REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER

"Majority Leader Fitzgerald, Democratic Leader Kreuser, Justice Prosser, Pastor Corey, Colleagues, friends and family. Thank you very much. And welcome to the People's House. Welcome to the Wisconsin State Assembly. Each of you is here today because you won something. I hope you realize what you won was not merely an election. No, you have won something much more. You have won an opportunity to make a difference, to grapple with the great issues of the day, to touch history, to make people's lives better. It is our task to work together to make Wisconsin the best place in the nation to live, work, raise a family and retire.

It is a high honor and a humbling experience to be elected as your Speaker today.

One of the reasons it is so humbling is because of the guests who have joined us today. The families and friends who fill the aisles and the galleries around us. Whether it is a parent who helped plant a dream in us, friends who spent their year working so we could follow our vision, or a spouse and children who reminded us that we were loved regardless of the title before our name or the number of votes we received, every one of us in this chamber has reached the heights we have only because we have had the help of so many others. Some of those special people are here with us today. Many are with us in spirit only, but are not far from our thoughts.

I think those of us who were elected should take a moment to thank those whose hearts and hands have helped bring us to this special place and who celebrate with us today.

I also want to take a moment to thank my Pastor, Corey Sateren for opening us in prayer and Sara Honadel for sharing her beautiful voice with us again today. Thank you both!

If you will permit me, I would like to personally recognize the very special people to me who are here today.

I think being a politician's wife is the toughest job in the world. They are asked to bear all the same scrutiny and put in much of the same work as a candidate, and all for a title they will not own and job they did not seek. And if in the end their husband wins, the wife's reward is to be forced to share him with 55,000 constituents demanding his time and attention. My wife Valerie has stood by my side since I started chasing my political dreams, and I'm pleased to have her by my side to share this special day with me.

I want to also recognize my sons Ryan and Brett. They are my reality check and make life worth living. I know they're as proud of me as I am of them. And they are a constant reminder that nothing that ever happens in the statehouse will ever be more important than what happens at our house. Speaker of the Assembly is a nice title, but it doesn't hold a candle to the title of being Ryan and Brett's dad. I love my boys.

My Mom, who since I was 6 years old has been telling anyone who would listen that I was going to be President someday, and my dad who, since I could remember has been proud of even my smallest accomplishments. I would never have done any of them without your love and faith in me. My dad has the flu and is unable to attend, but I'm proud to have my mom here today.

My oldest friend, the one who has been there the longest is my sister, Wendy. Her husband and their family are also here from Illinois. Wendy, Andy, Meghan and Hannah, thank you for being here today. My mother-in-law, Elinor is truly a rare woman. A mother-in-law who likes her son-in-law. And I feel the same.

I want to mention someone who isn't here today, but without whom I would not be standing here. 12 years ago, when the people of the 94th District first elected me, some of them were voting for Mike Huebsch. But I'm convinced that more of them were voting for Doc Johnston's son-in-law. Valerie's dad, and Elinor's husband Ken was an extraordinary man. He spent a lifetime as a vet, working farm to farm all throughout the Coulee Region. In that first election, Tommy Thompson's endorsement was nice to have, but it was Ken Johnston's seal of approval that got me elected. Ken went home to be with the Lord 6 years ago, and I miss him, but especially on a day like today.

Finally, I want to thank the people of the 94th District who for 7 terms now have given me the privilege to be their voice in this chamber.

This is a special day. And this is a special place. You've probably heard that before, and if you're here long enough to hear some of your colleagues' farewell speeches you'll hear that again. But it is true.

I believe the State Assembly is a snapshot of Wisconsin. Spend some time in the different communities around our great state and you will never be surprised by the person sitting in this chamber representing that area.

From downtown Milwaukee to outside Oconto. From way up by Bayfield and clear over to Prairie du Chien. Our hometown, our background, our political ideology may be as different as you can imagine.

But in the wisdom of the men who founded our state nearly 160 years ago, these extremely different people are all thrown together in this beautiful building and told to work out the common good of our great state.

That is as amazing and visionary an idea today as it was 160 years ago, that our state's strength will not be born out of some sameness of race, geography, gender, or background, but rather out of our diversity. It is through the interaction of those different traits that groundbreaking ideas arise.

Each of us was sent here to represent the ideas and interests of our constituents, yes. But we were not sent here to represent those ideas in a vacuum. We were sent here to represent them in the context of the needs of the entire state.

In this election, the people of the state saw fit to split control of the houses between Republicans and Democrats. But they did not tell us to grind to a halt. They expect us to lead, to govern. And together we will!

That's the power of this place. That's the magic of this place. Those one-on-one interactions, multiplied by all 99 of us here, all 33 of our colleagues in the Senate, and by our partner in the East Wing are the individual bricks with which our state's future will be built.

We've seen that power in action in the past, as Wisconsin leaders working together led the nation in everything from creating the nation's first Kindergarten in Watertown in 1856

to workman's compensation in 1911. In this chamber we invented School Choice and our welfare reform not only became the model for the nation, but the model for the world. Wisconsin has always been ready to meet challenges with innovative and unique ideas.

Today I am confident that we can see that power in action again as we work to confront the challenges of today: From reining in Wisconsin's high tax burden and runaway health care costs to attracting and creating new jobs and preparing a workforce ready to fill those jobs. From providing wings on which the strongest in our society can soar to providing compassionate arms on which the neediest in our society can lean.

I believe it is within our grasp to meet these challenges and solve these problems if we are willing to work together—individual by individual – to do so. Our system allows it. Our history demonstrates it. Our constituents demand it. It now falls to us to have the will to do it. What legacy will we leave as future generations look back on our brief time here?

President Ronald Reagan said "There is no limit to what you can accomplish if you don't care who gets the credit."

When we, in this special place, use partisan or parochial battles to tear each other down, all the people of this state lose.

When we focus on our own personal, political fortunes rather than the collective good of the entire state, even what we may call "success" rings hollow in the ears of the individuals and families looking to us for real leadership.

I spoke earlier about an opportunity to make a difference. Let us resolve today to enthusiastically seize that opportunity, and conduct ourselves in such a way that two years from now, whether I'm still standing here or you're still sitting there, or whether we are home reflecting on a political career that was, we will all be able to look back with pride on the work we did here and say we made Wisconsin a better place.

Now let's get to work...together!

REMARKS BY THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

The State Elections Board staff has received a number of inquiries concerning the last day on which the legislature may act to ensure that a proposed constitutional amendment can be

placed on the ballot for the April 3, 2007 spring election. The legislature must complete action on a proposed constitutional amendment no later than Tuesday, February 20, 2007.

By statute all proposed constitutional amendments and any other measure or question that is to be submitted to a vote of the people shall be filed with the official or agency responsible for preparing the ballots for the election no later than 42 days prior to the election at which the amendment, measure or question will appear on the ballot. S. 8.37 Wis. Stats. Tuesday, February 20, 2007, is 42 days before the April 3, 2007 spring election.

In order for the legislative action to be filed in our office, it is sufficient for the chief clerks to notify our office by e-mail, that the legislature passed the resolution no later than Tuesday, February 20, 2007. It is not necessary that we receive the signed resolution by the close of business on Tuesday, February 20, 2007.

In order to facilitate preparation for the April 2007 spring election, I suggest that the sponsoring legislators contact the office of the Attorney General to make arrangements for the preparation of the explanatory statement required by S. 10.01 (2)(c) Wis. Stats. The explanatory statement is published in the paper by the county clerk immediately before the election. It is also posted at the polling place on election day.

The Department of Health and Family Services is pleased to report to you and the Legislature on the development of a uniform document of gift form that will aid families considering the donation of a loved one's organs and tissues. This work was required by 2005 Wisconsin Act 229.

2005 Wisconsin Act 229, effective November 1, 2006, required that additional information be included in any document of anatomical gift for organ and tissue donation. Act 229 also directed the DHFS to convene a group of interested parties to discuss and provide input about the development of a document for use by all parties including hospitals, organ procurement organizations, tissue banks, coroners and medical examiners involved in the donation process.

In September, DHFS convened a group to discuss the need for a statewide form. The group included representatives from the Wisconsin Hospital Association; University of Wisconsin Organ Procurement Organization; Wisconsin Donor Network Organ Procurement Organization; American Tissue Services Foundation; the Musculoskeletal Foundation; RTI Donor Services; Wisconsin Tissue Bank; the Lions Eye Bank of Wisconsin; the Wisconsin Coroners and Medical Examiners Association and the Wisconsin Funeral Directors Association. In the course of several meetings, the parties concluded that a uniform document had value and reached consensus on the specifics of the form. This document provides grieving families with the information they need and simplifies the consent process.

Through this effort, Wisconsin has become one of the first states to have a uniform consent form for organ, tissue and eye donation. The model form has been distributed to all organ and tissue recovery organizations, and the Wisconsin Hospital Association has shared it with their members. On November 1, 2006, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$12.0 million. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$8.5 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$12.0 million on November 1, 2006. Wisconsin Act 211 authorizes the fiscal year 2007 transfer of \$25.4 million from the General Fund to the Medical Assistance Trust Fund, which will offset this cash deficiency.

On November 1, 2006, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0 thousand. The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$2.0 thousand on November 1, 2006. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On November 1, 2006, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.7 million. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.8 million. The Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$2.8 million on November 30, 2006. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund and Worker's Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use

of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

In 1997 Act 27, the 97-99 Biennial Budget, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. DHFS and (for certain child care providers) counties and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to the Department, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Sections 48.685(5g) and 50.065(5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct the Department to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. Attached is the report for 2006.

On December 5, 2006, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$333.0 million. This negative balance continued through December 28, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$116.5 million. The General Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$547.0 million on December 7, 2006. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 1, 2006, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$8.5 million. This negative balance continued through December 31, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$5.4 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$8.5 million on December 1, 2006. 2005 Wisconsin Act 211 authorizes the fiscal year 2007 transfer of \$25.4 million from the General Fund to the Medical Assistance Trust Fund, which will offset this cash deficiency.

On December 1, 2006, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0

thousand. This negative balance continued through December 31, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On December 27, 2006, the Wisconsin Building Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.3 million. This negative balance continued through December 31, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.6 million. The Wisconsin Building Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$1.6 million on December 29, 2006. The negative balance was due to a delayed cash transfer from the University of Wisconsin.

On December 1, 2006, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.8 million. This negative balance continued through December 31, 2006, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$3.5 million. The Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$3.5 million on December 6, 2006. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Wisconsin Building Trust Fund and Worker's Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

The following information is provided to you pursuant to 301.03(6m) Wis. Stats. The figures below pertain to calendar year 2006.

1) In 2005, there were 70 Chapter 51 mental health commitments within the Department of Corrections. 58

commitments were obtained at the Wisconsin Resource Center (male inmates) and 12 commitments were obtained at Taycheedah Correctional Institution (female inmates).

After a Chapter 51 commitment, male inmates return to the Wisconsin Resource Center (WRC) for further treatment. Average length of stay for WRC inmates was 343 days. No male inmates were directly transferred to a state mental health institute on a voluntary or involuntary basis. Instead, the Wisconsin Resource Center provides an inpatient setting that is used for intensive mental health treatment of male inmates.

After a chapter 51 commitment, 9 females were transferred directly to Winnebago Mental Health Institute (WMHI) and 3 were transferred back to Taycheedah Correctional Institution. All 9 of the transfers to WMHI represented involuntary transfers, and the average length of stay was 75 days. There were no voluntary transfers to a state mental health institute.

- 2) The total number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication in 2006 was 6865. This number includes inmates who were incarcerated for short-term stays as well as long-term stays. The number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication on any specific date is estimated at approximately 3900. Of these, the number treated on an involuntary basis was the same as the number of involuntary commitments (70). Major classes of medication included antidepressants, antipsychotics, and mood stabilizers.
- 3) Mental Health Services are available at all of the major institutions. Services include crisis intervention, individual counseling, and group therapy. Specific programs include sex offender treatment, anger management, domestic violence, substance abuse treatment, and cognitive interventions. Psychiatrists are available at all major institutions to provide evaluations for psychotropic medication and management of these medications. In addition, consultation is available from both psychologists and psychiatrists to evaluate competency to consent to psychotropic medication and/or medical treatment.

AGENCY REPORTS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

February 16, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Unemployment Reserve Fund for the years ended June 30, 2006 and 2005. We performed the audit at the request of the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) and to meet our audit responsibilities under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

Our audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the financial statements and related notes. It does not discuss DWD's ongoing development of computer software to support the Unemployment Insurance program, which we will address in a future evaluation.

During the period of this audit, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was lower than in prior years and ranged between 4.5 percent and 5.0 percent. However, unemployment benefit payments and other expenses exceeded employer contributions and other revenues. Consequently, the Unemployment Reserve Fund's balance continued to decline from its high of \$1.9 billion as of June 30, 2000. The Fund's balance was \$971.0 million at the start of our audit period and \$895.0 million as of June 30, 2006. 2005 Wisconsin Act 86 directed DWD to study the long-term financial stability of the Fund and report to the Unemployment Insurance Advisory Council by July 1, 2007, on any measures required to maintain the Fund's stability.

As part of our audit, we matched data on unemployment benefit payments and individuals in the custody of the Department of Corrections. From this work, it was determined that two prisoners had inappropriately received \$2,697 in unemployment benefits. We have therefore recommended in a separate audit communication that DWD work with the Department of Corrections to periodically identify any similar instances of inappropriate benefit payments.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DWD staff during the audit.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of January 2007.

On January 1, 2007, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at its intra-month low of a negative \$5.2 million. This negative balance continued through January 23, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$277.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through January 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Building Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.2 million. This negative balance continued through January 11, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$5.3 million. The Wisconsin Building Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$2.8 million on January 4, 2007. The negative balance was due to a delayed cash transfer from the University of Wisconsin.

On January 1, 2007, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$3.5 million. This negative balance continued through January 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$1.9 million. The Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$4.3 million on January 3, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Wisconsin Building Trust Fund and Worker's Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

The 1983-85 budget act, 1983 Wisconsin Act 27, created the Community Integration Program (CIP) for Residents of State Centers under s. 46.275. The intent of this program "is to relocate persons from the state centers for the developmentally disabled into appropriate community settings with the assistance of home and community-based services and with continuity of care. The intent of the program is also to minimize its impact on state employees through redeployment of employees into vacant positions." S. 46.275(5m) requires the Department to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance and to the Chief Clerk of each house of the Legislature describing the program's impact during the preceding calendar year on state employees, including the Department's efforts to redeploy employees into vacant positions and the number of employees laid off.

The 2003-05 biennial budget provided for the phasedown of long term care services at Northern Wisconsin Center and the placement of residents in community settings. Northern Wisconsin Center's last long term care resident was placed into the community in September, 2006. Southern and Central Wisconsin Centers continued to relocate individuals under the CIP program as well during CYO6. For the period of January 1, 2006 to December 31, 2006, 22 center residents were placed into the community. The Department was able to reduce positions and dollars for calendar year 2006 without employee layoffs and without redeploying employees into vacant positions.

AGENCY REPORTS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed an evaluation of personnel policies and practices within the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS), as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. In March 2006, the 16 technical college districts employed 7,181 full- and part-time faculty and 5,664 full- and part-time support staff and administrators. Each district is a local unit of government that establishes its own personnel policies. The State's Technical College System Board and its 63 staff oversee certain district operations.

The earnings of WTCS employees reflect compensation rates and workloads specified in each district's policies and collective bargaining agreements. Full-time faculty earned an average of \$74,598 in fiscal year (FY) 2004-05, in part because most received additional compensation for work exceeding a full-time workload ranging from 32 to 40 hours per week. By comparison, faculty at the two-year University of Wisconsin Colleges earned an average of \$52,552 in 2005. Faculty in the largest WTCS district-Milwaukee Area-earned the most: an average of \$89,850.

Every district pays all or part of the cost of health insurance for retirees. By FY 2009-10, all public employers are required to report the cost of such non-pension benefits, which are known as other post-employment benefits (OPEB). Accounting rules do not require employers to fund these costs, but large unfunded liabilities could affect future operations. WTCS districts' OPEB liabilities are largely unfunded, and the Milwaukee Area district's is by far the greatest, at \$228.6 million.

The amounts of leave earned by WTCS employees vary widely. Full-time WTCS employees reported using an average of 6.0 days of sick leave in FY 2004-05, although 38.1 percent of faculty reported using no sick leave.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Technical College System Board and each of the districts. A response from the WTCS President follows the appendices.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

March 22, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(de), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, which insures health care providers in Wisconsin against medical malpractice claims that exceed the primary malpractice insurance thresholds established in statutes. We have provided an unqualified auditor's report on the Fund's financial statements for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2006, 2005, and 2004.

The Fund continues to maintain a sound financial position. Its audited financial statements show net assets of \$59.8 million as of June 30, 2006, the highest year-end balance reported since the Fund's inception. The Governor's 2007-09 Biennial Budget Proposal would transfer \$175.0 million from the Fund to a newly created heath care quality fund. Although the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund has accumulated cash and investments of \$737.4 million to pay estimated loss liabilities of \$685.0 million as of June 30, 2006, a transfer of \$175.0 million would place it in a deficit accounting position. In addition, 2003 Wisconsin Act 111 established the Fund as an irrevocable trust for the sole benefit of participating health care providers and proper claimants.

The Fund's computerized provider system, which tracks and accounts for its operations, is aging and experiencing errors that require regular manual reviews and adjustments to correct. The condition of the system presents increased risks to the Fund's financial operations. The Governor's 2007-09 Biennial Budget Proposal recommends additional funding of \$600,000 for the development and implementation of a new system.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance and the contractors who assist in administering the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund program. A response from the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance follows the appendices.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes)

and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the temporary reallocation of balances' authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of February 2007.

On February 16, 2007, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$873.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through February 28, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$4.2 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$5.1 million on February 22, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On February 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through February 28, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$2.0 thousand on February 6, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Conservation Fund and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each funds share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

March 30, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our annual financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin. This audit satisfies state agencies' audit requirements under the federal Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended, and the federal Office of Management and

Budget Circular A-133. It also assists us in meeting audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

This audit covers \$9.4 billion in federal financial assistance that state agencies administered in fiscal year (FY) 2005-06. We assessed the propriety of revenues and expenditures and tested internal controls and compliance with laws and regulations for 16 federal programs that were selected for review using risk-based assessment criteria established by the federal government.

