

2005 SENATE BILL 361

1 **AN ACT to amend** 15.377 (8) (c) 5m. and 118.19 (10) (c) of the statutes; **relating**
2 **to:** allowing the use of technologies other than fingerprint cards for background
3 checks related to teacher licensing and changing a statutory reference to reflect
4 the name change of the Wisconsin Council of Religious and Independent
5 Schools (suggested as remedial legislation by the Department of Public
6 Instruction).

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

LAW REVISION COMMITTEE PREFATORY NOTE: This bill is a remedial legislation proposal, requested by the Department of Public Instruction and introduced by the Law Revision Committee under s. 13.83 (1) (c) 4., stats. After careful consideration of the various provisions of the bill, the Law Revision Committee has determined that this bill makes minor substantive changes in the statutes, and that these changes are desirable as a matter of public policy.

7 **SECTION 1.** 15.377 (8) (c) 5m. of the statutes is amended to read:

1 15.377 **(8)** (c) 5m. One person licensed as a teacher and actively employed in
2 a private school, recommended by the Wisconsin Association of Nonpublic Schools
3 Council of Religious and Independent Schools.

NOTE: Under current law, one member of the professional standards council for teachers shall be recommended by the Wisconsin Association of Nonpublic Schools. The Wisconsin Association of Nonpublic Schools has changed its name to Wisconsin Council of Religious and Independent Schools. This bill amends the statutory reference to reflect that change.

4 **SECTION 2.** 118.19 (10) (c) of the statutes is amended to read:

5 118.19 **(10)** (c) If the person under par. (b) is a nonresident, or if the state
6 superintendent determines that the person's employment, licensing or state court
7 records provide a reasonable basis for further investigation, the state
8 superintendent shall require the person to be fingerprinted on 2 fingerprint cards,
9 each bearing a complete set of the person's fingerprints, or by other technologies
10 approved by law enforcement agencies. The department of justice may provide for
11 the submission of the fingerprint cards or fingerprints by other technologies to the
12 federal bureau of investigation for the purposes of verifying the identity of the person
13 fingerprinted and obtaining records of his or her criminal arrest and conviction.

NOTE: Under current law, certain individuals who are applying for teacher licensing are required to submit their fingerprints on a fingerprint card. This bill allows the use of technologies other than fingerprint cards for the fingerprinting.
