

A Wisconsin prison inmate wants the state to provide a sex change operation, a bra and some respect.

Donna Dawn Konitzer, formerly known as Scott, says prison doctors have been giving Konitzer female hormones since 1999 when Konitzer was diagnosed with gender identity disorder.

Now that Konitzer is a woman in all but genitals, Konitzer wants to be addressed by guards at the Wisconsin Resource Center near Oshkosh as a woman, and Konitzer wants to wear a brassiere, said Jennifer Frakes, one of Konitzer's court-appointed attorneys.

The state Department of Corrections policy says men get to have men's clothes and property. Women have women's stuff. And they determine which is which by the inmate's genitals.

"The hormone therapy caused her to grow breasts," Frakes said. "But she's not allowed to have a bra."

Last year Konitzer filed a lawsuit against state officials, including Corrections Secretary Matt Frank, in federal court in Milwaukee. The court appointed Frakes and Brian Cothroll, attorneys from the law firm of Foley & Lardner, to represent Konitzer.

The case could have impact well outside Wisconsin. Across the country, transgendered inmates have started to take prison officials to court over their treatment.

In Wisconsin, state Assistant Attorney General Jody Schmelzer says Konitzer's case is heading toward trial.

In his complaint, Konitzer, who's serving a 128-year sentence for several armed robberies committed between April

and June 1994, said prison doctors diagnosed Konitzer with gender identity disorder, and former Bureau of Health Services medical director George Daley approved hormone therapy in 1999.

Since then, Konitzer said in the complaint that he had "substantial female development" though his genitals are still male.

Konitzer has made six attempts to castrate himself and two to sever the male genitals.

"It is an act of sadism to develop a prisoner into a female and then forcibly treat that individual as a male," Konitzer wrote in a supporting document.

Konitzer added: "The defendants have claimed that they cannot treat the plaintiff as a female in a male institution. They were not making any such argument when they developed her into a female in a male institution."

The state refers to Konitzer as "he." For self-identification, Konitzer uses the pronoun "she."

Gender identity disorder - a condition in which a person feels persistent discomfort with his or her biological sex - is a psychiatric diagnosis, said Sarah Morgan, a member of the UW- Milwaukee nursing faculty.

Morgan, whose doctoral thesis studied transgendered adults, said the controversial diagnosis allows someone to have access to hormones but also labels them as mentally ill. Some experts say transgenderedness is a biological anomaly, not mental illness, she said.

Corrections Department spokesman Bill Clausius says there are five to seven transgendered inmates in the Wisconsin system. A three- page policy approved in 2002 determines how they are handled.

In short, the policy says:

- * State doctors can start hormonal therapy for someone with this disorder.
- * No sexual reassignment surgery will be provided to inmates.
- * Inmates are assigned to prison based on their external genitalia.
- * Self-inflicted genital mutilation is "not consistent with successful sexual reassignment therapy."

Morgan, however, said Konitzer should be in a female population. "A lot of people would be unhappy with that, especially if she hasn't had sex reassignment surgery," Morgan acknowledged.

But people who are transgendered want to be treated like the gender they identify with. "Despite the ability to pass and live in society, they just want acceptance," Morgan said. "Using the proper pronouns is critical. That's their sense of self. They say, Address us in the way we are presenting ourselves."

"I know a lot of people who have really struggled over the years before they could feel comfortable in their bodies."

Attorney Cothroll said the state's care of Konitzer has not followed accepted standards for treatment, which include sex change surgery after hormones and counseling.

"That's part of the treatment," Cothroll said. "It is certainly an option ... but it's not everything."

Frakes said hormones caused Konitzer to develop many feminine traits, but guards refuse to recognize Konitzer as female.

"Psychologically, that's completely contrary to what proper treatment is," Frakes said.

Members of the Madison Area Transgendered Association number almost 200, according to director Ann Marie Knittel. They range from people who are just questioning their sexual identity to cross dressers and transsexuals who have had sex change surgery.

Knittel said Wisconsin law does not require that the transgendered be isolated in cells. "It's very dangerous to be put into a male population if you are a male who is female," Knittel said. "There's a lot of hatred, a lack of education and a lot of inmates taking advantage of the situation sexually."

Attorney Frakes said there hasn't been much discussion yet of the costs involved in a possible remedy. One Neenah physician puts total charges for sex change surgery at \$17,325.

But given Konitzer's many attempts at castration and suicide, Frakes said "they've spent quite a bit of money on Donna Dawn, trying to treat her somehow but not the right way."