Our report contains the auditor's reports on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance with program requirements and our unqualified audit opinion on the State of Wisconsin Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards. We also discuss the results of our follow-up to prior audit findings. Overall, state agencies have complied with federal grant requirements and have taken steps to address findings included in last year's single audit report. However, we report internal control deficiencies and several areas of federal noncompliance, and we question \$14,697 in costs charged to the federal programs, in addition to \$4.4 million already returned. The federal government will contact state agencies to resolve the findings and questioned costs included in our report.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by state agency staff during our audit. Agencies' comments on individual findings, along with their corrective action plans to address our concerns, are included within the agency narratives.

I am pleased to present to you, for distribution to the Wisconsin Legislature, the annual evaluation report on the Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program. It is also available on our website, www.dot.wisconsin.gov/library/publications/topic/safety.htm. The program, created by section 85.53 Wis. Stats., was established by the legislature in 1997 with the requirement that the Department study its impact and report on its findings.

The Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program is intended for offenders who are arrested for their second or subsequent OWl (Operating While Intoxicated) offense. Offender participation may be voluntary or court ordered. It is an intervention model designed to get offenders into counseling, treatment and supervision as soon as possible after the arrest. The program is individual to each community.

As you will see in the report, no community that has begun a program has dropped it. Overall, offenders who successfully completed the program were less likely than non-participants to be re-arrested for subsequent OWl violations. Those who were re-arrested went significantly longer between arrests than non-participants. Currently there are seven counties on a waiting list for funding to begin programs.

I commend those people who have dedicated themselves to making this innovative program a success. There are no "silver bullets" in eradicating impaired driving, but I feel this effort is a vital piece in the total transportation safety effort.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a review of information technology (IT) projects that describes and provides cost and funding information for 184 projects in 28 executive branch agencies. We identified 103 projects that were completed in the past two fiscal years at an estimated cost of \$90.6 million, and 81 projects that were ongoing at the start of fiscal year 2006-07 and are expected to cost \$201.1 million upon completion.

Individual projects with costs of \$1.0 million or more represent 92.7 percent of the expected costs of ongoing projects. These large projects are typically complex and entail a significant risk of exceeding estimated costs and time lines. We note particular concerns with six ongoing projects that are expected to cost a total of \$122.7 million upon completion and have already experienced difficulties.

In a detailed review of selected large, high-risk projects, we found evidence of inadequate planning that increased costs and compromised timeliness. Estimated costs for one project to customize software for administering the Unemployment Insurance program increased by \$18.7 million, and another project was suspended after \$23.6 million had been spent. In addition, sales and use tax software with a cost of at least \$24.9 million is being replaced only five years after implementation. Two statewide IT consolidation projects have experienced significant delays and cost overruns. A third, intended to replace approximately 100 types of administrative software and projected to cost at least \$66.6 million upon completion, requires close monitoring.

The Department of Administration (DOA) has broad statutory authority to oversee and coordinate state IT projects. However, its oversight has been inadequate. We include recommendations to improve DOA's collaboration with other agencies in identifying high-risk projects and establishing planning standards, including quantifiable performance

measures. We also include recommendations to enhance legislative oversight of high-risk IT projects.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by officials and staff of DOA and other agencies. DOA's response follows the appendices.

We have followed up on the Department of Revenue's (DOR's) efforts to address concerns related to the processing and distribution of sales and use taxes through its Integrated Tax System (ITS), which was implemented in December 2002. In a letter report issued in December 2005, we summarized challenges DOR faced during implementation of the sales and use tax component of ITS, including an initial backlog in processing sales and use tax returns, various computer programming problems, and errors in distributions from the State to counties and professional sports districts that assess their own sales and use taxes. Difficulties in planning ITS are described in a review of state information technology projects (report 07-5) that we are issuing today.

Our current analyses, together with work performed by the system's developer, indicate the errors we reported in December 2005 have been addressed effectively in ITS. This work provides reasonable assurance that ITS is accurately calculating counties' and two professional sports districts' shares of reported sales and use taxes.

To better understand sales and use tax trends, we analyzed and identified reasons for a decline in 2006 sales and use tax distributions to the Green Bay/Brown County Professional Football Stadium District. We found the decline was largely the result of lower sales and use taxes reported for the football stadium district; certain changes in sales and use tax law; and a reporting error by a single, large business entity.

In February 2007, DOR announced that ITS will be replaced with new software from a different vendor, at an estimated cost of \$3.3 million. Given the challenges faced in implementing ITS, we believe continued oversight will be important to ensure accuracy in the processing and distribution of local governments' sales and use taxes. Our report includes a recommendation for reporting by DOR to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DOR staff during our review.

On March 30, 2007, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$37.3 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On March 1, 2007, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$4.3 million. This negative balance continued through March 15, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$19.2 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$5.9 million on March 7, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On March 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through March 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Conservation Fund and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by

the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At your request, we have completed a limited-scope review of how the Department of Commerce and the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) have spent funds from the Fire Department Dues Program in recent years.

Commerce is appropriated funds to administer a statewide fire inspection and prevention program. In fiscal year (FY) 2005-06, its expenditures totaled \$641,900, 65.6 percent of which supported the salaries and fringe benefits of 6.6 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions that are responsible for distributing program funds to municipalities and training fire department staff in inspection duties. In FY 2005-06,

Commerce charged \$92,700 in overhead costs to the program, representing 14.4 percent of its expenditures for administering the program.

WTCS is appropriated program funds for two purposes: to administer fire prevention and protection training programs and to offer training courses to local firefighters in technical college districts. In FY 2005-06, its expenditures for administration of the program totaled \$435,000, 41.2 percent of which supported salary and fringe benefit costs for 3.0 FTE positions in the central office. In FY 2005-06, WTCS spent \$117,500 for supplies, primarily to purchase office furniture and supplies for the program as part of WTCS's move to new offices, and charged \$15,800 in overhead costs to the program, representing 3.6 percent of its expenditures for administering the program.

In recent years, WTCS has spent almost all of the \$600,000 it has been appropriated annually for conducting training courses in technical college districts. However, until recently it has not spent all of the funds appropriated to it for administration of the program. Funds for administration of the program that are not spent or encumbered do not lapse but instead remain in the appropriation. At the end of FY 2005-06, unspent funds, which are available for reallocation by the Legislature, totaled \$308,000.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Commerce and WTCS.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

During the course of a September 2005 financial review of internal controls at the Green Bay Correctional Institution, we became aware of a credit union on its grounds and employing state workers. In 2006, we conducted additional fieldwork to learn more about the operations of this credit union and identified another credit union operating at Waupun Correctional Institution. We assessed whether state resources, including state employee staff time, were being used to conduct credit union business. We did not review the financial condition of each credit union; however, we note that as required by s. 186.235(16), Wis. Stats., each credit union has been subject to regular inspections by the Office of Credit Unions within the Department of Financial Institutions.

The credit unions were incorporated and chartered in 1932, and they continue to serve several hundred members. However, both their location and prison officials' limited knowledge about their operations raise some concern that state resources have been used inappropriately. For example, until we raised the issue, and contrary to Department of Corrections policy, conflict-of-interest forms were not on file for any of the five state employees who are also paid employees of the credit unions. Further, the Waupun credit union is located in the business office, and staff have reported that information on credit union services is sometimes provided during state office hours.

We believe steps should be taken to ensure compliance with the Department's policies concerning outside employment and to establish a clear separation between credit union and state business. It may also be appropriate to consider whether the credit unions should continue to operate under the existing arrangements.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff at the Department of Corrections and at the Office of Credit Unions within the Department of Financial Institutions as we conducted this review.

REFERRAL OF AGENCY REPORTS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

May 3, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As part of our ongoing audit responsibilities, we conducted a limited-scope review of pricing policies for canteens in each of the 20 adult correctional institutions administered by the Department of Corrections (DOC). Canteens operate as prison stores from which inmates may purchase packaged foods, cards, stamps, personal items, toiletries, and other items. Institution administrators have broad authority for canteen operations. For example, they choose whether an institution will operate its canteen directly or select a private vendor, as well as which items will be sold to inmates. Canteens are managed by state employees in 14 institutions and by contractors in the other 6.

DOC has established pricing policies that apply to both state-operated and contract canteens. These policies require items sold in the canteens to be priced approximately 10 percent above the price paid by the vendor. The mark-up now appears to be consistently applied, but we found that differences in prices for similar items were sometimes substantial and that these differences occurred in both state-operated and contract canteens.

In February 2003, an internal working group reported that consolidating canteen operations would likely result in reduced costs to DOC and inmates. We include a recommendation for DOC to reassess the cost-effectiveness of consolidating canteen operations, either through a private vendor or with state employees, and report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee by October 1, 2007.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DOC staff during the course of our review.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we have completed an evaluation of wetland regulatory programs

administered by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). In fiscal year 2005-06, estimated expenditures for wetland regulatory activities, including permitting, enforcement, and mapping, totaled \$1.75 million, including \$1.43 million in salaries and fringe benefits for an estimated 19.3 full-time equivalent employees.

Most projects that disturb wetlands require approval from both DNR and the United States Army Corps of Engineers. From January 2001 through June 2006, DNR approved 3,582 permits, or 82.6 percent of the applications it received. However, the process is complicated and requires frequent communication with applicants. Although DNR generally issued permits within 120 days, as required by statute, 282 decisions took longer than one year from when the application was received.

Other states differ in the manner and extent to which they regulate wetlands. For example, local governments, rather than state agencies, approve permits for activities that disturb wetlands in Minnesota. Further, most midwestern states require compensation for permitted wetland losses, although Wisconsin does not. As a result, DNR approved only 52 compensatory mitigation projects from February 2002 through June 2006.

We make recommendations to simplify the permitting process and improve program management, including establishing categories of general permits, providing additional guidance to applicants, improving coordination with federal agencies, and tracking permitted wetland losses. We also include recommendations for DNR to report to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee by December 31, 2007, with options for increasing the use of mitigation banking, eliminating duplicative state and federal permits, and improving its wetland maps.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DNR and other state and federal agencies. DNR's response follows the appendices.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of April 2007.

On April 5, 2007, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$45.7 million. This negative balance continued intermittently through April 19, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$73.0 million. The General Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$397.0 million on April 13, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On April 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

AGENCY REPORTS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(dm), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of State Fair Park. We have issued an unqualified opinion on State Fair Park's fiscal year (FY) 2005-06 financial statements. In addition, we have continued to monitor State Fair Park's financial condition and its efforts to improve its financial performance.

In FY 2005-06, State Fair Park's expenditures exceeded revenues by \$1.7 million, increasing the fairgrounds' accumulated cash deficit to \$11.5 million. As part of efforts to improve State Fair Park's financial condition, agency officials have restructured the fairgrounds' financial relationships with two other facilities that operate on the fairgrounds: the Milwaukee Mile and the Pettit National Ice Center.

In December 2005, State Fair Park entered into an agreement with a private promoter to operate the Milwaukee Mile racetrack. The promoter acquired all promotional rights to the racetrack in exchange for an annual license fee. This license fee will provide State Fair Park with between \$1.7 million and \$1.8 million per year over the 18-year term of the agreement.

In January 2007, the Pettit Center was sold to its managing not-for-profit corporation for nearly \$5.6 million. Proceeds from the sale will be used to fund remaining debt service payments, which at the time of the sale were \$5.7 million. As a condition of the sale, State Fair Park waived \$1.0 million in past-due rent, which had been outstanding since June 30, 2004

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of State Fair Park. A response from State Fair Park's executive director follows the appendix.

Section 36.11(22)(2)(b) <u>Wis. Stat.</u> § 36.11(22)(2)(b) requires the Board of Regents to annually submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature on the methods used by each UW System institution to disseminate information to students on sexual assault and sexual harassment.

The law requires UW System institutions to incorporate into their orientation programs for newly entering students oral and written information on sexual assault and sexual harassment, including information on: 1) sexual assault by acquaintances of the victims; 2) the legal definitions and penalties for sexual assault; 3) generally available national, state, and campus statistics on sexual assault; 4) the rights of victims; and 5) protective behaviors including methods of recognizing and avoiding sexual assault and sexual harassment. In addition, each institution must annually supply to all students enrolled in the institution printed material that includes information on all of these topics. This law was enacted in April 1990 and this is the seventeenth report to be compiled for the Legislature since its enactment.

At its meeting April 8, 2007, the Board of Regents accepted the attached 2006 report for submission to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under <u>Wis. Stat.</u> § 13.172(3). The attached report fulfills the requirements of this statute.

The enclosed report, which covers the federal fiscal year 2005, was provided to the federal government. The federal fiscal year (FFY) is defined as June 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006 because this is a program managed by the U.S. Department of Education. Beginning in FFY 2005, the federal government requires all states to report according to new guidelines, which include federally-established program outcomes. The enclosed report is the first Annual Performance Report based on these new guidelines and will serve as baseline data for future reporting years.

As intended, the vast majority, over 95%, of children are served in their homes (90%) or other settings for typically developing children such as child care centers. Pursuant to s. 25.17(14r), Wis. Stats., I want to advise you of revisions to SWIB's "Investment Policy, Objectives and Guidelines" recently approved by the Board of Trustees. These guidelines apply to SWIB's internal investment managers. I am sending you electronic copies of the revised guidelines plus a red-lined copy that shows the language added or deleted.

The statutes do not appear to require SWIB to inform you of changes we make to contracts with external managers. However, the percentage of the assets managed by external managers has grown over the past few years. In light of that, we decided in 2006 to advise you of changes we make to those contracts. During the past six months, SWIB made a change to all contracts with external managers who manage global or emerging market fixed income portfolios. The change clarifies the procedure the manager should follow if sovereign debt the manager holds is downgraded. SWIB also modified the contract with one manager that manages an opportunistic high yield/emerging markets fixed income portfolio to allow the manager to invest up to 5% of the market value of the portfolio in defaulted debt in countries in which it is authorized to invest.

Pursuant to Wis. Stats., s. 50.04(5)(fr), I am submitting the Department's annual report to the Legislature related to class A violations committed by nursing homes, including facilities serving individuals with developmental disabilities, and forfeitures assessed on nursing homes for those violations.

As defined by Wis. Stat., s. 50.04(4)(3b), a class A violation is "... a violation of this subchapter or of the rules promulgated thereunder which creates a condition or occurrence relating to the operation and maintenance of a nursing home presenting a substantial probability that death or serious mental or physical harm to a resident will result...."

The Department issued 43 class A violations in calendar year 2006. The enclosed report provides details on all class A violations, including the original forfeiture amount assessed and the status of payment.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

June 26, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit and biennial program evaluation of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. We have issued an unqualified opinion on financial statements prepared by the Wisconsin Lottery for fiscal year (FY) 2005-06 and FY 2004-05.

Over the past five years, total sales increased 19.0 percent, from \$427.6 million in FY 2001-02 to \$509.0 million in FY 2005-06. Net lottery proceeds provided \$133.3 million in property tax relief in FY 2005-06.

To maximize revenue from sales and increase the net proceeds available to fund property tax relief, the Wisconsin Lottery seeks to maintain player interest by offering a variety of games at different prices. It has improved its instant game development and management practices since our 2005 evaluation (report 05-8) and modified the Retailer Performance program, which provides performance-based incentives to retailers.

The annual product information budget for the Wisconsin Lottery has been \$4.6 million since FY 1990-91. Proposals are pending in the Legislature to increase the product information budget to \$7.5 million annually.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Wisconsin Lottery staff in the Department of Revenue. The Department's response follows the appendices.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of May 2007.

On May 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2,000. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2,000. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfall was not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

Wisconsin's Public Health Preparedness Program continues to strengthen the foundation of preparedness through preparedness and response planning, workforce competency development and exercises with evaluation. State and local partners plan, train and exercise together to assure not only individual agency response capability, but also strong coordination for regional and statewide response. Highlights of the Pubic Health Preparedness Report include:

- Extensive pandemic influenza planning, purchasing of antiviral medication and exercising plans for disease containment.
- Establishing cross-border capacity through participation in the Great Lakes Border Health Initiative, consisting of MN, WI, MI, IN, OH, PA, NY and Ontario. This group has developed and tested guidelines for sharing communicable disease information across state and international borders.
- Implementing the Wisconsin Electronic Disease Surveillance System and associated electronic laboratory reporting for real time access to disease identification.
- Developing Chemical Emergency Assessment Teams to mobilize environmental health staff resources in the event of a major incident resulting from chemical agents, radiological agents or natural disasters.
- Testing, evaluating and improving emergency response to public health emergencies, terrorism and mass casualty events at the State, regional, local and tribal level.

These successes reflect sustained progress as well as exciting enhancements to Wisconsin's readiness to prevent, detect, investigate, control and recover from a public health event.

The Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) is pleased to submit to you and the Legislature the annual Wisconsin Immunization Program Legislative Report for State Fiscal Year 2007. The attached report is required by Wisconsin Statutes 252.04(11).

Wisconsin continues to make important progress towards attaining the goals set forth in Governor Doyle's KidsFirst Initiative and Healthiest Wisconsin 2010. The percentage of school aged children that meet the minimum immunization standard as required by the student immunization law requirements increased from 88.5% in the 2005-06 school year to 91.7% in the 2006-07 school year. For students attending the Milwaukee Public Schools there was a significant increase, from 44.9% to 61.3%, in the same time period. DHFS staff continues to work with other public and private partners to identify opportunities to improve immunizations rates for all children living in Milwaukee. Other highlights of the Legislative Report include:

- •The implementation of newly licensed vaccines to prevent potentially serious diseases in children and adolescents has increased the amount of federal funds for vaccine purchase from \$18.3 million in SFY 2006 to \$25.9 million in SFY 2007.
- •The annual Kindergarten Immunization Assessment indicates a 6% increase in the percentage of children that are considered to have completed their immunizations and a 1.6% decrease in the percentage of children who have opted for a personal conviction waiver.
- •The Wisconsin Immunization Registry (WIR) continues to be a success with an increase in the number of records in the system, an increase in users and enhancements added to the system that will be beneficial in a bioterrorism or related event.
- •With Governor Doyle's announcement that parents and guardians will have direct access to their children's immunization history in the WIR, there have been approximately 6,000 public access attempts per month.

