

Section 227.19 **requires** you to notify each member of your committee that you have received this Clearinghouse Rule. Although some committee chairs choose to do so, you are not required by law or rule to send a copy of the text of the rule to each member at this time. Instead, your notice could state that members should contact you if they wish to receive a hard copy of the rule. Another option would be to email the rule to members. 

- The language in the bill
  - Takes away the ability of the Wisconsin Examining Board to decide on a case by case basis what organizations and classes can qualify for Continuing Education.
  - Eliminates the possibility that a state and federally funded accredited program with a proven track record of training staff which far exceeds the current minimum standard of certification education be kept from offering continuing education.

- Requires that in many cases, qualified CEU providers seek sponsorship from out of state chiropractic colleges.
- All this to provide certified CEUs to staff with as little as 3 hours of education that amounts to seminar based education. Essentially, most certified chiropractic technicians have no formal education in the work that they do.
- Physical Therapy Assistant (PTA) standards—an example.
  - Any comparison to PTAs who have formal education requiring a 2 year associate degree and licensing exam to the current minimum standard for certified chiropractic staff does not make sense.
  - PTA and PT certification allows for organizations in the state outside of their trade associations to host CEU seminars. Most of the UW system schools host CEU seminars. There are online course offerings allowed from online agencies that most of us in the room have never of before:

  - Current certification rules for certified chiropractic staff are closer to the qualifications of a physical therapy aid who can clean up and apply hot or cold packs. They are to be trained by their employers. There is no state certification or continuing education required for that position.

PT 9.01 Authority and purpose. The rules in this chapter are adopted by the board pursuant to the authority delegated by ss. 15.085 (5) (b), 227.11 (2) and 448.55 (3), Stats., and govern required biennial continuing education of licensees of the board. History: CR 03-020: cr. Register April 2004 No. 580, eff. 5-1-04.

#### PT 9.02 Definitions. In this chapter:

- (1) "Contact hour" means not less than 50 minutes a licensee spends in actual attendance at or completion of acceptable continuing education.
- (2) "Continuing education" means planned, organized learning activities designed to maintain, improve, or expand a licensee's knowledge and skills relevant to the enhancement of practice, education, or theory development to improve the safety and welfare of the public.
- (4) "Licensee" means a person licensed to practice as a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant in this state.

History: CR 03-020: cr. Register April 2004 No. 580, eff. 5-1-04; CR 08-049: r. and recr. (1), r. (3) Register November 2008 No. 635, eff. 12-1-08.

- PT 9.03 Continuing education requirements. (1) Unless granted a postponement or waiver under sub. (8), every physical therapist shall complete at least 30 hours of board-approved continuing education in each biennial registration period, as specified in s. 448.55 (3), Stats. Four of the required 30 hours shall be in the area of ethics and jurisprudence.
- (2) Unless granted a postponement or waiver under sub. (8), every physical therapist assistant shall complete at least 20 hours of board-approved continuing education in each biennial registration period, as specified in s. 448.55 (3), Stats. Four of the required 20 hours shall be in the area of ethics and jurisprudence.
- (3) Continuing education hours may apply only to the registration period in which the hours are acquired. If a license has lapsed, the board may grant permission to apply continuing education hours acquired after lapse of the license to a previous biennial period of licensure during which required continuing education was not acquired. In no case may continuing education hours be applied to more than one biennial period.
- (4) Unless granted a postponement or waiver under sub. (8), a licensee who fails to meet the continuing education requirements by the renewal deadline shall cease and desist from practice.

- (5) During the time between initial licensure and commencement of a full 2-year licensure period new licensees shall not be required to meet continuing education requirements.
- (6) Applicants from other states applying for a license to practice as a physical therapist under s. 448.53 (3), Stats., shall submit proof of completion of at least 30 hours of continuing education approved by the board within 2 years prior to application.
- (7) Applicants from other states applying for a license to practice as a physical therapist assistant under s. 448.53 (3), Stats., shall submit proof of completion of at least 20 hours of continuing education approved by the board within 2 years prior to application.
- (8) A licensee may apply to the board for a postponement or waiver of the requirements of this section on grounds of prolonged illness or disability, or on other grounds constituting extreme hardship. The board shall consider each application individually on its merits, and the board may grant a postponement, partial waiver or total waiver as deemed appropriate.

Note: Under 2001 Wisconsin Act 70, continuing education requirements do not become effective until the licensing period beginning November 1, 2005 and ending on October 31, 2007.

