## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

The proposed Bill may impact DOT's ability to purchase mitigation property only under some relatively infrequent circumstances. If DOT is prevented from acquiring its first choice of a mitigation property within a city or village boundary, other mitigation options (within or outside of the city/village boundaries) will need to be identified. The cost impact to DOT will be unique to each circumstance, and is dependent upon the value of the property DOT is prevented from buying compared to the value of the property DOT eventually is able to buy for its mitigation purposes. Since property values vary so much from one location to another (including from within a city/village boundary to outside of the boundary), it is not reasonable to speculate on the size of any fiscal impact, if it were to occur, without first knowing the locations and comparative value of the properties. Since we don't when or where this situation may arise, I marked the "Indeterminate" box above.