We are pleased with this progress and will continue our strong partnership with other public and private health care providers in Wisconsin to ensure that children are properly immunized.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

July 24, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed an evaluation of the allocation of prosecutor positions, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The State has funded county-level prosecutors, including district attorneys, deputy district attorneys, and assistant district attorneys, since 1990. As of July 1, 2006, there were 424.65 full-time equivalent (FTE) county-level prosecutors statewide. Fiscal year 2005-06 expenditures totaled \$44.4 million, including \$40.8 million in general purpose revenue.

Each year, the State Prosecutors Office in the Department of Administration (DOA) calculates prosecutorial staffing needs in each county using a formula that considers current staffing levels and the number and types of cases prosecuted by each county. However, the formula has never been used to reallocate positions across counties. The current weighted caseload formula estimates that statewide, district attorneys' offices are understaffed by 117.33 FTE positions.

Prosecutors have expressed a number of concerns with the formula's calculation of staffing needs. We found that while the formula's basic methodology is sound, it uses incomplete data and out-of-date measures of the time required to prosecute cases. Updating the formula will require use of a more accurate data source and a new time study to measure prosecutors' work.

We also examined the extent to which prosecutors' workloads are affected by other agencies, including prisons and the courts. We found that cases involving prison inmates are relatively rare but can be time-consuming, and that better coordination between district attorneys and prison officials could assist in mitigating the workload impact of crimes committed by inmates.

We identify several issues for the Legislature to consider in allocating prosecutor positions. For example, creating a pool of "floating" assistant district attorneys could help counties manage unexpected or short-term workload increases.

We appreciate the courtesy extended to us by DOA, district attorneys and their staffs, and other state and local officials we contacted during our evaluation. DOA's response follows the appendices.

The Department of Health and Family Services is pleased to submit to you, as required by s. 253.115 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the annual report on the status of Universal Newborn Hearing Screening (UNHS) in Wisconsin. Once again I am pleased to note that in 2006 Wisconsin hospitals have exceeded the legislative directive that at least 88% of all deliveries be performed in hospitals with a UNHS program. In 2006, 99.9% of Wisconsin babies born in birthing hospitals were born in hospitals with a universal newborn hearing screening program. Including children born at home, 96% of all Wisconsin newborns were screened for hearing disorders in 2006.

Hearing loss is the most common congenital birth defect affecting Wisconsin infants. If hearing loss is left undetected, it will impede speech, language, cognitive and social development. Working in collaboration with other public and private agencies, the Department has developed an exemplary program of early hearing detection and intervention. The Department looks forward to continuing to provide a sound beginning for Wisconsin babies.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed an evaluation of the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, as directed by s. 25.17(51m), Wis. Stats. As of December 31, 2006, the Investment Board managed a total of \$88.4 billion in investments that included assets of the Wisconsin Retirement System, the State Investment Fund, and five smaller insurance and trust funds.

The retirement funds provided mixed returns for periods ending December 31, 2005 and 2006. The Core Fund exceeded all of its benchmarks. The Variable Fund met or exceeded all of its benchmarks in 2005 but lagged its three-and five-year benchmarks at the end of 2006. We include a recommendation for the Investment Board to re-evaluate its policies and procedures for making decisions affecting the Variable Fund's performance.

The Core Fund's performance ranked in the middle in comparison to nine other public pension funds surveyed as of December 2006. A relatively lower allocation to private equity and real estate and underperformance of its domestic equities contributed to this ranking.

In past years, the Investment Board encountered difficulties in the management of private markets investments. It has made organizational, staffing, and procedural changes to address these concerns. Correspondingly, its private markets investments have provided strong returns in recent years.

The Investment Board manages two private markets portfolios with a Wisconsin emphasis. The Wisconsin private debt portfolio is providing solid returns. However, it is too early to assess the long-term success of the Wisconsin private equity portfolio, which was established in 2000.

As required by s. 13.94(1)(dg), Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the dental services grant provided by the Department of Health and Family Services to the Marquette University School of Dentistry for fiscal year (FY) 2004-05 and FY 2005-06. Under this grant program, Marquette University received general purpose revenue funding of \$2.8 million in each year to provide dental services to low income individuals at clinics in various locations throughout Wisconsin.

Overall, we found Marquette University has developed and implemented adequate procedures to ensure compliance with statutory and grant requirements. In addition, we found state funds were expended only for services normally considered a part of comprehensive general dental treatments, as required by statute.

We note that dental services expenses exceeded revenues by \$1.6 million in FY 2004-05, and \$1.8 million in FY 2005-06. Marquette University staff note that clinic revenues, which

include the State's grant as well as patient fees and other revenues, are not intended to cover all costs and that the clinics also depend upon financial support from other sources, such as tuition. In addition, we note that at the end of calendar year 2006, a federal Medicare waiver demonstration project ended and two clinics in the City of Milwaukee were closed. In FY 2006-07, the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee authorized a one-time \$1.0 million grant for Marquette University to open two new clinics in Milwaukee.

As required by s. 39.46, Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the dental education contract between the State of Wisconsin and the Marquette University School of Dentistry for fiscal year (FY) 2004-05 and FY 2005-06. During this period, the State provided \$8,753 each to 142 Wisconsin residents enrolled in the undergraduate dental education program in FY 2004-05, and 159 Wisconsin residents in FY 2005-06, for a total of nearly \$2.6 million during the two-year period.

Overall, we found that Marquette University was in compliance with its contract with the State and with requirements set forth in s. 39.46, Wis. Stats. During our review, we found the students for whom Marquette University claimed tuition aid were certified by the Higher Educational Aids Board as Wisconsin residents and were eligible to receive this state aid. In addition, we found that Marquette University spent state funds only for the undergraduate dental school program, gave preference in admissions to Wisconsin residents, and promoted minority enrollment.

As requested by the Public Service Commission (PSC), we have completed a financial audit of the Universal Service

Fund, which was established to ensure that all state residents receive essential telecommunications services and have access to advanced telecommunications capabilities. It is funded primarily through assessments on telecommunications providers, which totaled \$30.2 million in fiscal year (FY) 2005-06. Our audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the Universal Service Fund's financial statements for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2006 and 2005.

The largest program supported by the Universal Service Fund is the Educational Telecommunications Access Program, which is administered by the Department of Administration. This program subsidizes data lines and video links for eligible educational institutions. In FY 2005-06, expenditures for these activities totaled \$11.6 million, or 50.4 percent of the Universal Service Fund's total expenditures. In September 2006, the State completed the conversion to a new statewide data and video network for program participants, as well as for state government and other public sector users.

Eight of the 13 programs supported by the Universal Service Fund are operated by the PSC. The Legislature limits the amount the PSC can annually assess telecommunications providers for the PSC-operated programs to \$6.0 million. The limit and growth in expenditures from FY 2001-02 through FY 2004-05 have presented budgetary challenges for these programs. In response, the PSC has reduced benefits and limited expenditures to better match its spending authority.

During FY 2005-06, revenues exceeded expenditures by \$8.8 million for several of the programs funded through the Universal Service Fund, which increased the fund balance to \$15.8 million as of June 30, 2006. Most significantly, funding received for the Educational Telecommunications Access Program exceeded expenditures by \$6.6 million. We include a recommendation that the PSC work more closely with the Department of Administration and the University of Wisconsin System in establishing annual assessment levels.

and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of July 2007.

On July 2, 2007, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$27.2 million, its intramonth low. This negative balance continued through July 23, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$211 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On July 3, 2007, the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$57 thousand. This negative balance continued intermittently through July 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$30 thousand. The Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance reached its intramonth low of a negative \$91 thousand on July 19, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On July 2, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund, Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund, and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 39.15, Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the medical education contract between the State of Wisconsin and the Medical College of Wisconsin, Inc., for fiscal year (FY) 2004-05 and FY 2005-06. The State appropriated \$4.1 million in general purpose revenue to the Medical College for tuition aid for this period. In addition, the State provided approximately \$6.7 million in general purpose revenue for the development and operation of the Medical College's family practice residency program. The State also made \$375,000 in debt service payments related to general obligation bonds that it issued to fund certain construction projects at the Medical College.

Overall, we found that the Medical College was in compliance with its contract with the State and with requirements set forth in ss. 39.15 and 39.155, Wis. Stats. During our review, we found the students claimed for state tuition aid were certified by the Higher Educational Aids Board as Wisconsin residents and were eligible to receive this aid. In addition, the Medical College gave preference in admissions to Wisconsin residents and promoted minority enrollment. We also found that the Medical College expended funds provided by the state in a manner consistent with legislative intent. Finally, the State's debt service payments agreed with the bond repayment schedules maintained by the Wisconsin Department of Administration for the applicable Medical College construction projects.

We have completed a biennial performance evaluation of the Department of Administration's Division of Gaming, as required by s. 13.94(1)(eg), Wis. Stats. The Division oversees Indian gaming, pari-mutuel racing, and charitable gaming activities in Wisconsin. In fiscal year (FY) 2005-06, its expenditures to regulate all three types of gaming activities totaled \$3.3 million in program revenue.

Indian gaming represents the most significant gaming activity in Wisconsin. In 2006, tribal gaming revenue was \$1.3 billion, tribal gaming expenses were \$770.3 million, and tribal gaming profits were \$555.9 million. The 2003 compacts between the State and the tribes expanded the types of games that tribes may offer, lengthened the duration of the compacts, and changed the method tribes use to calculate payments they make to the State. In FY 2005-06, the State received \$118.7 million from ten tribes. Compact disputes with several tribes remain unresolved.

Compacts contain several provisions designed to ensure the integrity of Indian gaming in Wisconsin and compliance with regulations. One important control requires tribes to identify instances in which amounts recorded by electronic meters in electronic gaming devices differ from amounts collected from those devices and counted by casino staff. We reviewed 2006 data maintained by the Division in the State's Data Collection System and found differences in these amounts for every day

of the year. The Division asserts most of these differences were caused by programming errors in the Data Collection System and the casinos' electronic accounting systems.

Although the Division reviews many important financial controls implemented by casinos, it has not routinely used the Data Collection System to identify differences between amounts recorded by electronic meters and amounts counted by casino staff. These data are important in identifying potential irregularities in gaming operations and financial reporting that cannot be identified from other controls the Division reviews. Moreover, we found that from March 2006 through April 2007, the Division did not review data maintained by casinos to determine whether the tribes identified, investigated, and documented these differences, as required by their compacts.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Division. The Division's response follows the appendices.

RULING ON THE POINT OF ORDER

On Tuesday, September 18th (page 278 of the Assembly Journal), Representative Schneider rose to a point of order that **Assembly Bill 506** was not properly before the Assembly because it required an emergency statement pursuant to s. 16.47(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Speaker Pro Tempore Gottlieb ruled the point of order **not well taken**. The full text of the ruling by the Speaker Pro Tempore Gottlieb follows:

"The Gentleman from the 72nd raised a point of order that, under section 16.47(2) of the statutes, this bill, Assembly Bill 506, is not properly before the body because it is an appropriation bill over \$10,000 and it does not have the required emergency statement.

I find the point of order to be not well taken.

We assume the normal case. Usually the budget bill is an executive budget bill. But I think it's clearly understood that that doesn't have to be the case, that we can pass a budget bill that is not the executive budget bill. That has happened in previous sessions when we passed a legislative budget bill.

I think it is also clearly understood that if we were to pass a complete and entire legislative budget bill, that that would not require an emergency statement because it would be the budget bill.

So, the question here is whether Assembly Bill 506 is, or is not, a budget bill. If it is an appropriation bill but not a budget bill, then the Gentleman from the 72nd's point is well taken. But if it is, in fact, a legislative budget bill, then the point of order would not be well taken.

The Gentleman from the 72nd made the point that it just so happens that the bill appropriates over half of the state general fund budget, and that it could just as easily be a bill to just fund the Arts Board, or that it could be a bill for a \$10,001 appropriation. I think therein lies the issue of how we interpret the question of whether this is, in fact, a budget bill.

There are certain things that argue in favor of making a determination that this is, in fact, a legislative budget bill.

The first one is that it appropriates a significant percentage of state money for the coming biennium.

Second, we should also look at the legislative intent and the intent of the authors of the bill. The authors of the bill have been clear in their intent that what they are introducing here, and bringing before the body, is a legislative budget bill.

There is also historic precedent for considering this to be a legislative budget bill. In 1971, the budget conference committee got bogged down on the governor's budget bill, 1971 Assembly Bill 414. While the conference committee was still meeting, senate members of the conference committee introduced 1971 Senate Bill 805. This bill addressed only general school aids and property tax relief. It was introduced as a budget bill and passed the Senate. The Senate Journal does not indicate that there was an emergency statement attached to the bill. The Assembly acted on this bill by passing an assembly substitute amendment that contained the entire state budget. It was eventually passed by the Senate as well. The 1971-73 biennial budget, therefore, originated in a bill that was passed by the Senate while the budget conference committee was still negotiating the governor's budget bill. The governor's budget bill, Assembly Bill 414, was recorded in the journal as failed to pass.

Clearly, the legislature has the authority to enact a legislative budget bill without an emergency statement. It is, likewise, clear that Assembly Bill 506 is intended to be a legislative budget bill.

It is, for all these reasons, that the chair rules the point of order raised by the Gentleman from the 72nd is not well taken."

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

September 26, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At the request of the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS), we have completed a financial audit of the Health Insurance Risk-Sharing Plan (HIRSP) for fiscal year (FY) 2005-06. HIRSP provides medical and prescription drug insurance for individuals who are unable to obtain coverage in the private market or who have lost employer-sponsored group health insurance. We have provided an unqualified opinion on HIRSP's financial statements.

Policyholder enrollment and claims costs are beginning to moderate. Enrollment decreased 3.8 percent during FY 2005-06 and 5.6 percent during FY 2006-07, to reach 17,612 as of June 30, 2007. Following four years of double-digit increases, net claims costs decreased by 1.2 percent during FY 2005-06. Most notably, prescription drug costs decreased by \$2.0 million. The creation of the federal Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage program has been a major contributing factor to these recent trends.

Correspondingly, HIRSP has maintained a sound financial position. The decrease in costs as well as an increase in revenues resulted in a \$4.2 million dollar increase in HIRSP's unrestricted net asset balance, which totaled \$3.9 million as of June 30, 2006.

A balance of excess policyholder premiums increased by \$10.0 million during FY 2005-06 and reached \$19.5 million as of June 30, 2006. At the direction of HIRSP's governing board, \$13.3 million of that amount was applied toward the

policyholders' share of costs, which has helped to limit premium increases for policyholders.

2005 Wisconsin Act 74 made significant changes to HIRSP. Among the most significant is the creation of the HIRSP Authority, which assumed oversight responsibility from DHFS on July 1, 2006. The Authority is currently pursuing several additional statutory changes, which are pending in the Legislature.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DHFS and the HIRSP plan administrator.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed financial audits of Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes for the period July 1, 2005, through June 30, 2006. The audits were requested by the Department of Health and Family Services to comply with requirements of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. We were able to express an unqualified opinion on each Institute's financial statements.

Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes are licensed and accredited hospitals that provide specialized diagnostic, evaluation, and treatment services for mentally ill children and adults. The Institutes also provide services to forensic patients referred to them through the criminal justice system. The Institutes are funded through a mix of general purpose revenue and program revenue.

Each Institute reported a financial gain for fiscal year 2005-06. Mendota reported a gain of \$1.2 million, and

Winnebago reported a gain of \$1.8 million. In each case, operating revenues increased enough to offset increases in operating expenses, such as salary and fringe benefit costs. Further, each Institute reported a positive accounting balance, which is reflected in its financial statements as unrestricted net assets.

As part of our audit, we followed up on internal control concerns reported in our prior year's audit related to administration of approximately \$395,000 in client funds by the Program of Assertive Community Treatment, an outpatient unit of Mendota. To assist clients in managing their own money, staff receive and disburse funds on their behalf. In accepting client funds, the State is responsible for ensuring proper controls are in place to reduce the risks of error or misappropriation. While some improvements were made, internal control concerns remain related to client funds administered by the Program of Assertive Community Treatment, including a lack of separation of duties and limited oversight of operations.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Department of Health and Family Services staff during our audit. A response from the Department follows our report.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of August 2007.

On August 8, 2007, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$441 thousand. This negative balance continued through August 9, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$21.4 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On August 1, 2007, the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$30 thousand. This negative balance continued through August 2, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$38 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On August 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through August 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative

\$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

In accordance with Section 51.06 (8), Wisconsin Statutes, enclosed is a copy of the report on people relocated and diverted from nursing homes, intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded (ICFs-MR), and State Centers for the Developmentally Disabled in FY 2007. This report provides information related to four programs, the ICF-MR Restructuring Initiative, Relocations from the State Centers for the Developmentally Disabled, the Community Relocation Initiative, and the Nursing Home Diversion Initiative.

The Department's relocation and diversion programs have been highly successful, providing the opportunity in FY07 for

1,064 elderly individuals and people with physical and developmental disabilities to live in community based settings, who otherwise would have resided in ICFs-MR and Nursing Facilities. Over the full 05-07 biennium, approximately 1,830 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities have successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional approximately 310 individuals were diverted from admission to a nursing home through the Department's programs. The quality of life for these 2,140 individuals has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community and be near family and friends and more fully involved in community activities.

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40(3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$66.3 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$5.4 million lower than the balance of \$71.7 million projected in the summary for 2007 Wis. Stat. Act 5. The balance would have been \$55.6 million higher had the new provisions of Chapter 16.518 not been in place requiring the transfer of fifty percent of revenue received over the original budget estimate to the Budget Stabilization Fund. The balance of the Budget Stabilization Fund is now \$55.6 million higher.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$12.618 billion compared to \$12.030 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$588 million or 4.9 percent. This increase was \$75.4 million

higher than the 2007 Wis. Stat. Act 5 summary of \$12.543 billion. General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$13.105 billion compared to \$12.385 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$720 million or 5.8 percent. This increase reflects funding associated with implementing support for two-thirds of local school costs and the property tax freeze.

