Testimony on SB 168 before the Senate Committee on Labor, Elections and Urban Affairs

Good Afternoon, Honorable Chair Coggs and members of the Senate Committee on Labor, Elections and Urban Affairs! I appreciate the opportunity to testify in strong support for Senate Bill (SB) 168 (Apprenticeship Bill) — which in my opinion is a commonsense bill. The bill that had unanimous support from both houses, last session, could not be pulled from the Senate Organization Committee to be heard on the Senate floor — and led to its "death".

This bill was drafted at the behest of the Department of Regulation & Licensing (DRL). I have worked very closely with DRL and the Board of Barbering & Cosmetology, in recent times to garner input from residents as to how best to enable the professions and sub-specialties under B & C flourish. This piece of legislation is among others that were enunciated during the listening sessions that occurred.

This bill is <u>merely</u> a technical fix that would allow this delegation to take place as had been the case in years past. The practice of barbering or cosmetology licensees who were not managers supervising apprentices was allowed under the Board rules; and was common practice until the rule was changed following a legal interpretation of the Legislative Council. Their comments were that..."the language conflicted with the provisions of statute."

The bill would therefore allow the industry to return to the former practice of allowing responsible licensees to supervise apprentices, and will expand the opportunities available to receive this training. More so, the cost for implementation is minimal.

It is my hope that this fix is executed in order that these professions will continue to thrive.

Dear Senator Wirch and Senator Lehmann,

I note there is a hearing on Senate Bill 168 on September 2. The Bill is of great importance to our organization, therefore we are hopeful of it passing during your current session.


Under the current statutes a Manager of Record license holder is required to supervise a Barber / Cosmetology apprentice. The proposed bill allows a licensed Barber / Cosmetology Practitioner in addition to a Manager to supervise an apprentice. The Department of Regulation, Barbering and Cosmetology Board, and Department of Workforce Development have all endorsed the proposed Senare Bill 168. Previously practitioners were allowed to supervise until a statute audit. The Barber and Cosmetology Board extended the delay of enforcement until July 1, 2009 for Managers of Record supervising with the intention of Legislature passing the proposed bill. If the bill would fail to go through the current legislation, it could have an impact of nearly \$150,000 annually in payroll dollars for our operations in Kenosha and Racine counties.

Allowing for a practitioner with sufficient education, training and experience to provide the supervision and training is much more effective. There are some very good educators whom do not have a desire to obtain their Managers License because it is not a career goal to manage. They like to teach and supervise. My 25 plus years of experience has shown that having a Managers license does not make an individual a more qualified instructor / supervisor with apprentices. I have talked with salons of all sizes and types, and they concur with allowing practitioners to supervise.

It seems to me that we would best serve the consumer by having the most qualified individual supervising the apprentices instead of limiting it to a "Manager". Apprentices need a qualified supervisor / mentor, but just by having a manager's license does not mean that they are the most qualified. The State of Wisconsin has done a tremendous job with significant impact in regards to the apprenticeship program allowing on the job training and earning an income while obtaining a profession. I struggle to find value and advantages in limiting a Manager of Record to supervise.