#### I. THE PROPOSED RULE:

The proposed rule, including the analysis and text, is attached.

# II. DETAILED STATEMENT EXPLAINING THE BASIS AND PURPOSE OF THE PROPOSED RULE, INCLUDING HOW THE PROPOSED RULE ADVANCES RELEVANT STATUTORY GOALS OR PURPOSES:

The chiropractic examining board is authorized under §§ 454.12 (2), 446.025 (3) (b) and 446.026 (3) (b), Stats., to promulgate rules establishing continuing education (CE) requirements for its licensees. The purpose of such rules is to preserve the public health, safety and welfare by ensuring the competency of those licensed by the board to practice their profession. This proposed rule-making order by the chiropractic examining board amends, repeals and recreates portions of ch. Chir 5 regarding continuing education for chiropractors, chiropractic radiological technicians (CRTs) and chiropractic technicians (CTs). The changes to ch. Chir 5 are necessitated by legislative changes made pursuant to 2009 Wis. Act 28, which have been codified into law as part of ch. 446 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The proposed rule advances the statutory mandate of §§ 446.025 (3) (b) and 446.026 (3) (b), Stats., by setting forth specific requirements for CTs and CRTs to follow. It further advances the statutory purpose of the rulemaking by providing the guidance necessary to promote compliance with the applicable statutes. The proposed rule also clarifies the continuing education requirements for chiropractors by removing provisions from § Chir 5.01 that are no longer applicable. Resultantly, only applicable provisions remain, making the rule cleaner, clearer and more concise.

# III. SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS AND THE BOARD'S RESPONSES, EXPLANATION OF MODIFICATIONS TO PROPOSED RULES PROMPTED BY PUBLIC COMMENTS:

The chiropractic examining board held a public hearing regarding the proposed amendments to Chir 5 on April 27, 2011. The following people either testified at the hearing or submitted written comments:

Morna Foy

Jeff Wilder Russ Leonard Elizabeth McClain

The board summarizes the comments received either by hearing testimony or by written submission as follows:

Jeff Wilder, D.C. and Russ Leonard are executive members of the Wisconsin Chiropractic Association (WCA). Both spoke to request that proposed § Chir 5.02 (1) (a) be amended to remove the provision that would allow colleges with board-approved CT and CRT certification programs to serve as sponsors or providers of continuing education programs and courses for CTs and CRTs. Mr. Wilder stated that a couple of decades ago, the WCA worked cooperatively with the board to limit the institutions able to provide CE to chiropractors to those with a long-term responsibility for the integrity of the Chiropractic profession and the resources to monitor the requirements for chiropractic education. He surmised that without "legitimate" sponsors, chiropractic staff could be taught clinical approaches outside the scope of practice or procedures that would pose serious health risks to patients, and further, that there is no accountability for instructors outside the established entities who offer education to DCs, CRs and CRTs. Accordingly, he proposes that no new sponsors be allowed, and that instead, any entity not currently able to provide CE to chiropractors work with already established chiropractic CE providers. Mr. Leonard agreed with the comments of his colleague, Dr. Wilder, and further indicated that restricting the list of providers to those presently allowed or those with a long-term interest in the success and viability of the chiropractic profession will increase the credibility and accountability of chiropractic education. According to Mr. Leonard, that would not include colleges with a CT/CRT certification program approved by the board.

Elizabeth McClain, D.C. is an executive member of the Moraine Park Technical College System Board. She spoke in support of the provision in proposed § Chir 5.02 (1) (a) allowing colleges with board-approved CT and CRT programs to serve as sponsors or providers of continuing education programs and courses for CTs and CRTs. Ms. McClain stated that technical colleges with approved CT/CRT certification programs are competent to provide CE to CTs and CRTs. Specifically, she indicated that Moraine Park graduates complete 4 internships in different chiropractors' offices prior to completion of the program, and that all training in delegable services is taught by chiropractors. She further stated that the curriculum is developed by a panel of experts that includes doctors of chiropractic. Lastly, Ms. McClain stated that technical colleges serve a public interest for people who want to work for chiropractors, and noted the difference between the WCA (as a non-accredited entity) and technical colleges (as accredited institutions).