In fiscal year 2007, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 56.0 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 21.0 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 7.8 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 15.2 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2007. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

State of Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services Madison

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

Wisconsin State Statute 13.172(2) directs the Department of Health and Family Services to submit an annual report to the Legislature regarding information on pharmacies and pharmacists that discontinue participation as a certified provider of medical assistance (MA). The mandate also requires the Department to report whether pharmacists comply with the MA program's deductible and co-payment requirements.

A comparison of MA certified pharmacy providers in SFY 2006 and SFY 2007 indicates 65 new pharmacies were certified as MA providers in SFY 2007. In addition, 21 Wisconsin pharmacies' or pharmacists' MA certification ended in SFY 2007. Twenty of those pharmacies no longer met certification requirements; many because their business had closed altogether. One provider chose to discontinue their MA certification. There were 25 out-of-state pharmacies or pharmacists that were no longer certified as providers of MA in SFY 2007.

The Department of Health and Family Services has not received any complaints that pharmacists have incorrectly charged MA participants a deductible or co-payment.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate

standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of September 2007.

On September 13, 2007, the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$12 thousand. This negative balance continued through September 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$55 thousand. The Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance reached its intra month low of a negative \$56 thousand on September 17, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On September 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through September 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund and Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At the request of the departments of Commerce and Administration, and in accordance with s. 13.94(1s), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2007, and June 30, 2006. We express our unqualified audit opinion on the Statement of Changes in Program Assets and related notes.

Under the program, the State has issued revenue obligations, such as bonds and commercial paper, to provide financing for payment of claims under the Wisconsin Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. These revenue obligations are not general obligation debt of the State. Instead, they are to be repaid primarily from petroleum inspection fees established under s. 168.12(1), Wis. Stats., and collected by the Department of Revenue.

During fiscal year 2006-07, the State collected \$75.4 million in petroleum inspection fees and made \$32.5 million in scheduled debt service payments, including \$19.8 million in principal repayment and \$12.7 million in interest. In addition, fees collected during the previous fiscal year were used for the early redemption of \$37.9 million in outstanding petroleum inspection fee revenue bonds. As of June 30, 2007, a total of \$272.6 million in revenue obligations remained outstanding, to be repaid from future petroleum inspection fees.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us during the audit by staff of the departments of Commerce, Administration, and Revenue.

Attached please find the Department of Administration's contractual service purchasing report for Fiscal Year 2007 pursuant to §16.705(8), Wis. Stats. This report also includes information on cost-benefit analyses produced by state agencies and campuses during FY07. I am pleased to announce positive results that inure to the benefit of state taxpayers.

The State of Wisconsin significantly reduced contracting costs in FY07. Overall contracting decreased from \$489.8 million in FY06 to \$419.6 million in FY07. These results represent a one-year reduction of more than \$70 million, or 14%, and continue a longer-term downward trend in state contracting. Contractual services represented 16% of total state operation costs in FY07.

In addition, state government in FY07 fully implemented cost-benefit legislation signed by Governor Doyle in January 2006. Wisconsin Act 89 requires state agencies and campuses to conduct a cost-benefit analysis prior to each proposed contractual service procurement over \$25,000. This report includes a summary of the more than 240 cost-benefit analyses produced during FY07.

These results are consistent with Governor Doyle's directives to make government run more resourcefully. State government will continue to seek ways to reduce costs, eliminate inefficiencies, and create sustainable sources of savings for state and local governments.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As directed by s. 13.94 (1)(p), Wis. Stats., we have completed a limited-scope review of the Private Employer Health Care Coverage Program created by 1999 Wisconsin Act 9. The Department of Employee Trust Funds (ETF) and the Private Employer Health Care Coverage Program Board were to have established a voluntary purchasing pool designed to allow a large number of small employers to provide a choice of competing health plans for their employees, reduce administrative costs, provide leverage in negotiating lower premiums, and reduce financial risk for insurers. It has not been implemented, in part because of a lack of interest by insurers, and program development efforts ended in 2003.

ETF and the Board attempted to design an actuarially sound statewide program and to contract with a private program administrator, as required by statutes. However, no contract proposals were received in response to a request issued by ETF in November 2000. Potential administrators cited numerous concerns, including the risk of adverse selection, which occurs when an insurance pool attracts individuals who have greater health care needs and are more expensive to serve, but not those who are less-expensive to serve and can pay lower premiums elsewhere.

After working with insurers and representatives of small employers, seeking changes to statutory program requirements, and commissioning an independent study, ETF and the Board recommended in March 2003 that the program be repealed, the Board disbanded, and any remaining funds returned to the General Fund. The Legislature has taken no further action on the Private Employer Health Care Coverage Program but has developed other proposals to expand access to health care for small employers, including several bills introduced in the 2007 session. Other states have established small employer purchasing pools with mixed results.

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40(3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$66.3 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$5.4 million lower than the balance of \$71.7 million projected in the summary for 2007 Wis. Stat. Act 5. The balance would have been \$55.6 million higher had the new provisions of Chapter 16.518 not been in place requiring the transfer of fifty percent of revenue received over the original budget estimate to the Budget Stabilization Fund. The balance of the Budget Stabilization Fund is now \$55.6 million higher.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$12.618 billion compared to \$12.030 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$588 million or 4.9 percent. This increase was \$75.4 million higher than the 2007 Wis. Stat. Act 5 summary of \$12.543

billion. General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$13.105 billion compared to \$12.385 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$720 million or 5.8 percent. This increase reflects funding associated with implementing support for two-thirds of local school costs and the property tax freeze.

In fiscal year 2007, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 56.0 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 21.0 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 7.8 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 15.2 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2007. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

November 28, 2007

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed an evaluation of state and local governments' compliance with election laws, as required by 2003 Wisconsin Act 265. The Elections Board enforces election laws and supports and trains the municipal clerks who register voters and administer elections. Early next year, however, the Government Accountability Board will replace and assume the duties of the Elections Board.

Federal law requires Wisconsin to implement an electronic statewide voter registration system, in part to prevent ineligible individuals from voting. Available information indicates there were few problems with ineligible individuals voting in November 2006; however, ongoing problems with the electronic system continue to make it difficult to identify such individuals.

Federal and state laws require voting systems and polling places to be accessible to individuals with disabilities. However, we noted numerous problems when we visited 36 polling places in 20 municipalities on Election Day in November 2006. As a result, we question whether some polling places are adequately accessible.

We have followed up on the recommendations in our 2005 evaluation of voter registration and provide a number of new recommendations for improving the administration of elections and enhancing the statewide voter registration system. We also note that additional efforts are needed to ensure that municipal clerks and other local election officials receive statutorily required training in administering elections effectively and appropriately.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Elections Board and local election officials. A response from the Elections Board follows the appendices.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of October 2007.

On October 1, 2007, the <u>Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund</u> cash balance closed at a negative \$55 thousand. This negative balance continued through October 27, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$11 thousand. The <u>Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund</u> cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$58 thousand on October 4, 2007. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On October 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through October 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On October 4, 2007, the **Worker's Compensation Fund** cash balance closed at a negative \$1.7 million. This negative balance continued through October 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.8 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On October 29, 2007, the <u>Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund</u> cash balance closed at a negative \$51.3 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through October 31, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$46.2 million. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

The Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund, Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Worker's Compensation Fund, and the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

December 21, 2007

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved Assembly Bill 207 as 2007 Wisconsin Act 42 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto to ensure that consumer protection and customer service standards are protected and to provide for the fair treatment of municipalities and their taxpayers while supporting the right of Wisconsin citizens to cable competition. In particular, I have thoroughly reviewed the measure as it relates to customer service standards and consumer rights to ensure that Wisconsin continues as a leader in protecting the consumer.

Assembly Bill 207 establishes a state process, in lieu of the current process at the municipal level, for granting franchises for the provision of video services to the public. The bill establishes certain requirements related to the following: the relationship between the state franchise agreement and

federal telecommunications law; the interaction of franchisees with municipalities on issues such as compensation for video services access and use of rights of way and support for public, educational and government access channels; and the provision of customer service standards and consumer rights.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the expiration of a franchise. The intent of my veto is to allow the Department of Financial Institutions (DFI) to promulgate an administrative rule setting the renewal term for the franchise. By allowing franchises to expire and establishing a renewal process and criteria, the public is served by providing more accountability of the service provider and the state.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the 15-day requirement for processing the franchise application. First, I am partially vetoing the requirement that DFI has 15 days to review the application. Second, I am partially vetoing the provision that if no determination is made within 15 days, the application is automatically approved. I object to the timeline for approval being written into the law. Placing a time limit on the process pre-judges that all applications will be similar and that investigation of facts may not, in some cases, take additional time. This veto will allow the department to serve both the public and the providers by allowing for both a complete and timely review of applications.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the automatic approval of a franchise for large video service providers. I believe that all applicants for a franchise should work through a common application process. As such, all providers would be required to prove that they are legally, financially and technically able to provide service in the designated service area. Much of the discussion surrounding this legislation centered on allowing greater competition in the video service market. This partial veto ensures that all entrants into the market go through the same process, thus leveling the playing field, which furthers the goal of increased competition.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the revocation of a franchise. The veto is designed to allow DFI to more completely define the requirements for franchise revocation through the administrative rule process. A more thorough definition of the revocation requirement will better serve both consumers and providers by adding clarity to these standards.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the prohibition on municipalities from charging a fee for the use of or occupation on public rights-of-way. I object to this prohibition directed toward municipalities which provides special treatment to one industry and does not recognize and thus compensate the public for the cost of establishing and maintaining public rights-of-way.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the 3-year limit on the review of the financial records of the service provider to allow municipalities to review records as needed. If there is a dispute on the amount of funding being provided, it is in the best interest of all parties to have that dispute settled in a timely manner.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the prohibition on DFI and the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection from promulgating rules. It is imperative that the state agencies responsible for

implementing the state franchise and enforcing anti-discrimination provisions have the ability to interpret these statutes through administrative rule.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to a video service provider's defense against not meeting the prohibition for income discrimination by establishing statutory standards of service provisions to low-income households. The intent of the veto is to raise the standard to be achieved more quickly. This veto will allow service providers to use a defense against allegations of discrimination based on income by showing that 30 percent of subscribers are low-income households within 3 years, two years earlier than originally provided in the bill. The effect of the veto will be to accelerate the provision of service to low-income households.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the definition of a low-income household. The effect is to allow DFI to define low-income household through administrative rule. As written, the bill provides a definition that does not take into account factors such as inflation or household size. Such a definition is inconsistent with the definition of low-income in other programs.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the definition of public, educational and government channel usage. As written, the bill states that such channels are defined as noncommercial. By striking noncommercial, I am giving public, educational and governmental channels the ability to air revenue-generating commercial programming.

I am partially vetoing section 8 as it relates to the application and annual fees. The effect is to allow DFI to set the fees through rule which allows the fees to better fit the scope of the specific conditions of an application.

I am partially vetoing section 27p as it relates to credit for service outage. My intent is that the bill reflects the current law standard that if service is interrupted for more than 4 hours in any one day, the video service provider must give subscribers credit for that outage. As passed, the bill would have allowed interruptions of up to 24 hours without providing credit and would have eroded one of the primary statutory consumer protections.

I am partially vetoing section 35 as it relates to Public Service Commission review of municipal regulation of the occupation and use of public rights-of-way. The provision prohibits the Commission from finding unreasonable any municipal regulation on aesthetics of a network under certain conditions. The intent of this partial veto is to delete this prohibition and allow the Commission to review the regulation and make a determination based on the merits.

I also carefully reviewed Assembly Bill 207 as it relates to public, educational and governmental channels in light of the concerns raised by interested parties on this matter. The bill requires that these channels continue as long as minimum criteria are met. Financial support of these channels by video service providers ends after three years under the bill. The intent of the bill is that the payment to the municipalities by video service providers of up to five percent of their gross receipts provides sufficient compensation for this access right.

While I did not exercise my partial veto authority in this part of the bill, I remain concerned about maintaining balance between the interests served by public, educational and governmental channels and video service providers. I urge

the Legislature to review this issue and consider follow-up legislation to address any remaining concerns.

I believe the partial vetoes I have made to AB 207 help to make it a stronger bill for consumers while promoting competition in Wisconsin.

The Department of Health and Family Services is pleased to provide you this annual report of the Wisconsin Food Security Consortium's plans to address food insecurity, as required under s. 46.76(4) and (5).

The Wisconsin Food Security Consortium continues to make progress in devising strategies to end hunger and food insecurity in Wisconsin. Highlights include:

• The Consortium continued to expand its membership to include several more local food security representatives. A website was established during 2007 to establish a primary communication link with members and other partners. (See http://www.wisconsinfoodsecurityconsortium.org) A series of Topic Papers were developed for the Hunger Summit related to the four areas of food insecurity: Emergency Food Programs, Nutrition Assistance Programs, Access to

Affordable and Nutritious Food, and Family Economic Security.

- The full Consortium met quarterly throughout 2007, while the Steering Committee met monthly. The by-laws were finalized and the Committee elected Jane Voichick as Consortium Chair.
- The Consortium planned and hosted a statewide Hunger Summit on October 4, 2007, in Stevens Point. The Summit was very well attended. Nearly 200 food providers, activists, state and local public and private hunger prevention agencies, public health nutritionists, FoodShare eligibility workers, business leaders, food pantry staff and volunteers, members of the faith community and other interested parties were present. Speakers included Senator Julie Lassa, Representative Louis Molepske, Patti Whitney-Wise (Executive Director of the Oregon Hunger Relief Task Force), Lynn Parker (Director of Child Nutrition Programs and Nutrition Policy, Food Research and Action Center, Washington D.C.), and Consortium members. The purpose of the Summit was to bring partners from around Wisconsin together to learn about food insecurity and hunger in the state, to network and collaborate, and to be inspired with ideas and actions. Input was collected to draft a statewide action plan that will serve as a blueprint as we move forward.
- The Wisconsin WIC Program conducted its WIC Food Insecurity Survey in 2007, a repeat of the survey conducted in 2002. Low food security increased from 44% in 2002 to 51% in 2007. However, very low food security (formerly described as food insecurity with hunger) decreased from 19% in 2002 to 15% in 2007.
- The major activities of the Consortium for 2008 will include finalizing the Statewide Action Plan and facilitating regional hunger forums throughout Wisconsin. The goal of the regional forums is to further engage local partners in strategies to reduce hunger. These strategies will be included in the final Action Plan which the Consortium will distribute statewide and begin implementing in 2008.

The Department is also a partner with the University of Wisconsin-Extension in the Wisconsin Food Security Project, which provides up-to-date county and state-level information about food security, economic well-being, and the availability and use of public and private programs to increase access to affordable and nutritious foods. An interactive map is available on the Wisconsin Food Security Project's website, showing each county's food security profile as measured by different indicators, including federal nutrition assistance program, food production and marketing, community infrastructure, and economic well-being, at http://www.wisstat.wisc.edu/uwex/foodmaps.aspx.

The Department, along with the Food Security Consortium, continues its commitment to fighting hunger in Wisconsin.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of November 2007.

On November 1, 2007, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On November 1, 2007, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.8 million. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.9 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On November 1, 2007, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$46.2 million. This negative balance continued through November 30, 2007, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$44.5 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$46.3 million on November 13, 2007. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Worker's Compensation Fund, and the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

The Department of Health and Family Services operates BadgerCare under Wis. Stats. s. 49.665. This statute also requires the Department to submit an annual report summarizing the BadgerCare program and its progress. This submission fulfills that legislative requirement.

BadgerCare was established under the terms of the federal State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) which was enacted through the federal budget of 1997. The SCHIP program provided states with the option of creating a new independent program to insure children or expanding the state's existing Medicaid program. Under 1997 Act 27, the Wisconsin Legislature created BadgerCare as an SCHIP Medicaid expansion program. Following recent federal requirements the State added a separate SCHIP program under BadgerCare to cover the unborn children of immigrants.

Attached is a chart showing enrollment and expenditures in BadgerCare by state fiscal year. BadgerCare began enrolling residents in July 1999. BadgerCare leverages significant amounts of federal funding for health care coverage of eligible Wisconsin residents.

In his 2007 State of the State Address, Governor Doyle emphasized access to health care coverage and committed to ensuring that all of Wisconsin's children and more adults have access to health care. This commitment resulted in the creation of a single health care safety net—BadgerCare Plus. The Department will implement BadgerCare Plus in February 2008.

BadgerCare Plus will cover eligible children and help ensure that 98 percent of Wisconsin's citizens have access to health care. The program will provide coverage and enhanced benefits for more pregnant women while simplifying the program and promoting prevention and healthy behaviors.

BadgerCare Plus will merge Family Medicaid, BadgerCare, and Healthy Start to form a comprehensive health insurance program for low income children and families. The program may also eventually incorporate other programs such as the General Assistance Medical Program (GAMP) in Milwaukee.

Wisconsin will lead the nation in streamlining health care eligibility by making BadgerCare Plus more efficient and less costly to administer. The expansion of managed care and the administrative savings from streamlining the eligibility process will generate a savings of approximately \$17.4 million over the first two years of BadgerCare Plus. We look forward to keeping Wisconsin on the cutting edge of quality and efficient health care coverage for those in need.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We completed an annual financial audit of the Department of Employee Trust Funds in April 2007, as requested by the Department and to fulfill our audit requirements under s. 13.94(1)(dd), Wis. Stats. The audit covered the period of January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2005. The 2005 financial statements and our unqualified opinion on them are included in the Department's recently issued financial report, which provides information on the financial position and activity of various benefit programs available to public employees. The late issuance of the Department's financial report was a result of delays in its completion by the Department.

The largest program administered by the Department is the Wisconsin Retirement System, which reported net assets of \$71.5 billion at the end of 2005 and provided benefits totaling \$3.1 billion during 2005. Positive investment returns contributed to the net increase in retirement assets of \$3.6 billion. At the end of 2005, the Wisconsin Retirement System was 99.5 percent funded based on actuarial measures that compare the actuary's valuation of assets to the estimated value of the benefit obligations for services already rendered by present and future retirees.

