Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

State Fiscal Effect:

The following provisions of the bill are anticipated to have minimal or no state fiscal effect on DPI:

- 1.) Elimination of the requirement that a school board pay the tuition of a pupil enrolled in the school district who attends the University of Wisconsin System if the course the pupil is taking is not offered in the school district, the pupil will receive high school credit for the course, and the pupil is not participating in the Youth Options Program. (The bill allows a school board to pay a pupil's tuition under these circumstances, but does not require it.)
- 2.) Elimination of the requirement that each public and private school annually file a report pertaining to fire drills with the Department of Commerce and with the local fire department. (Instead, the bill requires that each public and private school keep a record of each fire drill for at least seven years.)
- 3.) Elimination of the requirement that each school board adopt rules prohibiting a pupil from using or possessing a paging or two-way communication device while on school premises and to submit the rules to DPI. (Under the bill, school boards may adopt such rules but are not required to.)
- 4.) Elimination of the requirement that a school board report school bus accidents to DPI.
- 5.) Elimination of the requirement that a school district is to report to DPI when it contracts with another school district to acquire or use the other district's facilities or equipment. School boards are required, under the terms of the bill, to adopt a policy on these contracts.
- 6.) Elimination of the requirement that school boards annually adopt a policy on access to extracurricular and recreational school programs and activities.
- 7.) Elimination of the requirement that DPI coordinate the exchange of teachers.
- 8.) Elimination of the requirement that DPI promote public awareness of, access to, and training of health professionals for rural and underserved urban areas.
- 9.) Elimination of the requirement that school boards maintain a mailbox for each school located on a rural mail route.
- 10.) Elimination of the requirement that DPI report to the legislature every three years on all Cooperative Educational Service Agency programs and services.
- 11.) Elimination of the uniform pupil transcript system under s. 115.28(32). Completion date for this system was set in statute by July 1, 1993.
- 12.) Elimination of the consolidated planning grant under s. 115.28 (33). A grant of \$25,000 was to be awarded in the 1991-92 school year.
- 13.) Elimination of a grant to the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee for a direct pilot instruction program under s. 115.28(44). The last year for this grant was 2002-03.

Local Fiscal Effect:

Local school districts may recognize cost savings as a result of the provisions of this bill. However, these savings are indeterminate.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