Kathleen Bellaire, deputy director at the Wisconsin Resource Center where Konitzer is being held, declined comment.

The Wisconsin Resource Center is a Department of Health and Family Services medium-security facility for inmates who are unable to adjust in normal medium- and maximum-security prisons.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTIVE # 68

SUBJECT: Scope of Services for the Treatment of Gender Identity Disorder

I. Background

It is the policy of the Wisconsin Department of Corrections (DOC) to provide appropriate treatment services to offenders meeting the criteria for a diagnosis of gender identity disorder (DSM-IV 302.85). Practitioners shall take correctional and community standards of care into consideration when providing treatment services.

II. Definitions

Diagnostic and Statistical Manual, 4th Edition, Revised (DSM-IV): The standard manual of psychiatric diagnoses and classification codes.

Gender Identity Disorder: A psychiatric disorder in which a person is not satisfied and is seriously dysphoric with regard to their anatomical gender. In general, this condition is a stable, nonviolent condition and not due to psychosis, but it may accompany other mental disorders.

Hormonal Therapy: The use of hormones to stimulate the development of secondary sexual characteristics such as enlargement of breasts and which may exert systemic effects such as body hair loss.

Sexual Reassignment Therapy: Treatment for gender identity disorder in which one or more of the following are used: hormonal medications, surgical procedures to alter a person's physical appearance so that he/she appears more like the opposite gender and psychological counseling.

III. Guidelines

A. No surgical procedures for the purpose of sexual reassignment shall be provided to any offenders incarcerated in the WDOC.

B. After consultation with the Gender Identity Disorder Committee, hormonal therapy for severe gender dysphoria may be initiated by the WDOC physicians.

The Gender Identity Disorder Committee will consult with a non-WDOC consultant before approving or denying a request from a WDOC physician for initiating hormonal therapy. If the Committee and the non-WDOC consultant do not agree regarding initiating hormonal therapy for severe gender dysphoria, the DOC Medical Director and non-WDOC Consultant will meet with the Secretary's Office to reach a decision.

- C. An offender who is receiving hormonal medications as a part of an established sexual reassignment therapy regimen under the supervision of a medical doctor at the time of incarceration may be continued on hormonal medications provided that the offender cooperates with the DOC in obtaining confirmation of his/her previous treatment. If an offender chooses to discontinue hormonal medications and then wishes to restart hormonal medications, the committee referenced below will evaluate the request and make a determination.
- D. The offender must agree to sign DOC-1163, Confidential Information Release Authorization, allowing DOC medical and mental health staff access to medical and mental health records regarding all prior treatment related to gender identity disorder.
- E. Offenders identified or claiming to suffer from gender identity disorder shall have access to the full range of mental health therapies available through the Wisconsin DOC. They shall have access to therapies in which they may explore their ambivalence, confusion and conflict around sexual identity as well as those services focusing on enabling those with identifiable mental health problems to better adjust to institutional living.
- F. Self-inflicted genital mutilation or other forms of self-mutilation are not consistent with successful sexual reassignment therapy.

Facility Placement

- A. In the event that an offender who has completed a surgical sexual reassignment treatment program is committed to the DOC, that offender shall be placed in a correctional facility appropriate for his/her reassigned gender.
- B. In general, offenders shall be placed in facilities in accordance with their gender as determined by their external genitalia.

Name and Apparel for Inmates with Gender Identity Disorder

- A. The DOC shall use the name of the offender as it appears on the Judgement of Conviction. The only exception to a name change will be through an order of a judge to have the name of the offender legally changed after the Judgement of Conviction. A new Judgement of Conviction must be issued or the court order must specifically state "change all records".

- B. Property and apparel shall be consistent with the offender's determined gender.

Gender Identity Disorder Management and Treatment Committee

- A. **Composition:** The Committee shall be composed of the DOC Medical Director, the DOC Mental Health Director, the Bureau of Health Services Director or designee, an assigned doctoral prepared psychologist, and a Warden or designee. In addition, a medical specialist in the treatment of gender identity disorder from the community may be retained as a consultant on specific cases. If the offender is identified as a sex offender, the Chief Psychologist, Sex Offender Specialist shall participate as a member.
- B. **Function:** The committee shall be convened to address issues in the management of individuals with gender identity disorder after review and referral by the medical director, mental health director or Bureau director. Inmates may be referred to the medical director, mental health director or bureau director to address issues of concern through the committee by institution Wardens or their designees.

The committee shall advise the medical director or treating physician on issues such as appropriate diagnosis, complications of treatment, management issues, and/or the design and implementation of a plan of care.