Accompanying this letter is a management letter we provided to the Department. As required by Government Auditing Standards, we include an auditor's report on internal control and compliance with the management letter. We identified three reportable conditions required to be reported under these standards:

- the existence of outstanding balances in clearing accounts that the Department needs to review and eliminate;
- a continuing concern with the lack of cash reconciliations on a program level; and
- the lack of a written signed agreement with and review of invoices from the third-party administrator for the Badger Rx Gold Program.

As noted in the management letter responses, the Department is making progress in addressing our concern with the outstanding balances in the clearing accounts. Further, the Department agrees with the value of completing cash reconciliations on a program level, but it has made limited progress to date because of other financial reporting priorities. Finally, the Department plans to obtain a signed agreement with the third-party administrator for the Badger Rx Gold Program. It does not agree with the recommendation for regular reviews of invoices for the program, but instead plans to rely on periodic compliance audits of it. In 1997 Act 27, the Legislature established requirements in state law intended to strengthen protections for children and vulnerable adults in organized care settings. The provisions require, among other things, that designated caregivers conduct background checks on all new and existing staff and bar them from employing anyone who has committed certain crimes or acts. DHFS and counties (for certain child care providers) and local school boards must perform checks on a provider before issuing a license or other credential. Individuals who have committed prohibited crimes or acts may apply to the Department, counties, or school boards for a waiver of the employment or licensing bans upon evidence of rehabilitation.

Sections 48.685(5g) and 50.065(5g) of the Wisconsin Statutes direct the Department to submit an annual report to the legislature that specifies the number of persons who have sought waivers of employment or licensing bans by requesting to demonstrate that they have been rehabilitated. The report must also specify the number of requests that were approved and the reasons for the success or failure of the requests. Attached is the report for 2007.

I write in response to questions raised by several legislators concerning the content and timing of our statutorily required analysis of the standardized test score data received from the School Choice Demonstration Project. Section 119.23 (7)(e) 2, Wis. Stats., requires the Bureau to report to the Legislature, in 2007 and annually thereafter until 2011, on the results of the standardized tests administered to pupils participating in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program and those who attend Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS). As you are aware, our first report to the Legislature will be delayed because we did not receive the baseline test score data from the Project until December 28, 2007.

We have completed a preliminary examination of the baseline test score data, which contain the results of the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination tests that were administered during the 2006-07 school year to a sample of 2,727 pupils who attended, schools participating in the Choice program, a sample of 2,727 MPS pupils who were selected based on their similarity to the sample of Choice pupils, and a random sample of 2,727 MPS pupils. Demographic and other information was also provided for these pupils.

With the data given to us, we anticipate that we can provide the Legislature with a report that analyzes the average baseline test score data, for reading and mathematics at each grade level, for each of the three groups of pupils and determine whether any differences in average test scores are statistically significant. We also anticipate providing summary demographic information for the three groups. However, because the test score data do not identify individual pupils or the schools where they were enrolled, we will be unable to report on the average test scores of pupils at individual Choice schools or determine whether pupils at some Choice schools scored significantly differently than those at other schools.

We will begin analyzing the test score data in earnest in the weeks ahead and anticipate releasing our first report to the Legislature later in 2008.

We appreciate the cooperation of the School Choice Demonstration Project in providing us with the baseline test score data and explaining its research methodology. Please contact me if you have any questions.

We have completed a review of food and dairy safety program funding, which is administered by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP). The program's expenditures totaled \$8.4 million in fiscal year (FY) 2006-07 and supported 97.6 full-time equivalent positions. In FY 2006-07, 54.9 percent of the program was funded with fees charged to regulated entities, 41.6 percent with general purpose revenue, and 3.5 percent with federal revenue.

During our review period, fee revenue increased 20.8 percent, but fee-funded expenditures increased by 43.2 percent. As a result, the program's appropriation account balance has decreased each year since FY 2002-03, and in FY 2006-07 ended with a negative balance of \$51,800. To address the program's current funding shortfall, DATCP has proposed increasing food and dairy fees by approximately 30 percent beginning July 1, 2008. This proposal is currently under review by the Legislature.

We compared Wisconsin's fee structure with those of six other states and found substantial variation in funding levels, staffing levels, and inspector workloads. While Wisconsin is near the average of the states we reviewed in terms of funding and staffing, it has the highest inspector workload.

In FY 2006-07, DATCP had contracts with 34 local health departments to conduct food safety inspections at retail food establishments such as grocery stores and delicatessens within their boundaries. We compared DATCP's retail food licensing fees with fees charged by 26 local programs and found that local fees were frequently higher than those charged by DATCP.

Our comprehensive evaluation of the effectiveness of DATCP's food and dairy regulatory activities will be released later in the year. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DATCP in conducting this review.

Speaker Huebsch:

Let us begin by thanking you for convening a task force charged to examine the state's recent Information Technology (IT) failures and to consider solutions aimed at preserving taxpayer dollars. The taxpayers of this state are justifiably frustrated by the tax dollars that have been wasted and misused. A closer look at these troubles was certainly in order.

The Speaker's Task Force on State Information Technology Failures, comprised of eight legislative members and eight private-sector Information Technology experts, sought to examine these problems in more detail. The Task Force conducted case studies, interviews and hearings devoted to learning from past mistakes in order to protect tax dollars in the future.

A state audit of Information Technology Projects finished its work shortly before our Task Force convened. The various recommendations of the audit have been examined closely throughout the work of the Task Force, and the audit team has provided invaluable assistance as we worked to ensure every effort was taken to protect the state from the types of failures that have come to light.

During the Task Force process members presented testimonies, offered suggestions and the public also submitted concerns. In addition, the legislature voted on a biennial budget bill that contained provisions aimed at curbing the culture of mismanagement which facilitated the waste of tax dollars on IT projects.

After considering the many factors which contribute to state IT delays or failures, Task Force members were asked to identify final proposals within four broad categories: IT

Project Needs Assessment and Identification; Project Development and Procurement; Implementation; and Oversight. The recommendations include:

- Standardized written policies for IT project procedures; increased IT staffing accountability; smaller project sizes; and vendor-selection criteria that include a vendor's track record on similar projects.
- Uniform information technology policies and procedures across agency lines; use of off-the-shelf systems when possible, and required approval when project customization is necessary; vendor contracts that include classes that require vendors to complete projects without additional payments, or prior approval to exclude the clause; more aggressive upgrade and innovation cycles; and a greater emphasis on cross-agency resource sharing.
- "Executive Sponsors" for all projects; reassigning ineffective project staff; education of human resources employees on the needs of the information technology staff; and providing an environment where employees can raise and resolve issues.
- Reinstating the Joint Committee on Information Policy and Technology (JCIPT) and the Information Technology Management Board; careful review of all ongoing information technology projects; and the creation of a more cohesive Project Management Office within DOA.

While the biennial budget bill directs the Department of Administration to address many of the items mentioned above, it is clear that the most glaring omission in the state's IT projects is consistent and careful oversight to ensure compliance with current state statutes prescribing effective management practices. Convening the JCIPT seems to be a necessary step to ensuring that provisions designed to preserve taxpayer funds directed toward state IT projects are not only conserved, but are utilized in a manner that provides effectual implementation of state IT projects.

Convening the Speaker's Task Force on State Information Technology Failures has been a key step in strengthening the state's IT procedures. Reconvening a standing legislative committee with the authority necessary to monitor and approve present and future IT projects will be the next important step in providing the taxpayers of the state with assurance that the state will continue to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our fiscal year (FY) 2006-07 financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, as requested by the Investment Board and to fulfill our audit requirements under s. 13.94(1)(df), Wis. Stats. The Investment Board's financial statements present the investments and investment activity for the State Investment Fund, the Wisconsin Retirement System funds, and five other smaller insurance and trust funds. The statements and our unqualified opinions on them are included in the Investment Board's FY 2007 Annual Report, which can be found on the Investment Board's Web site.

The State Investment Fund invests the excess operating funds of State of Wisconsin agencies, the retirement funds, and the Wisconsin Local Government Investment Pool. Net investment income earned by the State Investment Fund increased 38.3 percent, from \$218.9 million in FY 2005-06 to \$302.7 million in FY 2006-07 because of higher interest rates in the markets. After factoring in net investment income and net deposits and withdrawals, the State Investment Fund had a net asset balance of \$6.2 billion as of June 30, 2007.

The retirement funds, which include the Core Retirement Investment Trust Fund and the Variable Retirement Investment Trust Fund, experienced positive investment returns in FY 2006-07. The Core Fund reported net investment income of \$12.2 billion, and the Variable Fund reported net investment income of \$1.3 billion. After factoring in net investment income, net contribution receipts, and benefit disbursements in FY 2006-07, the net investment assets of the retirement funds as of June 30, 2007, were \$80.5 billion for the Core Fund and \$7.4 billion for the Variable Fund.

The Investment Board is also responsible for investing the assets of five insurance and trust funds: the Injured Patients

and Families Compensation Fund, the State Life Insurance Fund, the Local Government Property Insurance Fund, the Historical Society Trust Fund, and the EdVest Tuition Trust Fund. Each of these funds has different investment policies, as established by the agency responsible for the fund and the Investment Board. The largest of these funds, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, had net investment assets totaling \$798.1 million as of June 30, 2007.

Government Auditing Standards require us to provide an auditor's report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters, which accompanies this letter. As noted in the report, we did not identify any control or compliance concerns that are required to be reported under these standards.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a review of 17-year-old offenders in the adult criminal justice system, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Wisconsin is currently 1 of 13 states in which individuals under the age of 18 are treated as adults in the justice system. We reviewed a variety of statistics, including data on arrests, the number and type of criminal charges filed, sentences imposed, prison admissions, probation placements, and recidivism.

From 2002 through 2006, 585 individuals who were 17 at the time of offense were admitted to prison and 10,632 were placed on probation. Of those admitted to prison, 429 participated in at least one educational program, but participation in other types of rehabilitation or treatment programs was much less frequent.

In a review of rates of recidivism and probation revocation among 17-year-olds, we found that fewer than one-half of 17-year-old offenders successfully completed probation, and 17-year-old offenders had higher recidivism rates than either juveniles or older adults.

Legislation currently under consideration would return 17-year-olds to the juvenile system. This change would have a significant effect on counties, which are primarily responsible for operating and funding juvenile corrections services. We estimate the juvenile corrections cost increase could range from \$53.5 million to \$82.4 million annually.

We appreciate the courtesy extended to us by officials and staff of the Department of Corrections and other state and local agencies we contacted during our review. The Department's response follows the appendices.

The Department of Health and Family Services is pleased to submit to you and the Joint Committee on Finance the attached report on the feasibility of modifying the Health Insurance Risk–Sharing Plan (HIRSP) Pilot Program under Wisconsin Statute, s. 49.686 (6). This report is required under Section 9129 (7p) of 2007 Wisconsin Act 20.

The HIRSP Pilot will provide coverage under HIRSP for at least one hundred uninsured clients of the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP). The Pilot reduces costs to ADAP and expands access for pilot participants to the full range of medical care available to HIRSP policy holders. ADAP and the companion AIDS/HIV Health Insurance Premium Subsidy Program (Insurance Program) have provided access to life saving medications and medical care for low-income Wisconsin residents living with HIV disease since 1989 without the need for waiting lists or other cost containment measures that would negatively impact this vulnerable population. This is due in part to the rebates that ADAP collects from pharmaceutical companies and the "payer of last resort" status conferred on ADAP by federal guidance and legislation.

The Department concludes that it is not feasible to modify the HIRSP Pilot. The modifications are contrary to the "payer of last resort" status of ADAP and would not result in any further increase in drug rebate revenues to the State or any reduction in the cost of the Pilot for DHFS.

On January 15, Representative Travis made a parliamentary inquiry regarding the messaging of Assembly action on **2007 Assembly Bill 377** to the Senate. Speaker Pro Tempore Gottlieb's response to Representative Travis is as follows:

Dear Representative Travis:

This is in response to your inquiry regarding the messaging of Assembly action on 2007 Assembly Bill 377 to the Senate.

Two rules are particularly relevant to the question of messaging.

Rule 50(1) states that "Each proposal that passes or is adopted after a 3rd reading...shall be transmitted...to the senate immediately after failure of any motion to reconsider the passage, adoption, or adverse disposition, as applicable, or the expiration of the time for making such a motion."

Rule 73(3) (a) states that "A motion for reconsideration of the vote by which a proposal is passed...may be entered: 1) before the relating clause of the next proposal is read by the clerk, the next order of business is announced by the presiding officer, or other business is begun; or 2) on the 7th order of business on the next legislative day thereafter. Any motion to reconsider such final action shall be taken up immediately if

the roll call day on which it is entered is already the next actual day following the vote constituting final action on the proposal."

Assembly Bill 377 was passed by the Assembly on January 23, 2008. The motion to suspend the rules for immediate messaging was defeated. Consequently, the bill would be messaged after the time for reconsideration had passed, which would be after the 7th order of business on the next legislative day.

The next legislative days following January 23, 2008 were January 24, January 25, January 29, January 31, February 19, and February 21. However, on each of those days, the Assembly adjourned before the 7th order of business was reached, thus preventing a motion to reconsider from being made. To treat any of those days as the expiration of time for reconsideration would effectively deprive members of the opportunity for reconsideration, since the time for the making of such a motion was never reached.

Consequently, I anticipate that Assembly Bill 377 will be messaged to the Senate at the completion of the 7th order of business on February 26, 2008, assuming that order is reached before adjournment.

On January 1, 2008, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through January 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 1, 2008, the Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$4.7 million. This negative balance continued through January 23, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$175 thousand. The Worker's Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$4.8 million on January 4, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$52.5 million. This negative balance continued through January 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$45.0 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation

Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$55.0 million on January 4, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On January 1, 2008, the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$16 thousand. This negative balance continued through January 23, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$381 thousand. The Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$17 thousand on January 3, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On January 31, 2008, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.5 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Worker's Compensation Fund, Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund, and Conservation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

February 27, 2008

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At your request, we have completed a limited-scope review of

the Department of Transportation's (DOT's) bridge inspection program. In fiscal year 2006-07, DOT spent approximately \$2.3 million to inspect Wisconsin's 5,188 state-owned bridges, including an estimated \$1.0 million to hire private consultants with specialized inspection expertise.

Federal and state law require DOT to inspect all bridges owned or maintained by the State at least once every 24 months. We found that 98.1 percent of routine inspections were completed on time between January 2003 and November 2007. During this period, 98.9 percent of routine inspections conducted on structurally deficient bridges, which are bridges that have deteriorated or developed structural problems, were completed within the required 24-month intervals. Both of these inspection rates have improved since our 2001 evaluation of DOT's bridge inspection program (report 01-17).

DOT has not implemented procedures for monitoring routine bridge maintenance work performed by county highway departments or verifying the cost of completed maintenance work. Therefore, we include a recommendation for DOT to develop policies and procedures to track the type and cost of routine bridge maintenance work performed by counties, which totaled \$5.7 million in 2006.

In general, the condition of state-owned bridges has improved in recent years. The percentage of state-owned bridges that are structurally deficient declined from 7.4 percent in 2002 to 4.2 percent in 2007, when there were 219 such bridges statewide. However, 34 state-owned bridges are more than 80 years old, exceeding the typical 75-year life span of bridges.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DOT in conducting this review.

Because our comments and support for that compromise language are the same as they were last session, I have attached that past testimony. During negotiations on 2005 Assembly Bill 850, a compromise had been struck on the regulation of piers which the DNR and Governor Doyle supported. Unfortunately, that compromise language never made it to the Governor's desk for his signature.

Now that the compromise language is again in front of the Legislature as 2007 Assembly Bill 297 and Senate Bill 169, we would like to renew our support.

If you have any further questions, DNR Executive Assistant Mary Ellen Vollbrecht and DNR Deputy Secretary Pat Henderson stand poised to assist you.

"On December 1, 2005, Secretary Hassett testified before the Assembly Natural Resources Committee, in opposition to Assembly Bill 850. Since then, many individuals and organizations have worked hard with Senator Kedzie and Representative Gunderson, to develop a compromise bill that addresses the Department's concerns, but also responds to legislative and constituent concerns about DNR's proposed pier rules. I thank Senator Kedzie and Representative Gunderson for their leadership in these efforts, and I am

pleased to testify today in support of this Senate Substitute Amendment.

Two years ago, when the legislature passed Act 118 and the Governor signed it into law, you established specific exemption standards for piers. Since then the Department has continued to pursue rules and legislation that achieve four goals:

- 1) Ensure that new piers are of a reasonable size
- 2) Grandfather all existing piers that meet the reasonable use test and that don't interfere with public rights the same standard that has existed in Wisconsin for decades
- 3) Establish certainty for everyone concerned, through numeric size limits, regarding what the owners of oversized piers must do to achieve compliance
- 4) Provide a mechanism to analyze the largest structures to make sure that those structures comply with the law and are not appropriating our public waters for a private purpose

The Senate Substitute Amendment achieves these goals, and establishes clear legislative intent for the regulation of piers and similar structures in Wisconsin. Here's what we believe the Senate Substitute Amendment does:

Exemption

Piers that don't need a permit can be up to 6-feet wide under current statute. This bill allows an 8-foot wide "T" or "L" platform at the end, to address concerns from manufacturers and dealers of 4-foot wide pier sections. More than 85% of current pier owners will have to do NOTHING, and the additional flexibility allows new piers to have a reasonable platform for loading and recreational use.

Grandfathering of Existing Piers

The bill grandfathers most piers that existed before the date of Act 118, but that don't meet the exemption requirements. These pier owners simply register their pier with DNR sometime in the next 3 years, through a one-time free process. They get a document back that they can record at the Register of Deeds if they desire. The registration insures that the pier owner can keep their existing pier at whatever length and number of boat slips it has. Also the pier can be up to 8-feet wide, have a platform up to 200 square feet in size, or up to 300 square feet as long as the platform is no more than 10-feet wide. Why do we care about width? Simple - the wider the platform, the more it inhibits sunlight from reaching aquatic plants, and the more it harms habitat in our lakes and rivers. Limiting platform size and especially width is critical to ensuring that grandfathered piers don't harm public rights.

