Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, if a person under age 25 commits a crime for which the maximum imprisonment is six years or less, a court may order at the time of sentencing that the record of the crime and conviction be expunged when the person successfully completes their sentence.

Under this bill, if a court did not, at the time of sentencing, enter an order expunging the record upon successful completion of the sentence, the person may petition the court for expungement any time after ten years have elapsed since completion of the sentence. The bill allows the court to expunge the record upon petition.

Prosecutors do not anticipate any fiscal impact on their offices should this bill be enacted.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

No long-term fiscal impact is expected should this bill be enacted.