Morna Foy, an executive with the Wisconsin Technical College System provided written comments in support of the proposed new rules as drafted, specifically, the provision of § Chir 5.02 (1) (a) allowing colleges with board-approved CT and CRT programs to serve as sponsors or providers of continuing education programs and courses for CTs and CRTs. Ms. Foy surmised that such a provision will ensure that Wisconsin citizens and the

Wisconsin chiropractic industry will continue to have access to high quality, affordable CT and CRT training programs.

The board explains modifications to its rule-making proposal prompted by public comments as follows:

The board considered the matter, including the public comments, and agreed with the recommendations of the WCA. Accordingly, the board moved to remove the provision that would allow technical schools with a CRT or CT certification program to serve as continuing education providers for CTs and CRTs. The board reasoned that such schools do not have a vested interest in the long-term success of the profession, that there is no way to ensure the quality of programs provided by these institutions and that there is nothing to ensure continued quality when college leadership changes. The board also considered the fact that any entity, including colleges with approved CT/CRT programs, seeking to become CE providers for CTs and CRTs could do so by seeking sponsorship from any one of the approved sponsors.

#### IV. RESPONSE TO LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

Comment 2k. If titles are used in paragraphs, they should be used consistently in all paragraphs in a subsection. Sections 9 and 10 create titles for two paragraphs in § Chir 5.02 (1) but no other paragraphs in § Chir 5.02 (1) have titles.

Response: Because the standard for CE is different for chiropractors, chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians, by using titles, the need to rewrite § Chir. 5.02 (1) (b) in its entirety is alleviated. Further, the board determined that including titles in this section will help to provide needed clarity to each class of licensee as to the particular standard that will apply to that licensee. This issue is not presented elsewhere in the rule, so no other use of titles is necessary.

Comment 21. In Section 12, "insure" should replace "ensure" because "insure" is used in the existing rule.

Response: The use of "insure" in the existing rule is incorrect. Accordingly, it is corrected in this rule draft to use the more appropriate term, "ensure."

All other recommendations suggested in the Clearinghouse Report have been accepted in whole.

#### PROPOSED ORDER

The Chiropractic Examining Board proposes an order to amend Chir 5.01 (title), (1)(a), (2)(a) and (b), and (3), 5.02 (1)(a), (c), and (e), and 5.03 (2); to repeal and recreate Chir 5.01 (1)(c), (d), (e), (f), (g), and (h); and to create Chir 5.01 (1g) and (1r), 5.02 (1)(b)(title) and (bm), (2)(am), and (4)(a)5m., relating to continuing education for chiropractors, chiropractic technicians, and chiropractic radiological technicians.

Analysis prepared by the department of regulation and licensing.

#### **ANALYSIS**

#### Statutes interpreted:

Sections 446.01, 446.02, 446.025, 446.026, 446.028, 446.03, 446.04, 446.05, and 446.07, Stats.

#### Statutory authority:

Sections 15.08 (5) (b), 227.11, 446.02) (1) (b), 446.025 (3) (b), 446.026 (3) (b), and 446.028, Stats.

#### Explanation of agency authority:

In 2009 Wis. Act 28, the legislature passed laws regulating chiropractic radiological technicians (CRT's) and chiropractic technicians (CT's), including a requirement that both types of technicians complete continuing education credit hours for biennial certification renewal. The Act charged the chiropractic examining board with certifying CRT's and CT's, and, beyond mandating current proficiency in the use of an automated external defibrillator, authorized the board to write rules related to the administration of the new statutory provisions.

#### Related statutes or rules:

There are no related statutes or rules beyond those referenced above.

#### Plain language analysis:

This proposed rule-making modifies continuing education requirements for license renewal for chiropractors and creates continuing education requirements for chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians.

SECTION 1 amends the title of s. Chir 5.01.

SECTION 2 amends s. Chir 5.01 (1) (a) to change the ending date of a 2 year license registration period.

SECTION 3 repeals s. Chir 5.01 (1) (c) and (d), because pars. (c) and (d) are no longer necessary. Due to the repeal of pars. Chir 5.01 (1) (c) and (d), current pars. Chir 5.01 (1) (e), (f), (g), and (h) are renumbered pars. Chir 5.01 (1) (c), (d), (e), and (f).

SECTION 4 creates s. Chir 5.01 (1g) (a) and (b) which requires chiropractic radiological technicians to complete at least 12 continuing education credit hours during every 2-year registration period ending on December 14 of each even-numbered year. It further provides a CE waiver to chiropractic radiological technicians in the biennium in which they are first certified.