Existing Piers that need a Permit

Less than 0.5% of all existing piers will have a larger platform and will require a one-time Individual Permit from DNR. These pier owners will have to demonstrate that their pier doesn't harm public rights or the rights of other waterfront owners – the same standards that have been in statute for decades. Under the Senate Substitute Amendment, the owner of an existing pier will not have to pay a fee to go through this Individual Permit process.

Funding

Let me be very clear – it will cost the Department about

\$400,000 to implement this legislation. Education and outreach to property owners who want to understand what's in the new law, responding to requests for Exemption Determinations from property owners, processing free grandfathering Registrations, processing Individual Permits for the piers with larger platforms - these all require significant staff time and financial resources, with no revenue to offset the costs. We can support the bill before you today because it appropriates the money we need for implementation. Without either permit fees or an appropriation to cover our \$400,000 costs, we'll be forced to shift resources from other waterway permit work, increasing turnaround times for other regulated activities and undoing much of the streamlining we all worked so hard to achieve with Act 118.

New Piers

The Senate Substitute Amendment addresses concerns that many had regarding how DNR's proposed rules limited options for new piers to go beyond exemption standards. This bill allows anyone to apply for an individual permit for a new pier, including solid piers or proposals for additional boat slips. It also allows more boat slips for new multifamily residential or commercial development on larger lakes that are not specially—designated waters, but requires a permit process to ensure that public and neighboring rights are protected.

Carefully Crafted Compromise

Like most controversial issues, this Senate Substitute Amendment to Assembly Bill 850 represents a carefully crafted compromise that either strikes a reasonable balance or has a little something in it to irritate everybody, depending on your perspective.

We are a bit uncomfortable with allowing ten foot wide, 300 square foot decks to stay on our public waters, but we can live with it.

We have some heartburn with allowing double density for boat slips solely because a property has more dwelling units on the same amount of shoreline, but we can live with it.

And we would have preferred to have more certainty when reviewing applications for solid piers on the Great Lakes or for individual permits for multi–unit dwellings, but we can live with it.

We can live with these things because this legislation as drafted does set clear limits on new piers and provides a mechanism for reviewing existing large party platforms so that we can make sure that no one is appropriating the public waters of this state for their own private use.

I mention these things because there may be attempts by other interests to amend or alter this legislation. Frankly, we would like a few amendments of our own. But we would suggest at this stage that any substantive changes to this carefully crafted compromise would very likely change our view of this bill.

So I urge you to approve this amended bill as is and to then urge the Assembly to concur with this version of Assembly Bill 850.

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

The Community Integration Program (CIP) for residents of State Centers was created by 1983 Wisconsin Act 27. According to s. 46.275 of the Wisconsin statutes, this program is intended:

...to relocate persons from the state centers for the developmentally disabled into appropriate community

settings with the assistance of home and community-based services and with continuity of care. The intent of the program is also to minimize its impact on state employees through redeployment of employees into vacant positions.

Under Wisconsin statutes s. 46.275(5m), the Department is required to submit an annual report to the Joint Committee on Finance and to the Chief Clerk of each house of the Legislature describing the program's impact during the prior calendar year on state employees, including the Department's efforts to redeploy employees into vacant positions and the number of employees laid off.

In calendar year 2007 (CY 07), the Department completed the relocation of the last long-term care resident from Northern Wisconsin Center (NWC). This relocation is the last step in phasing down long term care services at NWC, as directed by 2003 Wisconsin Act 33. Southern and Central Wisconsin

Centers relocated a total of 28 individuals under the CIP program during CY 07.

As a result of these community placements, the Department laid off one employee who was subsequently hired into another position at the same Center. In addition, the Department redeployed 11 employees into other vacant positions dedicated to providing care to persons who continue to reside at the Center.

Thank you for your interest in the CIP program and its effect on our employees.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have examined the Indian Gaming, Racing, and Charitable Gaming programs administered by the Division of Gaming in the Department of Administration, as required by s. 13.94(1)(eg), Wis. Stats. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Division's budgetary financial schedules for the three-year period from fiscal year (FY) 2004-05 through FY 2006-07.

In September 2007, we issued Report 07-12, which was our biennial program evaluation of the Division of Gaming, as required by s. 13.94(1)(eg), Wis. Stats. We will report on the Division's efforts to address recommendations made in that report during the next program evaluation, which is expected to be completed in 2009.

As shown in the financial schedules, the payments the Indian tribes made to the State were \$27.4 million in FY 2004-05, \$118.7 million in FY 2005-06, and \$49.8 million in FY

2006-07. These amounts fluctuated in part because of the timing of payments received from tribal governments. However, payments have also been affected because compact disputes with several tribes remain unresolved.

Indian Gaming revenues that are not expended, encumbered, or distributed to other agencies based on statutory requirements are transferred to the State's General Fund as miscellaneous receipts available for legislative appropriation. Because Indian gaming payments to the State have fluctuated over the three-year period, the amounts transferred to the General Fund have also fluctuated and were \$3.8 million in FY 2004-05, \$88.9 million in FY 2005-06, and \$22.1 million in FY 2006-07.

From FY 2004-05 through FY 2006-07, revenues generated from the Racing program have declined as another racetrack closed during FY 2005-06, while bingo revenues have remained relatively stable. In total during the three-year period, these sources provided nearly \$2.0 million to the Lottery Fund for property tax relief.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department of Administration's Division of Gaming.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of February 2008.

On February 1, 2008, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through February 29, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On February 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$44.8

million. This negative balance continued through February 29, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$28.7 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$46.6 million on February 14, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On February 1, 2008, the Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$14 thousand (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through February 5, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$33.0 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On February 1, 2008, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$3.0 million. This negative balance continued through February 29, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$12.1 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Dry Cleaner Environmental Response Fund, and Conservation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

March 31, 2008

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed our annual financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin. This audit satisfies state agencies' audit requirements under the federal Single Audit Act of 1984, as amended, and the federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133. It also assists us in meeting audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats.

This audit covers \$9.6 billion in federal financial assistance that state agencies administered in fiscal year 2006-07. We assessed the propriety of revenues and expenditures and tested internal controls and compliance with laws and regulations for 22 federal programs that were selected for review using risk-based assessment criteria established by the federal government.

Our report contains the auditor's reports on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance with program requirements, and our unqualified audit opinion on the State of Wisconsin Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards. We also discuss the results of our follow-up to prior audit findings. Overall, state agencies have complied with federal grant requirements and have taken steps to address findings included in last year's single audit report. However, we report several new and continuing internal control deficiencies and areas of federal noncompliance. The federal government will contact state agencies to resolve the findings and questioned costs included in our report.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by state agency staff during our audit. Agencies' comments on individual findings, along with their corrective action plans to address our concerns, are included within the agency narratives.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

April 7, 2008

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I am vetoing Assembly Bill 676 in its entirety. This bill would allow or expand access to juvenile court record information for courts, prosecutors, law enforcement agencies, the Department of Health and Family Services, county child welfare departments and licensed child welfare agencies without those individuals of entities first having to obtain a court order.

The initial goal of Assembly Bill 676 is a laudable one, and I support legislative reform in this very important area. I agree, for example, with the bill's proponents that certain juvenile court record files should be more readily accessible for child protective service social workers who would use juvenile court record information to help ensure that children are being placed in households that are as safe as possible. However, I am vetoing Assembly Bill 676 because it is too broad and would undo significant protections concerning the confidentiality of sensitive information regarding children.

Specifically, this legislation makes juvenile records available to far too many people. Assembly Bill 676 would

allow anyone working for a law enforcement agency to obtain juvenile court records as long as the records were obtained for the purpose of investigating alleged criminal activity. The bill contains no restrictions on who in law enforcement would be authorized to access the records, or what type of thresholds must be met before otherwise confidential juvenile files could be unsealed. Assembly Bill 676 similarly would allow any employee of the Department of Health and Family Services, a county social service agency, or a licensed child welfare agency, unrestricted access to sensitive information regarding children.

Furthermore, the bill does not define or limit what information in a juvenile court record should be made accessible to the government and child welfare agencies specified in the bill. Juvenile court records may often contain alcohol and drug assessments, psychological evaluations or other treatment records. This very sensitive information should be closely guarded. Allowing access to these types of juvenile records goes beyond the information needed to meet the initial intent of the legislation.

I have long supported the important work done by child protective service social workers who want to ensure that every placement option for a child is as safe as possible. However, Assembly Bill 676 broadens access to juvenile records far beyond what is required to accomplish that goal and expands access to far too many individuals and entities without adequate protections. I strongly encourage the Legislature to introduce revised legislation as soon as possible that addresses the access needs of child protective service social workers but also properly balances the need to protect from disclosure sensitive information concerning children. I look forward to working with the Legislature to accomplish that end.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a best practices review of local government operations, as directed by s. 13.94(8), Wis. Stats. This report focuses on public library services provided by Wisconsin's municipalities and counties, with support from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI). Wisconsin has 388 public libraries, which are funded primarily with municipal and county taxes, as well as 17 regional library systems supported by state aid. These libraries and systems employed more than 3,200 full—time equivalent staff in 2006, when their operating expenditures totaled \$210.4 million.

The 17 regional library systems are statutorily required to provide specific services, such as interlibrary loans of materials, reference assistance, and consulting services to member libraries. Consulting services include assistance with promoting library use, addressing the needs of users with special needs, and evaluating current and future building and space requirements. The regional library systems also provide libraries with technology support, which includes troubleshooting and consulting for purchases of software and hardware. More than one—half of the libraries we surveyed indicated an online catalog is the most valuable service provided by their regional library system.

Through surveys and interviews with the directors of individual libraries and all 17 regional library systems, we identified best practices related to collaboration among systems, effectively using volunteers, securing adequate technology support, and periodically assessing patron needs.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DPI, the regional library system directors, and the many public library directors who responded to our survey and our additional requests for information.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of March 2008.

On March 24, 2008, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$108.6 million. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$212.5 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On March 1, 2008, the Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2 thousand. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On March 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$27.5 million. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$25.7 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra month low of a negative \$27.9 million on March 13, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On March 24, 2008, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.8 million. This negative balance continued through March 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$1.8 million. The Lottery Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$3.1 million on March 27, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditure.

On March 1, 2008, the Conservation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$9.7 million. This negative balance continued through March 18, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$1.3 million. The Conservation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$17.9 million on March 14, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Wisconsin Health Education Loan Repayment Fund, Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Lottery Fund, and Conservation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

Sales were down \$9.5 million or 7% from the third quarter of Pt 2007, primarily due to a drop in Powerball and Megabucks sales, which are jackpot driven. Lower jackpots in FY 2008 have resulted in lower sales of these two products. Scratch ticket sales were also down during the third quarter. Grocery and convenience stores account for approximately 80% of lottery sales and high food and gas prices may be having a negative impact on lottery sales.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a review of dental care services provided under the State's Medical Assistance program, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Dentists statewide have long expressed concern about the amounts they are reimbursed under the program. In fiscal year (FY) 2006-07, when approximately \$46.0 million was spent for dental services provided to Medical Assistance recipients, only 1,342 of 3,493 licensed dentists in Wisconsin, or 38.4 percent, were certified as Medical Assistance providers statewide.

We focused our analysis on four counties in southeast Wisconsin in which dental services are provided to Medical Assistance recipients through health maintenance organizations (HMOs). We found lower utilization of dental care services among HMO enrollees, particularly for those under the age of 21, and higher costs than in the fee-for-service system used in other counties. Furthermore, HMO utilization rates have not improved in the past five years. We therefore include a recommendation for the

Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS), which administers the Medical Assistance program, to develop alternative dental service delivery models for southeast Wisconsin before current contracts expire in December 2009.

The Legislature has recently funded alternative programs to improve dental care services to low-income and underserved populations in varied settings, including federally funded community health centers. For example, since FY 2005-06 it has appropriated \$16.3 million in general purpose revenue for various dental clinics and programs. In December 2006 the Joint Committee on Finance approved the distribution of \$4.1 million in federal funds as one-time grants to expand dental services provided through specific clinics and programs statewide.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation of DHFS and other parties with whom we met in conducting this review.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

May 16, 2008

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved Special Session Assembly Bill 1 as 2007 Wisconsin Act 226 and deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State.

In February 2008, the Legislative Fiscal Bureau issued revisions to the revenue estimates that were used in developing the 2007-09 biennial budget which I signed in October 2007. Those revisions reflected a slowdown in the national economy brought on by a credit crisis in financial markets and higher commodity and fuel prices. The effect of this economic downturn was an estimated \$652 million deficit by the end of the biennium.

My administration took immediate action to reduce this projected deficit by rolling over repayment of short-term borrowing and ordering immediate cuts in cabinet agencies' state operations funding. In early March, as required by law, I introduced Special Session Assembly Bill 1 to bring the state budget back into balance.

I appreciate the Legislature's efforts in responding to the budget deficit. The leaders of both houses did what they could to forge a bipartisan agreement on budget repair legislation. I do not agree with all of those compromises, particularly the continued refusal by Assembly Republicans to secure Wisconsin's fair share of federal Medicaid revenues through a hospital assessment despite the overwhelming support of the state's major business and hospital associations. This continued shortsightedness reflects a missed opportunity that would have helped the Legislature avoid the accounting tricks I have had to correct through my vetoes.

When I first took office in January 2003, I inherited a \$3.2 billion budget deficit. I closed that deficit by prioritizing spending and protecting the taxpayer. I applied those same principles in the bill I introduced in March and in the vetoes I have made to the final bill.

First and foremost, we cannot solve our problems by not paying our bills. Delaying a school aid payment weakens Wisconsin's financial balance sheet, and more importantly, creates the risk of a significant cut to education in the next biennial budget. I have always been clear that education is my top priority because it is Wisconsin's top priority.

Second, we must look to reduce spending from previously authorized levels in the face of a budget deficit. The

Legislature proposed a modest lapse of \$69 million. My budget proposed a \$330 million lapse, offset by \$190 million of GPR-supported general obligation bonds for transportation. Through my vetoes, I will authorize a \$270 million lapse to bring the budget back into balance.

In addition, when facing a budget deficit, it does not make sense to also authorize large spending increases. For example, prior to the budget repair bill, spending for transportation was approximately \$350 million (15 percent) higher in this two-year budget compared with the last biennium. In the budget repair bill, the Legislature spends an additional \$180 million to provide a total increase of approximately \$530 million (22 percent) compared with the previous biennium. After vetoes, the budget repair bill I am signing today retains two of the Legislature's major increases in state spending - \$18.6 million GPR to address caseload increases in the state's child care subsidy program and \$24.8 million SEG to address higher county highway maintenance costs brought on by one of the worst winters in Wisconsin history. Other spending in the bill and increases provided in 2007 Wisconsin Act 20 will be scaled back in order to protect priorities and meet the \$270 million lapse goal.

Third, we must seek to maximize cost savings in state government. In my 2007-09 budget, I proposed taking advantage of favorable interest rates to refinance tobacco bonds. At that time, this refinancing was estimated to save \$50 million annually to fund increased smoking cessation efforts and to help meet health care costs in the state's Medicaid program. The Legislature included the refinancing plan in Act 20. In the budget repair bill, the Legislature has proposed using state appropriation bonds for this refinancing because this approach will provide even greater interest rate reductions than the Act 20 proposal. I am glad to see that the Legislature agrees with my goal of reducing the cost of the tobacco bonds. However, I do not agree with the Legislature's overreliance on an up-front payment from the refinancing. Therefore, I am directing the Department of Administration secretary to ensure that the tobacco bond refinancing be structured to deliver the greatest economic savings to the state with a more reasonable up-front savings amount.

Finally, I have continually sought to improve the state's long-term financial condition by increasing the state's budget reserves. The Legislature's proposed \$25 million reserve is not prudent under good economic conditions let alone the current national economic uncertainty and is, in fact, lower than amounts kept in reserve after addressing the \$3.2 billion deficit. Through my vetoes, I have restored the \$65 million statutory balance and maintained an overall general fund reserve of approximately \$100 million.

In previous sessions and in Act 20, the Legislature and I have significantly reduced the number of major nonfiscal policy items in budget bills. Unfortunately, this budget repair bill includes a major policy item related to property tax exemptions for low-income housing. While this legislation has a laudable goal, it demands a full public hearing and legislative debate. I look forward to the Legislature putting a low-income housing bill on my desk that is faithful to the legislative committee and public hearing process.

The following is a brief summary of how this budget repair legislation, including my vetoes, will address some of the key issues facing the citizens of Wisconsin:

- •Addresses the \$652 million deficit by scaling back spending increases, reducing the cost of borrowing and avoiding tax increases.
- •Protects schools from possible future budget cuts and improves the state's long-term fiscal condition by maintaining the current law school aid payment schedule.
- •Restores the \$65 million statutory balance, leaves an overall reserve of \$100 million, and maintains the requirement to transfer unanticipated revenues to the budget stabilization fund.
- •Authorizes the Department of Administration secretary to lapse \$270 million over the biennium from state agency appropriations. This amount is in addition to the \$200 million lapse authority included in Act 20.
- •Protects transportation-related investments and jobs by appropriating transportation revenue bond proceeds to address the \$27.5 million deficit in the transportation fund, allocating \$77 million in new federal funding for major highway construction and state highway rehabilitation projects, providing \$24.8 million for unforeseen winter maintenance costs, and authorizing \$50 million of GPR-supported general obligation bonds for highway rehabilitation projects to help reduce the impact of state agency lapses on the highway program.
- •Funds unanticipated caseload growth in the state's child care subsidy program by providing \$18.6 million GPR in fiscal year 2007-08. In light of this funding increase, the Department of Workforce Development will remove the current emergency rule related to attendance based reimbursement of providers. However, the department's authority to implement rules to base provider reimbursement on attendance is maintained in order to address any unanticipated caseload growth in fiscal year 2008-09.
- •Improves the economic savings associated with the Act 20 tobacco refinancing by authorizing state appropriation bonds to replace bonds sold in 2002 by the Badger Tobacco Asset Securitization Corporation.
- •Increases the current law funding of \$15 million annually for smoking cessation by \$250,000 in fiscal year 2008-09.
- •Closes an unacceptable tax loophole used by multinational corporations to shift profits out of the state to avoid paying Wisconsin taxes.
- •Maintains funding to implement the federal REAL ID mandate by vetoing the Legislature's transfer of \$20 million in driver license fee revenue from the transportation fund to the general fund.
- •Improves consumer protection by expanding the state's No Call List to include cell phones.
- •Includes the following provisions: requires school districts that are phasing in 4-year-old kindergarten to offer the program to all eligible pupils by the 2013-14 school year; clarifies utility aid hold harmless payments; authorizes retired

public safety officer annuity payments for health and long-term care insurance; defines custody for purposes of penalties related to escape from probation, parole and extended supervision; exempts nonprofit youth camps from certain town assessments; increases fees for nonresident snowmobile trail use stickers; prohibits the transporting of invasive fish species; and clarifies Act 20 provisions related to long-term care insurance agent training.

