Collection of fines and forfeitures by counties									

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, when a circuit court imposes a fine or forfeiture for the violation of a non-transportation-related state law or local ordinance, the county treasurer pays 90% of collections to the state and retains 10% as an administrative fee. Under the bill, the county treasurer would retain 20% of fines and forfeitures collected within 120 days of being imposed and 30% of fines and forfeitures collected more than 120 days after being imposed.

Under the bill, to the extent counties that retain the higher percentage of fines and forfeitures, the state share of these fines and forfeitures will decline by an equal amount. Data collected by the Department of Revenue contain no information on when fines and forfeitures are paid versus when the fines or forfeitures are imposed. The Department is therefore unable to estimate the increase in county revenue and decrease in state revenue that the bill could engender.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