SECTION 5 creates s. Chir 5.01 (1r) (a) and (b). Paragraph which requires chiropractic technicians to complete at least 6 continuing education credit hours during every 2-year registration period ending on December 14 of each even-numbered year. It further provides a CE waiver to chiropractic technicians in the biennium in which they are first certified.

SECTION 6 amends s. Chir 5.01 (2) (a) and (b) to include chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians within the scope of both paragraphs (a) and (b). Paragraph (b) also changes the date on or after which continuing education hours will apply to the preceding licensing biennium.

SECTION 7 amends s. 5.01 (3) to include chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians within its scope.

SECTION 8 adds the title "Chiropractors" to s. Chir 5.02 (1) (b).

SECTION 9 creates s. Chir 5.02 (1) (bm), specifying the subject matter standard for chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technician continuing education programs.

SECTION 10 amends s. Chir 5.02 (1) (c) to include chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians within its scope.

SECTION 11 amends s. Chir 5.02 (1) (e) include chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians in the existing provisions.

SECTION 12 creates s. Chir 5.02 (2) (am) to extend the provisions of 5.02(2) to continuing education programs for chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians

SECTION 13 creates s. Chir 5.02 (4) (a) 5m. to extend the provisions of 5.02(4) (a) to applicants for approval of continuing education programs for chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians.

SECTION 14 amends s. Chir 5.03 (2) to include continuing education programs for chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians within its scope.

SECTION 15 provides that these proposed rules first apply to credential renewal applications submitted on the date the rules take effect.

#### Summary of, and comparison with, existing or proposed federal regulation:

There is no existing or proposed federal regulation addressing the subject matter of this proposed rule-making.

#### Comparison with rules in adjacent states:

#### Illinois:

Illinois does not regulate chiropractic radiological technicians or chiropractic technicians.

#### Iowa:

Iowa does not regulate chiropractic radiological technicians or chiropractic technicians.

#### Michigan:

Michigan does not regulate chiropractic radiological technicians or chiropractic technicians.

#### Minnesota:

Minnesota does not regulate chiropractic radiological technicians or chiropractic technicians.

#### Summary of factual data and analytical methodologies:

The chiropractic examining board used the current continuing education rules governing chiropractors as the basis for the continuing education rules to govern chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians.

The comparison information with the rules in adjacent states was obtained directly from contact with those states and/or a review of their laws. Because Wisconsin is the only jurisdiction regulating chiropractic radiological technicians and chiropractic technicians, the comparison to adjacent states provides no insight.

Analysis and supporting documents used to determine effect on small business or in preparation of economic impact report:

Section 227.137, Stats., requires an "agency" to prepare an economic impact report before submitting the proposed rule-making order to the Wisconsin Legislative Council. The Department of Regulation and Licensing is not included as an "agency" in this section.

#### Anticipated costs incurred by private sector:

The department finds that these proposed rules will have no significant fiscal effect on the private sector.

#### Fiscal estimate:

The department estimates that this rule will require staff time in the Office of Exams, Division of Board Services and Division of Professional Credentialing. The total one-time salary and fringe costs are estimated at \$10,960. The total on-going salary and fringe costs are estimated at \$9,260.

#### Effect on small business:

These proposed rules have been reviewed by the department's Small Business Review Advisory Committee to determine whether the rules will have any significant economic impact on a substantial number of small businesses, as defined in s. 227.114 (1), Stats. The department finds that these proposed rules will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small businesses. Chir 5.01 (1) (a) Every chiropractor shall complete at least 40 continuing education credit hours in approved continuing education programs during each 2 year license registration period ending on January 1 December 14 of each odd numbered even-numbered year, except as specified in s. Chir 3.02 (1) (c).

**SECTION 3**. Chir 5.01 (1) (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and (h) are repealed and recreated to read:

Chir 5.01 (1) (c) The board may grant a waiver, partial waiver or postponement of the continuing education requirements in cases of hardship.

Chir 5.01 (1) (d) Course work completed in pursuit of the educational requirements of ch. Chir 12 may be counted on an hour-for-hour basis.

Chir 5.01 (1) (e) Of the 40 continuing education credit hours in par. (a), a chiropractor holding a nutritional counseling certificate issued under ch. Chir 12 shall complete at least 4 continuing education hours in nutrition.