Regarding a provision associated with interest expense addback requirements for corporations, I concur with the Legislature's intent that this does not apply to legitimate intra-company loans where both entities of the company are subject to Wisconsin income tax. Some concerns have been raised regarding the interpretation of this language and I am requesting the Department of Revenue secretary ensure that companies are not, in effect, taxed twice due to this provision.

I have used my veto authority to craft a final bill that, while not addressing every issue, protects our priorities and improves the state's financial condition.

Last year, state agencies made strong progress toward the 5 percent minority contracting goal. This report provides information on Fiscal Year 2007 state purchases made with minority business enterprises (MBE) certified by the Wisconsin Department of Commerce. Our progress stems from your commitment to providing full and fair opportunities for all businesses, including MBEs, to compete for state contracts.

In Fiscal Year 2007, Wisconsin state government spent over \$62 million with MBE firms for products, services, facilities and highways. This is the second highest amount spent with minority businesses since the MBE program began.

Fiscal Year 2007 MBE results represent 4.02 percent of overall state spending. State agencies led the way with a 38 percent increase in total spending with certified minority firms. In addition, fourteen agencies surpassed the 5 percent MBE goal in Fiscal 2007, up from seven agencies in 2006.

Through your leadership, opening access to minority-owned businesses who are interested in doing business with the state will continue to be a major focus across state agencies.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed audit work at the Wisconsin Arts Board to help meet our audit requirements under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats. We have reviewed the Arts Board's fiscal operations to assess whether they are well-controlled and in compliance with statutory requirements. One of the Arts Board's major activities is to administer artistic and cultural grant and fellowship programs for cultural organizations and individual artists. It also administers the State's Percent for Art Program, which coordinates the acquisition of artwork for public state buildings with building projects exceeding \$250,000.

The Arts Board is primarily funded by general purpose revenue. It also receives program revenue from the federal government, Indian gaming compacts, and funds from other state agencies. Grant expenditures represented 61.3 percent and the Percent for Art Program represented 15.6 percent of the Arts Board's total expenditures of \$3.9 million during fiscal year 2006-07.

We identified several significant concerns with the Arts Board's fiscal controls. The major factor contributing to our concerns is that key fiscal responsibilities are primarily completed by one fiscal person with limited management oversight. The Arts Board has taken some steps to address our concerns, but we encourage it to implement all of the improvements we have recommended in a separate management letter.

The Arts Board is an active participant in Wisconsin's sister state relationship with Chiba Prefecture, Japan. The Board's Executive Director serves as the president of the nonprofit organization, Wisconsin-Chiba, Inc., which provides the primary financial support for the relationship. The Arts Board provides program and administrative support to the organization. Our management letter includes

recommendations for formalizing the Arts Board's arrangement with Wisconsin-Chiba, Inc., in a written agreement and ensuring costs incurred for annual exchange trips are allowable and reasonable under state and federal requirements. The Arts Board has agreed to implement these recommendations.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Arts Board staff during our review.

Expenses for these services are directly charged to the current income of the fund for which the services were furnished.

This report lists expenses on an accrual basis, which lists costs when they are incurred rather than paid. Providing the information on an accrual basis gives a better picture of quarter to quarter trends in services that are directly charged to the funds. A negative charge typically indicates an adjustment to expenses accrued in a prior quarter or a refund of expenses that were prepaid and subsequently adjusted.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes)

and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of April 2008.

On April 1, 2008, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$303.2 million. This negative balance continued through April 18, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$114.6 million. The General Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$648.4 million on April 10, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On April 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$25.4 million. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$22.9 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$25.5 million on April 7, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund pursuant to 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On April 1, 2008, the Lottery Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.2 million. This negative balance continued intermittently through April 25, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$3.0 million. The Lottery Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$2.6 million on April 3, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On April 21, 2008, the Utility Public Benefits Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.8 million. This negative balance continued through April 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$4.1 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Lottery Fund, and Utility Public Benefits Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as

a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

May 30, 2008

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed an evaluation of the food and dairy safety program administered by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP). This report focuses on the effectiveness of DATCP's regulatory activities and follows our January 2008 review of the program's funding. The program's expenditures totaled \$8.4 million in fiscal year (FY) 2006-07 and supported 97.6 full-time equivalent positions.

From FY 2004-05 through FY 2006-07, DATCP completed 79,743 routine inspections of food and dairy establishments.

During this period, 98.7 percent of completed dairy inspections and 68.3 percent of completed food inspections were conducted when scheduled. DATCP has not developed formal inspection frequency standards for food establishments, which partially explains why a smaller percentage of food inspections were completed as scheduled.

While its approach to compliance appears effective in most cases, we found that DATCP is at times ineffective in gaining timely and continued compliance when follow-up is required after an inspection. In a review of 50 cases that suggested significant noncompliance with food and dairy safety regulations, we identified 13 in which DATCP did not take timely and sufficient enforcement action to ensure "permanent and continuous" compliance with food and dairy safety regulations.

In addition, we identified concerns with DATCP's oversight of contracts with local health departments that regulate retail food establishments, and with its documentation of food emergencies. We include several recommendations to improve program management and enhance food and dairy safety enforcement activities.

We appreciate the cooperation extended to us by DATCP in conducting this evaluation. A response from DATCP follows the appendices.

RE: Report Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 36.11(22)(2)(b)

Section 36.11(22)(2)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, requires the Board of Regents to annually submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature on the methods used by each UW System institution to disseminate information to students on sexual assault and sexual harassment.

The law requires UW System institutions to incorporate oral and written information on sexual assault and sexual harassment into their orientation programs for newly entering students, including information on: (1) sexual assault by acquaintances of the victims; (2) the legal definitions and penalties for sexual assault; (3) generally available national, state, and campus statistics on sexual assault; (4) the rights of victims; and (5) protective behaviors including methods of recognizing and avoiding sexual assault and sexual harassment. In addition, each institution must annually supply printed material to all students enrolled in the institution that includes information on all of these topics. This law was enacted in April 1990, and this is the eighteenth report to be compiled for the Legislature since its enactment.

This report summarizes the primary methods used by each institution to comply with s. 36.11(22)(2)(b), Wisconsin Statutes. The summaries are not exhaustive of all efforts underway at the institutions. Instead, they summarize the programs institutions have identified as their "best practices" to respond to victims of sexual assault and provide information about sexual assault and its prevention to all students.

Overall, UW System institutions are (1) continually updating and improving the scope and quality of information provided to students; (2) integrating presentations, small-group discussion of the issues, and interactive dramatizations relating to sexual violence into new student orientation programs; (3) providing the educational and resource information required by s. 36.11(22), Wisconsin Statutes, on the web or in print form; (4) offering educational programs addressing the topic in a wide range of venues, including residence halls, student unions, classrooms, student organization gatherings, and private housing facilities; and (5) establishing effective and important connections among campus Dean of Students staff, residence hall staff, police and security, counseling and health personnel, local police, community service agencies, and regional hospitals to address sexual violence in a coordinated manner.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a review of overtime in state agencies, excluding the University of Wisconsin System, the Legislature, and the courts. During the last three years, state agencies paid a total of \$187.3 million in overtime, an increase of 15.2 percent since 2005. The largest category is for premium overtime, which is 1.5 times the employee's regular hourly rate and is typically earned for working in excess of 40 hours per week.

From 2005 through 2007, more than 90.0 percent of all premium overtime payments were for employees in agencies that have 24-hour operations or must quickly respond to emergencies. Two agencies with the largest amounts of premium overtime—the Department of Corrections (DOC) and the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS)—identify inadequate numbers of authorized positions as the most significant factor for increased use of overtime. Overtime provisions in collective bargaining agreements and increases in the amount of leave time granted have also contributed to increased overtime costs.

A total of 59 state employees were paid more than \$100,000 in premium overtime for the three-year period we reviewed: 49 were correctional officers and sergeants at DOC, and 10 were patient care staff at DOC or DHFS.

The extent to which the State is relying on overtime to meet continuing operational needs suggests that comprehensive analysis of the most cost-effective mix of additional authorized positions and overtime may be warranted. We include a recommendation for DOC and DHFS to analyze overtime use at their facilities and submit options for reducing overtime costs to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee by January 5, 2009.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have reviewed the Office of the State Treasurer's administration of unclaimed property that financial institutions and certain other businesses are required by statute to remit to the State on behalf of owners. As of March 2008, the Office held an estimated \$354.2 million in unclaimed cash and unliquidated securities, as well as the unliquidated contents of safe deposit boxes.

In fiscal year (FY) 2006-07, the Office received \$84.3 million in unclaimed cash and liquidated assets; paid more than \$22.0 million in claims, primarily to individuals; and deposited \$50.0 million in unclaimed property to the Common School Fund, which provides low-interest loans to municipalities and helps to support school libraries. The program's FY 2006-07 administrative expenditures—which are funded with program revenue—totaled \$4.7 million. Most administrative expenditures were payments to a private contractor, Affiliated Computer Services, Inc., which identifies and collects unclaimed property and provides other services to assist 7.75 full-time equivalent employees of the Office in administering the program.

As part of our annual financial audit of the State of Wisconsin, we reviewed the Office's internal controls over the unclaimed property program and performed limited testing. Overall, we found the Office's internal controls to be reasonable. We did, however, identify several areas for improvement, which are summarized in this letter report.

In addition, we identified policy issues the Legislature may wish to consider related to allowing a portion of unclaimed property to be deposited to the General Fund and altering the treatment of gift certificates and gift cards as unclaimed property.

The following information is provided for your consideration and review pursuant to 301.03(6m) Wis. Stats. The figures below pertain to calendar year 2007.

1) There were seventy-one Chapter 51 mental health commitments within the Department of Corrections. Of these, thirty-one were initial commitments and forty were extensions of commitments from previous years.

Sixty of the seventy-one commitments were obtained at the Wisconsin Resource Center (male inmates). Of these, twenty-seven were initial commitments and thirty-three were renewals of commitments from previous years. Eleven of the seventy-one commitments were obtained at Taycheedah Correctional Institution (female inmates). Of these, four were initial commitments and seven were recommitments from previous years.

After a Chapter 51 commitment, male inmates were treated at the Wisconsin Resource Center (WRC). The average length of stay for WRC inmates was 309 days. One male inmate was transferred from WRC to Mendota Mental Health Institute on an involuntary basis.

After a chapter 51 commitment, four females were transferred to Winnebago Mental Health Institute (WMHI) and seven were treated at Taycheedah. In addition, two females were transferred to WMHI and received treatment on a voluntary basis. The average length of stay was 26.5 days.

- 2) The total number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication in 2007 was 8022. This number includes inmates who were incarcerated for short-term stays as well as long-term stays. The number of inmates who were treated with psychotropic medication on any specific date is estimated at approximately 4200. Of these, the number treated on an involuntary basis was the same as the number of involuntary commitments (seventy-one). Major classes of medication included antidepressants, antipsychotics, and mood stabilizers.
- 3) Mental Health Services are available at all of the major institutions. Services include crisis intervention, individual counseling, and group therapy. Specific programs include sex offender treatment, anger management, domestic violence, substance abuse treatment, and cognitive interventions. Psychiatrists are available at all major institutions to provide evaluations for psychotropic medication and management of these medications. In addition, consultation is available from both psychologists and psychiatrists to evaluate competency to consent to psychotropic medication and for medical treatment.

The Department of Health and Family Services is pleased to submit to the Governor and the Legislature the Wisconsin Tobacco Prevention and Control Program, 2007 Annual Report. The report is required by 2003 Wis. Act 33, SB 44, Section 2462, 255.15 (4).

Wisconsin continued its success during 2007 in preventing youth tobacco use and promoting tobacco addiction treatment, the elimination of tobacco-related disparities and exposure to secondhand smoke. Highlights include:

- Smoking among high school students decreased from 38 percent in 1999 to 20 percent in 2006. This equals over 47,000 fewer high school smokers in 2006 than in 1999.
- Youth access to tobacco products declined substantially from 24.6 percent of establishments selling to minors in 2000 to 4.5 percent selling to youth in 2007.
- The Wisconsin Tobacco Quit Line received over 70,000 calls since its beginning in May 2001, through December 2007. Smokers who use Quit Line services are four to five times more likely to quit successfully than a smoker who quits "cold turkey."
- The First Breath Program, administered by the Wisconsin Women's Health Foundation in partnership with the Division of Public Health, provided 6,211 pregnant women on public assistance programs with intensive tobacco addiction treatment counseling and support at 114 sites in 63 counties from 2003 through December 2007. In 2007, 1,490 women were enrolled in the program.

 Tobacco consumption declined from 80.1 packs per capita in 2000 to 69.0 in 2007.

These accomplishments mark the continued importance of tobacco prevention and control in Wisconsin.

Under the leadership of Governor Doyle, the Tobacco Prevention and Control Program achieved great success in the 2007-09 Biennial Budget. The Program's budget was increased by \$5 million annually, bringing the program's total funding to \$15 million annually. The Program will use the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's revised 2007 Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs to guide its enhancement of existing efforts in Wisconsin.

In addition, the Biennial Budget included a \$1 increase in the state's tobacco excise tax, effective January 1, 2008. This tax increase is a proven best practice strategy that will significantly increase the quit attempts by Wisconsin smokers. In order to provide treatment to these tobacco users, Quit Line services will be expanded and nicotine replacement therapy medications will be provided in conjunction with free coaching.

These successful milestones demonstrate the continuous progress that is being made in tobacco and control efforts in Wisconsin as well as the significance of these efforts.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of May 2008.

On May 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$23.0 million. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$21.5 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$23.1 million on May 6, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On May 7, 2008, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$8.4 million. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$59.7 million. The Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$60.5 million on May 21, 2008. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, including a pending transfer from the Permanent Endowment Fund as required under 2007 Wisconsin Act 226.

On May 20, 2008, the Utility Public Benefits Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$1.8 million. This negative balance continued through May 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$2.5 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund, and Utility Public Benefits Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority, and as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

The Department of Health Services (DHS) is committed to reducing energy use at all of its facilities per the Energy Cost Reduction Plan guidelines in s. 16.953, Wisconsin Statutes.

In a continuing effort to do so, the Department has included high efficiency equipment and energy reducing building systems into its ongoing capital projects. High efficiency equipment was designed into the new 200-bed facility currently under construction at Sand Ridge Secure Treatment Center. The program statement for the 45-bed Female Treatment Facility at the Wisconsin Resource Center requires the architect/designer to "explore methods, materials and configurations" to conform to State energy concerns and comply with Act 141 and Executive Order 145.

The Department has initiated projects that will ultimately reduce energy consumption at its facilities, including the replacement of inefficient heating and ventilating equipment at the Southern Wisconsin Center, installation of new instantaneous water heaters in the Heating Plant at Mendota Mental Health Institute, and the installation of high efficiency laundry equipment at Central Wisconsin Center. DHS energy reduction efforts continue with the current evaluation of the use of LED street and sidewalk lighting at several of its facilities, the use of an alternate fueled boiler and solar thermal hot water in its laundry and food service areas.

A number of issues, however, complicate the Department's ability to implement energy efforts as rapidly and to the extent that might be desired or might be possible in other state facilities. All of the Department's campuses have components that operate 24 hours per day, 365 days a year. These facilities care for persons who have medical and emotional issues, and have difficulty tolerating disruptions in their daily routine. In addition, many components on our campuses have significant security and/or life safety considerations that must be met. Five of the facilities also must meet regulatory requirements of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) and the Joint Commission. These factors must be carefully considered in planning for the implementation of energy conservation measures.

The attached Energy Cost Reduction Plan worksheets reflect the Department's efforts over the last two years and outline some of its potential efforts in the next two years. The Department has and will continue to make energy efficiency a major part of all its capital improvement projects. In addition, the operating and maintenance staffs at our facilities will continue to look for and identify non-capital improvements resulting in further reduction of our energy usage.

Based on the data collected and analysis performed, the existing corridor will provide acceptable operating capacity for at least the next 20 years. No further action is planned at this time.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. We have issued an unqualified opinion on the Wisconsin Lottery's fiscal year (FY) 2005-06 and FY 2006-07 financial statements. We also found that the Wisconsin Lottery was in compliance with statutory spending limitations related to prizes, product informational advertising, retailer compensation, and administrative expenses.

Total ticket sales increased \$57.8 million, or 13.3 percent, from FY 2002-03 to FY 2006-07. However, FY 2006-07 ticket sales of \$492.8 million were \$16.2 million, or 3.2 percent, less than those of the previous year. Wisconsin Lottery staff attribute this decrease to the timing of large Powerball jackpots, which have a significant effect on ticket sales. Total operating expenses increased \$42.5 million, or 13.6 percent, from FY 2002-03 to FY 2006-07, primarily because lottery prizes and retailer compensation fluctuate with ticket sales. In FY 2006-07, lottery proceeds of \$160.0 million were distributed to provide property tax relief.

As required by s. 13.94(1)(dm), Wis. Stats., we have completed our annual financial audit of State Fair Park. We have issued an unqualified opinion on State Fair Park's fiscal year (FY) 2006-07 financial statements. In addition, we have continued to monitor State Fair Park's financial condition and its efforts to improve its financial performance.

