconsin Act 33.

Created in 1967, the Department of Regulation and Licensing provides centralized administrative service to 25 boards, examining boards, and affiliated credentialing boards that regulate certain occupations and businesses to ensure that the public's health, safety, and welfare are adequately protected. In addition, the Department shares authority with several boards or directly regulates several businesses.

The Department and its attached boards issue credentials—such as licenses, certificates, registrations, or permits—to regulated occupations and businesses, for which there may be three separate charges. First, all applicants must pay a standard fee for initial credentials. Second, for those occupations that require an examination, the Department establishes a fee that reflects the estimated cost of administering the examination. Third, the Department charges credentialing renewal fees every two years for most occupations. Since the 1991-93 biennium, the Department has used two components to determine the renewal fee for a given occupation or business: a fixed administrative cost component, and a variable cost component that reflects the Department's enforcement costs for a given occupation or business.

In fiscal year (FY) 2003-04, the Department's total budget is \$11.1 million, funded entirely from program revenues. The largest source of funding for the Department's operations is credential issuance and renewal fees. The Department also receives funds raised from the sale of study

guides, penalties charged for late renewals, and fees for wall certificates, reciprocal credentials, and the endorsement of credential holders to other states.

An evaluation of credentialing fees could determine whether:

- the methodologies for determining fees are adequately documented and administered correctly;
- the fees represent the actual costs associated with the Department's regulation of credentialed holders;
- the fees provide sufficient revenues to support the Department's operations; and
- the fees and methodologies compare favorably to those in other midwestern states.

The RISAM Team (Reception, Records, Intake, Screening, Auditing, and Monitoring) in the Division of Enforcement had two fulltime auditors working during the two year period <u>January 1, 2001- December 31, 2002</u>. The auditors' only job is to conduct audits. Between the two positions the following audits were conducted:

Monitoring Program:

When formal action is taken against a credential holder, the Board taking the action or the Department in some cases, issues a formal order. The Department Monitor is charged with the responsibility of making sure that the credential holder complies with the requirements of the order. For planning purposes orders are divided into two different types of monitoring. Active monitoring of an order means we are constantly receiving reports of some kind on the credential holder and have to do something with the reports – file them, take them to the board, etc. We need to keep the boards informed on those credential holders we are actively monitoring, usually on a quarterly basis. We normally have ticklers sets up in our computer system to remind us when reports are due and deadlines approaching.

Inactive monitoring of an order means a person is under an order to do something but it doesn't really require any active work on our part until they trigger it. For example, if a person is suspended from practice, and in order to get their license back they have to complete 30 hours of continuing education, we would designate that as inactive monitoring. We have to keep the monitoring file open because they have not completed the requirements of their board order, but we don't have to do anything. The burden is on them to notify us that they have completed the 30 hours. There are no ticklers entered, no deadlines to watch, etc.

Currently there are over 750 credential holders under orders. The .5 FTE assigned to the monitoring program spends 100% of their time monitoring these credential holders. The number of orders to be monitored by registration type is as follows:

Dear Legislators:

The Department of Regulation and Licensing (DRL) is requesting that you again consider the fee setting methodology that the department contracted to develop that equitably allocates the department's costs to all credential holders based on a true study of department staff time and costs.

The method developed captures all the costs of credentialing and monitoring compliance with regulations by each licensed profession. The old method allocated only the costs of enforcement attorneys and distributed all other costs across-the-board. The proposed methodology results in a more fair allocation of credentialing fees among professionals licensed by DRL.

Since we presented this methodology to the Joint Committee on Finance (JCF) in May, we have altered the allocation slightly. The members of the boards that regulate the various professions, who are senior practitioners of those professions, requested that renewing established licensees bear a greater portion of the cost of regulating their profession than newcomers to their professions. We made this change as an encouragement to economic growth.

The new fee methodology decreases the fee for new licenses for 101 of the 110 professions regulated. The new fee methodology also reduces renewal fees for 27 professions, which under the current methodology are subsidizing the cost of regulating other professions.

A copy of the newly proposed fee schedule is attached. The fees that would be reduced under the new methodology are highlighted.

In deciding not to accept the new fee setting methodology for now, the JCF reduced DRL's spending authority by \$833,700 to avoid the deficit that would result from using the old fee structure.

Although it will have a substantial impact on the department's operations, DRL believes it can absorb a cut of \$543,400 and is accomplishing this through staff reductions and other measures. However, an additional reduction in spending of \$290,300 will have severe impact on the services the department provides to the boards that regulate their professions. Attached is a list of the available options for meeting the additional reduction. As you can see, the boards' ability to monitor and regulate their own professions will be severely limited if the additional \$290,300 cut is required.

DRL is requesting that the new fee setting inethodology, with the modification to new credentials, be implemented by accepting these fees as provided under s. 440.03 (9). In addition, the department is requesting that budget authority of \$290,3 (2) he had a back to the department's general operations appropriation. Thank you.

Consequences

- Will have severely restrict number of in-person meetings to no more than 4 annually; all other meetings, including screening panels, will have to be by teleconference.
- Will have to limit out-of-state travel to conferences only if conference sponsor pays all costs, except per diem; will result in no national presence and loss of ability to stay on top of cutting edge issues and regulatory approaches.

Printing/Postage Costs

Consequences

- Will have to severely restrict number of regulatory digests produced; publish on Web site only, no free hard-copy distribution
- Will have to severely restrict size of board packets; delivery will be by electronic means exclusively