#### **SECTION 4**. Chir 5.01 (1g) is created to read:

Chir 5.01 (1g) (a) Every chiropractic radiological technician shall complete at least 12 continuing education credit hours in approved continuing education programs during each 2 year certificate registration period ending on December 14 of each even-numbered year. A chiropractic radiological technician who receives an initial certificate during a licensing biennium is not required to satisfy the continuing education requirement from the date of that certificate to the end of that licensing biennium.

(b) The board may grant a waiver, partial waiver or postponement of the continuing education requirements in cases of hardship.

### **SECTION 5**. Chir 5.01 (1r) is created to read:

Chir 5.01 (1r) (a) Every chiropractic technician shall complete at least 6 continuing education credit hours in approved continuing education programs during each 2 year certificate registration period ending on December 14 of each even-numbered year. A chiropractic technician who receives an initial certificate during a licensing biennium is not required to satisfy

the continuing education requirement from the date of that certificate to the end of that licensing biennium.

(b) The board may grant a waiver, partial waiver or postponement of the continuing education requirements in cases of hardship.

SECTION 6. Chir 5.01 (2) (a) and (b) are amended to read:

Chir 5.01 (2) (a) The continuing education credit hours required of a particular chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician as a consequence of a disciplinary proceeding, informal settlement conference, or resolution of an investigation into the conduct or competence of the chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician may not be counted towards the fulfillment of generally applicable continuing education requirements.

(b) If the chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician has failed to meet the license credential renewal requirement during the period, continuing education hours acquired on or after January 1 December 14 of any odd numbered even-numbered year will apply to the preceding period only if the chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician has failed to meet the license credential renewal requirement during that period, and will not apply to any other period or purpose.

## SECTION 7. Chir 5.01 (3) is amended to read:

Chir 5.01(3) To obtain credit for completion of continuing education programs, a chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician shall certify on his or her application for renewal of license registration credential renewal that he or she has completed all continuing education credits as required in this section for the previous 2 year license credential registration period. A chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician shall retain for a minimum period of 4 years, and shall make available to the board or its agent upon request, certificates of attendance issued by the program sponsor for all continuing education programs for which he or she claims credit for purposes of renewal of his or her license registration credential. Chiropractors, chiropractic radiological technicians or chiropractic technicians attending a program for credit shall be present in the room where a program is being presented in order to claim credit. A chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician may claim credit hours for continuing education for which he or she was in actual attendance in the room, except for authorized break periods or to attend to personal hygiene needs.

**SECTION 8**. Chir 5.02 (1) (b) (title) is created to read:

Chir 5.02 (1) (b) Chiropractors.

**SECTION 9.** Chir 5.02 (1) (bm) is created to read:

Chir 5.02 (1) (bm) Chiropractic radiological technician and chiropractic technician. The program subject matter relates to improving the clinical skills of a chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician, as applicable.

# SECTION 10. Chir 5.02 (1) (c) is amended to read:

Chir 5.02 (1) (c) The program sponsor agrees to provide a responsible person to monitor and verify the attendance of each registered chiropractor, chiropractic radiologic technician or chiropractic technician, as applicable, at the program, and the program sponsor agrees to keep the records of attendance for 3 years from the date of the program and to furnish each participant with evidence of having attended the program.

# SECTION 11. Chir 5.02 (1) (e) is amended to read:

Chir 5.02 (1) (e) The program sponsor has reviewed and validated the program's course content to insure its compliance with pars. (b) and (bm).

## SECTION 12. Chir 5.02 (2) (am) is created to read:

Chir 5.02 (2) (am) Continuing education programs may include subject material other than that which relates to improving the clinical skills of a chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician. However, only the parts of the program which relate to improving the clinical skills of a chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician, as applicable, are eligible for credit.

# SECTION 13. Chir 5.02 (4) (a) 5m. is created to read:

Chir 5.02 (4) (a) 5m. Include evidence of the program sponsor's verification showing to the satisfaction of the board that the subject matter relates to improving the clinical skills of a chiropractic radiological technician or a chiropractic technician, as applicable. A detailed course outline or syllabus describing the subject matter of the program, and the amount of time devoted to each section of the outline or syllabus shall be attached to the application.

# SECTION 14. Chir 5.03 (2) is amended to read:

Chir 5.03 (2) The emphasis of the program is on the business, management, or insurance aspects of a chiropractic practice rather than on improving the clinical skills of the chiropractor, chiropractic radiological technician or chiropractic technician, as applicable.