In FY 2006-07, State Fair Park's revenue exceeded expenditures by \$1.3 million, the first time since FY 1998-99. As a result, State Fair Park was able to reduce the accumulated cash deficit to \$9.9 million. The positive operating results are primarily attributable to reduced operating costs as a result of the licensing of the Milwaukee Mile racetrack to a private promoter. However, the promoter has reported financial difficulty, and in February 2008 the license agreement was renegotiated and the annual license fee paid by the promoter was lowered from approximately \$1.8 million to \$1.0 million. Further, a portion of the amount due has been deferred. As a result, State Fair Park will receive only \$725,000 in license fees in 2008.

As part of our audit, we also reviewed conflict of interest allegations related to the management of State Fair Park's Agriculture Department. State Fair Park has begun to take steps to address concerns raised by members of the agriculture community. We include several recommendations for further improvement, including increased communication among the Board, management staff, various advisory committees, and the agriculture community in Wisconsin. In addition, we recommend State Fair Park seek an opinion from the Government Accountability Board on the perceived conflicts of interest between the Agriculture Director's outside business interests and his responsibilities to State Fair Park.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of State Fair Park. A response from State Fair Park's executive director follows the appendices.

We have completed a review of the Environmental Cooperation Pilot Program (ECPP). The program is administered by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and was established by 1997 Wisconsin Act 27 to test innovative environmental regulatory methods. Since the program's inception, DNR has entered into seven agreements with power generation and manufacturing companies to

reduce pollution. Statutes require the Legislative Audit Bureau to monitor ECPP and report to the Legislature on our findings.

During 2006 and 2007, DNR renewed six of the seven agreements with ECPP companies for a final five-year term. One of two separate ECPP agreements with We Energies was not renewed because environmental goals had been attained and neither DNR nor the company anticipated any further benefits from the program.

Since our last review, DNR has reported environmental performance measures. However, these measures could be improved to identify performance by individual companies.

In order to meet statutory requirements and better assess ECPP's effectiveness, we also suggest that DNR expand its efforts to measure the companies' and its own administrative savings, consider additional strategies for sharing environmental or technical innovations, and employ additional efforts to ensure adequate public involvement.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DNR and the ECPP companies we contacted in conducting this review.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of June 2008.

On June 16, 2008, the General Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$576.4 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through June 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$24.8 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

On June 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$20.8 million. This negative balance continued through June 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$35.3 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$37.0 million on June 6, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$71.5 million to the General Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On June 1, 2008, the Medical Assistance Trust Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$59.5 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through June 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$32.3 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures, including a pending transfer from the Permanent Endowment Fund as required under 2007 Wisconsin Act 226.

On June 1, 2008, the Utility Public Benefits Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.7 million (its intra-month low). This negative balance continued through June 3, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$2.2 million. The negative balance was due to the difference in the timing of revenues and expenditures.

The General Fund, Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, Medical Assistance Trust Fund, and Utility Public Benefits Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority and, as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of July 2008.

On July 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$163.3 million. This negative balance continued through July 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$156.0 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$170.7 million on July 10, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$200 million to the Medical Assistance Trust Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

On July 9, 2008, the University Trust Fund - Principal cash balance closed at a negative \$1.2 million. This negative balance continued through July 31, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$4.2 million (its intra-month low). The negative balance was due to an accounting error that was corrected in August.

The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund, and University Trust Fund - Principal shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. We have completed a best practices review of local government operations, as directed by s. 13.94(8), Wis. Stats. This review focuses on efforts by Wisconsin's public school districts to reduce truancy, which is the unexcused absence from school of children under the age of 18. In the 2006-07 school year, 9.3 percent of pupils in kindergarten through grade 12 were classified as habitual truants because they had five or more unexcused absences in a semester, although rates in individual school districts ranged from 0 in 47 districts to 58.2 percent in the Menominee Indian School District.

Efforts to reduce truancy are guided by a statutory framework that requires school districts to establish plans and policies, collaborate with local officials within their counties, and notify parents and guardians of their children's truancies. Districts have also established a variety of programs consistent with nationally developed best practices, which include involving parents in improving school attendance and working with human services and law enforcement agencies to provide services to pupils and to enforce local ordinances.

We have identified several best practices to assist school districts and the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) in monitoring, assessing, and reducing truancy.

We appreciate the courtesy extended to us by DPI, school district officials, other state and local government officials, and officials representing private-sector agencies that provided information for our review.

As required by 2005 Wisconsin Act 125, we have reviewed the pupil test score data provided to us by the School Choice Demonstration Project, which is a group of privately funded education researchers who are studying the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. The Choice program provides publicly funded private school tuition for low-income children in Milwaukee.

Project researchers are conducting a five-year longitudinal study of a sample of 2,727 Choice pupils that comprises a random sample of pupils in the third through eighth grades and all Choice pupils in the ninth grade; 2,727 Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) pupils in the third through ninth grades who were selected based on their similarity to the Choice pupils; and a random sample of 2,727 MPS pupils in the third through ninth grades. The researchers plan to track changes in Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination scores and determine how participation in the Choice program affects changes in academic achievement.

We reviewed the project's data for the 2006-07 school year, the first year that it arranged for the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination to be administered to Choice pupils. We analyzed and confirmed the test score averages and related analyses that the project reported in February 2008. However, we were unable to review average pupil test scores at individual Choice schools because the project, citing confidentiality concerns, did not provide us with this type of information. As a result, we cannot provide legislators and other policymakers with information about academic performance specific to each of the 120 Choice schools that operated in the 2006-07 school year. We also note analytical challenges that the project will need to address when analyzing test scores in future years.

As requested by the Public Service Commission (PSC), we have completed a financial audit of the Universal Service Fund, which was established to ensure that all state residents receive essential telecommunications services and have access to advanced telecommunications capabilities. It is

funded primarily through assessments on telecommunications providers, which totaled \$30.0 million in fiscal year (FY) 2006-07. Our audit report contains our unqualified opinion on the Universal Service Fund's financial statements for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2007, and June 30, 2006.

Eight of 13 programs currently supported by the Universal Service Fund are operated by the PSC. The programs provide low-income or disabled individuals affordable access to basic telephone and information services, lessen the financial effect of high rate increases, and assist in the purchase of medical telecommunications equipment.

The largest program supported by the Universal Service Fund is the Educational Telecommunications Access Program, which is administered by the Department of Administration (DOA). This program subsidizes data lines and video links for eligible educational institutions. In FY 2006-07, expenditures for the program totaled \$17.4 million.

The Universal Service Fund also supported two programs administered by the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) during FY 2006-07, including state aid to public library systems. Since FY 2004-05, the Universal Service Fund has been used increasingly for library system aid.

In our Report on Internal Control and Compliance, we reported on three fiscal management issues that require attention by the PSC and DOA. We found errors in the financial statements, inaccurate copayment billings for educational institutions participating in the Educational Telecommunications Access Program, and an incorrect treatment of a prior-year refund.

The Department of Health Services operates BadgerCare under section 49.665 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Under this section of the statutes the Wisconsin Legislature requires the Department to submit a report summarizing the BadgerCare program and its progress. This submission fulfills that legislative requirement.

BadgerCare was established under the terms of the federal State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) enacted through the federal budget of 1997. The SCHIP program provided states with the options of creating a new independent program to insure children or to expand the state's existing Medicaid program. The Wisconsin Legislature created BadgerCare as a SCHIP Medicaid expansion program under 1997 WI Act 27.

The Department implemented BadgerCare Plus in February 2008 as authorized under section 49.471. BadgerCare Plus merges Family Medicaid, BadgerCare, and Healthy Start to form a comprehensive health insurance program for low income children and families to help ensure that 98% of Wisconsin's citizens have access to health care. The program provides coverage for more members while simplifying the program and promoting prevention and healthy behaviors.

Enrollment and expenditure data, reported below for SFY08, shows both BadgerCare and BadgerCare Plus programs separately. Enrollment simplification implemented with BadgerCare Plus makes it difficult to identify BadgerCare Plus members made eligible under the enrollment rules of BadgerCare. Thus the department has determined that data on all BadgerCare Plus members, beginning February 2008, is pertinent information for this report.

BadgerCare leverages significant amounts of federal funding for health care coverage of eligible Wisconsin residents.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

We have completed a review of the Department of Administration's (DOA's) oversight of a contract for print and mail staffing services, which we initiated in response to a complaint reported on the fraud, waste, and mismanagement hotline established by 2007 Wisconsin Act 126.

The complaint alleged that DOA was not exercising adequate oversight of contract staff provided by Spherion Corporation, whose employees filled 34.0 of 58.0 full-time equivalent positions in DOA's Bureau of Publishing and Distribution as of June 2008. We did not substantiate any allegations related to workplace safety concerns, a hostile work environment, and fraudulent time recording by contract staff. However, our report includes both a recommendation for DOA to recalculate its cost-benefit analysis related to print and mail service staffing and several strategies to better control state costs associated with DOA's print and mail services.

In fiscal year (FY) 2007-08, DOA spent \$20.4 million on print and mail services, including \$1.7 million paid to Spherion for staffing services. The current contract with Spherion will expire on June 30, 2009, and DOA has begun preparations to solicit bids in October or November 2008. Using a cost-benefit model developed by DOA, we estimate that as much as \$616,500 could be saved in the five-year period from FY 2009-10 through FY 2013-14 if state staff filled all print and mail positions currently filled by contract staff. However, contract costs will be difficult to estimate until DOA has received vendors' bids, and the actual cost of adding state staff is difficult to estimate because of the uncertainty of future salary, fringe benefit, and recruiting costs.

If DOA chooses to continue to contract for some or all print and mail staff in the future, we recommend formalizing billing procedures for supervisory staff, prohibiting the contractor from billing for time new contract staff are trained in the operation of printing and other equipment, and including in the contract standard provisions to impose damages if confidential information is disclosed.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by DOA and Spherion in conducting this review.

We have completed financial audits of Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes for the period July 1, 2006, through June 30, 2007. The audits were requested by the Department of Health Services (formerly the Department of Health and Family Services) to comply with requirements of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. We were able to express an unqualified opinion on each Institute's financial statements.

Mendota and Winnebago Mental Health Institutes are licensed and accredited hospitals that provide specialized diagnostic, evaluation, and treatment services for mentally ill children and adults. The Institutes also provide services to forensic patients referred to them through the criminal justice system. The Institutes are funded through a mix of general purpose revenue and program revenue.

In FY 2006-07, each Institute reported an operating loss of \$3.7 million, in part because operating expenses increased at a faster pace than operating revenues. Salaries and fringe benefit expenses, which were the largest expenditure category at each Institute, increased by \$5.7 million at Mendota and \$3.5 million at Winnebago. To help address the Institutes' operating losses, the Department increased daily patient rates by 9.5 percent at each Institute effective on October 15, 2007, and approved increases of 9.5 percent at Mendota and 11 percent at Winnebago to be effective October 12, 2008.

Mendota's overall net assets increased by \$1.5 million, while Winnebago's declined by \$2.6 million for FY 2006-07. Mendota's increase in net assets is primarily attributable to proceeds from the sale of general purpose revenue funded bonds, which it received to install equipment to reduce air pollution at the power plant it operates.

We continued to monitor the status of prior-year concerns related to the administration of approximately \$476,000 in client funds by the Program of Assertive Community Treatment, an outpatient unit of Mendota. In our Report on Internal Control and Compliance, we report that the Department has taken some steps to improve controls subsequent to our audit period. However, we still noted concerns during FY 2006-07.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Department of Health Services staff during our audit. A response from the Department follows our report.

This report presents statements of fund condition and operations (budgetary basis) of the State of Wisconsin for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008. This satisfies the requirements of sec. 16.40(3), Wisconsin Statutes. Displayed are major sources of revenues and major categories of expenditures for the General Fund and other funds compared to the prior year.

The General Fund has an undesignated balance of \$130.7 million as of the end of the fiscal year. This is \$50.2 million higher than the balance of \$80.5 million projected in the estimate for 2007 Wisconsin Act 226. The higher ending balance was due to tax collections exceeding estimates for the fiscal year made in February 2008.

General-purpose revenue taxes were \$13.043 billion compared to \$12.618 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$425 million or 3.4 percent. This increase was \$174.6 million higher than the 2007 Wisconsin Act 226 estimate of \$12.868 billion. General-purpose revenue expenditures, excluding fund transfers, were \$13.526 billion compared to \$13.105 billion in the prior year, an increase of \$421 million or 3.2 percent. This increase reflects funding associated with continuing support for two-thirds of local school costs, including associated increases in school levy tax credits, as well as increased higher education financial aid and child care assistance.

In fiscal year 2008, the State of Wisconsin continued to devote the major share of state tax collections to assistance to local school districts, municipalities and counties. Local assistance accounted for 55.8 percent of total general purpose revenue spending. Aid payments to individuals and organizations represented 20.7 percent of total general purpose revenue expenditures. The University of Wisconsin accounted for 7.8 percent of total general purpose revenue spending and state operations spending for all other state agencies accounted for 15.7 percent of the total.

The State of Wisconsin expects to publish its comprehensive annual financial report in December of 2008. The report will be prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

I am pleased to present to you, for distribution to the Wisconsin Senate, the annual evaluation report on the Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program. It is also available on our website www.dot.wisconsin. gov/library/publications/topic/safety.htm. The program, created by section 86.53 Wis. Stats., was established by the legislature in 1997 with the requirement that the Department study its impact and report on its findings.

The Pretrial Intoxicated Driver Intervention Grant Program is intended for offenders who are arrested for their second or subsequent OWl (Operating While Intoxicated) offense. Offender participation may be voluntary or court ordered. It is an intervention model designed to get offenders into counseling, treatment and supervision as soon as possible after the arrest. The program is individual to each community.

As you will see in the report, no community that has begun a program has dropped it. Overall, offenders who successfully completed the program were less likely than non-participants to be re-arrested for subsequent OWl violations. Those who were re-arrested went significantly longer between arrests than non-participants. Currently there are seven counties on a waiting list for funding to begin programs.

I commend those people who have dedicated themselves to making this innovative program a success. There are no "silver bullets" in eradicating impaired driving, but I feel this effort is a vital piece in the total transportation safety effort.

This report is transmitted as required by s. 20.002(11)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Wisconsin Statutes) and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative cash balances during the month of September 2008.

On September 1, 2008, the Utility Public Benefits Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$2.9 million. This negative balance continued through September 18, 2008, when the

fund's cash balance closed at a positive \$13.1 million. The Utility Public Benefits Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$3.4 million on September 11, 2008. The negative balance was due to a delayed cash transfer.

On September 1, 2008, the Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance closed at a negative \$139.5 million. This negative balance continued through September 30, 2008, when the fund's cash balance closed at a negative \$141.0 million. The Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund cash balance reached its intra-month low of a negative \$142.5 million on September 4, 2008. The negative balance was due to the transfer of \$200 million to the Medical Assistance Trust Fund per 2007 Wisconsin Act 20, and the pending liquidation of fund securities necessary to offset this shortfall.

The Utility Public Benefits Fund and Injured Patients and Families Compensation Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the statutory interfund borrowing limitations and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by the State Controller's Office will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority and, as a result, the funds requiring the use of the authority will effectively bear the interest cost.

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Madison

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

As required by s. 13.94(1)(em), Wis. Stats., we have completed a program evaluation of the Wisconsin Lottery, which is administered by the Department of Revenue. Although annual sales have fluctuated, they increased from a total of \$482.9 million in fiscal year (FY) 2003-04 to \$494.7 million in FY 2007-08, or by 2.4 percent over the past five years. Net lottery proceeds provided \$146.5 million in property tax relief in FY 2007-08.

In FY 2005-06, the Wisconsin Lottery implemented an evaluation tool to assist in the development and management of instant games. We include a recommendation for the Wisconsin Lottery to include product information costs, which include spending to publicize individual games, in the evaluation tool and to require its contractor to regularly report on product information expenditures associated with specific games.

Between FY 2003-04 and FY 2007-08, the Wisconsin Lottery paid one contractor \$25.2 million for product information services and another contractor \$61.1 million for operations services such as computerized gaming system services. Formal annual performance evaluations are required under both contracts. While the Wisconsin Lottery meets regularly with its product information contractor to provide verbal feedback, it has not completed formal annual evaluations, as it does with its operations contractor. We include a recommendation for the Wisconsin Lottery to evaluate its product information contractor annually.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by Wisconsin Lottery staff in the Department of Revenue. The Department's response follows the appendices.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:

At the request of the departments of Commerce and Administration, and in accordance with s. 13.94(1s), Wis. Stats., we have completed a financial audit of the State of Wisconsin Petroleum Inspection Fee Revenue Obligations Program for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2008, and June 30, 2007. We express our unqualified audit opinion on the Statement of Changes in Program Assets and related notes.

Under the program, the State has issued revenue obligations, such as bonds and commercial paper, to provide financing for payment of claims under the Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award (PECFA) program. These revenue obligations are not general obligation debt of the State. Instead, they are to be repaid primarily from the \$0.02 per gallon fee charged to suppliers of petroleum products sold in Wisconsin, which is collected by the Department of Revenue.

During fiscal year (FY) 2007-08, the State collected \$76.6 million in petroleum inspection fees and made \$30.4 million in scheduled debt service payments, including \$20.3 million in principal repayment and \$10.1 million in interest. As of June 30, 2008, a total of \$252.3 million in revenue obligations remained outstanding, to be repaid from future petroleum inspection fees.

Petroleum inspection fees in excess of debt service requirements are deposited to the Petroleum Inspection Fund and are used to pay PECFA claims and for other purposes authorized by the Legislature, including the early redemption of petroleum inspection fee revenue obligations. During FY 2007-08, \$47.0 million in inspection fees was deposited to the Petroleum Inspection Fund while \$16.8 million in PECFA claims was paid from the Fund. The remaining \$30.2 million was used for a variety of purposes, including a \$20.3 million transfer authorized by the Legislature to the Transportation Fund, as well as \$1.0 million in transfers to the General Fund to help meet lapse requirements included in 2007 Wis. Acts 20 and 226.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us during our audit by staff of the departments of Commerce, Administration, and Revenue.
